 Tuesday, Nov. 11, 1890, 10 o'clock. A. M.

Board met pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 664, R. S. and was called to order by L. M. Miller, Chairman.

On motion the Rules of March 8, 1886 were adopted for the government of the present Board.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

Mr. Warwick moved that the Board proceed to an informal ballot for Chairman. Motion prevailed.

Result of ballot: Whole number of votes was 33, of which Sup'r Morgan

received 15, Sup'r Davis received 16, Sup'r Huxley received 1, and Sup'r Warwick received 1.

There being no choice the Board proceeded to a formal ballot.

Result of ballot: Whole number of votes was 33, of which Sup'r Davis received 18, and Sup'r Morgan 15.

Sup'r Davis having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared duly elected Chairman for the ensuing year.

Sup'r Schoetz offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, which motion unanimously prevailed:

Whereas, Colonel L. M. Miller, of Oshkosh, Wis. has filled the office of Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors of this County for the last fifteen years with great ability and care,

Be it Therefore Resolved, by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the thanks of this Board be tendered to him unanimously.

Chairman-elect Davis thanked the Board for the honor conferred, and solicited the unanimous support of the Board in the performance of the duties before him.

Ex-Chairman Miller extended his thanks to the Board for the pleasant associations during the many years of his holding the office of Chairman.

On motion by Sup'r Cook the Board adjourned until 9 A. M.

BRIDGE PETITION.

Sup'r Bushnell presented the following petition:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.:

Your petitioners members of the Board of Supervisors of Omro, Winnebago county, State of Wisconsin, represent that the electors of said town have voted to build an iron bridge across Fox river in the village of Omro, and that the town has provided four thousand and five hundred dollars (\$4,500) one-half of the cost of said bridge and foundations, and that the total cost of said bridge and foundations will be more than one-fourth of one percentum of all property in said town according to the last equalized value of said town.

Your petitioners therefore pray that the County Board of Supervisors will appropriate one-half of the cost of said bridge and appoint a committee duly authorized to act for the county, in accordance with Section (1) one of an act to amend Chapter 375 of the Laws of 1881, approved March 30, 1885.

REMONSTRANCE AGAINST BRIDGE.

The following remonstrance was presented, read, and on motion referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges.

Winnebago County, {
State of Wisconsin. }

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of said County:

We the undersigned, tax-payers in the town of Omro, in the said county, humbly represent to your honorable board that the bridge in said town is a new bridge built in the year 1878, and with such repairs each year as all bridges require, will last as long as bridges generally do. Further represent that 30 or 40 feet of the bridge is on an island in the middle of the river and the north channel, and the island is about three-fourths of the bridge. Further represent that the north channel is piled and the water is about 6 feet deep with clay bottom. We therefore represent that there is no call for a new bridge, as we firmly believe, but ask your honorable body to investigate the merits of this question to the end that this county and the town of Omro may not be unjustly taxed to accommodate the board of Supervisors of said town, who we believe intend to throw away a good bridge by means of a fraudulent vote taken at the last town meeting. We further represent that the town has not had a fair notice of any vote that has been taken, or has the vote been taken by ballot according to law.

PETITION FOR CANCELLATION OF TAX CERTIFICATES.

The following petition from J. W. Dunham for the cancellation of tax certificates read and on motion referred to Committee on Illegal Assessments.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.

Your petitioner James W. Dunham respectfully represents that he is the owner and holder of the following tax certificates, to-wit:

No. 257 of the sale of lands for the year 1886, dated May 18, 1886, for the sum of \$32.28
 No. 245 " " " " dated May 17, 1887, for \$5.95
 No. 211 " " " " " " 15, 1888, for 8.00
 No. 207 " " " " " " 21, 1889, for 8.04

on land described as lot 6 and the N. 22 feet of lot 7, block 89, Leach's map, 4th ward, city of Oshkosh, and No. 193, dated May 20, 1890 for the sum of \$6.05 on land described as lot 6 and the north 14 and 6-10 feet of lot 7 Block 89, Leach's map, 4th Ward city of Oshkosh, sold and executed as of the dates aforesaid respectively by the County Treasurer of said county.

That all of said tax certificates are void for the reason that the above descriptions contained in said certificates respectively as above set forth, and also in the tax roll of the city of Oshkosh for the respective years and the taxes on which the same are based are not correct, and include lands or parts of said lot 7 on which the taxes were duly paid in each of the years aforesaid in which said land was sold and said tax certificates issued as aforesaid.

That the entire width of said lot No. seven as appears from the recorded plat thereof is not more than thirty-six and 6-10 feet.

That as appears from the public records in Vol. 122, Page 553 Mrs. Susanna Hefte is the owner of the north 14 and 2-10 feet thereof, and Christian Hefte is the owner of the south 22 feet thereof (see Vol. 86, page 378, of deeds in register office of said county.)

That in each and everyone of the years aforesaid for the taxes of which said sales were made the taxes on the south 22 feet of said lot have been duly paid, whereas the descriptions contained in each of aforesaid certificates numbered 257, 245, 211, and 207 cover the north 7 and 4-10 feet thereof on which land as aforesaid the taxes have been duly paid in each of the aforesaid years, for which and on which land said tax certificates were issued.

Wherefore petitioner asks that said tax certificates No. 257 sale of 1886, 245 sale 1887, 211 of 1888 207 sale of 1889, and 193 sale of 1890, be cancelled and the amounts paid thereof with interest on each from their respective date be refunded to him as provided by law.

The entire cost of the institution, including salaries of the Physician, Matron and Superintendent, and all permanent improvements added to the place exclusive of new buildings, is \$7551.40; from this deduct \$7437.29 due the county for care of inmates and \$659.81 received from sale of farm products leaves a balance of \$454.30 in favor of the institution.

The principal improvements made during the year are as follows: Wash house 30 x 50 two stories high; barn 40 x 60 with root cellar 17 x 40 under it; shed 24 x 78 with stable room for 45 head of cattle; 300 rods new fence, also the necessary repairing, painting, etc. Owing to the disability of some of our horses we have exchanged so that we have now three good teams. SPECIAL REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors and Committee on Poor and Poor Farm:

Your County Sup't of Poor and Poor Farm to whom your honorable body left the construction of a wash house, barn and shed at the Poor farm, would make the following report:

Before commencing the erection of the wash house a portion of your Committee on Poor Farm met with the Trustees and decided not to put the root cellar under the wash house but under the barn on account of not having the future location of the County Asylum fixed. We therefore built it so that it can be moved at any time if thought advisable. But the erection of this most necessary building has so pleased the State Board of Charities and Reform that they are willing to let the County keep their insane in the present building for two or three years longer. They say it is not necessary to build under that time as the State has more room than they can fill at present.

The wash house is 30 x 50, two stories high, with stone foundation and is connected to the Asylum by a corridor. The lower floor is divided into a wash room and an ironing room; the upper floor contains a dry room, also a sewing room, bed room, and clothes' room.

Barn 40 x 60 with root cellar 17 x 40. Shed 24 x 78 with a capacity of 45 head of cattle. All are built of good material and cost as follows: Wash house \$1313.07; Barn and shed including root cellar \$1122.56; total cost of the three buildings \$2435.57. Am't appropriated by the County Board \$2400.00. Cost of the three buildings in excess of appropriation \$35.57.

I have also carried out your instructions in regard to having a survey made for a sewer from the county buildings to Winnebago lake. I secured the services of County Surveyor Randall. You will find the plans and specifications and estimated cost of two routes from the house to the lake at two different points, on file in the County Clerk's office. The cost of making the survey was \$70 which was audited and paid from the building fund.

Bills to the amount of \$2323.51 have been allowed by the Trustees and drawn from the County treasury to apply on buildings, leaving a balance of \$6.49 on hand. There are two bills not yet allowed: S. M. Hay & Bros., for hardware and nails \$56.08; G. F. Stroud, for paints and oil \$55.98, making a total of \$112.06, from which deduct \$5.49 amount on hand, leaves a balance of \$106.57 to be provided for.

GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned your committee on Roads and Bridges to whom was referred the petition of the Town Board of Supervisors of the Town of Omro in said county and state, respectively represent that the town aforesaid has voted to build an iron bridge and foundations across Fox river in the village of Omro, and the said town has provided the sum of (\$4500) Forty Five Hundred dollars, one-half the cost of said improvement, would respectfully report that we find that the town of Omro has complied with all the requirements as set forth in said petition according to law in providing for the cost of said bridge. That the cost of said bridge exceeds one-fourth of one percentum of all the taxable property in said town according to the last equalized valuation thereof, and that the county is under legal obligation to provide for one-half the cost of said improvement.

Your committee would therefore recommend that the sum of Forty Five Hundred Dollars (\$4500) or so much thereof as shall be necessary to pay one-half (½) the cost of said improvement, be and the same is hereby appropriated for the building of said bridge and foundations, according to the prayer of the said petitioners, and that the Chairman of this Board appoint two commissioners from towns taxed outside of the town of Omro, subject to the payment of a portion of such appropriation, who shall act for and in behalf of the county in the construction of said improvements and the disbursement of such appropriation, and that the Clerk of this Board be authorized and instructed to apportion according to law the

tax for this appropriation to the following towns and villages, namely: Algoma, Black Wolf, Clayton, Menasha, Neenah, Nekimi, Nepeuskun, Oshkosh, Omro, Poygan, Rushford, Utica, Vinland, Wolf River, Winchester, Winneconne and Winneconne village.

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen: The past year has been fraught with very satisfactory results in many respects. The children have attended school regularly; parents and school patrons have interested themselves in school work; no serious complaint has been made from any quarter, and, in general, the school work has proceeded harmoniously. Many more school houses have been repaired and refurnished the last year than the year previous. Still there are others that require the attention of the school board. I have not advocated the purchase of an expensive outfit of school apparatus, in the ordinary district schools. But plenty of blackboard, reading charts, outline maps, and a cheap globe, are requisites essential to the best work.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.

There are 5772 children of school age in the county. Of the 2929 between the age of 7 and 14, 2445 have attended public school, and 209 private school, leaving 274 (17 less than the previous year) who have not attended any school.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION.

A year ago, I addressed a circular to the teachers, and among other things, asked if their district board had complied with the requirements of the compulsory clause of the school law. Nearly every teacher responded promptly, and so far as reported, no district in the county had done more than talk about the "Bennett law." So far as I can ascertain the private and parochial schools generally teach English sufficient to come under the requirements of the law. In fact the "Bennett law" has had little effect on the schools of this county.

SPELLING SCHOOLS.

Last winter, at my suggestion, spelling schools were held in the various districts of the county, and in February the successful contestants met me at Oshkosh for a final contest. The prize an elegantly bound volume of poems, was awarded Miss Emma Petzold of the town of Oshkosh. The result was very satisfactory to me. Much interest was manifested throughout the county. Credit should be given the Oshkosh Northwestern for the able and generous manner in which the spelling match was reported.

TEACHERS' WAGES.

In many cases the wages of teachers has materially increased during the year, owing to the fact that poor and inexperienced teachers could not be found so readily to compete with successful ones. In regard to teachers, I have endeavored to keep the supply and demand about even. There has never been a time but that I could supply a teacher at the call of a board. But often times the board, for personal reasons, has asked that some special teacher without a certificate be allowed to teach their school, that I give them a "permit" or a "license," and when I could not agree to the stultification or prostitution of my position, irreconcilable opposition was the inevitable result. I have ever taken into earnest consideration the exigency of each individual case, but it seemed time to draw the line when the accommodation demanded an illegal procedure. The schools of this county, gentlemen, have been run on the accommodation plan altogether too long. I have transacted my official business fairly and impartially, I have done my work conscientiously and fearlessly, I have not craved popularity earned by unworthiness. During the year I have made over two hundred school visitations. The usual teacher's meetings and examinations have been held. Every candidate's individual case has been carefully considered. The best teachers have been pushed to the best positions. Poor and incompetent teachers have been refused certificates, whether they were the especial favorites of prominent politicians, or the most obscure personage in the realm. The teachers of the county with a very few rare exceptions are united, outspoken, and enthusiastically in favor of my policy, a few campaign misrepresentations to the contrary notwithstanding, and they will heartily support my policy of raising the standard of teachers and schools if followed out, as I have reason to believe it will be. I feel assured that my failure of re-election was due mainly to two causes—the novelty of the contest and unsubdued opposition at the party convention. Of my successor, I know nothing except mere hearsay. But I have reason to believe that she is a lady endowed with rare moral qualities, fine intellectual attainments, and with a worthy ideal regarding school work. I trust she may be received at the homes of the people as cordially as I have been. My love for the common schools, and my solicitude for the thousands of bright young minds budding and developing so rapidly into manhood and womanhood is such that my earnest desire is that they have suitable and efficient supervision. I hear in the distance, gentlemen, the steady tramp, tramp, tramp of a vast army of countless thousands—an army that is steadily advancing to wrest from our grasp, our schools, our churches, our farms, our business, our social, political and governmental organizations. This great multitude of children will "ere scarce a second tho't" be standing at the helm where stood their fathers years before. It behooves us to watch with jealousy guarded eye that no evil environments contaminate their youthful minds. Too much attention cannot be given them. Too much care cannot be taken of them. Impressions once received can never be effaced. Work once done is done forever.

In the words of Coleridge:

The dreary years may flow between,
But neither heat, nor frost, nor thunder,
Shall wholly do away, I ween,
The marks of that which once hath been.

REPORT FROM COMMISSION FOR INDIGENT SOLDIERS.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County Wis.:

GENTLEMEN:—We have the honor to submit the financial statement of the County Soldiers' Relief Commission of this county for the year ending Nov. 15, 1890, in accordance with Chapter 339, Laws of 1889. This report includes the expenditures for the last thirteen months, from Nov. 1, 1889 to Nov. 15, 1890, leaving only one calendar month to be provided for during the present year.

The appropriations made by the County Board of Supervisors thus far have been as follows:

One-half or more of the balance now in the fund will be needed between now and the 31st of Dec. The total number of families and beneficiaries aided from the fund during the past year in the various cities and towns of the county is 96, the average amount to each being \$35.00. This includes special cases. Deducing these special cases and the average would be about \$50.00 per year to each family regularly receiving assistance.

The number of beneficiaries have increased from 73 last year to 96 the present year. The causes were alluded to in our last report, among which are increasing age and debility and deaths among the heads of families. We do not anticipate any material change in the situation for some months to come. The pension law passed at the last session of Congress, when appropriations have been made to carry it into effect, will relieve many families from eleemosynary support. How long we must wait for this result it is difficult to estimate. But it is safe to say, that, owing to the large number of claims already on file in the pension department, that but a small proportion of the whole can be acted upon within a year from this time.

Therefore a renewal of the appropriation made last year may be necessary; should by any chance the whole not be needed, we think your honorable Board may be safely assured that only so much as is necessary will be used, the balance remaining in the treasury at your future disposal.

The beneficiaries of this fund were thus distributed, the past year, among the several towns, and cities, numbering as follows:

City of Oshkosh 39, city of Neenah 13, city of Menasha 13, Omro 8, Winneconne 7, Nepeuskun 2, Vinland 1, Rushford 6, Poygan 1, Clayton 4, Black Wolf 1, Winchester 1.

An aggregate of 96 which doubtless includes from 400 to 450 members of soldier families. All of which is respectfully submitted.

OPINION BY DISTRICT ATTORNEY.

District Attorney Fitzgibbon being present, submitted his written opinion as follows:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.

There are two modes in which the County is connected with the poor.

1st—When there is no distinction between County and Town poor, all stand on an equal footing. All are supported by a County tax, Sec. 1519 Sanborn & Berryman's Statutes of Wis. In which case the County Board of Supervisors shall elect three Superintendents, and in case a member of the County Board of Supervisors is ineligible to act as such Superintendent, under Sec. 1526, same statutes.

2d—The other case is where the distinction is made between the County and Town poor, and each town pays for its own poor, Sec. 1517 same authority. In such case the County Board may appoint an agent to look after the poor house, poor farm, etc., Sec. 1518 same statutes.

They may call him by what name they see fit: the statute *names him agent*. Sections 1520, 1522 1523, 1526 have nothing to do with such agent. In other words, the County system has been abolished in Winnebago County, and the Town system, i. e. each town supporting its own poor, exists.

Sub-division 2, Sec. 604 n, of the same statutes, under the head of Chronic Insane, wherein is used the word "The County Superintendent of the Poor" is not in conflict with the doctrine that you may name the person elected by the Board to take charge of the County house and County poor, as the same section uses the words immediately thereafter, "or other officers having charge of the poor of any county on said list, claiming compensation for the care of chronic insane."

REPORT FROM COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

Sup'r Hamilton from Committee on Illegal Assessments, submitted the following report, which on call of ayes and noes was unanimously adopted:

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.:

Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that they have had the matters referred to them under consideration, and recommend as follows:

- On the petition of James W. Dunham to have cancelled tax certificates,
- No. 257 of the sale of lands for the year 1886, dated May 18, 1886, for the sum of \$32.28
- No. 245 " " " " dated May 17, 1887, for \$5.95
- No. 211 " " " " " " 13, 1883, for 8.00
- No. 207 " " " " " " 21, 1883, for 8.04

all upon the north 22 feet of Lot 7 and the whole of Lot 6 in block 83 in the 4th ward of the city of Oshkosh.

The cancellation is asked for the reason that about 7 feet of the north 22 feet was assessed each year to another person who owned the same under the description of the south 22 feet of said lot 7 and the taxes paid each year by the owner thereof. We find upon investigation, this to be true. We believe that as these certificates include land upon which the taxes had been paid and which the County had no right to sell, these certificates are illegal and should therefore be cancelled and the amount thereof with interest charged back to the city of Oshkosh, to-wit:

On certificate No. 257 the sum of \$ 32.28, with interest \$ 10.13; total \$ 42.41.
" " 245 " " 5.95, " 1.44; " 7.39.
" " 211 " " 8.00, " 1.40; " 9.40.
" " 207 " " 8.04, " 84; " 8.88.

making the total amount to be charged back \$73.14.

The same petition asks the cancellation of tax certificate No. 193, sale of 1830 upon the north 14 6-10 feet of lot 7 and all of lot 6 in block 83, 4th ward of city of Oshkosh, according to Leach's map, for the reason that said certificate includes in it 6-10 of a foot of land which had been assessed and the taxes levied thereon and paid by the owner thereof, and therefore the County had no right to sell.

This whole question depends upon the width of lot 7. If lot 7 is 36 6-10 feet wide, then the assessment and certificate is all right. If only 30 feet, it contains 6-10 of a foot upon which the taxes had been paid by the owner of the south 22 feet. We have examined all the maps and plats in the Register's office to ascertain the true width of said lot. Leach's map to which to which the certificate refers, does not give any width in figures, but Randall's map from which Leach's was presumably made, gives the width at 25 6-10 feet. We have been unable to satisfy ourselves whether the lot is 35 feet or 36 6-10 feet and therefore cannot say the certificate is illegal and recommend that the certificate be not cancelled.

Result of ballot: Whole number of votes was 31, of which Sup'r Morgan received 17; Sup'r Loope 14. Sup'r Morgan having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared duly elected Trustee to fill vacancy.

Sup'r Bushnell from Committee on Printing, asked that further time be granted the committee to consider the necessity of refileing records in the office of the Register of Probate.

On motion time was granted said committee until next session of Board.

The question recurring on the adoption of the report from the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, Sup'r Northrup with consent of the second, withdrew his motion to strike from the report of Committee on Poor, the three accounts from Superintendents of Poor from the cities.

Sup'r Hamilton moved for a division of the question. Motion lost.

APPROPRIATION TO SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 9.

Sup'r Brooks offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, which motion, on call of ayes and noes, unanimously prevailed.

Whereas School District No. 9 in the town of Oshkosh has had taken from its tax roll the lands occupied by the Northern Hospital and the County farm, amounting to about 620 acres, all of which is exempt from taxation, and whereas children from County farm are from time to time receiving the benefit of said school,

Therefore it is hereby ordered and determined that there be appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) from the County treasury, and the Chairman and Clerk are hereby authorized to issue said county order for such amount.

RESOLUTION ON SUPERINTENDENT OF POOR.

Sup'r Krueger offered the following resolution:

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

That hereafter before any Supervisors of the towns, and Superintendents of the Poor or such other persons who may be authorized by law to look after the poor of the towns or cities in this county who shall be called upon to attend to or support any poor person applying for aid to any town or city in this county as aforesaid, said Supervisor, Superintendent or other person, shall, before he makes any permanent allowance or any fixed amount to be given said person so applying for aid, who in the opinion of said Supervisor, Superintendent or other person, may be liable to become a county charge, to immediately notify the Agent or County Superintendent of the Poor elected by this Board, of such person applying for aid, giving name of such person together with a strict and concise statement of facts and history of said person applying for aid, as shall have come to the knowledge of said Supervisor, Superintendent or other person as aforesaid.

On motion by Sup'r Lomas the resolution was accepted.

On motion by Sup'r Dichmann the resolution was re-referred to Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, with instructions to report at the January session.

REPORT FROM TRUSTEES FOR INSANE.

Sup'r Loope from Board of Trustees for Insane, submitted their report as follows:

The Trustees of Winnebago County Asylum submit the following report:

The whole number of inmates during the year has been 86: males 40; females 46; of these 8 have been discharged; 3 have died; 2 are out on leave of absence, and 1 escaped.

The Trustees have audited and allowed bills to the amount of \$6351.40.

The matter of separate buildings for the care of the insane has heretofore been urged by the State Board of Charities and Reform, but since the removal of the laundry work and the root cellar from the basement of the Asylum buildings the sanitary conditions have been so improved, that they are now willing to approve of the present building as satisfactory for the next few years; the matter of drainage, is however, still unsatisfactory.

In this connection we desire to say that in our opinion some provision should be made whereby the idiotic inmates of the asylum might be separated from the less unfortunate which cannot now be done for want of room.

REPORT FROM COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.:

Your Committee on Illegal Assessments to whom was referred the petition of M. M. Schoetz praying for the cancellation of tax certificates Nos. 377 and 410, beg leave to report that after due and thorough examination, they find that the property therein described, was doubly assessed for the years in question, that the tax thereon was duly paid on one assessment for each year, and your Committee therefore recommend that the said certificates be cancelled, the amount thereof together with interest at 7 per cent. per annum be refunded to the proper claimant, and charged back to the city of Neenah where the mistake occurred.

And your committee would further report that since making the preceding report they have further found that on being served with notice of application for a deed on certificate number 377 the owner through misapprehension of his rights, redeemed said certificate by paying to the County Clerk the face of the certificate and interest at 25 per cent. and taken a redemption receipt, amounting all to the sum of \$12.69. Having paid the tax on said land once, and the redemption money presumably under the mistaken impression that it was the only way to prevent a tax deed, we believe the redemption money paid should be refunded. REPORT OF COUNTY PHYSICIAN.

County Physician W. A. Gordon being present read and submitted his annual report, which on motion was accepted and Clerk instructed to spread on the minutes of the Board.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.

Gentlemen: I have the honor of presenting herewith my report as county physician for the year 1890. Apart from one severe surgical operation there has been nothing to record of unusual interest. The ordinary routine of life in the jail, the poor house and the asylum has not been disturbed by accident or epidemic. There were two deaths in the poor house and three in the asylum. The stern fact, that, in this peculiarly favored land, with all its enlightenment and science, education and morals, there is a steady increase in pauperism, insanity and crime, demands serious consideration. These three melancholy maladies of civilization are inextricably interwoven. Pauperism causes insanity and crime. Insanity causes crime and pauperism. Crime causes pauperism and insanity. They form a vicious circle—a trinity of sorrow. Sociological agitators and dreamers have presented to the world many plausible theories of the philosophy of poverty. They have inscribed infallible remedies for these most unpleasant conditions; but the ancient prophecy that "The poor shall never cease out of the land," yearly finds complete fulfilment. As long as men are ignorant, dissi-

pated, lazy and improvident there will be poverty. If everyone was governed by the old New England economy or the German thrift there would be no poverty in America. We have spent enough for tobacco and liquor to enrich the world. There are a hundred well known preventible causes of poverty, but every man wants to be excused himself and have his neighbor exercised therein. The poor for whom you provide are either infants, invalids or aged persons, all of whom are physically unable to procure a livelihood by their unaided efforts.

The typical pauper, with whom we are all too well acquainted, is a trembling old man. He has been harrassed by want, buffeted by fate, mocked by fortune, deserted by friends, gnawed by disease, discouraged by many failures, and,

The mossy marbles rest
On the lips that he has pressed
In their bloom;
And the names he loved to hear
Have been carved for many a year
On the tomb.

In his helplessness and homelessness he feebly knocks at the poor house door, asking bread and shelter until he finds "surcease of sorrow" in the pitying bosom of his mother earth. You ask him not for reason or causes. It matters not why he comes. The bended form and the wrecked life are his passports to our assistance. It is your duty and mine to cheer and comfort him with honest, manly sympathy and material aid.

There was but one birth in the poor house during the year. The mother was quite young, and, as usual unmarried.

Some day Wisconsin will erect a maternity hospital, to which any erring or indigent parturient woman can retire until her travail is completed. It is certain that an institution of this kind would not lack inmates while the constitution of man continues as it now is. It is also certain that such a hospital would diminish the frequency of criminal abortions and thus save the lives of children and occasionally the life of a woman. The poor houses of the state are for reasons which I have before stated to this board, very illy adapted to the care of such cases. Science and humanity both demand an appropriate place for these unfortunates. Society at large knows little and cares less for the tribulations of these poor girls. "It is their own fault, let them suffer," is the general verdict. There is not in the world a more mournful spectacle than that of a young woman journeying forth to the poor house to bring forth a child of ignomy. The sweetness and light have gone out of her life. Her cheeks are wet with unavailing tears. Her heart is "wild with all regret." She walks the way of grief and remorse to receive the scarlet badge of shame. She treads the path of pain with the knell of innocence echoing in her ears. In the whole universe she has no friend.

The Winnebago county jail, like all other jails in the state continues to be a monument to legislative stupidity, a relative of primitive ignorance, a school of vice and a disgrace to civilization. One year from to-day I hope to be able to present to you some observations on the causes of crime and treatment of criminals.

It is now nine years since the county asylum was opened for the reception of patients. Since that time 127 insane persons have been received into the institution. Of these twenty-five have been discharged, thirteen of whom exhibited noticeable mental and physical improvement before their discharge. The asylum building is not what it should be. You are all familiar with its defects. It is greatly inferior to the new county asylums which have recently been erected in other parts of the state. It is to be hoped that the day is not remote when Winnebago county will own an asylum equal if not superior to any county institution in the state. The success of the Wisconsin system of county asylums under state supervision, after nine years of trial is now assured. It is successful, notwithstanding the railing accusations and opposition of persons who fail to appreciate its advantages because they are blinded by prejudice, self interest or purely theoretical considerations. This system is destined to be one of the most important factors in the coming revolution in the management of the insane. This system needs no defense or eulogy from me or any man.

There has been a steady and alarming increase of insanity

in this country for many years past. This increase has been out of proportion to the growth of the population. Insanity is one of the prices we pay for education. It is one of the accompaniments of civilization. It is one of the products of false religion. It is one of the terminations of the dollar worship that is now afflicting the world. Drunkenness, injuries, heredity and various somatic disorders are the prolific causes of mental aberration. There is also a constant influx of paupers from Europe. These mad immigrants are purposely unloaded upon the United States by the authorities in foreign lands. In addition to these causes, that there are no hospitals for the cure of insanity in this country adds to the increasing number of the chronic insane. In every state there are large institutions for the reception of insane persons, but they are not hospitals in the true modern meaning of the word. They are really warehouses for the storage of lunatics. A certain number of feeble minded old people are sent to these asylums for storage, simply because it is inconvenient or disagreeable to some one to have them about home. A large number of harmless and incurable cases are retained in the asylums because there is no other place for them, or because relatives are too poor or indifferent to care for them.

Another class is detained because its members have suicidal, homicidal or incendiary proclivities and they would be dangerous to themselves or society if they were not under constant guard. A certain number of harmless incurables are retained because they are good workers and their labor is valuable. And so it has come to pass, for these and various other reasons that the so-called hospitals are crowded with chronic and practically incurable cases. Hundreds of poor sufferers in all stages of the disease are huddled under one roof. And the larger the number of inmates the greater the glory of the institution. These immense asylums are in accord with the tendency of the times to do everything on a large scale. The insane are to be cured by wholesale. The healing art is to be conducted on the factory plan. The theory is, to get one thoroughly educated physician for superintendent and two or three young men who will work for small salaries because they are beginners and are seeking experience, as his assistants, and the mechanism of the machine will restore disordered minds with neatness and dispatch. Until the factory idea is driven from the public and legislative mind these alleged hospitals will continue to convert curable into incurable lunatics.

In the treatment of insanity the most renowned medical authorities assure us that there should be an absence of all noise and excitement. Even ordinary conversation is sometimes prohibited. Repose must be obtained. The exhausted brain must have rest. And all sources of irritation must be removed. And yet an acute maniac screaming and raving is carried to an asylum and dumped into the "noisy ward" with twenty-five or thirty others equally violent and excited, in obedience to the profound and brilliant dictum of the alienists, that the insane must be "classified." The new comer is then given a large dose of chloral, paraldehyde or some other soporific, so that he will be unable to hear the tumult of his fellow prisoners, and thus he obtains repose. By this prompt and convenient method irritation is removed and excitement avoided. The superintendents of all large asylums are very particular to have the inmates correctly classified. Great stress is put upon classification. The demented persons are kept by themselves; the maniacal people have their wards; the parietic cases have a corner of their own, and so on. This is said to have a very important curative influence. A person who has recently lost his reason and has been filthy in his habits for a week or two is imprisoned in the same hall with others who have been filthy for years, that one may learn cleanliness from the other. A person who has been depressed and melancholy for a short time is locked into the same apartment with others who have been melancholy for a long time, so they can cheer each other up and thus "pluck from the memory a rooted sorrow." The man who has been yelling for a week is locked in with those who have been shouting for months, that they may soothe each other, and yet we wonder why there are so many chronic insane. The wonder is that any recover their senses amid such surroundings.

It is a thoroughly established fact that the prospects of recovery in insanity is diminished in direct proportion to the duration of the disease. There

MEMORIAL TO LEGISLATURE.

Mr. Cook offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Resolved by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

That whereas a bill has been introduced in the present session of our State Legislature to make the office of Register of Probate in this County elective rather than appointive as at present, and whereas we believe such a law, should it pass, would prove detrimental to the best interests of Winnebago County, therefore resolved that we do hereby memorialize your honorable body not to pass such a law. And that our County Clerk is hereby instructed to immediately forward a certified copy hereof to each member of the Legislature from this County, who are hereby requested to present the same to the Legislature.

Sup'r Dichmann moved to lay the resolution on the table. Motion lost.

The question occurring on the adoption of the resolution, which on call of ayes and noes, was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes 16—Bushnell, Cook, Hamilton, Howard, Husley, Kisner, Locke, Lockhart, Lomas, Loope, Northrup, O'Brien, Orchard, Reinert, Vredenburg, Vosburg.

Noes 13—Arnmann, Broderick, Brooks, Dichmann, Dobberpuhl, Krueger, Mathewson, Morgan, Nigl, Schneider, Schoetz, Tobey, Wendorf.

Absent not voting 4—Davis, Pratt, Warwick and Moore.

On motion by Sup'r Dichmann the County Clerk was instructed to give number of ayes and noes on the question when sending memorial to the Legislature.

SEWER AT COUNTY FARM.

Mr. Krueger offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption.

Resolved by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

That there be constructed a sewer at the County Farm, such sewer to connect with lake Winnebago. And be it further resolved that the Committee which may be appointed to carry out the work, be and are hereby authorized to adopt, reject or modify any part of the plans and specifications for that purpose now on file in the office of the County Clerk, or to procure such other plans as they may deem necessary.

And be it further resolved that there be constructed a water connection with the State Hospital, and County Asylum, also such hydrants, piping and connections as may be found necessary in the County Asylum.

And be it further resolved that the above improvements be carried out and completed during the coming summer, provided the cost does not exceed the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars.

And be it further resolved that the Chairman of this Board and the County Treasurer, be and they are hereby instructed and authorized to borrow for and in the name of Winnebago county, for said purpose, the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars, for the term of five years, one fifth of such sum to be paid annually; provided however, that the interest on such loan shall not exceed six per cent. per annum.

On motion by Sup'r Dichmann the Board took a recess until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Supervisors' Room, Oshkosh, Wis.
March 5, 1891, 1:30 o'clock P. M.

Board met pursuant to adjournment from recess taken.
Chairman Davis presiding.

Accounts presented and referred to appropriate committees.

The accounts of C. Morgan and C. W. Cook, amount \$3.00 each, were, under suspension of the rules, allowed.

The question occurring on the adoption of the resolution for sewer at the County Farm, Sup'r Orchard offered the following substitute:

Resolved that this resolution be postponed until the November session and that during that time the Com. on Poor and Poor Farm see to securing the water power, and instruct the Sup't of Poor to dig a well large and deep and erect a wind mill.

On call of ayes and noes the substitute was lost by 10 ayes to 19 noes.

On call of ayes and noes the resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes 21—Arnemann, Broderick, Brooks, Cook, Davis, Dichmann, Dobberpuhl, Howard, Huxley, Kisner, Krueger, Lomas, Mathewson, Morgan, Nigl, Northrup, O'Brien, Schneider, Schoetz, Vosburg, Wendorf.

Noes 8—Bushnell, Hamilton, Locke, Lockhart, Loope, Orchard, Reinert, Vredenburg.

Absent not voting 3—Moore, Pratt, Warwick.

Sup'r Cook moved that a committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board, the County Sup't of Poor, and Sup'r Huxley be appointed to take charge of the work at the County Farm.

Sup'r Broderick moved to substitute Sup'r Brooks for Sup'r Huxley, which motion prevailed by 19 ayes to 9 noes.

Sup'r Hamilton offered a resolution with instruction to the committee to procure permission for use of water from State Hospital.

Sup'r Dichmann offered the following substitute, which Sup'r Hamilton accepted.

Resolved by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.:

That the Committee authorized to build sewer on County Farm and to connect with the water supply of the Insane hospital shall not commence such improvement nor expend one dollar on above named improvement until the County shall have procured from the State of Wisconsin, authority to make such water connection with the water mains of the Northern hospital, and until the State gives this county the permanent right to the free use of the same for flushing sewers, putting out fires, and other necessary purposes contemplated by the proposed improvement. And the Committee on Sewer and Water Improvements on County Farm are hereby authorized to procure such right from the State.

On motion the substitute was adopted.

Mr. Schoetz offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Whereas the Humane Agent has taken children from the several towns and cities in Winnebago county to the Industrial School of this State, and that the maintenance of said children in said school is charged to the county at large, and as a matter of fact should be charged to the proper town or city from where taken, be it therefore

Resolved by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County: That the Humane Agent be requested to make a report to the County Clerk of this county and show by said report to which town or city said children belong; and the Clerk is hereby requested to charge the same back to the several towns and cities to which said children belong.

Mr. Hamilton moved to lay the resolution on the table which motion prevailed.

TO BORROW MONEY.

Sup'r Huxley offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, which motion on call of ayes and noes unanimously prevailed:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Whereas: From present indications the appropriations made at the November session to meet the expenses of the County for the current year will be inadequate, therefore

Resolved that the Chairman of this County Board and the County Treasurer be and are hereby authorized to borrow in the name and for the use of the county of Winnebago a sum of money not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to pay any indebtedness that may accrue against said Winnebago county during the present year. Said loan to be made on the best terms available both as to time and rate of per cent.

And be it further resolved: That the Chairman and Treasurer are hereby authorized to execute notes in their official capacity for said loan, and for the payment of such notes the said county of Winnebago shall be responsible.

VOTE OF THANKS.

Sup'r Bushnell offered the following resolution:

Resolved that the thanks of the Board are due and are hereby tendered to Chairman Davis, for the courteous and impartial manner in which he has discharged the duties of said office.

The Clerk put the motion which prevailed unanimously.

Minutes of forenoon and present session read and approved.

On motion the Board adjourned *Sine Die*.
