WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETING TUESDAY, AUGUST 17, 2021

Chairman Shiloh Ramos called the meeting of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors to order at 6:00 P.M. from the Sunnyview Expo Center, 500 County Road Y, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an invocation by Supervisor Powers.

CORRESPONDENCE

Clerk Ertmer presented the following "Petition for Zoning Amendment:

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS AND BOARDS

Supervisor Lautenschlager reported that he was appointed to the National Association of Counties (NACo) Health Steering Committee and will serve as the Vice-Chairman of its Long-term Care Subcommittee. He was also reappointed to the NACo Healthy Counties Advisory Board as a Vice-Chairman.

Vice Chairman Egan thanked the Highway Department and County Executive Doemel for their hard work cleaning up storm damage in Waukau so they could hold their annual Children's Day Parade.

Supervisor Binder reported that the county's north-end dog park will be opened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the end of September or beginning of October.

Supervisor Cox reported on his attendance at the July 21 meeting of the Wisconsin Counties Association's (WCA's) Personnel, Finance and County Organization Steering Committee in Stevens Point. At this meeting they reviewed resolutions submitted by Wisconsin counties for presentation at the WCA's annual September conference.

Supervisor Snider also reported on his attendance at the July 21 WCA Personnel, Finance and County Organization Steering Committee meeting. At this meeting, Supervisor Snide challenged the attendees to call federal representatives and ask them to support the Veterans Support and Outreach (CVSO) Act.

Supervisor Norton thanked Executive Doemel, Judge LaKeisha Haase, Supervisors Lautenschlager, Binder and Gordon, as well as, staff from the county's Human Services Department, for making the 4th Annual Winnebago County Wheelchair Wash a success.

Supervisor Norton stated that there is still a vacancy on the county's Aging and Disabilities Resource Center (ADRC) Board. If anyone is interested in serving on the board, they should contact County Executive Doemel's office.

Supervisor Finch thanked everyone who supported the new dog park on the north-end of the county and looks forward to its opening next month.

Supervisor Defferding reported on his attendance at the WCA's Judicial and Public Safety Steering Committee meeting on July 22 in Stevens Point. At that meeting a representative from the State Attorney General's Office explained how COVID has caused a huge backlog in court cases. This backlog is negatively affecting counties' District Attorney's Offices and causing an increasing in expenses. This committee is recommending that counties use "American Rescue Plan Act" (ARPA) funds to help offset these extra costs in District Attorney's offices across the state.

Motion by Supervisor Stafford, seconded by Supervisor Ellis, to approve the proceedings from the July 20, 2021 Winnebago County Board meeting. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Executive Doemel thanked the public for coming to tonight's meeting and expressing their thoughts and concerns about downsizing the county board and other county issues.

Executive Doemel explained that Wisconsin's counties are under a tight redistricting timeline because of actions taken at the state level and Governor Evers. He stated that regardless of why this is happening, the county must keep moving forward and a decision on the size of the county board must be made at tonight's meeting so that supervisory district maps can be drawn by the county's GIS Department.

Executive Doemel explained that, "Resolution No. 196-082021: Authorize Winnebago County to Accept the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds Established by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) in the Amount of \$16,695,459, with Expenditures to be Appropriated at a Future Time," would authorize Winnebago County to accept the money. A committee will then be formed to determine the appropriate way to appropriate these funds.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Ramos reported that all 36 county board supervisors are in attendance at tonight's meeting either inperson, via ZOOM or by telephone.

Chairman Ramos reported that the county's "Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR)" is posted on the county's website. It can be viewed at this link: https://www.co.winnebago.wi.us/finance/comprehensive-annual-financial-reports

Chairman Ramos explained the redistricting timeline and how the county board's meeting schedule has been altered to accommodate it. The board's September 7, 2021 Special Orders meeting will now be held on September 14, 2021. This will be a public information meeting so that the public and the county board can review the proposed maps. Chairman Ramos explained that no action will be taken on the maps at this meeting—it is strictly informational. It will be at the county board's regular meeting on September 21, 2021, when the board will vote to accept one of the maps. That map will then be transmitted to the county's municipalities so they can work on ward boundaries.

Chairman Ramos then explained the format of future county board meetings. He stated that in an effort to make the county board's redistricting meetings accessible to the most people, he has chosen to hold these "hybrid" meetings—in-person and via ZOOM. However, once redistricting has been finalized (perhaps after the September 21, 2021 meeting) he will have the meetings in only one format—in-person or via ZOOM.

COUNTY BOARD SIZE RECOMMENDATION FROM THE JUDICIARY & PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE

Supervisors Schorse and Eisen presented information and explained why the Judiciary & Public Safety Committee (JPS) is recommending that the county board be downsized to 28 members.

Supervisor Schorse began the presentation by explaining that the JPS Committee began working on this issue in the Spring of 2021 with the anticipation that they would have more time and additional meetings to present and explain their findings to the county board and the public. However, the shortened redistricting timeline has forced them to alter their plans and make their one presentation at this meeting.

Supervisor Schorse stated that the recommendation to downsize the board is not because of any political influence at the local, state or federal level; or because of an "urban vs rural" agenda. She stated that smaller boards are common across the State of Wisconsin and the country. The Winnebago County Board remains one of the largest boards in the State of Wisconsin.

Supervisor Schorse presented the history of the JPS Committee's recommendation to downsize the county board to 28 members. She explained that the 1990 "Winnebago County Task Force on Government Efficiency and

Effectiveness" recommended that the board have between 15 and 30 supervisors. In subsequent years, efforts again were made by a citizen group and the board to reduce the board's size. In 2007, the county board reduced their size from 38 to 36 members, in order to thwart the efforts of a citizen group that wanted to downsize the board to 18 members.

Supervisor Schorse encouraged the board to accept the JPS Committee's recommendation and vote to downsize the county board to 28 members.

Supervisor Eisen presented a historic timeline on how county boards were established in Wisconsin. Supervisor Eisen explained that it wasn't until after the county's 1990 "Winnebago County Task Force on Government Efficiency and Effectiveness" recommendation that the county board have between 15 and 30 members, that the county board reduced their size from 45 supervisors to 38.

Supervisor Eisen stated that it was in 2007 when the Citizens United group collected 5,000 signatures on a petition asking that a referendum question on the size of the county board be put on the ballot at the next election. On advice of the Corporation Counsel, the County Clerk did not accept their petition because the county board acted to reduce their size from 38 to 36.

In 2007, the "Temporary Committee on County Board Size" established by then County Board Chairman Albrecht, also recommended that the county board have 28 members.

Supervisor Eisen stated that the JPS Committee has based their recommendation to downsize to 28 on these past recommendations, as well as, the current sizes of county boards in counties with populations similar to Winnebago County.

PUBLIC INFORMATION HEARING ON WINNEBAGO COUNTY REDISTRICTING

Jerry Bougie, Winnebago County Planning and Zoning Director, introduced Adam Dorn, Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Administrator; and Diane Culver, GIS Specialist; who will be the "architects" of the redistricting maps.

Mr. Bougie reiterated that counties and municipalities are under a very tight redistricting timeline to get supervisory district maps drawn and ward boundaries established.

Mr. Bougie reported that, fortunately, the counties did get final census block numbers yesterday, so the GIS Department can begin the process of drawing the maps as soon as tomorrow, if the county board decides on their number of supervisory districts at tonight's meeting.

Mr. Bougie went over the redistricting timeline:

- After tonight's meeting, the GIS Department will create maps from census data.
- September 13 maps are reviewed by the JPS Committee and referred to the county board.
- September 14 Winnebago County Board holds public hearing on proposed maps.
- September 21 Winnebago County Board adopts tentative map to send to the county's municipalities so they can set up their wards.
- October 25 municipalities submit maps with wards back to the county.
- November 16, Winnebago County Board holds public hearing on final map and votes to adopt map.

Following Mr. Bougie's presentation, Chairman Ramos opened the floor for questions and comments from the public and the county board of supervisors.

RESOLUTION NO. 195-082021: Authorize Winnebago County Planning Department to Develop Supervisory Districts based on a County Board Size Comprised of 28 Supervisors

WHEREAS, pursuant to state and federal law, Winnebago County Is required to amend the size of County supervisory districts every ten (10) years to comply with the "equal representation" requirements placed upon local governmental units by the United States Supreme Court; and

WHEREAS, the over-riding objective of the equal representation requirement is the creation of substantial equality of the population in each individual district so that the weight given to the vote of any one citizen is approximately equal to the weight of that of any other citizen in any other supervisory district within the county; and

WHEREAS, actual population figures from the 2020 U.S Census will be provided by the federal government and the State of Wisconsin to Winnebago County by September 2021; and

WHEREAS, once census population figures are provided to Winnebago County, Winnebago County normally has sixty (60) days to forward a preliminary supervisory district plan to cities, villages and towns within Winnebago County; and

WHEREAS, in keeping with the equal representation requirement, it is necessary that the total population of Winnebago County be divided into supervisory districts of approximately equal size; and

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that no district should exceed the quotient of the total population of Winnebago County divided by the number of supervisory districts by more or less than 5%; and

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that it is of the utmost importance that the Winnebago County Planning Department be provided direction immediately in order that it may begin work as soon as possible with regard to drawing new supervisory district boundaries.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby authorizes the Winnebago County Planning Department to draft preliminary County Board Supervisory District boundaries as soon as it is possible based on a county board size comprised of 28 supervisors and that the size of said supervisory districts be within 5% of the quotient of the total population of Winnebago County divided by the number supervisory districts authorized.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that there shall be 28 supervisory districts created within Winnebago County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that there shall be no splitting of census blocks in preparing said supervisory districts.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that natural boundary lines, such as roads, river and streams, shall be used whenever possible in creating supervisory districts and municipal boundaries.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that all districts shall be composed of naturally contiguous territories and shall be designed in a geographically compact manner.

RESOLUTION NO. 196-082021: Authorize Winnebago County to Accept the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds Established by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) in the Amount of \$16,695,459, with Expenditures to be Appropriated at a Future Time

WHEREAS, state, local, territorial and tribal governments have been on the front-lines of responding to the immense public health and economic needs created by the COVID-19 crisis, even as these governments confronted revenue shortfalls during the downturn; and

WHEREAS, to support the immediate pandemic response, bring back jobs, and lay the groundwork for a strong equitable recovery, the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) established the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, designed to deliver \$350 billion to state, local, territorial, and tribal governments to bolster their response to the COVID-19 emergency and its economic impacts; and

WHEREAS, of the \$350 billion earmarked, Winnebago County was allocated \$33,390,918, this amount disbursed in two tranches. The first tranche was received by Winnebago County on May 19, 2021 in the amount of \$16,695,459, the remaining \$16,695,459 tranche will be received by approximately May 19,2022; and

WHEREAS, per the United States Treasury's Interim Final Rule, recipients may use the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds to:

- 1. Support public health expenditures,
- 2. Address negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency,
- 3. Support services to disproportionately impacted communities,
- 4. Provide premium pay for essential workers,
- 5. Invest in water, sewer and broadband infrastructure,
- 6. Replace lost public sector revenue.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby authorizes Winnebago County to accept the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds established by the American Rescue Plan Act in the amount of \$16,695,459, with expenditures to be appropriated at a future time.

RESOLUTION NO. 199-082021: Authorize a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) That Will Provide

Cross-Jurisdictional Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) Using the Integrated Public Alert

Warning System (IPAWS)

WHEREAS, this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) allows jurisdictions to improve their ability to warn the public of emergencies in a timely manner where a multi-jurisdictional impact is likely; and

WHEREAS, this MOU will allow Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) to reach those affected and help to eliminate duplicative or conflicting instructions. Each jurisdiction participating in this MOU can activate the Integrated Public Alert Warning System (IPAWS) in an Emergency; and

WHEREAS, this MOU may be used when there is an incident, other than a weather event, that has occurred in a neighboring jurisdiction, but which may impact an area outside of the incident jurisdiction and the incident may impact the outside jurisdiction within 30 minutes or when back-up alerting is requested; and

WHEREAS, this MOU will allow for back up alerting capabilities to the other participating jurisdictions in the event that the impacted jurisdiction is not able to initiate an alert e.g. system accessibility or failure, time constraints, or other issues that prevent the jurisdiction from issuing an emergency alert message; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby authorizes the Winnebago County Emergency Management Department to enter into this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) which will provided cross-jurisdictional Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) using Integrated Public Alert Warning System (IPAWS) with adjacent counties.

RESOLUTION NO. 204-082021: Support the Commitment to Veterans Support and Outreach (CVSO) Act

WHEREAS, the number of veteran suicides continues to rise nationwide. Approximately fourteen (14) of the twenty (20) veterans who die by suicide each day are not under the care of the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA); and WHEREAS, County Veterans Service Officers (CVSOs) are generally the first point of contact when a veteran transitions from active duty status to civilian life. CVSOs provide assistance on a wide range of benefits, including service-connected benefits, enrollment in the VA health care system, VA home loans, VA education benefits, and assistance with job placement where available; and

WHEREAS, transitioning veterans are not always aware of benefits they may be eligible for, and CVSOs are often the first to inform veterans of these available benefits; and

WHEREAS, CVSOs are employed by counties and are nationally accredited to prepare, present, and prosecute these claims on behalf of veterans; and

WHEREAS, there is no direct federal funding currently available for CVSOs and TVSOs (Tribal Veterans Service Officers); and

WHEREAS, there is legislation currently pending in both houses of Congress, known as the "Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act (SB-2405 / HR 4601), which would authorize the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to enter into contracts with the individual states, or to award grants to states to promote health and wellness, help prevent veteran suicide, and improve outreach to veterans; and

WHEREAS, the CVSO Act would provide for \$50 Million annually for five (5) years to expand outreach and support CVSOs, TVSOs, or similar entities which currently assist veterans in obtaining over \$50 Billion annually; and WHEREAS, Winnebago County has been a front-runner in working with our federal legislators in the development and presentation of said legislation since 2017.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby supports this pending legislation in both houses of Congress, known as the "Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act (SB-2405 / HR 4601) that authorizes the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to enter into contracts or award grants directly to individual states to help prevent suicide, and to promote the health and wellness and improve outreach to veterans.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it directs the Winnebago County Clerk to forward a copy of this Resolution to all other Wisconsin counties, the Winnebago County Veterans Service Officer, all Tribal Veterans Service Officers, the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Veteran Affairs, the National Association of Counties (NACo), Veterans and Military Services Committee, the National Association of County Veterans Service Officers Association of Wisconsin (CVSOA-WI), and the Wisconsin State Association of County Veterans Service Commissions (WSACVSC).
