

Dr. Gudden was called for and addressed the Board as follows:

Saving Lives by Sanatorium.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen: I ask the privilege, in fact, I assume it my duty or obligation to make a few remarks on Sunnyview, our tubercular hospital.

I take this opportunity of expressing appreciation and thanks, in behalf of Mr. C. R. Smith, Dr. M. E. Corbett and myself, for your bestowal of the trusteeship of the Winnebago County Tuberculosis sanatorium.

Using the term, "sanatorium" advisedly, I follow Dr. Adolphus Knopf of New York, who, in his international prize essay on tuberculosis, adopted the word "sanatorium" (from the Latin "sanare" to heal) in preference to "sanatarium" designated a health resort for nerve fag or convalescents.

The basic principles of treatment in all tuberculosis institutions, which I shall briefly state, are always the same: The result, however, depends largely on individual care and the avoidance of stereotyped methods.

Upon admission, each patient is carefully questioned and a thorough history relating to occupation, habits, heredity, previous

illnesses, etc., precedes the many clinical and laboratory tests.

It is a scientific axiom that we formerly observed the progress of the world through a telescope, but now we gauge it through a microscope.

Hygienic discipline is the keystone of all hospitals or modern institutions. The patient who rebels against a week's observational rest period can by kindness and persuasion be convinced of its benefit in establishing his better chances for recovery.

The effect of absolute rest while observing and noting temperature, pulse, respiration, digestion, kidney function, cough, sputum, etc., is that it affords remarkable relief even in fatally advanced cases which are often pathetically obstinate to treatment.

Extra nourishment of raw eggs and other palatable foods, without detrimental overfeeding, builds up the tissues, lessens tubercular intoxication and arrests emaciation.

If the patient reacts well to above treatment, he passes into what is called the ambulatory stage. He is allowed to dress, sit up, take moderate exercise and later live in a pavilion or cottage.

According to the highest authority on pulmonary diseases, practically no spirituous liquor is advised and the use of medicine is reduced to a minimum.

The use of tuberculin injections and other methods depends entirely on individually tested conditions.

The nitrogen treatment for compression of the lungs, so successful in hemorrhages and cavities, has passed the experimental stage. I was accorded proof of this on a recent visit to the Fresh Air Hospital of Chicago, under the superintendency of Dr. Ethan A. Gray.

According to gravity of the case, from five to eighteen months may be required for a cure.

Dr. Newell B. Burns, of Massachusetts, emphasizes the sharp distinction between the active and quiescent stages of tuberculosis.

Controlling physical and bacteriological examinations must continue until the lung no longer discharges tubercle bacilli, regardless of apparent restoration to health.

Every sanatorium issues its routine rules and bulletins on hygiene and prevention.

Suitable work in the ambulant stage is a curative factor and a beneficial necessity if not degraded into compulsory drudgery. Dr. Frederic L. Hills of the Rutland (Mass.) sanatorium lays down the rule that patients whose temperature is 100 degrees, Fahrenheit, or over are kept in bed. Those with a temperature of 99.6 degrees are permitted on verandas without exercise. After a week's normal temperature walks of ten to fifteen minutes' duration are prescribed. If symptoms remain favorable, the patient will be allowed to work

from half an hour to two hours daily, making beds, caring for rooms, wiping woodwork with damp cloths, serving lunches, cleaning sidewalks and lawns, mowing grass and doing garden work.

At Rutland, thirty-eight per cent of 345 patients do light work, and more than one-tenth of the able patients put in four hours daily in preparation for their return to industry.

Constant rest makes patients disastrously dependent and morbid. This fact is recognized even in private institutions, where economy is not a necessity.

Ability to work gives the patient confidence in his efficiency, but results should not be expected to be more than one-third the output normally to be obtained from a well person.

Dr. Rosenberg, of Bedford Station, N. Y., reports the interesting experiment of turning fifty little garden plots over to patients, teaching them the wholesomeness, joy and financial return of agriculture.

Proper recreation is fully as important as proper work.

Hardly any other disease has a more marked detrimental influence on the mind. Cheerful books should be furnished.

Games, music, motion pictures and other suitable amusements are veritable tonics for the patients.

Cheerfulness should be the aim of both attendants and patients.

Only too often worry for the dependent family at home retards recovery.

Fortunately, change of climate is not necessary for a cure. In fact Latham, of London, clinches an argument as to the welfare of convalescent tubercular people in the following words: "Most physicians who have had much experience in sanatorium treatment and who have watched patients for some years after their return from a sanatorium, agree, that as far as possible, all patients should be treated under the same climatic conditions as those which they are likely to experience in their subsequent life."

The prejudice against a tuberculosis sanatorium and the groundless fear of an attached stigma, often leading to fatal delay, are being replaced by confidence in their efficacy.

It will be the duty of the county board, trustees, the superintendent and staff of assistants, as well as the attending physician, to justify this expectation.

And, gentlemen, I wish to reassure you regarding the practicability and wisdom of the project the county board has undertaken. You are on no uncharted sea. The course is definitely mapped and outlined.

What I mean by that is that the sanatorium method of fighting tuberculosis has long ago emerged from the experimental stage. It represents modern scientific thought and conclusions. It is prac-

tical and effective. There is naught of the fad about it. It is merely one form of community protection, community preservation, community insurance. The results can be definitely calculated.

Therefore, let there be no misgivings as regards the wisdom and urgency of your investment. Winnebago's funds were never expended in a more worthy or more profitable cause. Leaving the matter of sentiment out wholly, even from the most practical and utilitarian standpoint, the investment is warranted and will assuredly yield great and impressive returns.

God's speed to Sunnyview, which faces the rising sun of future knowledge and greater chances of health in the fight against tuberculosis.

Vice Chairman Thompson called to the chair and Chairman Arne-mann excused.

Supervisor Loescher moved that the Board meet Wednesday at the Sanatorium to inspect the same and later to meet at the Court House.

Equalization Committee.

Supervisor Nicolai offered the following Resolution No. 4:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen: Be it resolved, That the Committee on Equalization is hereby authorized to meet at the Court House in the City of Oshkosh, not to exceed six days, for the purpose of familiarizing themselves with the assessment of the several towns and wards in said county, at such time as may be fixed by said chairman of said committee.

And Be It Further Resolved, That the said members of said Equalization Committee shall be allowed and paid the sum of \$3.00 per day for every day that each of them is in actual attendance upon said meeting, and the per diem as allowed for meetings of the County Board, not to exceed six days for such meeting. And be it further

Resolved, That the Supervisors of the towns, cities and villages be authorized and directed to attend said committee meeting, not to exceed one day, upon notice from chairman of said committee, and that they be paid at the same rate when in attendance. And be it

Further Resolved, That the Income Assessor shall send each supervisor a list of the sales in said Supervisor's district, so that said Supervisor can inquire and get all the facts about said sales, and that they be paid for one day, \$3.00 for their services.

Yellowstone Trail.

Supervisor Nigl offered the following Resolution No. 5:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen: Whereas, There has been a road laid out extending from the Pacific Coast across the state of Washington, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota to St. Paul, known as the Yellowstone Trail, on which there has been already expended seven million dollars (\$7,000,000), and

Whereas, This trail is now being laid out through the southwestern part of the state of Wisconsin to Milwaukee, thence to Chicago, and

Whereas, It now proposes to change the route of said Yellowstone Trail through the state of Wisconsin from the southwestern course to a northerly and easterly course, extending from St. Paul to the cities of Abbotsford, Marshfield, Stevens Point, Waupaca and Oshkosh, thence in a southerly direction to Milwaukee; and

Whereas, There is some expense connected with the laying out of this trail, such as putting up arrows and guide boards, etc., and said expenses are being contributed by the several counties and cities through which said trail extends.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund for the payment of Winnebago County's share of said expenses; that the same be paid to the proper person or persons upon orders drawn by the Clerk and signed by the chairman of this Board, after the said arrows and guide boards have been erected satisfactorily to the chairman of this Board.

Nekimi Bridge.

Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

Supervisor Loescher offered the following Report No. 3:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Tuberculosis Sanatorium begs leave to make their final report, and we move that the partial report made at the March meeting be and is hereby rescinded, as all matters pertaining to this Committee in regard to the construction of the Sanatorium will appear in this report and the two may be misconstrued in the sense that the same matters might appear in both and might conflict with the meaning we wish to convey in this, our final report. At the May session, 1914, your Chairman placed the honor of carrying out the instructions of this board in regard to the building of a Tuberculosis Sanatorium in the hands of this Committee. The first step taken was to organize our Committee which was done on June 5, 1914, at the same time your Committee consulted the architect Mr. H. Auler as to the plans which your Honorable Body had accepted at a former meeting and we found that same had not as yet been fully approved by the State Board of Control, and from that time up to August 1st the plans were held up by said Board of Control on account of minor and various other changes. Your Committee accepted several of these changes which involved hundreds of dollars. Some changes and extra expense will appear in this Report later. It was the idea of the Board of Control that the building should be enlarged to the extent of adding twenty feet to each of the East and West wings—widening the North wing or Administration part four feet. We found that the cost would amount to \$5,000.00 to add forty feet,—The North wing \$1,000.00,—the other minor changes could be made without much expense. It was decided to widen the North wing four feet, and instead of extending the East and West wings twenty feet each, we added five feet more to each of the open porches, and returned the plans to the Board of Control, same being returned to us about August 15th. We then advertised for bids on the construction work, amounts of same are hereto attached, the work going as follows: General Construction, R. C. Meyer & Sons,—Heating. Dukerschein Heating Co.,—Plumbing. C. Thayer,—Painting. H. C. Danks,—Electric Wiring. H. Meyer. In taking up the matter of sewers, light and water it was the understanding that connections could be made with the County Asylum for all three of these but upon going into the matter in a practical way we found the expense would be greater than furnishing same in the building and the sewer would lay above ground in several places, as the asylum

sewer was too high to accommodate the sewer of the Sanatorium, it would be subject to frost and might be worthless. The cost of enlarging the electric plant at the Asylum, enlarging water mains between County Home and Asylum to accommodate the extra water for Sanatorium, laying of pipe from these buildings to Sanatorium, would create an expense greater than putting in a combination water and light plant at the Sanatorium. (Please note here that your Committee was having its troubles, right in the start.)

On Sept. 4th your Committee met to get down to business and the instructions of the Chairman should be and were remembered and carried out by the Committee, in their work during the building stage of the Sanatorium. It was decided at this meeting that if Winnebago County built a Sanatorium for its sick it should and would build and equip as good as any in the State or the United States, built by Counties for their own use. And we took into consideration the comfort of the inmates to the extent of placing ourselves in their places, and we, feeling that if we were sick and should have to avail ourselves of your institution we should want surroundings as good as we have at home, if not better. And we all felt that we would like them a little better, and so we used our judgment, and if your Sanatorium is not as good as we wished to make it, it is not the fault of this Committee. For we believe that there are more comforts and better surroundings than in our own homes for those who wish to avail themselves thereof. And with this sentiment ever before us, with your help, and the good will of the people, have done our very best and hope that upon final inspection you will approve of our efforts and should any doubt arise in your mind that we have not done as you would, had you been in our positions, kindly tell it to us here today, so that we may correct any impression of error that may lodge in your estimation against any one or all of this Committee, for we stand together in what has been done and all we ask at any time is the chance to explain any or all things in connection of the construction and furnishing of your Sanatorium. If there is anything you don't understand, we, gentlemen, are here to explain our actions to the letter, and you will find attached to this report an account of money spent for the various lines of work. Also a full account of Committee expense and minutes of all meetings. Bills and vouchers for same are in the hands of the Clerk and after summing them up you will have the entire cost. The first step taken was to sink a well. And in view of the fact that at times water had been scarce at various institutions your committee decided to put in an eight inch well, the difference between six and eight being only 50c per foot. We went down three hundred feet, and have ample water for all purposes, including fire protection.



Winnebago County Insane Asylum.

Your Committee, from June 5th to Oct. 1st, met in a body. After Oct. 1st each member went to the site one day each week, wherein to make his inspection and one day in each six weeks we met to compare notes, thus covering the job every day during the construction. Mr. Auler going out on Mondays.

Your Board was kind in considering the Trustees we asked for. They have been a great help in the final finishing and furnishing. And we here wish to thank Mr. C. R. Smith, Drs. Cudden and Corbett, and we feel that we are leaving the care of your institution in the hands of men who will make it a success in all ways.

The co-operation of the Supt. Mrs. H. Threlkeld, was a great burden taken from our hands, for under her advisement we found it very easy to get what we should for the best of all concerned, and we hope that the people in general will help to make this venture a grand success. This means you. Don't let yourself get into the habit of depending on the other fellow to visit the institution and say a kind word where it will do the most good. Don't forget that the Superintendent of this institution has a load to carry, at least for the first year. And let us join in making it as light as possible, for upon her rests the responsibility of success. The Committee wishes to sincerely thank her, for she had always her patients at heart in her work with this Committee. I dare say that personally each member of this Committee would have wished to have added more in the surroundings, but as the expense ran over the appropriation on account of the various extras we could not go to any extent in the outside surroundings and were compelled to overrule our Superintendent in some things that we hope your Honorable Body will see fit to allow. Heat should be provided in every room as well as on the sunporches. Should they be used as dormitories in the winter time various other changes, that we shall recommend, should be made, but your Committee did not feel it best to make them without the consent of the Board because the plans had been approved by the State and as the State was the power, we felt that our plans were correct, but since we have been notified that there should be several changes made, such as heat in all patients' rooms, etc., Mrs. Threlkeld has surely looked forward to the good of her patients and this Committee looks forward to much good coming therefrom. We feel that she, as well as ourselves, worked only for the good of those who have been unfortunate to the extent of sickness and despair.

We could not let the chance go by without saying a few words about the surroundings. Trees and plans for beautifying the grounds. Trees have been purchased and set out along the road and to the North and West of the building walks have been provided for the patients to exercise, and all has been done that pos-

sibly could be done for the comfort of those who wish to avail themselves of what God and man has done to help them back to health and happiness. God has given us an abundance of fresh air, the site is ideal and the sun while shining surely goes to make what your Committee has found in its name, "Sunny View." In looking North and South over pastures and trees you see the stacks of manufacturing plants that place the cities of your County at the front and gives the Fox River Valley the name of being the best location in the state. Looking East and West you see Lake Winnebago and Butte des Morts, surrounded by the farms and mansions of the country gentlemen who have helped to put Wisconsin on the map, and make it the greatest State in agriculture in the United States of America.

Therefore with all conditions ideal; a County Board who do things right or not at all; men at the head who DO; a Superintendent with a working force that will do or die; with an institution second to none, we may hope and look for good results.

District Attorney explained laws and reason for the call. Also read petition for bridge at Omro, after remarks by Supervisors Fernandez and McCool.

Petition for Omro Bridge.

To the County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

We, the undersigned, Supervisors of the Town of Omro, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, and President and Trustees of the Village of Omro, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, do hereby respectfully represent and show to your honorable body:

1. That the Fox River bridge in the Township of Omro crossing Fox River in the Village of Omro, on the section line between section seventeen (17) and eighteen (18) and seven (7) and eight (8) of said Township, is a bridge which the said Town and Village of Omro are by law required and compelled to maintain and keep in repair jointly.

2. That said bridge is in urgent need of repairs and that the safety of the traveling public requires that said repairs should be made without delay. That said repairs are made necessary by reason of damage to the roadway and support to said bridge, caused by the frost and elements, and it is necessary that said roadway should be immediately repaired.

3. That, according to the last assessment as equalized by the County Board, the said Town of Omro and the said Village of Omro each had an assessed valuation of more than four hundred thousand dollars; that the costs of the necessary and urgent repairs to said bridge will exceed the sum of two hundred dollars and probably amount to the sum of approximately one thousand dollars, or more.

4. That the Town of Omro and the said Village of Omro have each provided for the payment of its proportion of the cost of such repairs as is required by and in accordance with the provisions of section 1319 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

WHEREFORE, Your petitioners pray that your chairman appoint two of your members who shall have the same powers and duties as members appointed pursuant to subsection six of section



Annual Report of the Trustees of the County Asylum, County Farm and County Home.

Wm. Faber, Trustee, read the following, Report No. 10:

The Board of Trustees of the Asylum for the Chronic Insane, and the County Home, of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, respectfully submit herewith their report of the two institutions covering the year ending June 30, 1915.

Our institutions and the county farm are, at the close of this year, in better condition than they were a year ago. While no new buildings have been built during the year, some extensive repairs have been made.

The condition of ceilings necessitated putting in new steel ceilings in the several wards and corridors of the institution, not previously done; in doing this it was necessary to change the electric wiring by putting all wiring in insulated conduits.

A new hardwood floor has been laid in the general dining room, and new floor coverings of battleship linoleum laid in the four wards and corridors.

Our farm has been no exception to the season's general bountiful harvest—producing heavy crops in grain, corn and vegetables, all of which have been used in providing for the needs of the institution and the farm stock.

We have contracted for 1,500 tons of screened lump Yougheny coal at \$3.50 per ton, f. o. b. State Hospital sidetrack—to supply the institutions until July 1, 1916; this is \$.05 per ton better price than the price of a year ago, for a coal equal to our requirements.

The new system of accounting installed under the direction of a State Auditor is proving very satisfactory, making very complete records on file at our institution and at the State Auditor's office at Madison.

Your Board of Trustees continue to feel as we did a year ago, that more acreage for our County Asylum Farm would be of material advantage to the institutions and urge upon your honorable body the careful consideration of an appropriation for the pur-

chase of some acreage available to replace the tract taken for the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, and meet the requirements of our increased herd of stock.

The net earnings of the farm over and above all expenses show a profit of \$3,439.43, after charging off \$2,559.80, being 4 per cent on inventoried valuation.

County Physician's Report.

J. E. Schein, M. D., read his report, No. 13, as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the County Asylum and County Home, and the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen: I herewith submit my report as County Physician for the year ending June 30, 1915. I have visited the County Asy-

lum and County Home regularly, twice a week, since March 1st, 1915, and the County Jail and County Work House whenever called, and I made special visits to all the County Institutions when necessary.

COUNTY ASYLUM.

At the County Asylum there were ten deaths during the year, five men and five women, and the majority of them were people of advanced age. The various causes of death were: One of dementia and heart disease; one of epilepsy; one of paralytic dementia; one of endocarditis; one of paresis; one of uremia; one of paralysis agitans; one of heart disease; one of general debility, and one of hemorrhage of the stomach, due to an ulcer of the same.

There were two major accidental injuries during the year—two broken arms, caused by falls. The one, at the age of fifty years, made a very nice recovery, and the other, at the age of seventy, left the arm partly paralyzed.

I have always found plenty of good substantial, nourishing diet, well cooked, for the inmates. I have found the attendants, Superintendent and Matron, very kind to the patients, and every effort was used to make them comfortable in every respect.

COUNTY HOME.

At the County Home there were six deaths during the year, four men and two women. The causes of death were as follows: One of apoplexy; one of endocarditis; one of myocarditis; one of senile debility; one of paralysis, and one of intestinal hemorrhage. No birth at this institution during the year. There was one operation, upon John Gaughan of the Town of Eureka, which was done at Lakeside Sanitarium without expense to the county. There was a very nice recovery.

I have at all times found this institution clean, and in a sanitary condition, and the food wholesome and well cooked. The overseer, his wife, and their assistants, do everything in their power to make the inmates comfortable.

COUNTY JAIL.

I have visited the jail at all times when called. There were no serious illnesses at this institution, and I have at all times found it in a clean and sanitary condition, the food well cooked, and all prisoners well cared for in every respect by those in charge.

COUNTY WORK HOUSE.

I have made several visits to this institution on account of the illness of various prisoners, but there was no illness of a serious nature during the year. I have inspected the prisoner's quarters, and have at all times found them clean and comfortable; the food excel-

lent, and the Superintendent always willing and anxious to help all conditions in his charge to the best of his ability.

I want to say that the management of all the County Institutions has been excellent; those in charge very courteous and ready to assist me in my work in every way possible.

County Farm Sewer.

Mr. Pinkerton of the Board of Trustees of County Asylum offered the following report, No. 11:

Pursuant to instructions of your Honorable Body under resolution of March 8, 1915, your Board of Trustees beg to report that after careful investigation of our needs for sewers from county property to Lake Winnebago, we have had County Surveyor Yoold make careful survey of the premises and find we can rebuild our present sewer from County Home and County Asylum buildings to Lake Winnebago which must be enlarged to meet our requirements, putting in a 20-inch sewer which would be large enough to meet the needs of our institutions for many years, at a cost of about 45c per foot for 6,000 feet of vitrified sewer pipe, making a cost of about \$2,700, besides labor, much of which can be furnished from our institutions.

A somewhat smaller sewer would likely be large enough for our needs, but by putting in a 20-inch sewer, same would be large enough to enable the Tuberculosis Sanatorium to build a sewer from their institution to connect with ours near the County Home. Should they find it necessary to put in a sewer. This sewer would also be large enough to drain several acres of our land which can be improved by tiling with proper drainage.

Contests.

During the past year the juvenile grain and poultry clubs have aroused considerable interest. Nearly three hundred boys and girls received certified barley and corn from the University which they planted and cared for in an approved way. Members of the Juvenile Poultry Growers' Association exhibited at the various fairs in the county.

The usual contests were held at the time of the county commencement. They consisted of contests in Adding, Spelling, Penmanship, Breadmaking, Sewing, Map Drawing and the Declamatory contest. The winner of the Spelling contest represented the county at the state fair in September.

Supervising Teacher.

A rather important change has been made in the management of the schools of the county. Chapter 531 of the laws of 1915 re-

pealed the law creating the County Board of Education and substituted therefore a Committee on Common Schools, one of whose duties was the appointment of a supervising teacher to assist the county superintendent in supervising the schools. This committee, upon the nomination of the county superintendent, selected Mr. E. E. Robey of the Oshkosh Normal School faculty as the supervising teacher for Winnebago County. The County Board is directed by law to make provision for the payment of the salary and expenses of this official, and at the end of the year the county is to be fully reimbursed by the state.

Report of Libraries.

Miss Rupp offered the following Report No. 27½:

Report of the Supervising Librarian to the Board of Libraries of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, for the period from October 1, 1914, to October 1, 1915.

Gentlemen:—By means of the visits to nearly all the stations in the county the pleasantest relationship between the custodians of the libraries and the distributing center in Oshkosh has been established. It is found that everybody except, perhaps, the newcomer, knows about the library privileges, and the library visitors are cordially welcomed as old friends. Whenever it is found necessary to change stations no difficulty whatever is experienced in finding someone to volunteer services. There is only one regret on the part of the library visitors and that is the short time that can be given to each visit. During the two days devoted to visiting this Fall 32 stops were made averaging perhaps 10 minutes to each stop.


There are now 49 libraries, of which two are reference. It is suggested that the number of libraries be limited to 50, which is all one assistant can take care of. Some of the older libraries need almost entire replacing, and with the increased circulation during the past year the wear and tear on the books has been greater. Two hundred and thirty-three books were added by purchase, 26 were added by gift, 12 were discarded on account of their worn condition, making a total of 2,704 volumes now in the libraries.

The total circulation for the year was 4,281, an increase of 1,137 over last year. The largest circulation of any one library was 364, at Winneconne.

The libraries have all been spoken for for the Winter and, with the exception of those kept on hand for exchange purposes, nearly all have been sent to their destination.

In connection with the exhibit of the Oshkosh Public Library at the County Fair was a map showing the stations of the Traveling Libraries. This brought a number of inquiries from interested visitors, and we hope will result in increased patronage.

It is very satisfactory to know the interest displayed by the teachers throughout the county. All are eager to make known the

library privileges to the people in the community, and good returns are expected from this party co-operation.

It is again urged that the County Board make the full appropriation of \$200.00 in order that new books may be added frequently and the old ones kept in good repair.

This of course entails a considerable loss of time and energy, having some one come down to call me and going up to answer the phone. I understand that the cost of a phone is about \$18.00 a year.

SUNNY VIEW SANATORIUM.

Dr. M. E. Corbett offered the following Report No. 41:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen: The Board of Trustees of Sunny View Sanatorium submit the following report:

While according to law we are required to make our annual report October 1st, we deem it advisable that it would be well and proper to submit to you at this time what has been accomplished at the Sanatorium and at the same time present to you our future needs.

Included in our report is the report of the attending physician, Dr. H. H. Bassler, who was elected in place of Dr. B. C. Gudden, resigned. We also submit the report of the Superintendent, Miss Hilma Anderson.

The success of the Institution is manifest from the fact that it has been filled with patients from the start to the present time and with a list of patients waiting to enter.

We can accommodate but twenty-four patients at one time, as the Sanatorium is now arranged. It appears to your board advisable to make certain changes so that we can accommodate those who are anxious to enter. Your board of trustees recommend that two or more of the porches be enclosed and properly equipped for the accommodation of these patients.

In our crowded condition at the present time our two recreation rooms have been given over for the housing of help and we have no room except the basement for our janitors. In our opinion the room now occupied by the janitors or any other room in the basement is not the proper place for any one to live.

Inasmuch as the recreation rooms have been given up as stated above, we would recommend that the large dining room be used as a recreation room; that the present kitchen and accessory rooms be made into a large dining room for patients and that the kitchen be moved to the basement.

Your Board further recommends that a laundry be installed in the basement of the Sanatorium. This would call for an expenditure of \$1200.00. While it may not be more economical to do the work at the Sanatorium, it will lessen the chance of infection to

people outside the institution, as it is now handled by a public laundry.

We further recommend that something be done with the septic tank and sewage. The tank is an absolute failure and the liquid pumped out into the open field. The odor is almost unbearable, both from the tank and the pumped out sewage. In the Winter it will be almost impossible to pump the liquid out on account of freezing.

We would suggest that the lighting system be obtained from the electric railway, as the present system does not seem practical.

Inasmuch as large quantities of ice will be required summer and winter, we suggest that an ice house be built.

We also call your attention to the matter of transportation. On account of the distance from the railway and electric line of one mile each, people now delivering supplies are objecting on account of the long haul. Furthermore, whenever any of our patients are compelled to go to town, they must walk the long distance to and from cars, which is very trying to people suffering from this disease and they are usually set back in their progress to a great extent. If agreeable to the board we ask to be authorized to purchase an automobile which can be utilized not only for carrying passengers but freight.

Of the 24 patients we have in the institution at the present time only one is a pay patient. Of the \$6,147.00 expended, we have received from patients only \$401.50.

Should the recommendations made by us be in accord with the views of your honorable body and if the proportionate expense for maintaining the institution be the same, taking into consideration the increased number of patients and help, it would appear to us that it would require an appropriation of \$40,000.00.



Report of Sanatorium Committee.

Supervisor Loescher offered the following Report No. 54:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen:—Your Sanatorium Committee beg to report that they have carefully gone over the report of the Trustees of Sunnyview Sanatorium and find that amounts expended are correct, and we recommend that the amount of \$25,000.00 be set aside for the maintenance of said institution for the next sixteen months, as there will be no returns from the State until April, 1917.

We further recommend that the ice house be built of sufficient size to furnish plenty of ice for the use of this institution; also that the purchase of a conveyance be postponed until spring.

Your committee, having money in the building fund, have ordered sash put in on all the sun porches, and same will be complete within the next week, and your institution will be ready to accommodate twenty more patients than there are at present.

We find that in moving the kitchen into the basement it would require more help. The kitchen was placed on the main floor for the purpose of saving help, and the space in the basement will be taken up by laundry, which we recommend, be installed during the winter. We find the janitor's room in the basement perfectly dry and healthy, having plenty of ventilation.

The septic tanks will be turned into the new sewer, which we

hope will be constructed as soon as possible. In regard to the lighting, and all other power machinery, we recommend that the Superintendent of this institution see to employing one of the two janitors, who is capable of taking care of such machinery, as we feel that such a man will more than pay for the amount paid him by saving in fuel and repair on machinery.

We also recommend that no more work be done about the institution and surrounding grounds than is really necessary.

We further recommend that the Trustees of the Asylum, with Mr. Manuel, the Superintendent, Trustees of Sunnyview Sanatorium, and the committees of both institutions, meet at the County Asylum not later than Dec. 1, to form a co-operation that will benefit all concerned and to the good of Winnebago County.

We further recommend that a copy of the resolution in regard to the County Physician taking care of all County institutions at his present salary, be sent to the Trustees of Sunnyview Sanatorium so that this matter be brought to their attention.

We also recommend that the charges for examination for patients entering the Sanatorium be charged back to the City, Town or Village where such patients live, and examination are made.

We also recommend that the Asylum Trustees complete sewer up to Sunnyview Sanatorium, as there is sufficient money at their disposal, by resolution passed by Chairman of Finance—at this session.

And Whereas Section 1317m 5-1 gives the county boards authority to contract or improve any road or bridge within the county upon the county system of prospective state highways, and in that event the county shall contribute sixty per cent and the state forty per cent of the cost thereof.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County That on and after January 1, 1917, Winnebago County adopt the system as provided by Section 1317m 5-1, so that thereafter the county and state will build the roads (except the bridges) upon the prospective state highway independent of the towns.

Printing of County Proceedings.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Printing to whom was referred Resolution No. 1, dated March 6, 1916, pertaining to the publishing of the proceedings of the County Board in a newspaper of general circulation throughout the County, beg leave to report as follows:

1st. That under the laws of Wisconsin, Section 57-1A, the publication of the proceedings of the County Board must be published in at least one newspaper having a general circulation and the maximum cost per folio is fixed by Statute.

2nd. That the Daily Northwestern of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, is the only newspaper having a general circulation throughout the county and therefore the only paper in which the proceedings can be legally printed.

3rd. That the County Board may, if it desires, have the proceedings printed in book form but your committee, on account of the booklets being a year old when received, regard this of secondary importance.

4th. The Daily Northwestern has made a proposition in writing combining the features of the publication of proceedings and booklets which reads as follows:

March 8, 1916.

Mr. E. E. Meeleus, Chairman Printing Committee, Winnebago County, Oshkosh, Wis.

Dear Sir: Regarding our conversation with the Printing Committee yesterday, we submit the following proposition to publish the proceedings of the County Board in the Daily Northwestern:

We will print the proceedings within twelve or fifteen days after each session and will furnish fifty proofs of the proceedings to the County Clerk for the use of the members at the next session of the County Board, and three copies will be mailed to each Supervisor after each session. Book to be same style as book of Douglas County herewith submitted, except resolution to be set in double column measurement, and other matter, such as figures, in single column measurement.

At the end of one year, we will furnish the County with 200 books in pamphlet form, style same as book for Douglas County. Price for publishing the proceedings in the Daily Northwestern and furnishing two hundred books in pamphlet form will be Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00).

We believe that if the County Board will let us do this work for one year at the price named, the taxpayers of this county will more than appreciate the change made in publishing the proceedings. In the past, very few taxpayers in this county read the official publication of the County Board Proceedings and if given an opportunity to publish the same, it will mean that 11,000 taxpayers of this County will read the proceedings in the Daily Northwestern. At the present time hardly three hundred taxpayers get an opportunity to read the proceedings of the County Board on account of the paper publishing the same having only a small circulation in this County.

RULES OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, ADOPTED MAY 24, 1914

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 a. m., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 a. m.

And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless adjourned to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in the case of his absence the Vice-Chairman, or in their absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

(Amended to provide for Vice-Chairmen as authorized by Ch. 110, of 1903.)

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, 13;

Finance, 9;

General Accounts, 9;

Illegal Assessments, 5;

Justices and Constables' Accounts, 9;

Sheriff's and Coroner's Accounts, 9;

Insane, 5;

Poor and Poor Farm, 5;

Workhouse, 3;

Corporations, 5;

Public Buildings, 5;

Roads and Bridges, 5;

Per Diem and Mileage, 5;

Printing, 5;

Bonds and Salaries, 6;

County Abstract and Tract Index System, 5;

Rules, 3;

County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy, 5.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman, or in his absence, the Vice-Chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.

3. Reports of Standing Committees.
4. Reports of Select Committees.
5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the County shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

RULE XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

RULE XXIX. No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.
