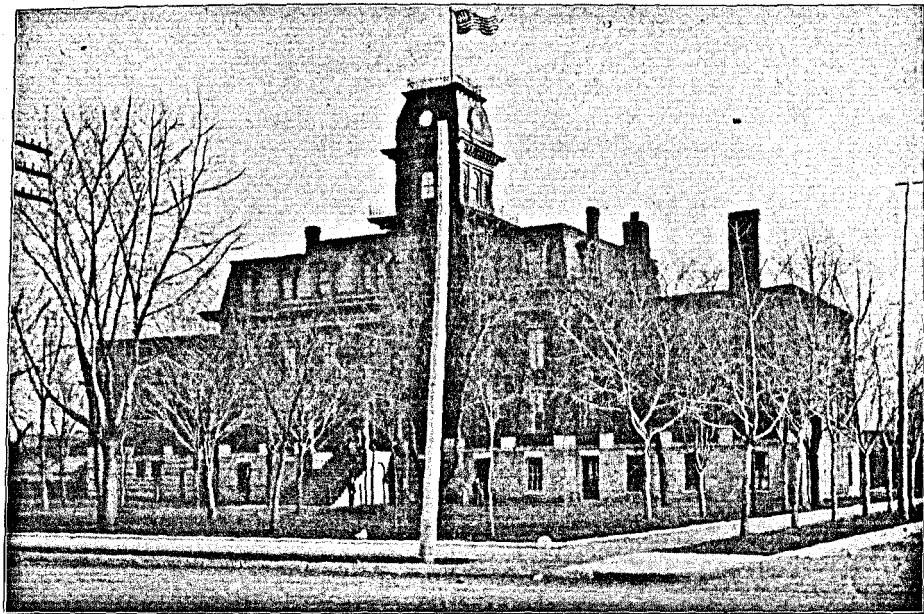

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County convened in Annual Session, at the Court House, in the City of Oshkosh, on the 10th day of November, A. D., 1910, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and was called to order by Chairman Thompson.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

Supervisor Schoetz nominated John C. Thompson for Chairman and moved, as there were no other nominations that the rules be suspended and the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for Mr. Thompson.

The Clerk put the motion which was carried unanimously. The ballot was cast and John C. Thompson declared elected.

Chairman Thompson thanked the members of the Board for the honor conferred.

ELECTION OF VICE-CHAIRMAN.

Supervisor Ehrgott nominated H. F. Gustavus for Vice-Chairman and moved, as there were no other nominations, that the rules be suspended and the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for Mr. Gustavus.

The Chairman put the motion which was carried unanimously. The ballot was cast and H. F. Gustavus declared elected.

Supervisor Gustavus thanked the members for the honor conferred.

Supervisor Schoetz moved that the rules of the last supervisor year be adopted. Carried.

RULES OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, ADOPTED NOVEMBER 9, 1909.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 a. m., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 a. m.

And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless adjourned to a day certain or sine die.

man, or in the case of his absence the Vice-Chairman, or in their absence,

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

(Amended to provide for Vice-Chairmen as authorized by Ch. 110, of 1903.)

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, 13;
 Finance, 9;
 General Accounts, 9;
 Illegal Assessments, 5;
 Justices and Constables' Accounts, 9;
 Sheriff's and Coroner's Accounts, 9;
 Insane, 5;
 Poor and Poor Farm, 5;
 Workhouse, 3;
 Corporations, 5;
 Public Buildings, 5;
 Roads and Bridges, 5;
 Per Diem and Mileage, 5;
 Printing, 5;
 Bonds and Salaries, 6;
 County Abstract and Tract Index System, 5;
 Rules, 3;
 County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy, 5.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman, or in his absence, the Vice-Chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of Standing Committees.
4. Reports of Select Committees.
5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the County shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

Supervisor Larrabee moved to adjourn to 2 p. m..

Supervisor Schoetz moved to amend making it Wednesday 9 a. m.

Remarks by Supervisors Larrabee, Schoetz, Arnemann, Gustavus and White.

Amendment carried. Original motion as amended adopted.

Chairman for Supervisor White invited the members to visit Agricultural School, Tuesday the 22nd, and for Superintendent of Work House Ganzer to dinner Thursday evening the 17th.

PETITION.
 FROM TOWN OF WINNECONNE.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Your Petitioner, the Town of Winneconne, respectfully shows:

That for some years last past the Butte Des Morts Land Company, a Wisconsin corporation, has been the owner of certain lands, hereinafter described, in the Town of Winneconne.

That said owner claimed and contended that the action of the Board of Review of the Town of Winneconne, in the year 1909, in raising and fixing the assessed value of said land, was illegal.

That in July, 1909, the State of Wisconsin, on the relation of the Butte Des Morts Land Company, brought a certain certiorari proceeding in the Circuit Court of Winnebago County, to review and have adjudged void the assessment and valuation of its said land in the Town of Winneconne for the year 1909.

That the Town of Winneconne, through its Town Clerk, against whom said proceedings were directed, appeared in said certiorari proceeding and answered, setting up the facts in regard to the assessment of said land and as to the action of its Board of Review in regard thereto, and that on a hearing and judicial determination had in said matter before said court, the assessment of said Butte Des Morts Land Company's lands, hereinafter described, for the year 1909, and the action of the Board of Review of the Town of Winneconne with reference thereto, were held illegal and void and were set aside and the taxes levied on said lands on said assessment for said year were declared illegal and void and uncollectable.

That prior to the determination of said proceeding, the Town of

Winneconne had levied taxes in accordance with the value of said lands, as fixed by its Board of Review, and the tax warrant for the collection of said taxes had gone into the hands of its Town Treasurer, and thereafter said taxes were returned to the County Treasurer of Winnebago County as unpaid.

That the determination of the legality of said taxes was made by the court prior to the sale of said lands by the County Treasurer in the year 1910, and that said County Treasurer being advised thereof and it appearing to him that said lands ought not to be sold, as provided in Section 1135 of the Statutes of 1898, did not offer the same for sale and the same have not as yet been sold for the reason aforesaid.

That the Town of Winneconne has valued and assessed said lands for the year 1910, at their true value, which valuation thereof is satisfactory to the Town of Winneconne and the land owner.

That opposite the descriptions of the lands hereinafter given is the 1910 valuation thereof, together with the amount of taxes thereon for town, city and state purposes, in accordance with the 1909 levy and on the 1910 valuation.

That the land owner is willing to pay the taxes, at said rate on said valuation, on said lands, and that your Petitioner is willing to settle and adjust said matter on said basis, as follows:

That said owner is willing to pay said taxes and said Town is willing to receive it, and believe it to be a fair settlement of the matters in dispute, but that said owner desires that said lands shall not be sold for the taxes of 1909, hereinbefore declared void and illegal, and desires to have proper receipts for the payment of said taxes, and it is conceded that said lands were justly taxable for the taxes above specified, amounting in the aggregate to \$34.57 aforesaid.

Wherefore, your Petitioner prays, that this Board do fix the amount of the taxes justly chargeable on said lands for said year 1909, as hereinbefore set forth, and on each parcel thereof, the amount above indicated, and the aggregate tax on said parcels being \$34.57, and that this Board direct the County Treasurer to accept the amount so fixed in full payment of the taxes against said parcels for the year 1909, and do

deliver his receipt therefor, and that he do return to the Town of Winneconne his proportion and share of said taxes, and do make proper entries on his books to show the payment of said taxes and the proper disposition of the amount received by him therefor, and for such other and further relief as may be proper.

During the past year the work of the schools has been very satisfactory. In working out the institute problem, the county was divided into six districts, and four meetings held in each district. Then a two day meeting for all teachers was held in Oshkosh at the end of the year. The work was conducted in the nature of round table discussions and I believe the teachers received the maximum benefit.

County graduating exercises were held, at which all diplomas for graduation were presented. The people and pupils showed keen interest in these exercises, one feature of which was a contest, a representative in which was chosen from each town. The interest was sufficient to warrant taking the matter up this year on a larger scale. In addition to the declamatory contest, will be held adding and spelling contests. In this manner we hope to revive interest in arithmetic and spelling, an end much to be desired.

During the coming year we will organize Pupils' Corn Growing Clubs in each school. The pupils to study corn during the year, and in the coming summer to raise a piece of corn. In the fall the product will be judged, probably at the County Fair, and prizes awarded to the winners. It seems desirable that the boys and girls in the country be interested in corn culture.

The attendance during the past year has been excellent, and the interest in the library work has been all that could be desired. I shall as I think the good results are largely due to this system.

In order to perfect the plans for the next year's work and continue the system of awards for attendance and for library readings, that already being done, there will be necessary the following amount to be used as follows:

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

County Physician Brockway read his Report No. 7, as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Winnebago County Insane Asylum and the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen:—The following is my official report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1910.

COUNTY ASYLUM.

The usual semi-weekly visits to this institution have been made regularly, as well as special visits when found to be necessary. There were thirteen deaths at the asylum this year, one in July, one in August, three in December, two in January, one in February, three in May, and two in June. Of these, nine were males and four females. Seven deaths were due to dementia, two heart disease, one paralysis, one chronic Bright's disease, one chronic bronchitis, and one to epilepsy.

There was only one major injury during the year, one of the women falling and breaking her hip while out walking. She has recovered. The sanitary conditions have been uniformly good, and the inmates carefully looked after by the Superintendent, Matron and attendants.

COUNTY POOR HOUSE.

I have visited here twice weekly and oftener if necessary, as usual. There were six deaths this year, five of them due to old age and the other to tuberculosis. These deaths occurred, one in September, one in January, three in April, and one in May.

The sanitary conditions of the building have been good and the inmates well cared for.

COUNTY JAIL.

I have responded promptly to calls to the jail during the year and

have found the prisoners well cared for. There has been no serious illness here during the year and no deaths.

COUNTY WORK HOUSE.

I have made several visits to this institution this year and have always found the prisoners' quarters clean and sanitary. There was no illness that resulted seriously and no deaths.

All of the county institutions have been kept in good condition throughout the year, and those in charge, as well as the Trustees and different Committees, have always been courteous and willing to do all in their power to provide for the welfare of the inmates.

EQUALIZATION.

Supervisor Varker offered the following Report, No. 9:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen:—The County Board of Supervisors in the March Session passed the following resolution by a vote of 32 Ayes to 7 Noes:

EQUALIZATION.

Supervisor Loope offered Resolution No. 3 as follows:

"Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, that the Chairman of the County Board, be and he hereby is authorized and requested to appoint the Committee on Equalization composed of the usual numbers of the County Board on or before May 1, 1910.

"That the duties of said committee be the equalization of the assessment of taxes of the several towns, villages and cities of the County. That the said committee is authorized to inspect, view and examine real and personal property in all parts of the County and to take any and every step deemed by it necessary to arrive at a just and equitable equalization of the taxes of the County.

"That such committee submit a printed report to the County Board at the November, 1910, session and that such report be filed in the office of the County Clerk at least ten days before the commencement of said session.

"Further Resolved, That the said Committee on Equalization so appointed is authorized to incur such expense as may be necessary to enable it to properly perform the work imposed upon it by this resolution.

In accordance with this action the chairman of the County Board appointed said committee, composed of the usual thirteen members. In this committee were seven members from the cities of Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha, and six from the towns.

This action originated from the refusal of the cities and several towns to adopt the report of Supervisor of Assessment Shea at the November Session and the substitution of a plan of equalization made in lieu thereof by said cities and towns.

It was believed that a committee composed of representative men of good judgment, honestly using their ability without prejudices or partiality could perfect an equalization better and with less cost than a State Commission who would manifestly know less of the local conditions.

The methods used by the committee were similar to those used by the State Commissioner. Every assessment district in the County was visited and a sufficient number of personal property valuations, in the judgment of the committee were taken to enable them to arrive at the percentage of true value used by the assessors in making the local assessments.

Your Committee found in most cases when estimating merchants and manufacturers stock that the owners or those in charge were willing to and did give out information to them which materially assisted them in arriving at the true value.

The true cash value of the real estate in the several districts was arrived at by using the sales of the preceding four years as a basis.

The supervisor of assessments furnished the committee with the sales of the last four years and with his assistance the committee carefully eliminated all trades and sales between relatives and any other which appeared irregular on their face to be fictitious or not representing the true cash value.

The committee found a large number of sales in new plats in the cities that were sold on land contracts to be paid for on the installment plan, viz., a dollar a week with no taxes or interest until such sum was

paid on such property sufficient to secure the owner or agent in giving a deed and take a mortgage security on the balance of the consideration.

It was found after a thorough investigation and the testimony of men called before the committee who dealt in property in this way that there was at least 20 per cent additional value placed on said property to cover interest and taxes than would have been charged had they been cash sales.

Consequently there was a 20 per cent reduction made in sales of this nature in arriving at a conclusion.

Your committee believe that their findings are a substantial advance towards a true and perfected equalization of the County, perhaps not without mistakes, for we are finite but with the plan corrected and purged of inequalities by subsequent action in other years will result in perfection as near as possible to accomplish; the work of the committee has been arduous and involves considerable expense and the exercise of their best judgment.

With so many different interests in the problem it is a wonderful fact that not a jar or clash has occurred in the committee and we present this report without a dissenting voice. We believe it fairer and better than a State Commission, with less expense and the beginning of an era of good will and equity in county equalization.

Your Supervisor of Assessments, Mr. Shea, has been with us and much of the results have been arrived at through his experience and expert judgment.

In conclusion we refer you to the following tables as compiled by Supervisor of Assessments, Mr. Shea, on blanks furnished for that purpose by the Tax Commission as the complete report of your committee on equalization.

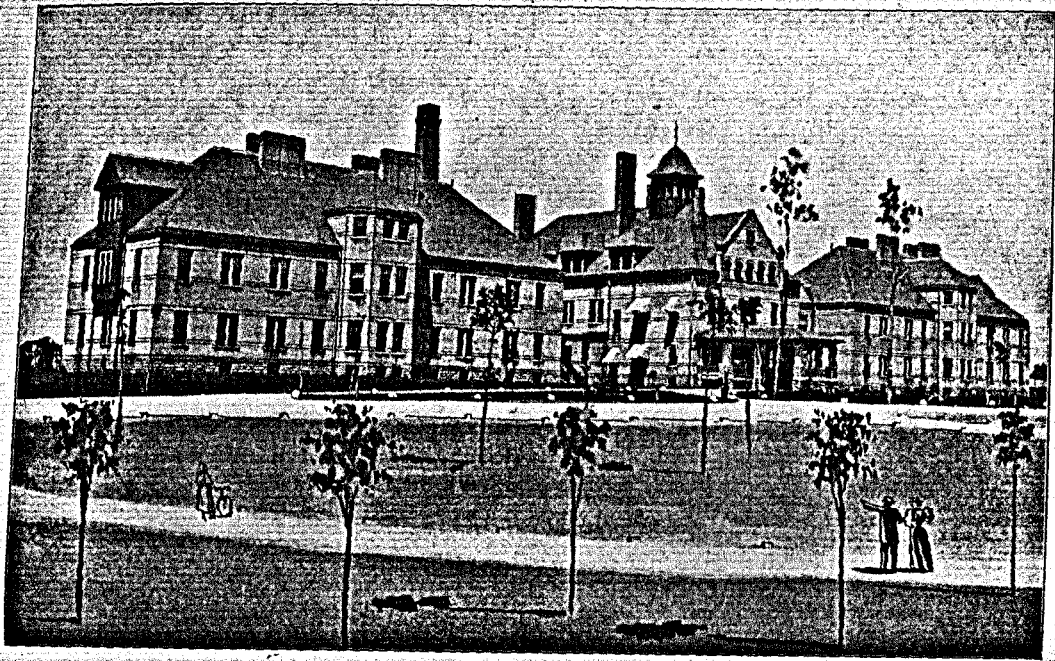

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE COUNTY POOR FARM AND INSANE ASYLUM.

Mr. Pinkerton read the following Report, No. 10:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen:—The Board of Trustees of the Asylum for the Chronic Insane of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, respectfully submit herewith their report of the institution covering the year ending June 30, 1910.

We wish to thank your honorable body for the appropriation, five thousand and five hundred dollars, made at the November session, for the purpose of building a cold storage and root cellar, which has been completed and, with the help of labor and material from the farm, has been built within the appropriation.

The Trustees, acting with the Committees on Insane and Poor and Poor Farm, on February 28, 1910, let the contract to Anton Neilson for the construction of the two buildings. A detailed statement of expense will be shown by the Joint Building Committee's report.

On August 22nd the Asylum buildings were seriously damaged by a cyclone; which have since been thoroughly repaired, the expense of which will appear in next year's report.

We have contracted for 1,500 tons dock screened Virginia splint coal F. O. B. State Hospital, at \$3.90 per ton, which will, we expect, supply the Asylum and Poor Farm until July 1, 1911.

A number of substantial improvements have been made the last year, some of which are:

New bath room on women's ward. Eighty iron beds and springs to match those we had. New steel ceilings on men's ward and patients' dining room.

Installation of electric night system; thereby doing away with the dangerous hand lamps.

Rewinding of the small dynamos to use to advantage with the day system.

Installed electric lights in the Engineer's house, and street lights to conform to the requirements of the County Board.

Painted all outside wood-work on Asylum and Laundry buildings, as well as large part of the interior of the institution.

In considering the needs of our institution for the present year, we would call the attention of the Board to the need of additional water supply. Our wells are not supplying sufficient water, and should be drilled deeper. During dry seasons we are obliged to call on the State institution to keep us in water for daily needs.

Again this year our County institution makes a most satisfactory financial report, exceeding that of any previous year, the cost of operation and maintenance being about two thousand dollars less than last year, with a larger number of patients to care for; and proceeds from the farm showing an increase of about one thousand six hundred dollars. These figures speak for themselves as to the efficiency of management by Mr. and Mrs. Manuel, for whom we bespeak your expressions of appreciation.

Dr. Brockway also has been faithful in looking after the medical needs of the institution.

Whereas, said corporation was found for the purpose of carrying on the same line of work which has for the past twenty-two years been carried on by the unincorporated association known as the Oshkosh and Neenah and Menasha Branch of the Wisconsin Humane Society.

The funds for carrying on said work being raised by payment of dues and donations from liberal and public-spirited citizens who had the welfare of children and dumb animals at heart; and,

Whereas, the revenues derived from dues and donations have been gradually decreasing and at the present time are wholly inadequate to effectively carry on said work; Therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, that pursuant to Chapter 65, Laws of 1909, there be, and is hereby, appropriated to the said Winnebago County Branch of the Wisconsin Humane Society out of funds not otherwise appropriated the sum of (\$600.00) Six Hundred Dollars, for the maintenance and support of said society in the prosecution of the work for

which it is organized and incorporated; said sum only to be expended in accordance with the provisions of said law.

COLD STORAGE AND ROOT CELLAR.

Supervisor Loope offered the following Report, No. 12:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen:—Your Committee consisting of the Trustees of Winnebago County Asylum, the Committee on Insane and the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, to whom we appropriated the sum of Five Thousand and Five Hundred Dollars (\$5,500), to build a cold storage and root cellar at the Winnebago County Asylum, beg leave to report as follows: That after securing plans and specifications and advertising for bids, we made a contract with Anton Neilson on February 28, 1910, for

the building of a cold storage building for the sum of \$3,810.00, the county to receive credit for excavating basement, and rubble stone the sum of \$357.00, leaving the amount to be paid Anton Neilson \$3,253.00.

We also contracted with Anton Neilson on February 28, 1910, for the building of Root Cellar for the sum of \$1,988.00. The county to have credit for excavating basement, Rubble stone and old brick the sum of \$195.00, leaving the amount to be paid Anton Neilson \$1,793.00.

Total amount of both contracts \$5,046.00. We are pleased to report that the cold storage building and root cellar are now completed and are filling a place in the needs of our county institutions which has long been urgent.

They are most creditable buildings and compare favorably with the best buildings of like character in the State. All are completed and paid for within your appropriation, made possible by the considerable amount of material and labor furnished by the institutions and the careful and judicious supervision of the work by our capable superintendent, Mr. Manuel.

In the spring the Board decided to have the land on the farm previously used for pasture plowed up and planted to corn, millet, buckwheat, beets, etc. There was produced about 400 baskets of good corn, 7½ tons of clover hay, a good crop of buckwheat, also of beets, the farm will pay this year about \$30.00 per acre.

The Financial Report of the farm products will appear in next year's report.

The Farmers meeting held last February at the school was a decided success, about 1,800 people were in attendance and the farmers derived great benefit from the lectures and the work done.

The Educational Committee put an excellent fence around the entire farm and put a chimney into the barn. The Board at its last November session appropriated \$700.00 for the establishment of an Elementary Course in the School. This has been done and the pupils are receiving training in the common branches preparatory to taking the advance course.

There was however a deficit of \$787.68 last year. The County Board raised \$700.00 to put in a new course and \$100.00 for fire protection, but there still remained a deficit. The School Board has been handicapped this year by not having sufficient funds to carry on the work as

was proper, owing to this deficit which existed previous to their being elected, the School Board would therefore recommend that the County Board of Supervisors appropriate the following amounts to cover the running expenses for the ensuing year, the new course, and the deficit.

\$2,600.00 for running expenses for the school year of 1910 and 1911.

700.00 for the Elementary Course for the ensuing year.

1,860.68 deficit prior to June 30, 1910.

\$5,160.68 Total.

SUPERBISING LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

Librarian read for Miss Noyes, Report No. 15, as follows:

To the Board of Libraries of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, for the period January 26 to October 28, 1910.

Gentlemen:—It is gratifying to be able to report that all the libraries are now placed for the winter. As much of the work as possible was done by mail in September and the rest was accomplished by personal visits to the stations the first of October. The following stations were visited: Winnebago, Clemensville, Allenville, Stations 1 and 2, Winneconne, Delhi, Nekimi, Station 2, Ring, Fisk, Elo and Waukau.

The present list of Stations is as follows:

Algoma, Allenville No. 1, Allenville No. 2, Black Wolf, Butte des Morts, Clemensville, Delhi, Elo, Eureka two libraries, Fisk, Larsen No. 2, Larsen No. 4, Neenah, Nekimi No. 4, Nekimi No. 5, Omro two libraries, Omro Junction, Oshkosh No. 2, Nepeuskun, Pickett No. 1, Pickett No. 2, Poygan No. 1, Poygan No. 3, Poygan No. 4, (Poygan, Rushford Grange, Ring), Rush Lake, Rushford No. 2, Waukau, Winchester two libraries, Winnebago, Winneconne, Wolf River No. 1, Wolf River No. 2.

The new stations this year are Nepeuskun, Nordheim, Poygan, Stations 3 and 4 (Poygan, Rushford Grange), Nekimi No. 4 and Wolf River, Stations 1 and 2.

There are now 39 libraries, including the collection of Scandinavian books loaned by the Commission. Forty-seven libraries have been sent out since the meeting last January. The two new libraries purchased last spring are at Allenville and Waukau. Ninety books have been added to the collection by purchase, making the total number 1,998 volumes. Fifty-one books have been rebound.

The circulation since the last meeting has amounted to 2,352. Although this is still pretty small, it is an advance upon that of last year and the books themselves show signs of good service.

This fall we have had fully fifteen calls for traveling libraries which we have been unable to supply. We have two on hand but one of them is library No. 2, which was reported last year and which we discovered at Fisk this fall while on our county trip. The library contains only twenty books, the remainder having been lost. I would recommend that money be appropriated immediately to fill up this library so that it can be put into use. The problem before us now is not that of arousing interest in the county traveling libraries, but that of getting new libraries to meet the demand caused by the interest already aroused.

For this reason I would further recommend that the County Board of Libraries make every effort to get the full appropriation of \$200.00 this year for the purchase of books, rebinding, and the other necessary expenses.

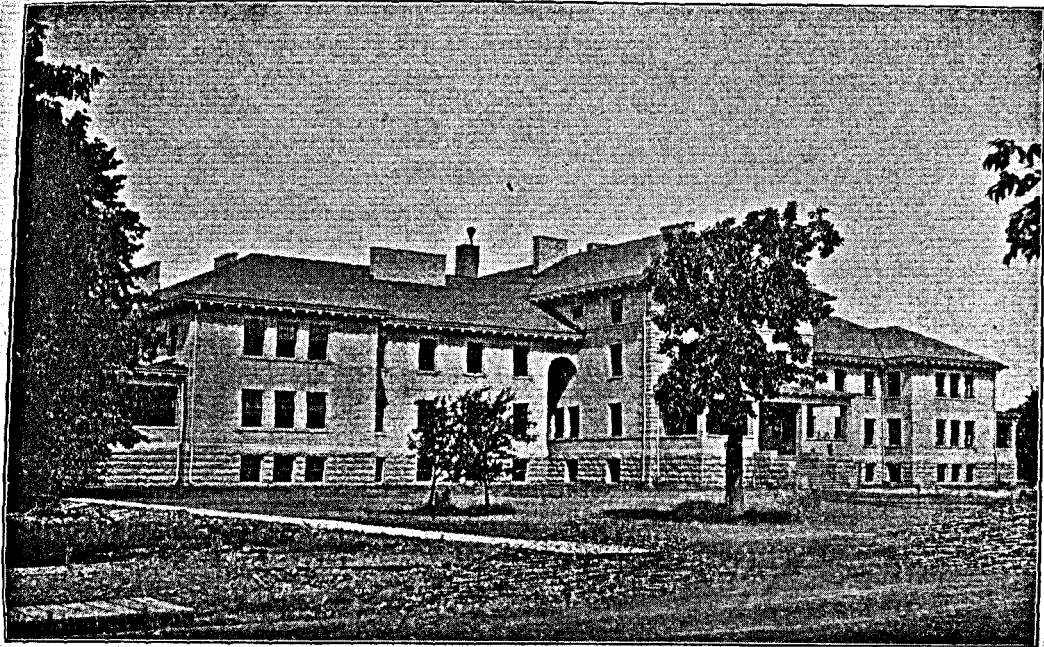

This agreement, made this 25th day of November, A. D. 1910, by and between the County of Winnebago and John Villwock, Sheriff-elect.

The said John Villwock does for and in consideration of a certain sum hereinafter mentioned, agree to board, wash and mend for all prisoners who may be confined in the jail of Winnebago County, and to furnish good, wholesome and well prepared food in sufficient quantity for \$3.25 a week after commitment, and 25c a meal before commitment of twenty-one meals, and all parts of the day or week. The board to be computed on the same basis of 21 to make a week's board, and in no case to charge for more meals than are actually furnished; and said John Villwock agrees to keep the register so as to show the hour of taking in and out of all prisoners.

It is further agreed that no bills shall be presented to the County Board for articles used in the preparation of food for said prisoners, nor in doing the mending and washing for the same; and it is further agreed by and between the said County of Winnebago and said John Villwock that said County of Winnebago shall provide all heat and light for said jail, Sheriff's residence, including fuel for cooking purposes for said jail and residence.

For and in consideration of the faithful performance of the above agreement by said John Villwock the County of Winnebago agrees to cause to be paid to said John Villwock the sum of \$3.25 per week, as above stated.

WISCONSIN TAX COMMISSION FIGURES.

Chairman Thompson offered Report No. 2 as follows:

The Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.

Gentlemen: I beg to report that during the November session I asked the Wisconsin Tax Commission to give me their figures of the value of the real estate in the different assessment districts of Winnebago County, thinking it might be of value in getting at the true equalization of the county.

The information did not reach me until after the Board had adjourned, and as the figures may be very useful to the Equalization Committee, as well as to the other members of the Board, next year, I thought it advisable to report to your body what they were and that possibly you might desire to have them printed in the proceedings of the Board, where they would be permanently available.

Of course the State Tax Commission does not expect that they are absolutely correct in every case. They are simply the figures they use in getting at the value of the real estate in this county. I have computed the percentage of the real estate value in each assessment district and placed it in a column opposite their valuations, so that it will be more convenient for use and for comparison with the figures used by the Special Equalization Committee.

VALUATION OF THE STATE TAX COMMISSION.

Table showing the valuation of taxable real estate in the several assessment districts of Winnebago County as calculated for purposes of the state assessment from statistics of land sales and assessed valuation of parcels included in such sales. The sales used in such calculations are taken from those recorded during the five years ending April 30, 1909. FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Chairman Thompson read a statement of the finances of the county as follows:

Gentlemen of the Board: I deem it not improper, as Chairman, to call your attention to the financial condition of Winnebago County.

Prior to November, 1908, the county had become indebted in a large amount, and we must admit that part of this indebtedness was due to the failure of the County Board, in the preceding year, to levy a sufficient tax. However that may be, in November, 1908, the County of Winnebago was indebted as follows.

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To this we should add a sufficient amount to have carried the county to January 1, 1909, which I estimate at	30,000.00
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Leaving the county's real indebtedness at substantially	\$143,235.13
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The County Board, at its November session, 1908, commenced a campaign of retrenchment, and not only tried to make adequate provision for the current expenses, but also levied a tax for the payment of \$25,000.00 of the county's indebtedness.

Again, at the November session, 1909, the County Board levied a tax of \$25,000.00 to pay outstanding notes, and, in addition, raised an adequate amount to cover the expenses of the year. The raising of these amounts, together with the fees turned over to the county, resulted in the much more favorable financial statement of November 1, 1910:

The county's indebtedness November 1, 1910, was	\$ 64,050.00
Cash in bank	36,320.10

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The provision made for the further reduction of the county debt at the November session, 1910, should, if care and economy is exercised at the present session and at the March session, result in leaving the county of Winnebago, at the opening of the next November session, in a position where it will have cash in the bank sufficient to cover all of its outstanding indebtedness.

However, it is probable that there will not be enough money at that time to pay all the indebtedness and run the county to January 1, 1912.

There is, however, about \$13,000.00 of county indebtedness which cannot be paid off during the coming year, as it does not mature and become payable until later. This will probably leave it so that the county can pay all of its indebtedness that will mature during the coming year, if economy is exercised, and have almost enough money to carry it to January 1, 1912. With economy in 1912 and the raising of \$13,000.00 to pay on the county's indebtedness by the Board in November, 1911, the county will be out of debt and in a sound financial condition in 1912.

The raising of taxes to pay off the county's indebtedness has cast a heavy burden on the taxpayers during the last three years. It has been a source of anxiety to the Finance Committee of this Board and to the able Chairman of that committee.

Now that the good work has been practically accomplished, it is time to make good resolutions for the future.

For my part, I believe that the County of Winnebago should never again go into debt, except it be in some most grave and unforeseen contingency—something entirely out of the ordinary course of events.

More than this, I believe the county should refrain from going into new and untried ventures and from broadening too much its legitimate field of expenditure.

The county government is not responsible for all the ills that afflict us. It is not its proper function to attempt to cure all the public evils that exist, nor to pour the county's money into all the divers channels that may result in public benefactions.

Millions of dollars could be expended in Winnebago County in doing good to the public.

Schools for the teaching of all the many and varied branches of education; all kinds of asylums for all the afflicted; public charities of all kinds, will knock again and again at your door for assistance. Doubtless the aims and purposes of all these will be good and worthy. Yet you could bankrupt the county and not fulfill half the demands that would be made upon you.

The point I am trying to bring to your attention is that it is not primarily the business of the county to enter all the fields of public charity.

There will always be the nation and the state above you and the city, village and town below you, which can and should be called upon to perform their proper functions and do their proper share.

In the light of present conditions, it is quite apparent that, for many years to come, we must look, as we have in the past to some extent, to the charity and generosity of private individuals to assist in some degree the numerous forms of charity.

The county government has its own duties to perform. Its scope and purposes are outlined on the statute books of the state. If it performs well the duties therein laid upon it, it may rest content.

If the legislature of the state, in its power and judgment, shall, from time to time, throw further obligations upon the county, it must accept the burdens, but as a general rule I believe it is safe to say that

the interests of the county will be best conserved, the duties of the supervisors will be best performed, and the people of the county will be best satisfied, if we confine ourselves to the fields and functions provided by law.

Any worthy cause, well pleaded to the members of this Board, is certain to excite their sympathy and good will and is apt to draw a hasty conclusion, that, because the purpose is worthy and the need great, recourse should at once be had to the public funds of the county to further the cause.

We must always remember that the real question for us to decide, in the very first place, is whether or not the cause is one which is proper for the county, as a county, to engage in and carry on, and, if not a proper county function, then, no matter how worthy, no matter what the need, the Board of Supervisors, as a governmental body, should not spend the taxpayers' money for it, but should leave it to make application to the proper quarters or to private generosity.

Primarily the functions of the county are the relief of its own afflicted and helpless citizens, like the county poor and the county insane and the blind; the maintenance of workhouses and jails for the petty criminals whose offenses are not grave enough to warrant a sentence to the state penitentiary, and for those awaiting trial; the overseeing of education in the county; the payment and oversight of the county officers; the erection and care of the county's buildings; the equalization of the taxes in the county, together with the taking of proper steps to insure their due levy, apportionment and collection, and other duties imposed by the statutes.

Outside of these ordinary and usual functions, our county has, with legislative aid and authority, gone into the field of special education, in the case of the Agricultural School; and into the field of private business to the extent of engaging in the abstract business, and is also assisting the United States in taking care of the families of its soldiers.

I have no criticism to make as to what has been done, but well realize that the different fields that the county has extended its functions to cannot easily be abandoned.

The work once taken up must be continued; and I simply call attention to these things that the county has done that you may realize hereafter what it means to enter into new fields of county activity.

The burden of a new endeavor once undertaken, can seldom, if ever, be laid down. Not only that, but the expense will usually increase as the years go on until we begin to appreciate what the acceptance of such a perpetual burden really means.

There always has been and always will be plenty of strictly county purposes for which all the money that can be fairly raised, without burdensome taxation, can be applied.

A new court house is a matter of but a few years. Provisions should be taken in time for the raising and accumulating of money for such a building, so that it may not come as a sudden burden on the taxpayers, nor give an excuse for the county again entering into debt.

If the future County Boards, commencing with that of 1912, will only make sufficient provision in their annual budgets for the payment of all county expenses, without using the fees that are now turned over to the county by the various county officers, and will provide for setting apart such fees in a special fund and allowing the same to accumulate, together with the interest paid thereon by the county depository, there would in ten or twelve years be a fund almost sufficient to build a substantial and modern court house such as this county will then need. Any additional cost of the construction of such a building could easily be

divided during a period of five years and in this way we could have the building that our necessities will then demand without any burden upon the taxpayers and without the county again being heavily in debt. I realize that this Board has no power to bind the action of future Boards, but I make this suggestion in the hope that those of you who may be members of the Board in the future will bring the matter up for more serious consideration.

In nothing that I have said do I desire to be understood as criticising anybody or anything. I am prompted to say these few words by the fear, perhaps unjustifiable, that the good work you members of the County Board have done in the last three years in providing for the payment of the county debt may be lost and become of no avail by reason of future Boards rushing into unwise expenditures and again creating a burdensome county indebtedness.

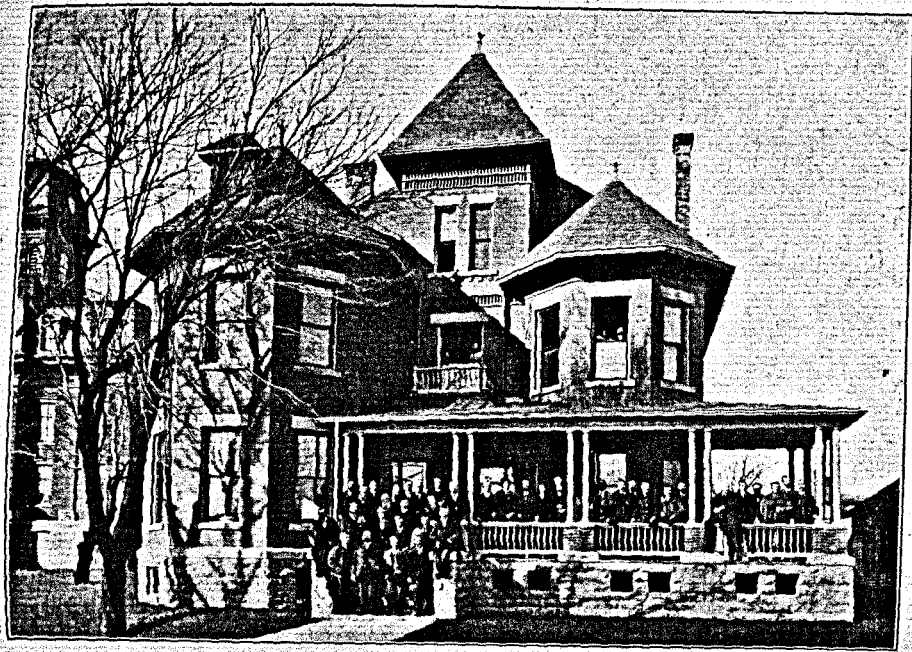

The hospital for the advanced case bases its appeal for support on both charitable and utilitarian grounds. The advance case is a social problem and must arouse the concern of the general public. One consumptive in advance stages spreads the disease to more innocent victims than a whole army of incipients. A patient, because he is not taken care of at the right time and place, directs a fearful sacrifice in money and lives. Unquestionably the best way to control a disease is by removing the centers of infection. A community which weighs the cost of a sanitorium necessary for the support of a family made dependent through disease is guilty of for the advanced case against the cost in lives, loss of wage and the expenditure a wasteful and shortsighted policy.

Every death from tuberculosis costs the community \$8,000. Such a loss demands the employment of the best methods known for the checking of the disease. The best method is isolation for the advanced. Both are possible in the county of Winnebago.

Winnebago County loses annually 79 patients. This means that the county loses annually \$640,000 from its deaths from tuberculosis alone.

An unfortunate part of the present situation is that there has been, for the past seven years, no time when the County Home has not had tuberculosis patients which have been a menace to the rest of the patients.

Therefore, we recommend that a separate institution be established for the care of advanced cases of tubercular patients.

Your committee respectfully asks that you give these matters your earnest consideration and that, if possible, you provide for a separate hospital for the treatment of those afflicted or suffering in the advanced stages from tuberculosis, which can be constructed and completed for a small sum.

The plan advocated by the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association estimates the cost of such a hospital at \$17,000.00, and the annual maintenance is estimated at \$18,500.00 This would provide for fifty patients and probably would be sufficient, at the start at least, for a number of counties.

Of course, if the patients were confined to those from Winnebago County alone, the annual cost of maintenance would be very much less, as there would not be fifty patients there probably for a long time to come.

And undoubtedly a considerable part of the patients would be able to pay a part, or all, of the cost of their treatment there.

We also would recommend that action be taken by your body memorializing the state legislature to pass a proper law providing for and authorizing the construction and maintenance of hospitals for the treatment and care of those suffering from tuberculosis, and with state aid, and with provisions permitting the county to charge the expense of the treatment of the patients to the towns, cities, villages and counties of their legal residence, and authorizing counties to receive gifts, endowments for such institutions, and to properly organize, equip and maintain the same.

If this plan is not considered feasible, we beg to substitute the following:

In the unused portion of the County Home building there is about room for thirty-five patients that could be utilized for this purpose. There would necessarily have to be some changes made at an expense approximately of \$500.00. The expense of furnishing the rooms would be about the same as the expense of furnishing the rooms in the new building. The medical treatment of the patients would be under the direction of the County Physician, whose salary would have to be increased.

There would not be required probably more than one nurse, in the beginning, and two attendants. The Special Committee met with two members of the State Board of Control and inspected the building, and those members of the State Board of Control endorsed the project and thought it was not only feasible but laudable, and could be made of great benefit to the community.

The members of the State Board of Control seemed quite certain that there would be pay patients from different parts of the state willing to take advantage of such an institution, as there is no place in the state where an advanced case can be taken, with or without pay.

MEMORIAL TO LEGISLATURE.

To the Honorable, the members of the Senate and Assembly of the State of Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: The Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago, in regular session assembled, do hereby respectfully memorialize your honorable bodies to enact a law which shall specifically authorize the various counties in the state of Wisconsin to establish county sanatoria for the treatment and care of indigent persons suffering from tuberculosis in the advanced stages, and that the care and treatment of such indigent persons shall be made a legal charge against the city, village or town in which such indigent person shall have had a legal residence.

It is further urged that such law shall be so drafted as to permit the boards of supervisors of the various counties to purchase or acquire land and to erect new buildings, or to utilize county buildings or isolated portions of such buildings already erected and not in actual use, for sanatorium purposes. Also that the boards of supervisors of the various counties, or some board committee or other

body to be appointed by the county board of supervisors, be authorized to receive and expend any gifts, donations or bequests, or such portions of them as may be needed, which may be tendered or made, and that the management of such institutions be authorized to receive for the counties compensation from such patients as may be able to pay for their care and treatment.

Be it Resolved, That a copy of this memorial be sent by the County Clerk to each of the members-elect of the legislature from this county, and that they be requested to use their best efforts to bring this memorial before the state legislature and to secure favorable action thereupon.

TUBERCULOSIS.

Dr. Brockway read the following Report No. 2:

On February 14 Miss Edith Tate, state organizer of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association, visited this city and the Oshkosh members of your committee held a meeting with her for the purpose of securing some data.

Those present at the meeting besides Miss Tate were Dr. Frank Brockway, Chas. H. Williams, Mrs. M. N. MacIver, Mrs. Ben Hooper, Mary Forbes and L. K. Bronson. Miss Tate read letters from Dr. H. E. Dearholt, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association, and Dr. J. W. Coon, superintendent of the Wisconsin State Tuberculosis Sanitarium. These letters showed that the cost of a sanitarium for 20 patients would not exceed \$300 per patient, and that the cost of operating would be from \$8.00 to \$10.00 per week. The plan for the building was presented and Miss Tate read the draft of the proposed law, providing for state aid for such institutions. Under this law, the state will pay \$3.00 per week for the care of each patient. This will reduce the cost of the county to about \$6.00 or \$7.00 a week per patient. These letters are on file in this office. Miss Forbes made a report of conditions in Oshkosh as she had found them. The city records show that in the year 1910-1911 there were twenty-seven (27) families in which there are tuberculosis patients receiving aid. Of this number there are 13 patients living now. Of the entire list, 15 families received constant help from the city and the others were given assistance from time to time or were provided for by private charities. These figures would indicate that the establishment of a sanitarium would be a matter of economy, not only in saving lives but caring for the sick. It would relieve the financial condition at home and perhaps obviate the necessity of any charitable assistance.

It was urged that the members of the committee write letters to the legislative representatives and ask others to do so, requesting the legislature to support this bill. It is believed that the bill has already been introduced and referred to some committee, but we have no definite information on this subject. However, if it has not been done, we are told there are ways in which it may be done yet, despite the time limited; therefore, your subcommittee advises that each member of the ways and means committee use his influence in securing the passage of this bill.

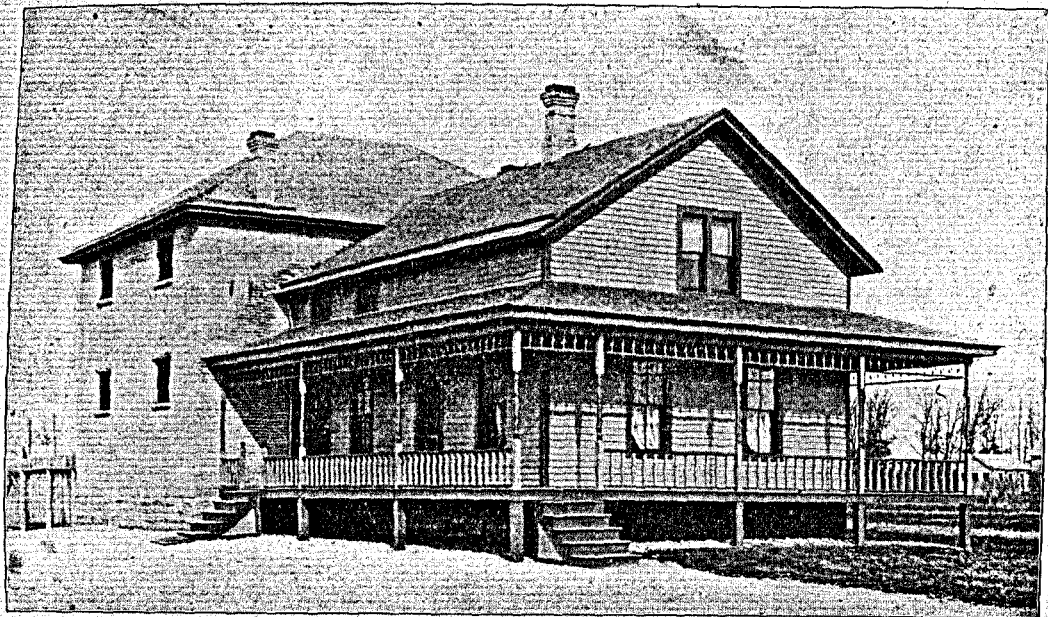

Dear Sir:—I have this day certified to the Secretary of State the apportionment of the School Fund Income received prior to the first day of this December. This apportionment includes, in addition to the sums received from other sources an amount equal to (7-10) seven-tenths of one mill for each dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of this state; two hundred thousand dollars of which are derived annually from the license fee paid by corporations doing business in this state. The amounts apportioned to the several towns, incorporated villages and cities of your county are as follows, and calculated on the basis of \$2,423-1,000 for each person of school age residing in districts which maintain a school as required by law. The number of persons of school age reported as residing in each city of the fourth class and in each town and village in your county for the year ending June 30, 1910, is given as required by Chapter 164, Laws of 1909:

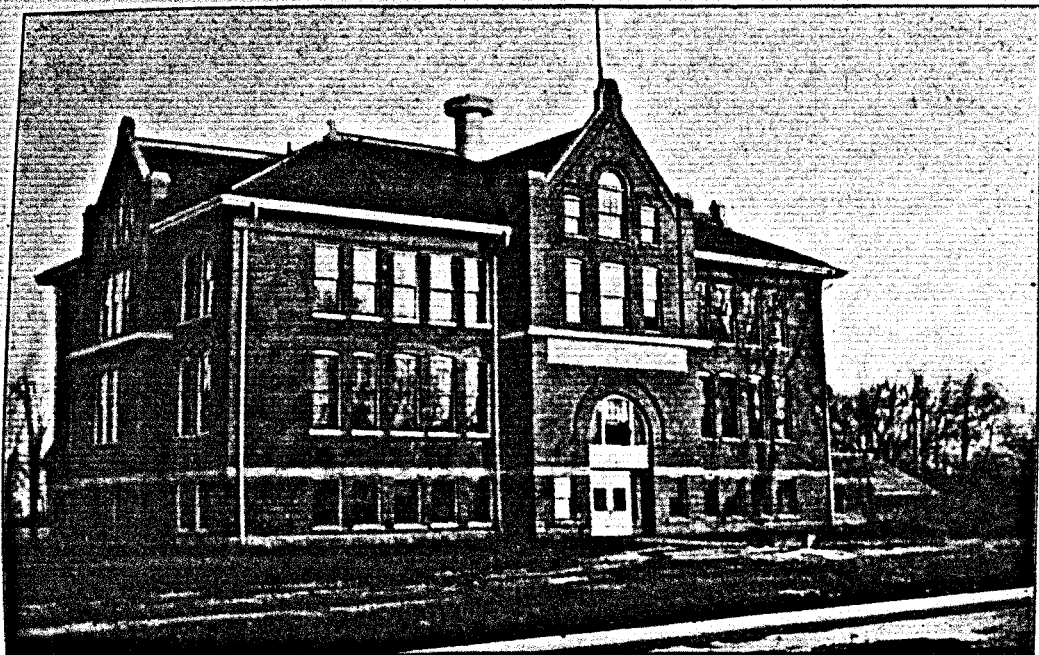
