The following memorial from the World's Fair Managers was received and referred to the Committee on Finance:

STATE BOARD OF WORLD'S FAIR MANAGERS
—OF—
—WISCONSIN.—

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMISSIONER.

To the Chairman of the County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

The Wisconsin State Board of World's Fair Managers have recently adopted architectural plans for State Headquarters Building to be erected next season, on the grounds of the World's Columbian Exposition, at Jackson Park, Chicago, and it is intended that such building shall fully represent, in its construction, the building material resources of the Badger State. To that end the Board earnestly desire that all the counties of the state shall contribute some part of the material used in the construction of the building, in order that it may fairly illustrate the varied resources of the state in that line.

To do this it has been thought desirable to call upon the several County Boards, at the ensuing November session, to appropriate, in each case, a small sum of money to quarry, cut, finish and transport to Chicago at least one block of building stone ready to be laid into the building. It is estimated that the necessary expense of such contribution in any county will not exceed \$50, and in many instances a much smaller sum will suffice.

Specifications, giving size, etc., of the stone, columns, pillars, window caps, bases and cornice work required, will be hereafter furnished by the Executive Commissioner to the counties proposing to furnish any part of the material used in the building, and the amount appropriated by the County Board shall be expended under the immediate direction and supervision of a County Auxiliary Committee, which the State Board propose hereafter to appoint in each county of the state, such Auxiliary Committee to co-operate with the State Board in securing creditable exhibits for the Fair, representative of the different resources and industries of the state.

To secure uniformity in the method and details of the appropriations a blank form of resolution for action by your County Board is enclosed.

It is earnestly hoped that you will lay this matter before the County Board of your county and that favorable action will ensue, to the end that your county may be represented creditably in the handsome structure which the state will erect at the World's Fair.

Any further information required will be promptly furnished by addressing the undersigned, or Chas. W. Graves, Secretary of the Board, at Viroqua, Wis.

JUSTICES TO REPORT TO CORONER.

Supervisor Schœtz offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, which motion unanimously prevailed:

Whereas, Under the present system by which Justices of the Peace throughout the county hold inquests and

Whereas, There does not appear to be any law in force by which they are obliged to report the number of inquests to the Coroner or any inquests held by them, and

Whereas, The Coroner receives frequent communications from abroad as to the manner or cause of death of this or that person, and he has no knowledge whatever and no records to show the death of the person,

Be it Therefore Resolved, That each and every Justice of the Peace before any claim for holding inquests shall be allowed by this Board shall be required to make a report of each and every inquest, so held by him, to the Coroner of this county, showing name and residence of deceased (if known) time and place deceased came to his death (if known) cause of death, time and place of holding inquest, and the finding of the jury, and when said report is so made to the Coroner, he shall record the same in his docket. The County Clerk or the Chairman of Justice and Constable accounts is hereby requested to notify each Justice of the Peace throughout this county of the passage of this resolution.

PORTRAITS OF CHAIRMEN.

Supervisor Schœtz introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption. Supervisor Hamilton moved to amend by referring the same to the Committee on Finance, which motion prevailed.

Whereas, It has not been the custom so far in this county, Be it therefore resolved that the clerk of this Board communicate with the several ex-chairmen, or if necessary with their families, to procure a large portrait of each and every chairman and ex-chairman, the same to be without expense to this county, but such portrait shall become the property of this county.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Superintendent of Schools, Harrington, being present, read and submitted his annual report. On motion by Supervisor Daly the same was accepted to be placed on file, and the clerk instructed to print in the proceedings of the Board as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

At the time of entering upon the duties of my office, the last school year was half over. During the remainder of the school year ninety-five schools were visited, leaving about fifteen to which no visit was made. I found, as I expected, that the general character of the work being done will compare favorably with that of other counties. Indeed it would be strange if it did not, this county being the seat of the largest Normal school in the state, and having four excellent high schools, to supply the demand for qualified teachers.

In visiting the schools, perhaps nothing within the range of my observation calls for criticism and consideration more than the fact that the pupils found in the district schools are small children. In schools numbering from twenty to thirty it is unusual to find more than three or four who are over fourteen years of age. About three-fourths of these are girls.

Some years ago it was common to find in every district school a number of pupils between fifteen and twenty years of age. Young men and women went to school. The reason for this is not clear. It may be that our schools are presided over by a younger class of teachers, many of them mere girls. There may be fewer male teachers. Perhaps it may be as the country becomes older and the population more dense, the struggle for a livelihood becomes keener, and enlists our youth into the rank of the army of producers at an earlier age. Whatever the cause may be, the condition is worthy of careful thought on the part of those interested in the efficiency of the common schools. Some of the larger boys and girls are drawn to the Normal school and the various high schools but this can be but a small proportion.

The chief remedy in the hands of the school board is their power to employ well-prepared, experienced and mature teachers. The members of the school board should also visit the school oftener and examine into the work, the methods, the program, the manner of the teacher, the conduct of the pupils, the text books, maps, blackboards, heating, ventilation, playgrounds, fences, shade trees and so on; and from time to time expend a few dollars in improving the means of work, and beautifying the surroundings of the children. It would also be well to direct the attention of parents to the proposition that a pupil will acquire more knowledge in one month at the age of fourteen or fifteen than in several months at the age of eight or nine.

The state department of education, for a number of years past has sought to reach the larger pupils by introducing into the district schools a "course of study," so arranged and classified as to lay out for pupils a definite plan of work to be completed in a definite time. This course of study divides the school into three grades, and the school life of the pupil into three periods, the work of each to be completed in three years. It outlines the branches to be studied in each grade, and the portion of each to be completed before passing into the next grade. It contemplates examination by the County Superintendent and graduation at the end.

One purpose of this scheme of work is to place before the pupil as an incentive certain definite work with a definite mark at the end showing that it is completed. It is thought that such a course of study would be an improvement on the present system or lack of system, by which each pupil studies what he pleases and where he pleases as nearly as he can under the compromise entered into between himself and the teacher at the beginning of each term, and under which the pupil generally leaves school by

some small accident without knowing how much he has done or left undone.

It is said that the course of study has been successfully introduced and used in some counties. After careful examination, the condition in this county can, I think, be summed up by saying: It has not been introduced. During the past year the examination and graduation provided for were held in only two districts, No. 2, town of Oshkosh, and No. 3, town of Utica. In the former there were three graduates and in the latter, one. The Town Clerk's reports state that ten schools are organized under the course of study.

Why the course of study has not been introduced may be left an open question for the present. The teachers of the county might be able to answer, but it is doubtful if even they would agree. I think in time it will be introduced and followed—more or less modified, perhaps; and I think the tendency will be then for larger pupils to be kept or to remain in school until they finish the course.

This county has moved slowly in the matter of establishing school libraries. Nearly all the village schools have small libraries. Only three towns report having withheld money from the school fund income during the past year, as provided in Chap. 426, laws of 1889. These towns are Menasha, Winchester and Wolf River. Under this law each school district might in a very few years at a small cost, have a quantity of the very best selected reading matter for the use of their pupils at school and in their homes. The advantages claimed for the township library system are, that the pupils and patrons can obtain the most useful information by the best writers and thinkers, especially selected and prepared for the different grades of pupils, and at the lowest possible cost. The law on this subject is deserving of the most careful examination by town and school district officers.

The laws relating to uniformity of text books have been in force for some years, and consequently are more familiar. The condition in this county is very creditable. In many districts where the board have not adopted a uniform series, the same result, practically, is secured through the efforts of the teachers. There is still room for improvement in a number of districts. Perhaps the most satisfactory method is that in which the books are purchased by the district and sold by the clerk to the pupils for cash at cost price. By this method about 25 per cent. is saved to patrons and uniformity is secured at once. A little additional work falls upon school officers, but it is not much after the books are once introduced.

The examination and certification of teachers is, perhaps, the Superintendent's most important duty. It involves the welfare of schools, and the somewhat conflicting financial interests of both taxpayers and teachers. The two extremes to be avoided are, first, issuing so few certificates as to entail hardships on school boards in securing teachers; and second, issuing so many as to enable inferior teachers to secure the majority of the schools by underbidding those who have made special preparation for the work at some expense. In the latter case the best product goes to the counties where better wages are paid, reducing the average grade of home teachers. While it is the Superintendent's duty to see that there are sufficient teachers it is also his duty to select the best, according to the light he has, out of the material that presents itself. He must try to do no injustice to persons desirous of earning a livelihood by teaching; and still more, he must try to do no injustice to schoolboards and taxpayers, and especially to little children, by causing some unqualified person to be imposed upon them as a teacher. Perhaps the best policy is to issue enough certificates to meet all the demands of the schools, leaving the balance of the applicants to make better preparation before entering the profession. It is true that the examination system like all other human institutions, is imperfect as a gauge of merit; but it is the best we have, and, on the whole, after noting the average standings of the same teachers through successive examinations and observing their work in school it is found to be reasonably fair and trustworthy.

COMMISSION ON INDIGENT SOLDIERS REPORT.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

The undersigned commissioners of the county Soldiers' Relief Fund have the honor to report,

That there have been held twelve regular meetings of the commission at which applications for relief have been heard and determined; that the aggregate number of families assisted is as follows: City of Oshkosh, 44; Neenah, 11; Menasha, 14; Town of Omro, 8; Winneconne, 7; Rushford, 5; other Towns, 10; Total, 99.

As appears from the detailed statement of the Secretary, nearly all the families have received monthly allowances, sometimes more and sometimes less, according to apparent necessity. The average to each family has been considerably reduced from last year, not because it has been too large; but because we feared to exceed the allowance made by the County Board. One dollar per week or less is not sufficient to pay even the rent of each family to say nothing of provisions and clothing. From present appearances and the approach of winter it will need larger instalments of relief than has been made since last winter. On the first of the coming year we estimate a balance in the fund of some \$300.00 or \$400.00. This will be needed in the month of January. Since our meeting of last week we have found that several worthy families were omitted, applications not having reached us in time.

Pensions come along very slowly, not over half a dozen in the whole county since last year.

We would respectfully ask your honorable board to allow the balance on hand January 1st., 1892, to remain in the fund, to be drawn against only in case of urgent need, and also a continuance of the regular appropriation as before, \$3650.00 for the coming year. All of which is respectfully submitted.

And while the Town of Winchester is willing to assist in the repairs, the burden is too great for the town alone. Your Supervisor from said town would therefore ask the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis., that the sum of three hundred dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of graveling and repairing a highway in the Town of Winchester known as the William Hall road, crossing Kat river in said town, provided however, that the said Town of Winchester shall appropriate an equal amount for said purpose. And be it further provided, that said appropriation shall not be paid such town until the Town Board of said town shall certify to the Chairman and Clerk of this Board that the said sum has been raised and paid into their treasury, and

Be it Further Resolved, that the Chairman of this County Board appoint a committee to act with the Iowa Board of said town in the expenditure of said appropriation.

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

The undersigned; your committee on Illegal Assessments respectfully report that that they have had under consideration the following petitions for the cancellation of tax certificates and recommend in relation thereto as follows to wit:

The petition, of C. M. Hale for the cancellation of the unredeemed tax certificate No. 147 of the sale of 1888, on lot 19, Block "L" Western Addition, 1st Ward, City of Oshkosh, we find that this property was exempt from taxation in the years 1886, 1888, 1889, 1890 and 1891 and is railroad property that on account of some error it was taxed in the year 1887, and hence sold for taxes in the year 1888 as aforesaid.

We therefore recommend that said tax certificate should be cancelled and the prayer of the petitioner granted and the amount of \$8.10 allowed petitioner charged back to the city of Oshkosh.

On petition of J. W. Dunham for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 39 of the sale of 1888, on the undivided $\frac{1}{2}$ of the south $\frac{1}{4}$ of the east $\frac{1}{2}$ of the south west $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. No. 19 town 20 range 16, Your committee find the treasurers delinquent sale shows that $\frac{2}{3}$ of the S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of the S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. 19 town 20 range 16 was paid before the sale and that the description of all returned on said certificate was the undivided $\frac{1}{2}$ of the south $\frac{1}{4}$ of the E. $\frac{1}{2}$ of the south west $\frac{1}{4}$ as aforesaid.

And your committee further find that the sum of 63 cents was paid on said certificate Sept. 14, 1888 by one John Logan who thereby redeemed the undivided $\frac{1}{2}$ of said property described as aforesaid and that the treasurer should have sold only the S. $\frac{1}{2}$ of N. E. of S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ in place of the description as aforesaid.

We therefore recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be granted and that the sum of one 33-100 dollars be paid the said petitioner and that the certificate be cancelled.

On the petition of Albert Gummer your committee would recommend that the petitioner be referred to the town of Omro for redress. On the petition of M. Matheson your committee would recommend that the matter be laid over to the March session for further investigation.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM COMMITTEE ON POOR.

Supervisor Krueger submitted the following recommendation which was unanimously adopted as follows:

The committee recommend that the Superintendent of the County Asylum, be, and is hereby authorized and instructed to arrange and partition off, in the second story of the wash house, four bedrooms and one sitting room for occupation by aged and infirm female inmates now lodged in the third story of the asylum.

The cost thereof not to exceed \$250.00.

It is further recommended that the Superintendent be instructed to purchase 150 feet of fire hose and construct or build a suitable house or shelter for same; also construct a reel for reeling up said hose.

Your committee further recommend that an electric fire alarm be constructed connecting the asylum with the Northern State Hospital.

Your committee further recommend that an amount not to exceed the sum of \$25.00 from the appropriation to county farm be expended by the Superintendent of Poor and Poor farm to the best of his judgement for the purchase of such reading matter as the Superintendent may deem for the best interest of the inmates of the county asylum and poorhouse.

REPORT FROM TRUSTEES ON INSANE.

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

The Trustees of the county asylum for chronic insane beg leave to submit their annual report:

The total number of inmates for the year closing Oct. 31, 1891, has been 73, of these two have died and one has been discharged. Remaining in the institution Oct. 31, 1891, 70.

We have audited and allowed bills to the amount of \$6740.45, two thirds of this sum together with a like proportion of the salaries of the Physicians, Superintendent and Matron are properly chargeable to this department and amount in the total to \$426.93 leaving to the credit of this department of county charities \$327.50, this sum to which may be added \$959.68 from sales of surplus products of the farm, goes toward the maintenance of the poor department.

In this connection it may not be improper to mention that nearly all labor performed by the inmates of the county house is done by the chronic

insane.

The completion of the water connection with the State Hospital and the sewer ordered made by your board at its March session is a long step in advance toward supplying the institution with needed water permanently, and drainage that makes the present location all that is necessary for the new insane hospital that this county ought to have in the near future.

The next step has been partially prepared for by the resolution of the present session looking to the securing from the state the privilege of water at all times and for all purposes.

In this connection we wish to call the attention of the Board to two or three paragraphs in the report of our predecessors made Nov. 26, 1889, on the subject of new buildings for the insane department as being increasingly important with the passing years and added needs of more and better accommodations.

The report reads as follows:

The probability in the near future of building a separate Asylum has been often discussed by your Trustees. The question of location is often raised with some diversity of opinion. If a new site is not purchased the question of drainage becomes at once important, and to that question we wish to call your earnest attention. With drainage it is possible to build on the present location; without drainage it would be impracticable.

We are firmly of the belief that it would be good strong horse sense for this county to build a new asylum, or if the consent of the State Board of Charities could be secured, to enlarge and modernize our present buildings so that we might accommodate the maximum number of insane allowed by the State Board. A few figures gives force to this idea Brown county for care of insane 98 inmates receives from state and counties \$10355 50; Dodge county for 100 inmates \$10548 47; Fond du Lac county for 97 inmates \$11468 82; Grant county for 104 inmates \$12681 19; Iowa county 96 inmates \$12335 54.

The total cost to us for support of paupers and insane on an average of 105 inmates is only \$731 49, so that we might be reasonably sure of a surplus of from \$3000 to \$5000 per year which would soon pay for an elaborate asylum. The fact that even with these figures it costs less than one-half what it requires to maintain the insane in the state hospital would insure a full house all the time.

We regard it as one of the pressing demands upon Winnebago county that better accommodations for the care of its insane should be provided.

We estimate that the sum of \$4500.00 will be needed to meet the current expenses of the insane department for the current year to which should be added \$500.00 for additional hose and drain tile.

During the year one of our members, the late Chas Morgan, has been removed by death. We the surviving members of the Board of Trustees wish to leave on record our high esteem for him as a man and our appreciation of his fidelity in the discharge of his official duty.

resolution for tomorrow's session legalizing the action of the Chairman and County Clerk for drawing of county orders in payment of sewer and water works at the county farm. Motion prevailed.

Supervisor Loope moved that when the Board adjourn from to-morrow's session it does then adjourn to the first Tuesday in March, 1892. Motion prevailed.

On motion by Supervisor Brooks the board adjourned to 9 A. M.

Whereas, by resolution the Chairman and county Treasurer were authorized to issue bonds of the county in payment of expense of said improvement, and

Whereas, it having been found impracticable to issue such bonds by reason of lack of authority under the law to do so they paid for such construction out of funds in the county treasury,

MENASHA AND NEENAH TOWN LINE.

The special committee appointed at the November session to take testimony and report on the town line of Neenah and Menasha, submitted the following, which was made the special business for 10 A. M., March 2nd:
To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago:

The undersigned Committee, appointed by said Board to take testimony in the matter of the division line, between the Towns of Neenah

and Menasha, and report the same to your Honorable Body on or before the first day of the adjourned session of said Board on the first Tuesday of March, 1892, together with their written report, would respectfully report, that they have had the matter referred to them under examination, and they have taken all testimony bearing upon the question so referred, within their knowledge, all of which they have been requested to take, bearing upon said question, by the parties interested; which said testimony is hereto annexed and forms a part of this report and is filed in the office of the County Clerk of this County of Winnebago, this first day of March, A. D. 1892.

The Committee, to whom was referred the matter of taking testimony to determine and fix the boundary line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha met at Menasha, Wisconsin, pursuant to notice theretofore duly given, and there were present H. E. Huxley, J. P. Lomas and Henry Fitzgibbon. On motion of H. E. Huxley, Henry Fitzgibbon was made Chairman of the Committee.

Curtis Reed being duly sworn, by Henry Fitzgibbon, as a witness, testifies as follows:

I was present before the County Board at the time the final action was taken, in reference to the line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha, what I understood to be the final action.

Q.—Can you give us the boundary line as finally fixed?

A.—It was finally fixed at the last action of the board in '55. "Starting on the center quarter line of Lake Butte des Morts, on the center line of the quarter line running east and west of section 21, and on that line west to cross section 21, and on to section 20 to the burying-ground, thence south on the east side of the burying-ground to the center of the east line of the burying-ground, thence west across the burying-ground, thence north to said quarter line of section 20, and west to the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter of section 20."

Q.—In running west on the quarter section line in section 20, did you come to a highway?

A.—Yes.

Q.—How did the line run in reference to that highway?

A.—Center of the highway, as I understand it.

EXAMINATION BY MR. LOMAS.

Q.—Mr. Reed, when the Town of Menasha was set off from Neenah you divided on the line that you described?

A.—Yes.

Q.—In describing the burying-ground, did you know anything of the Potter's field in the north and south corner?

A.—Might have known of it, I don't know.

Q.—In trying to describe the burying-ground, so much was for the Potter's field, so much for the Protestants and so much for the Catholics?

A.—I don't remember about the division of the burying-ground.

EXAMINATION BY HENRY FITZGIBBON.

Q.—Mr. Reed, do you remember the date of the final action so taken?

A.—First day of March.

Q.—In what year?

A.—1855.

EXAMINATION BY MR. LOMAS.

Q.—Do you remember anything about the grave-yard, in 49, of a committee being appointed to hunt up land to make a grave-yard?

A.—No.

Q.—Which line does Mr. Reed fix as the boundary of this cemetery?

A.—Center of the road, on both sides of cemetery.

Q.—That is what you determined, was finally understood, is that your testimony, on said east line of the burying-ground?

A.—Yes, center of the highway.

Q.—Were you present at the time this was so fixed by the Board.

A.—That is my understanding of it, and has been ever since.

Jeremiah Hunt being duly sworn, by Henry Fitzgibbon, as a witness, testifies as follows:

EXAMINED BY H. E. HUXLEY.

Q.—Mr. Hunt, you can tell us what you know about this line.

A.—Well, in 1854 the towns of Neenah and Menasha were together. I was on the County Board in 1855. They passed a resolution dividing the Towns of Neenah and Menasha. They called the west half Menasha and the other half Neenah. The line on the Island struck the quarter line of section 21, and then it went west to the quarter line of Clayton. That was in January when the division was made. The Board adjourned some time in February, and in February Mr. Smith and Mr. Reed came up, and we got an amendment of the division, section 21. We went west to Mr. Lomas' land, thence north to the section line again, to Clayton. In that amendment we took in the burying-ground, the north half.

Q.—Is that all you have to say in regard to it?

A.—That is all I know of it. We didn't go any further. The amendment was made in February. We took in Mr. Lomas', Mr. Blair's and Mr. Jordan's land and the north half of the burying-ground.

Q.—Did this division line take you to the center of the highway?

A.—I could not say. We took half of the burying-ground. We didn't suppose that we could get to the burying-ground without the road. The understanding was that we had the highway to the burying-ground to get there. If that had not been the understanding they would have said so. We had half of the burying-ground and the highway to get there.

Q.—Mr. Hunt what is your understanding of it?

A.—In regard to the highway?

Q.—What was your understanding at the time?

A.—The highway belongs to the burying-ground, half of it.

Q.—You described the line without any consideration of the road at all. Took the road to the grave-yard?

A.—There are two roads to the burying-ground. On the north side and east side.

Q.—Mr. Hunt, have you anything further to say?

A.—No.

(The witness has stated that he has stated all he knows about the boundary line.)

Q.—You speak of the meeting in 1855, what meeting was that you recollect?

A.—We met in November, 1854 and adjourned to January, 1855. Mr. Hamilton came up and got the division of the town, we then adjourned to the latter part of February, and then we met again.

(This was all stated before so you needn't go on with it.)

Q.—What is your recollection as to how the boundary line of the Town of Menasha was fixed on the east side of the cemetery, with reference to this highway?

A.—I don't remember as there was anything said. We took half of the burying-ground.

Q.—Who?

A.—The Town of Menasha, the north half of it.

Q.—Did that take in half of the road on the east side?

A.—Yes.

Q.—It would not be necessary to take the road in order to take half of the burying-ground.

A.—It would be necessary to have the east half to get there, to the burying-ground. It is more essential on the east side than on the north.

Q.—That was the time Menasha was not to go through Neenah to the burying-ground.

A.—Oh, no.

Q.—Was the long bridge there then?

A.—No, the float bridge.

Q.—What is your first name?

A.—Jeremiah.

Q.—You were chairman of the Board of the Town of Neenah; in January and the winter of 1855?

A.—Yes.

Q.—You attended the next session of that Board?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Do you recollect the division of the section line?

A.—It came up in January, 1855.

Q.—You made an amendment?

A.—Yes, it was divided in January, and amended in March.

Q.—During that time, in the County Board, Mr. Hunt moved so and so and Mr. Hunt ordered so and so, is that you?

A.—I guess so.

Q.—Was that you?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Did you make those motions?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Do you recollect that, did you make an order?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Was the line that was east, is that the dividing line given now between Neenah and Menasha?

A.—Yes.

Q.—That left half of the grave-yard?

A.—Yes. Took in the north half of the burying-ground and nothing was said about the highway.

Elbridge Smith being duly sworn, by Henry Fitzgibbon, as a witness, testifies as follows:

Q.—What do you know about the town line or the dividing line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha, and where was the town line or dividing line finally established between the towns of Neenah and Menasha?

A.—The dividing line established between the Towns of Neenah and Menasha started from the west side of Lake Butte des Morts, running west on the quarter line of section 21, and on to section 20, section or quarter line, section 20 is the land belonging to Mr. Lomas, and in running across that, we came to the burying-ground, which has been spoken of by other witnesses; on the east side of this cemetery is a highway, and the highway remains there yet. The question has been raised about the dividing line before, and there has been quite a fight in the Board about it. The citizens of the Town of Menasha, and the City of Menasha, and others claim—

Q.—Was there a city of Menasha then?

A.—No, but where the city now is. And that is the way the question sprung up about an amendment. The original order that was first passed, was the line further north, leaving the whole cemetery in the Town of Neenah. Then a question was raised by the Town of Menasha and the Village of Menasha, that that would shut out the use of the burying-grounds, for the Town and village of Menasha. Then there was a compromise made to change the line and fix the line on the quarter line of section 21, to the quarter line of section 20, as far as it reached, until it reached the cemetery and highway upon the east side of the cemetery and highway. Then it was agreed and understood, and a motion made to that effect, that the dividing line be changed. Only that when it came to the cemetery it would take in half of the burying grounds, including half of the highway into the town of Menasha, leaving the other half in the town of Neenah. And the division line ran south until it took in half of the burying ground and then north on the said quarter line and north again to the quarter line of Mr. Lomas' land, to the quarter line of section 20, and then west to the Town of Neenah, and the final vote was taken on that line. I am very sure that I was present when it was passed. I

was present at this proceeding and know what was done at the Board, and know the reasons, and that the change was made, and the compromise was made in this line.

EXAMINATION BY H. E. HUXLEY.

Q.—Were you a member of the County Board at this time?

A.—No, I was not, but I was present. Knew of the proceedings.

Q.—In reference to the division of the Town of Neenah, the matter has been subject to some controversy?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Hunt was the Supervisor of the Town of Neenah, at the time?

A.—Yes.

Q.—The Towns of Neenah and Menasha were not divided then?

A.—No. The last proceedings of the County Board, in reference to said boundary line, Mr. Hunt presented an order passed January 6th., 1855, dividing the Town of Neenah, moving the dividing line. Mr. Townsend presented an amendment which was adopted. The order as amended was then passed. Mr. Church moved that the order in regard to the division line of the Town of Neenah, and introduced by Mr. Hunt, and amended by Mr. Townsend, then passed and reconsidered. Carried. Mr. Hunt moved that the amendment of Mr. Townsend be stricken out, that was carried. That left the original order as made by Mr. Hunt without any amendment. Mr. Hunt moved that the original order introduced, made by Mr. Hunt, be adopted. Carried. That is the last proceeding.

Q.—What do you base your recollections on in regard to the center of the highway, being the town line, and of the fight that occurred over this highway?

A.—Not distinctly from the highway. It was the cemetery more than anything that the fight was over.

Q.—Do you know, of your own knowledge, that this highway is any part of that cemetery?

A.—To my own knowledge, so far as my judgment goes—

Q.—I have asked you this question, do you know of your own knowledge that the cemetery is any part of this question?

A.—To my judgment it is.

Q.—We want your answer.

A.—That is my answer.

Q.—Mr. Smith you stated that you were present at the County Board at the time this locating of the Town line happened. I would like to ask you under what circumstances you were present at this meeting, in other words, were you present?

A.—I don't know as I can give you what I presume was the reason why I was present. Whether I was called there or whether I went there on my own notion I am not able to say. Having got there, and learning the fact that the question of the division of the Town was up, I was called to present my views and to address the County Board, in what I had to say about it.

Q.—You were practicing law at the time?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Were you there as an attorney for some party at the time?

A.—No, I was employed just to give my views in regard to the matter.

Q.—Have you been employed since, an attorney at that time, to adjust this locating of the town line?

A.—No Sir. This is the first time that I have known that the question was up. I was employed for another purpose, another question which it has nothing to do with.

Q.—This other question, which you refer to, has reference to this fact?

A.—It may be, it is in no way connected with it.

J. B. Hamilton being duly sworn by Henry Fitzgibbon, as a witness, testifies as follows:

In 1854, in Fall, some of the citizens of the Town of Neenah concluded it would be for their interest to have the Town of Neenah divided. I was chosen, or appointed to represent that interest, draw up a petition to the County Board, present it at one of the sessions, and ask the County Board to take action and divide the Town of Neenah. I did so and attended all the sessions of the County Board, whenever that question was being acted upon, until the final decision was made. The original petition have for a decision, from the section line between section 21 and 16, and 17 and 20. But Mr. Hunt, who represented the town of Neenah; said that would take too much from the town of Menasha, which was at once set off, and wanted it changed to the quarter line of section 20 and 21. I think that was the compromise and we consented to it, and the Board established that line and divided the Town. The line as adopted by the County Board commenced at Lake Butte des Morts on the quarter line of section 21, running thence west on said quarter line to the center of section 20, thence north to the section line, thence west to Clayton. A subsequent session of the County Board was held in February or March and those who opposed the decision appeared before the County Board. I think Curtis Reed was the principal one who appeared, and claimed that they wanted the line changed some. The most prominent reason was, that they didn't want to be compelled to bury their dead in the town of Neenah, and they wanted the line so changed as to include the north half of the cemetery. I think an amendment was introduced, and the line should commence at Lake Butte des Morts, on the quarter line of section 21, running thence west until it struck the northeast corner of the cemetery, thence south along the east line of the cemetery until it struck the half way point, thence west in a parallel line with the north line of the cemetery until it struck the west line of said cemetery, thence north on the west line of the cemetery to the quarter line, thence west on said quarter line to the center of section 20, thence north to the section line, thence west to the west line of the Town of Neenah. I think that was as near as I can recollect, the words of that amendment. There was nothing in the amendment about a road or any highway. I am quite sure that question was not raised at all in the county Board, and to my recollection, that was not thought of. Mr. Reed and those he represented there said that the north half of the cemetery should be included within the bounds of the Town of Menasha. That to my recollection, is just what the County Board did. The question of the highway was not thought of at that time. My recollection about this matter is corroborated and very much strengthened by the fact, that in 1856 the Town Board of the Town of Neenah, of which I was chairman, took up the road that lay on the east side of the cemetery, or rather changed it, and instead of running along the east side, it started from the northeast corner, thence running southeast until it struck the Neenah road. They passed a resolution of that kind but I think Mr. Merriman was dissatisfied with the action of the Board and an appeal, called a jury. At the trial or hearing, before the jury, Mr. Reed and I appeared, represented by the Town of Menasha and objected to the road being changed for various reasons; but no question of jurisdiction was raised at all, or any point made in reference to it. At that time it was fresh in my mind where the line was, and fresh in Mr. Reed's mind because it was only a year before the division was made. The jury reversed the decision and the road remained where it was.

Q.—In what capacity did you attend?

A.—As a supervisor. I was chairman of the board of supervisors. If I had known that line included half of the highway I certainly should not have advised the board to have acted upon it. I didn't suppose it was necessary. I should certainly not have taken the proceeding that I did.

Q.—Have you refreshed your recollection since then?

A.—I have not.

EXAMINATION BY MR. LOMAS.

Q.—Mr. Ham'lon, do you know, when this grave-yard was platted out, whether the road was platted out too?

A.—I don't know, the cemetery was bought and platted out and

fenced.

Q.—I want to know whether these lots were surveyed.

A.—I don't remember.

Q.—Have you ever been solicited as an attorney in this matter in regard to the boundary line of the towns of Neenah and Menasha?

A.—I have not. Not at all.

Q.—Have you ever thought of this matter of 1855-56 until it was brought to your attention recently, in the past few months?

A.—Oh yes, I have thought of it. I have always thought that the north half of the cemetery was included in Menasha. I had a child buried there, and I thought of it then. I have spoken of it frequently that this is Menasha cemetery

Q.—Haven't taken any legal action between the towns?

A.—I have not been solicited in regard to the proceedings. I have not interested myself about it, if I knew anything about the town line I should have said so.

Mr. W. H. Scott being duly sworn, in relation to said matter, testifies as follows:

In 1854-55 I was chairman of the town of Vineland, and was a member of the county Board at that time. I remember the matter of fixing the town line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha, coming before the Board at that time. In the first place the line was fixed on the section line, and after was changed to the quarter line. It was finally established to take in to the town of Menasha one-half of the burying-ground. The north half of the cemetery. There was no action in regard to the highway, not that I recollect of.

Findings of fact and conclusions of law of said committee.

I. We find the following facts; that the territory comprising the present towns Neenah and Menasha, originally constituted the Town of Neenah.

II. That the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, on the first day of March, A. D., 1855, made an order dividing said Town of Neenah, and setting off the town of Menasha from the same, at a session of said Board, held on the first day of March, A. D. 1855.

III. That the order setting off said Town and making said division, is defective, as the same was recorded in the minutes of the proceedings of said Board, on the adoption of said order, in that the order, as recorded, failed to give the line of the division of said Town; and for that reason your committee was obliged to resort to evidence outside of the records and files of the proceeding of said Board, to ascertain and determine the true line of the division adopted by said Board. The evidence taken by said committee to supply the missing evidence by reason of said defect in the records and files, is herewith returned and attached to and made a part of this report.

IV. Attached hereto, as part of the evidence returned, is a certified copy of all the doings and proceedings of said County Board of Supervisors, relative to the division of the Town of Neenah, down to and including the final order of said Board dividing said Town, made by the County Clerk, also the testimony of members of the Board, and others who were present at the time of the adoption of said order.

V. From the records and files, and from all evidence in the case, your committee find, that the division line as fixed and determined by said Board, in its final order, made on the first day of March, A. D., 1855, commencing on the east and west quarter line of section 21, in township number 20, North of Range 17 east, where said quarter line intersects the west shore or line of Little Lake Buttes des Morts, and running thence west across said section 21, to the west line of said section, thence continuing west on the east and west quarter line, of section 20, same Town and Range to the center of the highway, running north and south on the east line of the cemetery of the town of Neenah, so called, thence south on the center of said highway to the middle or center line of said cemetery, running east and west, said center line being parallel with the north line of said cemetery, thence running west on said middle or center line of said cemetery, parallel with the north line of the same, to the west line of said cemetery, thence north on a line parallel with the east line of said cemetery to the east and west quarter lines of said section 20, thence west on said quarter line to the north and south quarter lines of said section 20, thence north on said quarter line of said section 20, thence west on said section line of said section, and on the section line dividing sections 18 and 19 to the west boundary line of said Towns of Neenah and Menasha.

As conclusions of law, your committee find, that the north half of section twenty-one (21), and the northeast quarter of section (20), and the north half of the cemetery of the Town of Neenah, the south line of said northeast quarter forming the north line of said cemetery and the north half of the highway adjoining the east line of said cemetery, and running north and south on said east line, and the southwest quarter of section seventeen (17) and all of section (18), were set off from said Town of Neenah by said Board, to the Town of Menasha, and form the south boundary line of all that part of the Town of Menasha, lying west of the little Lake Buttes des Morts, and the division line between said Towns of Neenah and Menasha.

NEENAH AND MENASHA LINE.

The hour for special business having arrived, to wit: the consideration of the report on town line of Neenah and Menasha.

Supervisor Cook called for the reading of the resolution of last November session whereby the committee on town line was appointed, and the same was read by the Clerk.

The report as introduced at yesterday's meeting was then considered.

Supervisor Schœtz moved the adoption of the report.

The committee in minority desiring to render a report, Supervisor Schœtz withdrew his motion on the condition that the said committee render such report at this session of the Board.

Supervisor Cook moved that the rules be suspended and that Mr. Reed of Menasha be permitted to address the Board. Request was granted and Mr. Reed addressed the Board on the merits of the question.

Supervisor Cook moved that the board adjourn for committee work to 9 A. M. and that the farther consideration of the town line question be made the special business for 10 A. M. Motion prevailed.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Accounts presented and referred to appropriate committees.

PETITION FOR WINCHESTER ROAD.

Supervisor Brightman presented the following petition:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Whereas, it appears from the affidavits of James H. Jones and William Hall, of said County that they were present when the County Commissioners of said County were called by a petition to relay a road called the Hortonville and New London Road, running across Rat River and Marsh, in section one (1) Town of Winchester, running and being in some places within twelve rods of the east line of said town of Winchester and twelve rods west of the Town line of the town of Clayton.

And it appearing to us from said affidavit, and resolution attached and made a part hereof, that the Town Board of Winchester prior to this time took up this road to have it relaid on the town line between the Towns of Winchester and Clayton, as the Town of Clayton was as much interested in keeping up a good road and in fact more so than the Town of Winchester.

And it appearing to us that said two witnesses were present when the commissioners came to said Towns to relay said road, as aforesaid, that they distinctly recollect that the Coun-

ty Commissioners made a proposition, after having looked over the Town lines between said Towns, admitted that the road ought to be laid in justice to the Town of Winchester, on the Town line, as the road bed of the old road by travel and labor, had become solid to a great extent, and the contemplated new road, a great deal of it was springy and mire, and was a road of great necessity for the public travel to the cities of Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha and the villages of Winneconne and Omro. And it was the regular traveled route for the lumbermen of these places in conveying their supplies into the pinieries, in the northern part of Wisconsin.

And it appearing to us, that on the contemplated new route, the Commissioners admitting the great necessity of said road, immediately appropriated nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) to be laid out on the approach to Rat River, and to bridge said Rat River.

And it appearing to us from the testimony of said two persons at the time that the said County Commissioners stated then and there that they entertained no doubts, whatever, and that the county Board would occasionally make an appropriation to assist the town of Winchester in keeping said road in good repair.

And it appearing to us that on the strength of the proposition so advanced and stated to the Town of Winchester, by said County Commissioners, whom the Town Board of Supervisors of the Town of Winchester believed had authority to make said representation and proposition, that the County would from time to time appropriate money to assist in keeping said highway in repair, accepted such proposition, and agreed in consideration thereof, to wit:—That in consideration that the County Board would assist them in keeping up said highway, agreed with said County Commissioners, to not appeal from the decision made by said Commissioners, leaving said highway where it was finally laid, and did not appeal from such decision.

And it further appearing that since said road was laid, the Town records show that the Town of Winchester has paid for work and repairing said Hortonville and New London Road, running through section one (1) Town of Winchester, fifteen hundred and twenty-seven dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$1527.27) outside of the general road tax, by appropriations made by the Town of Winchester.

Therefore, *Be it Resolved* that there is hereby appropriated to the Town of Winchester, the sum of five hundred dollars, (\$500.00) out of any moneys in the County Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by the Town Board of Supervisors of the Town of Winchester, in repairing said highway. Said money to be expended under the supervision of the Town Board of Winchester, and the Chairman of this Board and the Clerk are hereby authorized to issue an order upon the Treasury for the payment of said sum.

James H. Jones and William Hall, being duly sworn, each for himself and not one for the other, disposes and says that he is a resident of the Town of Winchester, in said County; that they were present when the County Commissioners of said County were called out by a petition to relay a road called the Hortonville and New London Road, running across Rat River and Marsh, in section one (1) of said Town, running and being in some places within twelve rods of the east line of said Town, and twelve rods west of the town line of the Town of Clayton.

That the Town Board of Winchester, prior to this time, took up this road to have it relaid on the Town line, between the Towns of Winchester and Clayton; as the Town of Clayton had as much interest in keeping up a good road, and in fact more than the Town of Winchester. That they were present when the Commissioners came out to said Town to relay said road, across Rat River and Marsh, as aforesaid, that they distinctly recollect that the County Commissioners made the proposition after looking over the Town lines between said towns, admitted that the road ought to be laid, in justice to the Town of Winchester, on the town line, as the road bed of the old road, by travel and labor, had become solid to great extent; and the contemplated new road, a great deal of it was springy and mire, it being such a necessary road for public travel to the Cities of Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha, and the Villages of Winneconne and Omro, and that it was the regular traveled route for the lumbermen of these places, in conveying their supplies into the pinieries in the northern part of the State. That on the contemplated new route it would take at least three years to form as solid a road bed as there was on the old road; and said that they would relay it on the old route and did then and there appropriate nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) to be laid out on the approach to the River and to bridge the River.

And said Commissioners further stated at said time and place that they had entertained no doubts whatever but that the County Board would occasionally make an appropriation to assist the Town in keeping the road in good repair. That on the strength of the proposition so advanced to them by said County Commissioners, the Town Board of the Town of Winchester did then and there accept the proposition so advanced to them by the said County Commissioners, as aforesaid. And the Town Board of said Town of Winchester, in consideration of said proposition so advanced to them, and the representation made to them at the time by said County Commissioners, agreed that they, as such Town Board would not appeal from such decision, so made by the County Commissioners as aforesaid.

REPORT ON NEW JAIL.

Supervisor Cook from committee to investigate as to the advisability of constructing a new Jail, submitted their report, which was accepted as follows:

To the county board of Winnebago county, Wis.

Whereas, the undersigned your committee to whom was assigned the duty of investigating as to the necessity and propriety of building a new county Jail in this county herewith report:

That after due investigation, they find your present county jail secure as regards the imprisonment of offenders, and that its sanitary condition, while it might be improved will still in our opinion pass muster. That if there be any serious defect in your present jail, it consists in a lack of room and facilities for classifying, separating and confining the various grades of offenders therein confined.

Your committee are of the opinion that the Sheriff's rooms in the basement of the court house adjacent to your present jail could be fitted up so as to supply this deficiency and so afford room for the better classification of offenders. This could be done at an expense of about \$3,000.00 and leave the jail kitchen and dining room as they now are. But should these said Sheriff rooms be so fitted up, this would necessitate the purchase, construction or rental of a dwelling house near the jail for the use of the sheriff and his family. This would entail an additional expense of perhaps \$3000.00 making a total of \$6000.00

To construct a new jail such as would supply the necessities of this county, and meet the demands of an enlightened civilization would cost \$50,000. Signed

GENTLEMEN:—Your finance committee to whom was referred the matter of investigation in regard to placing the funds of said Winnebago county with some bank or banks in order to secure to the county the interest that such bank or banks might be willing to pay, have performed the duty assigned them and respectfully report as follows:

We have interviewed the several banks of Winnebago county and find they are willing to pay interest ranging from $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 percent. on the average daily deposits if said amounts equal or exceed \$500. Your committee therefore recommend that this matter be considered by this board in committee of the whole and decide upon this question.

Said line commencing on the west side of Lake Butte des Morts on the quarter line of Section 21 and running west on said quarter line across sections 21 and 20 until it reaches the North east corner of Neenah cemetery, thence south on the east line of said cemetery, thence west parallel with the north line of said cemetery until it reaches the west line of said cemetery, thence north to the quarter line, thence west to the quarter line of section 20 running north and south, thence north to the section line between section 20 and 17, and thence west to the town line of Neenah, Menasha and Clayton.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN, with your permission I herewith present my annual report.

There were six births in the poor house during the year. The mothers were all young and unmarried. I have frequently called your attention to the hard lot of these unfortunate girls. Under fervid promises of marriage; with bright visions of future domestic happiness, in a moment of weakness, she yields to an imperious physiological impulse. When she announces her pregnancy to her lover he has, at once, pressing business in the far west, and she is left to face a scolding world. Without money, home or friends. Every door is closed against her. Not a helping hand is extended. No word of sympathy is uttered. The poor house is the only shelter she can obtain, and to the poor house she goes—timidly, tearfully goes—with her pitiful burden, with her poverty, pain and guilt, the joy and hope and innocence of her young life wrecked on the reefs of passion—lost on the ledges of lust. She goes enveloped in the sackcloth of remorseful memories with the ashes of a vanished love upon her head. She goes to expiate her fault in agony, but she is to pass the perilous portals of parturition into the sacred realm of maternity. By order of an enlightened community, by command of the chivalry of Wisconsin, in the name of sweet charity, with the sanction of the Christian church a prospective mother is forced to associate with deformed persons, with vicious people, with scoffing paupers and leering lunatics.

Though grief hath many a form and show,

I think an unloved woman must know

The very bottom of human woe.

If there is ever a scene in this sorrowful world over which the pitying angels weep it is when, in that little room in the poor house, a confiding and betrayed girl in anguish of body and torture of mind brings forth the child of her unfortunate love. No one in the wide world knows better than she that crosses are made to be crucified upon. No one can appreciate more than she the truth of that awful dictum which has been wafted across the centuries—in sorrow thou shalt bring forth children. Though the world heeds not her tribulation from the abysmal depths of shame the sound of her sorrow goes up to God. It is idle to expect that these cases will cease to come to us; they will occur as long as men are lustful and false and women are loving and frail. There is ample scientific evidence of the power of parental influences upon the future of the child, so that if the mother were the chief of sinners (which she is not) it is an infinite outrage

upon the unborn infant to deliberately modify its life in an unfavorable manner. In the great northern insane hospital are many patients who are there because of offenses much more heinous than that of having loved not wisely, but too well. Men who are utterly unappreciative, who are entirely bereft of reason, yet they are supplied with libraries, carpets, pianos, singing birds and flowers, no expense is spared to make their calamity lighter. Somewhere there should be a place where the unfortunate, simple-minded, trusting, deceived, deserted girl could be secluded from the world, with proper surroundings, until she undergoes the dread ordeal which nature has ordained.

During the first three months of the year there was considerable sickness among the prisoners in the jail, but nothing occurred worthy of special mention. ~~Mr. White, the deputy sheriff, has furnished me the following list of the number of commitments and the offenses:~~

Some of these men were undoubtedly recidivists, but it is safe to say that 400 men were locked up in the jail for periods varying from five days to six months. The costs for officers' fees, for maintenance, etc., was \$10,000. There are but three rational reasons for putting a human being in prison. First, to isolate for life those who are deemed too dangerous to be at liberty. Second, to deter possible law breakers through fear of the prison, and lastly to so punish those who are imprisoned that upon their release they will forsake their evil ways and sin no more. With the life prisoners we are not now concerned. Whether criminals are ever kept from crime because of prisons is very doubtful. That any human being has ever been benefited or reformed by a residence in a Wisconsin jail is not believed by anyone familiar with that absurd institution. The only persons who are in any way aided are the sheriffs, justices of the peace, constables and chiefs of police, who receive fees. Every man who is locked in a jail is injured. If every jail in the state were destroyed today it would be a blessing to the public. Prisons have come to be considered necessary adjuncts of civilization; in fact they are monuments to one of the many failures of civilization.

That eminent body of law makers and social science philosophers, the Oshkosh common council, in the year 1891, issued 120 saloon licenses, or one saloon to every thirty-eight voters in the city, and then hired policemen to imprison men when they became drunk and to lock them in jail when they became vagrants. A more ungrateful proceeding it is hard to imagine. A jail filled with vagrants, beats and thieves is no place for an inebriate. The drunken man should be sent to the Turkish bath room and have the alcohol steamed out of him. It would be more economical and certainly more humane to sweat a man two or three hours than to board him in jail ten or twenty days. For the first and second offences the drunkard should be thoroughly washed until he is sober. If

he persisted in his reprehensible habits let him be locked away from the world a few days in solitude, not in the company of scoundrels. If cleanliness and a reasonable amount of solitary confinement failed to prevent his return, he should be sent to a state institution for a protracted period where his disease could be cured. Vile associates, impure thoughts, foul ideas never did and never will eradicate the terrible appetite of a confirmed drunkard for alcohol. To confine a drunkard in the company of felons is not only useless, but it is cruel to the man and an ultimate injury to the public. Some time in the beautiful sometime, we will get a legislature which has an idea beyond the distributing of Blue Books and the extortion of passes from frightened railway officers, and there will be laws on some social questions which are not an insult to the dignity of man and a burlesque of justice. One of the meanest features of the whole business is, that no prominent citizen, be he ever so "disorderly," no rich man's son, be he ever so abusive, is imprisoned for drunkenness. It is always the poor fellow who can ill spare the time and still less the loss of character who goes to jail. This, however, is strictly in consonance with the motto of the time—the devil take the hindmost. There were 150 men imprisoned in the jail during the year for "vagrancy." The only object in sending them to jail was that the officers might obtain the fees incident to the process of depriving a fellow creature of his liberty. They were all young able-bodied men, well qualified to do a hard day's work. Many of them were anxious to obtain admission to the jail which was a good reason for not sending them there, for anything a vagrant wishes is wrong. Our jail as you all are aware, is divided into the new and the old jail, the former is dismal, sunless and imperfectly ventilated cave-like abomination fit only for the abode of rats and men who commit rape. The old jail is better lighted and ventilated, is well heated, and so poorly constructed that any one can get out if he wants to. In this place the vagrants are kept. They have shelter, lights, newspapers, medical attendance and supplies, fire, food, playing cards and checkers and nothing to pay. In one respect this is ahead of the business men's rooms—the occupants don't have to go out in the cold to get home at night. This is the vagrant's home in the winter: in the summer he reposes upon new mown hay which somebody has mowed for him. He never mows or toils. With his amusements, with songs and merry jests occasionally adding a new story to his repertoire, chewing his tobacco in serenity, guying the poor drunkards, learning new devices in the art of living without work, laughing at the men who labor, kicking because he don't get mines pie and scalloped oysters, he serves out his sentence and hastens to another county where a new set of officers can get fees and he can get thirty days. He always contrives to be committed in November and his last term for the year expires in May. The tramp ought not to go to jail. He is an American citizen, he is a man. He did not exist in the United States twenty-five years ago. He appears to be one of the products of our advancing civilization. With the enormous, the marvelous increase of national wealth, has come the vast army of vagrants. For every new millionaire we get five or six hundred tramps.

"Ill fares the land to hastening ills a prey

When wealth accumulates and men decay."

The tramp is not so much a sinner, he is an evolution. In the frightful race and rage for dollars he is elbowed into the ditch. He is weak of will, infirm of purpose, his intellectual outlook is morbidly narrow, his moral vision is jaundiced, all his views of life and duty distorted. In the wild rush of the time he is trodden under foot. He is thrust into jail, his self-respect is at last all gone, and he becomes the veteran vagrant so familiar to the policemen and jailors. Heredity has something to do with the vagrant. Perhaps he was morally marred by a forgotten ancestor. It may be he was mentally maimed by a bacchanalian father. Born perhaps with a blight upon his nerves or a "blot upon his brain," or with something lurking in the blood. Who can fathom all the secret and the mystery of the

life of any man? The tramp should be regarded as an imbecile. He is certainly mentally weak. He is often witty, cunning, ingenious and logical, still there is a missing link in his mental machinery. No strong, manly, coherent character is a tramp. No man with ordinary ambition and a resolute will is a tramp. He should be treated as a big, wayward, foolish child. The mental weakness, loss of self-respect, lack of ambition, poverty and degradation of the wretched vagrant should excite our pity and not arouse our anger. It is because he is strong of body that men look upon him with contempt. His intellectual and moral obliquities not being considered.)

His mental deformity and moral distortion are not so easily seen as a hunch back or a club foot. His will is paralyzed. His soul is sick. The law takes the dispirited outcast to jail where he is forced still deeper into the mire. When he leaves the prison he is still more unfit for citizenship, still less able to do a day's work. What the man needs is to be helped not hurt. He is wounded unto death and needs the Samaritan—not the policeman. He should be compelled to know the full force of that ancient edict, "in the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread." He should do the sweating before he does the eating.

In Germany where there were 200,000 vagrants ten years ago, now there are practically none. By a variety of enterprises the tramp has been abolished. In every town and city the people formed anti-begging societies, the members pledging themselves not to give food or money at their doors. They established a number of "labor colonies," where work could be obtained and refuge had. They created employment bureaus in every city. They provided a series of "wayfarer's lodging houses" throughout the length and breadth of the empire. By removing temptations, by extending friendly aid, by providing work at small wages, the thrifty and far-seeing German has gently forced the tramp out of existence. The same remedies applied in America, will undoubtedly cure the same disease. Our present methods are worse than useless. They are extravagant, injurious and cruel. To assist a poor, vicious human being to a nobler life is one of the grandest achievements of which any man is capable. Service of others is the crowning glory of man's work. It is only by the united efforts of the people of the entire state that the tramp can be lifted back into the ranks of reputable citizenship. When the public once knows what ought to be done, when its sympathy is enlisted, when its conscience is aroused, the years will be few until the tramp will be merely an unpleasant memory.

Supervisor Daly moved to accept the report and print in the proceedings.

Supervisor Schetz moved to amend by having the same printed in the proceedings and also 1000 copies in pamphlet form. Amendment accepted by Mr. Daly and motion adopted by 32 ayes to 1 no.

ON ADJOURNMENT.

Supervisor Loope offered the following resolution and moved its adoption which motion prevailed:

Resolved, That when this board adjourns from this days session, it shall stand adjourned until 10 A. M. March 7th, and that the special business be postponed until 10:30 on that day.

Whereas, it is necessary to raise a little money to defray expenses to make proper exhibits at the World's Columbian Fair, of the products of this county,

Be it Therefore Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that there be appropriated the sum of three hundred dollars for said purpose, such sum to be expended under the direction of a committee to be appointed by the chair, and such

committee to serve without compensation for mileage or per diem or other expenses.

The undersigned committee to whom was referred the duty of ascertaining the amount received by the Sheriff for services as such officer per annum in said county and such other facts in relation to said office as will tend to enlighten the county board as to the proper amount to pay as salary to such officer, including his under sheriff and deputies, also if it be advisable to return to the fee system for said office, respectfully report:
1st, That they have examined the accounts audited by the county

board of supervisors for services etc. of the sheriff of said county, his under sheriff and deputies, for two years of the terms of Frank Follett and Fred Burgess and find that the average annual amount of the sums so paid is as follows as will more specifically appear by the schedule hereto annexed, to wit:

That said salary shall be in full for all services rendered said county within the limits thereof by said sheriff, his under sheriff turnkey or jailer and all of his deputies, and be it further provided that said sheriff or his under sheriff shall receive no fees per diem for attendance on the circuit, county or any other court wherein the county may be liable to pay such per diem for such attendance; and that it shall be the duty of the committee auditing accounts before the allowance of any of the accounts of said sheriff to ascertain whether any certificate for per diem of said sheriff or his under sheriff has been issued to them by any court or any officer thereof, and if any so appear to have been issued, the amount thereof shall be deducted from any bill or account, that the said sheriff or his under sheriff may have against Winnebago county, and the remainder only, paid in full of such claim or account due the sheriff or his under sheriff from said county.

Third:- The committee further recommend the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved by the county board of supervisors of Winnebago county, Wis. That it is hereby made the duty of the sheriff of this county, his under sheriff and all his deputies to tax up on all papers served by them within the limits of the county for which the county would be liable to pay, all legal charges and mileage taxable by law; and that the said sheriff, under sheriff and all his deputies, pay over to the county treasurer all fees and mileage collected by them, upon all papers served by them in cases within the county, for which services the county would be liable to pay.

AGREEMENT WITH WATERWORKS.

MESRS:—Early in January last your committee on Public Buildings received a communication from the President of the Oshkosh Water Works company; to the effect that they were re-rating their customers; and that as it is difficult to establish a rate on such a building as is your court house; they would put in a meter and charge for the water actually used, as thus shown; unless we objected, which we at once did.

Your committee succeeded in obtaining the following proposition from said company, to wit:

The Oshkosh Water Works company hereby makes the following proposition:—To furnish water for the court house of Winnebago county for the year 1892 for the sum of \$125, payable quarterly in advance on the first days of January, April, July and October. This rate covers all the fixtures now in the building, including lawn sprinkling. The use of water is to be governed by the same rules which apply to our private consumers, a copy of which is hereto attached. On this rate you are not to allow any running fixtures except a slight stream in the urinals, and the water on the lawn to be used during the hours specified for private consumers.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee to whom was referred the question of the advisability of taking steps looking to the construction of a new Insane asylum for the insane, beg leave to report. That they have considered the subject and that the present building is inconvenient and poorly adapted for its intended purposes. That its construction does not conform to the scientific methods now in general use in respect to sanitary needs and general safety of the inmates, who in case of fire and the attending excitement would some of them probably be burned up, partly by reason of inability to act in time of danger and partly by reason of the intricate means of egress. In view of such deficiencies your committee is of the opinion that in the near future some steps ought to be taken looking towards a new Asylum for the Insane and therefore recommend that your committee be instructed to correspond with other counties to ascertain as near as possible the cost of the several county asylums and the expense of maintaining them, and report at the next November session.

We further recommend that the Trustees and County Superintendents of Poor and Insane be authorized to construct a tank of sufficient capacity to furnish water in case of emergency.

Your committee report that they have taken inventory of the county property at the County Asylum and farm, and submit the same herewith.

As per resolution adopted in November last the Superintendent was instructed to partition off and prepare for occupancy for aged and infirm

inmates, five rooms in the second story of the wash house; also to construct a house for storing fire hose. Both improvements have been completed at a cost of \$247.42.

The first has proven very satisfactory as the occupants have been transferred from the third story and now have easy access to the dining room, also saving the trouble of serving meals and transferring dishes etc.

The arrangement for fire hose is such that connection with hydrants can be made and water thrown in one minute from time alarm is given.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC BUILDINGS REPORT.

Supervisor Cook from Committee on Public Buildings submitted the following report which was unanimously adopted:

To the Honorable the county Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, Wis:

Whereas, your committee has been instructed by your honorable body to prepare a suitable resolution for the abatement of the vagrant or tramp nuisance, and,

Whereas, your committee find after a careful examination of the records, statements and reports from the Justices of the Peace and other officials, that the county is forced to carry a burden, so large and expensive, as has never heretofore been known in any county of this size: that the roving class of mankind known as vagrants or tramps have so increased as to not only bring financial trouble upon our county, but have become so bold as to endanger the lives of our inhabitants by their exorbitant demands.

Therefore be it Resolved, by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, Wis. That the Chairman of this County Board, be, and he is hereby empowered to cause the Superintendent of the Poor Farm from time to time, to deliver such an amount of hard head stones from the county farm as shall be sufficient to keep the vagrants or tramps in employment breaking such stone, and the said Chairman is further empowered to procure the necessary tools for such employment.

And it is further Resolved, that the chairman of this Board be authorized to dispose of such stones when so broken to the highest bidder.

And this further Resolved, that the Sheriff of this County be and is hereby instructed the

keep all tramps or vagrants at work breaking stone in the jail yard, not less than eight hours per day.

Whereas, this county has tried the salary system for the past five years and find that it works to the disadvantage of the county, as we are now paying a salary of \$2,500 and the larger part of the fees as provided by law:

Now Therefore be it Resolved, that it is for the interest of this county to return to the old system of paying fees and no salary, and

Be it therefore Resolved, by this Board, that this the county of Winnebago does hereby return to the system of paying our Sheriff the fees made and provided by law in lieu of all salary for his services.
