ORGANIZATION MEETING Tuesday, April 15, 1980

The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 6:00 P.M., in the Supervisors Room, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin by the County Clerk Dorothy L. Propp.

By virtue of Chapter 59.04B of the Wisconsin Statutes the April Organization Session of the Winnebago County Board was called to order for the purpose of organization and doing any and all regular business which according to law may come before the Board.

The Honorable Judge Thomas S. Williams, Circuit Court Branch III, administered the Oath of Office to the Supervisors.

The newly-elected members of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors were formally introduced.

Roll call showed full board present with the exception of Supervisor Maehl who was excused.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Invocation by Supervisor Goff.

The first order of business was the election of a Chairman of the Board for the term of two years.

ELECTION OF A CHAIRMAN

Supervisor K. Brandt nominated Herman J. Brandt. Motion made by Supervisor Neely and seconded that nominations be closed. Carried by Voice Vote. Motion made by Supervisor R. Olson and seconded that the clerk be instructed to cast the unanimous vote for Herman J. Brandt. The vote was so cast and Herman J. Brandt declared elected as County Board Chairman for the term of two years beginning April 15, 1980.

ELECTION OF A VICE CHAIRMAN

Supervisor R. Olson nominated Ralph Nielsen for Vice Chairman. Supervisor Donner nominated Kurt Brandt for Vice Chairman. Supervisor W.C. Pawlowski nominated James Shipman for Vice Chairman. Motion made by Supervisor Neely and seconded that nominations be closed. Carried by Voice Vote.

The Chair appointed Supervisors M. Utech and F. Utech as tellers.

It was agreed that the two highest candidates would be on the second ballot unless one candidate received a majority.

First Ballot: Shipman received 20 votes

K. Brandt received 7 votes

R. Nielsen received 17 votes. Second Ballot: Shipman received 26 votes

R. Nielsen received 18 votes.

The Chair announced that Supervisor Shipman having received the majority of the votes cast be declared Vice Chairman of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors for a term of two years beginning April 15, 1980.

HIGHWAY COMMITTEE

Chapter 147, Laws of 1979 permits counties to either elect or appoint members of the Highway Committee. Motion made by Supervisor M. Motion made by Supervisor W.C. Pawlowski and seconded that smoking be allowed during the County Board Session. Motion made by Supervisor Goff and seconded to designate a smoking area. Amendment LOST by Voice Vote. Motion LOST by Voice Vote.

Motion made by Supervisor Jacobson and seconded to have a commendation sent to the supervisor who were either defeated or resigned from the County Board. CARRIED by Voice Vote.

Board Meeting shall be on the second Tuesday of the month.

ADD NEW TITLE: ANNUAL BUDGET SESSION:

- Page 83 1.103: DELETE PRESENT SENTENCE AND SUBSTITUTE NEW WORDING: The Annual Meeting shall commence on the last Monday in October. The remainder of that week shall be devoted to special orders of business and consideration of specific budgetary items, with all resolutions affecting the budget to be acted upon in order immediately following the public hearing.
- Page 83 1.1031: CHANGE TO READ: The public hearing as required by law, on the proposed annual budget shall be held at 7:00 p.m. on the fourth Monday of October. All other items then moved down to next letter, ending now with "O". Motion made by Supervisor Donner and seconded to approve the change. CARRIED by Voice Vote.

Page 87 — 1.147: NEW NUMBER & ADDITION: Amendatory Ordinances shall be presented for first reading at one meeting and acted upon at the second reading. Motion made by Supervisor Hunter to amend by adding "not affect Zoning Ordinance." CARRIED by Voice Vote.

Page 87 — 1.148: NEW NUMBER & ADDITION: When a motion or question which affects changes in the budget, either in amounts appropriated or the purposes for which amounts have been appropriated has been defeated because of a lack of ½ vote of the membership of the Board as required by Wisconsin Statute 65.90 (5) the motion, or substantially the same motion, cannot be reconsidered prior to the next budget session, except by the consent of 90% of members present and voting. 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5.13 COUNTY PLANNING AND ZONING COMMITTEE

5.131 There shall be five county board members on the County Planning & Zoning Committee with duties as established by previous county board rules. The make-up of this committee shall include at least one, but not more than two, supervisors from an incorporated area. No two members of the Planning & Zoning Committee, may be from the same incorporated or unincorporated area. The members shall be appointed by the Committee on Committees of the County Board. All Planning & Zoning Committee members shall be subject to County Board confirmation.



5.132 THE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF SAID COMMITTEE SHALL BE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Responsibility for all matters of procedure relating to the Winnebago County Zoning Ordinance (This would include basic zoning provisions, floodplain-shoreland provisions and airport zoning provisions), except those designated to Board of Adjustment's Jurisdiction.
- 2. Creation and maintenance of the county development plan.
- 3. Consideration of solid waste disposal, metropolitan sewage disposal and matters relating thereto.
- 4. Committee of Jurisdiction for the Winnebago County Planner.

Motion made by Supervisor Goff and seconded to add to paragraph 3 the following: "not under the jurisdiction of the Solid Waste Board". CARRIED by Voice Vote.

Motion made by Supervisor K. Brandt to add paragraph 5 "Committee of jurisdiction for the County Surveyor. CARRIED by Voice Vote.

Motion made by Supervisor Hunter and seconded to adopt the duties of the County Planning and Zoning Committee. CARRIED by Voice Vote.

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5.21 BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

5.211 The Board of Adjustment shall consisit of five (5) citizen members. All members of the Board of Adjustment must be from the unincorporated areas of Winnebago County. No two members of the Board of Adjustment may be from the same township. All members shall have a term of three (3) years except initially the term of one citizen member shall commence with the date of appointment and confirmation by the County Board and end the third Tuesday in April, 1981; the term of the two citizen members shall commence with appointment and confirmation by the County Board and end the third Tuesday in April, 1982; and the term of two citizen members shall commence with appointment and confirmation by the County Board and end the third Tuesday in April 1983. Thereafter, all terms shall be three (3) years. All members of the Board of Adjustment shall be appointed by the County Executive subject to confirmation by the County Board.

5.212 The Board shall function as the Board of Adjustment with such duties as are outlined in Wis. Stats., Sec. 59.99.

5.103 It is the Committee of Jurisdiction in the operation of the Winnebago County Fairgrounds and, as such, is responsible for the auditing and examination of expenditures made by the Winnebago County Fair Association as relates to the operation of the Winnebago County Fairgrounds and especially such appropriations as Winnebago County shall make from time to time for the maintenance and improvements of the Winnebago County Fairgrounds.

- 2. If such resolution is presented after adoption of the annual County Board Budget, the vote requirement for passage shall be as established by Sec. 65.90, Stats.

AUTHORIZE EXECUTION OF CONTRACT CREATING EAST WISCONSIN COUNTIES RAILROAD CONSORTIUM

The following Resolution No. 1 was Presented: TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPER-VISORS:

WHEREAS, the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroad service to the Counties of Columbia, Dodge, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Washington and Winnebago, by a branch line presently known as the Northern Division, is scheduled for complete abandonment on June 30, 1980; and

WHEREAS, it is essential from the standpoint of welfare and to the best interests of the Counties and the inhabitants thereof that the railroad service on the said line be retained; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has acquired the said railroad line and wishes to enter into appropriate railroad property agreements to continue railroad service on the said line; and

WHEREAS, the Counties have received offers from

private railroad operators to continue railroad service on the said line after June 30, 1980; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has insisted that in order to continue said rail service beyond June 30, 1980, the aforementioned Counties or those interested in continuing rail service, must enter into a contract for the joint exercise of powers and authorities provided under \$59.968, Stats.; and

WHEREAS, §59.968, Stats., provides that a county board may acquire a railroad system for transportation of freight within the county or between counties; and

WHEREAS, a county may contract with other counties pursuant to §66.30, Stats., for the operation of a railroad system; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned Counties wish to enter into such a contract so as to create the East Wisconsin Counties Railroad Consortium; and

WHEREAS, a copy of the proposed contract creating the Consortium is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that appropriate Winnebago County officials be and they hereby are authorized to execute the attached contract on behalf of Winnebago County creating the East Wisconsin Counties Railroad Consortium.

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation requires as a condition precedent to making grants under §85.05, Stats., that each governmental unit of the eligible applicant agencies adopt a resolution which commits the local government units making up the eligible applicant agency to provide its share of the 20% of local funds necessary for the acquisition of the rail property improvements and the rehabilitation of the improvements of such rail property; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide the funds required as the 20% local share by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, the East Wisconsin Counties Railroad Consortium has, on the 29th day of April, 1980, entered into a written agreement with the Wisconsin & Southern Railroad Company, a subsidiary corporation of the FSC Corporation of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, whereby the Wisconsin & Southern Railroad Company has agreed to provide the required 20% share of local funds to the East Wisconsin Counties Railroad Consortium for the rehabilitation of the improved rail property or improvements necessary to preserve rail service; and

The meeting of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was called to order by the Chairman Herman J. Brandt, on Tuesday, June 17, 1980 at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

Roll call showed full board present with the exception of Supervisors Vanevenhoven and Goderstad.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and invocation by Supervisor Daggett.

A communication from Dorothy Propp was read thanking the Board for their thoughtfulness and gift.

ZONING PETITION JAMES C. FRANK, JR. — TN OSHKOSH

ZONING PETITION NO. 1 — A request from James C. Frank, Jr. who owns property in the Town of Oshkosh for a change in zoning from Rural Residential District to Suburban Residential District was read. Referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

- 7. Reduce the single grant to a lessor amount than was available in several programs that were available in the 1979-1980 heating season.

ication of said ordinance by the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection, farmland owners in the towns will be limited to a maximum of 70% of tax credits under the state farmland tax credit program (Wis. Stats. Chapter 91) vs. a maximum of 100% tax credit under a fully enacted county farmland preservation program.

4. Subsequent Amendments to County Board

a. All future amendments to the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance (text and map amendments) shall be referred to the County Board according to procedures established by the County Board for consideration regarding approval.

5. Record Keeping Responsibility to be Satisfied

a. The Utica Town Board is expected to forward, on at least a quarterly basis, to the County Planning and Zoning Department a list of permits issued for the period covered indicating the type of structure, use, size, owner, and builder for each town permit issued under town zoning to enable the County Planning and Zoning Department to adequately carry out its responsibilities for county-wide record keeping and for construction/economic forecasting.

6. <u>In Conformance with County's Ordinance</u>

a. The Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance is in general conformance with the Winnebago County, Town/County Zoning Ordinance with regards to the following: completeness in matters of district descriptions; attention to details, except that it does not provide references to jurisdictional authority; and does otherwise generally provide basic zoning standards in conformance with said County zoning ordinance, except that minimum lot sizes require 1 acre for residential and indus-

trial uses and 11/2 acres for commercial uses.

7. As Restrictive as County's Ordinance

a. Finally, it does provide for land use delineations which are generally as, or more, restrictive than the County's zoning ordinance, except in Section 12 Commercial District and Section 13 Industrial District.

8. Other County Ordinances and Codes Not Affected

a. The approval of the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance shall not interfere with, abrogate or annul any existing, or subsequent, ordinances and codes duly adopted by the Winnebago County Board.

9. Warning and Disclaimer of Liability

a. This Resolution has been submitted on the basis of a generalized review of the substantive aspects of the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance. While this review is considered sufficient and reasonable for County Board action, it does not imply that said Town ordinance is legally defensible, technically reliable, and of high quality. Therefore, any approval of said Town ordinance shall not create liability on the part of Winnebago County, or any officer or employee thereof, for any damages from reliance on this approval or any administrative decision made thereunder by the Town of Utica.

ORDINANCE: TO CREATE CHAPTER 16 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES REGULATING PRIVATE SEWAGE SYSTEMS: COUNTY PRIVATE SEWAGE SYSTEM ORDINANCE (*59.065, STATS.)

The following Ordinance was presented:

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPER-VISORS:

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Legislature, in Chapters 34 and 221, Laws of 1979, requires counties to adopt an ordinance governing private sewage systems as defined in §145.01, Stats., which ordinance shall conform with the State Plumbing Code; and

WHEREAS, your Planning and Zoning Committee is recommending that the following ordinance be adopted so as to comply with the new statutory requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the provisions of \$59.065, Stats., the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE CHAPTER 16 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES REGULATING PRIVATE SEWAGE SYSTEMS: COUNTY PRIVATE SEWAGE SYSTEM ORDINANCE

16.01 AUTHORITY

- (1) This chapter of the Code is adopted pursuant to authority granted in §59.065, Stats.
- (2) This chapter of the Code incorporates by reference the provisions of Chapter 145, Stats., and all subsequent rules and regulations promulgated thereunder regarding private sewage systems as defined §145.01(14), Stats. Any provisions of Chapter 145, Stats., regarding private sewage systems as defined in §145.01(14), Stats., shall apply until amended and then shall apply as amended.
- (3) This chapter of the Code shall not be more lenient nor stringent than the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to Chapter 145, Stats.
- 16.02 JURISDICTION. The jurisdiction of this chapter of the Code shall apply to the entire area of the County.

16.03 DEFINITIONS

(1) "Alternative System" means any private sewage system that is not of conventional design which has been approved by the Department.

- (2) "Department" means the State Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations.
- (3) "Issuing Agent" means the County Code Administration Office (Zoning Office) and staff assigned the duties of administering the private sewage system program for Winnebago County.
- (4) "Private sewage system" means a sewage treatment and disposal system serving a single structure with a septic tank and soil absorption field located on the same parcel as the structure; an alternative sewage system approved by the Department including a substitute for the septic tank or soil absorption field, a holding tank, a system serving more than one structure or a system located on a different parcel than the structure; and may be owned by the property owner or by a special purpose district.
- (5("Sanitary permit" means a permit issued by the Department or the Issuing Agent for the installation of a private sewage system.

16.04 SANITARY PERMIT

(1) VALIDITY.

- (a) No person may install a private sewage system unless the owner of the property on which the private sewage system is to be installed holds a valid sanitary permit.
- (b) No person may sell at retail a septic tank for installation unless the purchaser holds a valid sanitary permit.
- (c) A sanitary permit is valid for two (2) years from the date of issue and renewable for similar periods thereafter.
- (d) A sanitary permit may be transferred from the holder to a subsequent owner of the land. The subsequent owner must obtain a new copy of the sanitary permit from the Issuing Agent.
- (2) APPLICATION FORMS. The Issuing Agent shall use the sanitary permit forms provided by the Department.

(3) APPLICATION PROCESS.

- (a) The applicant shall submit the completed sanitary permit application to the Issuing Agent.
 - (b) The Issuing Agent shall review the certified soil

tester reports for the proposed private sewage systems and, if necessary, verify the report at the proposed site.

- (c) The Issuing Agent shall approve or disapprove applications for sanitary permits and assist applicants in preparing an approvable application.
- (d) The Issuing Agent shall issue written notice to each applicant whose sanitary permit application is disapproved. Each notice shall indicate the following:
- 1. The specific reasons for disapproval and amendments to the application, if any, which would render the application approvable.
- 2. Inform the applicant of the right to appeal and the procedures for conducting an appeal as provided by law.

16.05 FEES

(1) SANITARY PERMIT.

- (a) Private System . . .\$35.00 (other than Alternative System)
- (b) Alternative System . . .\$80.00
- (2) TRANSFER FEE . . . \$10.00
- (3) The Issuing Agent shall forward a copy of each valid sanitary permit and that portion of the fee required to be submitted to the Department within ninety (90) days after the sanitary permit is issued.

16.06 INSPECTION

- (1) The Issuing Agent shall inspect or cause the inspection of all private sewage systems after construction, but before backfilling, no later than the end of the next workday, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, after receiving notice form the plumber in charge.
- (2) The Issuing Agent shall file reports and conduct surveys and inspections as required by the County or the Department.
- 16.07 VIOLATIONS. The Issuing Agent shall investigate violations of the private sewage system ordiance, issue orders to abate the violations and submit such information to appropriate County or State Officials for enforcement of this Chapter of the Code.
- 16.08 PENALTIES. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Chapter of the Code, upon

WHEREAS, your Committee is recommending this policy be adopted by the County Board.

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE SECTION 8.02 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

- 8.02 URBAN TYPE CONSTRUCTION ON COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAYS UNDER COUNTY MAINTENANCE JURISDICTION: POLICY.
- (1) PURPOSE. The purpose of this policy is to establish a criteria for sharing the cost of funding for urban type construction on County Trunk Highways under County maintenance jurisdiction.

WHEREAS, the General Code of Winnebago County was printed prior to the adoption of Resolution No. 7 dated December 11, 1979; and

WHEREAS, the said Resolution created County policy concerning the discontinuance and vacation of streets, slips and alleys, which policy should be included in the County Code of Ordinances.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE SECTION 8.03 OF CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

8.03 DISCONTINUANCE AND VACATION OF STREETS, SLIPS OR ALLEYS IN A RECORDED PLAT NOT LOCATED WITHIN ANY CITY OR VILLAGE: POLICY. (1) AUTHORITY. This section of the Code is adopted pursuant to authority granted in §66.296, §236.445 and §840.11, Stats.

(2) PURPOSE. The purpose of this policy is to establish an orderly procedure whereby the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors may take action on petitions for discontinuance and vacation of streets, slips or alleys in a recorded plat not located within any City or Village.

(3) PROCEDURE.

(a) PETTITION. The written petition required by \$66.296(1), Stats., shall be filed with the County Clerk who shall present the petition to the County Board at the first regularly scheduled meeting following the receipt of the petition. The petition shall be referred by the County Board to the Planning and Zoning Committee.

Upon receipt of the petition by the County Clerk, two photocopies thereof shall be made. One such photocopy shall be referred to the Corporation Counsel to determine whether the statutory requiements concerning the preparation of the petition (§66.296, Stats.) and filing of notice of application (§840.11, Stats.) have been met, and the other photocopy shall be referred to the Planning and Zoning Department for a determination concerning the accuracy of the legal description contained in the petition.

(b) PUBLICATION / RESOLUTION. Upon receipt of the petition referred by the County Board, the Planning and Zoning Committee shall determine when a resolution will be acted upon by the County Board, taking into consideration the notice requirement of §66.296(5), Stats., Class 3 Notice, such requirement being three insertions, once in each week, for three consecutive weeks, the last of which shall be at least one (1) week before the week in which the resolution will be acted upon by the County Board. After the aforementioned date has been selected, the said Committee shall authorize the preparation of the notice to be published and the preparation of a resolution for presentation to the County Board. The resolution prepared hereunder shall contain a full and accurate description of the land affected by the petition and shall be accompanied with a map showing the location thereof. The Planning and Zoning Committe shall include its recommendation concerning the petition in the said resolution.

- (c) PAYMENT OF PUBLICATION FEES. The petitioner shall be responsible for payment of publication fees required by §66.296(5), Stats., and recording fees required by §840.11, Stats. The payment of publication fees by petitioner must be made prior to action by the County Board on the resolution provided in Paragraph (b) hereof. A receipt from the Planning and Zoning Office evidencing payment of such fees shall be satisfactory proof of payment.
- (d) CERTIFIED COPY OF COUNTY BOARD RES-OLUTION. The County Clerk shall prepare a certified copy of the County Board resolution and attachments adopted pursuant to Paragraph (b) hereof which shall be suitable for recording by the Register of Deeds. The petitioner shall be notified when the certified copy is available.
- (4) EFFECTIVE DATE. The effective date of this section of the Code shall be upon passage by the County Board and publication in booklet form as provided in §66.035, Stats.

APPROVE THREE-PHASE CAMPUS COMPLETION PLAN: UW-Fox Valley Center; appropriate \$616,910 Winnebago County share of First Phase in 1981 Budget

WHEREAS, in a contract with the Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, Winnebago and Outgamie Counties have agreed to provide and maintain facitilities for a freshman/sophomore university educational program to be offered to the citizens of the Fox Cities area by the University System, and;

WHEREAS, those facilities, constructed 20 years ago no longer adequately house either the number of students enrolled or the types of programs offered, and;

WHEREAS, the four temporary buildings provided as a stop-gap measure fail to meet ongoing needs, and;

WHEREAS, the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley has fewer square feet per student than any other campus in the University of Wisconsin System (see attachment), and;

WHEREAS, the over crowded conditions and the lack of certain kinds of facilities have caused students to be turned away, and;

WHEREAS, the present facilities lack the kinds of space needed for a freshman/sophomore educational program of either 500 or 1,000 students, and;

WHEREAS, the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley provides access to higher education to over 1,050 credit-seeking students, many of whom would be unable to go elsewhere because of economic limitations, family responsibilities and employment schedules, and;

WHEREAS, thousands of additional citizens make use of the campus each year to attend short courses, cultural events, special lectures and various other educational programs, and;

WHEREAS, projections indicate that the population of the Fox Cities will continue to increase throughout the remainder of this century, and;

WHEREAS, non-traditional students (those over 21)

at the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley constitute fifty percent of the enrollment, and;

WHEREAS, the coming decade will bring a marked increase in this age group to the area served by the campus, and, hence, to the campus, and;

WHEREAS, projections indicate that enrollment of traditional students (age 18-19) at the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley will not decrease to the same degree as projected for the state or nation, offering little relief from the crowded conditions now experienced, and no relief from the lack of needed kinds of space, and;

WHEREAS, in excess of 60% of those students who graduate from the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley — many of whom would not have gone to college were it not for the presence of the campus - continue to support higher education in the area by transferring to UW-Oshkosh, and;

WHEREAS, the presence of the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley constitutes a significant economic benefit to the Fox Cities through salaries paid to employees, business directed to local merchants and other providers, and through the contribution of employees' expertise to the community, and;

WHEREAS, Winnebago and Outagamie Counties together have resources greater than those of any other, save one, of the thirteen counties providing facilities for two year campuses, and;

WHEREAS, a Facilities Planning Committee, appointed by the Trustees of the campus and representing the communities, student body and faculty, have recommended a modest building and remodeling program to complete the campus, and;

WHEREAS, three campus completion programs, financed by Waukesha, Rock and Washington counties—two of which are located approximately twenty miles from major, public 4-year Universities—and approved by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin and the Building Commission of the State of Wisconsin, clearly establish a policy precedent for and an example of campus completion to be emulated, and;

WHEREAS, the County Executive has indicated he would not approve participation by Winnebago County in the construction of a new campus for the Univversity of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley at a site adjacent to the Fox Valley Technical Institute, and;

WHEREAS, the Executive has indicated he would support a campus completion program in the present location if recommeded by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, and;

WHEREAS, the Outagamie County Board of Supervisors, has in the past officially indicated its support of campus completion;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County approve the three-phase campus completion plan for the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley, and;

4. Make repeated telephone calls, whether or not conversation ensues, with intent soley to harass any person at the called number.

5. Make a telephone call, whether or not conversation ensues, without disclosing his or her identity and with intent to abuse, threaten or harass any person at the called number.

6. Knowingly permit any telephone under his or her control to be used for any prupose prohibited by this section.

APPROVE TOWN OF POYGAN ZONING ORDINANCE (TEXT DATED FEBRUARY 7, 1980; MAP DATE UNKNOWN)

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPER-VISORS:

WHEREAS, your Planning and Zoning Committee was on February 19, 1980, instructed to review the Town of Poygan Zoning Ordinance and report back on same with a recommendation regarding County Board action to approve the ordinance; and

WHEREAS, on May 20, 1980, your County Board instructed this Committee to limit its review and recommendation to the substantive aspects of said Town's zoning ordinance; and

WHEREAS, a substantive review must address conformity of the Town's zoning ordinance with the Winnebago County, Town/County Zoning Ordinance, February 6, 1979, and address whether or not the said Town ordinance is as restrictive as the County's zoning ordinance; and

WHEREAS, this Committee finds significant to note the following for all who may be interested in said Town zoning ordinance:

1. Legality and Statutory Authority Not Implied

a. That said County Board approval does not include a review and recommendation based upon any aspects of the legal and statutory precedures and citings related to the adoption or administration of said Town ordinance.

2. County Floodpain and Shoreland Authority Reaffirmed

- a. That Winnebago County has statutory authority to administer and enforce floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in all unincorporated areas of the County and has done so according to the requirements of applicable state and federal legislation since July 24, 1968. As such, Winnebago County shall continue to enforce and administer floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in the Town of Poygan and shall expect that the Town Board of Poygan shall instruct appropriate town officials to cooperate with the County Planning and Zoning Department in the procedures necessary to insure the protection of our valuable shoreland resources and the protection of property of affected landowners, including the processing of County zoning permit applications and the direction of affected citizens to procedures for the County's zoning petitions, permit applications, and appeals where applicable.
- b. That the administration and enforcement of any town zoning related to the floodplain and shoreland areas must be preceded by ordinance review

and certification by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. Government's Federal Emergency Management Agency. Additionally, any subsequent approval of town floodplain/shoreland provisions by the aforementioned agencies will also take into account requirements that the town floodplain/shoreland zoning provisions must be in conformance with and more restrictive than the County's floodplain/shoreland provisions to enable administration and enforcement of same by the town.

c. That whatever action the town takes with regard to floodplain/shoreland zoning, Winnebago County is obligated and shall continue to carry out its responsibility and authority for the administration and enforcement of County floodplain and shoreland provisions in the Town of Poygan.

3. Farmland Preservation Alternatives

a. That under town zoning, but not until certification of said ordinance by the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection, farmland owners in the towns will be limited to a maximum of 70% of tax credits under the state farmland tax credit program (Wis. Stats. Chapter 91) vs. a maximum of 100% tax credit under a fully enacted county farmland preservation program.

4. Subsequent Amendments to County Board

a. All future amendments to the Town of Poygan Zoning Ordinance (text and map amendments) shall be referred to the County Board according to procedures established by the County Board for consideration regarding approval.

5. Record Keeping Responsibility to be Satisfied

a. The Poygan Town Board is expected to forward, on at least a quarterly basis, to the County Planning and Zoning Department a list of permits issued for the period covered indicating the type of structure, use, size, owner, and builder for each town permit issued under town zoning to enable the County Planning and Zoning Department to adequately carry out its responsibilities for countywide record keeping and for construction/economic forecasting.

6. Not in Conformance with County's Ordinance

a. The Town of Poygan Zoning Ordinance is not in general conformance with the Winnebago County, Town/County Zoning Ordinance with regards to the following: completeness in matters of district descriptions and standards; attention to details, e.g. does not include definitions, references to jurisdictional authority, and provisions for typical modifications under certain district limitations; and does not otherwise generally provide basic zoning standards inconformance with said County zoning ordinance, e.g.:

1) Empowers the Town Zoning Committee to establish land uses and district standards not identified within the ordinance language in the M-1, Manufacturing and Industrial District; MH3, Contingency District; and B-2, Commercial Dis-

trict.

2) Does not provide standards for the granting of a variance.

3) Ordinance relegates all pre-existing lots of less than 60 ft. in width or less than 6,000 sq. ft. in area to nonconforming status.

7. Not as Restrictive as County's Ordinance

a. Finally, it does not generally provide for land use delineations which are as, or more, restrictive than the County's zoning ordinance.

8. Other County Ordinances and Codes Not Affected

a. The approval of the Town of Poygan Zoning Ordinance shall not interfere with, abrogate or annul any existing, or subsequent, ordinances and codes duly adopted by the Winnebago County Board.

9. Warning and Disclaimer of Liability

a. This Resolution has been submitted on the basis of a generalized review of the substantive aspects of the Town of Poygan Zoning Ordinance. While this review is considered sufficient and reasonable for County Board action, it does not imply that said Town ordinance is legally defensible, technically reliable, and of high quality. Therefore, any approval of said Town ordinance shall not create liability on the part of Winnebago County, or any officer or employee thereof, for any damages from reliance on this approval or any administrative decision made thereunder by the Town of Poygan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, to approve the Town of Poygan Zoning Ordinance.



ADJOURNED ANNUAL SESSION Tuesday, January 20, 1981

The meeting of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was called to order by the Chairman Herman J. Brandt on Tuesday, January 20, 1981 at 6:00 p.m., in the Supervisors' Room, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

Roll call showed full board present with the exception of the following excused supervisor Wertsch.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Invocation by Supervisor Goff.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Mr. James P. Coughlin, County Executive, presented his report to the County Board. Mr. Coughlin informed the board members that a ceremony was held on January 5th, 1981 for the newly-elected county officers. A former supervisor Max Carpenter passed away and the county board remembered him with a floral bouquet. Mr. Coughlin read

a copy of a telegram sent to Mr. Roeder on the release of his son who was held hostage. The jail in the courthouse has been completely cleared. The Data Processing Department will be moved to the fifth floor. Applications have been received for the position of County Planner. The County will begin microfilming records in the Clerk of Courts office. A Coordinator for the Alcohol & Drug Abuse program has been hired. Mr. Coughlin urged opening of the new unit at Park View Health Center. The patient's stay would be \$65.00 per day to that of \$184.00 at the State Hospital. Mike Goerlits will operate the restaurant at the airport. The computer system for 911 Emergency system has been installed in the Neenah-Menasha Area. The Corporation Counsel will hire additional legal counsel to act on the claims against Winnebago County pertaining to the Joint Safety Building. WHEREAS, sec. 60.74(7), Stats., provides that any zoning ordinance adopted by a town board and any amendment thereof under this subsection shall be subject to the approval of the County Board in counties having a county zoning ordinance; and

WHEREAS, your Planning and Zoning Committee has developed a procedure for submittal of zoning amendments to the County Board for approval under this provision of the Statutes; and

WHEREAS, all towns affected were sent copies of this proposed procedure and no comments have been received by the Planning Office.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE SECTION 8.04 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

8.04 PROCEDURE FOR COUNTY BOARD ACTION ON TOWN ZONING AMENDMENTS POLICY.

- (1) AUTHORITY. This section of the code is adopted in response to statutory requirements found in sec. 60.74(7), Stats.
- (2) PURPOSE. The purpose of this policy is to establish an orderly procedure whereby the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors may take action on town zoning amendments as required by law.
- (3) PROCEDURE. (a) Information to be submitted by town. Any town with an adopted town zoning ordinance which has been approved by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors shall submit its recommendation or action on all town zoning ordinance amendments, both text and map amendments, to the Winnebago County Board in care of the Winnebago County Clerk.
 - 1. The recommendation or action on the amendment by the town shall be submitted to the County Clerk and a copy thereof shall be furnished to the County Board Supervisor who represents the the affected town. The information submitted to the County Clerk and the aforementioned County Board Supervisor shall be made not less than ten days prior to the next County Board meeting in order to be read at that meeting.
 - 2. All submittals to the County Clerk and County Clerk and County Board Supervisor shall require signed receipt of transmittal.
- (b) READING OF TOWN BOARD INFORMATION. The County Clerk will read the town board recommendation or action on the town zoning ordinance at the first County Board meeting that follows ten days or more from the receipt of the submittal by the town on the amendment.

- (c) OPTIONS CONCERNING PROPOSED AMEND-MENT. Following the reading of the proposed town zoning amendment by the County Clerk and during the County Board session at which the Zoning Amendment has been read by the clerk, it will be the responsibility of the County Board Supervisor in the affected town to exercise one of two options on the propsed zoning amendment:
 - He or she may submit a resolution recommending approval of the town zoning amendment as as acted upon or recommended by the town board. Any such resolution for County Board approval shall include a disclaimer of County liability for the town zoning amendment and town zoning ordinance.
 - 2. He or she may request that the proposed town zoning amendment be referred to the County Planning and Zoning Committee for its review, a public hearing, and its recommendation on the matter to the County Board within ninety days. A filing fee of \$45.00 will be required of the property owner for any such review by the Planning and Zoning Committee.
- (4) EFFECTIVE DATE. The effective date of this chapter of the code shall be upon passage by the County Board of Supervisors and publication in booklet form as provided in sec. 66.035, Stats.

An amendment to the Winnebago County Town/County Zoning Ordinance, Page F/S-3, Boundaries Section, to read as follows:

"BOUNDAIRES*

The General Floodplain District encompasses both floodway and flood fringe areas. Therefore, a determination shall be made pursuant to Appendix "A" to determine whether the proposed use is located within a floodway or flood fringe area.

The establishment of floodplain jurisidiction limits was originally established by the Winnebago County Board in 1968. These limits were primarily established by non-engineering data including the utilization of soils maps, U.S.G.S. Flood Prone Maps, Historic Data and aerial

photographs. The delineation of these boundaries has now been updated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The floodplain jurisdictional limits include those areas shown as "General Floodplain Overlay" on the official zoning map(s) of Winnebago County.

The boundary of the floodplain districts and, where shown, the floodway district shall be those areas designated as "A-Zones" on the Flood Insurance Rate Maps and in the Flood Insurance Study. This map dated February 4, 1981, is the official floodplain zoning map for Winnebago County and has been approved by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and FEMA and shall include the County's mapped Conservancy Districts established July 24, 1968. All applicable maps are on file in the County Zoning Office.

The floodplain areas within the jurisdiction of this Ordinance are hereby divided into three districts: the Floodway District (FW), Flood Fringe District (FF), and General Floodplain District (GFP), defined as follows:

- a. The Floodway District consists of the channel of a stream and those portions of the floodplain adjoining the channel that are required to carry and discharge the flood waters or flood flows of any river or stream associated with the regional flood.
- b. The Flood Fringe District consists of that portion of the floodplain between the regional flood limits and the floodway area.
- c. The General Floodplain District consists of the land which has been or may be hereafter covered by flood water during the regional flood and encompasses both the Floodway and Flood Fringe Districts.

The boundaries in the Floodplain Overlay Districts shall be determined by scaling distances of the Official Zoning Map. Where interpretation is needed as to the exact location of the boundaries of the districts as shown on the Official Zoning Map, as for example where there appears to be a conflict between a mapped boundary and actual field conditions, the necessary interpretation

shall be made according to procedures established in Appendix "A"."

Page F/S-4, Special Floodplain Provisions Section, add "i", "j", and "k", to read as follows:

- "i. All mobile homes shall be anchored according to the special mobile home provisions of the MH-1 Mobile Home District.
- J. Owners or operators of all mobile home parks and mobile home subdivisions located in A-Zones shall file adequate evacuation plans indicating vehicular access and escape routes, including mobile home hauler routes, with the appropriate disaster preparedness authorities, and shall provide for adequate surface drianage to minimize flood damage.
- K. All on-site sewage disposal systems and wells shall be floodproofed to two (2) feet above the established flood level and shall meet applicable standards of the County Private Sewage System and Sanitary Ordinances."

Page F/S-5, Basic District Standards Section, to read as follows:

"The standards of the overlying district shall apply. However, where County zoning districts allow smaller lot sizes than those of the Shoreland District of this Ordinance, the basic district standards of the Shoreland District Shall apply."

Page F/S-5, add section entitled Accessory Uses, which shall read as follows:

"According to underlying district, except in a floodway no structures shall be allowed."

Page 20, add section entitled Special Mobile Home Provisions, which shall read as follows:

"Mobile home placement (new and existing parks or subdivisions). All mobile homes shall be placed to prevent the flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure due to flooding, or displacement, or overturning due to winds. Such mobile homes shall be anchored according to the following specifications: (a) over-the-top ties shall be provided at each of the four corners of the mobile home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than fifty (50) feet long shall require one additional tie per side; (b) frame ties shall be provided at each corner of the mobile home with five (5) additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than fifty (50) feet long shall require four (4) additional ties per side; (c) all components of the anchoring system shall be capable of carrying four thousound eight hundred (4,800) pounds; (d) any additions to the mobile home shall be similarly anchored."

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County do ordain that the Zoning Ordinance and the Zoning Map of the COUNTY OF WINNEBAGO, be and the same are, amended as follows: TO READ AS PRINTED (ATTACHED).

APPROVE TOWN OF BLACK WOLF ZONING ORDINANCE (TEXT, NO DATE: MAP DATED JANUARY 12, 1981)

The following Resolution No. 4 was presented:

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPER-VISORS:

WHEREAS, your Planning and Zoning Committee was on January 20, 1981, instructed to review the Town of Black Wolf Zoning Ordinance and report back on same with a recommendation regarding County Board action to approve the Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, on January 20, 1981, your County Board instructed this Committee to limit its review and recommendation to the substantive aspects of said Town's Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, a substantive review must address conformity of the Town's Zoning Ordinance with the Winnebago County, Town/County Zoning Oridnance, February 6, 1979, and address whether or not the said Town Ordinance is as restrictive as the County's Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, this Committee finds significant to note the following for all who may be interested in said Town Zoning Odinance:

- 1. Legality and Statutory Authority Not Implied
 - a. That said County Board approval does not include a review and recommendation based upon any aspects of the legal and statutory procedures and citings related to the adoption or administration of said Town Ordinance.
- 2. County Floodpain and Shoreland Authority Reaffirmed
 - a. That Winnebago County has statutory authority to administer and enforce floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in all unicorporated areas of the

County and has done so according to the requirements of applicable state and federal legislation since July 24, 1968. As such, Winnebago County shall continue to enforece and administer floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in the Town of Black Wolf and shall expect that the Town Board of Black Wolf shall instruct appropriate Town officials to cooperate with the County Planning and Zoning Department in the procedures necessary to insure the protection of our valuable shoreland resources and the protection of property of affected landowners, including the processing of County zoning permit applications and the direction of affected citizens to procedures for the County's zoning petitions, permit applications, and appeals where aplicable.

- b. That the administration and enforcement of any Town zoning related to the floodplain and shoreland areas must be preceded by ordinance review and certification by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. Government's Federal Emergency Management Agency. Additionally, any subsequent approval of Town floodplain/shoreland provisions by the aforementioned agencies will also take into account requirements that the Town flooplain/shoreland zoning provisions must be in conformance with or more restrictive than the County's floodplain/shoreland provisions to enable administration and enforcement of same by the Town.
- c. That whatever action the Town takes with regard to floodplain/shoreland zoning, Winnebago County is obligated and shall continue to carry out its responsibility and authority for the administration and enforcement of County floodplain and shoreland provisions in the Town of Black Wolf.

3. Farmland Preservation Alternatives

a. That under Town zoning, but not until certification of said Ordinance by the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection, farmland owners in the towns will be limited to a maximum of 70% of tax credits under the State Farmland Tax Credit Program (Wis. Stats. Chapter 91) vs. a maximum of 100% tax credit

under a fully enacted county farmland preservation program.

4. Subsequent Amendments To County Board

a. All future amendments to the Town of Black Wolf Zoning Ordinance (text and map amendments) shall be referred to the County Board according to procedures established by the County Board for consideration regarding approval.

WHEREAS, your Planning and Zoning Committee was on January 20, 1981, instructed to review the Town of Vinland Zoning Ordinance and report back on same with a recommendation regarding County Board action to approve the Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, on January 20, 1981, your County Board instructed this Committee to limit its review and recommendation to the substantive aspects of said Town's Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, a substantive review must address conformity of the Town's Zoning Ordinance with the Winnebago County, Town/County Zoning Ordinance, February 6, 1979, and address whether or not the said Town Ordinance is as restrictive as the County's Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, this Committee finds significant to note the following for all who may be interested in said Town Zoning Ordinance:

1. Legality and Statutory Authority Not Implied

a. That said County Board approval does not include a review and recommenation based upon any aspects of the legal and statutory procedures and citings related to the adoption or administration of said Town Ordinance.

2. County Floodplain and Shoreland Authority Reaffirmed

- a. That Winnebago County has statutory authority to administer and enforce floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in all unincoporated areas of the County and has done so according to the requirements of applicable state and federal legislation since July 24, 1968. As such, Winnebago County shall continue to enforce and administer floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in the Town of Vinland and shall expect that the Town Board of Vinland shall instruct appropriate Town Officials to cooperate with the County Planning and Zoning Department in the procedures necessary to insure the protection of our valuable shoreland resources and the protection of property of affected landowners, including the processing of County zoning permit applications and the direction of affected citizens to proceedures for County's Zoning Petitions, permit applications, and appeals where applicable.
- b. That the administration and enforcement of any Town zoning related to the floodplain and shoreland areas must be preceded by ordinance review and certification by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. Government's Federal Emergency Management Agency. Additionally, any subsequent approval of Town floodplain/shoreland provisions by the aforementioned agencies will also take into account requirements that the Town floodplains/shoreland zoning provisions must be incomformance with or more restrictive than the County's floodplain/shoreland provisions to enable administration and enforcement of same by the Town.

c. That whatever action the Town takes with regard to floodplain/shoreland zoning, Winnebago County is obligated and shall continue to carry out its responsibility and authority for the administration and enforcement of County floodplain and shoreland provisions in the Town of Vinland.

3. Farmland Preservation Alternatives

a. That under Town zoning, but not until certification of said Ordinance by the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection, farmland owners in the towns will be limited to a maximum of 70% of tax credits under the State Farmland Tax Credit Program (Wis. Stats. Chapter 91) vs. a maximum of 100% tax credit under a fully enacted county farmland preservation program.

4. Subsequent Amendments To County Board

a. All future amendments to the Town of Vinland Zoning Ordinance (text and map amendments) shall be referred to the County Board according to procedures established by the County Board for consideration regarding approval.

A HISTORY OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY GOVERNMENT:

1840-1880

By: Charles D. Goff

INTRODUCTION AND BIBLIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

A history of at least the pioneer period of the county government of Winnebago County, Wisconsin is warranted at this time because a comprehensive account of the county's development, from the creation of Winnebago County in 1840 by the Wisconsin Territorial Legislature to 1880 has never been written. A second reason is that the two best sources of information concerning the early days of the county board, i.e., the proceedings of the board and the newspapers of the day have never been combed for county government news and crafted into an account covering the pioneer period. A third reason for attempting to write a history of the pioneer decades is the physical fact that the ink on more than 100 pages of the old handwritten volumes in which the County Clerk used to write the board minutes is so faded in Volumes II and IV of the Supervisors Record as to have become illegible. If the history of Winnebago County government is ever to be captured and recorded for the information of a present-day public, the effort must be made while the original handwritten pages can still be read.

The original handwritten minutes of the County Board, written by the County Clerks from the first meeting of the Winnebago County Board on September 14, 1843 to November 16, 1920 were recorded in Volumes 1-13 of the Supervisors Record and currently are shelved in the basement of the County Highway Department on Knapp Street. The title of the Board's official minutes was changed to Proceedings of the (Winnebago) County Board of Supervisors beginning with Volume 14 on November 16, 1920. The *Proceedings* were typewritten from November 15, 1923 to November 4, 1957 although these typewritten minutes were still inserted into Volumes 16-22 of the large, old leather-bound volumes.

According to entries in the handwritten Supervisors Record, printed copies of the Supervisors Record were published as early as 1870 and issued in limited annual editions of 200-1,000 copies. While no copies of printed minutes for the 1870's and 1880's have been found, the handwritten record of the clerks is still available and the County Clerk's Office has a complete file of printed

Proceedings 1890 to date.

The existing files of Oshkosh newspapers or microfilm of these papers published 1849-1880 were read for county government news which might supplement or clarify the official minutes of the clerk.

Citations to all sources have been recorded as chapter end notes to assist any reader in pursuing further any specific matter contained in the text.

THE GOVERNMENT OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN:

THE PIONEER YEARS 1840-1861

The County in England, the State of New York and Northwest Territory

The Kingdom of England, when it was first formed in the ninth century AD some 1,100 years ago, was a unification of a number of former Anglo-Saxon kingdoms. English local government was organized in an institutional ancestor of the modern county called the shire. The shires in the south and far north of England followed the boundaries of former kingdoms or of districts which had been settled at an earlier time by Norse or Teutonic invaders. In the English Midlands the shires were administrative districts without reference to earlier history. Shire business in Anglo-Saxon England was conducted chiefly by three officials, the ealdorman (i.e., Earl) who represented the royalty of the earlier kingdoms and led the military forces, the shire reeve or sheriff who was chief representative of the crown and head of the shire court, and the bishop who presided over ecclesiastical cases in the shire court.

After the Norman Conquest in 1066 AD the earls were retired from shire business, the position becoming merely a title of nobility. At the same time, the bishop was retired from the shire court by the separation of church and state jurisdiction. These changes left the sheriff as the chief military officer of the Norman county, as the shire now came to be called. As a police officer the sheriff maintained the peace, was steward of the royal estates, had a judicial role and generally became the locally powerful chief agent of the British Crown.

In the thirteenth century a new type of county police officer emerged in England when landowners began to be appointed to a new position called the justice of the peace. In the fourteenth century a judicial role was added to the powers of the justices of the peace when the king decided to reduce the local power of the sheriff. The rise and fall of the county sheriff from the Norman Conquest to the reign of Edward III was completed when the sheriffs, constables and coroners became the servants of the justices and frequently their nominees. The English justices of the peace at their quarter sessions of the county court also had the power to levy taxes, control the expenditure of county monies and had

the authority to direct the maintenance of the county jail, public buildings, bridges and roads. Seemingly the wielder of such powers was a powerful official but by the seventeenth century the justices were controlled in all their functions by statutes of Parliament enforced by the royal judges. The British Crown also controlled justices of the peace, sheriffs and local executive officers down to village constables by the power to dismiss them from their offices.'

County sheritts were appointed by the British Crown from a list of three selected by the Privy Council, and by law the same man could not be appointed for two successive years. The sheriff summoned juries, executed judgments of the courts, had charge of the county jail and was the local host to visiting representatives of the Crown. A lord lieutenant, usually the highest nobleman with estates in the county, supervised the local militia. By the seventeenth century, justices of the peace had become less prestigious, but were the real workhorses of county administration. Coroners investigated sudden deaths and bound over for trial those indicted by the inquest jury.²

In the New England colonies of North America, counties existed for judicial and militia purposes and the registry of land titles, but the most important local unit of government was the town. New England was settled by geographically compact communities of church congregations from which civil towns evolved by roughly 1700 AD. The New England town maintained highways, supported public schools, cared for the poor, regulated private businesses, was the governmental unit for the assessment and collection of taxes, for militia organization and for representation in the colonial legislative assemblies.3 Control of town affairs was in the hands of a freeholder democracy, the annual town meeting and an administrative and executive committee, the town board. Other officers of the New England town included a constable, town clerk, treasurer, assessors, fence viewers, hog reeves, overseers of the poor and even a town crier. When New Englanders immigrated west to New York, they established a vigorous system of New England style town governments before the county in New York had assumed its modern form.

After English conquest of New Netherlands in 1664, rudimentary counties were established in what we now call the State of New York. A few years later in 1683, the English county system was established more comprehensively in New York with the creation of ten counties having appointed sheriffs, justices of the peace and probate or orphan's courts. In 1691, following the establishment

of an elective legislative assembly in New York, elective county boards were created which were composed of

supervisors from the local towns.4

After the American Revolutionary War, the Confederation Congress in the Ordinance of 1787 defined the area west of the Appalachian Mountains and north of the Ohio River as the Northwest Territory. The present-day states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin were ultimately formed from the lands of the Northwest Territory. The first county in the Northwest Territory was established in 1790 and town meetings were begun in 1802.

The development of strong township government in the New England tradition was hindered by the political artificiality of establishing township boundaries in six mile squares by map makers of the U.S. Government instead of establishing them New England style by following topographic features, i.e., rivers, ridge lines, valleys, etc., to divide one settlement from another. Town government in Ohio was also hindered by the tendency of frontier farmers to build their cabins in isolated farmsteads rather than in the compact communities characteristic of New England. Ohio in 1803 was the first state formed from the Northwest Territory, Indiana joining the Union in 1816, Illinois in 1818, Michigan in 1837 and Wisconsin in 1848.

When Wisconsin Territory was organized in 1836, small three member boards of county commissioners were established. In 1841 a blend of the two systems was made available. The term "supervisors" was used but each county was permitted to choose between a small three member board of county supervisors and a larger county board of supervisors representative of towns. When the Wisconsin Constitution of 1848 required the legislature to establish a uniform system of county government, the legislature adopted the New York and Michigan plan of a large board of county supervisors elected from towns, villages and cities.⁵

The land within present-day Winnebago County was subject to the authority of the U.S. Confederation Congress from 1783 to 1788, and to the governor of the Northwest Territory from 1788 to 1800. When the Territories of Ohio and Indiana were organized in 1800, present-day Winnebago County was part of Indiana, the capital being at Vincennes and the white population of the whole territory including 50 souls at Green Bay, was only 5,461. This area became part of Illinois Territory on February 3, 1809, the capital being at Kaskaskia, i.e., East St. Louis today.

The year 1818 brought four historical changes to the status of present-day Winnebago County. First, the Treaty of Ghent in 1815 ending the War of 1812 required all British Canadians, including fur traders, to leave Wisconsin. This ended the "de facto" British control of Wisconsin despite the "de jure" control by the United States 1783-1815. The year 1818 was also the time when the boundary of Michigan Territory (established in 1805) was extended west of Lake Michigan to the Mississippi River and north to Lake of the Woods and the Canadian border. The Winnebago County area, then, became part of Michigan Territory on April 18, 1818, the territorial capital being at Detroit.

A third event in 1818 of importance to the history of Winnebago County was the establishment by Augustin Grignon and Louis B. Porlier of their trading post at Big Lake Butte des Morts, thus becoming the county's

first white settlers.

Change number four in 1818 for the Winnebago County area was that Governor Cass of Michigan Territory proclaimed the division into three counties on October 26, 1818 of the land lying west of Lake Michigan and north of the Straits of Mackinac. The County of Michilimackinac extended from the south shore of Lake Superior to the headwaters of rivers flowing into Lake Superior. Brown County was the region lying south of the headwaters and extended from Lake Michigan west to a northsouth line through the Fox-Wisconsin portage, the county seat to be at Green Bay. Thus the present-day area of Winnebago County as of 1818 was a part of Brown County in 1818. Crawford County was the region from west of the Fox-Wisconsin portage to the Mississippi and north to the boundary of Michilimackinac County, its county seat to be at Prairie du Chien.

The management of county affairs in Michigan Territory in 1818 was in the hands of a board of three county commissioners. Originally appointed by the governor, the county commissioners by 1825 had become elective. The boards of county commissioners were replaced in 1827 by boards of county supervisors, one elected from

each town.6

In Brown County citizen participation in the Michigan Territorial government began at Green Bay in 1821 when 42 votes were cast for territorial delegate to the U.S. Congress, and elected Robert Irwin of Green Bay in 1823 as a western Michigan representative in the Michigan Territorial Legislative Council.

Winnebago area residents by 1823 could thus express their legislative needs to county, territorial and Congressional levels of government. They could also avail themselves of justice courts, county courts and the Michigan Territorial Supreme Court which met annually in Detroit in late September. The U.S. Congress even made it unnecessary in 1823 to take appeals to Detroit from the county courts of the three Michigan Territorial counties west and north of Lake Michigan when it created a Michigan Territorial Circuit Court for western Michigan. This territorial circuit court had a uniquely extensive jurisdiction only slightly less than the Michigan Territorial Supreme Court, which lost its original jurisdiction in the region west of Lake Michigan. James Duane Doty's appointment as the judge of this "Wisconsin" court became effective on March 20, 1823.

Iowa County, with its county seat at Mineral Point, was created by the Michigan Territorial Legislature in 1830 and Milwaukee County was created in 1835 with its county seat at Milwaukee.

Thus, when Wisconsin Territory began to function on July 3, 1836 there were four counties within the present boundaries of Wisconsin, i.e., Brown, Crawford, Iowa and Milwaukee — Michilimackinac County remaining with Michigan. The total white population of the four Wisconsin counties according to the territorial census of 1836 was 11,683.

Once Wisconsin became a territory in 1836 fifteen additional counties were created; those in or near the Fox Valley included the counties of Calumet, Manitowoc, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac, Marquette and Portage.⁸

At the same 1836 session of the Wisconsin Territorial Legislature, Act Number 16 provided in Section One that:

Each county within this territory... is one township, and there shall be elected at the annual town meeting in each county three supervisors who shall perform, in addition to the duties assigned them as a county board, the duties assigned them as a township board.

Creation and Organization of Winnebago County and Its Towns

Three additional counties were "set off" or the boundaries defined by the Wisconsin Territorial Legislature in 1840, i.e., St. Croix, Sauk and Winnebago. Three landowners in Winnebago County were appointed commissioners to locate the county seat, i.e., Nathaniel Perry, Robert Grignon and Morgan L. Martin, but it wasn't until 1842 that the Wisconsin Territorial Legislature provided for the legal organization of the governments of

Winnebago County and the Town of Butte des Morts. Even then, the Wisconsin Legislature inadvertently complicated matters by providing that "the first election of county and township officers shall be held on the first Monday in April next at the schoolhouse in Manchester", i.e., on the east shore of Lake Winnebago in Calumet County."

This requirement failed to provide for a polling place in Winnebago County and seems to have been an error in legislative bill drafting. Elections had been held previously at Oshkosh in the 1830's. Furthermore, roads scarcely existed between the settlements west of the lake and those on the eastern shore and would have been virtually impassable because of snow or mud on the first Tuesday of April, 1842 had Winnebago citizens actually tried to travel to Manchester.

Yankee common sense prevailed. The April election in 1842 was held at the home of Webster Stanley in the Village of Oshkosh as had been done in previous years. The county and town decisions made at the April town meeting held at Webster Stanley's in 1842 were legalized later by a special act of the Wisconsin Territorial Legislature. Even this action seems to have been unnecessary since the Territorial Legislative Act of February, 1842 had stated specifically that the law activating government in Winnebago County was (only) to take effect from the first Monday in April, 1843.

Less than a week before the April election in 1843 at Webster Stanley's tavern in Oshkosh at which the first town and county board were to be elected for Winnebago County, the Wisconsin Territorial Legislature changed the name of the Town of Butte des Morts in Winnebago County to be the Town of Winnebago. ¹³ In accordance with the Territorial Legislature's act providing for only one township per county until the Legislature decided otherwise, the voters assembled at Stanley's tavern and elected three men to be at one and the same time the first supervisors of the Town of Winnebago and of Winnebago County. These first three supervisors were William C. Isbell, Chester Ford and Louis B. Porlier.

The first meetings of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors were held on May 1 and May 6, 1843 at the house of Webster Stanley in Oshkosh and elected William C. Isbell the first chairman of the Winnebago County Board and of the Town of Winnebago Board. The board appointed George F. Wright, the first county clerk, and William W. Wright, the first county treasurer. County supervisors that first year of 1843 received a per diem of two dollars per day, but they didn't anticipate

many meetings, as the total county tax for the fiscal year September, 1843 to September, 1844 was for only \$50.

While the first meetings of the board of supervisors were held in May, 1843, the first annual meeting of the board was held September 14, 1843 at which a budget of \$125 was adopted. Later the same month, the first regular election for county officers retained George F. Wright as county clerk, W. W. Wright as treasurer and elected W. C. Isbell the first register of deeds and Samuel L. Brooks the first coroner.¹⁴

A dramatic increase in Winnebago's population begining in the summer of 1846 seems to have persuaded the Territorial Legislature on February 11, 1847 to divide the Town of Winnebago into five towns, i.e., Brighton, Butte des Morts, Neenah, Rushford and Winnebago. ¹⁵ The towns of Winneconne (spelled Winneconnah in 1848) and Utica were set off on March 11, 1848 and ordered organized. ¹⁶ Since town chairmen in the 1840's were automatically county supervisors, the above increase in the number of Winnebago County's towns also increased the size of the county board after the election of 1848 to seven members.

In the month of March, 1849 four different bills passed the Wisconsin State Legislature and received the governor's signature which changed town boundaries or town names in Winnebago County. Chapter 79 signed into law March 8, 1849 temporarily extended the county boundaries by adding "Indian land" acquired from the Menominee Indians on October 18, 1848. By March 28, 1856 the land involved had either been set off into Outagamie County or been attached to Shawano and Oconto Counties. These changes again reduced Winnebago County to its present geographical limits.

The Wisconsin Legislature in 1849 set off and organized the Town of Vinland, and changed the name of the Town of Butte des Morts to the Town of Bloomingdale.¹⁷ A third bill approved on March 21, 1849 set off and organized the Town of Clayton.¹⁸ The last act of the Wisconsin Legislature affecting town boundaries or town names in Winnebago County was Chapter 136 approved March 22, 1849 which changed the boundaries of the towns of Winnebago and Brighton.¹⁹

Matters of primarily local concern, i.e., the need to set off, organize and change the name of local towns, had consumed so much of the Wisconsin Legislature's time that they delegated this important power to the county boards in an act approved on August 28, 1848. Thus the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors received a petition at its annual meeting in November, 1849 asking for the creation of a Town of Algoma.²⁰ This petition

was laid over until the next meeting of the board, but at the same meeting the Town of Nepeuskun was set off from Rushford and the new town ordered organized.²¹

Friends of the unincorporated Village of Algoma succeeded in getting a Town of Algoma created out of the Town of Winnebago by the tactic of substituting a prominent attorney in the Village of Algoma, E. S. Buttrick, for town chairman I.S. Clapp, for a single meeting of the county board on February 5, 1850, the chairman of the town "being absent". Supervisor-for-aday Buttrick was allowed to sit as a member of the board and made the motion to set off the Town of Algoma from the Town of Winnebago, the first town meeting to be held at the schoolhouse in the Village of Algoma. The motion passed and so did Buttrick's motion at the same meeting to change the name of the Town of Brighton to Town of Nekimi.²²

A petition to the Winnebago County Board from J.D. Whitney and others to change the name of the Town of Winnebago to Town of Oshkosh was received in November, 1852 and referred to the Committee on Town Organization. The committee recommended the change and the resolution was adopted by the board on November 10, 1852.²³ On the same day the name of the Town of Bloomingdale was changed to Town of Omro;²⁴ and on November 11, 1852 the Town of Poygan was set off and organized.²⁵

A proposal to create a Town of Menasha out of the northern areas of the Town of Neenah was received by the board at the annual meeting in 1852 and the resolution passed January 6, 1853 subject to a town referendum at the annual meeting in April, 1853²⁶ The referendum was favorable and the first annual meeting of the Town of Menasha was held at the Decker House in the unincorporated Village of Menasha in April, 1854.

The last town to be set off and organized by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was the Town of Orihula. Set off and ordered organized on January 2, 1855 the name of the town was changed six years later, i.e., January 9, 1861 to Town of Wolf River.

Perhaps the most interesting conflict over town names in Winnebago County's history developed when a faction of admirers of Armine Pickett in the Town of Utica persuaded the county board in February, 1856 to change the town's name from Utica to Welaunee, the name of Pickett's home. A motion in November, 1856 by "no nonsense" New Yorkers to restore the name of Utica lost but the friends of Utica persuaded a majority of the board to restore the name Utica in March, 1857. However, the battle over the names Utica or Welaunee was again on

the county board's agenda in November, 1857 the pro-Welaunee faction losing again. The Welaunee supporters now changed their tactics and asked the board to change the name of Utica to Liberty Prairie, the original pioneer name for the area. The board was unconvinced, no change was made and the Town of Utica has continued to be called Utica to this day.²⁸

Struggle for the County Seat: Butte des Morts vs. Oshkosh

The phrase "county seat of justice" particularly refers to the location of a county's courts and judicial system, but it also refers more broadly to the community in which the judicial function is carried on. While Winnebago County government was activated in April, 1843 the county remained attached to Brown County for judicial purposes and paid eight percent of all taxes collected annually into the treasury of Brown County to defray the expenses of courts.²⁹

Winnebago County was attached to Fond du Lac County in 1844 for judicial purposes, but the Territorial Legislature in the spring of 1845 authorized:

location of the Winnebago County seat of justice by three county seat commissioners at such place as they may deem most convenient and most for the

present and future interests of the county.30

The problem of choosing the community in which the future seat of justice for the county was to be located produced the first county-wide political controversy. The contest was nonpartisan, but became a replay of the ethnic competition in 1839 when Yankee settlers at "Athens" were outvoted by French Canadians resident at Algoma and Butte des Morts causing the new village to be named Oshkosh. According to famous Wisconsin historian, Reuben Gold Thwaites, at the April, 1845 meeting of the inhabitants of the Town and County of Winnebago:

The half-breed element was present in unwonted strength. They were headed by Robert Grignon, and old settlers say that even squaws were dressed in male attire and helped carry the day at the polls for the commissioners pledged to the location of the

county seat at Butte des Morts.³¹

The candidates for the three county seat commissioners and the votes they received were Clark Dickenson, Oshkosh, 39; Robert Grignon, Butte des Morts, 26; Harrison Reed, Winnebago Rapids, 20; Joseph Jackson, Oshkosh, 20; Joseph Dickinson, Oshkosh, 2. The tie between Reed and Jackson was settled in runoff election which Reed

won 31 to 20. While the commissioners represented the three population centers of Oshkosh, Neenah and Butte des Morts, it was also clear that the decision on the county seat would be made by any two commissioners able to agree on a single site.

The commissioners reached no agreement at their first meeting and adjourned for almost a month. At their second meeting, July 16, 1845 Robert Grignon presented a written offer from Augustin Grignon to deed a tract to the county for the seat of justice 300 feet by 300 feet, from Grignon's land at Butte des Morts. Harrison Reed offered a site near Winnebago Rapids and Clark Dickenson orally offered a site in Oshkosh near the mouth of the Fox River on land then owned by Chester Ford.

In reporting their decision to the county board, the county seat commissioners reported at a board meeting on April 24, 1845, "The several propositions were discussed; it was finally resolved that we proceed to fix the county seat of Winnebago County upon the land of Augustin Grignon on the Great Butte des Morts Lake . . . Messrs. Grignon and Reed voting in the affirmative, Mr. Dickenson in the negative". 32

Butte des Morts had won! Augustin Grignon, the county's first white settler and founder of Butte des Morts, had now won the victory of having his village chosen

as the county seat.

Grignon's victory was short-lived. The unincorporated Village of Oshkosh and the largest population center in the county was outspokenly dissatisfied with the outcome. Reuben Gold Thwaites reported, "The action of the commission was productive of intense indignation in the eastern section of the county, where white interests were mostly centered, and the determination to resist was general". 33 Butte des Morts, on the other hand, was so small that it lacked a U.S. Post Office in 1845 and its land hadn't even been platted as a village.

Since Butte des Morts had been chosen as the new county seat, the county board on December 13, 1845 voted to discontinue use of Webster Stanley's house in Oshkosh as a hall for county meetings and elections, and to thereafter hold such meetings at the house of Augustin Grignon in Butte des Morts. However, according to Reu-

ben Gold Thwaites:

The board never met at Grignon's house. The residence of H. L. Blood of Butte des Morts was the scene of their labors until March 6, 1847 when a change to Oshkosh was again made. There the board flitted to and fro, now in a saloon, again in a dwelling house, and then in a trading shanty, until

1849-50 when a courthouse was built upon the present site (i.e., Court and Ceape Streets in Oshkosh).³⁴

Supporters of locating the county seat at Oshkosh rather than at Butte des Morts now triumphed by hiding language transferring the Winnebago County seat from Butte des Morts to Oshkosh in the legislative act organizing the County of Winnebago for judicial purposes from and after January 1, 1848. Without mentioning the names of either Butte des Morts or Oshkosh, the transfer of the county seat from Butte des Morts to Oshkosh was accomplished in the following language:

Section 6. That the county seat in and for said county, for judicial and county purposes, is hereby established, after the first day of January next, on Section 24 in Township 18 North of Range 16 East, provided that suitable buildings shall be furnished for the holding of courts for said county by the proprietors of said town, free of all cost or charge to the said county for the next three years; after which the qualified voters of said county may vote for or against raising a tax for the erection of public buildings and if a majority of same shall decide in favor of said tax the supervisors . . . shall levy such a tax upon the taxable property of said county as they may deem necessary to carry out the provisions of this section. 35

Since the Village of Oshkosh was the only settlement in Section 24, Township 18 North, Range 16 East, it was now the county seat for a minimum of three years, provided the Town of Winnebago, i.e., the Village of Oshkosh, could pay for building satisfactory buildings. According to E. Edwards, the first Oshkosh historian, the passage of the above bill "removing the county seat from an isolated and unsettled point to Oshkosh," was an event "at which the good citizens (of Oshkosh) rejoiced liberally." ³⁶

The Wisconsin Territorial Legislature on March 2, 1847 had given Oshkosh the county seat for three years, i.e., from January 1, 1848 to January 1, 1851 after which time the voters could "vote for or against raising a tax for the erection of public buildings." Butte des Morts supporters, however, wanted the unrestricted opportunity to have the county seat returned to Butte des Morts, and launched political efforts in the spring of 1849 to accomplish such return.

A bill was introduced into the Wisconsin Legislature which would have returned the county seat to Butte des Morts had it been enacted, but the bill was killed in the Senate at the request of its Butte des Morts friends on account of an onerous amendment compelling

the completion of the county buildings in two years.³⁷ A petition was also started which gained 800 signatures by the time of its presentation to the Legislature which asked that the question of the site of the county seat be decided in a public election. Probably related to these efforts, was the reestablishment of a post office at Butte des Morts, for which Augustin Grignon was appointed postmaster.

While the county seat prospects of Butte des Morts seemed to be improving, Oshkosh resident and Winnebago County Assemblyman T. I. Townsend decided the Butte

des Morts faction as:

a few speculators (in village lots) who have been endeavoring to build up a village where there are no natural advantages... At present there are not more than twenty families within a circuit mile of Butte des Morts.³⁸

The county seat referendum was held April 2, 1850, Oshkosh winning by a vote of 690 against removal of the county seat from Oshkosh, to 470 for removal to Butte des Morts. The chief argument favoring Butte des Morts was that it was more nearly in the geographic center of the county, but those favoring Oshkosh said it was better to have the county seat in the major business center of the county, the Village of Oshkosh having reached a population of 1,032 inhabitants according to a school census in the fall of 1849. The greater size of Oshkosh meant there were better accommodations for food, lodging, shopping and for rental of facilities for county offices. Besides, editorialized the Oshkosh True Democrat:

Remove the county seat, and a new courthouse will have to be built. The people of Winnebago County are already complaining of heavy taxes. (The need to build a new courthouse) will increase, necessarily,

the burden of the taxpayers.39

To some extent, the county seat question became an issue between Oshkosh Whig defenders of Assemblyman Townsend and Jacksonian Democrats in the western part of Winnebago County. More important was the ethnic and political cleavage between the remnants of the French-Indian-Catholic-fur trade culture in the western part of the county and the Yankee-Anglo Saxon-Protestants who had settled in the villages and on the farms in the eastern part of the county. Real estate speculators interested in Butte des Morts properties seem to have played a role. In any case, the Winnebago County Clerk reported in the Supervisors Record that:

The towns of Algoma, Utica and Neenah, not having made returns to the Clerk, we certify there is a majority of 218 votes against removal of the county seat to Butte des Morts.40

The canvass of the election showed 690 votes against removal of the county seat to Butte des Morts, to 472 in favor.

An unsolved mystery about this election is that the clerks of the towns of Algoma, Utica and Neenah didn't file their returns with the county clerk, a most unusual delinquency. It is easy to speculate as to what might have happened, and both sides had understandable motives for wishing to control the result. However, research 100 years after the fact has failed to disclose what did happen, other than the data indicated above.

Shortly after the defeat of Augustin and Robert Grignon's hopes to have Butte des Morts declared the county seat, the county board returned the title to Augustin Grignon which he had conveyed to the county for a public square in front of the county building, when the future of the Village of Butte des Morts had appeared so bright.

A final effort to remove the county seat from Oshkosh was reported in the Oshkosh *True Democrat* on January 17. 1851:

At the session of the Winnebago County Board last week, Mr. C. J. Coon of Algoma presented a bond with a penalty of \$2,000 binding himself in case he succeeded in getting the Wisconsin Legislature to authorize the removal of the county seat to the Village of Algoma, to pay Winnebago County whatever the board should assess as to the value of the present buildings. The chairman refused to bring the resolution before the board on the ground that the board had nothing to do with it. An appeal from the chair was sustained, and Mr. Coon's bond was laid on the table with the privilege for him to withdraw it.

The struggle between county factions for possession of the Winnebago County seat was finally ended.

County Buildings Before the Civil War

Three gifts of Oshkosh land were offered for a county courthouse site by L. M. Miller and S. A. Wolcott, by Joseph Jackson and by W. W. Wright. The offer of Miller and Wolcott for land at Ceape Avenue and Court Street in Oshkosh was accepted by the county board on March 24, 1847 for the courthouse site. The procedure by which the realtors and merchants of the unincorporated Village of Oshkosh succeeded in raising the money and getting the courthouse built is unkown, but it seems likely that a committee was organized which "passed the hat" among residents of the settlement, and that the first courthouse, a two story frame structure which housed

all county administrative offices in two rooms on the first floor and the courts and the county board on the second floor, cost between three and five hundred dollars. The only county assistance came in an appropriation of \$300 for "building a jail, provided the citizens of the Town of Winnebago (i.e., Village of Oshkosh) will raise \$200 for the same purpose." This challenge to civic giving was met promptly by Oshkosh people, because the completed jail was accepted by the county board on February 5, 1850.⁴²

The specifications for the first Winnebago County jail required that the structure "be built of oak timber walls and floor twelve inches thick, fourteen feet wide by twenty-eight long and not less than ten feet between joints, the whole to be done in a good and workmanlike manner." The Oshkosh *True Democrat*, the first newspaper in the county, described the first courthouse in the following vague language:

The people of this town (of Winnebago, i.e., Village of Oshkosh), in consideration of a temporary location of the county seat here, built and gave to the use of the county, a hall for the sittings of the courts, etc., and a jail amply sufficient for its present need. It is a good house, and for the time being, answers the purpose well.⁴³

Winnebago County's first courthouse may have satisfied the legal requirements in moving the county seat to Oshkosh, but from the beginning the building seems to have needed almost continuous repairs. Completed in early 1849 at a cost which probably didn't exceed \$500, the county board in November, 1850 appropriated \$100 to build a wall under the building one foot thick with stone abuttments under each corner and two under each sill. By 1852, the county board felt it necessary to spend another \$200 to repair, underpin and paint the two lower rooms and the courtroom. Only one year later the county board spent still another \$282.02 for additional repairs to the courthouse.44 The first Winnebago County courthouse must really have been poorly built to have required more expenditures for repairs in only the first four years than the entire structure probably cost originally!

What were some of the shortcomings of the first county courthouse? In addition to the structural problems indicated above, the courtroom was too small to seat a large audience, since in the locally famous Partridge Trial in 1852 the county rented the Oshkosh Methodist Church auditorium for fifteen dollars to accommodate the interested public. Other court sessions appear to have

also been held outside the courthouse since the county board in 1854 approved an expenditure of eighty dollars for courtroom rental.

A second shortcoming of the first courthouse was the fear that vital records of the county clerk, treasurer and register of deeds could easily be destroyed in a wooden building. This hazard of potential destruction of unreplaceable records in a courthouse fire was a sufficiently clear and present danger in pioneer Oshkosh that the county board's Courthouse Building Committee in December, 1853 recommended erection of a fireproof (i.e., brick) courthouse annex or administrative building.

The dimensions of the new county annex were 24'x34' and 15' high, having three rooms; one designed to hold the office of the register of deeds, a second office to house the clerk of court and sheriff, and a third office to be occupied by the county clerk and county treasurer. The committee recommended this office building be erected on the existing courthouse site, and estimated it could be built for \$1,500. They also recommended against building a full-scale new courthouse and jail until the Wisconsin Legislature passed an act authorizing counties to issue bonds sufficient to pay the cost of erecting such buildings.⁴⁵

The Oshkosh *True Democrat* enthusiastically supported the county board's Building Committee proposal to build a county annex by the following revealing language:

The movement (favoring erection of courthouse annex) is a good one. Our courthouse and jail are perfect nuisances; they answer no good purpose whatever. The courthouse stands nearly empty; the circuit court has been held the past season in Marks Hall, and the county has had to pay the rent. There are no rooms in it fit for the county offices, and the records and papers are kept in different parts of the city, liable every day to be destroyed by fire; and although we believe every officer has used every precaution in his power to prevent such an event, yet it is impossible to make them secure without a fireproof building or safe of some kind in which to keep them.

The destruction of the office and records of either the register, clerk of court, or clerk of the board of supervisors, would jeopardize an immense amount of property and probably lead to litigation which would cost the county more than the expense of providing some safe place to keep them.

The jail is perfectly useless for keeping any man who is disposed to get out, as has been abundantly

proved in several instances. The only man who has remained there for any length of time this past season is one from Waushara County, and he has had ample chance to escape, but positively refused to leave when all the doors were open and he was urged to make his escape. It is certainly inhuman to keep any peaceable, well-disposed man in such a miserable hovel as that we call a jail. The county is able to erect good buildings.⁴⁶

Three weeks after the above editorial, the Winnebago County Board's Committee on County Buildings reported they had examined several proposed sites on which to erect a county administration building and favored the existing location at the corner of Makake and Awah-Sah (i.e., Ceape and Court Streets today). The committee recommended erection of a temporary but fireproof building 30' x 40' and 15' high containing three rooms; one for the register of deeds, one for the clerk of court and sheriff and one for the clerk of the county board and county treasurer. The committee estimated such a build-

ing could be erected in 1853-54 for \$1,500.

The county administration building recommended for construction in December, 1853 was not considered to be a new county courthouse or jail, but was thought of as being merely temporary fireproof quarters to house essential county services. The county board Committee on County Buildings specifically recommended against undertaking the building of a courthouse and jail until the Wisconsin Legislature passed an act authorizing the county to issue and sell bonds to an amount sufficient to defray the cost of building a courthouse. However, this recommendation appears to have been more of a bid for political approval of the committee's stand for frugality than a serious effort to obtain state authorization to issue bonds, because the same annual meeting of the county board rejected a resolution asking "our senator and members of Assembly to procure passage of a legislative act authorizing the county to issue and sell its bonds to pay for erecting county buildings".47

Having expressed politically appropriate sentiments favoring frugality, the County Buildings Committee (Eli Stilson, Joseph Osborn and Seth Wyman) was authorized to let the contract and superintend construction of a fire-proof courthouse annex for a cost not to exceed \$2,000.⁴⁸ The new building was occupied by the November annual meeting of 1854. The county's space needs for courtroom and jail space, however, were still unmet. The county's courtroom was still a rented hall for which the county paid an annual rent of \$80 and there was an urgent

need for an entirely new jail.49

In January, 1855 the Winnebago County Board called for bids for construction of a new county jail, but a legal dispute developed with the City of Oshkosh over the county's title to the tract on which the jail was proposed to be built. The board was apparently embarrassed by the ensuing delay and allowed a compensation of \$25 to Markham and Dexter, the lowest bidders for making the "winning" estimate on the cost of a new jail the board now decided it didn't want to build. The board then discharged the building committee. 50

More than a year later the Winnebago County Board offered on February 8, 1856 to settle its dispute with the City of Oshkosh over title to the land on which the old original courthouse stood, the county offering to:

release all title and claim to the old courthouse on Lot 24 in Block 19 in the 1st Addition, 2nd Ward, City of Oshkosh, provided the city would lease Lot 24 for five years, and provided the City and Town of Oshkosh would quit claim Lot 24 to the county.⁵¹

When no suitable place could be obtained in Oshkosh in the fall of 1856 to hold sessions of the county court, the Winnebago County Board was again urged to consider erecting county buildings. The board acted to the extent of appointing a committee of five "to inquire into the expediency of erecting county buildings" and ordered the committee to report its findings at the next session of the board. 52 The editor of the Oshkosh (Weekly) Courier sputtered in his impatience:

Winnebago County, with a population one-third larger than Manitowoc (which had just completed a new courthouse and jail) is as yet destitute of a courthouse, unless the dilapidated old wooden structure propped up on one corner of the (Oshkosh) public square is dignified with the title, and the probate records of the county are exposed to destruction by fire because of the penuriousness of the Board of Supervisors and their neglect to provide for their proper security.⁵³

The county board's Committee on Buildings presented three plans, the board adopting "Plan C" on January 13, 1857 "provided the buildings don't cost over \$25,000." Two days later the Building Committee was authorized to procure suitable plans and specifications for building a courthouse. 54

On March 4, 1857 the Building Committee reported a bid of \$23,975 from A. V. Parker to build a county courthouse. Parker's proposal was to complete construction of the new building by January 1, 1859 in return for \$8,000 in four-year county bonds bearing 12% interest issued in May, 1857, \$8,000 in cash payable in March,

1858 and \$7,975 in cash payable in March, 1859. A motion to approve Parker's proposal carried by a bare majority of the board.55

At this point, supervisor Joseph Stringham and several other Oshkosh real estate men on the south side of the Fox River, proposed that the new county building be located on an eight lot tract which they owned and which they offered to the county free of charge. Stringham's proposal caused the county board to reconsider their previous vote and to lay the courthouse construction proposal on the table so that the Building Committee could inquire into the merits of Stringham's proposal. 56

The Oshkosh Courier complained that since "Ninetenths of the business and population of the City of Oshkosh is on the North Side, the injustice of changing the location of the public buildings (to the South Side) is too manifest to need argument."57 While the county already owned county grounds north of the river, Stringham's offer of free land or the money equivalent gave non-City of Oshkosh supervisors the opening to drive a

hard bargain with the City of Oshkosh.

The "bargain" was contained in a motion to erect the county buildings on the original county grounds north of the river provided that the City of Oshkosh pay Winnebago County \$2,000, quit claim to the county the lot on the public square on which the City of Oshkosh owned a reversionary interest, provided the \$2,000 be used in construction of the proposed county buildings, provided the contractor accept \$2,000 in cash in lieu of \$2,000 in 12% interest-bearing bonds and provided the contract not be closed until the \$2,000 in cash had been received from the City of Oshkosh. The record shows that this motion was adopted.58

Needless to say, the Oshkosh newspaper of the day, the Weekly *Courier*, approved locating the new county buildings on the original county site north of the Fox River,

but editorialized indignantly:

The imposition of an extra tax of \$2,000 upon the City (Oshkosh) as a bonus to the county we look upon as an arbitrary, inequitable proceeding which cannot be defended upon any principle of justice or fair

dealing.59

While the county building contractor, A.V. Parker, had made some progress in the construction of a county courthouse by the November annual meeting of the county board in 1857, there was great reluctance on the part of the county supervisors to continue with the project. The county was feeling economic effects of the Panic of 1857, and many town chairmen were reluctant to raise

any new taxes before the town meetings the following April. There were also Republican vs. Democratic Party cross-currents which may explain why a motion to pay the county's obligation to its building contractor, A. V. Parker, by raising \$14,000 by taxes was postponed indefinitely by a vote of 13 to 11.

Oshkosh Courier Editor, George Read, summarized

the situation colorfully by editorializing:

The time (of the Winnebago County Board at their annual meeting) was mainly consumed in wrangling over petty accounts against the county, repudiating just and equitable claims presented, and disreputable intrigues to prevent the completion of the new county buildings . . . The present system of county (supervisor) legislation is a humbug and a nuisance and the sooner it is abolished the better.61

Only two weeks later Courier Editor, George Read,

commented in a similar mood:

The Neenah Conservator (criticizes) the Oshkosh papers for not giving publicity to the Board of Supervisors. We can say for the Courier, that the reason why we have not reported the doings of that convocation of chuckle heads is that we were ashamed to have it go abroad that Winnebago County contained a set of men so deplorably mean as the majority of that body. The dirty pretexts and excuses by which they - in a majority of cases - sought to avoid the payment of just claims against the county were as contemptible as they were dishonest. 62

The continuing economy emphasis by the county board of the time may be evident in the board's request of the county judge in January, 1858 that he occupy the room "now occupied by the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and keep his office therein hereafter." The county clerk, the county judge and clerk of court thus were ordered to occupy the same single room. The county judge deemed such crowding unacceptable and continued to hold court in his rented quarters.63

The county board sought a longer term solution to their financial difficulties in building a courthouse by adopting a resolution on January 14, 1858 asking the state senator and the three Assemblymen from Winnebago County to work to procure an amendment from the Wisconsin Legislature which would authorize the county board to issue bonds up to \$10,000 payable in six to ten years at interest not exceeding 12%, provided that not more than \$1,000 would be made payable in any one year. The extremity of the board's cash flow problem would seem to be indicated by the fact that while they paid county buildings contractor Parker \$1,500 on account, they issued \$500 bonds to do so.64

Nearly a year later at the November, 1858 annual meeting of the county board, a committee was appointed to confer with contractor A. V. Parker as to what damages would be payable to Parker if the county abandoned their contract with him to build the county courthouse. The county board, however, couldn't avoid additional costs by the tactic of doing nothing, since the judge was still holding court in quarters rented from

Peter McCourt for \$8.00 per day.

The county board now chose to refer the question of erection of new county buildings to a special "blue ribbon" committee composed of Curtis Reed, C. Bigelow and chaired by S. M. Hay, then the Mayor of Oshkosh. The Hay Committee report advocating an adequate building was rejected 13 to 12 in favor of the adoption of a substitute motion to erect courthouse buildings for a price not to exceed \$15,000. A building committee of county supervisors was chosen to supervise construction, one supervisor to be chosen from each Assembly district. and were authorized to alter the courthouse specifications to lessen the price provided the general plan of the courthouse building wasn't changed.69

Once the policy of building a county courthouse capable of providing space for all county officials and services had been decided upon, the actual construction began to move forward quickly. The Building Committee settled the county's contract with A. V. Parker and acted as the general contractor on the new building by hiring subcontractors for masonry, carpentry and ironwork, and persuaded the Board to restore several items previously cut out of the building plans, i.e., \$1,200 for a slate (fireproof) roof and some additional brickbearing walls in the interior of the building. By mid-September, 1859 the walls were up as far as the third story, by October 14th the roof was on and the cupola raised, and by November 1st the slates for the roof had been laid. It should surprise no one that the supervisor elected chairman of the county board in the November, 1859 annual session was Eli Stilson, the impressively effective chairman of the Courthouse Building Committee. 66

The Menasha Conservator described the 1860 courthouse as follows:

In the basement of the new county courthouse are the convicts cells, and the guards and jailors apartments. In the first story are rooms for the county clerk, register, treasurer, clerk of court, district attorney, grand jury, law-library and judges room from which the judge can pass to or from the courtroom above by a private stairway. Over the two jury rooms is a large gallery for spectators. The exterior walls of the courthouse are of cream colored brick.

Two final steps were taken in 1860 to put the courthouse in full operation. First, the new building was insured for \$10,000 against loss by fire with the Aetna and Phoenix Insurance Companies of Hartford, Connecticut. The premium was three-fourths of one percent of the building cost per annum. The second step was the leasing of the county's brick administrative annex in the northwest corner of the courthouse square to the City of Oshkosh. The second official courthouse building in Winnebago County history was in full operation by January or February of 1860. As its final act, the Courthouse Building Committee reported to the county board that the entire cost of the new courthouse and jail was:⁶⁷
