- This month the FoodWis team is working on Virtual Cooking Matters Lessons. The lessons are virtual and are open to WIC participants in the COWW counties. A lot has been put into these lessons from state meetings, video recordings, closed captioning and much more. There are two lessons that will be shared a few times. The lessons are called Keep Calm and Cook On.
- FoodWIse has finished up with the Mapping lessons put on by Teresa Curtis from the state office. This has allowed us to see where pockets of poverty are in our counties. These mapping lessons has helped us with possible food insecurity in our area/COWW
- The Winnebago County Food Security Project is up and running. Meetings are scheduled for the rest of the year. Our goal is to figure out where we fit and do what is needed to help the food insecurity in our area. FoodWIse is working with local partners on this project such as Public Health and the Appleton Library to name a couple.
- I will be participating in a professional development called Healthy Schools Bootcamp. It starts in January and runs twice a month through April.
- I contacted fifth grade teachers at Webster School and will be working with them. I will be teaching virtually in their classrooms teaching 5th grade nutrition.

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- December was light on events but heavy on "behind the scenes" work internal Extension initiatives, such as two three-day conferences, continue to build the leadership core team with the ColorBold Business Association, and lead the Extension's Communication subgroup forward in the Dean's Initiative #8 Task Force for Inclusive Recruitment, Hiring & Retention Strategies.
- I have been working with a team including Kim Miller and the City of Oshkosh in light of the <u>Community</u> <u>Garden RFP</u> that was launched last fall to create a sustainable plan for the Phoenix Rising Community Garden. Still many barriers to work through like unknown soil quality, setbacks, liability, and small parcels.
- With my counterpart in FDL County Diana Hammer, I was asked to co-lead the 18 county wide <u>NEW</u> <u>North</u> D&I Roundtable subgroup on Entrepreneurship and Small Business.
