COUP ROAD IMPROVEMENTS.

Supervisor Lomas submitted the following report, which, on motion, was accepted and referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges:

To the Honorable Board of Superirsors of Winnebago County:

The undersigned J. P. Lomas, Chairman of the town of Menasha, respectfully represent to your body, that in accordance with a certain resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, at its January session, 1893, appropriating the sum of Three Hundred Dollars to the town of Menasha for the purpose of grading and graveling the Coup Road, leading through the east end of said town of Menasha, along the shore of Lake Winnebago, and said money to be expended as aforesaid, under direction of the Chairman of said town; I do therefore most respectfully report that the sum of Two Hundred and Eighty-nine and Fifty-six One Hundredth Bollars have been expended on said road and I herewith present vouchers for said expenditures. The sum of Ten and Forty-four One Hundredth Bollars remaing on hand will be expended for the purpose of grading and graveling a small portion of said road, which requires a culvert and which said culvert will be constructed by the town of Menasha and when completed the Ten and Forty-four One Hundredth Bollars will be expended as a foresaid.

Hundredth Dollars will be expended as aforesaid.

I further report that said road is now in a first class condition and may be said a credit to the town and to the county of Winnebago.

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Superintendent of County Schools Pederson being present read and submitted his annual report as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

It gives me pleasure to be able to state that our schools with but few exceptions continue in a prosperous condition. No interest of a public character has a stronger hold upon the heart of this community than the educational welfare of our children. Amid discouragements that shake the faith in popular government, it is pleasant to know that the most democratic of our institutions is so strongly entrenched in the affections of the people, that nobody dares assail it. At present there seems to be a steadily increasing interest manifested by the parents and patrons of our schools in making our Public Schools more efficient and practical in their results.

The sentiment in favor of a good common school education as a necessary attribute of manhood and womanhood, is certainly not decreasing. Though some districts change teachers as often as possible, many retain the same teachers as long as both parties are satisfied. As long as the present teacher is interested in his work, and makes his labor result beneficially to the pupils, a change on the pretext of economy in the expenditure of money for salary, is fatal folly. Teaching ability is a commodity on the market and is governed by the general laws of trade, and the better the ability the higher the price it demands.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATION.

Care has been exercised in the issuing of certificates; only those known to be thoroughly qualified in both education and ability to teach have been permitted to teach in the better class of schools. A County Superintendent can do more for the schools under his jurisdiction by strictness in the matter of certificates, than in any other way, His knowledge of the schools' needs and the teacher's ability ought to insure a wise choice. A teacher who will do well in one school, may totally fail in another; and district boards do not always discriminate wisely. At the Spring and Autumn Examination (301) applications for certificates were examined. Of this number (192) received certificates, (176) receiving third grade, (14) receiving second grade and (3) first grade.

No teacher's institute has been held this year, on account of the "institute committee" at Madison, being unable to send a conductor. However Two Summer Schools have been held in this county, during this last summer; one at Omro and one at Oshkosh. The one at Omro was held under my direct supervision, and was conducted more for the benefit of the district school teachers. About twenty teachers attended the two schools. These schools have proved themselves to be of great benefit to the teachers in raising their standard of qualification to a very large degree, this was very manifest at this fall's examination, as compared with the Spring Examination held last March. Last spring forty limited certificates were issued, while this fall only eleven limited certificates were issued, notwithstanding the fact, that the standard of qualifications were slightly raised this fall.

VISITATION.

School visitation seems to be the chief duty connected with the Super-intendency. Much of the time during the past year has been occupied with the work. I have visited every school, and expect to have completed a second visit to all the schools by the first of January. While the law requires only one visit annually it is my opinion that a Superintendent should make at least two visits annually in order to do good work. During these visits I have made such snggestions as I thought were practicable. One character of the work has been frequently criticised, viz: a profession for which thorough training is needed and proper financial remumeration made.

ATTENDANCE.

The children of school age number 5,724, of whom 1,800 are not enrolled in the public schools. This seems to be a bad showing as far as attendance goes, indicating that thirty-five per cent. of the children of school age have not attended school at any time during the year. Probably this absenteeism is not so serious a matter after all. There is a good attendance for at least four months in the year, of pupils from five to fifteen years of age, while a comparative small number over fifteen are found enrolled in our district schools. Again while children from four to six years of age draw public money, few in proportion to numbers are enrolled.

Only six under four years of age were registered. Teachers should send such representatives of the nursery kingdom back home with the request to parents to keep them there or send cradles to facilitate business.

HINDRANCES.

There is a false opinion among many parents that unless their children are hurried from book to book, unless they jump from lower to higher, teachers are not properly discharging their duties. They think pupils must go on at a high rate of speed and carry on a long train of studies as a mark of superior ability, never thinking that overtaxing the delicate faculties in process of development tends to nervous prostration, and perhaps a long life of untold miseries. Again parents do not always judge wisely of the efficiency of a teacher. Some really good teachers, because

of sterness and strict sense of justice are underated, while other good natured teachers are estimated above their true value. One very encouraging thing is that the teachers, with but few "exceptions" and these "exceptions" could get married with profit to the district boards, if not to their husbands, try to do well. A strong fraternal feeling exists, and every effort is made to prepare for better and more effective work.

"SCHOOL HOUSES."

Four new school houses have been erected; three are wooden buildings and the other is a brick building located in the village of Omro, this school house is provided with all the latest improvements and is one of the finest buildings in the county. In Nekimi where the new school house was built a new district has been formed which has greatly facilitated school matters in that locality; the other two buildings are located in the towns of Oshkosh and Utica.

The large majority of school houses in this county are in a comparatively good condition. The greatest evil I have noticed pertaining to buildings and school furniture is the utterly repulsive condition of many of the outhouses belonging to the schools. Much has been said and written about this matter, but the general abhorent condition of these outhouses demand that almost any sacrifice be made to save children from the mental and moral degradation incident to daily contact with indecency. Some reform has been made in this direction, but a great deal more is anticipated during ensuing year.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee to whom was instructed the building of Winnebago County's New Asylum, beg leave to report that they have let contracts and authorized expenditures amounting in all to \$55,718.17, this includes the building contract, plumbing, heating, lighting, sewerage, two wells, two pumps, and \$1,500 to the architect.

We are of the opinion that the attic ought to be finished so that it may be utilized for patients and as a measure of economy.

In heating the building the magnitude of the work has called for time and earnest thought which you may appreciate better as you examine closely the details.

Your committee has been conscientious and painstaking and as economical as possible to secure perfect working and finished details in such an institution.

We submit herewith an estimate of the various sums necessary to completely finish and equip the asylum for 200 inmates with a possible capacity of 250, viz.:

ASYLUM LOAN.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

That the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated by Winnebago County to provide for the finishing and furnishing of the Winnebago County Insane Asylum and that certificates of indebtedness or bonds be issued, upon which the amount may be loaned.

Resolved, That the Chairman of the County floard and two members to be appointed by him be constituted a committee to negotiate such loan at a rate of interest not exceeding four pareans.

by him be constituted a committee to negotiate such loan at a rate of interest not ceeding 5 four per cent.

Resolved. That the above loan shall be paid in fifteen equal annual installments, the first being payable April 1, 1895, and one equal annual installment each succeeding year until all are paid, and that Winnebago County shall annually raise by tax on the taxable property of said county, a sum sufficient to pay the interest and principal about to become due, and the County Clerk shall insert the said amounts in the tax roll and the same shall be collected and be applied to the payments of said loan and interest and for no other purpose, and said certificates or bonds shall be payable at the office of the County Treasurer of said County or at such other place as committee may find necessary, and shall be signed by the Chairman and Clerk of said County in their official capacity and under the seal of said County of Winnebago.

Supervisor Loope stated that in order to prepare for the loan being obtained from the state of Wisconsin, he would offer the following resolution in lieu of the resolution just passed:

Whereas, By the provisions of Chapter 167, of the Laws of 1881, and acts amendatory thereof, the Commissioners of the Public Lands of Wisconsin are authorized to invest the trust funds of this state in loans to towns, villages, cities, and counties in this state.

Resolved, That we, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, duly assembled according to law, do hereby approve and authorize application to be made to said Commissioners by the chairman and Clerk of this Board of Supervisors for a loan of twenty-five thousand dollars to this county, said loan to be payable within twenty years, in fifteen equal annual installments of one thousand six hundred dollars and sixty-six cents, each with interest thereon at the rate of four per cent. per annum, payable in advance, from the date of making of the law to the first of next January, and thereafter annually in advance, as provided by law, further

Resolved, That no money obtained by this County by such loan from the state, be applied or paid out for any purpose except the finishing and furnishing of additional County Insane Asylum, without the consent of the Commissioners of the Public Lands, hereafter obtained.

NEKIMI ROAD APPROPRIATION.

Supervisor Abrams offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

That the sum of three hundred dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated to the town of Nekimi, in said county, to be expended by the supervisors of said town for grading and graveling the following road, to-wit: commencing at the intersection of the Waupun road between sections 15 and 16 in said town and running north east of said Waupun road about one and one half miles. Said expenditure to be used exclusively on the said Waupun road described as aforesaid. And the Chairman and Clerk of this Board are hereby instructed and requested to issue a county order in favor of said town of Nekimi for said sum of three hundred dollars, to be expended as aforesaid.

Supervisor Krueger moved to amend by inserting "the said town of Nekimi agrees to provide an equal amount in cash to be expended on said road," Amendment accepted by Supervisor Abrams.

On motion by Supervisor Bushnell the matter was referred to the committee on Roads and Bridges.

BLACK WOLF ROAD APPROPRIATION.

Supervisor Howlett offered the following resolution and moved its adoption.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

That there be and is hereby appropriated the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars road tax to be applied in the town of Black Wolf on what is known as the middle road, commencing at the county line between the counties of Fond du lac and Winnebago; thence northward on said road as far as the said amount shall be sufficient to make a passable road. Also provided that, if the said town of Black Wolf shall refuse or neglect to raise an equal amount as a special tax at the next town meeting, to be applied on the said middle road and shall certify the same to the county clerk, then the said town shall not be entitled to the above appropriation, and be it further

to the above appropriation, and be it further Resolved, That the said money shall be expended by and under the direction of the Supervisors of the town of Black Wolf; and that the county clerk and the Chairman of this Board be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to issue an order on the County Treasurer in the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars in favor of said town of Black Wolf.

On motion by Supervisor Huxley the above resolution was referred to the committee on Roads and Bridges.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: We would represent to your honorable body, that the road leading from Oshkosh to Omro is of great importance to the traveling public as a public highway. That said road is located on low, level and clay lands and with the large amount of travel on said road from the towns of Poygan, Rushford, and Omro it is very expensive to maintain such a highway as the interest of the public demands.

We therefore petition your honorable body, to appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars, for the improvement of said highway, commencing near the bridge across Spring Brook near the house belonging to C. L. Booth on section 15: thence northwesterly to the northwest corner of the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 16; thence west to the northwest corner of said section 16. Provided, that the town of Omro shall provide the same amount in money for the purpose; that six hundred dollars thus raised shall be expended on said highway under the direction and supervision of two commissioners appointed by the county Board and the Supervisors of the town of Omro. And when the money has been expended to the satisfaction of said commissioners and supervisors and they shall certify to the Chairman and Clerk of the county Board that said money has been properly expended, then the Chairman and Clerk shall execute a county order for three hundred dollars in favor of said town of Omro.

We ask that the county be represented in the expenditure of this money, to protect the town from censure in not expending the county appropriation to the best advantage.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

That the sum of three hundred dollars (330.00) be and the same is hereby appropriated to the town of Nekimi in said county to be expended by the Supervisors of said town, for grading and graveling the following roads, to-wit: One road known as the Waupun road, commencing at the intersection of the Waupun road between sections 15 and 16 in said town, thence running northeasterly on said Waupun road about one mile, more or less, and the road commonly called the Oshkosh and Ripon road, from the town line of Nekimi in section 7, to a certain bridge located on said road near the P. A. Cook place, now owned by one Eddy James; said expenditure to be used exclusively on said described roads, to-wit: upon one mile, more or less, of the Waupun road, and upon about half a mile of the Oshkosh and Ripon road; and the Chairman and Clerk of the Board are hereby instructed and requested to issue a county order in favor of said town of Nekimi, for the sum of three hundred dollars, conditionally that said town of Nekimi, in consideration of the appropriation herewith made, appropriate the further sum of three hundred dollars which, in connection with the three hundred dollars appropriated by this board, shall be expended as follows: Four

hundred and fifty dollars therof upon the Waupun road, and one hundred and fifty dollars upon the Ripon road; and the Chairman and Clerk of this Board are hereby further instructed not to issue said order until said improvement has been made to the satisfaction of the Chairman and Clerk.

The Board of Supervisors met in special session, persuant to a call signed by a majority of the members of the Board and a notice issued by the Clerk in conformity with said call.

On roll call the following persons responded: Algoma, Elihu Hall; Black Wolf, Fred Zentner; Clayton, Fred Schultz; Menasha, J. P. Lomas; Neenah, H. E. Huxley; Nekimi, Robert E. Abrams; Nepeuskun, J. A. Fridd; Omro, I. A. Tuttle; Omro village, J. T. Orchard; Oshkosh, J. B. Olcott; Poygan, James Heffron; Rushford, T. E. Loope; Utica, L. J. Miller, Vinland, Wm. H. Jenkyns; Winchester, D. Brightman; Winneconne, P. Vredenburgh; Winneconne village, J. A. Suhl; Wolf River, Fred Krenke; Menasha City. First Ward, A. M. Little; Second, John Schneider; Third, E. L. Mathewson; Fourth, M. M. Schoetz; Oshkosh, First Ward, J. J. Moore; Second, J. F. Wendorf; Third, W. P. Warwick; Fourth, Be J. Daly; Fifth, C. W. Davis; Sixth, J. J. Nigl; Neenah City, First Ward, M. L. Campbell; Second, absent; Third, A. H. F. Krueger; Fourth, John Hunt, Sr. At large, Charles Oellerich.

The members present took and subscribed the oath of office before C. D. Cleveland, County Judge.

Honorable Charles Oellerich, city mayor of Oshkosh, responded to the call issued and informed the board that by the precedent established and by virtue of the authority granted by the legislature he was a member of the County Board and would insist on being recognized as such until otherwise informed.

Mr. Oellerich further stated as he had been informed by the Chairman that the attorney generel held that any act done or resolution passed by the Board for which he, Mr. Oellerich, should cast a vote would invalidate such proceedings, he would retire from the deliberations of the Board and await a decision by legal authority to sustain his right as a member. Mr. Oellerich then retired.

On motion by Mr. Schoetz the Board proceeded to the election of Mr. C. W. Davis as Chairman by acclamation. The Clerk put the motion which resulted in the election of Mr. Davis by a unanimous vote.

Mr. J. T. Orchard from the village of Omro so refrained from voting on all questions and stated to the board as his reasons that he was informed that there was some question as to his right as a member of the Board, and therefore would take no part that would tend to invalidate the proceedings, but, like Mr. Oellerich, would await a legal decision.

The Chairman explained the purpose of the meeting as set forth in the called issued by the County Clerk.

The following resolution was introduced and on call of ayes and nays, adopted by 30 ayes to 1. Paepke absent, and Orchard and Oellerich not voting:

Whereas, By the provisions of chapter one hundred and sixty-seven of the laws of 1881, and acts thereof, the commissioners of public lands of Wisconsin are authorized to invest the trust funds of this state in loans of Towns, Villages, Cities and Counties in the state, as in said acts provided and

Whereas. Every Town. Village, City and County in this state, is empowered to borrow of said commissioners, from said trust funds, such sum or sums of money, for such time and upon such conditions and terms as may be agreed upon by and between the said commissioners and the Town, Village, City or County applying for a loan, subject to the limitations, restrictions, and conditions in said acts set forth; now therefore,

Resolved, That we, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County. Wis., in special session duly assembled according to law, do hereby approve and authorize application to be made to said commissioners by the Chairman of the County and Clerk of this Board, for a loan of \$60,000 to this County, said loan to be payable within twenty years, in fifteen (15) equal annual installments of \$4,000 each, with interest thereon at the rate of 4½ per centum per annum, payable in advance, from the date of of the making of the loan to the first day of per county of next January, and thereafter annually in advance, as provided by law; the first payment of principal July 1, 1898; further

Resolved, That no money obtained by this County, by such loan from the state, be applied or paid out for any purpose except for additional County Insane Asylum for said County without the consent of the commissioners of the public lands, hereafter obtained,

Resolved. That in case the aforesaid application for a loan from the trust funds, shall be approved by the said commissioners of the public lands, that the Chairman of said Board and Clerk for this Country be, and they are hereby fully authorized and empowered, in the name of the Country of Winnebago. Wisconsin, to make, execute and deliver to said commissioners, certificates of indebtedness, in such form as required by said commissioners, for any and all sums of money that may be loaned to said country, pursuant to said application, hereby empowering the said Chairman of this Board and Clerk to do and provide the provisions of said chapter one hundred and sixty-seven, and acts amendatory thereof, and these resolutions:

Resolved. That a certified copy of this preamble and resolutions, and a certificate of the vote by which said preamble and resolutions were adopted, be filed by the Clerk of this County with the secretary of state of the state of Wisconsin.

The Chairman declared the resolution adopted.

Mr. Loope moved that the committee, A. H. F. Krueger, C. W. Davis and E. L. Mathewson to procure funds for the erection of the additional County Insane Asylum be authorized to make such clerical alterations in the resolution for the funds as may be found necessary to obtain such funds.

On call of ayes and nays the motion was adopted by 30 ayes to 1 absent and 2. Orchard and Oellerich not voting.

Minutes of meeting read and approved.

On motion by Mr. Loope the Board adjourned without date.
