REPORT ON WINCHESTER BRIDGE.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Winchester Bridge beg leave to report that they have performed the duties assigned them.

The contract for said bridge was let for \$1,067.00 which amount exceeded the estimate to the amount of \$67.00.

BOUNDARY LINE.

Supervisor Oellerich, from committee to take testimony in the matter of locating the town line between towns of Neenah and Menasha, submitted their report, the consideration of which was made the special order for io A. M., November 22d.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago:

The undersigned committee, duly appointed by said Board at the November session. r893, for the purpose to determine a request made by a resolution adopted at said session, which resolution was entitled a resolution to establish a boundary line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha, respectfully report:

That they did on the 25th day of January, 1894, and from time to time thereafter, meet for the purpose of investigating any and all facts that to them appeared necessary to establish said boundary line. They have carefully read all the testimony bearing upon the question so referred that has been taken and recorded by a committee appointed for the same purpose, and acting in March, 1892.

They furthermore carefully perused the records, and visited the locality where such defect, if any, exists.

In the opinion of the committee it was not necessary to take further testimony than that which is now on file with the Clerk of the county. That no new evidence was offered by either party interested in the dispute. That the committee deemed it advisable, and so instructed County Surveyor Leach, to lay out and prepare an exact map, which is herewith pre-

sented, which explains the location and shows the boundary line as, in the opinion of the committee, it does exist.

Finding of facts and conclusions of law:

8

First-We find the following facts: That the territory comprising the present towns of Neenah and Menasha originally constituted the town of Neenah.

Second-That the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, on the first day of March, 1855, made an order dividing the said town of Neenah, and setting off the town of Menasha from the same, at a session of said Board, and on the first day of March, 1855.

Third-That the order setting off said town, and making said division, is defective as specified by the former committee.

Fourth—On the records and files, and from the evidence as produced and recorded, your committee find that the division line as fixed and determined by said Board in its final order made on the first day of March, 1855, commencing on the east and west quarter line of section 21, in township number 20, north of range 17, east, where said quarter line intersects the west shore of Little Lake Butte des Morts, and running thence west through said section 21 to the west line of said section; thence continuing west on the east and west quarter line of section 20, same town and range, to the center of the highway running north and south on the east line of the cemetery of the town of Neenah, so called, thence south on the center of said highway to the middle or center line of said cemetery; thence running west on said middle or center line of said cemetery, parallel with the north line of said, cometery to the east and west quarter lines of said section 20; thence west on said quarter line to the north and south quarter lines of said section 20; thence north on said quarter line is of said section 20; thence west on said section line of said section 20; thence west on said section line of said section 20; thence west on said section 20; thence north on said quarter line of said section 20; thence west on said section 20; thence north on said quarter line of said section 20; thence west on said section 20; thence north on said quarter line of said section 20; thence west on said section 20; thence north on the section line dividing sections 18 and 19, to the west boundary line of said towns of Neenah and Menasha.

As conclusions of law your Committee find, as the former committee has heretofore reported, that the north half of Section 21, and the northeast quarter of Section 20, and the north half of the cemetery of the Town of Neenah, the south line of said northeast quarter, forming the north line of said cemetery and the north half of the highway adjoining the east line of said cemetery and running north and south on said east line, and the southwest quarter Section 17, and all of Section 18, were set off from said Town of Neenah by said Board to the Town of Menasha, and form the south boundary line of all that part of the Town of Menasha Jying west of the Little Lake Butte des Morts, and the division line between said Towns of Neenah and Menasha.

Supervisor Orchard from Trustees on Insane submitted their report, which on motion was accepted and referred to Committee on Poor and Poor Farm: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

We, the Board of Trustees of Winnebago County Asylum for the Chronic Insane and Poor House submit to you, gentlemen, our annual report being for the fiscal year beginning November 1, 1893, and ending September 30, 1894.

We have drawn orders on the County Treasurer in favor of the Superintendent during said time for \$11,633.85.

The Superintendent has received for sale of farm products \$21.47; making a total of \$11,655.32.

We have audited accounts for amounts as follows, and which have been paid by the Superintendent:

There has been furnished during the eleven months which this report covers, 6,946 weeks' board to inmates in the county asylum and poor house at a cost of \$1.62 per capita. For an itemized statement of the asylum and poor house, the number, sex, etc., of patients, and the amount of grain, hay, etc., raised during the year, we refer you to the Superintendent's report which is herewith submitted. There is now due the county from the state and other counties for care of insane \$8,224.35, and from cities and towns for support of their poor \$2,529.02. and the care of our own County Insane for the past year amounts, at \$1.50 per week each and clothing furnished, to \$7,246.37, and for support of our own poor \$990.32, making the total earnings of the institution for the eleven months ending Sept. 30, 1894, \$18,990.06, leaving a balance in favor of the institution of \$7,716.50.

The Legislature of 1893, by Chapter 98, passed a law giving the County Board authority to create Asylum funds wherein all the earnings of Asylums should be placed, and your Trustees would recommend the adoption of the same, for we feel assured if that is done, so that there can be kept an accurate account of all the earnings and expenditures of the institution, that there will be no further need of appropriation from the county, as it will sustain itself, and, we believe, pay off its bonded indebtedness as it becomes due.

And, as a basis for our belief, we submit the following estimate of the earnings and expenditures of the institution, based on its present number of inmates which is only two-thirds of its capacity, 132 patients at \$3.00 per week; \$20,592.00, on estimated cost including Superintendent's salary and insurance. For the 132 patients at \$2.00 per capita would amount to \$13,728.00, leaving a balance of \$6,864.00 in favor of the asylum. Deduct from this \$3,675.00 per annum interest on the \$\$5,000.00 bonded indebtedness, would leave \$3,189.00 per annum to pay off the said bonds as they become due, and the first payment will not become due until July 1, 1898, at which time there would be a sufficient amount to the credit of the Asylum to take up the said bonds as they become due.

These estimates are for the Insane Asylum only, as the poor department will pay its own expenses as each city, town and the county would be charged with the actual expense of the support of their poor.

Your Trustees are well satisfied with the management of the Asylum and Poor House during the past year, and think that great credit is due the Superintendent and Matron for their efficient management of the same.

County Physician Gordon being present read and submitted his report, which on motion was accepted.

On motion by Supervisor Schoetz and on call of ayes and nays the County Clerk was instructed to have 1,000 copies of the report printed in pamphlet form.

ANNUAL REPORT OF DOCTOR W. A. GORDON.

(Read Before the County Board, November 19, 1894.)

To the Trustees of the Winnebago County Insane Asylum:

GENTLEMEN: As required by law, I herewith submit my annual report as your physician for the year ending September 30, 1894. The statistics setting forth the admissions, deaths, etc., have been furnished you by the superintendent, Mr. Eaton. I have made the semi-monthly inspections as required by law,

and have also attended the several cases of sickness as they have occurred. The year was uneventful in the matter of physical disease. No epidemic or accident worthy of special note disturbed the tranquillity of the institution. The superintendent and matron have always co-operated heartily with me in promoting the comfort of the inmates, and they are entitled to the gratitude of all who have friends in the institution for their zeal and kindness. The attendants have been earnest and faithful in the discharge of their trying and laborious duties. The harmony which has prevailed among all the officers and employes has redounded to the success of the asylum.

The completion of the new asylum marks the beginning of a new era in the management of the chronic insane in Winnebago county. This splendid building is an honor to the county. It is a monument to the humanitarianism, which is one of the chiefest glories of modern civilization. In every civilized country the Wisconsin method of caring for the chronic insane is being observed with interest. The building of this asylum places Winnebago county in the front rank of humane communities. There is not on this earth a state, province, principality or power that stands above Wisconsin in sympathy for the afflicted. The people of Wisconsin are not only willing, but eager to expend money in aiding the unfortunate victims of insanity. Theoretically our system is the best which has ever been proposed, to wit: large hospitals for the cure of the curable and small asylums for the care of the incurable. Practically this ideal has not been realized. Uninformed persons believe that in our state hospitals everything that can be done, is done for the care of the acutely insane. Such, however, is far from being the truth. There are important reforms which must be brought about in the methods of these "state hospitals" before they fulfill the noble purpose for which they were established. As now conducted, they are not hospitals, they are merely receptacles. The insane are simply corralled. There is no such thing as individual treatment. They are treated in bulk, by wholesale. When there is a recovery it is in spite of the surroundings: it is a happy accident.

Take the case of our own Northern Hospital. Here there are 600 patients. There are three physicians who are supposed to "treat" these 600 people. The superintendents of this "hospital" have usually been men of experience and ability, but much of the superintendent's time is taken up with correspondence, receiving officials and visitors, attending to numberless administrative details; so that it often happens that there are days, and even weeks, at a time when he never sees a patient. The "treatment" devolves largely upon the two assistants. Since this "hospital" was opened twenty-two years ago, there have been thirty-eight assistant physicians employed therein, an average term of service of about fourteen months. Nearly all of these assistants have been young gentlemen fresh from medical colleges-the ink hardly dry upon their diplomas. They have had no general practice; no special studies in mental diseases; no training in the marvelous science of psychiatry. No examinations as to their fitness have ever been required, the only requirement being that they should work for small wages. In their inexperience and ignorance they have been called upon to solve the most complex problems known to medical science, questions of life and death hanging upon their decisions. Restorations to family and society, or a life-long residence in an asylum, are the issues.

It is unnecessary to state that there is a constantly increasing burden of

chronic insanity being fastened upon the state. Instead of employing physicians who know next to nothing about insanity when they go into the state service, only those should be employed who are well posted in the management of that direful malady. The state boards-Republican and Democratic alike-have been guilty of a stupid and cruel, not to say criminal, parsimony in failing to supply abundant and skillful medical service for the helpless beings whose destinies they control. There is no actual economy in sparing expense in the treatment of the acutely insane. The disease is only curable in the earlier stages of its course. Every case that is discharged from a state hospital as chronic is a prospective loss to the public of \$5,000 to \$10,000. It will cost on an average \$3,000 to \$4,000 to care for the case until death comes. To this it is fair to add what the patient would have earned had he been restored to society, so that the actual money loss is as stated. If better service would cure only ten cases a year more than at present, the gain to the state would be in the end from \$50,000 to \$100,000 a year.

Of the 600 patients in the Northern "Hospital," it is absolutely certain that 400 of them will never recover. These 400 should be promptly sent to the several County Asylums, and then no expense should be spared in the effort to save the other two hundred before the curable stage has gone forever.

In the matter of the attendants who nurse and wait upon the insane, the state "hospitals" are, and always have been, antiquated concerns. No fact is better established in progressive modern hospital administration than the inestimable value of trained nurses. But trained nurses cost money—they come high—in Oshkosh, Milwaukee, and such cities they obtain from \$15 to \$30 a week, which is more than the nurses in the state hospitals get in a month. So the state patients do not get graduates of nurses' training schools to attend them. They get graduates from the farm, the street car barn, the sewing room or the shingle mill. The best results obtainable will never be reached until skilled nurses have charge of the patients.

The present reservoirs of insanity must be changed into genuine hospitals, where every acutely insane person will have as thorough, kindly and intelligent care as is now accorded cases of rheumatism, pneumonia, or typhoid fever, in a well regulated general hospital. There are many details of treatment which are of value in certain selected cases which it is impossible to apply under the deplorable herding methods now in operation. Massage is useful sometimes. The Turkish bath is a remedial agency which is frequently beneficial. The methods in vogue in water-cure sanitariums, such as the wet pack, etc., have great value in the cure of insanity. And yet there is not a decent bathroom in our great Northern "hospital." Asylum schools, for instance, have been demonstrated to have a positive and powerful influence in aiding the insane towards mental health. Who ever heard of a school in a Wisconsin "hospital?" Week after week, month after month, the wretched prisoners tramp aimlessly up and down the halls, or sit in gloomy apathy, devoured by their own wayward fancies. The discipline, the emulation, the intellectual stimulus of a good school are influential in dissipating delusions, in banishing melancholy.

Altogether too little attention is given to arousing and cultivating the intellectual faculties. With the limited number of physicians, it is impossible that it should be otherwise.

One of the most important truths established by recent medical research is that consumption is a contagious disease. Yet in our state institutions there are always cases of this scourge of humanity scattered through the buildings, jeopardizing the health of the attendants and other patients. There should be two wards, one for either sex, devoted exclusively to these dangerous cases. Or, better still, detached cottages should be built for their exclusive use. As it is, the over-crowded conditions render futile any feeble attempt at isolation. Epileptic patients ought not to be crowded into the halls and rooms with the non-epileptics. This is a matter of much importance.

The night treatment of the insane, as practiced in large asylums, is often cruel and injurious; it is always unscientific and mechanical. The night watchers, male and female, are armed with a bottle of chloral, or some other equally potent narcotic, and patients who are "restless" or "noisy" are slugged into silence with a dose of this overwhelming drug. It does not matter as to what makes the poor stricken sufferer "noisy." Corns or colic, backache or brainache, mania or melancholy, paralysis or paresis, the disturbed and disturbing patient is by the uneducated watcher knocked into silence by a dose or two from the bottle. The doctors are asleep, and quiet must be preserved. Gentlemen, I ask each of you for a moment to imagine your wife, or your mother, or your daughter, to have become suddenly insane. She is conveyed to the "hospital"-far from those who love her, from those whom she has loved. She is locked into a room, alone in the darkness. The weary hours drag by. She may become "nervous," perhaps hysterical. It may be that dreadful delusions dominate her disordered intellect, hideous hallucinations may mock and terrify her. In her loneliness and desolation, in her terror, in her unspeakable anguish, she shrieks and screams for help. What help does she get? The night watcher comes, and she gets a dose of "dope" out of the same old "dope bottle," and all is quiet. It is possible that a light, and the presence of kindly human faces, and some assuring words quietly spoken, or some cold water on her head, or a glass of hot milk, or a warm bath, or any of fifty things, would be better than the omnipotent chloral for the woe-worn woman. If ever mortal needs the healing hand of science, the skillful, the learned and discriminating ministrations of an appreciative physician, she needs it in that hour of fathomless distress. Every hospital should have a competent doctor and two or more skilled nurses on duty all night. They, and not the untutored night watchers, should treat the patients. I believe there would be less chronic insanity if this were the rule.

There are many details of treatment which ought to be used that need not be enumerated at this time. The overcrowded wards, the absurdly small number of physicians employed, prevent their execution. As they have always been managed, the state hospitals are responsible for a certain amount of the cbronic insanity which abounds. It is a fact which cannot be explained away, that numbers (no one knows how many) have been made permanently insame by their incarceration in these "hospitals," who would have recovered if they had been left at home. Such should not, need not, be the case, and will not be when these institutions are placed upon a rational basis; when they are no longer mathouses with keepers, but hospitals with nurses. The state authorities are deceiving confiding people who commit friends and relatives to these institutions with faith that the best treatment known will be accorded them.

The state of Wisconsin should cease playing a confidence game on the people. It is hoped that our legislature will thoroughly investigate the farcical treatment \uparrow of this most helpless and pitiable class of sufferers, and will then be enlightened, humane and liberal enough to make it what it ought to be.

There is no reason why Wisconsin should not have the best insane hospitals in the world, institutions in which everything that can be done will be done to rescue stricken humanity from the abysmal depths of chronic insanity, institutions that will be models for all civilized nations to imitate. But after all, when science has applied every helpful device which the wit of man has brought forth, there will still be a great number that will never recover. The recuperative powers have been exhausted, disease has produced organic changes which the art of the physician cannot remedy, chronic insanity has been established, and nothing remains but to guard and guide the unfortunate to the grave. But for those who have insane relatives above the sorrow and the pity of it all, there is a great consolation, a supreme hope. The mind itself has not been, cannot be diseased. It is a spiritual, an immaterial essence. It is indestructible; it is immortal. When the body of the poor lunatic is dead and dust, his soulhis liberated soul -- will wing its way along "the serene and shining pathway of the stars" to a far off happier and diviner shore. His memory will hold no trace of the darkened and melancholy past. In the golden radiance of the "eternal morning" his rehabilitated spirit will find peace. Permit me, gentlemen, in behalf the afflicted people whose guardians you are, to thank you for the enlightened kindness and liberality which has characterized all of your official actions. Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that there be appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated the sum of twenty-five dollars (525.00) from the county treasury, and the Chairman and Clerk of this County Board are hereby authorized and instructed to issue a county order for such an amount.

On motion, same referred to the special Committee on Workhouse.

SHADE TREES AT THE ASYLUM.

Supervisor Krueger submitted the following report on tree planting at the Asylum, which was accepted and made the special order for 9:30 A. M., November 21st.

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on trees for the County farm, respectfully submit the following report:

I have laid out driveways and walks around the Asylum and to and from the Wisconsin Central depot and the Poorhouse; all the driveways and walks have been graveled. The gravel was taken from the hill back of the Asylum, thereby establishing an even grade, with gradual slope from the Asylum building.

A park has been laid out in front of the Asylum. In this park and along the driveways and walks I have planted 500 forest and 200 evergreen trees; of the latter mentioned many have died, on account of the severe drouth.

There has been purchased and planted the following: 500 hardy apple trees (of which only two have died) 25 cherry and 25 pear trees.

Of small fruits, 1,200 raspberries, 104 gooseberries, 212 currants and 100 grape vines.

The amount expended is as follows:

making a deficiency of \$2.30 which will be made up by members of the Board. I would recommend an appropriation for the purchase of the following additional trees, shrubs and plants:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County. That there be and is hereby created a fund to be designated and known as the asylum fund, which fund shall be kept separate and distinct from all other funds in the county treasury. It shall be credited with all the sums of money received from the state and from other counties for the care of insane. Also for the care of our own county insane and poor, and all other revenues derived from whatever source, together with appropriations for the asylum and poor house as may

be made from time to time by the County Board, and shall be charged with all sums paid out for or on account of said asylum or poor house. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized and instructed to carry out the provisions of this resolution by keeping the asylum fund in the manner provided.

INDIGENT SOLDIER COMMISSION REPORT.

The clerk read the report from the Commission on Indigent Soldiers, which on motion by Supervisor Schoetz, was accepted and placed on file:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors:

GENTLEMEN: As President of the Indigent Soldiers and Sailors Commission of above county, I have the honor to submit our annual statement of allowance and disbursements for the twelve months beginning December 15, 1893, and ending with November 9, 1894.

We have held as usual one session in each month, finding it impossible to do justice to the claimants for aid and to the county, which has a right to expect due care and economy from all those who have control of any portion of its funds, should our sessions be restricted to the four months required by law. Changes are made in many cases each month, some of our beneficiaries drop ping off, or dropping out, and others wishing to join the rapidly vanishing army of the old veterans who are deserving of the aid so generously tendered by our state and county.

The number of those who have received more or less aid from the Soldiers' Fund, is distributed among the cities and towns as follows:

Quite a number of these have been assisted only temporarily, the average to those assisted more or less regularly being at the rate of about four dollars per month, with a little additional during the winter months.

Nine-tenths of the list have families, and it is hardly necessary to say, that the amount allowed will not begin to pay their rent, to say nothing of their subsistence, still they manage to get along, and the monthly pay day is as welcome to them as is Christmas to the rising generation.

Pensions come along slowly, the number of new allowances being about even with the death ratio among the veterans.

The statement of the Secretary shows that we have drawn for \$3,287 the past year. The allowance to be made in December is estimated at about \$300.00. This will exhaust the Soldiers' Fund practically.

It is the opinion of the Commission that the same provision should be made for the coming as in the past year, to wit, \$3,600.00.

On motion of Supervisor Loope the Board proceeded to an informal ballot for County Physician.

Supervisor Oellerich moved to include the name of Supervisor Schoetz, which was accepted by the mover, and resolution then adopted.

TO COLLECT BILLS FOR INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Supervisor Schoetz moved to instruct the Chairman and District Attorney to proceed to collect amounts paid Industrial Schools for care of children sent to such schools and actually belonging to other counties. Carried.

PURCHASE OF COUNTY MAP.

Supervisor Orchard introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the chairman of this Board be, and is hereby authorized and instructed to subscribe for one copy of H. W. Leach's new map of the city of Oshkosh, to be kept in the County Clerk's office for the benefit of the county. And the Chairman and County Clerk are hereby authorized to issue a county order for same when delivered.

On motion to adopt, and on call of ayes and noes, all voted aye except Supervisor Henry.

ADDITIONAL MEMBERS ON WORKHOUSE COMMITTEE.

Supervisor Schoetz moved to add two members, to wit: Supervisors Loope and Krueger to the Special Committee on Workhouse. Motion prevailed.

Supervisor Schoetz moved to increase the amount of salary to the janitor \$100. Supervisor Moore moved to make the consideration of the motion the special order for IO A. M. to-morrow. Carried.

Supervisor Orchard moved that when this Board adjourns they adjourn until 9 A. M. to-morrow. Carried.

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

School Superintendent Pederson being present read and submitted his annual report, which on motion of Supervisor Schoetz was accepted and ordered printed with the proceedings of the Board.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Another year of educational work has rolled by, and notwithstanding the presence of some serious drawbacks, the *progress* and *general* condition of the schools of the county have been *good*. The general peace in some districts has been somewhat disturbed by an attempt to enforce the laws of vaccination; however this law as far as I know has been enforced in all the towns of this county.

The supply of teachers has been much larger this year than last, and in some districts the school boards have reduced the wages to quite an extent. There are probably several reasons for these two facts; the most important one I believe is owing to the hard times.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

A teachers' institute was held at Winneconne last March. The number of teachers present was over one hundred, it being probably the largest Institute ever held in the county.

The meeting was a complete success, both socially and intellectually. The interest which Prof. Hewitt, of this city, inspired in the teachers, in the study of History was quite wonderful. He proved to them the value of History as a study, from a moral and practical standpoint over all other studies, with the possible exception of Arithmetic, Reading and Writing in the district schools.

I believe the study of History in the district schools has long been neglected for the less important study, Technical Grammar.

WINNECONNE HIGH SCHOOL.

The schools of the village of Winneconne have been reorganized, the districts of East and West side have been joined into one joint district, and an accredited high school, with a three years' course has been established. This change was accomplished after much work and personal opposition; however, the change has already been fruitful of good results. The schools are better graded; much better work has been accomplished by the teachers, and the attendance of the High school proper has been increased by at least 40 per cent., the tuition amounting to \$72 in 1893, as compared with——in 1892. Two new school houses have been built during the last year, one in the town of Utica, Pickett Station, and one in the town of Poygan; they are both fine buildings and a credit to the districts that built them.

COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT.

A strong movement is now in progress to have the next legislature change the time for the election of County Superintendent from fall to spring; the term lengthened from two to four years, and a salary commensurate with services rendered. This is a very desirable change indeed. The time of election should be changed so as to take the office out of politics as much as possible. The

term should be lengthened to give the officer an opportunity to carry out his work. To do this two years are not enough. It takes all of one year to get acquainted with the schools, and a superintendent cannot plan his work until he does this and knows what is needed. By the time his work is planned and he is ready to work in accordance therewith the two years have expired. In justice to the schools as well as to himself, he should complete his work, and another two years are needed for this purpose.

TOWNSHIP LIBRARY LAW.

The "Township Library Law" is in force in five different towns in this county. It is a law permitting the Town Treasurer of each town to withhold an amount equal to ten cents for each child of school age in the district; the amount with held varies from four to seven dollars for each district; this is a very small sum when compared with the amount of good these libraries do for the schools. I know from personal experience the value of these school libraries. I well remember while teaching in one of the schools of this county the Town Clerk brought us six new books, which was our share for the library that year. Among these books there were two, "The Life of Lincoln," and "The Boys of '76," in which the boys seemed to take special interest.

Every evening a dozen boys or girls would come to my desk and ask to borrow one of these books; one boy read the Life of Lincoln four different times in one week. The increased interest which was manifested in the History class after having read these books was marvelous. The effect upon the child from reading these books is three fold. They elevate the child morally, they inspire *patriotism* in the boys, and *last* but not *least*, they instill a *strong* desire to read good books.

It is my desire to have these school libraries in *every* town in this county, and I shall work strenuously with this end in view from now until next June, when the money for these libraries is generally apportioned to the several towns. I ask your personal interest, gentlemen, in assisting me to accomplish this work. I find that the town treasurers are rather reluctant in withholding the money unless advised to do so by their chairman.

CONCLUSION.

It is not enough for us to feel an interest in education, we must show it. We must not only talk and write, but we must act. We must be positive workers, such as encourage, sustain, support and give life to the cause. The crowning glory of our public schools is that they mix and blend the children of all nationalities, all social conditions, every political creed and religious faith, make them know and understand each other in early life, and mold them into American citizens, the future guardians of our great republic.

Supervisor Hamilton from Committee on Illegal Assessments submitted the following report, which, on motion to adopt, and on call of ayes and nays, was unanimously adopted:

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that they have had under consideration and examined, the several matters referred to them and report and recommend as follows:

First. The petition of M. M. Schoetz for cancellation of tax certificate No. 390, sale of 1890, on lot 8, block 33, in the city of Menasha, (of which he is the owner) for the reason that the owner of said lot had paid the tax to the City Treasurer and afterwards by mistake, or otherwise, returned the tax as unpaid. After examining the stub book of said Treasurer, showing payment of said tax, we are satisfied that the facts stated in the petition are true, and therefore recommend that said certificate be cancelled, and the petitioner be paid back the amount for the same to wit; \$6.17, and seven per cent, interest on the amount paid from October 8, 1890, the time of the assignment of said certificate to this date, to wit: \$2.26, in all the sum of \$8.43, and that the tax be charged back to the city of Menasha.

Second. Your committee have also examined the list of lands withheld from sale by the County Treasurer, because of indefinite and improper descriptions contained in the delinquent tax returns of the several cities and towns of the county for the year 1893, and the report of a committee appointed by this Board to examine said list and report is as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

The committee appointed by the County Board to examine the delinquent tax return of the several towns and cities for the year A. D., 1893, respectfully beg leave to report that after having examined said rolls they recommend to the County Treasurer to withhold from sale the following list of lots and lands which they deemed to be indefinitely or wrongfully described or not liable to be taxed as therein specified and which were withheld from sale by him as provided by section 1135 of the Revised Statutes.

MUNICIPAL COURT.

GENERAL ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

Supervisor Warwick from Committee on General Accounts submitted the following report, which was unanimously adopted.

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on General Accounts beg leave to report they have examined the following bills referred to them, and recommend that they be allowed, disallowed or disposed of as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed:

REPORT FROM ASYLUM BUILDING COMMITTEE.

Supervisor Loope, from Committee on New Asylum Building, submitted the following report which was unanimously adopted:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:

GENTLEMEN: The Asylum Building Committee desires to report that they have had on hand since last March the various details pertaining to the new county asylum, and have nearly completed their labors. There are a few details yet unfinished, but of minor importance. Our work has required considable time and attention, and necessarily some expense, which we believe is not greater than we could avoid.

Your committee believe that the Asylum as it stands complete is a lasting honor to Winnebago county, and a boon to the unfortunate persons who may be committed within its walls. We also have good reason for making the assertion that no more perfect institution of its kind exists in Wisconsin or elsewhere.

The generosity you have shown in the large sum you have voted for this purpose should redound to your credit, and while we have expended a large portion of this sum, we believe that not one dollar has gone for anything but a legitimate purpose. The county is to be congratulated upon the perfect working of the different plants in the Asylum, and the perfection of all details in its construction. We especially feel gratified that we secured an inexhaustible supply of water, thus relieving the county from continued expense by reason of drawing on the Northern Hospital for our supply. The well is 283 feet deep, 256 feet of which was drilled, and flows a stream four inches in diameter, which rises in the well, sixteen feet in diameter, to the height of ten to twelve feet.

The Asylum building is imposing and beautiful from outside, and we believe substantial and economical in its arrangement.

The item of fuel requisite to run such an institution is perhaps the greatest drawback in the expenses, but the committee has been unable to find any way to lessen it. The Asylum is provided with sufficient hose to reach all parts of the building, with connections ready in case of fire, and in addition to the right of pressure for fire purposes from the Northern Hospital, we have our own water supply to draw from, giving as complete fire protection as is possible to attain.

In addition to the other buildings we have erected a neat cottage for the engineer at a cost of \$1,100.

The Committee desires to express their appreciation of the efficient manner in which Architect Waters has aided them by suggestions and advice and the thoroughness he has shown in superintending the construction of the building.

We have tried to do our full duty and as your honorable body has been over the building and inspected it in detail we are content to await your judgment as to its adaptability for the purposes it was intended for.

We as a committee are proud of it and also feel a consciousness of having faithfully tried to so fashion and perfect it as to meet your approbation.

If we have accomplished this we are satisfied.

The bills paid by this County to above named school for the board and care, clothing of said three children amount to \$858.60, and further find that Harry Sawyer and Maggie Green were residents of Waupaca County. The bills paid the school for said Harry Sawyer and Maggie Green amount to \$157.44. I find upon the evidence that the above named children are residents of Outagamie and Waupaca Counties respectively, and recommend the above named amounts of \$558.60 be charged to Outagamie County and the amount of \$157.44 be charged to Waupaca County by the Clerk and the said Counties be notified and requested to cause to be repaid to this county for care of said children as specified above.

And that the Chairman and District Attorney be requested to see that the same be collected.

FOR APPROPRIATION TO TOWN OF WINCHESTER.

Supervisor Brightman, from town of Winchester, presented the following petition and report from Committee on Construction of Bridge in said town:

WHEREAS, The estimated cost of two iron bridges in the town of Winchester at one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), and

WHEREAS, The said bridges cost one thousand and seventy dollars (\$1,070.00), and

WORK HOUSE.

Supervisor J. T. Orchard, from the committee to whom was referred the drafting of a bill for the erection of a work house, presented its report, which was accepted and, on motion of Supervisor Loope, was made special order for 9 A. M. to-morrow.

Following is the report of the committee:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on the tramp question beg leave to report as follows:

The several committees from Winnebago, Outagamie, Fond du Lac and Sheboygan Counties, met at the City Hall, in the city of Oshkosh, on the 11th day of December, 1894, and organized by electing Chas. Oellerich Chairman, and David Whitten, of Fond du Lac County, Secretary.

After discussing the matter thoroughly there was a sub-committee appointed to draft a bill to be presented to the legislature.

The several committees met again at the Court House in the city of Fond du Lac on January 2, 1895.

All of the above counties considered the bill as presented by the subcommittee, and approved the same, which is herewith presented to your honorable body as a part of their report.

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A WORKHOUSE BY ANY TWO OR MORE COUNTIES OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enacl as follows: SECTION 1.—Authority is hereby conferred upon, and powers in conformity therewith granted to, any two or more counties in the State, jointly to establish, erect and maintain, for the uses and purposes hereinafter specified, an institution called a workhouse.

SECTION 2.—The county boards of two or more counties may by resolution duly passed at a regular meeting, provide for the establishment, erection and maintenance of a workhouse jointly, and authorize the purchase jointly with such other counties of lands necessary for the purpose of erecting such workhouse. The expenses necessary for the purchase of land and the erection and construction of the workhouses shall be borne by the counties interested in the establishing of such workhouse, same to be apportioned according to the assessed valuation of each county so interested; and such apportionment shall be raised by tax levy in accordance with the provisions made for levying and raising of other county taxes.

SECTION 3.—The location of any such workhouse shall be determined by the commissioners elected by the several county boards of the counties who shall have voted to unite for such establishment; and such workhouse shall be located by them, at their first annual meeting, or as soon thereafter as possible, at such place within any one of said counties so united, as shall be most suitable and accessible for such purpose.

SECTION 4.—Such workhouse shall be under the control, supervision and management of a board of commissioners, composed, when more than two counties unite in such action, of one supervisor of each county, duly elected by the county board of each county so interested, at the next November session, or at a special meeting called for that purpose, by a majority of the members of the county boards of each county so interested, next succeeding the passage of this act. In case only two counties participate, then and in that case the board of commissioners shall consist of four supervisors, duly elected as hereinbefore mentioned. two commissioners from each county interested. The commissioner first elected by the county in which said workhouse is located shall be the president of said board. After the election and formation of said board, said commissioners shall meet on the first Monday in December next succeeding their election, which shall be termed the annual meeting, for the purpose of electing one of said commissioners to act as secretary of said board; and also elect a treasurer, who need not be a member of the board, who shall be a resident of the county wherein said workhouse is located, and who shall receive as compensation for the services so rendered not to exceed the sum of two hundred dollars per annum. Said treasurer shall, before assuming the duties of his office, give to the commisioners a bond in such sum as the commissioners may direct, with sureties to be approved by them, conditioned that he will faithfully execute the duties of his office and account to said commissioners for all moneys received by him as such treasurer; said treasurer to make a monthly report to said commissioners, or oftener if desired by them. At said first annual meeting of the board of commissioners, their term of office shall be determined by lot, in the following manner: If the board consists of three commissioners only, in that case one is to hold his office for the term of one year, another for the term of two years, and the other for the term of three years; and thereafter all commissioners shall be elected for three years.

In case the board consists of more than three commissioners, the term of their respective office shall be determined by lot; no term to exceed three years. Said board of commissioners shall appoint one inspector for said workhouse, who shall be the principal keeper of said workhouse, and who shall hold his office for the term of one year, commencing on the first Monday of January succeeding his appointment, unless sooner removed by said commissioners for incompetency, improper conduct, or other cause satisfactory to said commissioners. The cause of such removal shall be particularly assigned in writing and entered upon the minutes of said commissioners, with ayes and noes upon the adoption of the vote for such removal. Said inspector shall be elected at the annual meeting of said commissioners, which is to be held on the first Monday of December of each year, at a salary not to exceed two thousand dollars per annum, which said amount shall be determined by the commissioners, and such salary shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which he shall be elected. In case of any vacancy occurring in the office of such inspector at any time, from any cause, such vacancy may be filled by appointment by said commissioners for the residue of the term. Said inspector shall, before entering upon the discharge of his duties as such, give to the commissioners a bond in such sum as the commissioners shall direct, with sureties to be approved by them, conditioned that he will faithfully execute the duties of his office and comply on his part with all such regulations, rules and by-laws as shall be prescribed or established by said commissioners for the government, management and discipline of said workhouse, and of the persons who may be confined therein. The inspector shall have the charge and control of said workhouse and of the persons confined therein, subject to such rules, by-laws and regulations as may be prescribed by said commissioners. He shall appoint and be responsible for the acts of all necessary assistants under him, subject to the power of said commissioners, to prescribe the number of such assistants and the duties to

be performed by them. The salary and compensation of said inspector and all assistants appointed by him shall be paid upon an order issued by the chairman of said board of commissioners, and countersigned by the clerk of said commissioners out of a fund for that purpose previously created, at such times as said commissioners shall direct; and said commissioners shall also have the power to fix the compensation to be paid all such assistants.

The members of the first board so elected shall constitute a constructive committee. They are hereby empowered to advertise for and adopt plans and specifications for the erection of a workhouse, and upon the adoption of any one of the plans so submitted to said commissioners they shall have full authority to advertise for bids and let the contract for the erection and construction of said workhouse, and the erection of the necessary out buildings, and to do all things necessary in completing the erection of said workhouse and suitable outhouses, yard and appurtenances, in the procuring of the necessary furniture and fixtures, and other things in and about the same. The amount to be expended for the purchase of a site for and in the erection and construction of such workhouse not to exceed seventy-five thousand dollars, shall be first determined by the respective boards of supervisors of each county jointly interested, at a regular meeting and by resolution duly passed. Said commissioners, before entering upon their duties as commissioners, and after taking the constitutional oath of office, shal, severally file in the office of the county treasurer of their respective counties a bond to the said county, executed by themselves severally, with two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the board of supervisors, in such an amount as shall previously have been determined by the respective boards of supervisors, and conditioned for the full and faithful performance of their duties as such commissioners, and the accounting to said board of supervisors at each annual meeting, and oftener if required by them, for all moneys received by them as such commissioners. The commissioners elected under the provisions of this act shall receive for each day actually employed in the discharge of their duties three dollars, and six cents a mile for each mile necessarily traveled in the discharge of the same.

SECTION 5.—Said workhouse when so erected shall be used for the safe keeping, reformation and employment of male vagrants, tramps, disorderly persons, and all male prisoners under sentence or conviction for a crime or misdemeanor who would otherwise be sentenced to be imprisoned at hard labor in the state prison for any term not exceeding two years; and all male persons sentenced and convicted in the courts of said respective counties interested jointly in said workhouse, and in city prosecutious, and in other cases (except for contempt) who would otherwise be sentenced or committed to imprisonment in the county jail, may be sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor in the workhouse so established, erected, and maintained jointly by the counties interested.

SECTION 6.—Whenever the said workhouse shall, in the opinion of the board of commissioners, be completed to insure the safe confinement and employment therein of persons intended to be confined therein, they shall make triplicate determinations thereof under their hands and seals; one of which they shall file with the office of the clerk of the circuit court of each respective county; one other they shall file with the clerk of each county, with instructions to said county clerks to send certified copies thereof to each justice of the peace, police magistrate, court commissioner and judges of circuit and county courts of their respective counties, within five days after receipt of said determination; and the other they shall cause to be published in several newspapers published in their respective counties.

SECTION 7 .-- Said board of supervisors of the respective counties so united for the purpose of erecting a workhouse, are hereby authorized to borrow from time to time on the credit of the county, such sum or sums of money as shall be necessary to defray proportionately the expenses of procuring the site and completing the erection of said workhouse, suitable outhouses, yard and appurtenances, and procuring the necessary furniture, fixtures and other things in and about the same; and the said board of supervisors of each county is hereby authorized and required to levy and collect a sum sufficient to repay the principal sum so borrowed, in not more than twenty equal annual installments, and also the interest that shall become due on the same, and the expenses of maintaining said workhouse over and above all receipts for the labor of persons confined therein, audited by the commissioners and approved by the board of supervisors of each county, which shall be levied and collected in the same manner as other county charges are levied and collected; and the said board of supervisors, or the county treasurer under their direction, shall from time to time pay such drafts or orders as may be drawn by said commissioners for the cost of said site and the erection and maintaining of said workhouse, not exceeding the amount at which said cost may have been fixed by the concerted action of the counties united for that purpose, and amounts properly

audited by said commissioners for maintaining and conducting the same. The county chairman and clerk of said counties, under the direction of said board of supervisors, may execute to the person or persons from whom such moneys may be borrowed, such bond or bonds for the repayment thereof as may be necessary or proper; which bonds shall be binding upon said counties, and shall draw interest at the rate of per centum per annum.

SECTION 8.—The expense of conducting and maintaining said workhouse, after its completion by the several counties united for such purpose, is to be apportioned according to the number of persons convicted and sentenced to such workhouse by each respective county at the rate of not to exceeddollars per capita of such persons so committed. If any profits should arise from any work done and performed in and about said workhouse, over and above the amount necessary for the conducting and maintaining of said workhouse, the same shall also be apportioned according to the number of persons sentenced by each county jointly interested in said workhouse.

SECTION 9 .- Any officer receiving the commitment of any prisoner upon a sentence to such workhouse from any judge, magistrate, court commissioner or justices of the peace from their county so interested in said workhouse, shall convey such prisoner to the workhouse as directed, as soon as may be after such conviction and sentence shall have been had, and after delivering such prisoner to the inspector of said workhouse, together with a copy of the certificate of conviction of the court ordering such imprisonment, the inspector, or his assistant in charge, shall deliver to such officer a receipt, acknowledging having received the prisoner; said receipt shall contain the date, name of the prisoner, the number of the commitment, the term of his imprisonment, the name of the officer by whom delivered, and be signed by the inspector or his deputy. The officer receiving said receipt shall file the same in the office of the county clerk of the county where said prisoner was convicted and sentenced, within twenty-four hours after his return from said workhouse; and such officer shall receive as fees ten cents per mile going and returning, but such officer shall not be entitled to more than one fee as prescribed herein for any one trip. In addition he shall receive five cents per mile transportation for each prisoner taken and delivered by him to said inspector, which fees so prescribed shall be in lieu of all compensation in each case for such services.

SECTION 10.—The inspector of said workhouse shall keep an accurate account of all persons so received by him for safe keeping, confinement and employment, and shall on the first day of each and every month render a report to said commissioners, enumerating the number of persons received, giving the date when received, their name, age, place of residence, in what court convicted, by whom sentenced, crime charged, and when discharged, died or escaped. All commitments and certificates of conviction received by the inspector shall be numbered, filed and recorded.

SECTION 11.—From and atter the passage and publication of this act, all sentences to imprisonment within county jails of counties adjoining any one county having an established workhouse under the provisions of this act may, on discretion of the court, make such sentence to be executed at such workhouse; and for this purpose the said workhouse is hereby declared to be a part of the county jail of each of said adjoining counties who make use of the authority granted them herewith.

- SECTION 13.—The provisions of this act shall not be construed as binding upon the counties uniting for the purpose of establishing a workhouse, except when the commissioners of said workhouse shall consent thereto.

SECTION 14.—All justices of the peace, police magistrates, municipal, circuit and county courts having criminal jurisdiction, shall have power to sentence prisoners to said workhouse.

SECTION 15.—This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A MUNICIPAL COURT IN WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

The People of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows: Section One-Its Jurisdiction.

A municipal court for the cities of Neenah and Menasha and County of Winnebago, is hereby established under the name of the Municipal Court of the Cities of Neenah and Menasha and County of Winnebago.

Said court shall be a court of record, and have a clerk and seal with suifable device, to be procured under the direction of the judge thereof, at the expense of the cities of Neenah and Menasha.

Said court has and may exercise powers and jurisdiction equal and concurrent with the circuit court of Winnebago County, in all cases of crimes and misdemeanors arising in said county, except murder, and except where the person accused shall demand in writing as hereinalter provided, to be tried in said circuit court.

Such jurisdiction shall include the right to try and determine all appeals to such court in criminal cases, from justices of the peace in said county; and the party appealing may, at his option, appeal to the county court of said county or to said municipal court of the said cities of Neenah and Menasha or to the municipal court of the City of Oshkosh and County of Winnebago.

Said court shall also exercise powers and jurisdiction in all civil actions within the County of Winnebago, State of Wisconsin, in law and equity concurrent with and equal to the jurisdiction of the circuit court of Winnebago County, where the value of the property in controversy, or amount of money claimed or sought to be recovered after deducting all payments and set offs, shall not exceed the sum of twenty thousand dollars; and also of all actions for the foreclosure of mortgages, in which the amount claimed does not exceed the sum aforesaid, although the value of the property to be affected by the judgment exceeds that sum. No justice of the peace or court commissioner within said cities of Neenah and Menasha shall exercise any jurisdiction in criminal or bastardy cases, but all such jurisdiction is vested in the judge of said court, and all examinations, recognizances, and commitments from said judge, and the other justices of the peace of said county in criminal cases (except murder) and in bastardy cases shall be certified and returned to said municipal court, or the municipal court of the City of Oshkosh and Winnebago County, instead of said circuit court, at or before the time fixed for the appearance of the accused; and the accused and all witnesses required to attend shall be committed to be brought, or recognized to appear, before said municipal court on a day certain, not more than thirty days from the date of such commitment or recognizance.

The judgments of said municipal court, in criminal cases tried upon information or upon appeal, and its judgments and orders in civil actions and proceedings, wherein a justice of the peace would not have jurisdiction, may be reviewed by the supreme court in the same manner as like judgments of the circuit court may be; and all judgments originally rendered by said court or the judge thereof, in civil or criminal cases, of which justices of the peace have jurisdiction, may be appealed to and tried by the county court of said county in the same manner as like judgments rendered by justices of the peace.

Section Two-Laws applicable to circuit court to apply. Change of venue. Processes in civil and criminal cases, how executed.

The general provisions of law which at any time may be in force relative to circuit courts, in actions and proceedings therein in civil and criminal cases, shall relate also to said municipal court, unless inapplicable, and the rules of practice prescribed by the justices of the supreme court for circuit courts shall be in force in said municipal court, and its rules of practice and proceedings shall conform as near as practicable to the rules and practice of circuit courts, but the laws of the state relative to changes of venue in criminal examinations and trials shall not apply to said court or the judge thereof.

But any person charged upon information of a criminal offense may, at any time before a jury is drawn for the purpose of a trial in said court, obtain a change of venue to the circuit court of said Winnebago County upon making an affidavit that he believes that he cannot obtain a fair and impartial trial in said municipal court, and thereupon the said municipal court shall commit or hold the party to bail to appear at the next term of said circuit court, as upon examinations, and the judge thereof, under the seal of said court, shall transmit all the papers and a copy of the records of the proceedings in such cause, properly certified to be such to said circuit court, which shall then proceed to hear and determine the same: and all recognizances, previously given in such cases and returned to said municipal court may be enforced by said circuit court as fully as if they had originally run and been certified and returned thereto. Provided that civil cases appealed or certified to said court shall stand for trial at the next regular term of said court, after the filing of the papers in such cases in said court without notice when such terms shall be held as hereinafter provided, and when such terms are not held, any party may bring any such case to trial at any time after the filing of the papers in such case, by thereafter giving the opposite party ten days notice in writing of the day on which said case will be moved for trial, and when such notice shall be given by a party, the opposite party may move such case on the day named without having given a notice.

Such notice may be served on the party or his attorney, if an attorney of record shall have appeared in the justice court, or in said municipal court in such cases, in the same manner as now provided by law for serving notices of trial in the circuit court.

Whenever any such case is continued for any cause, it shall be to the next term of said court when terms are held, and when not to a time to be fixed by said court, and when any such case has been continued it need not again be noticed for trial.

Said court shall have power and authority to issue all processes necessary to carry into effect its jurisdiction, which process shall in substance be the same, when applicable, as used in circuit courts; or shall be as directed by the judge thereof.

Processes issued by said court, its judge or clerk, in civil or criminal cases may be executed in any part of the state by the officer to whom it is addressed.

The sheriffs of Winnebago county may execute all sentences and judgments of said court.

Section Three-Judge vested with powers of Justice of the Peace.

The municipal judge, in addition to the powers vested in the municipal court as aforesaid, is vested with all the powers and jurisdiction of a justice of the peace in said county in criminal actions and proceedings, and jurisdiction of all prosecutions for breach of any ordinance or by-law of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, and also with all the powers and jurisdiction of justices of the peace in said county, in civil actions and proceedings, and also power to hear and determine any such case, although the title to land may come in question therein: and to exercise such jurisdiction, shall hold the municipal court as courts are held by justices of the peace.

The general provisions of law relative to civil and criminal actions before justices of the peace shall apply to said court so far as applicable. Appeals from judgments rendered in said court in civil and criminal actions, of which a justice of the peace would have jurisdiction, shall be taken to the county court of Winnebago county, in the same manner as appeals from judgments of justices of the peace in similar actions. Said judge shall open court each morning (Sundays and legal holidays excepted), and hear and dispose of in a summary way, all cases for violations of the ordinances and by-laws of said cities of Neenah and Menasha, which shall be brought before him by police officers or otherwise, either with or without process.

Proceedings therein shall be in the forms as directed by the judge of said court, and the city attorneys shall be the prosecuting officers in all actions for violations of ordinances or by-laws of the said cities of Neenah and Menasha. All provisions of the charter and ordinances of the cities of Neenah and Menasha relating to justices of the peace or to criminal prosecution shall be held applicable to said municipal court.

Section Four-Election of judge, vacancy, court commissioner may hold court.

The qualified electors of the county of Winnebago shall, on the first Tuesday of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five and on the same day of the same month each six years thereafter, elect a suitable person, who shall be an attorney of a court of record, to the office of judge of said municipal court to be called Municipal Judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years from the third Monday in April next succeeding his election, and until his successor is elected and qualified, and who may be removed from office in the manner provided in the constitution for the removal of supreme and circuit judges. Whenever a

vacancy shall happen in the office of such judge, the Governor shall appoint to fill the same until a successor is elected. Elections to fill the vacancy, for the residue of the term only, shall be held as provided by Section Eighty-eight for other judges and notice thereof shall be given by the sheriff of Winnebago County in the same manner as for election of county officers. All such elections shall be held and conducted, and the votes cast thereat shall be returned and canvassed and a certificate shall be given in all respects as is provided by law in case of the election of county judges.

Said judge, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed in the constitution, which shall be filed in the offices of the city clerks of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, and a duplicate oath in the office of the clerk of the circuit court of Winnebago County.

In case of the absence, sickness, temporary disability or press of business at a regular term of said court, said judge may, by order in writing to be filed in said court, appoint a court commissioner of the circuit court of said county, to discharge the duties of such judge, during such absence, sickness, disability or press of business at a regular term, who shall have all the powers of such judge while administering such office, in all actions or proceedings civil or criminal in said court within the jurisdiction of a justice of the peace, and such court commissioner shall receive for his services five dollars per day to be paid as the salary of said judge is paid.

Section Five-Clerk. Judge may appoint. His duties.

Said judge shall appoint in writing a clerk of said court, who before entering upon his duties shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed in the constitution; which appointment and oath shall be filed in the offices of the city clerks of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, and a duplicate thereof in the office of the clerk of the circuit court of Winnebago county.

He shall make and keep the records of said court, and perform all the ministerial acts required of him, by and under the direction of the judge. He shall have power to administer oaths and take bail in the absence of the judge, subject to his revision. He may examine on oath all persons applying for warrants, may reduce their examination to writing and file the same, and may issue all warrants and other processes from said court. He shall procure under the direction of said judge all necessary record books, blanks, stationery, lights and fuel for said court at the expense of the cities of Neenah and Menasha. Said clerk, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall make and file with the city clerks of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, a bond with two good and sufficient sureties, to be approved of by the common council of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, conditioned to pay to each and every person who may be entitled thereto, all such sums of money or moneys which may come into his hands by virtue of his office. The clerk of said court shall have the custody and care of all books, papers and records of the court, and shall be present at all times unless absent from sickness or by the consent of the judge, who shall in such case appoint some person temporarily in his place, and in case of a vacancy the judge may appoint some person for the residue of the term.

The clerk may swear all witnesses and jurors, and may administer oaths and take and certify acknowledgements of deeds and other instruments required to be acknowledged. He shall keep minutes of all proceedings, enter the judgments, and make up and keep the records of said court; shall issue all processes under his hand and the seal of the court, shall attest them in the name of the judge, signing himself Clerk of the Municipal Court; tax costs, and when the court is not in session shall have power to take bail for the appearance of any person under arrest before the court, subject to the revision of the court.

The clerk of said court shall keep a full and complete record and account, in a book to be furnished as the other records and books of said court are furnished, of all fees and costs received by said judge or clerk, in such manner as that such record shall show the exact amount paid, by whom, at what time, and on what account, and if paid in any case, what case; said clerk shall make a duplicate certificate showing the same facts, and file one with the county clerk of Winnebago county, and one with the city clerks of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, at the end of each month,

Section Six-Court, where to be held. Fines and costs to be paid to county and city. Said municipal court shall be held at the cities of Neenah and Menasha in some suitable place to be provided and suitably furnished by said cities. All the fines, costs and penalties collected in criminal cases shall be immediately paid by said citers of said court to the treasurer of the County of Winnebago, on the first of each and every month, and shall be by said county treasurer annually accounted for at the time said cities shall pay over to him

their proportion of county taxes. All fines collected in city prosecutions shall be on the first of each and every month paid by said clerk to the city treasurers of the cities of Neenah and Menasha respectively. At the time of payment of taxes to the county treasurer such county shall pay to said cities respectively two-thirds of all sums paid for records, books, stationery, office furniture, lights and fuel and other expenses of the court.

Section Seven-Terms of court. Jury how obtained.

Said judge may, if he deem it best, by order in writing filed in said court, direct terms to be held for the trial of civil business and of offences on which informations may be filed, and of appeals from justices of the peace in criminal cases, not exceeding four terms in any one year. When such terms are ordered, the clerk of said court in the presence of the judge, at least three days before such term, shall draw from the persons selected as hereinafter provided to serve as jurors therein, thirty-six jurors for such term, and shall issue a venire to summon them as such. If no such terms are ordered, the judge shall fix a particular day for the trial of criminal cases mentioned in this section, not more than twenty days after the day fixed in the recognizance or commitment for the appearance of the accused, or after the filing of the return on appeals.

And the jury shall be drawn in open court in the presence of the defendant and prosecuting officer, at least two days before the day fixed for trial in the following manner: The clerk shall draw in the presence of the judge from a box containing the names of all the persons furnished as hereinafter provided, twelve names. Each party may, alternately beginning with the prosecution, object to a name drawn, not more than six in all on each side, and as soon as any name is objected to the clerk shall draw another, the twelve remaining after such objections are made or waived shall be summoned as jurors in such cases.

In all actions, civil or criminal, before such judge wherein a justice of the peace would have jurisdiction, jurors may be drawn and summoned as now provided for drawing and summoning jur.rs in justice courts. The day for trial may be adjourned from time to time in the discretion of the court. If any person thus drawn can not be summoned or be excused, or be set aside as incompetent, another name may be drawn from said list to supply his place, who shall be summoned in like manner; or the judge may direct the issuing of a venire to said sheriff or other officer of said court to summon the necessary jurors to complete the panel from said county at large.

Section Eight-Jury list. Jurors', witnesses' and officers' fees.

At least two weeks before each term of said court the judge and clerk shall select from the residents of the county qualified to act as jurors in the circuit court, fifty persons to serve as jurors in said court for such terms; but if such jury shall not be selected at such time, it may be selected at any time before the commencement of such terms and such judge and clerk shall make a list of the names of all persons so selected, signing the same, and forthwith filing such list with the clerk of said court. Such jury shall not be irregular or illegal if persons se selected in good faith, who are not qualified; but the names of such persons shall be stricken thereform.

A jury trial in said court may be waived in writing by both parties or by consent in open court entered in the minutes.

The fees of said judge, witnesses, jurors, sheriffs or other officers shall be the same in civil and criminal cases cognizable before a justice of the peace, as now provided by law.

In all other cases the fees of witnesses, jurors, sheriffs, reporter, interpreter or other officers shall be the same as now provided by law in circuit courts of this state, and shall be paid in the same manner. The clerk of said municipal court shall make out a certificate, under the seal of said court, to each juror, witness, interpreter, reporter or other officer entitled to compensation for actual attendance upon said court, and every such certificate shall be receipted for by the person in whose favor it shall be drawn, and thereupon the county treasurer shall pay the amount thereof out of the county treasury.

Section Nine-Salary of judge and how paid. Costs and fees. How disposed of.

The salary of the judge of said municipal court shall be the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars per annum, to be paid in quarter-yearly installments out of the treasury of said County of Winnebago.

The said sum of two thousand five hundred dollars shall be in full for all services rendered by said judge and the clerk of said municipal court. The said judge or clerk is authorized to tax and collect fees as follows: for all services rendered by him in civil and criminal actions when exercising the powers of a justice of the peace the fees allowed to justices of the peace as now provided by law. In all other actions both civil and criminal in said court the fees and costs to be the same as prescribed for the circuit courts of this state, and the said

costs in all such civil actions may be taxed by the clerk and inserted in the judgment in the manner now provided in circuit courts, and the clerk shall be entitled to the same fees as the clerk of the circuit courts and all costs collected in civil cases in said court and all costs imposed and collected in criminal cases arising under the laws of the state shall be paid into the county treasury, and all costs imposed and collected in cases arising under the charter and ordinances of said cities of Neenah and Menasha shall be paid into said city treasuries respectively. The clerk of said court shall keep an accurate statement of all such costs and fees thus collected, and file the same in the county clerk's office at the first of each month, under his hand and seal of said court, and shall at the same time pay over all mores provided for in this act. The common councils of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, with the concurrence of the county board of the County of Winnebago, may in their discretion fix a salary for the clerk of said municipal court exclusive of the two thousand five hundred dollars per annum paid to said judge. Said salary not to exceed the sum of six hundred dollars per annum paid to said judge.

Section Ten-The sheriff and other officers to be officers of court.

The sheriffs of Winnebago County and chiefs of police and all policemen of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, and all constables of the County of Winnebago, shall be officers of said court and may serve its processes and carry into effect its lawful orders and judgments.

Section Eleven-Judge may appoint reporter.

The judge of said court may appoint, and from time to time remove, a phonographic reporter for said court, skilled in the art of short-hand, who shall take and subscribe the oath of office in the constitution, and who shall be furnished with all necessary stationery, and shall attend only when required by said judge, and perform such duties as he may require. Such judge shall fix his compensation, not exceeding ten dollars for each day, and five dollars for each half day that he shall attend, and which shall be in full compensation for his services and for making such transcripts of his short-hand notes of any charge of the court required by it or the judge; and who shall lurnish to and may charge persons requiring them like transcripts at a price not exceeding five cents per folio. He shall make the like transcript required by the court to be filed therein, and shall be paid therefor the like sum, which sum together with his per diem compensation shall be paid in the same manner as the other expenses of the court are paid.

Section Twelve-Clerk may adjourn court.

In the absence or disability of the judge of said court, the clerk of said court may adjourn the same in the manner now provided by law for the adjournment of circuit courts.

Section Thirteen-Use of county jail.

The use of the common jail of Winnebago county is granted to said court for the confinement of all persons committed to it for contempt or otherwise, and every such person shall be delivered to the sheriff of such county, who shall confine him in such jail until discharged according to law.

Section Fourteen-Lien of Judgments.

All judgments rendered in said court and docketed, as prescribed by law, in the office of the clerk of said court, shall be a lien on the real property in said county of Winnebago, and every person against whom the same shall be so rendered or docketed, or which he shall at any time thereafter acquire, for ten years from the time of docketing the same. Transcripts of the docket of such judgments may be filed and docketed in the office of the clerk of the circuit court of this state, with the same force and effect as constituting a lien upon real estate that judgments rendered and docketed in circuit courts have by law.

Section Fifteen-Suit Tax. Clerks' Fees.

Except in civil action wherein justices of the peace would have jurisdiction, the sum of one dollar shall be paid by the plaintiff at the commencement of each suit in said court as a suit tax to be applied towards the salary of the judge. And at the same time there shall be paid to the clerk of said court upon the filing of the original papers in any suit or proceeding in said court upon appeal coming from inferior courts, acbitrators, commissioners and referees, or upon a charge of venue from some other court, except in criminal cases, the sum of two dollars in addition to the suit tax now required to be paid, which sum shall apply on the clerk's fees in such case.

Section Sixteen-Jurisdiction of other courts not interfered with.

Nothing in this act shall be construed in any manner affecting the right or jurisdiction of any court, judge, justice of the peace or police justice to hear, try and determine any cause

now pending in such court, or before such judge, justice of the peace or police justice, or which may be commenced before the judge of said municipal court shall enter upon the duties of his office.

Section Seventeen.

The judge of said court may hold court in either the city of Neenah or the city of Menasha, as he may deem best, consistent with the business before said court.

Section Eighteen.

This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES.

Supervisor Schoetz presented the following report memorializing the legislature to amend the law relating to hotels and boarding houses, which, on motion, was accepted:

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION I, CHAPTER 251, OF THE LAWS OF 1889, IN RE-LATION TO HOTELS, INNS AND BOARDING HOUSES.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1, of Chapter 251, is hereby amended by striking out the following:

Any person who shall put up at any hotel, inn or boarding house, and shall procure any food, entertainment, or accommodation, without paying therefor, except their credit by express agreement, with intent to cheat or defraud the owners or keepers of such hotel, inn, or boarding house out of the pay for the same, "or if" and by inserting the word "who" after the word "person" in the seventh line, so that said section when so amended shall read as follows:

Any person who shall obtain credit at any hotel, inn, or boarding house, for food, entertainment, or accommodation, by means of any false show of baggage or effects brought thereto, or who shall with s ich intent remove or cause to be removed any baggage or effects from any hotel, inn, or boarding house while there is a lien existing thereon for the proper charges, due from h m for board and entertainment furnished as aforesaid, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100,00), or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding three months.

SECTION 2.—This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

Supervisor Hamilton moved to amend by instructing the Board of Supervisors to memorialize the legislature to repeal the law of which the above is a proposed amendment.

The amendment was accepted, and, on motion, the memorial was then adopted as amended.

APPROPRIATION TO REFUND TO COUNTY CLERK.

To the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Your Finance Committee find that the County Clerk Jas. P. Rasmusen has overpaid the County Treasurer the sum of sixty-five dollars and ninety cents (\$65.90), and that there is due the County from said Clerk the sum of four dollars (\$4.00), the same being errors in footings, therefore,

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the Chairman and incoming Clerk be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to draw a county order for sixty-one and 90-100 dollars in favor of Jas. P. Rasmusen to balance said account.

MUNICIPAL COURT FOR CITIES OF OSHKOSH, NEENAH AND MENASHA AND WINNE

Supervisor Oellerich. from special committee on laws and amendments, pesented the following report, and asked-leave for City Attorney H. I. Weed of Oshkosh, to read the bill as prepared by the committee. Leave being gented, the bill was read, and on motion of Supervisor Schoetz the consideration of the same was made special order for 10 o'clock A. M. to-morrow.

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A SUPERIOR COURT IN WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

The People of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows: Section One-Its Jurisdiction.

A Superior court for the city of Oshkosh and County of Winnebago, is hereby established under the name of the Superior Court of the City of Oshkosh and County of Winnebago.

Said Court shall be a court of record, and have a clerk and seal with suitable device, to be procured under the direction of the judge thereof, at the expense of the City of Oshkosh.

Said court has and may exercise powers and jurisdiction equal and concurrent with the Circuit Court of Winnebago County, in all cases of crimes and misdemeanors arising in said county except murder, and except where the person accused shall demand in writing as hereinalter provided, to be tried in said Circuit Court.

Such jurisdiction shall include the right to try and determine all appeals to such Court in criminal cases, from justices of the peace in said county; and the party appealing may, at his option, appeal to the County Court of said county, or to the Municipal Court of the cities of Neenah and Menasha and County of Winnebago.

Said Court shall also exercise powers and jurisdiction in all civil actions within the County of Winnehago, State of Wisconsin, in law and equity concurrent and equal to the jurisdiction of the circuit court of Winnehago County where the value of the property in controversy, or amount of money claimed or sought to be recovered after deducting all payments and set offs, shall not exceed the sum of twenty thousand dollars; and also of all actions for the foreclosure of mortgages, in which the amount claimed does not exceed the sum aforesaid, although the value of the property to be affected by the judgment exceeds that sum.

No justice of the peace or court commissioner within said city of Oshkosh, shall exercise any jurisdiction in criminal or bastardy cases, but all such jurisdiction is vested in the judge of said court, and all examinations, recognizances, and commitments from said judge, and the other justices of the peace of said county in criminal cases (except murder) and in bastardy cases, shall be certified and returned to said superior court, or the municipal court of the cities of Neenah and Menasha, and Winnebago County, instead of said circuit court, at or before the time fixed for the appearance of the accused, and the accused and all witnesses required to attend shall be committed to be brought, or recognized to appear, before said superior court on a day certain, not more than thirty days from the date of such commitment or recognizance.

The judgments of said superior court, in criminal cases tried upon information or upon appeal, and its judgments and orders in civil actions and proceedings wherein a justice of the peace would not have jurisdiction, may be reviewed by the supreme court in the same manner as like judgments of the circuit court may be; and all judgments originally rendered by said court or the judge thereof, in civil or criminal cases, of which justices of the peace have jurisdiction, may be appealed to and tried by the county court of said county in the same manner as like judgments rendered by justices of the peace.

Section Two-Laws applicable to circuit court to apply. Change of venue. Processes in civil and criminal cases, how executed.

The general provisions of law which at any time may be in force relative to circuit courts, in actions and proceedings therein in civil and criminal cases, shall relate also to said superior court, unless inapplicable, and the rules of practice prescribed by the justices of the supreme court for circuit courts shall be in force in said superior court, and its rules of practice and proceeding shall conform as near as practicable to the rules and practice of circuit courts; but the laws of the state relative to change of venue in criminal examinations and trials shall not apply to said court or the judge thereof.

But any person charged upon information of a criminal offense may, at any time before a

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jury is drawn for the purpose of a trial in said court, obtain a change of venue to the circuit court of said Winnebago county upon making an affidavit that he believes that he cannot obtain a fair and impartial trial in said superior court, and thereupon the said superior court shall commit or hold the party to bail to appear at the next term of said circuit court, as upon examinations, and the judge thereof, under the seal of said court, shall transmit all the papers and a copy of the records of the proceedings in such cause, properly certified to be such to said circuit court, which shall then proceed to hear and determine the same; and all recognizances, previously given in such cases and returned to said superior court may be enforced by said circuit court as fully as if they had originally run and been certified and returned thereto. Provided that civil cases appealed or certified to said court shall stand for trial at the next regular term of said court, after the filing of the papers in such cases in said court without notice when such terms are not held, as hereinafter provided, and when such terms are not held, any party may bring any such case to trial at any time after the filing of the papers in such case by thereafter giving the opposite party ten days' notice in writing of the day on which said case will be moved for trial, and when such notice shall be given by a party, the opposite party may move such case on the day named without having given a notice. Such notice may be served on the party or his attorney, if an attorney of record shall have appeared in the justice court or in said superior court in such cases, in the same manner as now provided by law for serving notices of trial in the circuit court. Whenever any such case is continued for any cause, it shall be to the next term of said court when terms are held, and when not, to a time to be fixed by said court, and when any such case has been continued it shall not again be noticed for trial,

Said court shall have power and authority to issue all processes necessary to carry into effect its jurisdiction, which processes shall in substance be the same, when applicable, as used in circuit courts, or shall be as directed by the judge thereof.

Processes issued by said court, its judge or clerk, in civil or criminal cases may be executed in any part of the state by the officer to whom it is addressed. The sheriffs of Winnebago County may execute all sentences and judgements of said court.

Section Three-Judge vested with powers of justice of the peace.

The superior judge, in addition to the powers vested in the superior court as a foresaid, is vested with all the powers and jurisdiction of a justice of the peace in said county, in criminal actions and proceedings, and jurisdiction of all prosecutions for breach of any ordinance or by-law of the city of Oshkosh, and also with all the powers and jurisdiction of justices of the peace in said county, in civil actions and proceedings, and also power to hear and determine any such cases although the title to land may come in question therein; and to exercise such jurisdiction shall hold the superior court as courts are held by justices of the peace. The general provisions of law relative to civil and criminal actions before justices of the peace shall apply to said court so far as applicable. Appeals from judgment rendered in said court, in civil and criminal actions, of which a justice of the peace would have jurisdiction shall be taken to the county court of Winnebago County, in the same manner as appeals from judgments of justices of the peace is of the peace in similar actions.

He shall procure under the direction of the said judge all necessary record books, blanks, stationery, lights and fuel tor said court at the expense of the iyi of Oshkosh. Said clerk before entering upon the duties of his office shall make, and file with the city clerk of the city of Oshkosh, a bond, with two good and sufficient sureties, to be approved of by the common council of the city of Oshkosh, conditioned to pay to each and every person who may be entitled thereto, all such sums of money or moneys which may come into his hands by virtue of his office.

The clerk of said court shall have the custody and care of all books, papers, and records of the court, and shall be present at all times unless absent from sickness or by the consent of the judge, who shall in such case appoint some person temporarily in his place, and in case of a vacancy the judge may appoint some person for the residue of the term. The clerk may swear all witnesses and jurors, and may administer oaths, and take and certify acknowledgements of deeds and other instruments to be acknowledged.

He shall keep minutes of all proceedings, enter the judgments, and make up and keep the records of said court; shall issue all processes under his hand and the seal of the court, shall attest them in the name of the judge, signing thinself "clerk of the superior court;" tax costs, and when the court is not in session, shall have the power to take bail for the appearance of any person under arrest before the court, subject to the revision of the court. The clerk of said court shall keep a full and complete record and account; in a book to be furnished as the other records and books of said court are furnished, of all fees and costs received by said judge or clerk, in such a manner as that such record shall show the exact amount paid, by whom, at what time, and on what account, and if paid in any case, what case; said clerk shall make duplicate certificates showing the same facts, and file one with the county clerk of Winnebago county and one with the city clerk of the City of Oshkosh at the end of each month.

Section Six-Court, where to be held. Fines and costs to be paid to county and city.

Said superior court shall be held at the City of Oshkosh, in some suitable place to be provided and suitably furnished by said city. All the fines, costs and penalties collected in criminal cases shall be immediately paid by said court to the treasurer of the County of Winnebago, on the first of each and every month, and shall be by said county treasurer annually accounted for at the time said city shall pay over to him its proportion of county taxes. All fines collected in city prosecutions shall be on the first of each and every month paid by said clerk to the treasurer of the City of Oshkosh. At the time of payment of taxes to the county treasurer such county shall pay to said city two-thirds of all sums paid for record books, blanks, stationery, office furniture, lights and fuel and the other expenses of the court.

Section Seven-Terms of court. Jury, how obtained.

Said judge may, if he deem it best, by order in writing filed in said court, direct terms to be held for the trial of civil business and of offenses on which information may be filed, and of appeals from justices of the peace in criminal cases, not exceeding four terms in one year. When such terms are ordered, the clerk of said court in the presence of the judge, at least three days before such term, shall draw from the persons selected as hereinafter provided, to serve as jurors therein, thirty-six jurors for such term, and shall issue a venire to summon them as such.

If no such terms are ordered, the judge shall fix a particular day for the trial of criminal cases mentioned in this section, not more than twenty days after the day fixed in the recognizance or commitment for the appearance of the accused, or after the filing of the return on appeals. And the jury shall be drawn in open court in the presence of the defendant and prosecuting officer, at least two days before the day fixed for trial in the following manner: The clerk shall draw in the presence of the judge from a box containing the names of all the persons furnished as hereinafter provided twelve names, each party may alternately, beginning with the prosecution, object to a name drawn, not more than six in all on each side, and as soon as any name is objected to the clerk shall draw another, the twelve remaining after such objections are made or waived shall be summoned as jurors in such cases.

In all actions, civil or criminal, before such judge wherein a justice of the peace would have jurisdiction, jurors may be drawn and summoned as now provided for drawing and summoning jurors in justice courts. The day for trial may be adjourned from time to time in the discretion of the court. If any person thus drawn cannot be summoned, or be excused, or be set aside as incompetent, another name may be drawn from said list to supply his place, who shall be summoned in like manner; or the judge may direct the issuing of a venire to said sheriff or other officer of said court to summon the necessary jurors to complete the panel from said county at large.

Section Eight-Jury list, jurors', witnesses' and officers' fees.

At least two weeks before each term of said court the judge and clerk of said court shall select from the residents of the county qualified to act as jurors in the circuit court, fifty persons to serve as jurors in said court for such terms, but if such jury shall not be selected at such time, it may be selected at any time before the commencement of such term, and such judge and clerk shall make a list of the names of all persons so selected, signing the same, and forthwith filing such list with the clerk of said court. Such jury shall not be irregular or ^{lit}legal if persons are selected in good faith, who are not qualified; but the names of such persons shall be stricken therefrom. A jury trial in said court may be waived in writing by both parties or by consent in open court entered in the minutes.

The fees of said judge, witnesses, jurors, sheriffs or other officers shall be the same in civil and criminal cases cognizable before a justice of the peace as now provided by law.

In all other cases the fees of witnesses, jurors, sheriffs, reporter, interpreter or other officers shall be the same as now provided by law in circuit courts of this state, and shall be paid in the same manner. The clerk of said superior court shall make out a certificate, under the seal of said court, to each juror, witness, interpreter, reporter or other officer entitled to compensation for actual attendance upon said court, and every such certificate shall be receipted for by the person in whose favor it shall be drawn, and thereupon the county treasurer shall pay the amount thereof out of the county treasury.

Section Nine-Salary of judge and how paid, costs and fees. How disposed of.

The salary of the judge of said superior court shall be the sum of three thousand dollars per annum, to be paid in quarter yearly installments out of the treasury of said County of Winebago. The said sum of three thousand dollars shall be in full for all services rendered by said judge and the clerk of said superior court.

The said judge or clerk is authorized to tax or collect fees as follows: For all services rendered by him in civil and criminal actions when exercising the powers of a justice of the peace the fees allowed to justices of the peace as now provided by law.

In all other actions both civil and criminal in said court the lees and costs to be the same as prescribed for the circuit courts of this state, and the said costs in all such civil actions may be taxed by the clerk and inserted in the judgment in the manner provided for in circuit courts, and the clerk shall be entitled to the same fees as the clerk of the circuit courts.

All costs collected in civil cases in said court, and all costs imposed and collected in criminal cases arising under the laws of the state shall be paid into the county treasury, and all

costs imposed and collected in cases arising under the charter and ordinances of said city of Oshkosh shall be paid into said city treasury. The clerk of said court shall keep an accurate statement of all such costs and fees thus collected, and file the same, in the county clerk's office at the first of each month, under his hand and seal of said court, and shall at the same time pay over all such moneys provided for in this act. The common council of the city of Oshkosh with the concurrence of the county board of the county of Winnebago may in their discretion fix a salary for the clerk of said superior court; exclusive of the three thousand dollars paid to said judge; said salary not to exceed the sum of eight hundred dollars per annum, to be paid in the same manner as the salary of such judge.

Section Ten-The sheriffs and other officers to be officers of court.

The sheriffs of Winnebago county, and chief of police and all policemen of the city of Oshkosh, and all constables of the county of Winnebago, shall be officers of said court and may serve its processes and carry into effect its lawful orders and judgments.

Section Eleven-Judge may appoint reporter.

The judge of said court may appoint, and from time to time remove, a phonographic reporter for said court, skilled in the art of short-hand, who shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed in the constitution, and who shall be furnished with all necessary stationery, and shall attend only when required by said judge, and perform such duties as he may require. Such judge shall fix his compensation, not exceeding ten dollars for each day, and five dollars for each hall day, that he shall attend, and which shall be in full compensation for his service and for making such transcripts of his short-hand notes of any charge of the court required by it or the judge; and who shall furnish to and may charge persons requiring them like transcripts at a price not exceeding five cents per folio. He shall make the like transcripts required by the court to be filed therein, and shall be paid therefor the like sum, which sum, together with his per diem compensation, shall be paid in the same manner as the other expenses of the court are paid.

Section Twelve-Clerk may adjourn court.

In the absence or disability of the judge of said court, the clerk of said court may adjourn the same in the manner now provided by law for the adjournment of circuit courts.

Section Thirteen-Use of county jail.

The use of the common jail of Winnebago county is granted to said court for the confinement of all persons committed to it for contempt or otherwise, and every such person shall be delivered to the sheriff of such county, who shall confine him in such jail until discharged according to law.

Section Fourteen-Lien of Judgments.

All judgments rendered in said court and docketed, as prescribed by law, in the office of the clerk of said court, shall be a lieu on the real property in said courty of Winnebago, and every person against whom the same shall be rendered or docketed, or which he shall at any time thereafter acquire, for ten years from the time of docketing the same. Trauscripts of the docket of such judgment may be filed and docketed in the office of the clerk of any circuit court of this state, with the same force and effect as constituting a lieu upon real estate that judgments rendered and docketed in circuit courts have by law.

Section Fifteen-Suit tax. Clerk's fees.

Except in civil actions wherein a justice of the peace would have jurisdiction, the sum of one dollar shall be paid by the plaintiff at the commencement of each suit in said court as a suit tax, to be applied toward the salary of the judge. And at the same time there shall be paid to the clerk of said court upon the filing of the original papers in any suit or proceeding in said court upon appeal coming from inferior courts, arbitrators, commissioners and referees; or upon a change of venue from some other court except in criminal cases, the sum of two dollars in addition to the suit tax now required to be paid, which sum shall apply on the clerk's fees in such case.

Section Sixteen-Jurisdiction of other courts not interfered with.

Nothing in this act shall be construed in any manner affecting the right or jurisdiction of any court, judge, justice of the peace or police court, to hear, try and determine any cause now pending in such court, or before such judge, justice of the peace or police court, or which may be commenced before the judge of said superior court shall enter upon the duties of his office.

Section Seventeen.

This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

The undersigned, Committee on Roads and Bridges, to whom was referred the petition of the Board of Supervisors of the town of Neenah in said county of Winnebago, and state of Wisconsin, which petition represents that the said town of Neenah has voted to build two bridges across the slough in said town of Neenah, and that said town has provided for the payment of six hundred dollars, one-half of the estimated cost of building said bridges, respectfully report:

We find that the town of Neenah has complied with all the requirements of law as stated in said petition in providing for the cost of said bridges and that said cash exceeds one-fourth of one per centum of all the taxable property in said town, according to the last equalized valuation thereof. And that the county is under legal obligations to provide for the payment of the other half of said cost for building such bridges.

Your committee, therefore, respectfully recommend that the sum of six hundred dollars, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to pay one-half of said cost of building said bridges, be appropriated for such purpose according to the prayer of the Board of Supervisors of the town of Neenah, as above set forth. And that the Chairman of this Board appoint two commissioners from towns, exclusive of the town of Neenah, and subject to the payment of their proportional parts of said appropriation, who shall act for and in behalf of the county in the disbursement of such appropriation, and that the Clerk of this Board be instructed to apportion according to law the taxes for this appropriation to the following towns, to wit:

Algoma, Black Wolf, Wolf River, Winchester, Clayton, Menasha, Neenah, Vinland, Winneconne, Winneconne Village, Poygan, Rushford, Omro, Omro Village, Oshkosh, Nekimi, Utica and Nepeuskun.

That in all incorporated cities in the state (except such as now have police or municipal courts with exclusive criminal jurisdiction) the common council of each city shall fix a salary for each justice of the peace, and each policeman appointed therein, for all services which such justices or policeman may have to perform in criminal matters, which salary shall be in lieu of all fees which now by law each of them may charge and receive in all criminal cases, and said salary be full payment for all such services in all criminal cases.

That in all criminal cases said justices and policemen shall make up, tax and enter in their docket fees the same as now provided by law, but all such fees when collected shall be paid into the treasury of his city, to be applied in payment of said salaries. Provided, that if such fees shall not be sufficient to pay the salaries of said justices, the balance shall be paid by the county at large, or so much thereof as they shall deem just at not less than two-thirds of such deficiency.

WHEREAS, We are convinced that the cause of this is in our present laws pertaining to this subject and that it is in the power of the Legislature to enact laws which will confine Sheriffs to a reasonable compensation, not only for services rendered, but also for the boarding of prisoners. Therefore be it

Resolved. That while we do not desire to dictate to our State lawmakers, we do urgently request them to take up this question and pass laws to reduce this drain on the public treasury to reasonable bounds: and

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be furnished by the Clerk to our Representatives from this County in Senate and Assembly, and that they be urged to do what they can to bring about this reform.

GENTLEMEN: Your petitioner would most respectfully call your attention to the fact that during every day of the year there are county orders on the books

of the County Clerk representing many thousands of dollars. That for the safe keeping and issuing of such orders the Clerk is held personally responsible.

That there is nothing to prevent such orders from being stolen, or valuable papers from being abstracted from the office in the absence of the clerk or his deputies.

That the iron box in the clerk's office called a 'safe,' where such order books are kept, is no protection against fire or thieves.

And your petitioner respectfully asks that a committee be appointed to examine the facilities in the Clerk's office for safe keeping of such valuables, and to report to your honorable body their conclusions.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

FOR FIXING THE FEES OF JUSTICES AND OFFICERS.

Supervisor Schoetz submitted the following resolution fixing the fees allowed justices and officers for the arrest, examination and commitment to jail of vagrants and tramps:

WHERELS, The compensation of officers and justices may be fixed by the County Board of Supervisors from time to time, under Sec. 6, A. Chapter 470, Laws of Wisconsin, 1887, be it therefore

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, That until further order from this Board, that the officers shall be entitled to receive not to exceed twenty-five cents, which sum shall be in lieu of his fees for each tramp or vagrant arrested by him or committed to jail, except that the officers shall be entitled to mileage as heretofore, and twelve and one-half cents for meals furnished prisoners.

And each justice of the peace shall be entitled to receive not to exceed twenty-five cents in lieu of his fees for each tramp or vagrant brought before him or sentenced to jail.

And the County Clerk is hereby requested to notify each justice of the peace and officer, of the purport of this resolution, and be it further

Resolved, That a certain resolution duly passed and adopted by this County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, on the 23d day of December A. D. 1837, fixing the compensation of officers and justices in tramp and vagrant cases, or any other resolution heretofore passed by the said County Board in conflict with the foregoing resolution, are hereby repealed.

Supervisor Loope moved to make the consideration of the resolution special order for 9 o'clock to-morrow, which was adopted.

COSTS IN RAILROAD SUITS.

The report of Henry Fitzgibbons, late District Attorney, who was directed by this County Board at its January session to act for the county as its attorney in the case of the Oshkosh City Railway Co. against the County of Winnebago et al., submitted the following report supplemented by a verbal explanation of the present status of the case.

THE OSHKOSH CITY RAILWAY CO., ET AL., PLAINTIFFS AND RESPONDENTS,

against

THE COUNTY OF WINNEBAGO, AND THE CITY OF OSHKOSH, DEFENDANTS AND AFPELLANTS. To the Honorable Chairman, and County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: The plaintiffs in the above entitled action have presented and filed a bill against the county for its costs and disbursements in this action, and asks payment of same. In consultation with City Attorney Weed, of Oshkosh, we have concluded that it is the legaand proper way to have the county pay the bill; and then the County Treasurer, in his settlel

ment with the City Treasurer of city of Oshkosh charge back to Oshkosh, the tax, and all of the money paid in defending this suit, as well as all of the costs and disbursements paid to plaintiff's attorneys; on the ground that the city of Oshkosh made assessment of the tax for a special improvement tax on one of its streets; and when the County Treasurer sold the land, and the certificate was issued, the County gave the city of Oshkosh credit for the tax certificate which amounted to four hundred and twenty-six dollars and forty-nine cents (sta6.ag); and the County, I claim, is entitled to what it paid out in defending the certificate, and its legality having been questioned, the County must defend it. And now that its illegality having been sustained by the supreme court, the County must now get back its money, together with what it cost to defend this suit, in its attempt to sustain the legality of the certificate and the c. BOUNDARY LINE BETWEEN TOWNS OF NEENAH AND MENASHA.

The report of the Committee appointed at the November Session, 1893, of this County Board to determine the location of the boundary line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha as laid over, was submitted.

Supervisor Huxley also submitted a report and resolution on the same matter, the same being a supplementary report, and submitted for the former report with a clear and plain oral statement of the facts as investigated by him.

A lengthy and spirited discussion followed the introduction of the report which was participated in by Supervisors Huxley, Daly, Brightman, Schoetz, and Hamilton.

On motion by Supervisor Schoetz to lay the report on the table, the same was lost by the following vote:

Following is the report of the committee referred to above as laid over from the November session.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago:

The undersigned committee, duly appointed by said Board at the November session, 1893, for the purpose to determine a request made by a resolution adopted at said session, which resolution was entitled a resolution to establish a boundary line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha, respectfully report:

That they did on the 25th day of January. 1894, and from time to time thereafter, meet for the purpose of investigating any and all facts that to them appeared necessary to establish said boundary line. They have carefully read all the testimony bearing upon the question so referred that has been taken and recorded by a committee appointed for the same purpose, and acting in March, 1892. They furthermore carefully perused the records and visited the locality where such defect, if any, exists. In the opinion of the committee it was not necessary to take further testimony than that which is now on file with the Clerk of the County. That no new evidence was offered by either party interessed in the dispute. That the committee deemed it advisable, and so instructed County Surveyor Leach, to lay out and prepare an exact map, which is herewith presented, which explains the location and shows the boundary line as, in the opinion of the committee, it does exist.

FINDINGS OF FACTS AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW.

We find the following facts:

I. That the territory comprising the present towns of Neenah and Menasha originally constituted the town of Neenah.

II. That the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, on the first day of March, 1855, made an order dividing said town of Neenah, and setting off the town of Menasha from the same, at a session of said board, and on the first day of March, 1855.

III. That the order setting off said town and making said division is defective as specified by the former committee.

IV. On the records and files and from the evidence as produced and recorded, your committee find that the division line as fixed and determined by said board in its final order made on the first day of March, 1855.

Commencing on the east and west quarter line of section 21, in township number 20, north of range 17 east, where said quarter line intersects the west shore of Little Lake Butte des Morts, and running thence west through said section 21 to the west line of said section: thence continuing west on the east and west quarter line of section 20, same town and range, to the centre of the highway, running north and south on the east line of the cometery of the town of Neenah, so called; thence south on the center of said highway to the middle

or center line of said cemetery; thence running west on said middle or center line of said cemetery parallel with the north line of same, to the west line of said cemetery; thence north on a line parallel with the east line of said cemetery to the east and west quarter lines of said section 20; thence west on said quarter line to the north and south quarter lines of said section 20; thence north on said quarter line of said section 20; thence north on said quarter line of said section 20; thence north is section and on the section line dividing sections 18 and 19 to the west boundary line of said towns of Neenah and Menasha.

As conclusion of law, your committee find as the former committee has heretofore reported, that the north half of section 21, and the northeast quarter of section 20, and the north half of the cemetery of the town of Neenah, the south line of said northeast quarter, forming the north line of said cemetery, and the north half of the highway adjoining the east line of said cemetery, and running north and south on said east line, and the southwest quarter section 17, and all of section 18, were cut off from said town of Neenah by said Board to the town of Menasha; and from the south boundary line of all that part of the town of Menasha lying west of the Little Lake Butte des Morts and the division line between said towns of Neenah and Menasha.

AMENDMENT TO THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BOUNDARY LINE BE-TWEEN THE TOWNS OF NEENAH AND MENASHA.

That said report be and the same is hereby amended by fixing said boundary line as the same was established by the County Board in the year A. D. 1855, on the east line of said cemetery as follows:

That the town line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha be and the same is hereby established on the quarter line east and west across sections twenty (20) and twenty-one (21) until if reaches the northeast corner of Neenah cemetery, thence south two hundred and eight and seven-tenths (208 7-10) feet on the east line of said Neenah cemetery to the center of said line of cemetery; thence west four hundred and seventeen and four-tenths (417 4-10) feet until it reaches the west line of said cemetery; thence north two hundred and eight and seven-tenths (208 7-10) feet; and to the quarter line of section twenty (20) running east and west; and thence west to the quarter line of section twenty (20), running north and south; thence north to the section line between sections twenty (20) and section seventeen (17); and thence west to the town line between Neenah, Menasha and Clayton. Therefore

Resolved. That the boundary line between the towns of Neenah and Menasha is hereby established in accordance with the foregoing amendment on the east line of Neenah cerretery.

Your Committee on Illegal Assessments respectfully report as follows:

On call of the previous question Supervisor Oellerich invited the District Attorney, who was present, to give his opinion on the subject in controversy, which the District Attorney did by reading the following as his conclusions in the matter.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: I herewith submit my opinion as to payment of salaries of county officers.

Sec. 698 R. S. of Wisconsin P. 430 among other things provides :-- "The regular term of office of all county officers above named shall commence on the first Monday of January next succeeding their election, and continue two years."

Sec. 4971, R. S. of Wisconsin, Par. 10, P. 2412, among other things provides:-"The word "month' shall be construed to mean a calendar month, unless otherwise expressed, and the word 'year' a calender year unless otherwise expressed."

To illustrate. Sec. 560, R. S. of Wisconsin, P. 343, provides:-"In reckoning school months, twenty days as specified in section four hundred and fifty-nine, shall constitute a month, and one hundred days, five months,"

Also, Sec. 158, R. S. of Wisconsin, provides .- "The fiscal year of the state shall commence on the first day of October in each year and close on the thirtieth day of September next succeeding."

But whatever questions there may be in the provisions of the Statute, there is no question in the meaning of amendment to section I, article XIII of the State Constitution, adopted in 1882, which reads as follows:

"The political year for the state of Wisconsin shall commence on the first Monday in January each year, and the general election shall be holden on Tuesday next succeeding the first Monday in November. The first general election for all state and county officers, except judicial officers, after the adoption of this amendment, shall be holden in the year A. D. 1884, and thereafter the general election shall he held biennially. All state, county, or other officers, elected at the general election in the year 1891, and whose term of office would otherwise expire on the first Monday of January in the year 1884, shall hold and continue in such offices respectively until the first Monday in January in the year 1885."

It is evident that the official term begins on the first Monday in January and continues to the first Monday in January two years hence; and the official year begins on the first Monday in January and ends on the first Monday in January next succeeding. This being the case, an officer is not entitled to extra pay for the time he serves from January first to the first Monday in January of the last month of his term.

As a 'month' may mean more or less than a calendar month, as the case may be, so it is possible that the pay for January should be in full, though the county officers did not assume their duties until the seventh day of said month. At least the full salary is due not later than the first Monday in February.

However, it matters little, except as to time of payment, for at the end of the official year. to wit the first Monday in January, 1896, there will be due to each salaried officer the remainder of the salary, as fixed by the County Board, that still remains unpaid.

Ch. 225, 1893, among other things provides:-""All salaries shall be paid out of the county treasury monthly, at the end of each month.

But the phrase "at the end of each month," does not, in the contemplation of the Statute, necessarily mean "the end" of the calendar month. It may mean the end of the official month.

As the official month begins on the first Monday of January, it will close on the first Monday of February, and the end of any official month does not come till the first Monday of the next succeeding month, and the end of the last month of any term of office, will not come on December 31st, but on the first Monday of January next succeeding.

I therefore suggest that the Board construe the phrase "at the end of each month" to mean, at the end of each official month, and that the salaries of county officers be paid for any month, not on the last day of the calendar month, but on the first Monday of the month next succeeding, and that on the first Monday of April, 1835, each of the salaried officers be paid his salary for March together with any arrearages that are due them; or, if paid at the end of the calendar month, that the order be drawn to include the time up to the first Monday of the month next succeeding.

B. BRIGHTMAN, D. E. BOWEN, FRED SCHULTZ, JR., J. A. FRIDD, P. VREDENBURGH, Committee, Supervisor J. T. Orchard introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the Chairman and Clerk be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to issue a County order for each of the accounts audited and allowed at the present session of the Board and for all appropriations made not otherwise provided for, and to persons named in any bills which are certified to by the Chairman of Committee on Public Buildings, and also bills certified to by the Purchasing Agent, to be paid out of the building fund and general fund respectively; and further

Resolved, That the County Clerk be and is hereby authorized to correct all apparent clerical errors that he may discover in writing up the proceedings of this Board.

On motion the above resolution was unanimously adopted.

The minutes of this day's proceedings of the Board were then read by the Clerk and approved.

On motion by Supervisor Loope the Board then adjourned sine die.

RULES, -

Adopted November 13, 1894, for the Government of the County Board.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees, and in the following order: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constable Accounts, Poor and Poor Farm, Corporations, Public Buildings, Roads and Bridges, Jurors, Printing, Per Diem and Mileage.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the Journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistakes therein shall be corrected by the Board, provided that upon the last day of the session, the Journal for that day shall be read and before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the Journal the order of business shall be as follows:

1st. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.

2d. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.

3d. Reports of Standing Committees.

4th. Reports of Select Committees.

5th. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order subject to an appeal to the Board, and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes except on appeals from his own decisions, provided that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie the question shall be deemed to be lost, and providing that in the order of voting his name shall be called last.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member, and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it, and when referred to a committee the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member previous to speaking shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first, but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question, without leave, and when called to order by the Chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and noes when called for by five members and *shall* be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law. XVII. When a question is under consideration no motion shall be entertained except: 1st. To adjourn.

2d. To lay on the table.

3d. For the previous question.

4th. To postpone to a day certain.

5th. To commit to a committee.

6th. To amend to substitute.

7th. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule. XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table and for the previous question shall be decided without debate excent as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition, but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

. XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member and the Chairman shall then say, "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise the previous question shall be thereby seconded, and an opportunity then be given to two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "shall the question be now put" which if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of ayes and noes, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and then upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of twothirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made. shall govern the Board until altered or repealed as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent here with, shall govern the Board.
