ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

Motion that we proceed to the election of chairman by informal ballot. carried. Supervisors Spore and Schneller were appointed as tellers. Informal ballot resulted: Silas L. Spengler 34, Geo. B. Young, 8, total 42. Motion that the informal ballot be made formal and that the clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the board for Silas L. Spengler as chairman, carried. The ballot was so cast, and Silas Spengler was declared elected. Chairman Spengler, upon taking the chair, voiced his appreciation of

the honor bestowed upon him by electing him as chairman of the board.

ELECTION OF VICE-CHAIRMAN.

Informal ballot resulted: Geo. B. Young 24, M. F. White 18, J. B. Schneller 1, Geo. Spore 1; total 44. Formal ballot resulted: Geo. B. Young 26, M. F. White 18; total 44. Geo. B. Young, having received the majority of votes cast, was declared elected.

Vice-Chairman Young thanked the board for conveying the honor of

vice-chairmanship upon him.

RULES.

Motion that the rules of the last supervisor year be adopted for the year 1929, and as amended at the November 1928 session, carried.

RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY. Adopted April 22, 1929.

The meetings of this board shall be held in the supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m

And the county board shall continue in continuous session from day

to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

At the first meeting of the board, it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in case of his absence, the vice-chairman, or in their absence, the clerk, to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present, the board shall proceed to the election of a chairman and vice-chairman.

(Amended to provide for vice-chairman as authorized by Chapter 110, of 1903.

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after

the name of each committee, viz:
Equalization, 9; finance, 8; general accounts, 7; illegal assessments, 5; justice and constables' accounts, 7; sheriff's and coroners' accounts, 7; insane, 3; poor and poor farm, 3; workhouse, 3; corporations, 3; publicities, 5; roads and bridges, 5; per diem and mileage, 5; printing, 3; bonds and salaries, 5; county abstract and tract index system, 3; rules, 3;

education, 3; sanatorium, 5; budget, 4 (county clerk, ex-officio).

IV. The board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be

done until the same shall be announced.

The chairman, or in his absence, the vice-chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of

business shall be as follows:

Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.

Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.

Reports of standing committees. Reports of select committees.

Consideration of miscellaneous business.

The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the board, and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken

by aves and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any

question is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost.

Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall design nate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his

seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by aves and name. XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the county board.

(Amended to conform to Section 709, Statutes of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be en-

tertained except:

To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

- 3. For the previous question. To postpone to a day certain.
- To commit to a committee. To amend or to substitute. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage

of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original state of the original state of the same as the original state of the o inal proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote. but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous

consent,

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the board until altered or repealed. as herein provided.

XXVII.The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and

applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the board.

XXVIII. Whenever the board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole.

and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind

No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the county board present.

All reports, resolutions and petitions must be presented in

typewritten form and read by the supervisor presenting the same.

(Amendment of May 4, 1925.) XXXI. All resolutions calling for an appropriation of money, and all resolutions, the adoption of which will require an ultimate expenditure of money or an appropriation by the county board, shall be presented to the county clerk of Winnebago county, ex-officio member of the budget committee, at least ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the annual November session of the county board, and no bill or resolution calling for

an appropriation of money shall be received by the board without the unanimous consent of the board after that time.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE COUNTY HOME.

Supervisor Young offered the following Report No. 1. To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin: Gentlemen: Your committee on poor, together with the district attorney of Winnebago county, met with the superintendent and trustees of the Winnebago county home to investigate certain alleged conditions relating to the admission of patients to this institution. We herewith tender our re-

port as the result of that investigation:

We find that some forty years ago, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the county board, the sum of \$1.50 per week was ordered charged to each town or city or village sending poor patients to the county home for their care and maintenance. We find that the per capita cost for caring for those same poor patients today is in the neighborhood of \$4.35 each, varying a small amount from year to year. This amount is for the actual maintenance charge and does not take into consideration the fixed overhead expense and charges of maintaining the property.

We further find that there is no provision made at the institution for taking care of hospital cases. We find that one man and one woman look after the needs of all of the patients, there being sixty-two patients there

at the present time.

We find that the management of the county home has at all times taken patients who were ordered committed by the court to this home, whether sick or otherwise, and it is our opinion that the law requires the superintendent to accept every person committed to the home by a lawful commitment.

We further find, however, that in one or two cases persons desiring commitment to the Home were in such physical condition that the institution was without facilities to care for them, and in those instances the superintendent asked that they be committed to a hospital until restored into a condition where they could be cared for at the home. We find that all cases requiring operations or hospital treatment have been taken care of at the hospitals, and we find that in fifteen years the total amount paid for hospital care for patients was \$1,260,50. In our judgment this represents a very considerable saving over what it would cost the county to maintain a hospital and nurses at the institution for this purpose.

We further find that the expense of maintaining a patient ordered committed to the hospital by the county physician and superintendent of the county home, is a direct charge against the county and is not charged back to the township or city or village from which the patient comes or

has a legal settlement.

We further report that in our judgment and opinion the management of the institution is right in sending patients needing hospital care to the hospital for treatment and care instead of attempting to maintain a hos-

pital in connection with the county home.

We further find and report that the total cost of maintaining the patients at the county home in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928, was \$11,141.84, not including expenditures for permanent improvements, and not including tixed charges in connection with the maintenance of the county home. We further find that the county received, out of the \$1.50 per week charged back to the towns, cities, and villages, the small sum of \$3,990.58, leaving a deficit of \$7,151.26 which had to be taken care of out of the general funds of the county.

We find that there are committed to the home now forty-six males and sixteen females, a total of sixty-two persons, twenty-nine of whom come from the city of Oshkosh, five of whom are county-at-large patients, nine from the city of Menasha, seven from the city of Neenah, four from the village of Winneconne, one each from the towns of Clayton, Oshkosh, Winchester, and Rushford, and two from the town of Nekimi. That there are two private charges located in the institution.

It will therefore be seen that there are many towns in the county that have no charges at the county home, and yet the general expense of maintaining the county home falls upon all of the taxpayers and tax districts

in the county.

It is the opinion of the committee that it would be proper for the county board to adopt a resolution providing that the actual cost of maintenance in each year, figured per capita, which last year was \$4.31 per week, should be charged back to the municipality in which the patient has a legal settlement, and we are further of the opinion that the cost of hospitalizing patients should likewise be charged to the town from which those patients come and have a legal settlement. For example, if the town of Clayton has one patient at the institution that town should pay, instead of \$1.50 a week, the actual expense of maintaining that patient in the home.

not including fixed charges in connection with the operation of the institution, and if it were necessary for that patient to be hospitalized, the town of Clayton should pay that expense instead of having it paid out of general county funds, as at present.

We would recommend that the county board give proper consideration

to this question.

4. Shall Winnebago county obtain prices on all other suitable pieces

of property for a new court house site?

5. Shall Winnebago county board of supervisors, after getting the prices on all suitable sites, put the selection of the site for a new court house to the vote of the people to decide where this court house shall be built?

6. Shall \$100,000.00 be levied by the Winnebago county board of supervisors each year for the next five years to provide a fund toward the cost of a new court house, the balance of such cost to be met by a bond issue, and the appropriations for road building to be curtailed during said five years approximately \$500,000.00?

other county fair.

For the past two years we have asked substantial cuts in the annual county fair appropriation, which is one of the most unique things that has ever happened in county fair history. This year, our fair board asks a further cut of \$1,500.00. This can be done and still have our fair progress in an admirable manner, and hold its high ranking with other fairs. The county board of supervisors should be congratulated on their unanimous support of the fair in the past, and I trust our county fair will always be kept on a business basis and will always merit your confidence.

REPORT OF PROBATION OFFICER, 1929.

Mrs. Margaret Thorn, probation officer, offered the following Report

To the County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen: Another year has swiftly passed, as busy years have a way of doing, and again it is time for you to receive the annual report of the county probation officer.

This report will cover the work done from November 1, 1923, to Novem-

ber 1, 1929, exclusive of one week of vacation and one week of illness, as

shown by the records in the probation office.

There has been an increase of the number of families and children under consideration as compared with those of the previous year. The children considered come under three (3) groups, classified as dependent,, neglected or delinquent. One hundred and forty families coming under the dependent group have received assistance from the children's aid appropriation, helping in the support of 375 children. Of these 140 cases, 27 have been discontinued for the following reasons:

through the assistance of relatives. Of those having sufficient income, in some cases the older children reached an age to work and provide for the family. In two cases work was found which gave the mother sufficient income. Without exception these cases have expressed their appreciation for the aid received and were glad to reach the goal of independence.

There were 72 new applications for aid requiring investigation, and 114 carried over from the previous year requiring re-investigation. Of the 72 new applications, 26 were granted an allowance. The others were found ineligible, sometimes because of sufficient income, cash on hand or some plan worked out making the family independent. The fact that a mother is left alone with a family does not necessarily mean that she is eligible to this aid. It is unfortunate that anyone must become dependent, and if the income is sufficient it would be wronging the mother and her family as well as the sufficient it would be wronging the mother and her family as well as those who furnish the money to place them upon the dependent list. Every effort is made to have the mother understand this and to work toward independence. In large families this seldom can be accomplished until some of the other children become old enough to work and assist in

the income.

In addition to the dependent cases there have been 61 other families referred because of neglect of children, delinquency, feeble mindedness, unemployment, investigations for adoption or some home condition needing adjustment. This makes a total of 247 families. These cases are personal applications, or may be referred by individuals, other welfare departments or the court. In many of these cases of neglect and delinquency the contact with the family cannot be broken, but must continue year after year. With the many new cases coming to our attention it is difficult for one worker to continue with these families and necessarily only those needing the contact most can receive the attention. This may be unfortunate. In some cases it has been found so. Human problems are not as exact as a mathematical problem and one cannot go to work with such a swift and direct course of action in their solution. It takes patience and often study and work over a long period of time to reach the desired goal. Sometimes this is not understood by those who refer cases to us and they wonder why something is not done. They are looking for immediate court action to settle the matter at once as they think it should be settled. It is not understood that such action is only the last resort. We are grateful that we have this last powerful appeal. It is a help on our most difficult cases without which we could not work.

Returning to our dependent cases, the families were distributed in the

county as follows:

There is a slight decrease in the incapacitated men over the number of last year. We regret to note an increase of cases of desertion and di-

ce. This was also true last year.

The monthly statistical reports show the following total of work done:

Two visits were made to the state prison at Waupun in the interest of families on our list. One visit was made to the Northern Colony & Training School for the mentally deficient at Chippewa on another case, also to the Southern Colony for the mentally deficient at Union Grove. The Northern Colony is greatly overcrowded. It is difficult to secure admittance because of this fact except in extreme situations. We have been able to have two cases placed there during the past year. At Union Grove the state is spending many thousands of dollars putting un fine modern buildings to care for this class of people. Our citizens should visit these places

and put thought upon this problem, which is becoming constantly greater and demanding constantly a greater expenditure of money from our state. Much of our dependency, delinquency and crime is due to sub-normal mentality. There is a difference of opinion, of course, as to what should be done, but we should continue to study the situation and come to some canclusion and legislation. Three meetings were attended, one at Madison and two at Milwaukee, which were held by those working on the children's code, to keep in touch with the work being done. After much revision the code has passed our legislature. We are glad such a general interest has been created in the welfare of children, those who will make our next generation. Those who have worked hard to formulate this code do not claim that it is perfect. Many changes were made before it passed the legislature, and others may be found necessary, but it is at least a big step in the right direction.

The passing of the code makes some changes in our work and appropriations. This is merely mentioned, for it, with its various features, will be

presented to you very fully by our district attorney.

The amount of aid given each family is decided by a budget, the necessary expense being balanced with its income. Heretofore, the amount that could be granted has in a few cases been insufficient and supplementary aid has been sought. In Oshkosh four Catholic families have been supplemented by the Oshkosh Apostolate, which has furnished milk, groceries, fuel, clothing and dental care amounting to \$467.26. The Bureau of Family Service has supplemented with groceries, milk and fuel amounting to \$54.60. Charity Circle has furnished milk in five families amounting to \$295.50. Mercy Circle has granted X-ray in two cases when the surgical fund of last year gave out and we did not have the new fund to work upon until January. The Paine Lumber Company has furnished milk to three families and fuel to one. In Neenah and Menasha the Red Cross, Emergency Club and the Smith Fund has supplemented where necessary

There is a dental clinic for needy children of Oshkosh held each Saturday of the school year at the Beach school. Ninety-eight children have had dental care at this clinic. Many of our mothers have not had dental care when needed but last year Service league provided \$100.00 for this purpose, Mercy Circle also \$100.00 and the adult dental clinic of the Bureau of Family Service provided \$271.00. The care given to many of these mothers will be permanent due to their ages and the character of the work. Dental care is considered such an important factor in one's health that the aid given was considered of great importance. While it was difficult to get the children in to the dental clinic at first, more and more the mothers appreciate the importance of care of the teeth and are glad to

have this work done.

The surgical fund appropriated by the county board furnished the

following:

Appendectomies with necessary hospital care and anaesthetics, 2 children; tonsillectomies, anaesthetics and hospital care, 16 children, 2 mothers; other operations and hospital care, 3 mothers; special surgical, X-ray and hospital care, 3 children, 4 mothers; making a total of 30 cases. There remains a small sum in the fund but with the cases now coming in it probably will be used by Dec. 31, the end of our year. This separate fund will not be asked for the coming year as the children's code provides for this being included in the children's aid fund. Special prices were secured the property of the work. from surgeons and hospitals for this work

The work of the local Kiwanis club with the juvenile court has been much appreciated. Their especial interest is the underprivileged child and they have under the supervision of their special committee at the present time, twenty-five boys. Some of these boys have to attend school one day a week and the club is also active in securing work for these boys. They are at the present time putting forth special effort in securing the interest of the employer in placing these boys. An active normal boy or girl will be doing something the other five days when he goes to school but one days when he had not be the school but one days when he goes to If he is not regularly employed trouble is school but one day a week. likely to come from his idleness.

In the dependent families, each mother will be asked the coming year to turn in each month her account. The children's code provides for this and we feel it is not only just to those who provide this help for these families but it is believed it will also prove to be a help to the mother. These accounts must all be gone over and wherever necessary the worker advise with the mother of the money. It the worker advise with the mother on the expenditure of the money. It

will be a great deal of work to do this and probably much time outside of what is considered the regular hours must be put upon the work.

Each month during the past year there have been contacts with from 130 to 139 families. Sometimes these include requests from other states which must be taken care of. As examples of such requests you will be given two recently received. One was from the travelers' aid of New York Citv asking that a home be visited in the northwest corner of Winnebago county to see if a certain little immigrant girl had reached her destination and if she had made the proper contacts in her new environment. An interesting fact was learned regarding the people to whom she came. She was one of six girls for whom they had paid transportation from Germany and taken into their home. Another request came from Alabama and an entire Sunday afternoon was spent on the investigation. As the people work out of the home they could be seen no other time. Many calls are made at probation officer's home in the evening and Saturday afternoons are not exempt. In this work one must be ready to give of their time whenever and wherever it may be needed. The work is growing Many factors in present day civilization enter into bringing us an increasing number of cases. The new code takes into

The work is growing. Many factors in present day civilization enter into bringing us an increasing number of cases. The new code takes into consideration provision for maintaining health and what could be more important. All of this calls for a larger appropriation but it is hoped you will not forget that in aiding these handicapped mothers, left alone, some of them with large families to rear, that it is your investment in human life and nowhere can you receive greater returns for the amount invested because it is an investment in human life—future citizens.

District taxes

Supervision.

There are 125 teachers in the ninety-four schools of the county. One hundred eighty visits were made in inspecting the schools and assisting the teachers. Twelve night meetings were attended during the year. The office cooperated with the districts in furnishing special talent for school programs. Talks on office records were given to the training class at Omro. Miss Ryss and I met regularly once a month with Mr. Patch and Miss Marie Berg, to discuss topics of supervision in the county as they pertained to the Omro graduates. The office cooperated with the training department at Omro and the Oshkosh State Teachers' college in permitting students to do observation and practice work in the county. The Oakwood school board gave permission for the students at Omro

The Oakwood school board gave permission for the students at Omro to do all of their observation and practice work in their school. We felt that this plan was most successful and regret to report the school board at Omro has seen fit to drop the training department. The Nordheim district has been most considerate in permitting the students of the rural division of the Oshkosh State Teachers' college to do observation and practice work in the Nordheim school. We are indebted to the directors of

both departments for outlines and teaching helps.

In the course of a year several thousand pages of mimeographed material, consisting of outlines, teaching helps, tests, etc., are sent from

the office. We certainly appreciate the electric mimeograph.

In accordance with the law, the county superintendent appointed the supervising teacher for a term of ten months, beginning August, 1929, and ending June, 1930. The supervising teacher is to supervise and assist, under the direction of the county superintendent, the teachers employed in the schools of the county or superintendent district, devoting special attention to the less experienced teachers. Miss Ryss is an untiring

worker, has cooperated 100 percent and deserves much commendation for her efforts in raising the teaching standards in Winnebago county. She was selected to represent the supervising teachers of Wisconsin at a convention in Des Moines, Ia. last June. This is another honor for Winnebago county.

Institute Fund.

The teachers' county institute fund is used for the expenses of speakers at county institutes held during the year. We are able to secure the services of such noted men as Dr. Willis A. Sutton, of Atlanta, Ga, and Judge Henry Graass, of Green Bay. Following is a report of the county institute fund of Winnebago county for the year 1928-29:

Certification.

Out of 125 teachers in the county, thirty-six had state certificates, fifty-nine had first grade certificates, twenty-nine had second grade certificates and one had a third grade certificate. With the raising of standards of certification the teachers have been required to go to summer school and to read professional books.

Improvements.

In the past six years there has been a noticeable improvement in the physical conditions in the schools of the county. Many schools have been remodeled. In a recent survey the following improvements were noted especially: More schools equipped with steel, single, adjustable seats; good slate blackboards; lighting on left or on left and rear; first aid kits; scales, bubbler or water jar; new maps; reference sets; supplementary material; playground equipment, and the fencing of school grounds. Of the few schools that still have eight months, two changed to nine months. This year four districts contemplated putting up new one-room schools. Through a county-wide, standard testing program we are able to discover the needs of the pupils and suggest remedial work.

Commencement.

Last June, the commencement exercises for the eighth grade were held at Madison. Approximately 800 children and adults took advantage of the opportunity of seeing Madison. The Northwestern railroad furnished a special train, which left Oshkosh at 8 o'clock and reached Madison at a little after 11. The rates were very reasonable, \$2.25 for the round trip. The Traction company, of Madison, furnished streetcars, taking the crowd to Vilas park to see the zoo. We walked through the stadium and later had the commencement exercises in the agricultural hall. From there we went to the state capitol. We left Madison at 4 o'clock. All agreed that it was one of the most inspirational and educational trips ever made. We hope to repeat the event next June.

Attendance.

There was less truancy in the county last year than there has been for five years. Parents are realizing that pupils must attend regularly if they are to make the most out of school. We still have some trouble with the beet weeders, but with the assistance of the state industrial commission the truancy cases among beet weeders is less every year; 212 children had 100 percent perfect attendance last year, an increase of seventeen over last year.

Reading Circle,

The rural and state graded teachers belong 100 percent to the local county teachers' association. They are entitled to reading circle books purchased by the association. The total number who earned teachers'

reading circle diplomas or seals was 111; 2,198 pupils earned reading circle diplomas or seals, an increase of 341 since 1926

County Fair.

The rural, state graded and high schools of the county were represented at the county fair this fall. The exhibit has been improving consented at the county tan this tan. The earnin has been improving constantly. The display of the 4-H club members has added materially to the appearance of the educational building. The work is judged and premiums awarded during the summer, thus it is possible to exhibit only prize winning entries. Sixty rural schools and state graded schools had approximately 1,500 entries. There were thirty-three individual prizes awarded at the state fair.

Winnebago County Library.

With the \$1,500 that has been appropriated by the county board for county library purposes it is possible to service the schools of the county. While only half of the schools have availed themselves of the opportunity of getting book collections, still we are able to report that fifty-five collections were sent to forty-eight schools during the past year. This gives a school circulation of 6,028. As was recommended in the report last year, the service of the county library has included mounted pictures in color, for use of teachers in art study and appreciation. To quote the librarian. "We find the teachers most enthusiastic and appreciative of our aid to them in their reading circle work and in furnishing the children with outside reading of high standard." I should like to express publicly my sincere appreciation of the fine cooperation and helpfulness that the county is receiving from those in charge of county library work.

Music.

The new course of study requires that music be taught in all of the rural and state graded schools. Realizing that many of the teachers are not prepared to handle music, arrangements were made with a professor from Lawrence college. Mr. O. Irving Jacobson, to give a two-hour course in music the first Saturday of each month. The teachers are asked to teach the course. In Outagamie county three music supervisors make each school once a week. Their services are paid for by the districts which they serve. Green Lake county normal has a music supervisor which they serve. Green Lake county normal has a music supervisor who takes care of the music work in the county, sends outlines out to the teachers, and has monthly group meetings. I trust that eventually we may have a county supervisor of music. Let us give the rural child more of the advantages and opportunities of the urban child.

School Influence.

The country has just celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the first cractical incandescent lamp, the achievement of a man who still lives in the flesh and who will continue to live for centuries in the hearts of the civilized world. His accomplishment has made living conditions the civilized world. His accomplishment has made living conditions better; it has added to people's pleasures; it has that the health and it has opened avenues of employment for millions of people. It has become a commonplace and is still a marvel. Light's Golden Jubilee will serve to impress upon both youth and adult the fact that we have traveled far in fifty years.

It may not be amiss to stress other equally remarkable changes. The experience of earlier school days are within the memory of many—the efforts to master the A, B, C's; the slow, laborious and uninteresting struggle to master reading; the old slate, the pencil, the moisture cleansing fluid and the rag: the old double desks, the birch rod and the sting-

ing fluid and the rag; the old double desks, the birch rod and the stinging ruler; the heap-much-heat heating stoves; the stern master with the quill; the intermittent school attendance, resulting in a very limited

education for the majority.

Methods of instruction, pupil interest and welfare, school atmosphere and environment, school objectives, all have expanded so that these influences have been more far-reaching than the spread in the use of the electric light. The school has gone into the innermost recesses of civilization and with it has gone the light of learning. It has gone into our rural districts, into our foreign city sections, into our industrial centers, into our gold coast regions and everywhere it has carried, irrespective of class or creed, the same uplifting, the same enlightening, the same stabilizing and the same energizing influence. It has been reassuring to see the level of education pass up from a third or fourth grade education to the sighth grade or even into the high school. tion to the eighth grade or even into the high school.

The light of the school has been penetrating, the pulling power irresise. The extensive spread of the electric light has brought comforts to the home—so have the schools. It has builded cities—so have the schools. It has created employment—so have the schools. It has safeguarded health -so have the schools. It has penetrated homes, offices, factories—so

have the schools. It has made history—so have the schools

In education we cannot press the button and get the illumination, but we can see in the personality of the individual, in his demeanor, in his expressions of purpose, in his portrayal of character, in his attitude toward life and living, the effects of enlightenment and the penetrating processes of the schools. It seems fit that while we are paying due homage to light and its inventor because of their contributions to man, it is equally appropriate to pay homage to the power of our schools and the teacher personalities back of them, a power greater than that which illuminates the earth and moves the wheels of industry—the power that moulds and models the lives of boys and girls into purposeful men and women. REPORT OF SUPERVISING TEACHER—1929.

Anna Ryss, supervising teacher, offered the following, Report No. 10: To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen:

Legal Provision for Rural Supervision in Wisconsin.

The existing plan for rural supervision in Wisconsin was provided for by the legislature of 1915, when a law was passed which requires that "the county superintendent shall employ a supervising teacher, and. it there are more than 125 schools under his supervising teacher, all employ two supervising teachers." The appointment of the supervising teachers is made by the county superintendents, but their salaries and traveling expenses are paid by the state. At the present time there are 110 supervising teachers employed in Wisconsin, thirty-eight counties having two each and thirty-four counties employing one each.

School District Unit of School Control.

The unit of school control in Wisconsin is the school district. are more than 7,000 independent districts which come under the control of seventy-two county superintendents. The problems of education are essentially rural. Of the total school population 54 percent is under the supervision of the county superintendent, and nearly 150,000 children or 29 percent of the total school population are enrolled in 6,655 one-teacher rural schools.

The Wisconsin supervising teachers must devote most of their attention to the teachers of one-room schools. Many of the teachers of these schools are young, inexperienced and with only one year of professional training in advance of high school education. The nature of the supervisory program in any county is largely determined by their needs.

Changes in Supervision Through Leadership of State Department of Education.

The intent of the law providing for supervising teachers was to furnish experienced rural teachers as helpers for the immature, inexperienced teachers. Great changes in supervisory method have been brought about corrough the leadership of the department of public instruction. A supervisory conference is held annually the last week in August at which the most profitable techniques, the most valuable supervisory activities and a general plan for a supervisory program are discussed. The needs of rural schools and rural teachers as disclosed by supervisory visits of the peceding year are analyzed. Experiences are exchanged and working relationships between the state and the county groups are established.

A County Program of Supervision.

Not all counties have definitely planned supervisory programs but a recent investigation by the state department revealed that more than 50 percent of the counties in the state have a well planned program as a guide for supervisory effort. Improvement of instruction is effected through: through the leadership of the department of public instruction. A super-

through:

1. Research. 2. Framing of the Plans 4. Judging Results. 2. Framing of Objectives and Planning. 3. Execut-

ing the Plans

The detailed plans for the supervisory programs in the counties may differ but the main objectives are essentially the same. The first thing that must be done is to discover the needs for supervision. Through a

well planned testing program, using both formal and informal tests the needs of the pupils are discovered. Through class room visitations and observation the needs of the teachers are recognized. With these needs in mind a supervisory program can be planned and objectives framed.

The plans for teacher training include activities such as teachers institutes, group meetings, preparation of bulletins and outlines, organized professional reading, visiting days for the teachers, experimental grouping of the pupils and demonstration teaching. The teacher training program for Winnebago county includes a teachers' meeting in the fall, usually the last Saturday in August. The main objectives of the year's work are discussed by the county superintendent and the supervising teacher. Later in the season, usually the last week of September, October, and the first part of November, group meetings of teachers are held. The program of these group meetings may consist of demonstration teaching, professional book reviews and discussion of teaching techniques. The teacher groups organized in the fall of 1928 chose a leader, and worked out detailed lesson plans in history and agriculture. These outlines were sent to our office where they were compiled, mimeographed, and a copy sent to every teacher in the county.

In the execution of the plans are included in addition to the activities just mentioned, a well organized plan of schoolroom visitation and other field work such as contests in various lines of activity and community work. The activities for supervision are well covered by the suggestions left with the supervising teacher by the state supervisor during a visit made in Winnebago county in the spring of 1928. The following a visit made in Winnebago county in the spring of 1928.

lowing are a few of the points mentioned:

1. Modification of the daily program.

An effort to increase available reading material for lower grades.
 The arrangement of a definite organization of the primary reading

program.

4. Urging the teachers to send into the office their special perplexing problems so that specific help may be planned for them in advance of the actual visit to the schools.

5. The necessity of the supervisor keeping in mind a sequence of

activities for consecutive visits such as the following:

(a) For the first visit:

1. Age grade statistics and suggestions for remedial work.

Examination of textbooks and library books and the preparation of a complete reading program for odd and even years.

The examination of the teacher's daily program and if possible the introduction of music and physical exercises at regular

intervals.

4. A conference with the teacher regarding the seat work activities of the children and her plan for making assignments. This conference should include special provision for the securing of materials suitable for self-directed creative activities on the part of the pupils.

5. A study of and suggestions for economizing in school man-

agement.

6. Attention to the physical conditions of the school and suggestions for schoolroom beautification.

Encourage teacher to work out some one special problem and to report to you upon your next visit.

(b) For the second visit:

1. Check on suggestions given above.

- Analyze two or three recitations according to a definite score card and confer with teacher regarding strong and wasteful practices.
- 3. Work concretely on some one special subject as is included in the county superintendent's yearly program; helping this teacher to see her way to do some creditable work in whatever field the county superintendent has chosen for emphasis.

 Give the teacher suggestions for carrying out the special work to which she is assigned for the cooperative group meetings.

Miscellaneous suggestions.

- Discuss with the teacher the special problems which she has sent into the office and leave with her definite concrete suggestions.
- (c) For all subsequent visits:

Check recitations as in second visit to note improvement in matters previously discussed.

Watch individual pupil's progress, according to the age grade statistics taken in first visit.

Confer with teacher on results of tests sent out from county superintendent's office.

Prepare a list of improvements needed for next year's work.

including textbooks. Give teacher definite help in rounding up subject matter so

that lengthy reviews at the end of the year are not necessary. Confer with teacher regarding the special problem which she took as her piece of experimental work for the year.

The contests in various lines of activity include the participation in the statewide contests in academic subjects, such as spelling, arithmetic, literature, civics and history, contests in song and declamation, and the athletic events, which are planned for field or play day. Another line of field work is found in such activities as encouraging Patrons' day for the schools, helping in the organization of community clubs, parent-teacher associations and boys' and girls' club work. Schools are encouraged to make educational exhibits at community and county fairs, and a county booth at the state fair is part of the educational program in this county.

A highly developed cooperation between the county supervisors and the training institutions is established through the provision of cadet teaching in the schools which is planned jointly by the county office and the training schools. Regular meetings of the county superintendent, supervising teacher and training teachers for the purpose of discussing

and solving teaching problems are held.

The judging of results in supervision is done in some measure through the attitude of the teachers toward supervision, the response from the pupils and parents, the cooperation from community groups and a general appearance of progress through increased interest in education.

Checks on Progress Made as Result of a Supervisory Program.

While it is difficult to obtain an exact check on the progress through rural supervision in any county the following activities reveal to a great extent the value of supervision as an agency for improvement of teaching 1. Special subject tests. 2. Personal visits of supervisors. 3. Testing programs. 4. Final examinations. 5. Yearly reports from teachers. programs. 4. Final examinations. 5. Yearly reports from teachers. 6. Scoring schools. 7. Increase in the percentage of attendance of publis. 8. Increase in the number of eighth grade graduates. 9. During the school year 1928-29 the standard test program included the Thorndike McCall reading test administered to all the sixth and seventh grade pupils in the county at the close of the year. The results of the test were used as a basis of promotion in these grades.

The time devoted to supervision but not accounted for in the above report was spent in preparing outlines and bulletins, and in exercising the duties involved while serving as president of the Winnebago county board of education

board of education

The total cost of the office of supervising teacher, salary and traveling

expenses, for the past year was \$2,879.00.

Up to date thirty-eight days have been spent in school visitation. During this time 129 contacts with teachers, in the schoolroom, have been

made, eighty-three of which were regular class room visits and observation of work, and forty-six pertained to administering tests and checking on delinquency. The latter activity frequently requires home visits to the parents.

The following range of activities are the leading factors in our super-

visory program for the year:

1. Organization outline sent regularly to all teachers.

2. Emphasis of music through monthly meetings under the direction

of a trained music supervisor.

3. A testing program to assist in regulating promotions, accompanied by achievement tests to aid teachers in keeping apace with the demands of the course of study

4. Detailed assignments available in geography, physiology and agri-

5. Improvement of the playground by addition of playground equipment, improved physical conditions of the buildings and well-balanced equipment in every school.

6. Increase in the number of districts maintaining nine months of

school

Reading circle work in all schools.

Increase in the number of community clubs and cooperative efforts in developing the 4-H club work.
 Emphasis on daily health in all the schools by promotion of directed

play and by an organized lunch hour.

10. Reduction in the number of 5-year-old children in the schools. 11. Experimental grouping of the third and fourth grades in arithmetic.

12. A county-wide standard test program in arithmetic.

13. An experiment in a limited number of schools with a new method of teaching beginners' reading.

14. An experiment in a limited number of schools with a new series of geography texts.

15. Better school attendance which spells reduction of illiteracy,

Supervision is the best method known for improving the quality of teaching. Supervision is a teacher training proposition. However, it takes more than the efforts of one or two supervising teachers in any county to make the supervisory program a success. It is the combined efforts of all who are interested in education, a wide awake county superintendent who has a far-reaching vision in his work, a corps of loyal, hard working teachers, a cooperative group of school board members, parents who are willing to make the necessary sacrifices to give their children the opportunities which our public schools afford, and all other agencies that so liberally cooperate in any educational ventures. To all of these we voice a hearty "thank you," and we assure you that we shall never lose sight of our ultimate goal, the development of our boys and girls into an enlightened and noble citizenship willing to take up the task of a Great Tomorrow. COUNTY NURSE'S REPORT.

Ada A. Newman, county nurse, offered the following, Report No. 14: Members of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago

County, Wisconsin: Gentlemen:

In accord with the custom for county officials to submit an annual

report. I present the report of the county nurse's office:

The purpose of giving this report is to review work being done by the county nurse, as well as to draw your attention to the fact that Winnebago county has much more to do along health lines before the rural child will have equal opportunity with the city child. The average rural child now has the advantage of more wholesome natural environment. On application of scientific approved methods for the rural child's protection from contagion and more instruction in regard to proper food selections and health habits of living, the statistical tables should soon be reversed, showing that the rural child is equal physically to his city cousin

The county health program has developed very satisfactory to the present time, but we have passed the preliminary stages of inspecting schools for clean hands, bodies, etc. The teachers for the most part are well able to care for the situation of that type. The nurse's inspection of vision and hearing are about as satisfactory as can be had in a rural school room. Our dental program, if allowed to go on and develop as hoped for, will be very satisfactory. Our next step forward therefore, must be a physical examination of rural school children. At present we can only select the children who seem below par and urge their parents to take them to their family physician. Often the parents cannot afford this attention, but more frequently the parents on ot see the need of medical attention because the child is able to be up and about.

Special Projects Carried During the Year—1928-29. Goiter Prevention Program.

This year we are again continuing the preventive program for goiter. This is the fourth year that this program has been carried. Two thousand four hundred seventy-seven children are taking the preventive treatment. The percentage of visible goiter has decreased greatly since the beginning of this program. The nurse's report shows only about 26 percent visible goiters. It would be an interesting study to have a new survey made, by physicians, to determine the exact prevalence of goiter among the children at the present time. Five years ago it was estimated at about 60 percent.

The entire cost of this program for the county is \$209.00. The expense is met by some of the town boards of health, school boards and in a few instances by the individual parents whose children are receiving the treatment.

Communicable Disease Survey.

It is the plan in this county to make a communicable disease survey of the schools each two years. The purpose is to know what diseases each child has had, and from what diseases he is immunized. This report is very valuable because it gives us information relative to each disease. When a disease is discovered we know at a glance at the survey which child might be susceptible to this particular disease.

The report shows that 2,334 children have had the following diseases:

It has been the policy of this office to follow as closely as possible any report of communicable disease. Some health officers are very dili-

gent in their work, others do not take their duty of quarantining and placing of placards very seriously. You as members of the town boards of health should lend your support in the enforcement of the rules of the state board of health in this regard. The community is entitled to a health officer who functions 100 percent in carrying out the various duties among which enforcement of quarantine is no doubt the most important.

Acute communicable diseases are being more successfully combated. A majority of parents no longer believe that it is necessary for children to have the so-called children's diseases, but are demanding that isolation,

quarantine and preventive measures be used.

Dental Hygiene.

Our reports have disclosed from year to year that a large percentage of children were suffering from decayed and infected teeth, that they were losing their permanent teeth when very young. Decay and infections leave permanent injury and result many times in chronic conditions in later life. Your health committee decided that this problem should be attacked in a more systematic method than was formerly used. We decided that the best method of approach was to provide a thorough examination of all the children's mouths, to obtain material as a basis for future work.

It was therefore decided to employ a dental hygienist to visit the schools and report her findings to the parents and keep a record for the study of the committee. This survey will be completed in a few days. The report as compiled now shows:

There are some surprising facts brought out by this report. It is not normal that children's teeth should decay. Improper diet and poor assimilation of foods is given as the principal factor in dental decay. Communicable diseases also play their part in destroying proper dentation We hope that this report will focus the attention of the parents upon this fact. Mrs. R. H. Weng, the hygienist who made this survey, has been very conscientious in making her examinations. Mrs. Weng gives a talk on proper diet and also a demonstration as to care of the teeth, at each school, on completing the examinations. The health committee is to be congratulated in promoting this work. Winnebago county is leading the state in its dental program.

Tuberculosis.

The tuberculosis problem is one which must be solved in the near future. We have been following up padents who have been definitely diagnosed as tubercular, urging early sanatorium care, but we know that there are many cases of tuberculosis of which we have no record. A statistical report of the mortality of 1928 gave a total of fifty-two deaths in the county due to tuberculosis. True some were not citizens of Winnebago county, but were committed to the sanatorium. A correct estimate gives about forty-five Winnebago county citizens who died last year from this one disease. Statisticians give an estimate of seven existing cases to each death. Eighty-seven visits were made to tubercular cases during the past year.

Orthopedic.

The cases which we had on our list last year have been visited. Where the doctor advised, we made an effort to have the corrective work done Rehabilitation contacts have also been made for eligible cases.

Rehabilitation contacts have also been made for eligible cases.

Four new cases were discovered. Two are now making plans for corrective work. One has had an examination at the Wisconsin General

hospital.

Clinics

Infant and preschool age clinics were held in Omro and Winneconne. Two clinics were held in Omro and three in Winneconne. One hundred twelve children were examined at these clinics.

A clinics for 4-H club boys and girls was held in August. Seventy-

eight examinations were made.

The county nurse assisted with the chest clinics held by the W. A. T. A. both in Oshkosh and Winneconne

Organization Work.

A total of thirty-three meetings were attended by the nurse during These included meetings with the town boards of health. the past year teachers, parent groups, etc.

Winnebago county organized a county health association on Oct. 9 of this year. The purpose of this organization is to further health educational work, by stimulating interest in health problems of the county. Two of the chief problems which we hope to attack through this group are in relation to the preschool age child and furthering work in prevention of communicable diseases through immunization.

Exhibits.

Educational and first aid booths were arranged for at the county fair in cooperation with the city health department and the Visiting Nurses' association.

At the first aid booth fifty-two cases were cared for. The nurses of the three departments conducted this work.

Assistant Nurse.

Miss Lillian Lyon was appointed as assistant nurse by authority of Resolution No. 16. Miss Lyon began her work on Sept. 1. Most of her time has been spent in school visitation, making a total of ninety visits. and twenty home and other visits. She has accompanied the hygienist and assisted her in her work at the same time, checking on health conditions in the schools. She has made 306 reports to parents, following inspections.

In a program of school health work the individual child is necessarily the unit with which we work. The volume of work in a county such as Winnebago, makes it impossible for one nurse to carry on a complete

program.

Report of Special Appropriation for Correction of Defects.

Throughout the county there are children who are greatly handicapped because of physicial defects and whose parents are not financially situated to give them the necessary attention. We have tried to make use of the fund appropriated at the last annual session of the county board, to the greatest advantage. It is a very commendable plan to place a small fund at the disposal of the health committee for this work.

Following are the corrections which have been made: 17 tonsil cases at \$21.00 each (hospital care included) \$357.00 4 vision 30.00 dental care 30.00

One surgical case was also cared for.

We have some cases yet to care for. May I extend to you a word of appreciation from these little people who know have a better chance in life because you have made it possible for them to enjoy better health.

In compiling this report I have endeavored to make it as complete as

possible in order that you might better understand the activities of the nursing service. The members of the county health committee have given much of their time to program planning. They have sought the advice of leading men in the medical and dental profession in an effort to direct the activities of this office in a more efficient manner. Under the direction of a committee so forward-looking the health work of this county cannot help but progress. The splendid support given me by the county health committee has made my work in Winnebago county most enjoy-

On completing my work as county nurse of Winnebago county I wish to express my appreciation to you and to your predecessors, with whom I have worked, for the cooperation and good spirit which has made my work here most pleasant. This board has always been in complete harmony with the work of the county health activities. It is necessary that this attitude should continue in order to preserve what progress has

been gained. We must look to the future. The opportunity and responsibility it brings are as mandatory upon boards and committees as on professional workers. Respectfully submitted.

Out of the balance on hand, we have to pay the salaries and outstanding bills for November and December.

EXPLANATION:

Under our present organization we are now completing our third year of work. Our patronage is continuing to increase. That in itself is a certain sign and indication that the county at large appreciates the things

that library facilities can do for their children as well as for themselves.

Our stations are located in sixty-five schools besides room collections

at Nordheim and Winneconne; in two banks; nine homes; five stores; one drug store; three granges; one village library.

The Civic league of Winneconne has petitioned us for a merger. They wish to turn over their library into the Winnebago county library system and come under the release of and come under the rules and privileges of the other units of the county.

One station in the county was taken away during the year because the rules and privileges were being grossly misinterpreted by the custodian We feel that visits to the stations and to individuals over the county

should be made. It is becoming more and more vital that personal contacts be made and that everyone in the county understands what the county library can bring them in enrichment and enjoyment. We are trying to find means of making such visits possible. Can you gentlemen suggest a plan? CIRCULATION:

This is the first year that our stations throughout the county are using the American Library association rules for counting circulating statistics. That it has made a decided difference in the totals results for the year can readily be imagined and be seen by consulting our circulation records. It will be very interesting, now that the statistics have a common basis, to watch the use of books in the various sections of our county. The picture this year is as accurate a one of the circulation as can be had. Our incomplete statistics compare very favorably with those of last year's. Seven hundred fifty or more books are still out in active use and we can assume an average of six users to a book. We predict that the final total will more than equal last year's circulation.

own village. WORK WITH THE SCHOOLS:

We have stressed the work with the children this last year and the bulk of our books have been bought from the Wisconsin Reading circle book list in order that the same opportunity for amassing credit from this list could be given in our county schools that the children have in the cities with a public library.

This is the first year that the study and appreciation of art has been started in this county and we have cooperated with the county superintendent in this work by giving mounted picture service to the teach-

ers of the county.

Nor did we forget the 4-H clubs. We have added to the county library

this year such books of interest as:

"Four H Trail," Kendrick; "Under the 4-H Flag." Case; "Make Em Laugh." Lurie; "Producing Amateur Entertainments," Ferris; "Ice-Breakers," Geister; "Foods and Cookery," Matthews; "Clothing and Textlles," Matthews.

We have had excellent cooperation from the county superintendent and shall ask for even closer work with his office. The governor of North Carolina (O. Max Gardner) is absolutely correct in his statement which came out in an editorial in The U. S. Daily, Oct. 25, 1929, that The textbook in school is obsolete; library is the basis of modern education. ***In more progressive elementary and secondary schools of the country, the entire curriculum is built around the service of the school library, with the result that every grade *** draws upon its resources for the preparation of reports to be made in the classroom. ***Cur civilization has reached the state of social, economic and cultural development where it has needs which are distinctly above and beyond the bread and butter line of bare necessity." "I believe," he writes it has reached the stage where we should begin to pay some attention to those things which have to do with excellence and the yearning of men and women for a way of life touched by beauty and not entirely devoid of the stuff that dreams are made of."
ADULT BOOKS:

Have you noticed the many magazines that are writing about county libraries and their services this fall? We have bought only a few books this year for the adult department because it was necessary to form a basic collection for the children. We have added, among others:

"Story of Philosophy," Will Durant; "History of the American Civilization," Beard & Beard; "Abraham Lincoln," Sandburg; "Wisconsin," Fitzpatrick; "Fur-Farming for Profit," Ashbrook; "Farm Income and Farm Life," Sanderson; "Economics of Farm Relief," Seligman; "Rado Up to the Minute," Nilson; "Blue Book of Cookery," Smith; "World Weather,"

Clayton.

The R. F. D. should bring books to the farmer until the time comes when Winnebago county library has a book truck to make individual cues upon its patrons. A request to the county library is all that is necessary to have the books arrive by parcel post. That is, an individual request should be made especially when no collection is in the neighborhood or no station is handy. Ages past Cicero wrote "Books are the food of youth the delight of old age; the ornament of prosperity, the refuge and comfort of adversity; a delight at home, and no hindrance abroad."

We are not asking for an increase in budget this year in spite of the use could make of several thousand dollars, but we understand the situation in Winnebago county and are therefore willing to make the old

budget over to suit the new needs.

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S ANNUAL REPORT FROM APRIL 1 TO NOV. 1, 1929.

O. P. Cuff, county agricultural agent, offered the following, Report No. 24:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen:

I am submitting for your consideration a brief summary of the extension work carried on in Winnebago county beginning April 1 and

ending Oct. 31, 1929.

In considering this report I wish to remind you that it has been a case of changing horses in the middle of the stream. In the first place, work accomplished during this season was well on the way before I started. Therefore, my predecessor's work should also be taken into consideration. In the second place, the work planned by the agricultural committee for the year 1929 was much more fitting to my predecessor than it was for me. The two main projects planned for 1929 were 4-H club work and rural home-makers work in home economics. This was new to me. I had never specialized along these lines.

Program of Work as Planned by the County Agricultural Committee,

Cow Testing Associations. Project IV. (1) Outagamie and Green Lake Mail Order Testing. (2). Murray's semi-mail association. Minor Projects. Weeds. Poultry Improvement.

4-H Club Work.

We enrolled 443 members in calf, pig, poultry, sheep, garden, potato, sewing, canning, food, etc. I gave special attention to the livestock and poultry members, and left the garden, sewing, canning, food, etc., to our summer club leader, Miss Sylvia Brudos. We held our county round-up in July at Menominee park. At that event about 500 people were present. One bovs' demonstration team; one girls' demonstration team; home economics judging teams, and a style show girl were selected to represent the county at the state fair and the state district contest at Fond du Lac. The boys' demonstration team and the girls' demonstration team won the district contest and later were sent to the state fair where the girls won third and the boys ninth.

We took twenty-seven boys and girls to the Wisconsin state fair, most of whom had at least their bus fare paid. The boys exhibited twelve calves and five pigs at the fair. They won \$103 in premium money and the girls won \$23 and some good valuable prizes.

During the season I called on all but four of the calf club members.

Made a personal contact, talking to them about their calves and suggest-

ing changes in selecting, feeding, etc.

We had about a dozen meetings in the calf club sections of the county where we talked dairy cattle judging and feeding. Our banner meeting was up in the town of Clayton at the John Danke farm, where we had Professor Humphrey of the university of Wisconsin talk calf judging, showing, and dairy cattle feeding to fifty-two boys. That day as I stood at the ring side and watched those fifty-two boys watch the demonstration and listen to the lecture of Professor Humphrey I was thrilled with enthusiasm. I thought what that meant to fifty-two boys from probably thirty-two farm homes in one of the greatest agricultural sections in the world, to gather and listen to one of the oldest and best known animal husbandry specialists in the country, in simple language reveal to these future farmers the results of years of experience handed down from generation to generation

Just before the state fair I visited most of the calf club members that had the best calves and selected twenty to go to Milwaukee. Owing to a little dissatisfaction that occurred the last minute, only ten out of the twenty calves selected went to the fair. Seven out of the ten calves that were left at home were our best calves so we did not make as good a show-

ing at Milwaukee as we should have,

At the county fair there were 107 calves shown. There were thirty-seven more than last year. Thirteen pigs were shown, the same number as last year, seven sewing booths, three garden booths, and a large number of individual entries in sewing, canning, vegetables, poultry, etc. We were unable to get an exact check on this as a large number were shown in the open class. All told, there were 149 exhibitors at the county fair and they won over \$890 in cash besides other valuable prizes such as pressure cooker, garden cultivator, etc. The amount of prize money won at Milwaukee and at the county fair was over \$1,015.

Figuring the amount of money appropriated by the county for club work and then considering that the boys and girls won twice that amount in cash which is only a small item compared to the education derived, the principal object of this project. It appears to be money well spent.

One way of looking at it is this—the entire cost to the county for extension work for the boys and girls is not more than it would cost to send one boy or girl to the state university for one year.

Home Economics.

There were four groups of sewing clubs visited by the extension worker, Mary Purcell. I did not have a great deal to do with this work. Miss Schneider, the clerk, made arrangements for the meetings for every series at Zion, Ring, Algoma and Clemensville. Miss Purcell came every other month and spent a day in each group. I met her at the hotel in the morning and took her out to the meetings and called for her again after the meeting. About all I know about this work is that the women in the county are very much interested in having it continue. That, of course, is self-explanatory.

Soil Improvement.

There has been a great deal of call for work in connection with drainage work. During the season just passed we assisted twenty-two farmers in some way or other with their drainage problems, including holding a septic tank demonstration.

ing a septic talk demonstration.

We were very much handicapped by getting on the job late. We did
bevo time to work out a definite plan to work on. The fertilizer not have time to work out a definite plan to work on. The fertili dealers in most cases did not have the mixtures we wanted to use, find that commercial fertilizer is comparatively new to this county. from that commercial terthizer is comparatively new to this county. I found that few people paid much attention to what they used or how they applied it. This made it quite difficult to check up. I spent a lot of time inducing farmers to try different mixtures in a small amount to test out on their soil. A good many of them tried different mixtures. When I got out to check up on the results, in most cases they had forgotten what mixtures they had used.

The general conclusion we came to is that it did not make much difference what mixtures they used-it all paid. But the mixtures most

profitable to use we will have to study out.

There were three pasture plot experiments started in the county last year in cooperation with Professor Richards of the state department. We found that commercial fertilizer worked about the same on the pasture plots as it did on the field crop. We cut the plots with a lawn mower and weighed the grass. We are not giving out the figures on this work and weighed the grass. We are not giving out the lightes on this work yet as this experiment is to be extended over a period of years. But just to give you an idea of the results where a good complete fertilizer was used. In one cutting we were able to cut 53 pounds, while on the blank or unfertilized plot we cut six pounds.

We tested about forty-five samples of soil for acidity and find that

about 75 percent of the samples tested were acid. Of course, we recommend the use of lime wherever we found acid soils. There is quite a lot of lime being used at present and I'm sure there will be a lot more.

Project IV. Cow Testing.

Outagamie and Green Lake Mail Associations. (2) Murray's

semi-mail association.

Here is where we got away from the committee's plans a little. I felt that if we spent a great deal of time on cow testing work that the results would be that in a year or two the farmers would be looking for better bulls. Bulls from dams of known production. When I came here there were only two pure bred herds in the county doing official testing. Since then one of the two has been sold. So it was plain to be seen that if the farmers would be calling for bulls of known production dams that we would be unable to find the bulls for them.

So as a forerunner to regular cow testing I planned to organize a pure bred herd improvement association and that is what happened. We now have a pure bred association of twenty-six members and a year from now we will be able to furnish farmers with at least a few bulls from cows

of known production.

This has taken a great deal of time and expense. But I am of the belief that it will be well worth while and much more than was put into it. It is the first and only association of its kind in the state and the first in the United States. There will be a lot of others following this plan or something similar to this plan in the future, but Winnebago county is the first.

In cooperation with the county agent at Green Lake and Fond du Lac we have been planning on taking over the so-called Murray association at Ripon so that it will be under our supervision. Our plan will enable the members of this association to get their testing done cheaper and enable Mr. Murray to make at least a better salary.

Minor Projects. Weeds, Poultry, Fruit.

About all I have been doing about weeds since I am here is a lot of thinking. We have figured out that the weed problem is a very serious one, one of the most serious problems that we have to contend with. At present the only plan I can see to hold weeds in check is a more intensive cultivation plan.

Poultry:-During the season we have had more calls for help on poultry than any other phase of farming. In most cases where we have had calls we found the chickens were dying. In probably every case, in fact in every case with the exception of one, we were able to find the trouble.

We found coccidiosis, round and tape worms, and a great deal of tuberculosis in chickens and black-head in turkeys.

We held seven culling demonstrations with an attendance of ninety ole. We have passed out hundreds of bulletins from the office on people. poultry

Fruit:-Next to poultry, fruit growers have received the most service. We have had a good line of bulletins on fruit growing and orchard care. and have had a great number of calls for them.

Miscellaneous.

From April 1 to Nov. 1: 583 farm visits; 2,285 circulars; 1,177 personal letters; 914 office, telephone and field conferences; 73 meetings, including demonstrations; 2,436 attendance at these meetings.

Plans for Future Work.

In planning my work for the future I expect to have in mind first of all profitable agriculture. Few people work for pleasure and experience only, but for profit. When farmers prosper—prosperity is general.

It is no longer a question of producing more, farmers are producing

enough. It is a question of producing cheaper. In soil improvement work I believe it is possible by more intensive cultivation, checking soil acidity and application of required plant food in the form of commercial fertilizer along with barn-yard manure. To produce more or less acres at less cost and at the same time eradicate or at least hold in check the weed nace. So, I hope to make soil improvement my major project, By far the largest part of Winnebago county farmers' income is from

The average dairy cow in Winnebago county produces less than 200 pounds of butterfat a year. It has been figured that a cow that pro-200 pounds of fat a year makes a profit of only \$8.00 for its owner. I hope to encourage farmers to keep their better cows and sell their unprofitable producers. As I believe a greater profit can be derived from fewer cows and at the same time maintain production and increase profits. When the better cows are selected they should be mated with sires of known production dams to be able to maintain that standard of excellence. With this aim in mind I would like to make herd improvement work my second project. With these two foregoing projects I want to keep in mind foremost better crops and better cows for better profits.

Approximately 80 percent of the farmers' income is from the dairy

cow. It can be seen at a glance that there is too much of the burden of production placed on the dairy industry. I believe that cabbage as a cash crop can be grown much more extensively in Winnebago county and I know that pork can be produced at a profit. Thus distributing the load of producing. With this thought in mind I would like to make diversi-

fied farming a third project.

I am not placing 4-H club work in fourth place, because I think it is less important. It was placed first last year. If possible I hope to do as much with the 4-H projects or more than we did last year but in a little different way. By working 4-H projects in connection with the other major projects we can encourage cabbage production and make commercial fertilizer tests with 4-P garden and field projects. We can encourage Better selecting and cow testing pork production with pig club work. work with calf club and cow testing projects.

Home Economics:—At present I can't say what can be done in the way of home economics work. We have already two new groups asking for the work. Mrs. Nellie Kedzie Jones, home economics extension director of the college of agriculture, states that Winnebago county has already received its share of state aid. She has suggested that I bring up the matter of hiring a full time home demonstration agent before the county board for consideration. If the county will appropriate \$1,500, the state will do the same, leaving approximately \$3,000 for the work.

The cooperation I have met with in my work has been exceptionally good. I do not feel that any extension worker of any kind has met with hotter convention than I have met with horter recognition.

Gentlemen: While your body will be in session this eleventh day of March we the undersigned deemed it fitting to address you by letter in support of the proposed inter-county new road, commonly called the Winchester-Dale short cut.

Outagamie county trunk highway T starts five miles north of Dale at highway 26 and ends at Dale. If said proposed road were built, our T would connect with U. S. 110, and also closely connect state trunk highway 150 and county trunk highway T in your county.

Our county is willing and was for many years, to build this road. Your county would have about one and one-half miles, mostly marsh to build, while our county would have about the same. This important connection

That, in the second ware of said city of Menasha, said railway company owns part of lots 37, 38, 39, 40 and 41, and all of lots 42, 43, 44, 45, 46 and 47 of block 12. and also part of lot 1, block 13, across and upon which lots the railroad track of said railway company is situated. This property is outlined in red on the blueprint attached and made a part of

That, all of the lots above described constitutes railway operating property and is necessary for the purpose of properly protecting the railroad tracks from the wash of the river, and that by reason of its use as such, none of the property in question has been sold or leased.

That, by reason of the character and use of the particular property above described the same has been and is now being assessed and taxed by the state tax commission as a part of the general railway operating property of said railway company, in accordance with the statutes and laws of the state of Wisconsin However, notwithstanding this fact, in the year 1929, for the first time, the local assessor placed a tax valuation of \$600 upon said lots, and said railway company is charged with a tax in and for said year of \$18.00.

STATE VOCATIONAL SCHOOL LAW.

The following resolution, No. 2, was offered:

Whereas: The state vocational school law is mandatory in all its attendance requirements and leaves no discretion with juvenile judges to

adapt the law to individual cases or to family necessities; and

Whereas: Juvenile judges are required by vocational school authorities to enforce the attendance requirements in all cases regardless of the mental capacity or temperament of the individual or the condition or necessities of the family of tre individual, and

Whereas: Enforcement of this law takes up much of the time and imposes many burdens upon juvenile judges without giving them any power of discretion or judicial decision and works injustice and injury in

many instances, and

Whereas: Juvenile judges generally declare that much injustice to individual and family arise out of the rigid enforcement of the law and positive injury to many children follow that could be avoided if they were given reasonable judicial discretion in its enforcement; now, therefore, be

Resolved: That the legislature to be convened in 1931 be requested to so modify the law as to give juvenile judges the power of judicial discretion in the enforcement of the law and that copies of this resolution be sent by the clerk of this body to the clerks of the state senate and the state assembly, that will convene in 1931, with request that it be spread on the records of the legislature, and to all members of the legislature elected from Winnebago county to serve in the session of 1931.

Resolved, by the county board of supervisors of Winnebago county that the county highway committee be instructed to make a study and investigation of county zoning with a view to ascertaining the advantages and benefits to be derived therefrom, to consult with the regional planning department of the state highway commission with respect thereto, to negotiate with the town boards of this county relative to lands situated in their respective towns as may become affected, and to make a complete report of their findings to this county board at its next regular on special session, together with recommendations for the adoption of a suitable zoning ordinance and the establishing of set-back building lines. ROADS ON COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY SYSTEM.

The following resolution, No. 4, was offered:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen: Inasmuch as the county is "slowing up" in the matter of taking over town roads and placing them on the county trunk system

Be it resolved, that any town or towns having a road or roads they wish to have placed on the county trunk system must meet the following

specifications:

First: That 50 percent of the proposed road must have been graded by the county crew or by local crew and approved by the highway commis-

Second: That this same grading must be covered with crushed rock

or gravel.

Third: That all brush, the entire distance on both sides of the road, must be cut.

Fourth: That 90 percent of culverts must be widened to twenty-four feet in width. (This does not apply to plank, stone or concrete bridges.)

And be it further resolved, that all towns that are maintaining 70 percent or more of their roads be given preference in the matter of taking over roads, and be it further resolved that all towns that are maintaining 65 percent or less receive no consideration in the matter of taking over roads until the other towns have caught up.

TO CURTAIL ROAD BUILDING.

The following resolution, No. 5, was offered:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County: Gentlemen: You all are, no doubt, aware that all federal aid monies our state will receive in 1931 will be expended under the direction of the Wisconsin state highway commission, permitting maintenance only to be in the hands of the counties. Winnebago county is practically the only county of the seventy-one in the state, that is building highways by day labor, all the counties having heretofore built roads by day labor, are now letting it through contracts under state supervision. And even today, we do not know whether or not we have been giving the taxpayer the most road value for his money. Had we kept accounts of each kind of road, type, and location, also separate maintenance cost sheet of each, we would then be in better position to know which kind, types and methods used would give the most road value for the dollar.

Therefore, be it resolved, that we realize the time being near at hand when the state will handle all state highway construction, and that our highway committee be instructed to ease up on the purchasing of additional machinery used for the construction of new roads, and only make such purchases of same to complete road projects, as now have been ordered to be built this year, and after the completion of same, to advertise for sale to the highest bidder, all surplus machinery which will not be used for the maintenance of our highways, before same shall have become obsolete.

Chairman Spengler addressed the board, thanking the supervisors for their cooperation during the supervisor year just ending.

Motion that a vote of thanks be extended to the chairman and the clerk of the board, to the district attorney and reporter for their services and courtesies, adopted unanimously by a rising vote.

On motion, the clerk was instructed to correct all apparent errors he may discover in writing up the minutes of the meeting.

Motion that the chairman approve the minutes of today's session after they shall have been prepared by the county clerk, carried.

On motion, adjourned sine die.
