1. Call to Order

Co-Chair Tom Egan called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

2. Public Comments

Candy Hall, Executive Director of Child Care Resource and Referral in Kimberly, Wisconsin, asked the commission for their support regarding their Spirit Fund request. She explained the need for sub programs and stated that by approving their project, it would allow them to better collect the needed data to create and sustain a sub program in Winnebago County and support our children, families, and childcare providers. She thanked the commission for their time and consideration.

Supervisor Doug Nelson voiced his concerns regarding the issue of the Winnebago County Fire Chief's Association (WCFCA) and their request to utilize Spirit Funds to replace mobile, portable and DVRS radios. Mr. Nelson realizes that Winneconne didn't request radios when that request came around. He re-read some of the resolution that was passed by the County Board at the November 21, 2023, meeting. He identified part of the title of the resolution "to be Distributed Equitably Among Association Member Fire Departments". Mr. Nelson stated there

is 15 departments and 14 of them will receive Spirit Funds to purchase radios and/or radio equipment. The Winneconne Fire Department is the only department that wouldn't receive any funds. Mr. Nelson does not believe that is equitably and hopes that the WCFCA will make it equitable and not disburse funds based on who submitted for radios and who did not. The reason Winneconne did not request any radios is because they are really hoping to get an upgrade for an airboat.

Supervisor Kay Horan stated she is on UW-Extension Committee. She spoke on behalf of Supervisor Steve Binder, who would like to know that the childcare issue will be addressed in Winnebago County. Ms. Horan also commented and supported Supervisor Doug Nelson's concerns regarding the Winneconne Fire Department. She stated they were responsible and budgeted for them as they were previously informed to do and should not be penalized for that. Ms. Horan also asked the commission to provide an update each month at the County Board meetings so all the Supervisors are aware of everything that this commission is doing.

Tracy Ogden, CEO of the Boys and Girls Club of Oshkosh, clarified the reason for their two requests and to answer some questions that came up. She informed the commission of all the services they provide and the need for the expansion to meet the big increase in attendance at the Boys and Girls Club. Ms. Ogden thanked the commission for their time and consideration.

Jeff Trembly, Board President of the Boys and Girls Club of Oshkosh, voiced his support for the Boys and Girls Club of Oshkosh project request. He stated that they have partnered with HeadStart and have children from 4 years old to 18 years old. This program has an impact on kids and may help children get on the right path.

Amy McGowan, Director of Development - Greater Fox Cities Area Habitat for Humanity and Kathi Seifert, Board of Directors Member – Fox Cities Habitat for Humanity voiced their support for the project request to Help Greater Fox Cities Area Habitat for Humanity Build or Rehabilitate 10 Homes in Northern Winnebago County and deeply appreciate the commissions consideration.

Jason Schulist, Executive Director for the Fox Valley Data Exchange, explained in detail what their project request entailed and voiced his support to build an online repository of community data used by organizations and governmental departments across Winnebago, Outagamie, and Calumet Counties. Mr. Schulist stated this is a community services organization and the primary purpose of this is to centralize and make data more accessible at the community level. He thanked the commission for their consideration.

Trevor Fenrich, Executive Director for Solutions Recovery, spoke about what their organization has been able to accomplish over the past several years to support individuals struggling with substance use in our community. Mr. Fenrich identified and explained in detail several services that they provide. He asked the commission for their support in their project request. This would allow Solutions Recovery to support the growing need for services and recovery in our community.

Dave Mack, Captain of the Sheriff's Office, and the current jail administrator, voiced his support of the request to use Spirit Funds to purchase the existing Christine Ann Building to expand Solutions Recovery. This is an excellent program, a growing need to provide individuals an opportunity to achieve sobriety. Mr. Mack stated that supporting Solutions Recovery and the STAR program is that goal.

Brandon Ansell voiced his support for the Damascus Road Project. Mr. Ansell spoke as a professional contact confirmation as to the work they do and what they've done in the community, particularly the human and sex trafficking issue that is taking place in our area.

Deb Allison-Aasby, Volunteer Business and Communications Director for the Damascus Road Project, provided an update on their new temporary home until a permanent home is determined. She thanked the commission for all they do and appreciates their consideration on the Damascus Road project request.

Lisa Sennholz, Founder and Executive Director for Damascus Road stated they've attended many of these meetings. She thanked the commission for their time, all of the opportunities they allowed them to speak and for their consideration to utilize the Spirit Funds for their project request.

Supervisor Steven Binder reminded everyone that UW Oshkosh had closed down their daycare and this community has been very fortunate to have the Oshkosh YMCA step up and take that over. Childcare is an issue that needs to be addressed. Mr. Binder also echoed Supervisor Doug Nelson's comments regarding the Winneconne Fire Department. They are the only Fire Department that will not receive any funds and that is not equitable. Supervisor Binder stated that the commission should somehow make it equitable for Winneconne, possibly push through a different project request.

Barb Tengesdal, First 5 Fox Valley (F5FV), stated she feels that a thriving community requires a robust vision to make a high impact investment in our youngest children. They have utilized The Help Me Grow Program and respectfully ask the commission to consider supporting The Help Me Grow Program to support early childhood development. Ms. Tengesdal thanked the commission for their time and consideration.

3. Approval of November 7, 2023, meeting minutes.

Motion by Doemel, seconded by Farrey, to approve the November 7, 2023, meeting minutes. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Co-Chair Egan reported that Supervisor Borchart and Tim Galloway asked to be excused for today's meeting.

4. Update/discussion: Status of where Municipalities stand regarding the \$145,000 Spirit Funds distribution.

Paul Kaiser provided a brief update for the commission on where all the towns and municipalities are at in this process. Mr. Kaiser stated out of the 21 municipalities, 17 of them have been sent their funds. He is still waiting for documentation and/or what the Town of Nekimi, Town of Vinland, Town of Wolf River, and the Village of Winneconne want to do with it. Mr. Kaiser will send out another email to them four municipalities relating to getting information on how they want to do that.

5. Update/discussion: Review of interest earned on the ARPA/Spirit Funds.

Paul Kaiser, Winnebago County Finance Director, discussed and explained where the Spirit funds are at with the interest earned from those funds. A document was provided that showed the interest earned from the Spirit Fund; Spirit Fund Projects that have been presented and passed by the County Board; and what has been approved and spent at this time.

6. Discussion/Action: Resolution – Approving \$_____ from the Spirit Fund's Government Identified Community Projects Category to Assist in the Purchase and Renovation of New Facilities for the Damascus Road Project

Motion by Doemel, seconded by Egan, to adopt the request from the Damascus Road Project at an amount of \$500,000.

Motion by Supervisor Buck, seconded by Supervisor Farrey, to make an amendment to the resolution. On Line 25, add the following verbiage to read, "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that the Damascus Road Project shall be responsible for reimbursement to Winnebago County for any disbursed funds which are determined by Winnebago County to have been misused or misappropriated. Any reimbursement of funds which is required by Winnebago County shall be due within 45 days after giving written notice to recipient of such misuse or misappropriation."

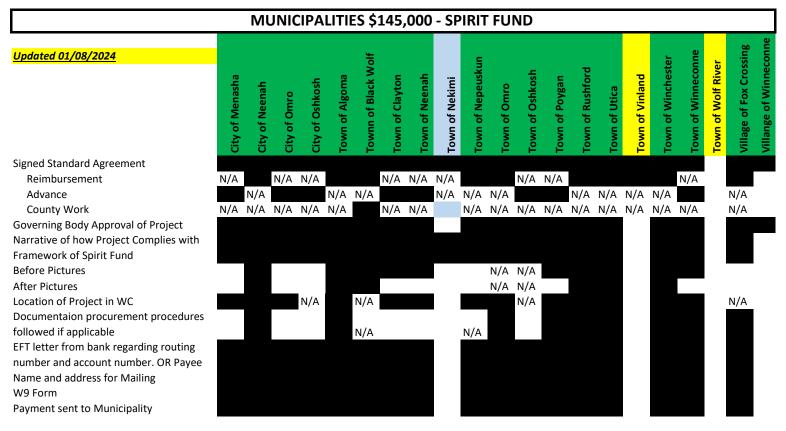

An estimated 65% of young children have all available parents working however the County lacks enough daycares for working parents in all industries to utilize. This forces parents to make the difficult decision to quit their job due to lack of childcare or take a lower paying job to work within the daycare's facility hours. Data from the Wisconsin Department of Revenue shows that Oshkosh has approximately 11,500 more workers coming into the City compared to workers who work and live in the City. This demonstrates that thousands of people are commuting to their jobs and in many situations, placing their children in daycares in the communities where they work. Existing residents would also benefit from the expanded daycare opportunities.

Providing affordable resources to residents such as daycare options and affordable housing will allow residents to save money, offer stability, and contribute to our economy.

Sustainable features and practices will be implemented in the development such a LEED Silver Certification or Enterprise 2020 Green Communities along with amenities such as proximity to the bus stop, central city services, and bike racks to make the project sustainable and environmentally friendly.

Retaining and attracting residents is important to the surrounding industries and schools as well. The City of Oshkosh, like other communities in the County, lack enough affordable workforce housing for the residents. Community partners in Winnebago County are looking to other regions in the State to learn best practices on how to attract affordable workforce housing to their communities. Community partners have learned quite a bit from Washington County and Sheboygan County on how to effectively implement affordable workforce housing programs and would like to create a program to construct affordable workforce housing in Winnebago County, as the City of Oshkosh serving as the proof-of-concept project location. Community partners would like to develop a subdivision with new homes that are affordable to residents within the 80%-120% Average Median Income range which is considered workforce housing income ranges.

Funding would be requested to assist with the costs for multiple aspects of the project. Community partners would first need to develop the Affordable Workforce Housing Implementation Plan which would require the need to obtain services from attorney's, engineers, builders, lenders, and others to develop a plan that would provide a detailed process on how to successfully implement the program. Examples of tasks to complete in the plan would be to identify the optimal legal structure, financing options, protective covenants to ensure the home prices stay affordable, etc. Also included in the project funding request is the acquisition of a property to develop the affordable workforce housing and a portion of the infrastructure costs as well.

The cost to create the Affordable Workforce Housing Implementation Plan will cost approximately \$145,000. The actual implementation of the plan will cost \$150,000 for the land acquisition, \$100,000 for engineering costs, and \$1,200,000 for the public infrastructure costs to develop 17 buildable lots. The cost to build the homes on the lots is undetermined at this time but is estimated to be approximately \$150/sq ft without the acquisition and infrastructure costs included.

Who will lead the project (Internal, City, Winnebago County, State of WI...)? The City of Oshkosh, who will be collaborating with the Greater Oshkosh Economic Development Corporation, the Oshkosh Chamber of Commerce and the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation. It is anticipated that other community partners will join in.

Where is the primary location of the project? The City of Oshkosh initially, but the partners anticipate that this proof-of-concept plan will be replicated throughout the County. Preliminary discussions have taken place with municipal staff in communities in the County who have expressed interest.

How many total individuals would this project serve each year? Initially, approximately over 75 people could benefit from a 17-lot affordable workforce housing project, but long term when the plan is implemented throughout the county, thousands of people would be positively impacted.

Winnebago County's efficient transportation infrastructure allows residents to live and work in different places throughout the County and commute with ease. The Oshkosh area will be the first location of the initiative, but the program will be expanded.

Housing stability is one the most important things that a person can have and has a profound impact on that person's future. Filling the gaps in the County's housing continuum so there is an ample selection of housing options for all is important to municipal staff and elected officials. Other housing initiatives in the County such as the Day by Day Warming Shelter, Tiny Homes, COTS, and low-income housing projects are helping to close those gaps throughout the continuum and complement this project well.
