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Supervisor Loescher moved that the rules be suspended and that the informal ballot be made formal. Motion carried and Mr. McDonald declared elected.

Mr. McDonald, in a few well chosen remarks, upon taking the chair, thanked the members of the board for the honor bestowed.

ELECTION OF VICE CHAIRMAN.

Supervisor Jourdain moved that the rules be suspended and that the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the board for Geo. A. Loescher for vice chairman. The ballot was cast and Mr. Loescher declared elected.

RULES.

Supervisor Fernandez moved that the rules of the last Supervisor year be adopted. Carried.

RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY. Adopted April 28, 1920.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' Room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 9 a. m., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 a. m. And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day

to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the IÌ.

Chairman, or in the case of his absence the Vice-Chairman, or in their absence, the Clerk, to call to order. The Clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

(Amended to provide for Vice-Chairman as authorized by Ch. 110, 1903.) of

It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following III. standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set

Standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the name of each committee, viz: Equalization, 9; Finance, 8; General Accounts, 7; Illegal Assess-ments, 5; Justices' and Constables' Accounts, 7; Sheriff's and Coroner's Accounts, 7; Insane, 3; Poor and Poor Farth, 3; Workhouse, 3; Corpor-ations, 3; Public Buildings, 5; Roads and Bridges, 5; Per Diem and Mileage, 5; Printing, 3; Bonds and Salaries, 5; County Abstract and Tract Index System, 3; Rules 3; Education, 3; Sanatorium, 5. IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairmore to prepare the list of committees and no business can

for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman, or in his absence, the Vice-Chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of VII. business shall be as follows: 1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.

Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same. 2.

3. Reports of Standing Committees.

Reports of Select Committees. 4.

5 Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of VIII. order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

The Chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken IX. by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member, who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.

2. To lay on the table.

3. For the previous question,

4. To postpone to a day certain.

5. To commit to a committee.

6. To amend or to substitute.

7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. Th previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the mediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

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XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of XXVIII. the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kinđ

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XXIX. No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.

Gentlemen-Whereas, on account of the change made in the laws relating to probate practice and the provision for appeals direct to the relating to probate practice and the provision for appeals direct to the Supreme Court from the County Court in Probate by the last legisla-ture and on account of an increase in Probate Matters generally, which has increased the work of the Register in Probate and County Court Reporter, and has been such as to render the present salary inadequate to prone-ly compared for the work so required to be done. to properly compensate for the work so required to be done.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Win-nebago County, that the salary of the Register in Probate and County Court Reporter from and after May 1st, 1920 be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty-four Hundred (\$2,400.00) Dollars per annum, said salary to be in lieu of all fees as Register in Probate and in full compensation for all services as Register in Probate and County Court Reporter, and to be paid monthly in twelve equal installments of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars per month. Whereas, as appears from the published proceedings of the County Board for the March Session 1920, and on page 145 of said published report, your committee on Bonds and Salaries reported to your Honorable Body that "in its opinion a uniform scale of salary should be adopted so far as possible for the various county officers," and as a part of the same report provided further, "that the salary of the Deputy County Clerk should be \$1,200.00 per year; that the salary of the Deputy County Clerk of Court should be \$1,200.00 per year; that the salary of the Deputy Clerk of Court should be \$1,200.00 per year; that the salary of the Deputy Clerk of Court should be \$1,200.00 per year; that the salary of the Deputy Clerk of Cle Deputy Register of Deeds should be \$1,200.00 per year; that the salary of the of the Clerk of Register of Probate should be \$1,200.00 per year; all of said salaries to take effect with the year commencing January 1921," and

Whereas, when resolutions were introduced at said March Session to carry out the foregoing, the resolution providing for the salary of the Deputy Register of Deeds was left in conformy with said report, viz:

\$1,200.00 per year to take effect January 1st, 1921. Whereas when the resolution providing for the salary of the Deputy County Treasurer and Deputy County Clerk were introduced, as appears from page 147 of the said published proceedings, the resolution was amended on motion so as to provide a salary of \$125.00 per month, and the time of taking effect thereof was amended to April 1st, 1920 and the resolution adopted as amended by 32 ayes, although the com-mittee on bonds and salaries had recommended uniformity in salaries as above set forth.

coming report of the said Register, will amount for the instant month to approximately \$700.00, and

Whereas the press of work in said Register of Deeds' office has ne-cessitated the register paying out from his own salary from \$75 to \$90 per month to the regular help employed by him; and considerable amounts from his salary for extra help during the rush periods, that he will have to pay out for the instant month for extra help, in the neighborhood of \$100.00, it is

Resolved, by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin that the Register of Deeds by and with the consent of the Chairman of the County Board, be, and he hereby is authorized and empowered to employ at the expense of the County, one copyist, when needed, at a salary not to exceed \$75 per month, until the further order of the board, to be paid monthly as other salaries of county officials are paid.

FRANCHISE WISCONSIN POWER, LIGHT AND HEAT COMPANY.

Supervisor Laabs offered the following, Report No. 31.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis. Gentlement: Your Committee on Roads and Bridges, to which was referred petition No. 4 of the Wisconsin Power, Light and Heat Company, for the approval of certain franchises in the Township of Nepeuskun and other towns, respectfully report as follows:

1. We find that attached to the petition of said company are purported copies of franchises granted said company by the Town Board of Nepeuskun, the Town Board of Rushford, and the Town Board of the Town of Winneconne.

2. We find further that before the said company can place its poles along and operate its lines upon the trunk highways of the county that it is necessary that it obtain the permission of he County Board to do so.

We find further that to permit the said company to obtain franchises from the towns of the county for the purposes of placing its poles and wires upon the highways of these towns, the result in granting to the company an indeterminate permit authorizes it to indefinitely occupy such highways with its poles and wires.

4. It is our opinion that great care should be exercised in turning over to any company for any purpose the public highways of the county under indeterminate permits.

5. We therefore recommend that approval of said franchise or permits by the County Board be limited to those trunk highways of the county over which it is necessary that said company run its lines in order to transmit electric current from Ripon to the Villages of Rush Lake, Eureka and Omro.

Report of the Winnebago County Traveling Library

Miss Edith K. Van Eman offered the following Report No. 33.

November 1920

To the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin. Gentlemen: The circulation of books from the Winnebago County Traveling Library for the year of 1919-1920 was 5,750, a decrease of 4,080 from the record of 1918-1919. Many of the libraries have not yet been returned and so the report of circulation is not complete.

65 new books were added to the collections, 31 worn out books withdrawn, making at total of 3,004 books in the entire collection. The number of libraries is 53; the number of stations, 39.

In the past the Winnebago County Traveling Library has operated under an annual appropriation of \$200, which has been made to cover books, repairs and binding, transportation, and service, that is salaries.

books, repairs and binding, transportation, and service, that is, salaries. A survey of conditions in the County made this Fall brought out certain facts in regard to the service being rendered and the demand for service. We present these facts in the following pages and in this connection we wish to show—

1-The demand for service.

2-The inadequacy of the present service.

3-The possibility for better service and to suggest a budget to cover expenses which would furnish better service.

There are in Winnebago County the following libraries, Oshkosh serving a population of 33,162; Menasha, 7,171, and Neenah, 7,214; a total of 47,547 persons served through three agencies. In addition there is a library at Omro formerly a city library and now operating through the school and at Winneconne. The library at Winneconne is very small and the collection of books is composed of books borrowed from the State Traveling Library and the Winneconne Traveling Library with only a few books belonging to Winneconne.

The people living outside of the three cities mentioned number 16,300 more than the combined populations of Neenah and Menasha. These people are served through the Winnebago County Traveling Library and through the three city libraries all of which allow residents of the county to borrow books free of charge. To serve these 16,300 persons the Winnebago County Traveling Library has 3,004 books or a book for every 5.4 persons. Winnebago County Traveling Library increased the number of books in its collection this year by 34. Therefore, one new book for every 480 persons was added. Minnesota is establishing County libraries at a rapid rate and recommends for each county one book per capita. The number of books in the Winnebago County Traveling Library is far short of the number being distributed in other states, many new books are needed, but under the present system of operation more money for books is not allowable.

Of the 39 stations in the Traveling Library 32 are placed in schools. There are 90 rural schools in the county and 4 graded schools. We have. on a waiting list of names to be sent libraries if the number of books can be increased practically all those schools now not receiving service, or can feel sure of their desire for service which it is impossible to fill. In many dis-tricts now not served there are many which would request service if the possibilities for service existed and could be explained. Probably there are now libraries in stores which would serve the community better if placed elsewhere although usually the rural school is a most desirable agency for the distribution of books. However, the facts of the best agency in a community for the distribution of books can not be known without personal visits, and at present the Winnebago County Library receives too small a budget to include adequate visiting of this kind. Visits are now made in two days each Fall and include some seven to ten stops which permit of nothing more than the delivery of books. The stations visited are those which are least able to ship or call for their books. We maintain that no business is successful unless based upon a knowledge of condition in the field covered and this knowledge is not now obtainable. We suggest a biennial visit to each agency as necessary for intelligent work.

Visits result in better choice of books because the requirements of each community can so be learned; stimuated work by the custodian after so co-operating with the librarian; changes of the location of collections to the advantage of the library; the selection of locations in districts heretofore not served and arrangements made to establish stations. Visits keep the work alive but under the present system of opration such visiting is not allowable.

The modern library idea is that everybody shall get books, the books he wants, all the books he wants, when he wants them.

Set collections, such as are now furnished some districts in the county, even when selected with discrimination and with a knowledge of local conditions can not insure such service as the modern library idea suggests. Parcel post service can and Winnebago County is well equipped to render service by parcels post with its 14 post offices and 27 rural routes. Given the books and sufficient time of a librarian, the means of transporting books to the reader is assured but under the present system of operation Winnebago County has neither the books nor the time of the librarian and it does not have the funds for transportation.

To give modern service to this county we must,

1-Have more books.

2-Send books to more places.

3-Change books sent more frequently.

4-Develop parcels post service.

5-Visit the agencies.

To accomplish modern service we need larger funds but under the law, section 43.21, the law under which we are now operating the funds to be appropriated are limited to \$200 after the first year and that sum of money is too small. However another law exists, section 43.31 of the County successfully since 1909, and this law will permit whatever service the county This is a law which permits the County Library Board to condesires. tract with the Library Board of an existing city library for service in the County. We suggest the following budget as one which would permit a beginning of better service for Winnebago County-

Books and binding \$1.200.00 Supplies and transportation 150.00 Service (Salaries) 650.00

people. We note realized, however, that some of those coming from other lands had gathered here and there in little groups and in the perpetuation of their own language, schools and customs, had failed to catch the real meaning and spirit of America or to understand our form of government. As a result, when it seemed necessary for us to enter the war these groups of people thought largely of their native lands and not of the new country which had given them prosperity and happiness. For months it was an open question whether or not such groups of people should support the government of this country or should treasonably work against its welfare. Never was this country in greater danger.

Thoughtful men and women agree that never again must people be allowed to come to our country and enjoy its opportunities without learning the nature of our institutions and developing a love for them. They must not be allowed to congregate in groups that foster thoughts and feelings that are entirely foreign. Intelligent, sympathetic efforts must be made to help these people become real Americans.

The schools are undoubtedly one of the greatest forces which can be used in this direction. An intelligent plan of Americanization of foreign born people is being worked out and must be applied both in the country and the city. The blennial report of the state superintendent showed that there were twelve hundred illiterates, mainly foreign born, in Winnebago County, that is, people at least ten years of age who could neither read nor write in any language. While most of these live in the three cities, yet many of them live in the country. The United States government has outlined courses in reading, writing, arithmetic and civics which we hope to use in starting some classes in Winnebago County during the current year.

The progress of the last forty or fifty years has been unequalled by that of any similar period in the world's history. Methods of manufacture, machinery used on the farm, and standards of living have all improved miraculously. Elementary schools in the cities, high schools, colleges and universities have had a wonderful development. The one laggard in the race has seemed to be the country school, which in the great majority of districts in the State of Wisconsin is practically the same as it was two generations ago, in the days of cradling grain and threshing with the flail. The old unplanned, box-like type of rural school building with its cross lights, misplaced blackboards and stove and limited equipment is still the usual building.

Three years ago the legislature passed a law providing special state aid to school districts which have a nine months' school year, employ a capable teacher, supply certain needed equipment, change and enlarge the lighting area so as to bring the light from the pupils' left and supply playground apparatus. I brought the provisions of this law to the attention of the school officers of those districts where the buildings seemed worth remodelling and during the past three years considerable has been done. School districts have been quick to see the improved conditions and to appreciate them. It may be gratifying to you to know that Winnebago County ranks first among the counties of the state in the number of first class rural schools, having fifty-five such schools out of a total of ninety. These districts secure special state aid of \$50 per year indefinitely so long as they maintain the conditions required by law. I feel that the various school officers and districts are to be commended for their desire to improve the schools.

However, the children of the farms, even with these improvements, must secure their elementary education under a teacher who has had little professional training and in a school building much below the standard of the farmer's home. The question is, how much longer the farmer who has modernized his buildings, machinery and h me, is going to allow his children to remain under the educational handicap of our present system Thoughtful people who have studied the rural school of rural schools. system are practically unanimous in the belief that the rural schools can never be greatly improved under the present system while they dot the country-side every few mils. The increasing cost of maintenance, including fuel, equipment and teachers' salaries, is making it increasingly difficult to maintain a good school in each district. Far sighted educators agree that there can be no great improvement until a system of consolidated schools is adopted, which would mean one school for each township. Such a system would decrease the cost of maintenance and would make it possible to secure suitable buildings, modern equipment and highly trained instructors. In the states of Indiana and Iowa most of the rural schools have been The reason I have not consolidated and have won strong endorsement. urged the erection of new district buildings except in cases of dire necessity is because I have felt that such buildings would be a handicap in securing consolidation when the time comes as it surely will sooner or later.

It is common knowledge that during the past two or three years the supply of legally qualified teachers has been entirely insufficient. As a result it has been necessary to use a certain number of high school graduates with no professional training. Some of these people, in spite of their lack of preparation, have had considerable natural ability and have, after a period of experiment, developed into capable teachers, though the schools in all cases have suffered more or less during the time these untrained people have been learning methods of teaching. It is somewhat the same as if we were to turn a set of intelligent but untrained men loose in a community with their scalpels and their medicine cases to learn to be surgeons and doctors by experimenting upon their neighbors.

The biggest single factor in a good school is a trained teacher, and until we can have such people either by means of consolidated schools or by paying salaries equal to those in the towns our schools can not rise much above their present efficiency. The tragedy of the situation is that when a teacher does show unusual ability she is often recognized by some nearby town and offered a better salary. The rural schools thus serve as a training ground where beginning teachers experiment upon the country children until they either become sufficiently capable to accept a city position or go into some other occupation. The result is that we have a large turn-over or shifting of the teachers from year to year, which means that without consolidated schools or some other remedy no high degree of efficiency can be developed.

The idea is more or less common that any one can teach little children or those in the lower grades. Nothing was ever farther from the truth. The early years of a child's school life are the most important. It is at this time that he lays the foundation for all later learning, that he forms his habits of study and his attitude toward education and that his life is given the bent for its later development. It is at this time that a child needs the most highly trained and efficient teacher in order to lay the best possible foundation. It is at this time that the untrained or mediocre teacher can do more harm than at any other time in a child's school life.

There is no question but what there are many intelligent, capable women in the rural schools. I am sorry to say, however, that in talking with such teachers one very often finds that they are planning to change their work and do something more to their liking. As they become more efficient they become less inclined to endure the hardships of a rural teacher's work. The customary requirement that the teacher shall not only plan all the work for twenty-five or thirty classes a day, conduct the 'recitations and correct the written work, but that she must also build the fires and do the other janitor work makes many unwilling to continue teaching. If a teacher is at all capable it is unwise business economy to require her to waste her time doing work which might just as well be done by cheaper labor. Many a capable teacher leaves the profession because she declares that she will not endure the hardships another winter of building the fire and caring for the building, in addition to all her other work. I am pleased to say that in many of the districts of Winnebago County the school officers are hiring someone in the district to at least build the fires, this service being often secured for from ten to twenty-five dollars for the three or four winter months of the school year.

One of the discouraging elements of a teacher's life is the commonly unappreciative attitude of the public toward the nature of a teacher's work. Many people can only see the five or six hours' work that she works when the school is actually in session and do not consider the hours spent in preparation and correction of work outside of regular school hours. Anyone who has been in charge of children for any length of time knows that teaching is very enervating and that a day spent in the school room is ordinarily much more exhaustive than it would be if spent at hard physical labor. When the public comes to realize these facts teachers will appreciate the more sympathetic understanding and will be likely to remain longer in this work.

During the past twelve months Winnebago County has had the services of a trained nurse supplied by the Red Cross of the county. I have been pleased to find that from the very first her work has been welcomed and appreciated. A thorough inspection of all the children of the county has revealed physical defects or more or less importance in 75 percent of the children, which is about the percentage throughout the state. After the inspection of the pupils of a school the nurse has sent notes to parents of those who have been found to have defects and it has been very encouraging to find in how large a number of cases the parents have responded by taking the children to physicians for more thorough examination and for remedy of the defects, which in many cases were unsuspected by the parents of the children. The filling and removing of teeth, the removing of adenoids and diseased tonsils and the proper remedying of other less

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common defects has been very general. It would be difficult to overestimate the improvements in health and school progress which are resulting from this service.

Many people have less bodily vigor and health because of improper selection of food. This is as common among people of wealth as among those in moderate circumstances and is largely merely a question of knowledge of food values. This year the county nurse plans to specially emphasize the subject of malnutrition. She will make it concrete by showing examples of meals where there have been desirable and undesirable selections and amounts of food. A Health Week was arranged for Winnebago County in October. In each of the schools an hour was taken each day for the study of health problems. Each school was invited to come to one of the twenty-three evening meetings which were addressed by physicians, nurses and others interested in health subjects. Between fifteen hundred and two thousand people attended these meetings.

Last year this board made provision for the salary and expenses of the county nurse from the time when she would be released from her contract with the Red Cross the first of November, until January 1st, 1921. If this board feels that the work of the nurse has been worth while and should be continued it will be necessary that action be taken at this session to provide for the salary and expenses of the nurse for the ensuing year. Realizing the impossibility of one nurse d ing the amount of work which the experience of last year has shown to be needed the Red Cross has engaged another nurse to take Miss Erdman's place when she is engaged by the county. This additional nurse will be paid and supplied with a car and necessary expenses by the Red Cross.

There is nothing more deep seated in the nature of a normal child than the sense of play. Until recent years little advantage has been taken of this tremendous force in the training of children. Their play has been largely incidental. Today educational systems everywhere are making definite and extensive plans for wholesome and healthful play.

The objection is made that play is unnecessary, that children, especially In the rural districts, have enough to do at home to give them all the exer-cise they need. This objection ignores the fact that there is much more than exercise to be secured from play. One has but to look at the dull and lifeless faces of children prematurely old as they pour out of factories where child labor is employed to realize that such children have lost something from their lives that can never be replaced. This is equally true of the stolid faced country boy or girl who has never learned how to play. The history of the dull, brutish men of today often shows that they were the playless children of yesterday. Bickering, quarreling, tale-bearing and fighting are much more common in schools where there is no provision or encouragement for play. Children who are engaged in active play not only find an outlet for surplus energy but their minds are safely employed. There is a stage in the development of a child when his thoughts need to be occupied with objective interests and rot allowed to rest on self. Many immoral and impure suggestions could be saved the minds of innocent children in our rural schools if provision were made to utilize all the recreation time in play, instead of allowing it to be spent in mischievous idleness. Many rural school districts in the county are providing playground apparatus, such as the giant strides, teeters, swings, and bins and soft base balls.' Money spent in supplying such equipment could not be used more wisely.

During the war larger boys and girls were excused from attendance at school more freely than usual because of the recognized necessity of assisting at home during the special stress of that time. This seemed to set a bad precedent. During the last two years a considerable number of children have been kept out of school to assist at home when it was really not necessary or even hired out to the neighbors. Some teachers and school officers dislike to report such cases because of the unpleasant feeling likely to result. I have recently informed the teachers, who under the law are made responsible, of the penalty provided by law and during the present year we hope to have much more regular attendance on the part of those who have been inclined to be negligent. We shall appreciate any influence members of this board may exert to assist us in this way.

It is commonly charged that the work of the schools is bookish and impractical and for this reason does not appeal to children as they get into the upper grades. We have been trying to meet this objection by making the school work practical and applying it to actual conditions wherever possible. Last spring the upper grades of many schools were present at the town meetings, which are ordinarily excellent examples of democratic government. Several weeks ago sample election ballots were sent out to all of the schools, where they were explained and elections held. Questions concerning school district, town and county government are given emphasis rather than those of state and national government which are of less immediate interest.

In the work in agriculture the selecting and testing of seed corn, the collection and mounting of weed seeds and grains, and the collection of samples of various kinds of soil have been carried on in many schools. The Seed Show held by the bankers in December had an excellent influence. Considerable attention was given to the study of birds, especially those valuable to the farmer. The calf and poultry clubs have been given every encouragement and credit has been given in agriculture to those boys and girls taking part in this work.

The value of general reading in giving a person a broad general knowledge of commonly recognized as a valuable auxiliary to school work. For this reason encouragement has been given to the reading of library books, magazines and newspapers and special credit has been given in reading for this outside work.

One of the most helpful forms of language work has been the issuing of school newspapers in many schools. Compositions, news events and various other interesting material is gathered together and edited by some of the older pupils, after which it is printed with the hectograph and copies provided for each family. The children have taken a great interest in this work and it has assisted in making them realize the value of using good English.

Criticism has always been made of elementary schools, that the number of graduates is very small compared with the enrollment. During the past few years the teachers have done a great deal in urging pupils to remain in school and take the final examinations. The number of graduates has gradually increased until last year we had a total of 170, distributed as follows:

Clayton-25; Rushford-22; Vinland-18; Algoma-12; Oshkosh-11; Poygan-11; Neenah-10; Nepeuskun-10; Utica-10; Wolf River-10; Omro 9; Winneconne-9; Nekimi-8; Menasha-2; Winchester-2; Black Wolf 1. At least 80 percent of these graduates according to our records, 'are now attending high school.

Probably no other single factor has been of more assistance in improving the rural schools than the supervising teachers who are provided by the state. Not being burdened with office work they have been enabled to spend much of their time in the schools where they have assisted greatly in setting the standards of accomplishment for teachers and pupils and in requiring that they be met. A day's visit from the supervising teacher very often means the difference between a medicore or poorly taught school and one which is reasonably effective. It seems likely in view of the good work of the supervising teachers that the legislature will this winter make, provision for increasing the number.

It cost last year to maintain the schools of Winnebago County that come under the supervision of this office the sum of \$137,859,76. The county paid in salary for the supervision of these schools the sum of \$1,700 or about one eighteenth as much as the entire cost. The elementary schools of the city of Oshkosh cost last year about \$180,000, and there was paid in salaries for supervision about \$12,000 or one fifteenth as much. This is five times as much per dollar of cost as the county pays. I submit to you whether this comparatively small expenditure for supervision is wise business economy or fair to the rural schools,

The salaries of many rural teachers have more than doubled since the salary of the county superintendent has been changed so that a number of them receive within eight or ten dollars as much per month. Some of the teachers in the high schools are receiving several hundred dollars more for two or three months less work. The principals at Winneconne and Omro receive eight hundred dollars more though these schools are under the supervision of this office. Laboring men receive from four or five to six or seven dollars a day. Carpenters and masons receive from seven to ten dollars a day. Your county superintendent who has had five years of special training for the work and is responsible for the supervision of the work of 120 teachers, 300 school officers and about 3,000 pupils receives about 35.60 per day. It is impossible to meet the demands made upon the office and live on this salary and I request that the board give this matter

Total \$6,900 At the last session of the legislature the limit of the salary of supervising teachers was removed, making it possible to employ much more capable people than would have been possible under the former statute. The Committee on Common Schools engaged Miss Alice Madison, formerly supervising teacher of Waushara County at a salary of \$150 per month and expenses. A careful estimate indicates that it will be necessary to place an additional thousand dollars in the revolving fund used for the supervising teacher. The county is reimbursed for the salary and expenses of this supervisor at the close of each school year. I also recommend that the usual appropriation of \$100 be made for the expenses of the Committee on Common Schools.

This agreement made and entered into this 5th day of January, A. D. 1921, by and between the County of Winnebago, State of Wisconsin, and William Golz, sheriff-elect, witnesseth as follows:

That the said William Golz, in the consideration of the payments of money herein provided for, agrees to board all prisoners who may be confined in the county jail of Winnebago County, except those prisoners confined at hard labor out of doors, to wash their clothes and mend the same, and to furnish wholesome, well-cooked food in sufficient quantities for their proper feeding, and maintaining such prisoners at a price of, twenty-five (25) cents for each meal so furnished such prisoners with no extra charge for wasning or mending the clothing of the same before trial; after trial, he should receive \$4.20 per week.

It is understood that said amount is to be paid for all meals so actually furnished said prisoners and the said Sheriff agrees to keep the County Jail Register so as to show the hour of receiving and discharging such prisoners and the exact number of meals furnished to each.

The said Sheriff further agrees to board all prisoners who may be confined in the County JaH of Winnebago County at hard labor out of doors for an agreed price of thirty-five (35) cents for each meal so furnished such prisoners while they are performing such labor, with no extra charge for washing and mending; where necessary, said meals are to be put up to be carried by said prisoners to their work, and furnished at suitable times, so that said prisoners can go to their work.

It is further agreed, that no bills shall be presented to the said county or any charge made for any services rendered in connection with the preparation of fund for said prisoners nor in doing the washing and mending herein provided for, of furnishing any materials or articles used in the way of preparations of said food, and that the County of Winnebago shall properly heat and light said jail and the sheriff's residence and shall furnish fuel for cooking purposes and for said jail and sheriff's residence.

In consideration of the faithful performance of the above agreement by said sheriff, the County of Winnebago agrees to cause to be paid to him the sum of twenty-five (25) cents for each meal for regular prisoners before trial and \$4.20 per week after trial, and the sum of thirty-five (35) cents for each meal for prisoners confined to hard labor out of doors while performing such labor.

To the Honorable County State Road & Bridge Committee: Subject: Furchase of County Material Yard. Mr. Pipkorn of the Pipkorn Fuel & Supply Company has purchased a new yard and herewith he submits a proposition to sell the buildings in the old yard, also the lease which he has with the C & N W Ry, which I understand is transferable.

1-The first reason why I think the County should own such a yard is to have a place to store road materials and supplies in a central location in the City of Oshkosh.

2—At certain times of the year we are able to purchase oils, gravel and sand at a reduction in prices, if we had some place for storage. .3—This yard is situated on Wisconsin Ave, has a railroad siding through center of yard. Yard is 105 ft. wide by 500 ft. long and well fenced, siding is accessible to all railroads entering Oshkosh.

4-Very often it is necessary to purchase tars, oils, roofing gravel and sand for maintaining concrete and crushed stone roads and we have no place for storage and unloading.

5-Whenever we unload materials especially with a clamshell from team tracks in railroad yards, we are blocking some one's warehouse or have obstructions in the way such as telephone and light wires and poles.

nave obstructions in the way such as telephone and light wires and poles. 6-As we are about to construct the Winneconne Road by day labor, we must have a yard to unload materials, so as to be able to stockpile a large amount of stone before we begin work on the Jackson St. road with our clam-shell, otherwise we will have to purchase another clam-shell to take care of unloading materials for the Winneconne Road, but by having this yard and stock piling, a large amount of stone before be-ginning work on Jackson St. will eliminate the purchase of another clam-shell shell

7-It will be very difficult later on during the season to get cement to carry on road work, when all the road construction jobs will be wanting cement, therefore by purchasing the buildings of Mr. Pipkorn, we could store a large amount of cement early in the season and avoid any delays later on due to cement shortage, which is bound to occur with such a large construction program as is to be carried on in the State this year.

-At present we have no place for the storage of trucks except at the County Workhouse and this is limited and during the working seaset county workhouse and this is limited and during the working sea-son, it is too far out to keep trucks, to go back and forth mornings and nights after the day's work is done. Pipkorn's yard is centrally located and we can run the trucks in there nights; there is also one large shed that can be made into a garage with very little expense, making a place to provide and determined and the second s

9- It is absolutely impossible to get the kind of material required for the States Specification from local quarries at all times during the year, therefore it is necessary to have a stock pile of material that we can go to at all times.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING AUTHORITY TO THE OSHKOSH GAS LIGHT COMPANY TO ERECT AND MAINTAIN ITS POLES AND WIRES OVER AND ALONG PART OF THE FOND DU LAC OR LAKE SHORE ROAD IN THE TOWN OF BLACK WOLF, WINNE-BAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN.

The Town Board of the Town of Black Wolf does ordain:

Section 1. Permission and authority is hereby granted to the Oshkosh Gas Light Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, to erect and maintain poles and wires in and along the public highway known as the Fond du Lac or Lake Shore Road in the town of Black Wolf, from the intersection therewith of the southerly line of the Plat of Windmere, and thence on and along said public highway to the intersection of said highway with the road running easterly to Fahrney's Point, for the purpose of transmitting light, heat and power by means of electricity. At the adjourned session of this board held in March, 1920, by Resolution Number Twelve adopted on March 5th, 1920, the per-diem compensation of the members of your board elected after the adoption of said resolution was fixed at five dollars (\$5.00) per day and at the same session of your board by report Number Sixteen made by the Committee on Bonds and Salaries to whom resolutions had been referred relating thereto recommended that the salaries of the Disitrict Attorney be fixed at Twenty-four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00) per year; Register of Deeds, Twenty-four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00) per year; County Treasurer and Purchasing Agent, Twenty-four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00) per year; Clerk of Courts, Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.000) per year; Courty Clerk, Twenty-four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00) per year; Sheriff, Thirty-six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) per year; Deputy County Clerk, Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per year; Deputy County Treasurer, Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per year; Deputy of Courts, Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per year; Deputy Clerk of Courts, Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per year; Deputy Register of Deeds, Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per year; Clerk to Register of Pro-bate, Twelve Hundred Dollars.(\$1,200.00) per year. That the report of your committee on Bonds and Salaries so made was received and placed on file and resolutions thereafter adopted fixing the salaries of said several officers as recommended in said report, except that the resolution fixing the salary of the Deputy Clerk of Courts was amended, increasing the amount of the salary of the Deputy of the salary of the Deputy Clerk of Courts from Twelve Hun-dred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per year to Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00), per year; the salary of the Deputy County Treas-urer from Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) to Fifteen Hundred Dol-Dollars Treaslars (\$1,500.00) per year; the salary of Deputy County Clerk from Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) to Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per year; and at the May, 1920, session of your Board the salary of Deputy Register of Deeds was increased from Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) to Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per year, and the salary of the Deputy Highway Commissioner increased from Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to Eighteen

Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per year. That the present Deputy County Clerk, Miss Georgia Pickett, has served Winnebago County faithfully and with great efficiency for more than twenty years; that the present Deputy County Treasurer, Miss Irene C. Eggersgluess, has/served the County faithfully and efficiently for approximately nine years; that the present Deputy Clerk of Courts. Miss Mildred MacDonald, has served the County faithfully and efficiently for approximately five years; and that the Deputy Register of Deeds, Miss Aleda Cowling, has served in the office of the Register of Deeds efficiently and faithfully for some years and has been promofed to the office of Deputy Register of Deeds; that the Deputy County Highway Commissioner, Mr. E. M. Bird has served in the highway department of this County for several years efficiently and that these several deputy officers because of their long period of service have become highly efficient and in a measure experts in the work of their several

That the County Highway Commissioner after his election in November. 1920, and the several county officers after their election in November, 1920, entered upon the duties of their offices and have appointed their deputies and continued them in office at the salaries fixed as hereinbefore stated

That faithful and efficient service in all County offices is desirable and essentially important and valuable to the County. That a proper mental atti-tude is fundamental and essential to success in all physical departments of human activities and that a reduction in the salaries of the present deputies if they are to be retained in office would naturally disturb their mental attitude in their work and affect the value and efficiency of their service to the County. That they might be replaced by less efficient persons at a lower salary but it does not appear to your Committees that after being trained for the work of their several offices it would be advisable or advantageous to the County at this time to reduce their salaries or displace them with cheaper and less efficient service.

That Subsection "4" of Section 59.03 of the Statutes fixes the per-diem compensation of members of your Board at Four Dollars (\$4.00) and permits an increase of the same to Five Dollars (\$5.00) per day; that any compensation permitted by law to County Boards does not compensate them for their time and expenses in attending County Board Sessions and they serve, in a measure at least, without adequate compensation and for the public good and not for the compensation allowed them.

That later when living conditions reach the normal and the salaries of all County officers can be readjusted it might be well to readjust them together with the salaries of their deputies and adjust both the salaries of the officers and their deputies at the same time.

That a saving to the County might be made by shortening the sessions of the board.

Your Committees therefore recommend that the salaries of the said deputies referred to in said resolution Number Three remain for the present as they now are and that the members of the County Board serve at the min-mum compensation fixed by Statute, or better, that they remit their compensation entirely except the compensation for mileage.
