ORGANIZATION MEETING Tuesday, April 21, 1981

The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was called to order by the Chairman Herman J. Brandt on Tuesday, April 21, 1981 at 6 p.m., in the Supervisors' Room, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Invocation by Supervisor Goff.

PARK VIEW HEALTH CENTER COMMITTEE REPORT TO THE COUNTY BOARD

As directed by the Winnebago County Board on March 17, 1981, the Park View Health Center Committee has thoroughly studied allegations of personnel problems directed against the administration of Park View Health Center.

The Committee was able to investigate and receive adequate information to confidently and unanimously make the following statements:

- 1. The overall operation of Park View Health Center is excellent. Patient treatment and care is of the highest quality and at no time has that quality and care been an issue or in question. Everyone, including critics, affirms the superiority of care at Park View.
- 2. The Committee does not wish to comment on any issues relating to cases currently in litigation.
- 3. The Committee is satisfied that Grievance Procedures are well defined and in place for bargaining and non-bargaining personnel. Grievance Procedures are the most effective and equitable way for employees to deal with legitimate personnel problems. We found no evidence that protection of the employee is not assured.
- 4. The Committee is confident that the primary concern of the administration is quality patient care. In this regard the administration is fulfilling the mission of Park View Health Center very well.

ORDINANCE TO REVISE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES (PARKS AND RECREATION) **TO INCLUDE ARCHEOLOGICAL SITES**

WHEREAS, it is necessary to revise certain sections of the Code of General Ordinances (Parks and Recreation) to provide for the inclusion of the archeological site recently acquired by Winnebago County.

AN ORDINANCE TO REVISE CODE OF GENERAL **ORDINANCES (PARKS AND RECREATION)** TO INCLUDE ARCHEOLOGICAL SITES

SECTION 19.01 DEFINITIONS

Add definition (15):

(15) ARCHEOLOGICAL SITE. Archeological site means any tract of land owned or acquired by Winnebago County due to the unusual or unique historical or archeological significance that the area possesses.

SECTION 19.07

OPERATING POLICY

Rescind and recreate (e) and add (f): (3) Archeological Sites including but not limited to the Lasley Point Archeological Site:

- 1. Summer Season 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. (May 1 to October 31)
- 2. Winter Season 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (November 1 to April 30)

(f) **Posting.** Operating hours shall be visibly posted at all Nature Areas, Park Areas and Archeological Sites.

SECTION 19.11 FIRES. (1) Should read as follows: (to add 'archeological site')

(1) No person shall start, tend, maintain or use any fire except at designated fireplaces in any County park, nature preserve, public access area or archeological site.

SECTION 19.26 and SECTION 19.27 shall be rescinded and recreated and SECTION 19.28 shall be recreated as follows:

SECTION 19.26 ARCHOLOGICAL SITE REGULA-TIONS. The following regulations shall apply to all archeological sites.

> (1) No motorized vehicles of any kind shall be allowed in any archeological site except for emergency, rescue or County maintenance vehicles.

> (2) Parking shall be restricted to only those areas specifically designated as parking areas by Winnebago County.

> (3) Hunting regulations shall conform with SECTION 19.16 (1)-(3) of this Code (Parks and Recreation).

> (4) Camping or overnight parking shall not be allowed in any archeological site.

> (5) No person shall uproot, gather, prune or modify any vegetation. Cutting of trees and other vegetation shall be

perfoermed only by Winnebago County and/or designated agents of the County.

(6) Any person or group wishing to perform any type of archeological excavation must comply with the following procedure:

> (a) A formal request must be made to the Winnebago County Parks and Recreation Committee.

> (b) Said Committee shall submit the request to the State Archeologist for evaluation and to local knowledgeable individuals and Winnebago County Historical and Archeological Society for input.

> (c) Upon approval or disapproval by the State Archeologist and input from other groups, the Winnebago County Parks and Recreation Committee will evaluate and approve or disapprove the request and, if approved, shall bring the request to the Winnebago County Board for final approval.

> (d) Upon County Board approval, a permit for excavations shall be issued to the requesting group contingent upon all excavations being supervised by the State Archeologist or approved representative.

(7) No adjoining landowners shall allow their cattle or other livestock to graze within the boundaries of any archeological site.

(8) No person shall possess or consume any food or beverage within the boundaries of any archeological site except in those areas designated by Winnebago County as picnic areas.

(9) No person shall bring a pet or animal of any type, except a seeing eye dog, into any archeological site. SECTION 19.27 ENFORCEMENT. The Parks Director or his authorized agents shall, with the assistance of the Sheriff's Department, enforce the provisions of this chapter. The Corporation Counsel, upon complaint from the Parks Director or the Sheriff's Department is authorized to institute whatever legal proceedings he may deem necessary to effect compliance with the provisions of this chapter.

SECTION 19.28 EXCEPTIONS. Nothing in this chapter shall hinder or prohibit the County, its law enforcement personnel, the Parks Director, Corporation Counsel, or other authorized agents, from performing their official duties.

ADJOURNED APRIL MEETING Monday, May 18, 1981

On Monday, May 18, 1981 at 9 a.m., the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors began their inspection of county-owned properties and facilities. Roll Call showed twenty supervisors present: Gavinski, Kampo, W.C. Pawlowski, Broas, Johnson, Daggett, H. Brandt, Hunter, Landwehr, Goff, Planalp, Wagner, Wertsch, Schwartz, K. Brandt, F. Utech, Newcomer, M. Utech, Warning, and Donner.

The tour included visiting the Park View Health Center, Fox Valley Campus, the Tri-County Ice Arena and the County Park. In the afternoon the supervisors reviewed the land owned by the EAA. At 2:15 p.m. a ground breaking ceremony was held in the Town of Omro for the Big Lake Butte des Morts Park and Boat Landing. The Chairman H. Brandt turned the first shovel of dirt. WHEREAS, the Town of Clayton Zoning Ordinance No. 3 is now ready for County Board action.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the Town of Clayton Zoning Ordinance No. 3 is hereby approved subject to the following:

1. Legality and Statutory Authority Not Implied

- a. That said County Board approval does not include a review and recommendation based upon any aspects of the legal and statutory procedures and citings related to the adoption or administration of said Town ordinance.
- 2. County Floodplain and Shoreland Authority Reaffirmed

That Winnebago County has statutory authority to administer and enforce floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in all unincorporated areas of the County and has done so according to the requirements of applicable state and federal legislation since July 24, 1968. As such, Winnebago County shall continue to enforce and administer floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in the Town of Clayton and shall expect that the Town Board of Clayton shall instruct appropriate town officials to cooperate with the County Planning and Zoning Department in the procedures necessary to insure the protection of our valuable shoreland resources and the protection of " property of affected land owners, including the processing of County zoning permit applications and the direction of affected citizens to procedures for the County's zoning petitions, permit applications, and appeals where applicable.

a.

That the administration and enforcement of h. any town zoning related to the floodplain and shoreland areas must be preceded by ordinance review and certification by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. Government's Federal Emergency Management Agency. Additionally, any subsequent approval of town floodplain/ shoreland provisions by the aforementioned agencies will also take into account requirements that the town floodplain/shoreland zoning provisions must be in conformance with and more restrictive than the County's floodplain/shoreland provisions to enable administration and enforcement of same by the town.

c. That whatever action the town takes with regard to floodplain/shoreland zoning, Winnebago is obligated and shall continue to carry out its responsibility and authority for the administration and enforcement of County floodplain and shoreland provisions in the Town of Clayton.

3. Farmland Preservation Alternatives

a. That under town zoning, but not until certification of said ordinance by the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection, farmland owners in the towns will be limited to a maximum of 70% of tax credits under the state farmland tax credit program (Wis. Stats. Chapter 91) vs. a maximum of 100% tax credit under a fully enacted county farmland preservation program.

4. Subsequent Amendments to County Board

a. All future amendments to the Town of Clayton Zoning Ordinance No. 3 (text and map amendments) shall be referred to the County Board according to procedures established by the County Board for consideration regarding approval.

5. Record Keeping Responsibility to be Satisfied

a. The Clayton Town Board is expected to forward, on at least a quarterly basis, to the County Planning and Zoning Department a list of permits issued for the period covered indicating the type of structure, use, size, owner, and builder for each town permit issued under town zoning to enable the County Planning and Zoning Department to adequately carry out its responsibilities for county-wide record keeping and for construction/economic forecasting.

- 6. Not in Conformance with County's Ordinance
 - The Town of Clayton Zoning Ordinance No. 3 is not in general conformance with the Winnebago County, Town/County Zoning Ordinance with regards to the following: completeness in matters of district descriptions and standards; attention to details, e.g. does not include definitions, references to jurisdictional authority, and provisions for typical modifications under certain district limitations; and does not otherwise generally provide basic zoning standards in conformance with said county zoning ordinance, e.g.:
 - (1) Does not provide for a separation of single family and duplex housing within residential zoning.
 - (2) Requires a one acre parcel of land for a house in any subdivision.
 - (3) Empowers the Town Zoning Committee to establish land uses, not identified within the ordinance language in Sub Sections 11.2-2 and 11.2-3 of the agricultural district and Sub Section 11.1-0 of the residential district.
 - (4) Does not allow for the establishment of new industrial uses in the Town.

7. Not as Restrictive as County's Ordinance

- a. Finally, it does not generally provide for land use delineations which are as, or more, restrictive than the County's zoning ordinance.
- 8. Other County Ordinances and Codes Not Affected
 - a. The approval of the Town of Clayton Zoning Ordinance No. 3 shall not interfere with abrogate or annul any existing, or subsequent, ordinances and codes duly adopted by the Winnebago County Board.

9. Warning and Disclaimer of Liability

a. This Resolution has been submitted on the basis of a generalized review of the substantive

aspects of the Town of Clayton Zoning Ordinance No. 3. While this review is considered sufficient and reasonable for County Board action, it does not imply that said Town ordinance is legally defensible, technically reliable, and of high quality. Therefore, any approval of said Town ordinance shall not create liability on the part of Winnebago County, or any officer or employee thereof, for any damages from reliance on this approval or any administrative decision made thereunder by the Town of Clayton.

APPROVE TOWN OF UTICA ORDINANCE DATED 2/15/80

The following Resolution No. 7 was presented: TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

WHEREAS, this County Board has, by Resolution No. 8 dated June 17, 1980, approved the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance dated February 15, 1980; and

WHEREAS, the Circuit Court of Winnebago County found that the Town of Clayton Zoning Ordinance was invalid, which decision affects the Town of Utica because its zoning ordinance was not approved by referendum held at the time of a regular annual town meeting and, therefore, said ordinance was invalid; and

WHEREAS, the town of Utica did conduct a referendum vote of the electors of the Town with respect to the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance at an election held on April 15, 1981, which resulted in a vote of 70 in favor of said Ordinance, 16 in opposition and 1 voted for no zoning at all; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance is now ready for County Board action.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance is hereby approved subject to the following:

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1. Legality and Statutory Authority Not Implied.

- a. That said County Board approval does not include a review and recommendation based upon any aspects of the legal and statutory procedures and citings related to the adoption or administration of said Town Ordinance.
- 2. County Floodplain and Shoreland Authority Reaffirmed.
 - That Winnebago County has statutory authority to administer and enforce floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in all unincorporated areas of the County and has done so according to the requirements of applicable state and federal legislation since July 24, 1968. As such, Winnebago County shall continue to enforce and administer floodplain and shoreland zoning provisions in the Town of Utica and shall expect that the Town Board of Utica shall instruct appropriate town officials to cooperate with the County Planning and Zoning Department in the procedures necessary to insure the protection of our valuable shoreland resources and the protection of property of affected land owners, including the processing of County zoning permit applications and the direction of affected citizens to procedures for the County's zoning petitions, permit applications, and appeals where applicable.
 - b. That the administration and enforcement of any town zoning related to the floodplain and shoreland areas must be preceded by ordinance review and certification by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. **Government's Federal Emergency Management** Agency. Additionally, any subsequent approval of town floodplain/shoreland provisions by the aforementioned agencies will also take into account requirements that the town floodplain/ shoreland zoning provisions must be in conformance with and more restrictive than the County's floodplain/shoreland provisions to enable administration and enforcement of same by the town.
 - c. That whatever action the town takes with regard to floodplain/shoreland zoning, Winnebago County

is obligated and shall continue to carry out its resonsibility and authority for the administration and enforcement of County floodplain and shoreland provisions in the Town of Utica.

3. Farmland Preservation Alternatives.

a. That under town zoning, but not until certification of said ordinance by the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, farmland owners in the towns will be limited to a maximum of 70% of tax credits under the state farmland tax credit program (Wis. Stats. Chapter 91) vs. a maximum of 100% tax credit under a fully enacted county farmland preservation program.

4. Subsequent Amendments to County Board.

a. All future amendments to the Town of Utica Zoning ordinance (text and map amendments) shall be referred to the County Board according to procedures established by the County Board for consideration regarding approval.

5. Record Keeping Responsibility to be Satisfied.

a. The Utica Town Board is expected to forward, on at least a quarterly basis, to the County Planning and Zoning Department a list of permits issued for the period covered indicating the type of structure, use, size, owner and builder for each town permit issued under town zoning to enable the County Planning and Zoning Department to adequately carry out its responsibilities for county-wide record keeping and for construction/ economic forecasting.

6. In Conformance with County's Ordinance.

The Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance is in general conformance with the Winnebago County, Town/County Zoning Ordinance with regards to the following: completeness in matters of district descriptions; attention to details, except that it does not provide references to jurisdictional authority; and does otherwise generally provide basic zoning standards in conformance with said County zoning ordinance, except that minimum lot sizes require 1 acres for residential and industrial uses and 1½ acres for commercial uses.

7. As Restrictive as County's Ordinance.

a. Finally, it does provide for land use delineations which are generally as, or more, restrictive than the County's zoning ordinance, except in Section 12 Commercial District and Section 13 Industrial District.

8. Other County Ordinances and Codes Not Affected.

a. The approval of the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance shall not interfere with, abrogate or annul any existing, or subsequent, ordinances and codes duly adopted by the Winnebago County Board.

9. Warning and Disclaimer of Liability.

a. This Resolution has been submitted on the basis of a generalized review of the substantive aspects of the Town of Utica Zoning Ordinance. While this review is considered sufficient and reasonable for County Board action, it does not imply that said Town Ordinance is legally defensible, technically reliable, and of high quality. Therefore any approval of said Town Ordinance shall not create liability on the part of Winnebago County, or any officer or employee thereof, for any damages from reliance on this approval or any administrative decision made thereunder by the Town of Utica.

Pursuant to notice duly given in the manner established by the Board and in compliance with subchapter IV, Chapter 19, Wisconsin Statutes, a regular public meeting, in open session, of the County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, was called to order by the Chairman at 6:00 p.m. on November 17, 1981, at Oshkosh, Wisconsin, the day, time and place established by the Board.

The Chairman stated that a quorum of the County Board was present.

The Chairman stated that the next order of business on the agenda was the issue of the proposed County promissory notes.

Motion was made, seconded and carried by a twothirds vote that all rules of the Board which interfere with consideration of this item of business be suspended.

The Chairman stated that each member of the Board had received a copy of the resolution he was about to introduce.

He then offered the following to the Board, to-wit; RESOLUTION NUMBER 1

A resolution authorizing and providing for the issuance by Winnebago County, Wisconsin, of \$6,000,000 General Obligation promissory notes, series 1981, for the purposes specified therein; awarding the sale of such notes; fixing the rates of interest thereon; providing for the form and contents of said notes; levying taxes; appointing fiscal agent and determining other details in connection with such notes.

WHEREAS, Winnebago County, Wisconsin (hereinafter called the "County"), is presently in need of funds aggregating Six Million Dollars (\$6,000,000), for public work or improvement, to-wit: Tri-County Expressway (\$3,891,694), Oshkosh Avenue Bridge (\$1,608,306) and county remonumentation program (\$500,000); and

WHEREAS, the County Board of the County decems it in the best interests of the County that the funds needed be borrowed in the aggregate amount hereinabove stated, pursuant to the provisions of Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, and upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth for the respective uses and purposes hereinabove stated; and

WHEREAS, in response to an invitation therefore mailed to interested parties, the County Treasurer has received written bids for the sale of the Notes, recorded the time of receipt of each such bid, publicly opened and read such bids at 10:00 o'clock a.m., local time, has retained all such bids secure and delivered the same to this County Board during its meeting, all on this day; and

WHEREAS, this County Board has considered all of the bids received and has determined that the Northern Trust Company & Marine National Exchange Bank (hereinafter referred to as "Best Bidder") bidding the price of Six Million One Hundred Thirty-three Dollars (\$6,000,133) for the entire issue of the Notes to bear interest at the following rates for Notes numbered as indicated, maturing on December 1 of the years inclusively noted:

1-168, inclusive 1982 10.60%
169-338, inclusive 198310.10%
339-510, inclusive 1984 8.20%
511-682, inclusive 1985 8.40%
683-854, inclusive 1986 8.60%
855-1026, inclusive 1987 8.80%
1027-1200, inclusive 1988
(hereinafter referred to as "Interest Rates") plus accrued
interest from the date of the Notes to the date of delivery of
the Notes (hereinafter referred to as "Purchase Price") was
the highest and best bidder, its bid resulting in the lowest
net interest cost to the County, determined by cumputing
the aggregate amount of interest payable on the Notes at
the rates designated in such bid from the date of the Notes,
for the respective maturities of the Notes and by deducting
from such aggregate amount the amount of premium bid,
if any; and

WHEREAS, the Note Purchaser has nominated The Northern Trust Company (hereinafter referred to as "Nominated Paying Agent") as paying agent for the Notes

and such nomination is acceptable to the County; and

WHEREAS, by proceedings duly taken in the manner, time and form required by law, the Notes have heretofore been authorized and the County fully authorized and empowered to sell and issue the Notes, as it is now expedient and necessasry be done, and to adopt the following resolution; and

WHEREAS, this County Board has determined that the Note Purchaser is responsible and that its bid complies with all terms of the sale.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Board of the County that:

1. For the use and purpose hereinabove set forth, the Chairman and Clerk of the County (hereinafter called the "Municiapal Officers") be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed, pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow from the Best Bidder, on behalf of the County, an aggregate sum of \$6,000,000 in lawful money of the United States.

2. To evidence such indebtedness, the Municipal Officers be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed to make, execute, issue and sell for, on behalf and in the name of the County, and in the manner hereinafter provided, 1,200 promissory notes of the County payable to the order of the bearer (herein called the "Notes").

3. The Notes shall be named "Winnebago County General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 1981". The Notes shall be dated December 1, 1981 (notwithstanding that the Notes may actually be executed on some other date). Each Note shall be in the face amount of \$5,000.00. The Notes shall bear interest at the Interest Rates set forth in the preamble of this Resolution, payable on the first day of June, 1982, and semiannually thereafter on the first days of June and December of each year until the Notes, respectively, shall have been paid. The Notes shall be numbered 1 to 1,200, both inclusive.

4. The said loan shall mature in installments, and the Notes shall be due and payable annually commencing December 1, 1982, and shall mature in numerical order, lowest numbers first, as follows:

5. The County shall have the right to prepay all or any part of the Notes maturing on or after December 1, 1985, on any interest payment date commencing December 31, 1984. This right of prepayment is exercisable at the option of the County in whole or in part, in inverse order of maturity and by lot within a maturity, at a redemption price of par and accrued interest to the date of redemption, plus a premium of 2% of the par amount of redeemed Notes if redeemed in 1984 or 1985, or a premium of 1% of the par amount of redeemed Notes if redeemed in 1986. If the County shall elect to redeem all or any part of the Notes, it shall give notice of its intention to redeem such Notes on the date designated in such notice, specifying, in case of a partial redemption, the numbers of such Notes to be redeemed and, in each case, stating that on said redemption date there will become due and payable upon such Notes so redeemed, at the principal office of the paying agent to be subsequently provided for, the principal thereof and accrued interest thereon to date of redemption plus any applicable premium and that from and after such redemption date, interest thereon will cease to accrue. Such notice shall be given by publication in the then official Wisconsin State newspaper not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days prior to the redemption date. In the event that the County shall give notice of its intention to redeem any Notes, it shall, and it hereby convenants that it will, on or prior to the redemption date, deposit with the paying agent to be subsequently provided for a sum of money which together with any sums already held by the said paying agent and available for such purposes, shall be sufficient to pay the redemption price of such Notes so called for redemption. and upon the deposit of such sum with the paying agent, interest on such Notes so called for redemption shall cease to accrue from and after the redemption date. The County will mail a copy of this notice hereinabove provided for to the last known address of any registered Note owner.

6. Each of the Notes and each of the interest coupons to be attached thereto shall be in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.

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7. The Notes shall be in coupon form registrable as to principal only. Upon presentation of any of the Notes to the aforesaid registrar, the same shall be registered as to principal on the Note register to be maintained for that purpose by the registrar, and such registration shall be evidenced by notation to that effect on the reverse side of the Note by such registrar. After such registration, no transfer thereof shall be valid unless made on the Note register by the registered owner in person or by his duly authorized attorney, and similarly noted on the Note, but the same may be discharged from registration by being in like manner transferred to bearer, and thereafter transferability by delivery shall be restored; but the Notes may again, from time to time, be registered or transferred to bearer, as before. Such registration shall not affect the negotiability of the appurtenant coupons, but every such coupon shall continue to be transferable by delivery merely and shall remain payable to bearer. For every such registration or transfer of Notes, the registrar may make a charge sufficient to reimburse any governmental charge or any mailing or other expense required to be paid with respect to such registration or transfer. The registrar shall not be required to transfer Notes which have matured, or which have been called for redemption.

8. Each Note shall be executed in the name of and for the County by the facsimile signature of the Chairman and the manual signature of the County Clerk, and shall be manually sealed with the corporate seal of the County. Interest on the Notes shall be evidenced by coupons attached thereto, such coupons to be executed with the reproduced facsimile signatures of the Municipal Officers and such officers shall by the execution of the Notes, adopt such facsimile signatures as and for their own proper signatures. In case either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes and coupons shall cease to be such officers before the delivery of the Notes, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until such delivery.

9. The sale of the Notes is hereby awarded and confirmed to the Best Bidder at the Purchase Price. The contract executed and presented to the County Board by the Best Bidder to purchase the Notes is hereby approved

and accepted, and the Nominated Paying Agent hereby appointed fiscal agent for payment of the principal of and interest upon the Notes. The Chairman and the County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed, in the name of the County to execute said contract and to affix the seal of the County thereto.

10. The Chairman and the County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to take such further steps as may be necessary to complete the sale of the Notes, including arranging for the printing of the Notes and for a specific time and place of closing of the sale.

11. The County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed forthwith to retain, secure and and uncashed, the good-faith-deposit check of the Best Bidder until the delivery of the Notes.

12. In order to provide for the collection of a direct annual tax sufficient in amount to pay and for the express purpose of paying the interest on the Notes as it falls due and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof at maturity, there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property in Winnebago County, Wisconsin, in addition to all other taxes, a nonrepealable, direct, annual tax in an amount sufficient for that purpose. This tax shall be from year to year carried into the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time. This tax shall be in the following amounts:

(a) For the year 1981, the sum of \$1,385,590, being the aggregate of the sum of \$272,795 for interest coming due June 1, 1982; the sum of \$272,795 for interest coming due December 1, 1982; and the sum of \$840,000 for principal coming due December 1, 1982.

(b) For the year 1982, the sum of \$1,306,550, being the aggregate of the sum of \$228,275 for interest coming due June 1, 1983; the sum of \$228,275 for interest coming due December 1, 1983; and the sum of \$850,000 for principal coming due December 1, 1983.

(c) For the year 1983, the sum of \$1,230,700, being the aggregate of the sum of \$185,350 for interest coming due June 1, 1984; the sum of \$185,350 for interest coming due December 1. 1984; and the sum of \$860,000 for principal coming due December 1, 1984.

(d) For the year 1984, the sum of \$1,160,180, being the aggregate of the sum of \$150,090 for interest coming due

June 1, 1985; the sum of \$150,090 for interest coming due December 1, 1985; and the sum of \$860,000 for principal coming due December 1, 1985.

(•) For the year 1985, the sum of \$1,087,940, being the aggregate of the sum of \$113,970 for interest coming due June 1, 1986; the sum of \$113,970 for interest coming due December 1, 1986; and the sum of \$860,000 for principal coming due December 1, 1986.

(f) For the year 1986, the sum of \$1,013,980, being the aggregate of the sum of \$76,990 for interest coming due June 1, 1987; the sum of \$76,990 for interest coming due December 1, 1987; and the sum of \$860,000 for principal coming due December 1, 1987.

(g) For the year 1987, the sum of \$948,300, being the aggregate of the sum of \$39,150 for interest coming due June 1, 1988; the sum of \$39,150 for interest coming due December 1, 1988; and the sum of \$870,000 for principal coming due December 1, 1988.

13. The proceeds of the said taxes, when collected by the County Treasurer, shall be placed and kept by the County Treasurer as a separate fund irrevocably pledged for paying the principal of and interest on the Notes so long as any such Notes shall remain outstanding, to be known as the Winnebago County General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 1981, Sinking Fund (hereinafter referred to as "Sinking Fund"). The accrued interest and any premium received at the time of delivery of the Notes shall be paid over to the Sinking Fund. In addition, there shall be paid over to the Sinking Fund from the borrowed money fund, from time to time, moneys remaining in such borrowed money fund not then needed and which obviously cannot thereafter be needed for the purposes for which the money was borrowed. Interest on or principal of the Notes falling due at any time when there shall be on hand in the Sinking Fund insufficient funds for the payment of such principal and interest shall be paid promptly when due from other funds of the County.

14. The Chairman and the County Clerk be and they hereby are authorized and directed forthwith to take all necessary steps to arrrange delivery of the Notes to the Best Bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of the proposal received from the Best Bidder, this and the previous resolutions of this Board relating to the Notes, and to execute and deliver the Notes to the Best Bidder upon payment by it of the Purchase Price. The appropriate officers of this County are further authorized and directed to prepare and furnish the Best Bidder and the attorneys approving the legality of the Notes, certified copies of all proceedings and records of the County relating thereto and to the financial condition and affairs of the County and such other affidavits, certificates and information as may be required to show the facts relating to the legality of the Notes as appear from the books and records under their custody and control, or as otherwise known to them, and all such certified copies, affidavits, certificates and information, including any heretofore furnished, shall be deemed representations of the County of the facts recited therein.

15. The whole proceeds from the sale of the Notes shall be segregated in a special borrowed money fund upon receipt and shall be used solely for the purposes for which borrowed or for the payment of the principal of or interest on the Notes.

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16. In case any one or more of the provisions of this Resolution shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provision of this Resolution.

17. The officers of the County, attorneys for the County or other agents or employees of the County are hereby authorized to do all acts and things required of them by this Resolution for the full, punctual and complete performance of all of the provisions of this Resolution.

18. Notice of the sale of the Notes, in the form attached hereto, shall be published forthwith in the official newspaper of the County. The Clerk shall obtain proof, in affidavit form, of such publication; and compare the Notice as printed with that attached hereto to ascertain that no mistake has been made therein.

19. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption in the manner provided by law.

20. All prior resolutions, rules, ordinances, or other actions or parts thereof of this County Board in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution shall be and the same are hereby rescinded insofar as they may so conflict.

Supervisor Orrin King moved the adoption of the foregoing resolution. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Joyce Donner, and after due consideration,

The Chairman declared that since the foregoing Resolution was supported by the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of all of the members-elect of the County Board, it was approved and he directed that it be recorded forthwith.

The Chairman directed the Clerk to record full and correct copies, so certified by the Clerk, of all the foregoing and attachments in the record of proceedings book required to be maintained by Chapter 67, Wisconsin Statutes and to keep, maintain and preserve an adequate and correct register account of these Notes and all payments and other transactions relating thereto.

- 4. WAGES (Appendix A)
 - 1982: Reclassification of Mechanics to new salary grade 4 resulting in a special salary increase of 10¢ per hour.
 - 58¢ across-the-board for all employees (7.7% of average base salary)
 - 1983: 7.75% across-the-board for all employees. (Average of 61.6¢ per hour).
- 5. FLOATING HOLIDAY (Article 12)

Addition of a floating holiday in 1983 bringing total of paid holidays to 10.

6. LAYOFF (Article 7)

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New comprehensive layoff section added to the contract providing for layoff as the normal course action when lack of work or lack of funds necessitates workforce reduction.

3. Specifications shall be prepared and bids taken for all items in excess of \$5,000.00. Informal bids shall be taken on items under \$5,000.00, but more than \$500.00. This rule may be waived by the County Executive in unusual circumstances.

4. Alterations within the Outlay budget may be made by the County Executive; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate that the County establish a policy for the purchase of non-capital items. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the following policy for the purchase of non-capital items be and the same is hereby adopted:

(5) NON-CAPITAL OUTLAY. (a) Non-capital outlay, if the expenditure of funds is expected to exceed the sum of \$5,000.00, shall be subject to that portion of the Statement of Policy No. 74-1 as adopted by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors on March 19, 1974, as revised in the past or in the future, concerning (i) advertising for and receiving bids, and (ii) reporting results of the bidding to the County Board.

1. The approval of this budget, or of any future budget, does not grant authority for the purchase of the requested individual items. It is only an indication of various departmental requests. Each request will be reviewed during the year.

2. All requests for non-capital purchases shall be made to the County Executive. If purchase is approved, County Executive will determine the method of purchase and the purchaser (Purchasing Agent or Department Head).

3. Specifications shall be prepared and bids taken for all non-capital items in excess of \$5,000.00. Informal bids shall be taken on items under \$5,000.00, but more than \$500.00. This rule may be waived by the County Executive in unusual circumstances.

4. Alterations within the Outlay budget may be made by the County Executive.

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COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Mr. James P. Coughlin, County Executive, presented his report to the County Board. Mr. Coughlin commended Mrs. Jane Hackbarth on her retirement from the Social Services Department. The County Executive informed the board thirteen employees had retired in 1980 and no replacements were secured for those positions. Winnebago County's insurance has been packaged into one policy. As a result of this new procedure Winnebago County has increased their insurance coverage with a savings of approximately \$8,000. Winnebago County will advertise for insurance bids in October of 1982. On February 23, 1982 bids will be let for 300 corners. It is anticipated that 950 corners will be completed this year. The slide presentation of county government will be shown to the County Board at their March meeting. Because of new programs implemented by the 51.42 Board the general fund has received a half-million dollars. Winnebago County has reached an agreement with two employee unions and there are two more to be finalized.

PUBLIC HEARING

The Chair announced that at this time the public would be allowed to express their opinion on any resolution or ordinance which appears on the agenda.

Mr. Neal Darrow, associated with Theda Clark Memorial Hospital, requested that the Ordinance for the General Relief Medical Services be defferred for one month so that the hospitals might meet with the Corporation Counsel to decide on the legality of the program as suggested.

Mr. James Egan, Assistant to Dean Johnson of the Fox Valley Campus, was concerned about Resolution No. 4.

There was general discussion by the public on the Resolution No. 3, Adoption of the Farmland Preservation Plan — February 1982. Those who opposed the adoption and the proponents were well represented at the County Board meeting and were allowed to express their view points. After two hours of discussion the Chair closed the hearing.

Mr. Joe Halter, Director, of the Winne-Fond Consortium, presented his annual report. Mr. Halter stated that the unemployment rate in Winnebago County is approximately 8.7%. The CETA Program will expire on September 30, 1982 but legislation is underway for a new program to continue.

STUDY COMMITTEE WITH RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE

WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

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The committee believes that there are people with legitimate medical needs, and it is the County's responsibility to meet these medical needs. Nevertheless, the County must find ways to cut costs and improve efficiency of administering its General Relief Medical system. We are entering into a new economic era which calls for hard choices. As a policymaking body, we must decide how to curb these medical costs. For if we fail to address ourselves to this situtation, we will be faced with the painful problem of ultimate denial of service to an individual on the basis of some defined eligibility requirement.

This shall be done every six months and report back to the County Board. CARRIED by Voice Vote. Motion made by Supervisor Schwartz and seconded to amend report page 8, (1X) (2) to delete the following: "to determine if any information is available relative to past social or medical history on the patients to help" and insert the following: "for a referral to a professional to assist in making". CARRIED by Voice Vote. Motion made by Supervisor Johnson and seconded to defer for thirty days. (No second to motion)

TO CREATE SECTION 3.06 OF CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

(General Relief Medical Payments by Winnebago County)

The following Ordinance was presented:

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

WHEREAS, Winnebago County, on December 11, 1979, by resolution adopted by an affirmative vote of the majority of its members to abolish all distinction between elegible County dependents and elibible municipal dependents as to medical, surgical, dental, hospital and nursing care, and optometrical services and have the entire expense of such care a County charge pursuant to sec. 49.03(1)(b), Stats.; and

WHEREAS, during the time this resolution has been in effect, there has been what appears to be an ever increasing number of medical relief cases requiring payment by Winnebago County; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned statement is especially true insofar as the written notices by physicians

and hospitals as provided in sec. 49.02(5), Stats., relating to emergency medical relief; and

WHEREAS, state law provides that the County is not liable for emergency medical care or hospitalization beyond what is reasonably required by the circumstances of the case.

NOW, THEREFORE, to insure that Winnebago County is meeting its statutory obligation with respect to the payment of medical relief claims, especially the claims for emergency medical care or hospitalization, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE SECTION 3.06 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

3.06 GENERAL RELIEF MEDICAL PAYMENTS BY WINNEBAGO COUNTY. (1) AUTHORITY. Winnebago County, by virtue of sec. 49.03, Stats., has all the power conferred and duties imposted by Chapter 49, Wisconsin Statutes, upon municipalities. Winnebago County has adopted a resolution pursuant to sec. 49.03(1)(a), Stats.

(2) PURPOSE. The purpose of this Section of the Code is to establish certain guidelines and policies for Winnebago County's relief granting agency to follow in its administration of the General Medical Program for the County.

(3) GUIDELINES AND POLICIES. It is understood that the following guidelines and policies are only a part of all the powers conferred and duties imposted upon Winnebago County by Chapter 49, Wisconsin Statutes, with respect to the County's General Relief Medical-Program. A "Report of the Winnebago County General Relief Study Committee with Recommedations to the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors" made earlier this date (February 16, 1982) is incorporated herein by reference.

(a) Prior Authorization.

1. Prior authorization for continued medical treatment of a person who has received emergency medical services pursuant to sec. 49.02(5), Stats., shall be obtained from Winnebago County as soon as possible, but not later than seventy-two (72) hours, after the person was admitted for emergency hospitalization or care. Nothing herein shall

affect the County's right to deny payment for any hospitalization or care rendered to a person not eligible, as a dependent person under Chapter 49, Wisconsin Statutes, or to a person who receives hospitalization or care which is not immediate and indispensable and for which prior authorization therefore could have been obtained without delay likely to injure such person.

2. Winnebago County shall provide the forms to be used and procedures to be followed by hospitals and physicians to obtain prior authorization as hereinbefore required.

3. Failure to obtain prior authorization as provided in subparagraph (a) hereof shall result in no payment by Winnebag County for any hospitalization or care as hereinafter provided if the County is not able to contact the person who has received the emergency medical services pursuant to sec. 49.02(5), Stats., for the purpose of determining whether the person is eligible for relief under Chapter 49, Wisconsin Statutes. For purpose of this subparagraph, the payment limitation by Winnebago County shall be for all hospitalization and care which occurred after seventy-two (72) hours from the time such person was admitted for emergency hospitalization or care.

(b) Duplication of Services.

1. Winnebago County shall not pay under its General Relief Medical Program for all or any part of the costs for a person's hospitalization or care, emergency or nonemergency, which is the primary responsibility of Winnebago County as provided in secs. 51.42 and 51.437, Stats., and the Winnebago County Ordinance establishing the Community Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, Alcholism and Drug Abuse Services Board (Unified Board).

2. Winnebago County shall not pay under its General Relief Medical Program for any support for anyone living in a "halfway house" under the Winnebago County 51.42 Unified Board Rehabilitation Programs.

(c) Limitations on Payments by Winnebago County.

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1. Winnebago County shall not pay under its General Relief Medical Program for any portion of any medical bill in excess of the amount which is paid by the person's hospitalization insurance carrier pursuant to an agreed

upon medical rate stucture with the medical care provider or a medical rate struture applicable to said provider.

2. Winnebago County shall not pay under its General Relief Medical Program for any portion of any medical bill in excess of the amount which is paid by Medicare or Medicaid, whichever is the lesser of the two.

3. Winnebago County shall not pay under its General Relief Medical Program for occupational therapy.

(d) Recovery of Payments.

Winnebago County shall recover any payments under its General Relief Medical Program as provided in sec. 49.08, Stats. If the County is unable to recover its general relief medical payments as hereinbefore provided, then, the County shall require persons who have received general relief medical to labor on any County work relief project which the persons is capable of performing as provided in sec. 49.05, Stats.

(e) List of Providers.

Winnebago County shall develop a list of providers of low cost prescription drugs and thereafter only presription drugs obtained from a provider on such list shall be paid by Winnebago County under its General Relief Medical Program.

(f) Emergency Defined.

Whenever the word "emergency" is used in this section of the Code, it means immediate and indispensable and for which prior authorization therefore could not be obtained without delay likely to injure the person.

(4) EFFECTIVE DATE. The effective date of this section of the Code shall be upon passage by the County Board and publication as provided by law.

1. HEALTH INSURANCE (ARTICLE XX)

1982: Continuance of the County's full payment of the single premium. Increase of \$10.00 in the County's payment of monthly family premiums (Single premium plus \$60.00).

1983: Continuance of the County's full payment of the single premium. Increase of \$15.00 in the County's payment of monthly family premiums (single premium plus \$75.00).

2. RETIREMENT (ARTICLE XVIII)

1982: Increase in the County's monthly contribution toward the employee's share of retirement costs by \$5.00 to a total of \$45.00.

1983: Increase in the County's monthly contribution toward the employee's share of retirement costs by \$5.00 to a total of \$50.00.

3. L.P.N. - C.O.T.A. RECLASSIFICATION (Appendix A) Reclassify the positions of L.P.N. and C.O.T.A. from salary grade 2 to salary grade 1 in two steps providing for a 20¢ per hour increase on January 1, 1982 and a 20¢ per hour increase on January 1, 1983. This reclassification pay would be in addition to the standard wage increase granted all employees.

4. WAGES (Appendix A)

1/1/82 - Increase the hourly rate of all employees by 47¢. This represents an average base salary increase of 8.26%.

1/1/83 - Increase the hourly rates of overrated

employees by 47° and the rates of all other employees by 48°. This represents an estimated average base salary increase of 7.74%.

5. FLOATING HOLIDAY (ARTICLE XII)

Provide for a floating holiday to be available for use in 1983 bring total of paid holidays to 9.

6. VACATIONS (ARTICLE XIV)

1982: Provision for fifth week of vacation after 21 years of service instead of after 22 years of service. **1983:** Provision for fifth week of vacation after 20 years of service.

7. LEAVE OF ABSENCE (ARTICLE XVIII)

Complete revision of contractual language governing unpaid leaves of absence.

8. SICK LEAVE (ARTICLE XIII)

Additions and deletions to the conditions of eligibility for paid sick leave benefits.

9. CONDUCT OF UNION BUSINESS (ARTICLE V) Increase in the number of unpaid leave days for Union delegates to attend Union conventions and conferences.

10. FUNERAL LEAVE (ARTICLE XVII)

Addition of stepchild living in residence for one day funeral leave eligibility.

11. PAYROLL SUSPENSION (ARTICLE XIX)

New article setting forth types of unexcused absences eligible for disciplinary action.

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

CHAPTER II

THE GOVERNMENT OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN: THE COUNTY BOARDS FROM THE CIVIL WAR TO 1880

Impact of Civil War on Winnebago County Government

While the Winnebago County Supervisors Reports don't reflect an awareness of the Civil War until an entry on July 8, 1861 relating to the payment of subsistence allowances for dependents of volunteer soldiers, the Oshkosh newspapers printed stories as early as the fall of 1858 which careful observers could have interpreted as events leading to war.

The Oshkosh (Weekly) Courier reported the Lincoln-Douglas debates in the Illinois U. S. Senatorial campaign of 1858 in great detail. In the fall of 1859, the Wisconsin election for governor used the Lincoln-Douglas joint debate format in a debate in Oshkosh on September 29th. Democratic candidate Harrison Hobart took the same debate ground as Senator Stephen Douglas had in Illinois in 1858 and Wisconsin Republican Governor Alex Randall defended his position with the arguments Abraham Lincoln had made. Randall, according to the Oshkosh . Courier:

was very animated and . . . kept striding up and down the platform, striking his clenched fist into his open hand by way of giving point and force to his arguments. During his pauses, Governor Randall rubbed his bald pate violently with his pocket handerchief. The Governor was tumultuously cheered by the Republicans who were almost frantic with delight. Mr. Hobart . . . concluded amid the uproarious applause of the Democracy.¹

John Brown's raid at Harpers Ferry, Virginia, occurred on October 17-19, 1859. The Oshkosh newspapers not only reported the event in substantial detail but the Oshkosh editor of the conservative Democratic *Courier*, George H. Read, published an editorial on December 2, 1859 which was amazingly pro-slavery in its content but probably reflected the thinking in 1859 of many Democrats in Winnebago County:

Tomorrow, Friday, is the day appointed for the execution of John Brown. Ere this (editorial) meets the eye of the reader this wretched old reprobate will have explated his many crimes upon the gallows -- a fitting close to his worthless, vicisous life. For twenty years John Brown has been the devoted, unreasoning tool of the abolitionists, in their aggressions upon the rights and property of the South. His long career of folly and wickedness has ended in overt acts of treason and murder, for which he has been tried, convicted and sentenced to a felon's death. No sane mind not imbued with the extravagant and pernicious ideas of the miserable culprit, can doubt the entire justice of John Brown's punishment.

Oshkosh editor George Read had enthusiastic supporters and bitter enemies in Oshkosh, but he also identified with remarkable acuracy the gathering clouds of the nation's Civil War storm. Only a week after the above editorial, Read wrote the following perceptive editorial published in the *Courier* on December 9, 1859:

Recent events (John Brown's raid and the dramatic opposition in Kansas of free soil Douglas Democrats to the pro-Slavery Lecompton Constitution) have exasperated and deepened the sectional feeling of the members of Congress, already sufficiently embittered; and it has become more than ever a matter of doubt whether the compromises of the Constitution and the integrity of the Union can be much longer preserved. The dark clouds of disunion are gathering on the horizon, and thoughtful minds are beginning to be seriously apprehensive that the present may be the last Congress that will ever assemble -- that the national banner is destined never again to wave over another meeting of representatives of all the states.

1860 was the year the Republican Party succeeded in electing Abraham Lincoln President of the United States. It was the year the Democratic Party split into Southern Democrats who defended slavery and Northern Democrats who rallied behind Senator Stephen Douglas' belief that a territory could exclude slavery. 1860 was the year when Southern secession and active military preparation for Civil War began almost immediately after it was announced that Lincoln was elected President, and it was certain that a hard line anti-slavery and Union-defending administration would be in power in J Washington in 1861. 1860 was also the year when a flury of anti-Fugitive Slave Act excitment touched Winnebag County in the person of the famous Milwaukee abolitionist editor and fugitive from federal enforcement of the fugitive slave law, Sherman Booth.

Sherman Booth was a Milwaukee anti-slavery newspaper editor who had helped free Joshua Glover, a Missouri fugitive slave, from a federal jail in Milwaukee in 1854. Jailed and released on bond for later trial, Booth, through his paper, proposed the July 13, 1854 convention at which the Wisconsin Republican Party was founded.² The federal district court later convicted Booth of violating the Fugitive Slave Act by aiding and abetting Joshua Glover's escape, but the Wisconsin Supreme Court had freed Booth several times on writs of habeas corpus but finally yielded in 1860 to the Federal Supreme Court's decision in the cases of Ableman v. Booth and U.S. v. Booth.³ Forced into bankruptcy and then imprisoned in the Milwaukee Customs House because the court judgment awarding damages to slave owner Garland remained unsatisfied, Booth again escaped and in August 1860 was staying at the house of Armine Pickett in the Town of Utica in Winnebago County.

U.S. marshals had been prevented from rearresting Booth in Ripon in early August, but in the language of the Oshkosh Weekly *Courier*:

The marshals, getting wind of his (Booth's) whereabouts, some half dozen of them undertook to arrest him at Pickett's about daylight on Monday, August 27th, but were resisted by the Pickett family, farm hands and people of the neighborhood, and were finally compelled to abandon the attempt.⁴

Booth was later arrested at Berlin in early October, 1860 reimprisoned and finally was given a Presidential pardon by President Buchanan on March 3, 1861 the day before Buchanan left office.

In late October, 1860 Carl Schurz, the most famous German-American-Republican in Wisconsin at the time, spoke in Oshkosh on slavery issues at the Presbyterian Church. Seen through the eyes of a Democratic apponent of Republicans in 1860, *Courier* Editor George Read reported Schurz' appearance in the following partisan language: CarlsSchurz . . . was here last night and made a speech in the Presbyterian Church . . . He spoke in German for the greater portion of the evening and for half an hour or so in English. He denounced slavery and advocated abolitionism, nullification and (national) dissention which he has been singing ever since he has been in the service of his Black Republican employers. He is a political Hessian and serves for pay.⁵

In the November election of 1860, Abraham Lincoln received only about forty percent of the popular vote, yet he was given a majority of the electoral votes and became President. The Republicans in 1860 didn't have majority control of Congress and they didn't have a majority on the Supreme Court.

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Only a week after Lincoln's election, the South Carolina legislature began the secession process by calling for the enlistment of 10,000 volunteers to be formed into Minute Men units and called for a state convention to legislate secession. The Oshkosh *Courier* the same week reported that Alabama would have 30,000 Minute Men enrolled very soon and that Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Misissippi and Texas were expected to accompany South Carolina in secession.⁶

By the end of the first week in February, 1861 a convention of seceeding states had met at Montgomery, Alabama and formed the Confederate States of America by agreeing unanimously to a constitution and the formation of a provisional government, the Confederary Congress to remain in session to make all necessary laws. All of the above had been done before Abraham Lincoln had even left Springfield, Illinois for his inauguration in Washington, D.C. on March 4, 1861.

In Lincoln's inaugural address he declared the Southern states ordinances of secession were illegal, that military actions in defense of secession were revolutionary and declared he meant to execute the laws and to "hold, occupy and possess" federal property, i.e. Fort Sumpter and Fort Pickens in the seceeded states. The Confederate reply was to bombard Fort Sumpter which was forced to surrender on April 14, 1861. When the news came to Washington that Major Anderson had been forced to surrender Fort Sumpter, President Lincoln called for 75,000 volunteers and called a special session of the Congress for July 4th. Oshkosh Weekly Northwestern Editor Nevitt probably expressed the opinion of nearly everyone in the community when he editorialized:

The Southern rebels have begun the conflict! With them rests all the responsibility and all the crime of flinging the firebrand of war among us... There now remains no question for patriots to ask but this: Are you For your country or Against it?⁷

A week later "the greatest, most enthusiastic gathering ever assembled in Oshkosh" met a Washington Hall to voice sentiments on the national crisis. Party lines and party creeds were forgotten in the speechmaking. The followin were two of the resolutions which the meetin adopted amid great applause:

RESOLVED, that it is with unfeigned sorrow, we find our country involved in war; that whatever causes may have led to it, we regard it as the duty of every citizen, in the present emergency, to sustain and support the Federal Government in putting down treason and rebellion, and in maintaining its authority throughtout all its dominions, and ... RESOLVED... that as the victory of the British at Bunker Hill was followed, after years of conflict,

by their defeat at Yorktown; so the Rebel triumph at Fort Sumpter is but the beginning of a contest whose end shall be glorious to the friends of the constitution and the Union...⁸

Less than a week after President Lincoln called for 75,000 volunteers, the members of the Oshkosh Fire Company No. 1 enrolled their names and volunteered their services "for three years or duration" to the governor of Wisconsin. The elected officers of these Oshkosh volunteers were two staunch Democrats, Captain Gabriel Bouck, an Oshkosh attorney and the Winnebago County Circuit Court Commissioner, John Hancock. Bouck's company was accepted, assigned as Company E to the 2nd Wisconsin Volunteer Regiment and ordered to rendezvous for basic training at the fair grounds in Madison. The 2nd Wisconsin passed through Chicago on June 20th, were in Pennsylvania on June 22nd and arrived in Washington, D.C. June 25th. By this time, the 1st Wisconsin Regiment had already crossed the Potomoc River into Virginia and were assigned to General Patterson's division in the northern end of the Shenandoah Valley.

Similarly, Captain Scott's company and Scherff's German Rifles were assigned to the 3rd Wisconsin and by late August five other Oshkosh volunteer companies had been filled and were receiving their basic training at Camp Bragg on the Winnebago County Fair Grounds in Oshkosh, at Camp Hamilton in Fond du Lac, or elsewhere.

The euphoria of the initial recruitment and training period was brutally interrupted by the only big battle of 1861, the Battle of Bull Run on July 21st.

Federal General McDowell's attack almost succeeded but Confederate General Beauregard's South Carolinians stopped a last strong Union assault. Beauregard then ordered a counter-attack and as the Confederates rushed forward a sudden wave of panic swept through the Union troops, wearied after hours of hot and hard fighting and demoralized by the abrupt change of events. The Union troops gave way, crossed Bull Run in a rout... and McDowell had to order a general retreat toward Washington.⁹

The Oshkosh Weekly Northwestern reported:

The crowds collected about the office of the Northwestern on the receipt of every (telegraph) dispatch... We all knew that some of the men who had left us only a few short weeks ago... must have fallen... The list of killed is small but yet sad, most sad to those who stood near in friendship and affection.¹⁰

A month later the Northwestern's editor wrote in retrospect in the issue of August 23, 1861:

The events of the last 30 days (preceeding and following Bull Run) must convince the most sceptical that those hoping for a short war are doomed to disappointment. Those will also be disappointed who look for anything else than a deep humiliation of the North or a complete subjection of the South.¹¹

Almost as soon as the Winnebago County Fair Grounds in Oshkosh was diverted to usage in 1861 as "Camp Bragg", a training camp for Union volunteer army companies, the county was called upon to appropriate subsistence allotments for the wives and children of enlisted volunteer soldiers and NCO's The Federal Congress in 1861 hadn't yet provided for the financial support of dependents of state volunteer units going into federal military service and the volunteer troops were the major responsibility of the state. As a consequence, the Winnebago County Board was asked on July 8, 1861 to appropriate \$2.00 per week to the wife of each volunteer soldier and NCO and an additional 75¢ per month to each dependent child.

The above motion failed of adoption 11 to 12 and also failed on reconsideration 12 to 12,¹² but a special meeting on July 31, 1861 appropriated \$2.50 per month to the wife of an enlisted volunteer private or NCO and 75¢ per month to each child of such volunteer. The chairman and clerk of Winnebago County were:

authorized and directed to isssue orders on the county treasurer on receipt of sufficient evidence, i.e. an affidavit of the wife and a certificate from a justice of the peace both showing that the party making the claim is justly entitled to it.¹³

At the November, 1861 annual meeting of the county board, the support for volunteers' dependents was reduced to \$2.00 per month for wives and 50¢ for children. Two additional qualifications were added requiring the volunteer to have been a resident of Winnebago County for thirty days prior to his enlistment and requiring the dependent wife to present an affidavit from a justice of the peace attesting that she and her children were in actual need of the support money.¹⁴ By early 1862, the amount that wives, children and widowed mothers of volunteers were allowed to draw in county orders was again reduced by twenty-five percent in all cases except those of long and continuous sickness in the family. The county order program for support of dependents of military volunteers was terminated as of March 26, 1862.¹⁵

The problem of raising private contributions to the county bounty fund for the payment of a \$30.00 bounty to each volunteer until the county's military manpower quota was full, was closely related to the problem of paying subsistence support to dependents of enlisted military volunteers. Once again, the county had to wrestle with the problem of how to finance the county bounty program because the Legislature hadn't acted. A Winnebago County Board resolution said: This money can only be raised now by voluntary contributions as a temporary loan to the county to be hereafter ratified by the Legislature and then be paid by the county, half in one and half in two years with seven percent interest. That for the purpose of carrying out the foregoing resolution we appoint the following named committees to solicit subscriptions to the Volunteer Fund: (Then followed the names of members of the solicitation teams in every city, village and town in the county).¹⁶

Volunteer Fund solicitation teams were ordered by the county board to transmit their collections to the county treasurer "with a statement of the names of the contributors to the county bounty fund and the sums which had been paid in. Upon receipt of such county bounty money, the treasurer was directed to issue a certificate to each contributor.¹⁷

An interesting sidelight to this method of financing is that army volunteers were not paid in United States dollars but were paid in a locally issued form of money called county bounty scrip, which was really a Winnebago County promisory note. The county bounty scrip circulated as locally recognized legal tender until finally withdrawn as of November 10, 1863 when the county clerk's entry in the Supervisors Reports noted that "the balance of the county bounty scrip... was burned in the presence of the county board".¹⁸

For residents of Winnebago County and perhaps the North, the twenty months from April, 1862 to November, 1863 were perhaps the most psychologically difficult period of the Civil War. This was the time period in which the Battles of Antietam, Chancellorsville and Gettysburg were fought in the East by the Army of the Potomoc and the Battles of Shiloh, Perryville, Vicksburg, Chickamauga and Chattanooga were fought in the West between the Appalachian Mountains and the Mississippe River. Winnebago County and Wisconsin troops were at all of the above engagements but while the 1st. 2nd and 3rd Wisconsin Regiments, i.e. the Iron Brigade fought in the East, nearly all of the remainder of Wisconsin's other troops were assigned to armies in the West. This may explain why the Oshkosh public was more impressed with Grant's capture of Vicksburg than with Meade's defeat of Lee at Gettysburg.

Confused telegraphic reports were arriving in Oshkosh of the Battle of Gettysburg on July 1 - 3, 1863 which generally indicated a great Union victory. However, according to the Northwestern:

The great event of the week is the capture of Vicksburg. No event of the war has produced such a sensation here as this... On the evening of July 4th (Winnebago County's) Courthouse Square was lighted up by bonfires and fireworks and an immense crowd was assembled to celebrate the capture of Vicksburg. Preparations were made by a committee during the day and Col. Hancock presided. Speeches were made by Rev. Messrs. Muller and McLean, and by Messrs. Gary, Pike, Hancock, Jackson and Ruggles.¹⁹

A BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS VS. A BOARD OF COUNTY SUPERVISORS

Four days after Abraham Lincoln was inaugurated as President of the United States, a Wisconsin legislative act on March 8, 1861 changed the form of county boards in Wisconsin from boards of supervisors to boards of county commissioners. Membership of the board was reduced to three supervisors per county. In Winnebago and other Wisconsin counties having three or more assembly districts one supervisor was elected from each assembly district.²⁰ This elimination on the county board of supervisors of the representation of all towns in a county by their town chairman was a controversial reform which had been desired by some favoring efficiency and lower cost of county government and opposed by others favoring neighborhood representation.

Settlers who had come west to Wisconsin from New England, New York or Ohio were accustomed to both the town form of local government and the New York creation of a large county board of supervisors representative of towns, villages and city wards. Anglo-Saxon settlers of Wisconsin, from Lake Michigan west to a general northsouth line of the Wisconsin River, Dane and Rock counties, generally favored large county boards of supervisors. Early settlers of Wisconsin, on the other hand, who had grown up in the Ohio River Valley or farther south or east and had come to the lead mines of southwestern Wisconsin some 100,000 strong by 1848 were advocates of the Pennsylvania and Southern type of county board of commissioners having only three or sometimes five county commissioners. A major reason why most of the states of the U.S. don't have county boards of supervisors today is that the county supervisor system was adopted only where New England towns or the Middle Western version of towns exist. The town as a local form of government spread west from New England, New York and to wherever New Englanders or New Yorkers settled. Historically, however, the town never gained a foothold in Pennsylvania or farther south, so a large county board on which towns, villages and wards were represented never developed. Consequently, small county boards of three to five commissioners exist today over most of the nation except in those areas north and west of the Ohio River which were originally settled by New Englanders or New Yorkers.

County boards of supervisors had existed in the Wisconsin portion of Michigan Territory east of the lead mines country prior to 1836. Once Wisconsin Territory was separated from Michigan Territory in 1836, the Wisconsin Territorial Legislature on December 20, 1836 replaced county boards of supervisors "heretofore existing in the serveral counties of this territory" with boards of three county commissioners.²¹ This action was essentially a political victory of the Southern lead miner settlements in western Wisconsin over the New England settlments along the west shore of Lake Michigan.

When the population of eastern Wisconsin began to surge ahead of western Wisconsin, the Territorial Legislature voted on February 18, 1841 to replace county boards of commissioners by a modified version of county boards of supervisors. The Territorial Legislature required that "the chairman of each town of every county in this territory shall meet annually . . . as a board of supervisors". The Territorial Legislature also provided that "In case there shall be only one organized town in any county . . . the board of town supervisors shall constitute a board of county supervisors for such county."²² Since Winnebago County from its organization in 1843 to 1847 had only one town, the personnel of the Winnebago County Board were identical with that of the town board.

When Wisconsin became the 30th state in the Union in 1848, it retained the county board of supervisors form of county government but early in the 1850's a movement developed to permit counties to return to the county commissioners system. In Winnebago County for example, a county board resolution in the January session of 1851 requested Assemblyman Eastman to procure passage by the Wisconsin Legislature of an act abolishing the supervisor system and reestablishing the county commissioner system. This resolution was tabled but apparently a similar effort had been thwarted several times, leading the Oshkosh *True Democrat* to the following perceptive comment:

Every year there is a question raised in regard to substituting the county commissioner for the county supervisor form of county government ... Those proposing such a change to three commissioners for the entire county are of that class of persons who from principle are conservative, who are always in favor of the good old way . . . and who oppose all reform experiments. A county board of supervisors is more democratic than a county board of commissioners, but one great evil arising under the supervisor system is the difficulty of satisfactorily equalizing the assessed valuation of property in the several towns. If there was an assessor for the entire county instead of one in each town, this evil would be remedied.23

George Read, editor of the Oshkosh (Democratic) Daily Courier, was a supporter of a county board of commissioners and a blunt and colorful opponent of a board of supervisor representation. Annoyed that county printing had been awarded to the Oshkosh Northwestern, Read wrote in November, 1857:

The present system of county legislation is a humbug and a nuisance; the sooner that convocation of chuckle heads is abolished the better.²⁴

A bill to abolish county boards of supervisors and establish county boards of three commissioners was introduced in the Wisconsin Legislature in May, 1858, advanced to a third reading by February, 1859, was enacted March 8, 1861 and effective as of January 13, 1862. In Winnebago County the new three member county board of commissioners was first elected in November, 1861 and sworn in at the January session of 1862. One Winnebago County commissioner was elected from each of the county's three Assembly districts.

There was continuity on the new board of commissioners since the new chairman of the board was Eli Stilson, who previously had been chairman of the Winnebago Board of Supervisors since 1857 and had been a supervisor from the Town of Oshkosh for many years. There was a partisan change in the board's majority at this time from Republican to Democratic, board meeting times changed to monthly meetings and many sessions during the Civil War years were held in the morning by the approximately full-time commissioners. With only three members instead o the previous twenty-six, the new board of commissioners spent less time in debate and arrived at policy decisions more quickly than the old board. In a time of crisis, i.e. the early days of the Civil War, the small board of county commissioners was ideally organized for rapid decision making commensurate with a brief consideration of public opinion.

After the Battle of Gettysburg and the capture of Vicksburg in July of 1863, Wisconsin Union-Republicans were no longer discouraged about the prospects for an ultimate Union victory and were already beginning to look forward to the end of the Civil War. A rising tide of confidence in the Northern cause was translated politically in the November elections of 1863 into a sweeping victory for Union-Republicans. In Winnebago County the Republican resurgence defeated Eli Stilson, the Democratic incumbent county board chairman, who was charged by his Republican opponents with being a "Copperhead" Democrat. While the charge was unfair asnd irrelevant to the efficient, competent and conscientious way in which Eli Stilson had administered Winnebago County's affairs during the unusually difficult early years of the Civil War, he none-the-less lost to Steven Bowron by 203 votes. Bowron became the new chairman of the board on January 6, 1864.25

The county commissioners' terms were extended to three years in 1866 with one commissioner elected from each of the three Assembly districts in the county, one member to be elected annually. After the Civil War, there was a sharp resurgence of support in Wisconsin and in Winnebago County for the former county board of supervisors system. The Oshkosh (W) Northwestern in February, 1868 reported, "There seems to be strong sentiment in the Wisconsin Legislature to abolish the county commissioner form of county government and to return to boards of county supervisors."²⁶ By March of 1870, legislative sentiment supporting a return to the board of supervisors form of county government was able to repeal the board of commissioners law of 1861 and require Wisconsin counties to return to a county board of supervisors.²⁷ The last session of the Winnebago County Board of County Commissioners was held March 18, 1870, The new supervisors were elected in April and the first meeting of the restored board of supervisors was held May 23, 1870. The new board of supervisors had twenty-four members including five supervisors from the then five Oshkosh wards.

The historical record shows that the supervisors form of county board triumphed and has continued to exist in Winnebago County from 1870 to the present day. However, local support of a board of commissioners died hard. At the annual meeting in November, 1873 the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors passed a resolution petitioning the Wisconsin Legislature to allow the county to elect one county commissioner from each Assembly district plus one at large. Since Winnebago County at this time had four Assembly districts, this would have produced a five member commission.²⁸

In the following year, the Winnebago supervisors by a vote of 13 - 8 again petitioned the Wisconsin Legislature to authorize the county to return to use of a five member board of county commissioners. Sentiment on the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was so strong in favor of return to a small board of county commissioners that the usual resolution passed 25 - 4 on November 20, 1874 asking the Winnebago County state senator and the county's then four Assemblymen to:

use their influence and efforts to change the present form of county government and adopt a commission system which would permit a board to be composed of two members from each Assembly district and one to be elected from the county at large (i.e. a nine member board).²⁹

By the November, 1877 annual meeting, sentiment favoring a board of county commissioners had finally cooled to the point that a pro-county commissioner resolution was laid on the table 18 - 13. A Daily Northwestern story November 16, 1878 reported, "There is a strong sentiment among leading members of the county board for a return to the commissioner system", but a search of the record shows that no more pro-commissioner resolutions have ever come before the Winnebago County Board.

THE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS: SIZE, COMMITTEES, AND CHAIRMEN

The historical growth in the size of the county board in 1843 - 1880 is tabulated in Table No. 1 at the end of this paper.

In a legal sense, increases in size of the board, 1843 -1880 were the result of the creation and organization of towns, the incorporation of villages and the creation of increasing numbers of city wards. This was true because each town, village and city ward by state law was also a county supervisor district prior to the reapportionment decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court in the 1960's. In a more general economic or demographic sense, the historical growth of the board has been a product of the growing economic strength and increasing population of Winnebago County. The City of Oshkosh became a major sawmill center. Neenah and Menasha became a major flour milling center. The result in these communities and elsewhere was that as manufacturing expanded and diversified, jobs were created which attracted and retained an increasing population.

The only startling change in the size of the Winnebago County Board occurred in the period 1862 - 1870 when the Wisconsin Legislature abolished county boards of supervisors and substituted three member boards of county commissioners. In general, elitist businessmen favored small boards of commissioners while Jacksonian democracy minded supporters of town government were the major advocates of large boards of supervisors.

Change in the form of government to a county board of commissioners proved to be advantageous during the Civil War because with only three commissioners serving fulltime the board could and did meet each Monday morning and as often later in the week as necessity seemed to require. Close contact was possible between the policy determining commissioners and the administrative officials in the county building. This form of government and personnel relationship would seem to have been ideally suited to the Civil War need to deal with urgent and rapidly changing problems because it permitted rapid consideration of issues, rapid decision making and rapid implementation of such policies as had been agreed upon.

An interesting exception to the general rule that members of the county board of supervisors were representative of towns, villages or city wards that from November 13, 1860 and again from November 13, 1877 until the end of the decade, the mayor of Oshkosh served as a county board supervisor at large. B.F. Henning was the first Oshkosh mayor to serve as a Winnebago County supervisor at large in 1860 - 1861, and Mayors Haben and Dale were also county supervisors in 1877 - 1878 and 1879 -1880. For personal political reasons, Mayor Beckwith didn't assume the office of county supervisor in 1878 - 1879 while he was mayor of Oshkosh. ³⁰

The number and subject matter jurisdiction of committees of a county board of supervisors are related to the kinds of historical concerns of the board and to the board's size. High priority concerns often are reflected in a larger than average size of a committee. Membership on county board committees may also be affected by the political need to represent an organized local interest, to ensure a factional majority, or to recognize a given supervisor's perceived expertise or competance. The committees of the board which existed in 1876 are listed in Table No. 2 at the end of this paper.

In 1876 the largest committee of the board was the Committee on Equalization which had thirteen members at a time when the total board had thirty-three members and when the average size of board committees was only three members. The Committee on Finance had five members and the Committee on General Accounts had six members, but none of the other ten committees had more than three members.

The huge size of the Committee on Equalization and the larger size of the Finance and General Accounts Committees would seem to suggest the felt need to represent politically influential interests when it was necessary for the board to decide the perennially sensitive need to equalize local property assessments. Membership on the larger committees was presumably prized, considered a privilege and a reward for a supervisor's seniority, competence and dependability or party regularity. Membership on smaller committees such as Per Diem and Mileage, Jurors, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Justice and Constables Accounts, Insane and Poor and Poor Farm was presumably less sought after, although such committees are largely related to traditional services counties provided their citizens.

The list of chairmen of the Winnebago County Board 1843 - 1880 has been tabulated in Table No. 3 at the end of this chapter.

The record shows that none of the chairmen in the first eleven years of the county's history served for more than a one year term. Armine Pickett in the annual meeting of 1855 was the first chairman to be reelected to a second term. Pickett's record was soon broken by Eli Stilson, Town of Oshkosh Chairman, who was first elected county board chairman in November, 1857 and served continuously through December, 1863.

Eli Stilson's six years of service as Winnebago County Board Chairman was not only the longest record of such service by any chairman prior to 1880, but Stilson more than anyone else built the first county courthouse and guided the county through the trying first three years of the Civil War. Stilson was the first chairman of the three member Winnebago County Board of Commissioners (1862 and 1863). He was also a Stephen Douglas (i.e. a Northern) Democrat and largely for this political "sin" was defeated by a Republican Party which was reviving by the fall of 1863 as a result of the morale lifting Union victories at the capture of Vicksburg and the Battle of Gettysburg.

Stephen Bowron, like Stilson, was a resident of the Town of Oshkosh, but he was Republican in his politics, was elected county commissioner in November, 1863 and board chairman in January, 1864. Bowron served as chairman of the county board for four years and was succeeded by H.P. Leavens, Neenah. Leavens was the last chairman of the board of commissioners and went out of office on May 23, 1870.

The first chairman of the reestablished Winnebago County Board of Supervisors in 1870 was E.M. Danforth, who like Eli Stilson and Stephen Bowron before him, was a resident and chairman of the Town of Oshkosh. The next chairman to serve more than one term was E.D. Henry, President of the Village of Omro. Henry was elected on a third ballot at the annual meeting in 1874, was reelected in 1875 on a fourth ballot but decided to resign at the March session in 1876 and was replaced by A.S. Trow.³¹ Henry C. Jewell, an Oshkosh lumberman and former mayor, was county board chairman in 1876 and 1877 and L. M. Miller, another prominent Oshkosh personality in the 1870's was chairman in 1878, 1879 and 1880.

Americans today are vaguely aware that there has been a substantial inflation of the dollar in their own lifetime. A comparison, however, of the "per diem" compensation of county supervisors today with levels existing a century ago may be interesting. Two examples will suffice. The county board decided in 1853 that mileage would only be allowed to supervisors living over six miles from the county seat but that for those supervisors eligible, mileage would be allowed for the whole distance traveled. By 1876, county supervisors received the same per diem of \$2.00 per day and six cents per mile, which Winnebago County supervisors had received since 1843, the City of Oshkosh supervisors not receiving any mileage.³²

Per diem for government officials is a daily flat rate of compensation plus a limited schedule of allowances for incidental expenses. Winnebago County's per diem for county board members was set by the Wisconsin Legislature, which in 1861 still allowed only a compensation of \$2.00 per day for each day employed on county business and six cents per mile. The law also declared that "no supervisor shall be allowed to draw pay for more than 25 days of county board service in one year".³³ In 1876 county supervisors still received only \$2.00 per day.

The Winnebago County Board decided in 1853 that mileage would only be allowed to supervisors living over six miles from the county seat but that for those supervisors eligible, mileage would be allowed for the whole distance traveled. In 1876 supervisors got six cents per mile, the City of Oshkosh supervisors not receiving any mileage.³⁴

A perennialy controversial county board issue in the mid-ninetenth century was the question of which newspaper in which city or village should be chosen to publish the proceedings of the county board and receive the designation of "official paper of the county". Political party loyalty and discipline were far stonger then and each party tended to have one or more newspapers which were strongly Democratic or Republican in their politics. Consequently, the Winnebago County's annual decision to publish its proceedings in the Oshkosh *True Democrat*, or in the Oshkosh *Courier* (Democratic), Oshkosh *Times* (Democratic), Oshkosh *Northwestern* (Republican), Neenah Gazette, Menasha Island City Times, or Menasha Press followed the partisan election returns more than competitive bidding.

By the twentieth century the partisan press slowly became weaker with a major decline in the number of newspapers published in the county and there was a slow trend toward non-partisan coverage by monopoly papers in a city. County government news in the late twentieth century seems to have less coverage than in the late nineteenth century. Whatever the causes, the once hot issue of whether the awarding of the business and title of "official paper of the county" should be a prize to be awarded to the newspaper of the political party having a majority on the board of supervisors has faded entirely from the list of county controversial issues.

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Another practice of nineteenth century county boards almost never used today was to formally request the county's assemblymen and state senator to procure passage by the staste legislature of laws or constitutional provisions the board supported. For example, the Winnebago County Board once asked its legislators to procure passage of a state constitutional amendment prohibiting the sale in Wisconsin of intoxicating liquor as a beverage. ³⁶ In 1880, the board requested a law making it the duty of each county judge "to make diligent inquiry as to the actual residence of insane persons" so that the support of such a person could be assigned to the proper county.³⁷ In the 1870's, there were repeated requests from the board for legislation authorizing the county to readopt the county commissioners (i.e. small board) form of county board in place of the much larger board of supervisors.

A concluding echo from the 1870's of possible interest a century later is that the first resolution to abolish smoking during meetings of the Winnebago County Board was offered by Supervisor Silverthorn, who on March 5, 1880 moved adoption of a resolution reading: WHEREAS the smoking of tobacco during the hours of business is an annoyance to many members of this board,

BE IT RESOLVED said practice during the hours of business is hereby prohibited.

On motion, the resolution was laid on the table.³⁷
