Gentlemen:

Whereas, Sec. 674 A, of the Statutes of 1913, provides that the County Board of Supervisors of every County in the State of Wisconsin shall by Ordinance or Resolution provide for one publication of a cer-tified copy of all its proceedings had at any meeting, regular or special, in one or more newspapers published and having a general circulation therein, said publication to be completed within sixty days after the ad-

journment of each session. And
Whereas, The Daaily Northwestern has submitted its proposal in
writing to publish the proceedings of the County Board, as prescribed
by law, immediately after each session for the sum of seven hundred
dollars (\$700.00). regardless of the number of folios. And
Whereas, said offer includes two hundred pamphlets of double col-

#### BRIDGE-BLACK WOLF.

To The Honorable, The Board of Supervisors, of Winnebago County,

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County has voted to construct a bridge, which bridge is known as the Weyerhorst Bridge

and is located in Section 1, in the Town of Black Wolf; and
Whereas, prior to the adoption of the Trunk-Line Highway system
by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, the cost of said bridge should by law be paid one-third by the town of Black Wolf and one-third by Winnebago County, and one-third by the State of Wisconsin; and

Whereas, is was voted to build said bridge prior to the time of the adoption of the trunk line system, and the State of Wisconsin, the County of Winnebago, and the town of Black Wolf each appropriated \$667.50

for the purpose of constructing said bridge, and

Whereas, owing to the increased cost of labor and materials, the cost of constructing said bridge is estimated to be \$3,500, or an additional expense of \$1,500.00; and

Whereas, the said town of Black Wolf has voted and appropriated the sum of five hundred dollars to aid in the completion of said bridge; and

Whereas, the State of Wisconsin has agreed to pay an additional five

hundred dollars toward the completion of said bridge; and Whereas, in addition to said amounts appropriated by the town and by the state, there is required an additional sum of five hundred dollars from Winnebago Couny. Therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that there be and there is hereby appropriated the sum of one thousand dollars, the same to be paid into the prospective County Road and Bridge Fund out of the General Fund for the purpose of constructing said bridge

and to be paid out of any funds not otherwise appropriated.

Five hundred dollars of which shall constitute the share of the State of Wisconsin, the same to be returned to the General Fund of the County of Winnebago when repaid by the State of Wisconsin and if not repaid by the State of Wisconsin to be paid one-half by the County of Winnebago and one-half by the town of Black Wolf the balance of five hundred dollars to be collected and repaid into the General Fund of Winnebago County.

#### NEKIMI BRIDGE, PETITION.

To the Honorable, The Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin. Gentlemen:

The petition of the undersigned Town Board of the Town of Nekimi,

County of Winnebago, Wisconsin, respectfully reports:

That on the 5th day of April, A. D. 1917, at the Annual Town Meeting of said town, the electors thereof voted to construct a bridge, lying wholly within said town and on a public highway, to-wit: on Knapp Street Road, and located between Sections, 10 and 11, in said town, and at the same time appropriated the sum of eight hundred dollars, being one-half of the estimated cost of construction of said bridge as required by law, and that the cost of said bridge is more than two hundred dollars and the estimated cost of said bridge is sixteen hundred dollars that the assessed valuation of said town as equalized by the County Board is \$2,124,500.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that the County Board appropriate eight hundred dollars, with which to pay one-half of the cost of constructing said bridge as required by sec. 1319 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Whereas, There is in process of construction over the Fox river, in the Village of Omro, a bridge, the expense of which must be paid as follows: One-third by the State of Wisconsin, one-third by the County of Winnebago, and the remaining one-third by the Town of Omro and the Village of Omro together; and

Whereas. The funds heretofore raised and appropriated for the purpose of building said Bridge are insufficient to complete the same; and Whereas, There is required for the proper completion of said bridge the total sum of \$2,100.00, one third of which should be paid by the

County of Winnebago; and

Whereas, The Village of Omro and the Town of Omro have at their respective Village and Town Meetings appropriated the sum of \$700.00, to be used in paying one-third of the expense of completing said bridge.

Now therefore, be it Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That there be and there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$1,400.00, the same to be paid into the County Road and Bridge Fund for the purpose of constructing and completing said bridge and to be paid out of any funds not otherwise appropriated as the one-third share of the expense of completing said bridge chargeable to said County.

Seven hundred dollars of which shall constitute the share of the State of Wisconsin, the same to be returned to the General Fund of the County of Winnebago when repaid by the State of Wisconsin and if not repaid by the State of Wisconsin, to be paid one-half by the County of Winnebago and one-half by the Town of Omro and Village of Omro, the balance of seven hundred dollars to be collected and repaid into the General Fund of Winnebago County.

During the past generation there has been a rapid shifting of population from rural districts to the cities. Teachers and parents alike have urged bright pupils to leave the farm and make something of themselves. Little wonder that these young people have felt that there were no opportunities on the farm, but that the cities held bright futures. It has become customary to think of the farm as requiring no particular training, skill or brains; as an occupation for those who have failed at everything else. I believe one of the objects of the rural school should be to counteract this harmful influence and to lead young people to realize that the country today offers greater opportunities to the average boy or girl than can be found in the city. With this idea in mind Harvest Festivals have been held in about thirty of the schools this fall at which there were exhibits of grains, vegetables, poultry and school work. A state institute lecturer on gardening, our local food agent and the food agent of Fond du Lac County, and others interested in bettering farm life have spoken at these meetings. For several years the bankers of Oshkosh have held grain shows in connection with which they have arranged excellent programs for rural school pupils and teachers. These and other influences have, I believe, been very helpful in leading young people to realize that rural life today offers some of the greatest of opportunities.

The text books used in rural schools have always been a mixed lot. They have usually been like those of the nearest city so that surrounding each city or village was a circle of schools which used the same books, which, though, possibly well suited to the city schools, have seldom or never been the best for the rural schools. One can imagine the difficulty of supervising the different subjects in 100 schools where the text books were of many kinds. This condition of affairs was brought to the notice of the school officers a year ago, and at the recent school board convention by an almost unanimous vote the school officers of the county expressed themselves in favor of county uniformity of text books, and elected a committee to select the books. This, I feel, is one of the biggest educational advancements that could possibly come to the rural schools of Winnebago County. Aside from the fact that the children will have the use of well adapted modern text books, they will also secure these books at a considerably lower price and have the privilege of re-selling them at the depositories which will be established at central points in the county.

To a young person taking training to become a teacher much of the professional work is purely theoretical and not fully appreciated. To overcome this difficulty last year members of the senior class of the teachers' training course at Omro and at the Normal School were sent into the rural schools for two weeks or more where they taught classes and had an opportunity to take charge of a school for a time. The benefits of this practical training are already manifest in the work of these students as teachers in the schools of the county this year. It is when a teacher is actually conducting classes that she begins to appreciate the value of definite methods of teaching, and to wish that she might again have the professional training she had at school. In another effort to supply this need I have requested each teacher in the county to read during the year two professional books and to make a written report. The teachers have responded loyally to this suggestion and I feel that much good has come from it.

During the last two years the Winnebago County Teachers' Association has spent \$30 in the purchase of professional books which have been placed in the superintendent's office as a teachers' library. By thus combining their efforts more and better books have been obtained than would have otherwise been possible.

Since the last meeting of this board we have held eight regular teachers' meetings and one three-day institute at each of which we have had some of the best instructors of rural teachers to be found. In these meetings and institutes we have attempted to get away from the old style inspirational meeting and to give the teachers actual definite methods and information which would be immediately helpful in their work.

At the close of the last school year forty-six teachers of the county received special state aid of \$1,521.58 for having taught successfully in the same school district for more than one year, the amount of aid depending upon the length of service. I feel that this aid has been helpful in retaining teachers in the same district and inspiring them to better work.

We are pushing again even more vigorously than last year the training of both teachers and pupils in the rapid muscular movement form of writing. Every teacher in the county who has not received a writing diploma is taking a correspondence course with a well recognized company. Each teacher sends in from one to six sheets of written drills each Friday to the superintendent's office where they are checked over and forwarded to the writing company. There they are carefully criticised and returned directly to the teacher. About twenty of the teachers have received writing diplomas. The emphasis on this subject has seemed to meet with the hearty co-operation of the pupils and parents throughout the county.

A Patron's Day was set aside last year at which time all the parents of the county were invited to visit the schools and see the work of the children. This opportunity was taken advantage of by about 1,000 people.

Following the custom of the last two years the pupils of the various schools tested seen corn in March. Each year a considerable number of farmers have been surprised to find that seed which they had previously thought satisfactory had a low germinating power. These tests have undoubtedly been helpful in preventing the planting of poor seed.

The usual contests in spelling, writing, map drawing, sewing, manual training, bread-making and the declamotory contest were held at the time of the county commencement. Luella Walter of district No. 2 of the Town of Oshkosh, the winner of the arithmetic, writing and spelling

contest in Winnebago County, won the first place in the state contest in

writing, and second place in spelling and in arithmetic

It is quite common in public meetings to find intelligent people who wish to bring up certain matters for consideration unable to do so because of the lack of a knowledge of the simple forms of parliamentary practice. In an effort to overcome this condition each teacher has taken a part of the time set aside for the study of civics and has organized her school for the practice of simple parliamentary rules. The pupils have been very much interested in this subject and many of them have become remarkably proficient.

It is really surprising often times to see the lunches pupils take to school. Quite often they consist very largely of pastry and other sweets at the expense of more nourishing food. When in addition these dinners are eaten with nothing warm the combination is distinctly undesirable. Quite a number of the teachers have during the past and more are planning this year, to serve one warm dish such as cocca, postum or some form of soup at the school house at noon. I am glad to say that with almost no exception the pupils and parents have heartily welcomed this idea where it has been put into practice.

Last spring before the annual school meetings a letter was sent to practically every school district in the county to be read at the annual school meeting suggesting definite improvements for the consideration of the voters. It has been very gratifying to find that in practically every case favorable action was taken on the suggestions given in these letters and appropriations were made for the improvements. This method obviates the difficulty that arises when improvements are requested during the year and school officers naturally are somewhat reluctant to take action without first obtaining the consent of the voters. In a considerable number of the schools of the county the old unsatisfactory school seats and desks have been replaced with single steel adjustable seats. Winnebago County is among the last in the state to make this change, but the districts where new seats were needed most keenly have in most instances been glad to secure the better seats when they realized the need.

By a practically unanimous vote of the electors, Jt. District No. 4 of the Town of Clayton decided to erect a new school building. It was completed and dedicated recently and is of the most modern form. It is provided with a basement in which a furnace is located for the heating and ventilating of the building. The lighting of the room is entirely from the left and the rear to avoid the undesirable cross lights. The steps leading up to the main floor are inside of the building to avoid the possibility of injuring the pupils on icy steps. These advantages together with others make the building especially adapted for its work. This is the third building of this type to be erected during the past two years.

We have not been unaware of the fact that the rural schools might exercise considerable influence during these war times in increasing the production of foods and in conserving what was produced. During the summer the pupils of the schools have, I believe, taken an even greater interest than ever before in the growing of pure bred seeds sent out by the College of Agriculture. The exhibits at the harvest festivals have proven that many of the pupils take a keen interest in the production of good vegetables and grains. Recently, food pledge cards were carried by the rural school pupils to a great majority of the homes in the country. In most sections the response was very satisfactory and will undoubtedly aid in the conservation of wheat and meat.

doubtedly aid in the conservation of wheat and meat.

Throughout the state there is a very favorable sentiment concerning the work of the supervising teachers of whom many counties have two, depending upon the number of schools. I feel that the results have also been very beneficial in Winnebago County, where instead of visiting each teacher once or twice during the year, most of the teachers have been visited three and some four times. During the past year the supervising teacher of this county, Mr. E. E. Robey, made 145 visits to schools besides consulting with many school officers. The total expense for the nine and one-half months work in Winnebago County was \$910.59.

During the past few months we have made somewhat of a study of the advancement of pupils throughout the county as compared with their ages. There appears to be considerable retardation due to several causes among them being irregular attendance, absence from school, physical defects of pupils, short school years, unsatisfactory text books and in some cases unsatisfactory work on the part of the teacher. In Winnebago County seventeen per cent of the pupils are above grade, or ahead of the grade where they should naturally be classed, thirty-four per cent

are normal and forty-nine per cent are below grade. It is surprising to notice in how many schools one finds children in a defective physical condition. The more common defects are adenoids and enlarged tonsils, impaired eye sight, defective teeth and undernourished bodies due to the use of poorly selected food. Of these defects probably the most common is adenoids. It is a matter of common knowledge to physicians and other informed people that adenoids, by shutting off the supply of oxygen absolutely dwarf the minds and bodies of children. Pupils who were apparently hopeless have after the removal of adenoids shown that they were among the brightest in a school. It seems a tragedy to condemn these little folks to lives far below what they might have been in accomplishment, had this acute condition been brought to the attention of the parents, and a slight operation performed. From numerous observations of children suffering from this trouble I would estimate that there are several hundred cases in the rural schools of children who would be greatly benefited by proper medical treatment. Teachers have in many cases done good service in bringing these conditions to the attention of the parents, but too often parents have felt that the teachers were only guessing at the matter and that the conditions were not really serious. This week I visited a school where I had to advise the school ficers to deny the privileges of the school to a boy fourteen years old and in the first grade, who had never been able to make any progress and who had become morally vicious to the other pupils of the school. There are many other cases of pupils who are far below where they should be in their school work because of physical deficiencies. I feel that this condition of affairs is very serious and that it deserves the recognition of this board. In practically every city of at least five or six thousand population and in several of the counties of the state competent school nurses have been employed. The people of these communities have realized very keenly the value of this medical attention to their children, not so much in what the school nurse was able to do directly for them, but in the improvement of conditions by calling the attention of the parents to pupils who deserved medical treatment and in giving advice to parents. Under the rules of the Red Cross if there is a local community nurse in a county the rules of the Red Cross it there is a local community nurse in a county or city, one-half of the proceeds of the sale of Christmas seals shall be given to the support of the local nurse. During the past years hundreds of dollars have been sent out of Winnebago County for the use of the Red Cross and although it has undoubtedly been put to profitable use, still, there is no reason to think that a part of it might not have been just as profitably used in the local community. Money from this source and a small additional amount would be sufficient to employ a competent nurse for at least a part of the year.

Two years ago one of the supervisors asked me to explain the uniformity method of conducting diploma examinations in the various counties. I explained this method at that time, but did not ask for any action by this board as I was not acquainted with conditions in the county and did not know that there was any special need. Since that time I have had considerable experience in conducting these examinations, and I feel that the present system of having each teacher conduct the examinations in her own school is decidedly unsatisfactory for several reasons.

First, I have been surprised to see how the standard of marking papers varies among the various teachers entirely. Some have given passing grades on examinations that were entirely unsatisfactory, while others have marked their pupils' papers very closely or have even placed them lower than seemed fair. It is true that these papers are alk sent to the superintendent's office where they are carefully looked over again, but in order to do this it has meant that the examination must be held considerably earlier in the spring than would be necessary if all of the papers were not to pass through the hands of two or three people. It is human nature for pupils not to take the same interest in subjects after they have taken their final examinations in them and the result has been a lessened effort and poorer work in many schools after the diploma tests.

In conducting the examinations some teachers feel that they can conscientiously answer certain questions with regard to the diploma questions, while others feel that no help must be given to the pupils in the interpretation of the examinations. These variations give some pupils a decided advantage in these examinations and put others at a disadvantage.

In about ninety per cent of the counties of the state the county boards of supervisors have provided for special committees of eight or ten people to work with the county superintendent and supervising teacher in holding the diploma examinations at eight or ten of the more cen-

trally located schools. Each of these examiners has taken all of the papers in a given subject and marked them, assuring absolute fairness throughout the county. The state superintendent very strongly recommends this method of holding the diploma examinations as opposed to having each teacher conduct her own examination. It is only natural that a teacher should wish to have her pupils finish the eighth grade and graduate with honors during her connection with a given school. As a result a certain percentage are given their diplomas before they are really deserving of them. Those of this class which go to high school either hold the classes back or fail altogether and never complete their high school work, whereas had they remained in the rural school a year longer and really earned a diploma they would in the great majority of cases have been able to do satisfactory high school work. This, I believe, is one reason why some definite uniform system of conducting the diploma examinations should be adopted in Winnebago County.

I, therefore, recommend that this board authorize the selection of a reasonable number of competent persons to assist in conducting the diploma examinations and that an appropriation of \$60 be made for this purpose.

Resolution Providing for Federal, State and County Aid Construction. In the Calendar Year 1918,

Supervisor Raddatz offered the following Resolution, No. 22:

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, regularly

assembled, does hereby ordain and resolve, that

Whereas, The State Highway Commission has notified the County Clerk that the sum of Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00), of which this County must provide one-third, will be expended in 1918, under the provisions of Chapter 175, Laws of 1917, for Federal and State Aid road construction on a project beginning at south end of present macadam road in Section 7, Township 17, North of Range 17 East and extending thence southerly about 4½ miles to the south county line at southeast corner of Section 31, Township 17, North Range 17 East and extending along the State Trunk Highway System in a southerly direction the same is hereby approved and the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) is hereby determined as the County's share of the cost of said construction; and,

Whereas, The regulations of the Secretary of Agriculture require that any deficits accurring on Federal Aid projects must be paid by the State or its subdivision and Chapter 175, Laws 1917 contains no provision for payment by the State, the said Board does hereby authorize such deficit to be paid by the County from its emergency fund as herein-

after provided.

Sec. 2. Whereas, The State Highway Commission has notified the County Clerk, that the sum of \$17,230.27 has been allotted to this County

whereas, Chapter 556, Laws of 1917, requires that fifty per cent of the foregoing sum, amounting to \$8,615.13 together with at least one and one-half times this amount of County funds must be expended on the State Trunk System in the County.

There is hereby appropriated under the provisions of Sec. 1317 M-1 to 15 the sum of \$12.922.69 to meet the first fifty per cent of the State Aid allotment to be placed on the State Trunk Highway System, thus making available for this purpose the sum of \$21,537.82, to be expended as follows:

The sum (1,000.00) One Thousand Dollars for constructing and completing the bridge known as the Weyerhorst Bridge, located on the State

Trunk Highway System.

The sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for improving the State Trunk Highway System by completing the road known as the Coupe Road in the Town of Menasha.

The sum of Fourteen Hundred Dollars \$1,400.00) for completing the bridge known as the Omro Bridge, located in the Village of Omro and on

the State Trunk Highway System.

The balance of Eighteen Thousand, Six Hundred and Thirty-Seven Dollars and Eighty-Two Cents (\$18,637.82) for the improvement of that portion of the State Trunk Highway System, beginning at the west line of the town of Neenah in Section 31, Township 19, North of Range 17, E thence South Westerly along said Highway, through the Town of Clayton to the Town Line between the Towns of Clayton and Vinland to Gillinghams corners, thence South on Jackson Street Road as far as may be improved with said amount of money.

And the County Board does hereby determine that the following Municipalities will be benefited by the construction of the State Trunk Highway System planned for 1918, under the provisions of Chapters 175 and 556, Laws of 1917. The Towns of Clayton-Neenah-Vinland-Oshkosh-Black Wolf-Algoma, the Cities of Oshkosh-Neenah-Menasha.

Sec. 3. There is hereby appropriated under the provisions of Sections 1317 M-1 to 1317 M-15, the sum of \$12,922.69, to meet the second fifty per cent of the State Aid allotment to be placed on the County of Frospective Highways in Municipalities not benefited by the construction contemplated on the State Trunk Highway System making a total of \$21,537.82, available for that purpose.

It is hereby ordered and determined that said amount be used for improvements on County system of prospective highways, as follows:

The improvement of the Omro-Waukau Road by grading, draining, graveling, leveling, straightening and improving the same, beginning at the old race of said Road, immediately North of Waukau, there Northeasterly to or toward the 18th Street Road, the sum of Three Thousand Dollars to be used for said purposes including purchase of any necessary lands.

The improvement of the Highway at the Town of Wolf River by constructing a concrete new bridge known as the "Schmidt Bridge" located in the North East quarter of Section 10 and on said highway system the sum of \$650.00 to be used for said purpose.

The improvement of the highway by building a nine-foot concrete roadway in the Town of Winneconne, commencing where the improved roadway ends on the Winneconne-Oshkosh highway east of the Village of Winneconne the sum of \$8,943.91 to be used for said improvement and

the same to extend as far as said amount will build.

The improvement of the highway in the Town of Nekimi to consist of a nine-foot concrete road, the same to begin at the Southerly end of the improved road on the Waupun Road and to extend Southwesterly toward the Fond du Lac line, the sum of \$8,943.91 to be used for said purpose and said improvement to extend as far as said amount will build.

Sec. 4. The said County Board does hereby appropriate the following

sums for the purposes set forth:

1.-For the County's share of the Federal aid improvement as provided in Sec. 1 of this Resolution, the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars.

2.—For the County's share of the State Trunk System improvement as provided in Sec. 2 of this Resolution, the sum of \$12,922.69.

-For the County's share of improvements in municipalities not benefited by Trunk Line improvement as set forth in preceding schedule, the sum of \$12,922.69.

4.-For maintenance of State Trunk Highway System the sum of \$9,806.00, of which amount \$6,806.00 represents the amount allotted to the County under provisions of Sec. 20-04-8 of the Statutes and which amount of \$6,806.00 shall be transferred by the County Treasurer from the County Maintenance Fund until repaid by the State of Wisconsin when the County Treasurer shall re-transfer same to the County Maintenance Fund the balance of \$3,000.00 to be raised by taxation as hereinafter provided.

5.—For Emergency Road and Bridge Fund. (to include right of way on Federal aid work where required and deficits incurred on Federal aid projects) the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00.)

And the County Board does hereby direct that taxes be levied against the several Municipalities hereinafter named for the purposes set forth.

1.—As special benefits to Federal Aid improvement, as provided by Section 1314-6.

Against the Town of Black Wolf the sum of (\$500.00) Five Hundred Dollars per mile for each mile of said Trunk Highway Constructed in said Town.

Against the Town of Menasha the sum of \$100.00 for completion of the Coupe Road.

2.—As special benefit through State Trunk Highway System improvement under Chapter 556, Laws of 1917 (the first fifty per cent of said aid.)

Against the town of Clayton, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), for each mile of road constructed wholly in said town.

Against the Town of Vinland, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per mile for each mile of road constructed wholly in said town.

Against each of the Towns of Clayton and Vinland the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per mile for each mile of road constructed on the town line road between said towns.

3.—As the municipalities' share of cost of improvement on County system of prospective State Highways (last fifty per cent to unite unbenefited by Trunk Line Improvement) under chapter 556 as follows:

Against the Town of Rushford the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each mile of such road constructed in said town.

Against the Town of Winneconne, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each mile of such road constructed in said town.

Against the Town of Nekimi the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each mile of such road constructed in said town.

Against the Town of Wolf River the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) for building Smith's Bridge.

As a State Trunk Highway Maintenance Fund the sum of \$3,000.00 and the County Clerk is hereby directed to place all taxes herein before levied against the County in the County Tax and to certify to all Town,

Village and City Clerks the amounts levied against their respective municipalities. Signed,

# REPORT OF THE SUPERVISING LIBRARIAN.

Miss Rupp offered the following report, No. 44:

To the Board of Libraries of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, for the Period From October 1, 1916, to October 1, 1917.

The annual visits to the stations were made on two days in October. All reports were favorable and all were eager to assume again the responsibility of the care of the Libraries for the coming year.

A group of books shelved in a box, with a glass front, so that all titles might be read, was placed in the library booth at the County Fair.

A map showing the location of the stations was also exhibited.

The number of volumes issued for home use during the last year was 5,354, an increase over last year of 865. The total number of books added was 169, of which two were gifts. The collection now numbers 3,010 volumes. There are fifty-one libraries with forty-five in use at the present time and six in for exchange purposes.

The demand so far has always been greater than the supply and we make the request for the full appropriation in order that two more libraries may be added to the system and the work may be carried on successfully for

another year.

In case such Resolution is adopted, a Supervisor elected to succeed the Chairman shall be designated and elected as Chairman and in case any Supervisor is elected in a year when his term as Supervisor has not expired, his office as Supervisor shall become vacant on the tenth day following his election as Chairman and shall be filled as provided by Law.

Section 3.—This Act shall take effect upon passage and publication. Approved, May 21, 1917.

Bonds and Salaries, 5;

County Abstract and Tract Index System, 3;

Rules. 3:

Education, 3 Sanatorium,

Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly

state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on

any question is a tie it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment above the shall be deemed to have been lost. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the

names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first,

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman shall take

his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the County shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be XVII. entertained except

To adjourn

To lay on the table.

For the previous question.

To postpone to a day certain.

To commit to a committee.

To amend or to substitute. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to XIX. commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the

same shall not be entertained.

When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall

be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present. XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jeffer-son's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.
