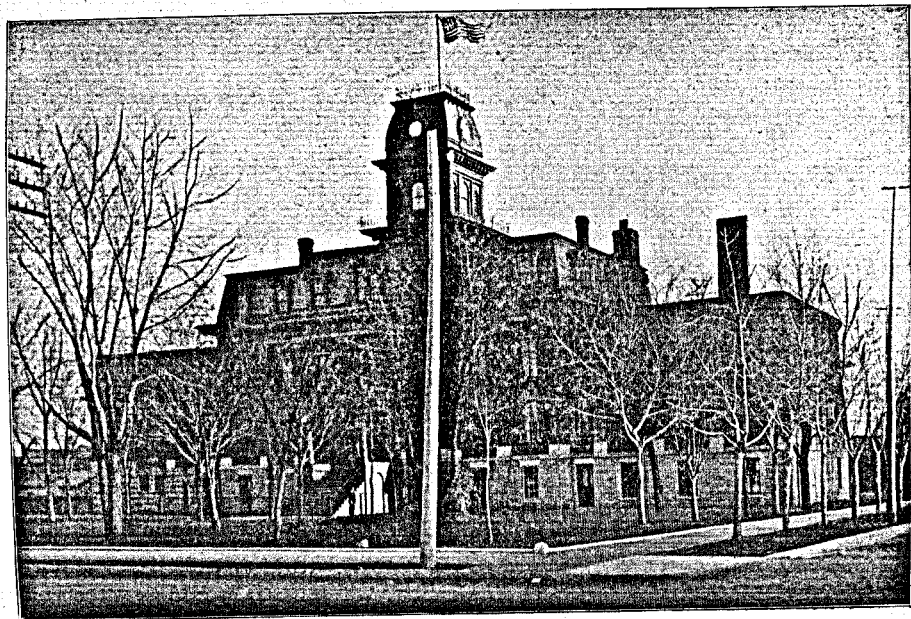

Who, after severally subscribing to the oath of office were duly sworn as such members by C. D. Cleveland, County Judge.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

Chairman Harrington announced that the first order of business would be the election of a Chairman of the Board.

With a few complimentary remarks Supervisor Chase introduced the name of Supervisor John Harrington for renomination for Chairman of the County Board. Chairman Harrington thanked the members for their hearty support, promising them in return the impartial and disinterested rulings in the future as in the past that in his judgment would be for the best interests of the Board and county.

ANNUAL VISIT TO COUNTY ASYLUM AND POOR HOUSE.

Supervisor Chase presented resolution No. 1, as follows:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the

annual visit of this Board, to the County Asylum and Poor Farm, be made the special order for Tuesday, Nov. 20th, and that an invitation is herewith extended to the county officers, including Supt. Abrams of the workhouse, and one representative from each newspaper to accompany said Board as their guests

Also, that the members from the north end of the county, who may so desire, be excused from roll call on the morning of said visit.

Amended to include three assemblymen and senator for this county.

TO NOTIFY SUPERINTENDENT AUSTIN.

Supervisor Pinkerton moved that the clerk be instructed to notify Supt. Austin of the date of the annual visit of the Board.

Which motion prevailed.

TO ELECT OFFICERS.

Supt. Edwards moved that Wednesday, Nov. 21st be named as the date of electing county officers, which motion prevailed.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF COUNTY ASYLUM.

W. W. Noble, trustee of the County Asylum presented and read the annual report of said trustees:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Another fiscal year has rolled around and again we submit our annual report as Trustees of Winnebago County Asylum for the Chronic Insane, for the year beginning October 1, 1899, and ending September 30, 1900.

In our last annual report we predicted that if prices on staple articles of consumption continued to advance it would cost more to meet our obligations than in previous years.

The expected has happened, and our expenses have been slightly higher.

Last year our total current expenses were \$22,480.60. This year they are \$26,555.01, an increase of \$4,074 41. Part of this increase in the expense account is owing to the fact that we have at this writing, coal to the value of \$2,000.00 stored in our new coal shed, (which will be referred to later in this report.)

As will be seen by a reference to the Superintendent's report, there has been furnished, 13083 weeks' board to inmates of the asylum and poorhouse, at a cost of \$1.96 per week, per capita. The increase in the cost per capita, as stated above, is owing to the advance in prices, and the investment in coal.

In our last report, reference was made to the appropriation of \$1,000.00 made by your honorable body March 7, 1899. Up to September 30, 1899, there had been expended \$707.61 of the appropriation.

Since that time, the floors in the poorhouse have been repaired, and a new cement floor put in the laundry. The old wooden floor in the laundry became decayed, and the water necessarily accumulating,

leaked through into the cistern beneath, making the water unfit for use. Following is a statement of accounts audited and paid by order drawn on County Treasurer by County Clerk: (Bills approved are on file with the County Clerk.)

During the winter of 1899 and 1900, it became very apparent to the Trustees, that several improvements should be made about the institution, and in accordance with this view, we petitioned your honorable body for an allowance at the last March session. We thank you for the liberal appropriation of \$2,900.00 made at that time.

One of the improvements long needed, was a partitioning of the dormitories. Until these partitions were put in, the patients of each ward with a few exceptions, occupied the same sleeping apartments; and many times a noisy patient disturbed the whole ward a greater part of the night. Now the noisy patient can be placed alone; and quiet reigns throughout the night in the main dormitory.

Another improvement long contemplated was an enlargement of the patients' dining room, and an addition of a store room on the first floor. Before the diningroom was enlarged the patients were always crowded at meals, and it was decidedly uncomfortable for both patients and attendants.

Several times during the extreme cold in winter our supply of fuel has run very low, and last winter at one time, we were compelled to use boxes and boards for fuel to keep steam in the boilers; while the telephone was in almost constant use by the Superintendent, begging

for coal that had been ordered six weeks in advance, and at one time during a coal famine the railroads confiscated six cars which were being shipped to the asylum. We determined to avoid future difficulty of this kind and have built a coal shed located south of the laundry about 15 feet (and facing the asylum proper) 52x100 feet with a capacity of 500 tons of coal, which is about full at this writing.

April 4, 1900, we advertised for bids on the work above mentioned, and on April 28, 1900, the contract was let to Louis Weber, of Neenah, to do the work as follows:

1st. To put in sixteen dormitory partitions.

2nd. Make addition to dining room 30x40 feet with store room adjoining 23x40 feet. The wall was placed deep enough so that a basement could be made if needed. A basement has since been placed beneath the whole addition

3rd. To build a coal shed 32x100 feet.

Wm. Waters was employed as architect, who drew all the plans and superintended all the work.

The work was completed July 12, 1900. Approved by the architect and we consider it satisfactory in every respect. We invite a careful inspection by you of the improvements thus far completed.

You will notice that the contract price was \$3031.00.

The contractor was also allowed \$24.00 for extra work outside of the contract, which in addition to the advertising fees and architect bill (amounting to \$173.00 as shown by statements) amounts to \$323.00 in excess of the appropriation, for which we drew an asylum order, and placed it in the permanent improvement account.

In the month of March, the reservoir which has supplied the institution with water for several years, suddenly failed and we were compelled to use water from the Northern Hospital for a short time. A well driller was immediately employed and the two old wells were cleaned out and drilled deeper and a new well located about five feet south of the boiler room, was drilled 221 feet deep. The total cost for cleaning out, drilling and piping all the wells was \$418.50. Since that time no further trouble has been experienced from water supply.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of Winnebago County Insane Asylum and Members of the County Board.

GENTLEMEN: I again have the pleasure of presenting you my report as County Physician for the term ending September 30, 1900. I am glad to say that the general health of all inmates of the county

institutions has been excellent. We have had no contagious diseases of any character in any institution. The deaths occurring at the Poor House and County Asylum have been due to a general breaking down and malignant condition incident to old age. The sanitary conditions, food, clothing, etc., of all the institutions have been fully equal to the previous year. I have made two or three calls a week at the County Farm and at the other institutions whenever called and have always found everything in good condition.

The recent ruling of the State Board of Control as to County Physicians, requires of them much more labor and time than in years past. I here quote their instructions:—

Asylum physicians should not be selected and contracts for medical care of the insane awarded upon competitive bids. The trustees should appoint some competent physician and fix his salary. The selection should be made with the care and consideration that might reasonably be expected in the selection of a family physician.

The asylum physician should visit the asylum at least twice in each week. At each visit he is expected in addition to attending to sick inmates to examine the sanitary condition of the asylum and grounds and the condition of the patients, their health, diet, clothing and cleanliness, the work required of them and any other condition affecting their welfare and comfort. He will advise and direct the Superintendent as to which of the patients should be required to labor and the kinds and amount of work each working patient is able to perform. At each visit to the Asylum the physician shall enter in a book, furnished by the Superintendent, the date of his visit, the name and malady of each patient treated by him, the treatment prescribed, and the name of each patient he has advised the Superintendent should not be required to labor. At least once in each month the physician should also enter in said book statements of the sanitary condition of the institution, and the general condition of the patients in respect to the matters herein mentioned. He is invited to enter therein any suggestions he may think proper to make for the improvement of the institution and the promotion of the welfare of the inmates. Such report book should be properly ruled and the required entries affecting individual patients should be made under the following heads:

Patients excused from labor may be named in second column or under the head "Remarks." A separate portion of the book may be set apart for the monthly report above mentioned.

A good many cases have been sent to the Poor House in a bedridden condition, and some surgical cases which were obliged to send to the City hospitals. If the county is to accept such inmates, more hospital provisions should be established for their care and treatment.

I believe the County Board should establish some rules governing the accepting of prisoners into the new jail to prevent the infecting of it as is now the case in the old one. I would suggest that the sheriff be obliged to keep extra clothing to be supplied prisoners on their entrance, that the old clothes be sterilized and given back to them on their departure; that tobacco in all forms be prohibited to prisoners, and such other measures as your committee and county physician may devise for the cleanliness of the jail. We have again escaped any contagious conditions at the work house which is due largely to the care and extreme cleanliness which, under Mr. Abrams prevails there.

Gentlemen, let me again congratulate you for the excellent condition of all your county institutions and thank you for the personal courtesies and good will you have shown me.

SELECT COMMITTEE

Supervisor Harrington presented Report No. 7:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board, and Supervisors Fridd, Pinkerton and Arnemann, who were appointed at the March, 1900, session of this Board, and instructed to visit the State Capital and meet the State Board of Assessment for the purpose of securing a lower assessment for Winnebago county if possible, beg to report as follows:

1. That we visited Madison and met the State Board of Assessment on May 16, 1900, being the date fixed by law for the meeting of the State Board; and also met the Board again on the following day.

2. That we found the prevailing opinion, namely, that this county had been raised one million dollars at the meeting of the State Board of Assessment for 1899 to be an error; but that this county had been raised in fact about \$500,000, and that this was explained by the further fact that the state as a whole had at the same time been raised twenty-five million dollars, and the amount added to this county was intended to be proportionate to the whole increase throughout the state.

3. Your committee further found that our county was in its judgment assessed higher in proportion than surrounding counties in this part of the state. Thus the average rate of farm lands per acre as fixed by the State Board for 1899 was found to be materially higher in our county than in such surrounding counties as Outagamie, Brown, Waupaca, Waushara, Green Lake, Marquette and Adams.

4. Your committee presented arguments showing that while it is probably true that the actual value of farm lands in our county is higher than in the other counties mentioned, yet there is no such difference as that fixed by the State Board of Assessors; and that this county ought in our judgment to be reduced materially to secure a more nearly correct proportion between this and surrounding counties.

5. We received the courteous attention of the State Board and were assured that if our position was found to be correctly taken such a change would be made, as would give us our just share of taxation, and no more.

6. We are informed by the Secretary of State that the assessment of this county for 1899 as fixed by the State Board of Assessors was \$19,571,497.50 and for 1900, \$19,535,936.50 being a reduction of \$35,561; while at the same time the total valuation of the state was increased from six hundred and twenty-five million dollars to six hundred and thirty million dollars, an increase of five million dollars. As a further result our state taxes recently certified to the County Clerk is \$254.47 less than that of a year ago.

7. Your committee is satisfied that its mission has been fairly successful, and the gain which has been secured for the present year will prove to be a like annual gain to us for future years.

REPORT OF WORKHOUSE COMMITTEE.

Supervisor Chase presented Report No. 8:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 260, General Laws of 1895, and amendments thereto, known as the "Workhouse Law," your committee beg leave to submit the following report:

The fruitful results arising from the establishment of a County Workhouse, as has been fully demonstrated by facts and figures in former reports, which do not need repetition at this time, have thoroughly exemplified the wisdom and foresight of the County Board in taking early advantage of the provisions of the aforesaid law. And while the present satisfactory conditions have not been reached by a smooth pathway strewn with cheers and roses, the zealous efforts for success have overcome, after much friction and stern opposition, all besetting obstacles; and we can truly say that this is largely due to the faithful vigilant labors of the committee on Justice and Constable and Sheriff and Coroner's accounts, backed and sustained by the heroic advice and close construction of the Statutory Law, by District Attorney Quatermass, pertaining to the subject matters in hand (See his Report page 81 last published proceedings.) And we also take this occasion to express our appreciation of the emphatic manner in which the Board, one year ago, in accordance therewith

unanimously adopted the recommendations of the Workhouse committee which effectually closed and legally and hermetically sealed, for the time being at least, the avenues by which designing parties sought to again loot the County Treasury of thousands of dollars annually, as they did before the existence of the Workhouse. But it should be steadily borne in mind that present conditions can only exist and the pockets of taxpayers be effectually safeguarded by the continuation of a like or similar policy, thoroughly watched and carefully guarded.

DISCIPLINE, SICKNESS AND SANITATION.

The workhouse, under the firm but humane local management of Mr. and Mrs. Abrams, superintendent and matron, has been very satisfactory during the past year; there have been but few attempts at insubordination and disobedience of the rules, the silent admonition of the dark dungeons doubtless has served as a wholesome restraint, under the guiding hand of Superintendent Abrams. Owing to the complete sanitary conditions at all times, of the apartments, apparel and sleeping hammocks and the enforced cleanliness of inmates, no contagious disease has found a foothold and the limited number of cases of temporary sickness have been promptly and faithfully attended by Doctor Barnett, county physician. No deaths have occurred.

The building was somewhat damaged but no fire ensued and the repairs were satisfactorily made by the Company holding insurance thereon.

REPORT OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

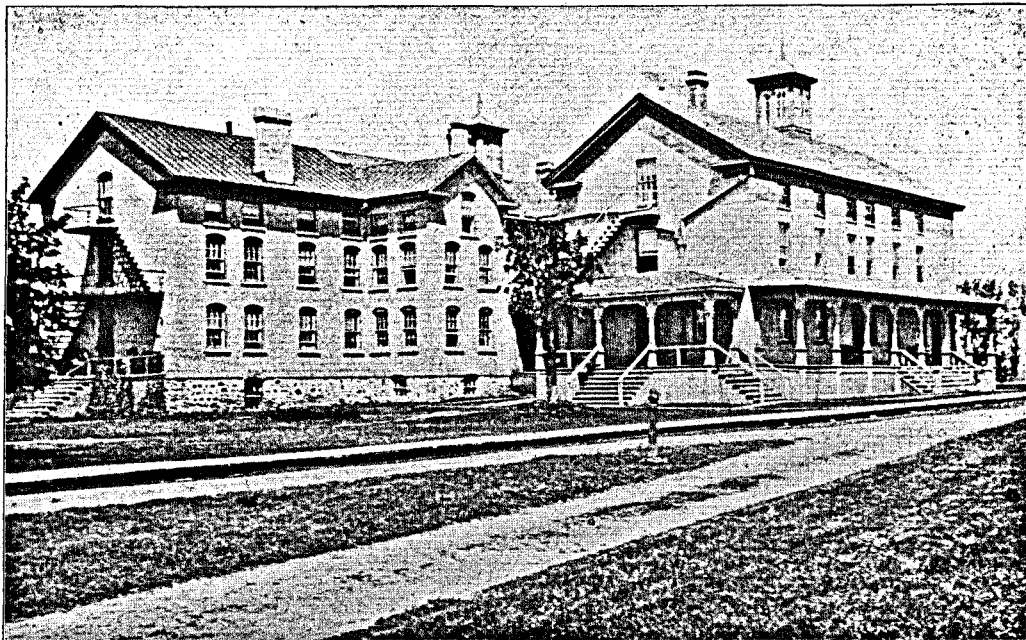
County Superintendent Overton presented his annual report No. 11:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to submit my first annual report. It is with a great deal of pleasure that I am able to announce that the schools of the county are in a fairly prosperous condition.

During the past year no institutes have been held. In consequence the institute fund at my disposal now amounts to \$171.77. The State Superintendent has suggested that the one day institute does not do permanent good in proportion to the expense involved. This has been the experience in this county and such institutes have been discontinued. Short institutes are too apt to develop into mere inspiration meetings, and after the enthusiasm has worn off to leave no impressions that will aid the teacher in his everyday work. No definite plan has yet been made to cover next year's work, nor will one be formulated till after the annual Superintendent's convention to be held next month.

I am very much in favor of a week's meeting during the spring vacation at some point most accessible to all teachers, where under the best conductors to be had, we can do some good hard work in a few definite lines. This work should be done in such a way that the teacher may carry something away that can be used in the schoolroom.

The regular spring and fall examinations were held as usual. The attendance was light at each. Many students at Normal schools took advantage of the provision of law which allows county superintendents to credit their final standings on certificates. We have a number of teachers who are working on state certificates and Normal diplomas, and one who is a college graduate.

At present the majority of the schools do not follow any systematic course of study. A course has been prepared by the state department of public instruction and some attempts have been made to put it into practice, but it has never been adopted and followed to any great extent. The most urgent needs of our county schools are a good course of study and a series of text books that shall be as near uniform as possible, throughout the county. The advantages of this plan are so obvious as to require no discussion. In order to get the best line of books we cannot take the list from any one book company. It will be necessary to choose from the publications of several firms; and when the best has been decided upon and adopted to suffer no change without good and sufficient reason.

In choosing a line I think it advisable to follow as much as is possible the series now in use in some of the best of our schools. We must consider the financial part of the question as it is viewed by the parents, and to work gradually up to a better state rather than to make any sweeping changes.

It is my purpose to raise the standard of qualification of the teachers and to do all in my power to assist them to reach a higher plane than the one upon which they are now working. By this plan the districts will be relieved of having inferior teachers in their employ and better service will be rendered to the schools. As soon as the quality of service is improved the teachers can insist on better wages. The wages at present paid in this county do not allow the better trained teachers to stay with us except in a few isolated cases. Each year some of our best teachers are called to counties where they receive from ten to forty per cent more in wages than is paid here.

Many new and well appointed schoolhouses have been erected during the past few years. We should do all we can through the medium of teachers, parent and school board to have the school room and its surroundings made a pleasant place in which to work. Too often the schoolroom and grounds constitute the most desolate spot in the whole district.

The furniture in many of our buildings is of the crudest kind and it is torture to sit in seats at the desks provided.

Many of our schools observed Arbor and Bird day and 166 trees were planted in the various school grounds. This practice is to be commended; we ought to create and maintain such a spirit that will continue the practice of beautifying the school surroundings throughout the year instead of limiting it to one day.

During the summer vacation agents of a certain firm thoroughly canvassed the county in order to sell a certain chart. This chart was supposed to cover the entire curriculum of the common school. By having it in the schoolroom few text books were to be needed. This was pointed out as a saving to the patrons of the school. Many school boards purchased the chart on the representation that it embodied all these merits. In other districts through a series of misrepresentations the chart was literally forced upon them. This chart cost the district \$37.50 and its actual value as is shown by the use the average teacher can make of it is only about one-fifth of that sum. In another district a man who is widely known in this county sold the district a dictionary for \$10.50 which the state department furnishes for \$7.50.

These are not the only instances where inferior or useless articles have been sold to school districts by unprincipled agents. Money so spent not only deprives the schools of necessary apparatus at the time, but it makes the taxpayer overcautious about voting money for supplies that are absolutely necessary to the good condition of the school in the future. In conclusion I will say that under the present system it is nearly impossible for a superintendent to so supervise the schools that they will derive the most benefit. The district to be covered is so large, the schools are so many that the time the superintendent can spend in any school is necessarily limited. But it is my purpose to visit each school not only as often as the law requires, but as much oftener as is possible for me to do.

Be it Resolved, That our Chairman appoint a committee to investigate, in conjunction with our County Superintendent, a system for his closer supervision, that is at this meeting desired, to be placed before the Board for consideration and report their decision after careful investigation, to this Board for its approval.

The resolution was adopted

The Chairman appointed a special committee as per resolution No. 13, Supervisors Fridd, Appley, Tipler, O'Brien and Manuel.

Supervisor Arnemaun made verbal report that the Register of Probate had made complaint of the heating in his office and informed the Board that in his, Arnemann's opinion, that by placing another radiator in said office it would keep the office in a comfortable condition.

Supervisor Kenney moved that the building committee be instructed to place and connect another radiator in the Register of Probate's office.

The motion was carried.

Supervisor Pinkerton moved that this Board set Tuesday, Nov. 27th as the day of final adjournment.

The motion was carried.

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That, the County Clerk be and is hereby instructed to employ such help as he may deem necessary to make out the tax warrant to the several cities and towns of the county, and help in other necessary work to be done before the first Monday in January 1901, at a cost not to exceed Fifty dollars; and that the Chairman and Clerk of this Board be authorized to draw order for said amount out of the general fund.

APPROPRIATION TO BUILD A BARN ON THE COUNTY FARM.

Supervisor Edwards, chairman of the committee on Poor and Poor Farm, presented Resolution No. 15, and moved its adoption.

WHEREAS, It is necessary to make certain improvements in the farm buildings on the County Poor Farm of Winnebago county, and

WHEREAS, The Trustees of the County Asylum of said county suggested in a communication to the County Board of Supervisors March 7, 1900, that the present buildings on said County Farm are inadequate for the proper storing of hay, grain and fodder raised on said farm, and the housing of cattle thereon, and

WHEREAS, A barn 40 feet by 120 ft with basement, would meet the needs of said farm for storing hay and fodder, and house the cattle and have a root cellar, therefore be it

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That, there is hereby appropriated the sum of Three Thousand (\$3000) dollars for the purpose of erecting a new barn, with basement and root cellar, on the County Poor Farm of Winnebago county; and be it further

Resolved, That the report of Special Committee on improvements of buildings on County Poor Farm, March 9, 1900 and also the report of Special Committee pertaining to joining two barns, 40 by 60 feet, together on said farm with an appropriation of Fifteen Hundred (\$1500) dollars, and all the motions and resolutions therewith connected are hereby rescinded.

CONTRACT WITH SHERIFF POTTER.

Supervisor Ganzer, chairman of committee on Bonds and Salaries, presented Report No. 13:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Your Committee on Bonds and Salaries submitted the following report of a contract entered into with Sheriff Eugene A. Potter, for the Board of prisoners as following:

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

This agreement made this.....by and between the county of Winnebago and Eugene A. Potter, sheriff elect. The said Eugene A. Potter does, for in consideration of a certain sum hereinafter mentioned, agree to board and wash and mend for all prisoners whomay be confined in the jail of Winnebago county, and to furnish good wholesome and well prepared food in sufficient quantity for the sum of three dollars and twenty-five cents per week of twenty-one meals, and all parts of the weeks or days the board to be computed on the same basis of twenty-one meals to make a week's board, and in no case to charge for more meals than are actually furnished; and said Eugene A. Potter agrees to keep the register so as to show the hours of taking in and out of prisoners.

It is further agreed that no bills shall be presented to the County Board for articles used in the preparation of food for said prisoners nor in doing the mending and washing for the same.

And it is further agreed by and between said county of Winnebago and said Eugene A. Potter, that said county of Winnebago shall provide and furnish all heat and light for said jail and sheriff's residence including fuel for cooking purposes for said jail and residence.

For and in consideration of the faithful performance of above agreement by said Eugene A. Potter, the County of Winnebago agrees to cause to be paid to said Eugene A. Potter, the sum of three dollars and twenty-five cents per week as above stated.

The minority report No. 18 was the cause of a somewhat lengthy and animated discussion taken part in by Supervisors Chase, Fridd, Hamilton, Mayher and others.

The motion was lost.

Supervisor Hamilton presented Report No. 19 and moved its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that they have examined and considered the several petitions, referred to them for cancellation of certain tax certificates and other matters and recommend as follows, to-wit:

The petition of L. G. Arnold for cancellation of tax certificates No. 176 and 177, sale of 1892, of lots 8 and 9 in block 76 in Gott & Reed and Eighthmes addition in the 4th ward of the city of Oshkosh, for the reason that said lots were, at the time they were assessed, owned and used by the "Ladies Aid Society, used for charitable purposes" and therefore not taxable. After careful examination your Committee find the allegations of the petitioner substantially correct; and that said lots at the time they were assessed were owned and used by the

organization now known as the "Ladies Home" and deeded on May 4, 1899 to the "Ladies Benevolent Society," and used by said society, a charitable institution, and was exempt from taxation at the time it was assessed in 1891. And had the petitioner presented it in proper time he would have had a right to have it cancelled, but there is an insuperable objection to granting this now. These certificates purport to have been assigned by the county May 27, 1892, more than seven years before his presentation thereof to this Board for cancellation. Section 1185 of R. S. provides that every claim against the county for the recovery of money on account of any defective or void tax certificate must be presented within six years after the sale and assignment of said certificate by the county. This petition or claim having been presented more than seven years after the assignment of said certificate by the county, your Committee regret that they are compelled to recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be not granted and that said certificate be *not cancelled*

The petition of N. A. Greenlaw for cancellation of tax certificate No. 34, sale of 1897, of a piece of land lying in the E $\frac{1}{4}$ of NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 36, T. 18 of R. 16, for the reason "that said land is a part of Winnebago Lake." From the best information we can get and examination of maps, your Committee believe that the allegations in the petition are true and the whole eighty in which said piece of land lies is east of the meandered lines of Lake Winnebago. Your Committee therefore recommend that said certificate be cancelled and that said petitioner upon delivering of said certificate to be cancelled be paid the amount paid therefor with interest at 7 per cent. as follows, to-wit:

From the best information your Committee has been able to get from abstracts of title and other sources, they believe the allegations of petition are true, and that said certificates, except No. 257, are illegal and they therefore recommend that they be cancelled and that said L. G. Arnold, the owner and petitioner, be paid back the amount he paid therefor with interest at 7 per cent. from date of sale upon his surrendering said certificates for cancellation as follows, to-wit:

And that when so paid the sum be charged back to the City of Oshkosh.

We further report that we believe that certificate No. 257 is a legal certificate as not all of Lot 8, Block 6 covered by it, is used for R. R. purposes; and that the right of way is excepted in the description and therefore recommend that said certificate be not cancelled.

We find referred to this Committee a resolution purporting to have been adopted by the Common Council of the city of Oshkosh providing for a compromise and settlement of a special sewer tax against the property of E. M. Clough, which said tax was returned unpaid to Winnebago county and said property sold by the county and authorizing the proper officers of the city to enter into an agreement with the county by which the redemption receipts were to be given for said tax and the amount of tax to be charged back to said city, and also an agreement signed by the officials of said city and county, reciting that the controversy between said city and the said Emma F. Clough in relation to said tax; and that said matter had been settled and compromised and authorizing the County Clerk and County Treasurer to issue redemption receipts for such special improvement taxes which were returned, and deliver said redemption receipts to R. A. Spink, city treasurer.

We have no doubt but that this compromise was a wise and proper thing to do and recommend that the action of the county officers therein be approved, and that the agreement be carried out and performed and the amount of said tax charged back to said city.

Your Committee further report that they have considered the account of E. W. Thomas for examining tax certificates and the title to the land described therein and recommend that said account be allowed at three dollars.

Your Committee further report that they have had before them again the petition of M. M. Schoetz for cancellation of seven certificates for the reason that the tax had been paid and the lands afterwards returned delinquent to and sold by the county. We reported at the March session of this Board that after diligent search we were unable to find satisfactory evidence of such payments but recommended that said petition be laid over to this session to enable petitioner to furnish evidence of such payment. This we have not received but recommend laying over to the January session to give petitioner further opportunity to furnish such evidence.

Your Committee further report that they have had before them six petitions by the C. & N. W. R. R. Co., and one by the C. M. & St. Paul R. R. Co., for cancellation of certificates on lots owned by them and used for R. R. purposes and had prepared a report thereon when the attorney of petitioner informed this committee that they desired to be heard thereon and requested that said petition be laid over to the January session for that purpose. We therefore ask leave to lay said petition over to the January session.

The Committee, in making this report desire to call specially the attention of the Board to the above claims and why such claims are allowed and disallowed as above set forth. The claim of the city of Neenah for Forty-seven and Fifty Hundredths (\$47.50) Dollars that was disallowed was a duplicate of the claim of the same amount that was allowed. It will further be observed that the city of Menasha, and the village of Winneconne and Omro have presented no such claims before the Board. The nature of the claims will appear from their various headings, that of the city of Oshkosh is as follows: "Bill for meals furnished for lodgers at city lockup from November 1, 1899, to October 31, 1900." One of the claims of the city of Neenah reads as follows: "Meals furnished tramps or lodgers not taken before the court." The other claims of the city of Neenah have headings substantially the same. The claims of the city of Neenah set forth the names of the persons furnished meals while that of the city of Oshkosh does not. Your Committee has examined the above claims and finds substantially the same state of affairs in the two cities. It appears that along towards evening and in the evening persons apply to the police departments of the two cities for lodging over the night and meals. These persons are accommodated, and are given supper, and breakfast for which twenty-five cents each are charged up to the county. In the morning instead of taking these people before a court to determine whether they are tramps or not, the chiefs of police send the men on their way rejoicing. During the year the city of Neenah accommodated 268 such persons, and the city of Oshkosh 334. The total number so accommodated by the two cities is 602, and the total amount charged up against the county is \$151.75. It appeared to the committee that the chiefs of police of the two cities acted in good faith, and for that reason the committee recommended the allowance of the claims, although advised by the District Attorney that the county was not legally liable for such claims. It was urged by the two chiefs of police that the method followed was a saving to the county, for if the persons so lodged had been taken before a court,

the expense to the county would, for justice and officer's fees, be so much the greater. Your Committee recognize the force of this argument, yet it is inclined to think that if the lodgers had been taken before a court to determine whether they were tramps or not, there would not be so many tramps in the county, and in the end the expense to the county would be no greater. We do not impugn the motives of the two chiefs of police, but we do question their wisdom. In order to obtain the opinion of the County Board upon this matter, your committee offers the following resolution:

Resolved. By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That, it will not allow in the future claims from cities, towns or villages for meals furnished tramps or lodgers that are not taken before a court.

GENTLEMEN: Your Special Committee to whom was referred the memorial from Dodge county, relative to certain changes in the game laws of Wisconsin, beg leave to report that they have unanimously agreed upon the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Senators and Members of Assembly of Wisconsin, and especially those representing Winnebago county, be and are hereby requested to use all honorable means to secure legislation amending Chapter 287 of the laws of 1899 so that the shooting of wild aquatic fowl (excepting mallard, teal, woodduck, pintail and pigeon) be authorized and permitted during the spring of the year, providing the sale or offering for sale of the same be prohibited, and that the transportation by any common carrier of the same shall be illegal. And further providing that any person may have in his possession at any one time, but a limited number of such water-fowl.

Be it further Resolved, That the above mentioned members of the legislature, be and hereby are requested to use all honorable means to secure the repeal of that part of the game laws of Wisconsin prohibiting the shooting or taking of wild aquatic fowl in open water so far as its application to the Fox river and its tributaries are concerned.

And that a duly authenticated copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the Assembly, and each of the representatives of Winnebago county.

The Board of Supervisors met in the Supervisors' room, pursuant to adjournment, Jan. 8, 1901, at 10 o'clock a. m., Chairman Harrington presiding.

The full Board, which was present, was called to order by the Chairman who in a few well chosen words wished the members a Happy New Year, and closed by introducing County Clerk J. J. Fish.

**SUPERINTENDENT OF POOR FARM TO CHARGE TOWNS AND VILLAGES
FOR MAINTENANCE OF POOR**

Supervisor Mayher introduced Resolution No. 1 and moved its adoption. Accepted and adopted as follows:

Resolved. By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the Superintendent of the Poor Farm of Winnebago county, be and he is hereby instructed to charge against different towns, villages and cities in said county, who have inmates in the County Poor House and for whose board and maintenance said towns, villages and cities are now charged, with all items of clothing and funeral expenses furnished said inmates for which the county is liable. That the said Superintendent report the cost of such clothing and funeral expenses, and the amount properly chargeable against each town, village and city, in his annual report to this Board, and that the same constitute a proper charge against said town, village or city, the same as board and maintenance is now a proper charge.

Be it further Resolved, That this resolution take effect Oct. 1, 1900.

Be it further Resolved, That the County Clerk is hereby instructed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the said Superintendent forthwith.

Supervisor Edwards presented the following Report No. 1, on visit of Committee to Industrial and Reformatory schools, which was accepted and adopted:

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO VISIT INDUSTRIAL AND REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Special Committee, to whom was referred the matter of examining into the condition of children from this county confined in the Wisconsin Industrial School for Girls, the Boys' Home Industrial School, and the Good Shepherd Industrial School, beg leave to report as follows: That on the 20th and 21st days of December, 1900, we visited said Industrial and Reformatory Institutions, all of said schools being located in the city of Milwaukee, or just outside the city limits. We made an effort to meet personally all the Winnebago county children confined in these institutions and succeeded in meeting and conversing with all but one. We were informed that the particular one not seen was confined to her room at the time, and we were satisfied that if we insisted we could also have seen her.

At the Wisconsin Industrial School for Girls there were during the year beginning Nov. 1, 1899, and ending Nov. 1, 1900, twenty-two (22) inmates, only one of whom was taken in during the year. Of these nine were discharged or paroled and one escaped. One was paroled since Nov. 1, 1900, and one was taken in; so that we found twelve inmates belonging to this county at the time of our visit. Of these three or four will reach their majority each year so that in a couple of years but few of those now detained will remain.

At the Good Shepherd Industrial School we found three inmates belonging to this county. There were none discharged or paroled nor none taken in during the year.

At the Boys' Home Industrial School there is but one inmate belonging to this county, a little fellow of about nine years of age who has been there since he was two years old. This institution is not a reformatory, but a benevolent institution, where dependent children are taken and kept, educated and trained, until the ages of 13 or 14 years when homes are found for them, usually among farmers; at that age they are able to earn their living and usually something more, which is saved for them until they reach the age of twenty-one.

The Good Shepherd School is also a benevolent institution, devoted to bringing up and educating dependent children, but having a separate reformatory department. The inmates of the two departments seem to be kept entirely separate at all times. This is also true of the Wisconsin Industrial School for Girls. All of these institutions

appear to be well kept, neat and orderly, pleasantly situated and among pleasant surroundings. The inmates are cheerful and industrious, and appear to enjoy general good health, to be well fed, and comfortably and neatly, but plainly clothed. They are taught the usual educational branches, and show average intelligence, and seem to make progress corresponding fairly well with children of similar ages outside. They are also given light work, from which they receive some industrial training; and the girls are taught housework, cooking, laundry work, plain and fancy sewing, and fancy work. Your Committee examined some beautiful samples of lace, drawn work, and other fancy work produced by the inmates. The general atmosphere of these institutions is healthful and homelike. Good feeling seems to prevail among the inmates and their instructors and managers, nevertheless it is not difficult to detect the fact that most of them are anxiously awaiting the arrival of the time when they may bid farewell to their present surroundings, and mingle again with the world.

It is probably true, as has been charged, that the managers of these institutions are somewhat loth to parole the inmates; but it also appears to be true that their experience with those who have been paroled has not been encouraging. The Matron of one of the schools stated that a majority of those paroled fell back into their evil ways, and that the same is true of a large number of those kept until they reached their twenty-first year; that one of the important services of such institutions is prevention of the evil which would come from such persons being at large among society. This of course refers to those committed as incorrigibles, and not to the dependents, who are usually taken while mere children, and who are kept separate from the others. It may be added that the number paroled looks large upon the reports in comparison with those discharged at the expiration of their sentence, but it appears to be the habit of the managements to parole many inmates a short time before their sentence would otherwise have expired. The reason is not clear, but perhaps it is found beneficial both to the inmates and to the institutions. In a general way your Committee would say that the institutions are more homelike than we expected to find them; and in appearance, to a visitor at least, there is little about them to suggest the idea of a prison or of prison life.

Our recommendations, if we may offer any, are that our magistrates exercise great care to the end that young people be not committed to these institutions unless upon the clearest evidence of their being incorrigible; that so far as possible dependent children should be placed in the hands of those persons and institutions that secure them immediate homes in families, and especially that the utmost strictness should be exercised in the examination of officers' fees for services in connection with such cases, to the end that they may re-

ceive no encouragement to cultivate as an industry the ferreting out and picking up of such cases, with an eye rather to the fees than to the well-being of either the child or the community. We suggest that no such commitments should be allowed by justices, judges, or court commissioners, but only by Courts of Record in open court; and the law should be changed so that the order of commitment might be modified or revoked at any time thereafter by the same court for good cause shown. And we suggest further that no accounts for maintenance should be allowed until there is first submitted to the county board a certificate showing the name, age, residence, and ground of commitment of each such person, with a reasonably full statement of the circumstances; the name of the committing magistrate; of the person making the complaint; of the parents and their circumstances; and such other information as will constitute a fairly complete history of the case; the same to be filed and preserved by the County Clerk until the final discharge of such person.

Your committee further report that a great improvement has taken place in the past several years in respect to the number of such children confined from this county, and the expense to the tax payers of the same, as will be shown by the following table, showing the amounts paid to these institutions annually since 1893:

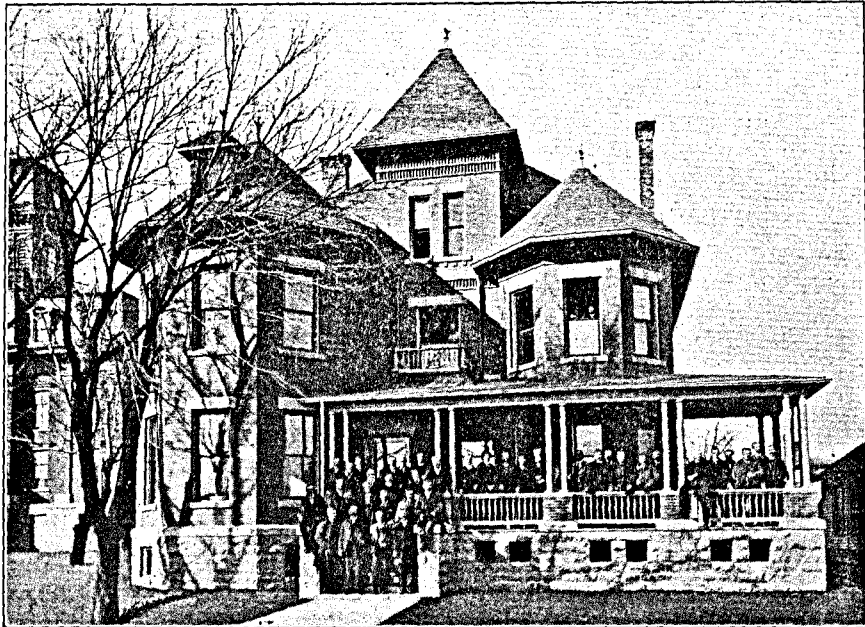

WEDNESDAY—SECOND DAY.

SUPERVISORS' ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS.,

Jan. 9, 1901, 9 o'clock A. M.

The Board of Supervisors met in the Supervisors' room pursuant to adjournment, Jan. 9, 1901, at 10 o'clock a. m., Chairman Harrington presiding.

The full Board which was present, was called to order by the Chairman.

Supervisor Arnemann introduced Resolution No. 2:

WHEREAS, At the January session of this Board, a report offered by a Special

Committee was unanimously agreed to, containing a resolution in part as follows:

Resolved 1. That we favor an inheritance tax law similar to that of Illinois.

2. That land and the buildings and improvements thereon be assessed separately.

3. Recognizing the fact that money, mortgages, notes, and certain other forms of personal property largely escape taxation, we recommend the exemption from taxation of the following items of personal property when owned by a person having a family dependent upon him for support, to-wit: One working team with harness, two cows, one wagon, one sleigh, one plow, one harrow, one seeder, one binder, one mower, and the tools and implements of a workman, mechanic, or other person used in his business, not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) in value.

4. That electric light and power plants, gas plants, water works, telephone plants and electric railways be assessed locally, and in the usual manner as other property, and that the franchises thereof be assessed separately; now therefore

Be it Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That, we continue to favor and support the provisions of the above resolution, and to advocate the same; that we hereby respectfully memorialize the state legislature at its coming session, to enact laws in accordance with said resolution. That the State Senator and Members of Assembly from this county, and the Wisconsin State Tax Commission be provided with copies of these resolutions by the Chairman of this Board, and that said officers be urged to use all honorable means toward securing the legislation indicated herein.

Dated at Oshkosh, Wis., January 8, 1901.

Supervisor Mayher moved an amendment.

The amendment was adopted.

Remarks by the Chairman, Supervisors Armington and Babcock on the resolution which was then adopted.

Supervisor Arnemann presented the following Report, No. 5, of Building Committee:

REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Building Committee to whom was referred the matter of the erection and completion of a new jail and sheriff's residence for Winnebago county, beg leave to report on said matter as follows: That for many years the old jail in the basement of the Court House was inconvenient, and inadequate for the needs of the county; and that it had on several occasions been examined and informally declared by the State Board of Control to be dark, damp and unhealthy, and unsuitable for the purposes of a county jail; that the Chairman, the Building Committee, and other members of the County Board were informally given to understand that a new jail must be erected, or that the old jail would be condemned and all prisoners ordered confined elsewhere at the expense of the county.

At the March, 1899 session of the County Board, a report recommending the erection of a suitable jail and sheriff's residence was adopted unanimously. At the same session a resolution was adopted instructing the Committee on Public Buildings to proceed and re-

ceive plans and specifications for the erection of a jail and sheriff's residence at a cost not to exceed Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000), and to select plans therefor suitable to the needs of the county. At the same session a resolution was adopted authorizing the Chairman and County Treasurer to borrow not to exceed \$25,000 for the purpose of erecting said jail and sheriff's residence.

On the 2d day of May, 1899, the County Board met in special session pursuant to call of a majority of the members, and was duly organized. At said special session the Committee on Public Buildings reported that in pursuance of the resolution adopted at the March session, they had accepted plans submitted by the Champion Iron Co., of Kenton, Ohio, and had accepted the bid of that Company to complete said building for the sum of \$21,982 subject to the approval of the Board.

That at said special session a resolution was adopted approving said plans, specifications, and bid of the Champion Iron Company, and instructing, authorizing and empowering said committee on Public Buildings to proceed and secure the erection, construction and completion of said jail and sheriff's residence in accordance with said plans and specifications as nearly as practicable; to execute all necessary contracts therefor and supervise the performance of the same; and said committee was vested with plenary power to carry out the purposes of the resolution.

Said Committee was also authorized to employ a competent superintendent at wages not to exceed \$3.50 per day.

The County Treasurer and Chairman were authorized to borrow the necessary money for said work; and the Clerk and Chairman were authorized to draw orders for the payment of the same.

At said special session a resolution was also adopted authorizing the purchase of the land upon which the new jail now stands for the sum of \$2,800, said lot having a frontage upon Ceape street of 60 feet, and a depth of about 210 feet.

Your Committee have to report that said lot was purchased in accordance with said resolution, for the sum of \$2,800. That the buildings were sold off said land for the sum of \$292.50, leaving the net cost of the land to the county \$2,507.50.

Your Committee further report that the Chairman and Treasurer, on the first day of July, 1899, borrowed \$22,000 from the South Side Exchange Bank of Oshkosh, on the notes of the county, payable as follows: \$2,000 April 1, 1900; \$5,000 April 1, 1901; \$5,000 April 1, 1902; \$5,000 April 1, 1903; \$5,000 April 1, 1904, with interest at the rate of three per cent per annum.

Your Committee further report that on the 3d day of May, 1899, a contract was entered into with the Champion Iron Company to build said jail and sheriff's residence, said building to be completed on the first day of November, 1899, and a surety bond in the sum of \$10,000

was taken from said Company for the faithful performance of said contract.

It was decided by the Committee to place the building upon the newly purchased lot and to set it forty feet from the street and twelve feet from the east line of said lot. Wm. C. Klapproth, of Oshkosh, was appointed Superintendent to supervise the construction of said building, and the actual work of construction was begun on the 15th day of August, 1899.

It was found, as the work proceeded, that a number of changes, alterations, and additions, to the plans and specifications were desirable and necessary to secure a durable, well constructed, and modern building, and to avoid the greater expense of repairs and alterations in the future.

Your Committee further report that they accepted the jail and sheriff's residence from the Champion Iron Company on the 28th day of November, 1900, and immediately thereupon took possession in behalf of the county.

Your Committee further wish to express the opinion that the county is fortunate in having let the contract for their new jail and sheriff's residence when they did, for the reason that immediately afterward a great advance took place in the price of all kinds of building material, and also in the cost of labor, so much so that had the con-

tract been postponed for a year or even for six months it is probable that the cost of building would have been from \$5,000 to \$8,000 greater to the county.

The cost of extras has been greater than your Committee anticipated, partly because of increased prices for materials and labor already referred to, and partly because the committee had not employed an expert architect before the selection of the plans and specifications, and had overlooked defects which were later found when work was in progress. Other changes were made because your committee considered the value much greater than the cost, with a view to a modern and durable building. All alterations and changes were made, and all extra expense incurred, as the substantially unanimous action of your committee.

There has been much delay in completing the building, which has been attributed by the contractors to the difficulty and great delay in securing material, especially iron and steel work. The building was not completed and in readiness for use until thirteen months after the time fixed by the contract. In our final settlement with the Champion Iron Co., your committee decided that the county was not entitled to punitive damages for delay; but that the county was entitled to actual damages, which were amicably adjusted and settled at \$514.69 as specified herein above, and allowed by the Company upon final settlement.

Your Committee feel justified in the opinion that Winnebago county has now as good a jail and sheriff's residence as any in the state, sufficient for the needs of the county, we hope, for many years. A modern and fire proof jail, an up to date residence, a building well and substantially constructed, well lighted, well heated, and well ventilated, healthful and pleasant for the inmates, a credit to the county, and an ornament to the city of Oshkosh. We hope it will endure until the higher civilization arrives, when jails shall be no more, and crime shall be unknown.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

TUESDAY—FIRST DAY.

SUPERVISORS' ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS.,
March 12, 1901, 10 o'clock A. M.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment, Chairman Harrington presiding.

Present—Full Board except Supervisor Hamilton.

Supervisor Arnemann reported Supervisor Hamilton as very ill, and Chairman Harrington announced that Supervisor Hamilton would be excused from the session.

Accounts presented and referred to appropriate committees.

Chairman Harrington named Supervisor Atwood and Pride as members of the same committees as were Supervisors Babcock and Gallingier (resigned) whom they succeed.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Accounts presented and referred to appropriate committees.

Supervisor Edwards read the report of Committee of Poor and Poor Farm, No. 1, and moved the adoption of the same.

BARN AT POOR FARM.

Partial report of the committee on Poor and Poor Farm on new barn to be constructed on the Poor Farm of Winnebago county.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Poor and Poor Farm with Superintendent A. C. Austin of the County Farm, beg leave to report that in pursuance to a resolution, No. 18, introduced by Supervisor Arne-mann and adopted by this Board on the 27th day of November, 1900, authorizing said committee to select plans and specifications and receive bids and proceed to secure the erection and construction of a new barn with basement on the County Farm of Winnebago county, at a cost not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.)

Your Committee adopted plans, specifications and details for building said barn, furnished to said committee by Supervisor Beduhn.

Your Committee on the 19th day of January, 1901, advertised for bids in various newspapers in this county, for furnishing all materials and building said barn on County Farm, and on the 4th day of February, 1901, received and opened all bids for building said barn. All bids were rejected by your committee for the reason that none came within the amount of the appropriation allowed by the County Board.

Your Committee on the 4th day of January, 1901, advertised, the second time for bids as before, and on the 15th day of February, 1901, received and opened all bids, and on the 2d day of March, 1901, awarded the contract as follows: The carpenter work to Fred Radtke of the city of Oshkosh for \$1,788; the mason work to Anton Nielsen of the city of Neenah for \$1,205.50; total amount of contracts \$2,993.50. Each contractor furnished bonds with two sureties, in the sums of \$1,500 and \$1,000 respectively for the full performance of said contracts, according to the plans, specifications and details. Said bonds were approved by your committee.

All bonds and contracts executed were prepared and examined by the District Attorney.

Your Committee further reports that all bids, contracts, plans, specifications and details, connected with the building of said barn on the County Farm are on file in the office of the County Clerk of Winnebago county.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

WHEREAS, on the 26th day of November, 1900, the County Board adopted a resolution, No. 17, appropriating the sum of \$3,000 to build a new barn on the County Poor Farm, and

WHEREAS, On the 27th day of November, 1900, the County Board by resolution No. 18, authorized the committee on Poor and Poor Farm, with Superintendent A. C. Austin of the County Farm, to adopt plans and specifications for building said

barn, and authorized said committee to enter into and execute contracts for same, and

WHEREAS, Said committee have adopted plans and specifications and entered into and executed contracts for said barn; now therefore

Be it Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That, the County Clerk and the Chairman of the County Board of Winnebago county, issue orders to pay for the construction and erection of said barn on County Poor Farm of said county, upon certificates therefor issued and signed by the chairman of the committee on Poor and Poor Farm and two other members of said committee.

Supervisor Fieweger moved that P. V. Lawson be permitted to address the Board on the subject of Traveling Libraries for the county.

The motion was carried.

Mr. Publius V. Lawson, president of the Fox River Valley Library Association then appeared before the Board and spoke as follows:

Mr. Chairman, Friends and Neighbors:

I have been requested to talk to this honorable body upon the subject of traveling libraries and their official establishment by the Board for this county. Of libraries in the cities we are quite familiar. The magnificent library here in Oshkosh bounteously serves the people of this city. Last month they gave out 9,500 volumes, with only 8,000 books available for use, thus showing the same books read again and again. The city of Neenah has 8,000 volumes, splendidly served to its good people from the rooms in their city hall. The city of Menasha with its fine library building filled with precious books, does the best for the city boy and girl.

But what of the country boy and girl. What are we doing for them? Some have provided traveling libraries. These have been put out here and there solely by private subscription; in this way, over 230 have been placed in this state. There are none now in Winnebago county, though there has been fifteen distributed over the northern part of the county. These were put out by Elisha D. Smith, of Menasha, under his own care and expense. They contained 750 books. The private philanthropy which places traveling libraries is very good in itself, but not destined to be permanent, as illustrated by this splendid effort of Mr. Smith. After the people of the county began to enjoy and profit by this fine set of libraries, they were withdrawn from circulation upon his death, with no provision for their mainten-

ance, mostly occasioned because there was then no legally constituted body to whom he could bequeath them.

It may be best for me to explain the meaning of traveling libraries. About fifty suitable books with magazines and pictures are put up in a box with handles on it and a locked cover; a convenient location is found for them easy of access by the community, and in three or four months the case is returned and a new one taken out; in this manner they are said to travel and become a stream of sunlight through the county, distributing their gladsoe rays of pleasure and profit into every home. These libraries cost about fifty dollars each.

Now this winter the legislature have passed an act, which the assembly without objection and even by suspension of the rules unanimously endorsed, authorizing counties to establish traveling libraries, appropriate money therefor and receive donations and appoint Boards of libraries to administer. This gives to the country people through its County Board, the same library facilities that the city has through its council, and gives the boy in the rural district the splendid opportunity to obtain books which the city boy has. In other words it gives the boy a chance. It also furnishes a means of making permanent those donations of some splendid people who love to do good with their wealth.

I will not occupy your valuable time upon the benefits of reading books and access to them. We all remember too well how we loved books and suffered for the want of them in younger days, and want our children to have these things which we could not get. Abraham Lincoln walked one hundred miles to borrow a book. The books published today, upon all the subjects of science, history and art are written in popular style, beautifully illustrated and at reasonable cost. It is a crime not to furnish them to the rising generation.

I would suggest you refer the subject to a committee for early report. For obvious reasons it is urgent to take action at this term.

Supervisor Pinkerton moved that a special committee of five be appointed to confer with Mr. Lawson as to what action was necessary and to report at once.

The motion was carried.

Chairman Harrington appointed Supervisors Pinkerton, Fridd, Rosenkranz, Forrest and Root as such committee with request to report at next meeting.

Supervisor Edwards moved that the communication of Norman Lillie be referred to Indigent Soldiers' Commission.

The motion was carried and so referred

Supervisor Arnemann spoke regarding some improvements and repairs in the County Clerk's office.

A motion to refer to Building Committee was amended to allow Mr. Riggs to address the Board. After remarks by Mr. Riggs the matter was referred to Committee on Public Buildings.

The motion was carried.

PRIMARY ELECTION BILL.

Supervisor Schneider presented Resolution No. 1:

WHEREAS, The "Stevens Primary Election Bill" is now pending before the legislature of the State of Wisconsin, and

WHEREAS, Said bill is revolutionary in its tendency, and would be cumbersome and expensive in operation and under the forms of the law, would create a party machine of unexampled power, and where there are many candidates for a single office, or in case of candidates for state offices practically unknown to most of the people of this state, the bill would be indecisive of the will of the people, inasmuch as a majority of the voters of either party are not required in making a nomination for any particular office. Therefore

Be it Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That we are opposed to the "Steven's Primary Election Bill" and we ask that the members of the legislature, from this county, vote against said bill.

Supervisor Chase moved that consideration of the same be made a special order for 10 a. m., the 15th.

The motion was carried.

TO ABATE TAX.

Supervisor Edwards offered the following Resolution No. 2, and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, The laws of the State of Wisconsin provide that all property, personal and real, owned by any Agricultural Society and used exclusively for holding agricultural fairs shall be exempt from taxation, and

WHEREAS, The fair ground property in the city of Oshkosh, owned by the Stock Growers Association was used for the year 1900 exclusively for the purposes of holding an agricultural fair, and the said property was also taxed contrary to the provisions of the statutes which said tax now remains unpaid; and

WHEREAS, The Winnebago Agricultural and Horticultural Society had the use of said property last year for its fair free of charge and are desirous of procuring the same this season and the existence of said tax standing upon the records against the Stock Growers Association, until it can go properly before the committee on Illegal Assessments next fall, may seriously interfere with the arrangements for procuring the use of the property this season for the fair.

Therefore, Be it Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the Treasurer, Clerk and Register of Deeds for said Winnebago county be and are hereby duly authorized and fully empowered to abate said tax of 1900, or otherwise release the Stock Growers Association from the payment of the same, provided the city of Oshkosh shall at the same time by its duly authorized officers, take similar act in duly releasing the said county of Winnebago from any and all liability to the said city of Oshkosh for its portion of said tax.

WHEREAS, The County Board of Winnebago County on the 13th day of March, 1900, did upon the petition of one W. W. Quatermass cancel certain certificates to-wit: No. 44, No. 46, No. 47, No. 49, all of the taxes of 1895 and sale of 1896, and No. 591 of the sale of 1899, being a resale of No. 48, of sale of 1896;

WHEREAS, According to the report of the committee on Illegal Assessments of said Board, it appears that said taxes had been paid to said county of Winnebago, and that said county of Winnebago had received the money therefor, and that no re-payment can be had from the county of Winnebago by said W. W. Quatermass or any other person; therefore

Resolved, That the County Clerk of said Winnebago county be, and he is hereby directed to draw a county order in favor of the town of Rushford, to the amount of \$21 44, which said amount has been heretofore, by mistake, charged back against the said town of Rushford.

TRAVELING LIBRARIES.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Special Committee, to whom was referred the subject of traveling libraries and the advisability of our county taking action in this matter, beg to report that we have read the bill now pending before the state legislature which authorizes County Boards to take charge of traveling libraries for their respective counties, under the supervision and control of a committee of five called a Board of Libraries; and after carefully considering same together with the needs and advantage derived by our county from the promotion of traveling libraries for the various districts not accessible to the several city libraries, and believing it to be a movement of substantial benefit to our county, we beg to report favorably on the same, and submit the following resolution:

WHEREAS, There is now pending before the State legislature, a bill providing for a law to authorize the establishment of county traveling libraries, and providing for a Board of Libraries consisting of five directors to be appointed by the County Board, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That, such traveling libraries shall be established in this county as soon as such bill becomes a law, and that the following directors thereof be appointed as a Board of Libraries, to-wit: P. V. Lawson, R. E. Root, Miss Lillian Kimball, L. E. Scott, Mrs. L. E. Chapelle. Said directors to hold their office until the annual session of this Board to be held in the month of November, 1901; and

Be it further Resolved, That there be appropriated out of the county funds not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars, to be used by said Board for the purchase and establishment of a system of traveling libraries for Winnebago county.

This resolution to take effect and be in force after the passage and publication of said bill.

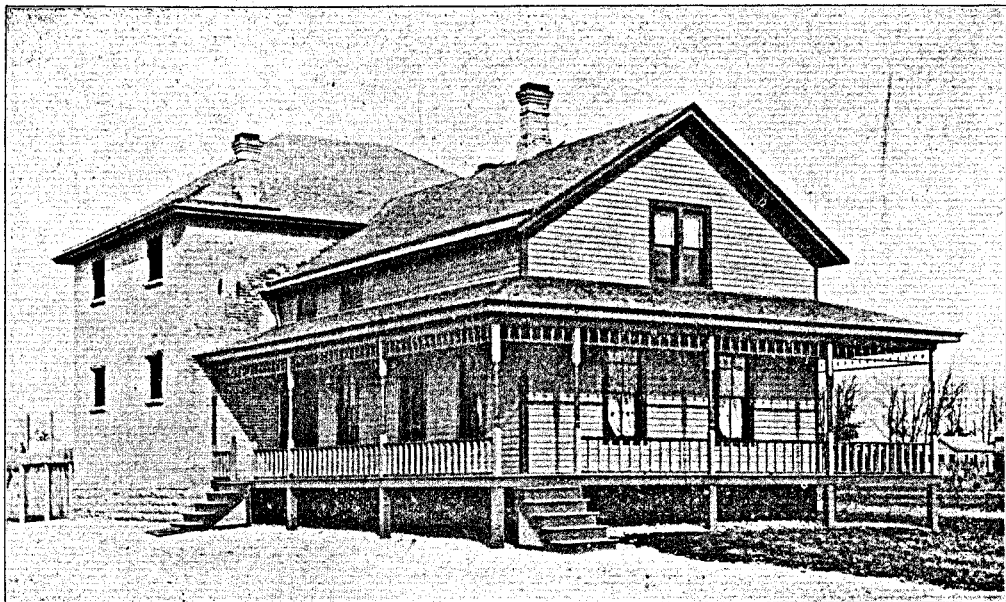

Supervisor Armington, acting chairman of Illegal Assessments Committee, presented the following Report No. 5, and moved its adoption.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report they have examined the following bills, referred to them, and recommend that they be allowed, disallowed or disposed of as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

Dated Oshkosh, March 15, 1901.

The petition of Chicago N. W. R. Co. for cancellation of certificates No. 306 sale 1896, certificate No. 305 sale 1898, certificate No. 312 sale 1899, and certificate No. 222 sale 1900, all of which certificates cover lots 1, 2, 9 and 10 in block 24, in the city of Oshkosh, for the reason that the several lots named in said certificates are owned and used by said Railroad Company for railroad purposes. Very likely the allegations of the petitioner are true, if so, evidently the certificates are illegal. But we have not deemed it necessary to verify it for the reason that this is a petition of the owner of the lots only and not accompanied with the consent of the owner of the certificates. The petition itself alleges that the certificates purport to grant to the owner or holder thereof, the right to a deed in fee simple to said premises in case said certificates are not redeemed within three years from date thereof. This Board is not a court of equity with power and jurisdiction to summon all parties interested before it. So long as the holder of the certificate chooses to insist upon the performance of the contract by the county, we believe the county have no right to repudiate it upon the request of the owner of the lots, only. We therefore recommend that the prayer of the petition be *refused*.

Another petition of the C. & N. W. Railway Company for cancellation of certificate No. 307 sale 1896, No. 307 sale 1898, No. 304 sale 1899, No. 308 sale 1896, No. 364 sale 1897, No. 308 sale 1898, No. 315 sale of 1899 all of which it is alleged cover lots 22, 23 and 24 for the alleged reason that said lots are owned by said Railway Company who is the petitioner. This petition like the one last above passed upon is made by the owner of said lots only and until the petitions can get the consent of the owner of said certificates or the owners thereof petition for the same reasons there given, we are compelled to recommend that the cancellation of these certificates on this petition be *refused*.

Another petition of C. & N. W. Railway Company for cancellation of certificates No. 522, 523, 644, 645, 646 and 647 sale of 1894, covering lots

44, 45, 42, 43 in block 12, 2d ward, city of Menasha, and certificate No. 398, 399, sale of 1895, covering lots 44 and 45, block 12, two of same lots and certificate No. 122 and 123, said block 12, sale of 1896. Also certificate No. 192 sale of 1897, covering said lot 42, No. 193, 194, 195, 196, 197, all sale of 1897, covering lots 43, 44, 45 and 46 all in said block 12, city of Menasha. Also certificates No. 104, 105, 106 and 107, all sale of 1898, covering said lots 44, 45, 46 and 47, all in said block 12. Also certificates No 150, 151, 152 and 153, sale of 1894, covering said lots 44, 45, 46 and 47 in said block 12, all in the city of Menasha, for the alleged reason that all of said lots are and were owned and used by said Railway Company for R. R. purposes, and therefore exempt from taxation. It will be observed that this petition is made by the lot owners only. But these same certificates, with others, were before us last year on the petition of Mr. Schoetz who claimed to be the owner of them, and asked that they be cancelled for the same reasons (and others) that the Railway Company now ask for their cancellation. Mr. Schoetz's petition has disappeared from the files, but these certificates remain. If we assume from these facts that the owners of these lots, asking for cancellation of these certificates, and the owner of the certificates consenting thereto are before us, there is another unsurmountable objection to granting the prayer of this petition, and that is, in considering the petition of Mr. Schoetz after carefully examining maps and making a personal view of the lots and railroad track, we then came to the conclusion that no part of either of said lots which were used by said Company for railroad purposes, were assessed, and that only that part of each of said lots not used for railroad purposes were assessed, and that your committee then concluded that said lots were properly assessed and the certificates legal; and therefore recommend that said certificates be not cancelled, which report was adopted by this Board. We see no reason for changing our then reported opinion or judgment, and still believe said certificates to be legal, we again recommend that the prayer of said petition be denied and said certificates be *not cancelled*.

Another petition of C. & N. W. Railway Company for cancellation of certificate No. 325 sale of 1897 covering lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 of block C, western addition, City of Oshkosh, for the reason that said lots are owned and occupied by said Railway Company. This is another petition by the owner of said lots only and for reasons above herein given unless the consent of the owner of said certificate for the cancellation thereof appears, the prayer of this petition must be denied.

Also another petition of said C. & N. W. Railway Company for cancellation of certificate No. 266 sale of 1898, and No. 266 sale of 1899, covering the same lots, to-wit: Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 of block C, western addition City of Oshkosh, for the same reasons to-wit that said lots are owned by said Railway Company and used for railroad purposes.

At the meeting of the County Board of Winnebago County held in March, 1901, it was voted to establish a County Board of Libraries, and to appropriate five hundred dollars to purchase books for traveling libraries, to be circulated among the farmers and villages of the county. The members of the Board of Libraries have been appointed by the Chairman of the County Board as follows: Mr. P. V. Lawson, of Menasha; Mr. L. E. Scott, of Neenah; Mr. R. E. Root, of Omro; Mrs. Jennie Chapelle, of Eureka; Miss Lillian G. Kimball, of Oshkosh.

Immediately after the appointment of the members of the Board of Libraries, the heirs of the late Hon. E. D. Smith placed at the disposal of the Board fifteen traveling libraries of fifty volumes each. At the first meeting of the Board, April 10, 1901, it was voted by the Board to expend four hundred dollars at once in the purchase of books to constitute eight additional libraries.

It is the wish of the members of the Board of Libraries to make these traveling libraries of the utmost possible use to the people of Winnebago County, and still to secure good care of the books. Each traveling library will remain in a community six months, and then be exchanged by the board for another.

To secure the regular visits of these traveling libraries, the people of a community must organize a local library association, or establish a permanent public library under the State law. In case a local library association is organized, it must consist of at least ten adult citizens of the county, and they must elect a secretary to act for them in dealing with the Board of Libraries. They shall also elect a librarian, though the secretary may act as librarian. The secretary and at least nine other adult members, or the officers of a permanent free public library shall sign an application promising:

1. To pay the expenses of the transportation of these libraries from and to Oshkosh, and to provide a suitable place to keep and shelve them.

2. That the books of these libraries shall be loaned without charge to any persons in the county who will observe the rules laid down by the Board of Libraries

3. That the association will be responsible for the safe return of the books of the library, in good condition except for unavoidable wear and tear.

The libraries will be sent by freight or delivered to an agent of the local library association. The Board will generally be able to send a small box of magazines with each library, if the association desires them. These magazines may be freely loaned to do the most good, but need not be returned to the Board of Libraries.

All inquiries concerning libraries should be addressed to Miss Emily Turner, Public Library, Oshkosh, who has been elected by the Board as supervising librarian.

FREE TRAVELING LIBRARIES OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

RULES FOR BORROWERS.

Borrowers.—Adults are entitled to draw books by filling out an application blank. Minors must obtain the signature of a responsible person.

Borrower's Card.—Each person entitled to draw books from the library will be given a card which must be presented whenever a book is taken, returned or renewed. If this card is lost a new one will be given after seven days' notice.

Number of Volumes.—One volume may be drawn at a time on one card.

Time Kept.—Any book may be kept two weeks and once renewed for the same time.

Fines.—A fine of one cent a day shall be paid for each book kept overtime, and any money thus received shall be used by the secretary of the local library association for library expenses. No book shall be lent to any one to whom a book or an unpaid fine is charged.

Reserved.—A reader wishing a book not on the shelves may have it reserved for him at least 48 hours, by giving notice to the librarian.

Injuries.—The pages of these books must not be marked and librarians are required to collect fines for injuries beyond reasonable wear. Such fines will be returned with the library to the supervising librarian.

RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD.

ADOPTED NOV. 13, 1900.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constables' Accounts, Sheriff and Coroners' Accounts, Insane, Poor and Poor Farm, Work House, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings Printing, Per Diem and Mileage, Bonds and Salaries.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of Standing Committees.
4. Reports of Select Committees.
5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by five members; and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. Infilling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

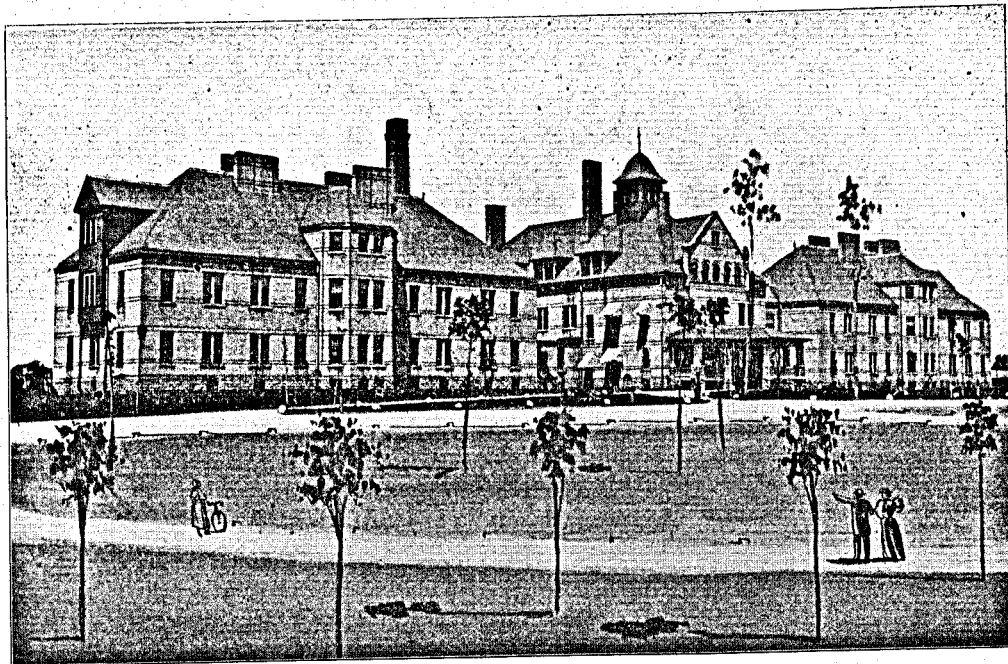
