ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

Supervisor O'Donnell moved that the rules be suspended and that the clerk be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for Geo. A. Loescher. Remarks by Supervisors Grimes and McCool. Motion carried.

The ballot was cast and Geo. A. Loescher declared elected.

Mr. Loescher, in a few well chosen remarks, upon taking the chair, thanked the members of the Board for the honor bestowed.

ELECTION OF VICE CHAIRMAN.

Supervisors White and O'Donnell were named as candidates for vice

chairman. Supervisor O'Donnell declined the nomination. Motion that the rules be suspended and that the clerk be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for M. F. White. Motion carried. The ballot was cast and M. F. White was declared elected.

RULES.

Motion that the rules of the last Supervisor year be adopted for the year 1924. Motion carried.

RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

Adopted May 7, 1924.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m.

And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in the case of his absence the vice chairman, or in their absence, the clerk, to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a chairman and vice chairman.

(Amended to provide for vice chairman as authorized by Ch. 110, of 1903.)

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, 9; finance, 8; general accounts, 7; illegal assessments, 5; justice and constables' accounts, 7; sheriff's and coroners' accounts, 7; insane, 3; poor and poor farm, 3; workhouse, 3; corporations, 3; public buildings, 5; roads and bridges, 5; per diem and mileage, 5; printing, 3; bonds and salaries, 5; county abstract and tract index system, 3; rules, 3; education, 3; sanatorium, 5.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of standing committees.
4. Reports of select committees.
5. Consideration of miscellaneous business.

VIII. The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board..

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law..

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn..
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

XXIX. No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.

RECESS.

Supervisor O'Donnell moved that a recess of thirty minutes be taken to give the chairman time to select the standing committees. Motion carried.

PETITION ASKING COUNTY BOARD TO APPROVE FRANCHISE.

Petitions of the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation were presented to the Board and on motion referred to the committee on roads and bridges.

PROVIDING PAYMENT OF BOND ISSUE, SERIES F.

Supervisor White offered the following Resolution No. 1:

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, that for the purpose of providing for the payment of the principal and interest of those certain highway bonds, aggregating two hundred and five thousand dollars (\$205,000), known as series F, bearing date April 1, 1924, there shall be and there is hereby levied a direct annual tax upon all taxable property in Winnebago county sufficient to produce the sum of ten thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$10,250), in each of the years 1924 to 1927, both inclusive, and the sum of two hundred ten thousand one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$210,125) in the year 1928.

And provision to meet the requirements hereof shall, in due time, manner and season, annually hereafter, be made.

To the County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: The trustees of the Winnebago county asylum and home beg leave to report as follows with reference to the sale of ten acres of land, a part of the so-called Miller farm.

We report that pursuant to the directions of this board the said lands were advertised and sold to the highest bidder, William Frees, for five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500.00), and that the deed and abstract will be delivered to the purchaser when the survey of the land sold has been completed.

We further report that in our opinion the money received from said sale should be paid into the asylum fund for the reason that the original purchase of the Miller farm and Grunske farm were paid for out of the asylum fund.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION TO LEASE SPACE IN EXPOSITION BUILDING.

Supervisor Macke offered the following Resolution No. 3:

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Whereas, the Winnebago County Fair Association is about to erect an exposition building on the Winnebago county fair grounds, owned by Winnebago county, to permit merchants and manufacturers and business men to exhibit their goods and merchandise, money for the erection of said building to be raised through subscriptions among the merchants and manufacturers, the same to be subscribed by leasing space to such subscribers for a period of ten years; and

Whereas, it is necessary that the Winnebago County Fair Association be free to enter into such leases or agreements with such subscribers for the space in said building; now, therefore

Resolved, that the Winnebago County Fair Association be and it is hereby given absolute right, power and authority to enter into leases or agreements for leasing space in said building to subscribers of money for the erection thereof for a period not to exceed ten years.

RELOCATION OF STATE TRUNK HIGHWAY 34, IN VILLAGE OF WAUKAU.

Supervisor Starr offered the following Resolution No. 4:

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Whereas, state highway No. 34, in the village of Waukau, in said county, has been relocated so that the highway does not reach the St. Paul station in said village; and

Whereas, it appears to be the wish of the people of said locality that the said highway be again relocated so as to go easterly on the town line to Waukau station, and thence north through the village of Waukau; and

Whereas, it is the belief of this Board that said roadway should be thus relocated to pass by the St. Paul station in Waukau;

Now therefore resolved, that this board petition the state highway commission to relocate said highway so that the same may come into the village of Waukau from the west on the town line road, and thence north-erly past the railway station through the village of Waukau.

And we further respectfully ask that action on said matter be had at an early date to permit the early construction of said road.

Resolved, that the highway committee be instructed to forward a copy of this resolution forthwith to the state highway commission.

Whereas, said company has petitioned this Board to approve the said permit from the town of Neenah;

Now, therefore, resolved that said permit be, and the same is hereby approved; and the county road and bridge committee is hereby authorized and directed to issue a permit to said company to construct and operate its said lines along the state highway within said town of Neenah.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE PARKING OF VEHICLES UPON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS IN WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

No person shall park or leave any automobile, motor vehicle or other similar vehicle, or any other vehicle, along, upon or within the limits of any public highway maintained at the expense of the County of Winnebago and State of Wisconsin; or either, in such manner as to interfere with the free passage of vehicles over and along such highway, except when making absolutely necessary repairs, and in all cases there shall be left a clear and usable passageway of at least 18 feet so that the vehicles going in opposite directions may pass without interference from any standing vehicles.

Section 2. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100

- and in default of payment of such fine by imprisonment in the county jail not less than 10 days nor more than three months.

Section 3. All proceedings for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance may be had before any justice of the peace or municipal court within the county having jurisdiction of similar cases under the law of the state. All of such proceedings shall be had and conducted in the same manner as similar cases under the state law, except that any and all fines collected under the provisions of this ordinance shall be paid into the treasury of Winnebago County.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication according to law.

APPROPRIATION—THIRD STREET, CITY OF MENASHA.

Supervisor Jourdain offered the following Resolution No. 2:

Whereas, Third street in the city of Menasha, Wis., from Racine to Manitowoc street and Depere street from Third street north to the north line of Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie Ry. right of way, known as the Soo line, same being on state trunk highway No. 114 and state trunk highway No. 15, in said city, has been paved with concrete, having an integral curb. That the plans and specifications and details, and the forms

of contract were made in accordance with the recommendations and approval of the road and bridge committee of the county of Winnebago, Wisconsin, and were fully approved by the state highway engineer of said state. That bids for the construction of said pavement were duly advertised for and bids therefor were duly received and opened in the presence of the road and bridge committee of said county, and upon the recommendation of said road and bridge committee the contract for the said pavement was awarded, and said contract signed and fully approved by the said road and bridge committee of said county of Winnebago and also by the state highway commission of the said state.

That the total cost of said pavement, including the city's portion, was thirty-one thousand, eight hundred and twenty-nine dollars and twenty cents (\$31,829.20).

That following is an itemized statement of the total cost of an eighteen foot roadway on the highways above mentioned, between the points on said highways named, was as follows:

Of the \$10,000.00 received from the County Board in 1923, \$250.00 was paid to the Wisconsin State Poultry Association of Oshkosh, \$250.00 to the Twin-City Poultry Association of Neenah-Menasha, and \$9,500.00 on permanent improvements on the county's land.

There were 1,526 people who had an active part in putting on the 1924 Winnebago county fair. There were 531 exhibitors, 36 police, 37 laborers, 15 ticket sellers, 251 race horse men, 13 night watchmen, 32 free acts people, 54 ticket takers (including shows), 30 superintendents and assistants, and 16 judges.

The Winnebago county fair is helping to put Winnebago county on the map and is now known as one of America's foremost county fairs.

Continued co-operation of County Board members, farmers, business men and citizens will in a short time give our fair the distinction of being known as "America's Foremost County Fair."

SUPERVISING TEACHER'S REPORT.

Elizabeth King offered the following Report No. 9:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago, County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: The supervising teacher under the new law is appointed by the county superintendent and works under his direction for ten months in the year, beginning in August and ending in June. The State Department of Education also assists in directing the work by sending out frequent instructions, suggestions, and bulletins, and an inspector who visits schools with the supervising teacher and helps in planning work. Once a year the State Superintendent of Public Instruction calls a conference at Madison, at which time plans and suggestions are given by members of the state department.

The work of the supervising teacher consists principally in visiting the schools while in session, conferring with and advising the teachers in regard to school organization, classification of pupils, course of study, methods of teaching, and the care and use of buildings, grounds, books, and other supplies. When occasion calls for it members of school boards and parents are also visited to confer on matters of interest pertaining to the schools. All teachers' meetings in the county are attended, and such part taken in the work as the county superintendent may direct. Evening meetings in school houses, such as school programs and community gatherings, are participated in when possible.

Following is a summary of the work of the year beginning August 18, 1923, and closing June 17, 1924.

In the present year to date, forty days have been spent in visitation; 104 school visits made—in all but twelve of the one and two room schools of the county; four days have been spent at institute and group meetings, and four at the county fair in placing, caring for, and judging the school exhibits.

Reports on all visits are made to the county superintendent, and these in turn are forwarded to the teachers and clerks of the schools visited, together with such suggestions in regard to building, equipment, or work of the teacher as he may deem necessary.

The total cost of the supervising teacher and expense for the year 1923-24 was \$2,656.20, for all of which the county is reimbursed by the state. The traveling and other expenses totaled \$356.20 for the year. This amount is approximately \$450 less than for the preceding year.

When one considers the following figures he cannot fail to see how slight the cost is in comparison to other expenses in the county.

The cooperation received from the teachers this year is exceptionally fine; and the work this year is both more interesting and more satisfactory than it was last year, owing to the better acquaintance with the schools of the county and a new plan of supervision by means of bulletins sent regularly to the teachers. These bulletins consist of suggestions to teachers and outlines of work to be done by each class in the following six weeks. The results of the tests are sent back to the office by the teachers, and thus we are kept better informed of the quality of work being done in each school. In spite of this it is still impossible to do all that should be done. The number of schools and the distances are too great to permit a sufficient number of visits per year to accomplish the best results. City schools have the advantage over rural districts in this respect. The work accomplished in them through closer supervision proves its value. To everyone acquainted with the situation it is most evident that there is a real need for more and still more supervision of rural schools.

In submitting this report for the year starting Nov. 1, 1923, and ending Nov. 1, 1924, I have some very interesting phases of the work to present to you.

Last year I mentioned several crippled cases that I had worked with to secure correction and also to secure some form of education for them. During the past year, one cleft palate case has been corrected, two infantile paralysis cases have been corrected—one a boy of 9 years who went to

Bradley Memorial hospital at Madison, has had a very good correction. He is still wearing a brace, but his parents were very much pleased with his correction.

The other boy was 16 years old. His correction has not been as pronounced as I hoped he would have, but all orthopedic specialists tell us that the ideal time to do corrective work is to have it done when the child is young and before bones are well set.

One man with a peculiar defect which started when he was a very young child has made application to have medical care. Of course, I do not know just how much can be done for him, but after he has had his medical examination we can at least satisfy ourselves that we have done all that can be done for him at this age of life.

I do not believe that the average individual stops to realize how many home calls it takes to get parents to respond. I must make repeated calls to get results and at times I think a great deal more could be accomplished if some neighbor or friend could and would help the family to procure corrective work for the child.

Just now I have four crippled children, two of whom have been examined by the physician that was with the Child Welfare Special and the diagnosis made was that some very good corrective work could be done. I am still urging the parents to have this corrective work done for them.

One boy that visited the bone clinic that we had here in February, 1923, is now attending school with an aim to securing an education in order to earn a living, where with only one hand, I believe you will agree with me, it would be rather difficult for him to ever become a real self-supporting citizen.

Another case is that of a girl who has one leg amputated. Her parents realize that this girl has a serious handicap and that she needs far more educational advantages than does a normal girl.

Through the vocational board, scholarships are available to a limited number of handicapped boys and girls whose parents are not financially situated to procure this education. If the child and family are deserving of this help a scholarship of \$15 a month is given, and this must go toward the child's board, room and school supplies.

The boy I just cited is receiving this help and a recent application has been made for the girl with the leg off. I believe she will receive this help through the federal board.

A child 7 years old has been attending one of the state day deaf schools and has made rapid progress. Possibly you are not familiar with the plan of these day schools. Any citizen having a child who is deaf can send him to one of these schools, the board and tuition being paid by the state and the teacher is thoroughly trained in teaching the deaf child. I am at the present time urging a girl who is now in the eighth grade to go to the state deaf school for high school work, where she will be fitted for a definite job.

I hope to procure repair work on an artificial leg for a boy whose parents cannot take care of this work, but through the kind help of the community money was raised to buy the leg a few years ago. It is now too short for the boy and the firm where the leg was purchased feel that it can be adjusted to fit him, so I have cooperated with one of the neighbors who is much interested and either he or I will take the boy and his artificial leg to Milwaukee very soon.

I believe one health problem that possibly we are more interested in than any other phase is the tuberculosis work.

I keep a record of each tuberculosis case that I get in touch with and I endeavor to visit them at stated intervals. With present plan of having consultation service at Sunnyview sanitarium, I find it much easier to have these patients examined more often and, of course, this means a much closer watch of their physical condition. As their condition improves it is not as necessary for them to be examined so often. I feel that I can safely say that the county tuberculosis cases are progressing or improving very nicely. The general attitude is now of getting well and we know that unless a patient assumes a mental attitude of fight, that no sanitarium or doctor can cure them. What we can do is this: through these factors instill them with that idea of their having to make it their own individual job.

You may recall the case of a boy that I reported to you last year who had a tuberculous foot. Through the free service of two local doctors he had a small piece of bone removed, then went to our sanitarium. He was discharged from there last spring, reexamined in July, and I hope to have

him examined again this month. His limp is not so marked as it was before his operation.

According to death records, we have had only two tuberculosis deaths in the county exclusive of the cities since January, 1923.

I do feel that we should have yearly chest clinics, one for both villages. I am much pleased with results obtained from clinics we had in August, 1923, and I believe only through frequent clinics can we find all the active tuberculosis cases, which is one big method of tuberculosis education.

There are twenty people in the county with tuberculosis history. I make visits to these at intervals, depending on the activity. Of course we never know just how many other cases we have, and it is only through education in tuberculosis that we can decrease the number of deaths.

I was able last year to visit all the schools at least once and inspect and weigh pupils present.

I am finding a very noticeable decline in the number of pupils with defects. It is also interesting to know that there are three schools where all permanent teeth are 100% perfect. There are quite a number of other schools where only a very small amount of dental work is necessary to make those schools 100%.

Another interesting factor is the smaller amount of eye defects and the number of children who have had corrections made. Several of the pupils who have worn glasses for three or four years are this year putting them aside, as their eyes have improved to normal vision. This is not true in all cases, as some of these children will always have to wear glasses.

One of the big difficulties in doing corrective work is to find the money to do it with. Some of the parents want to have the work done, but really feel that they cannot afford to take care of it. I try to get an accurate financial history of the family before asking a doctor to give free help, and I find opinions differ very greatly as to financial circumstances of a family, so I find it exceedingly difficult to know whether I am justified in asking for free care.

The Child Welfare Special made stops in five places when in the county in the spring. As you know, this health car is sent out by the state with a physician who examines all pre-school children brought to the car.

3—Dissemination of knowledge as to prevention of goitre and more extensive work along goitre prevention.

I have followed up the cases recommended for hospital care and also eight others where recommendations were made for examination or treatment.

Possibly you have heard some discussion on prevention of goitre, and I hope that we can do some rather extensive work in that line this year. We have started work in Omro, the two physicians examining all pupils (whose parents are willing) free of charge, and a form of chocolate iodide tablet will be given. The Parent-Teachers' organization of Omro will pay for this medicine. I find that the number of pupils whose parents are willing to take the treatment is 167, with two others already taking the treatment at home.

I hope that we can extend this work to Winneconne in the spring, but with the large number of rural schools to visit and vast amount of organizing to do for a goitre campaign, I did not believe it possible to attempt another village at this time. I believe you will realize how much more difficult it is to organize a rural school along these same lines on account of getting the pupils examined by a doctor, but teachers have cooperated and we have had what we might call mothers' day, and I have talked to groups of mothers, urging each family to go to the family doctor and have him advise them as to the treatment. Possibly a little later we can do some group or rural school goitre prevention work.

According to report on file for the year 1920, 67% of the pupils had defects and the percent is now 53%, so we now have only about a half of the pupils with a defect.

The past year I was able to finish having a sample of the water used in each district tested, and where it was reported as unsafe, a large supply was pumped out and water re-tested, and then it was found safe.

This fall I asked health officers to have water examined again for several reasons: First, there was some typhoid after our heavy rains and a great number of people were made sick from the water and especially was this true in several schools.

This fall I have visited 49 schools and inspected or weighed the pupils. Pamphlets that I am able to secure free from various health organizations, are given out on teeth, tonsils, goiter and various contagious diseases, and I believe all this material helps along in health work.

May I ask in closing that you, as chairman of your township, call my attention to any tuberculosis or crippled children in your township, as it is only through some interested public worker that I learn of these cases?

County Board of Education.

The school boards in session a year ago appointed a committee of five members, consisting of Elizabeth King of Omro, president; Mr. Plenske, Menasha; Mr. Patch, Omro; Mr. Hewitt and Mr. C. C. Bishop of Oshkosh. To decide the question of changing textbooks in the county. Because of a technicality in the law that was not adhered to, the texts were not changed the preceding year. Standardized tests were given last year, and the results showed that children had low averages, especially in reading and arithmetic. The change has worked a hardship upon many of the farmers, but we find that the poorer teachers in the county are doing better work, and the ability tests given out at the end of the first six weeks proved decidedly that the change is satisfactory from the point of view of education.

Improvements.

One new building was constructed last year—Mears school, No. 6, Vinland. The same plans were used for the Mears school as were used for the Black Oak and Jackson schools of Nekimi. A modern structure in every way was erected. A formal opening was held at the school. Several of the former teachers attended, one having taught in the district some fifty years ago. The cost of erecting the structures mentioned above, although the same identical plans were used, were as follows: Black Oak, \$7,200; Jackson, \$7,500; and Mears, \$8,000. Two other districts contemplate building a new school the coming year. One incentive to building is the fact that

money may be borrowed from the state at the rate of 4½ % for a term of fifteen years.

In my visits this fall I was pleased to note that practically half of the schools have improved the appearance of both the inside and outside of the school buildings. Last year twenty schools were given special state aid of \$50, while this year five additional schools have made application.

Consolidation.

Three meetings were held last year, at which time the question of consolidation was considered. I still favor consolidation, but the people in this part of the state are not ready for it.

Supervision.

Since the meeting last year, I have visited all of the 96 schools at least once and most of them twice. During the year 1923-24 I made 176 visits, most of them half-day visits in inspecting the schools and assisting the teacher. This year to date I have made 82 visits. Reports are made to the teacher and the school clerk. To date, five night meetings have been held this year. The office is always willing to cooperate in furnishing outside talent for these meetings.

Attendance.

The average daily attendance for 1922-23 was 82½ percent. In 1923-24 it was raised to 86 percent, while the average for the state was about 78 percent. To encourage regular attendance, attendance charts were used. It is hoped that the average will be raised the coming year. Last year there was no school with an enrollment of less than five, while the largest enrollment was eighty.

Reading Circle Work.

The teachers of the county belong 100 percent to the local teachers' organization, which authorizes the superintendent to buy professional reading circle books, three of which must be read and reported on during the year. Last year 1,079 pupils in the county did reading circle work, an increase of 300 over the preceding year, or 48 percent increase.

County Fair.

People generally have commented on the exhibit made at the county fair, in 1923. Eight schools were represented, while twenty-two were represented in 1924. Each school is requested to make an entry next year. Such being the case, it will be necessary to have more space. Mr. C. C. Bishop, city superintendent, is desirous that we have an educational building. If the building were put up, the vocational department would take care of the interior decorating.

The winners of the state contest held at commencement time represented the county at the state fair.

Products Exposition.

Some 200 pupils wrote essays last year on "My Best Opportunities Are in Wisconsin," with the result that a boy and a girl were selected to represent the county, with all expenses paid, to the products exposition, which was held at Milwaukee.

Honor Diplomas.

Honor diplomas were given last year to each pupil having 100 perfect recitations in spelling and arithmetic. These diplomas will be given again this year. To the school having 90 percent perfect attendance during the year, appropriate diplomas will be given. To the child having 90 percent perfect attendance for three years in succession, a button will be given.

Teachers' Meetings.

The two-fold duties of the supervisor must be kept clearly in mind: one concerned with improving the working conditions and the other with increasing the effectiveness of the specific teacher activities. In the past a large part of the supervisor's visitation time has been required to adjust the physical conditions of the schools. As these are of a definite and somewhat permanent nature, more and more can they be kept up to standard through suggestions and directions given at the county institutes and group meetings. Five institutes were held during the year. A two day institute was held Friday and Saturday before the opening of school, at which time plans for the year were outlined and methods of teaching discussed. The attendance at these meetings has been nearly 100 percent. This year it is planned to have sectional meetings in addition to the institute.

Parent-Teachers.

Parent-teacher associations should be encouraged to raise funds for phonographs and records, pianos, pictures, hot lunch equipment, first aid cases, and a few good periodicals for children. The knowledge that parent-teacher associations favor a liberal policy in spending money for equipment

will far toward influencing boards of education to show liberality in this respect. Parent-teacher associations should not be expected, however, to provide such things as textbooks, shades, seat work material, and other supplies that are a regular part of the equipment of every school.

When boards of education do not purchase adequate equipment for schools, it may be because they do not know what to buy or where to buy. Teachers are not always in a position to help them. Rural boards of education are made up in large part of farmers and business men. Such men usually welcome the advice of the expert.

General.

Mr. Sanders, former county superintendent and at present educational representative of the fourteen banks of Winnebago county, has been giving some instructive work on savings. It is planned this year that the subject of thrift be taken up in the county. Each school is to have a fifteen minute banking period once a week, at which time the children are to make deposits, and the teacher will be responsible to see to it that the money is taken to the bank. This plan is working very successfully in the larger cities. Winnebago county is the first county in the United States to adopt such a plan.

Farm account books were used in the county last year and will be used again this year. The bankers of the county offered first and second prizes for each township. These in turn were entered at the county fair.

Members of the historical association are reserving a section in the Sawyer foundation (art museum) for the rural schools. The office has been asked to canvass the county for the purpose of obtaining articles of historical interest pertaining to the schools forty or fifty years ago.

American education week will be observed again this year, November 17-23 inclusive. November 21st has been designated as parents' and patrons' day. Every effort is being put forward to encourage parents to visit school. Fire and accident prevention week have also been emphasized.

In order that the farmer may get just treatment and that a sane national program may be planned and carried out, which will react on the well-being of the whole national group, the following objectives are immediately concerned with adaptation of children to a rural environment:

1. Knowledge of the political organization of rural districts.
2. Knowledge of common laws affecting daily life.
3. Knowledge to insure intelligent membership in cooperative enterprises.
4. Ability and willingness to participate properly in community programs of sanitation.
5. Ability and willingness to participate properly in community programs of beautification.
6. Ability and willingness to participate properly in building up a satisfactory community recreational life.
7. Ability and willingness to participate in a program of betterment of community institutions, especially school and church.
8. Understanding of the relation of the farmer to transportation and problems of transportation.
9. Ability to make best possible use of existing communication facilities.

On motion accepted and placed on file.

Supervisor Jungwirth read a communication from the city of Oshkosh relative to a hook and ladder wagon which they wish to dispose of.

Supervisor White moved that a special committee of four be appointed by the chairman to investigate said matter, said committee to be composed of two members of the committee on insane and two members of the committee on poor. Motion carried.

Chairman Loesch appointed as such committee Supervisors Schneider, Scholz, Young and Schultz.

APPROPRIATION FOR HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION.

Supervisor Spore offered the following Resolution No. 12:

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, do hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1—Whereas, the state highway commission has notified the county clerk that the sum of \$17,928.17 has been allotted to this county under section 83.02 of the statutes, and section 83.03 requires that one-half of the foregoing sum, amounting to \$8,964.08, together with at least one and one-half times this amount of county funds be expended on the State Highway system lying within the county;

There is hereby appropriated under this provision of section 83.03 the sum of \$13,446.13 to meet the first one-half of said state aid allotment to be placed on the state trunk highway system, thus making available for this purpose the sum of \$22,410.21, which shall be expended as follows:

The improvement of the Omro-Eureka-Berlin road, commencing at Water street in the village of Omro and extending southerly on Main street towards the Omro cemetery known as State Trunk Highway No. 34, building an 18 ft. concrete road as far as the money available will build.

Section 2, and in accordance with section 83.03 of the statutes, the second one-half portion of the state aid allotted to the county, amounting to \$8,964.09 hereinbefore undistributed together with the sum of \$17,928.17 to be raised by the county, making available the sum of \$26,892.26, shall be expended as follows:

The sum of \$3,246.36 to pay for the building of the Naffin bridge in the town of Black Wolf.

The sum of \$3,081.66 to pay the balance of the county's share existing on the construction price of Third street in the city of Menasha.

The balance of \$20,564.24 to be used for the improvement of the Oshkosh-Waukau road, known as County Trunk "C" by gravelling from the end of 1924 construction easterly towards Oshkosh as far as the money available will construct.

Section 3—There is hereby appropriated to be raised by direct taxation in the ensuing year the sum of \$200,000.00; this sum together with balances amounting to \$53,000 more or less left from 1924 construction making a total of \$253,000.00 to be expended as follows:

The sum of \$145,000.00 for improving the Neenah-Winchester road of 18 ft. concrete, beginning at the end of 1924 construction and building westerly to the village of Winchester, and the Larsen road, commencing at a point north of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway company depot at Larsen in the center of the public highway, thence west in the village of Larsen to a point between section 19 and section 20, thence north to the Neenah-Winchester state highway of 18 ft. concrete.

The balance of \$108,000.00 for improving the Omro-Berlin-Eureka road, beginning where the state aid leaves off, mentioned in section 1 of this resolution building an 18 ft. road of concrete on State Trunk Highway 34 as far as the Bell schoolhouse, thence westerly on County Trunk "E" together with the balance now appropriated for gravel on this road, which is hereby authorized to be used in putting in a concrete road instead of gravel.

Section 4—The said County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums to be provided by a general tax levy for the purposes set forth.

1—for the county's share of the cost of improvements on the state trunk highway system provided for in section 1 of this resolution, the sum of \$13,446.13.

2—For the county's share of the cost of improvements on portions of the county system of prospective state highways, not portions of the state trunk highway system, as set forth in section 2 of this resolution the sum of \$17,928.17.

The county treasurer is hereby directed to pay for the maintenance of the state trunk highway system from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purpose for which appropriated prior to Aug. 1st, 1924, and to reimburse such funds from the sums received under paragraph H of subsection 3, of section 20.04, when the same are received from the state treasury.

Section 5—There is hereby assessed against the following municipalities as special benefits for the construction of roads already made, the following amounts:

REPORT OF PROBATION OFFICER.

Mrs. Margaret Thorne, probation officer, offered the following Report No. 23.

To the County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen—The following is a report of Margaret A. Thorn, probation officer, from January 1, 1924 to November 1, 1924, as shown by her records.

The mothers' pension has served 113 families and helped to care for 300 children.

Visits made	1639
840 of these were made upon the families directly concerned and the remaining 799 were made upon others for purposes related to the work in these families.	
Letters written and received	384
Telephone calls to and from	1042
Office consultations	425

Most of these 113 families are cared for by mothers who are widows, but in 27 cases the fathers, so far as is known, are living.

In 10 of these 27 cases the husband was incapacitated by tuberculosis. During the year 2 of these died and 2 recovered and began to care for their families again so the pension could be discontinued. In 5 of the 27 cases, the husband was incapacitated by insanity, 2 by other illness, and 1 was committed to Green Bay reformatory. There were 2 cases of desertion and 6 of divorce where alimony could not be secured.

Three orphans, by means of the mothers' pension, are allowed to remain with and be cared for by relatives. One baby has been permanently placed by adoption. One girl has been placed in an institution. Guardian was appointed for one incompetent mother and her child is under supervision. Free medical services and hospital care has been secured for tonsillectomies for ten children. Two children were taken to Brady Memorial hospital, one of which has since been taken to Janesville blind school. Reports have been received of great improvement in both cases.

Pensions have been granted, continued, increased, decreased and discontinued according to the needs of the family. Near the close of the fiscal year a few critical cases came in that demanded an unusual amount of aid.

The Bureau of Family Service has been of great aid where the mothers' pension has been insufficient, as it has been in some cases, by providing clothing, fuel, and groceries. Two of the pension families receive a weekly allowance of groceries, one of these being a tubercular family. The father is in Sunnyview. One child died there the first of the year and two of the children, until recently, have been in the fresh air room at school. The family shows a decided gain in health under the care that has been given. The Bureau of Family Service also has provided means through its stenographer and record material for keeping records of 50 of the 113 families which have received family case work in varying measure during the year.

Mr. A. W. Dunham, president of the Bureau of Family Service, recently secured a much needed second hand desk for the use of probation officer, which makes the office work more satisfactorily and easily done.

Much time has been spent on interviews with boys and girls. At the present time 5 are making weekly reports. Four other cases are mental cases which have been impossible to place as yet because of parents' objections.

One mother (not a pension mother) and her child have been under constant supervision and received both medical and hospital care. The mother is now attendant in a hospital and the child being cared for by a pension mother.

In the normal life there are at least five elements to be considered: health, education, employment, recreation and spiritual development. Rarely, if ever, do we find a perfect balance in the development of these elements in any family, whatever their position in the social scale. It does not necessarily mean dependence but where we find dependence we usually can trace it to a lack in one or more of these elements. Where the family burdens fall entirely upon the mother, it is especially difficult to keep a well balanced family life. The mothers' pension here meets a very real need and the worker in this field endeavors to strengthen the normal elements of life through cooperation with outside forces—physicians, nurses, attorneys—especially our district attorney, schools, churches and employers. The recreation facilities are not as well taken care of as could be desired—the movies and automobiles seeming to be the largest factors and productive of much trouble. In a few instances disappointment has been met because results have not been what are desired but the majority of families respond most readily and gratefully to help received.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT.

G. A. Sell, County Agricultural Agent, offered the following Report No.

24.

To the Honorable Members of the County Board, Winnebago County, Wis. Gentlemen: I submit herewith the annual report of County Agricultural Agent work for the year ending October 31, 1924, in the form of a summary of the more important projects and results obtained.

GUSTAV A. SELL, County Agricultural Agent.

1. Cow Testing Association—Helped reorganize two of our three associations and bring them up to a full membership. These were the Neenah and Oshkosh Associations. The Wolf River group kept up its membership unassisted, even through the throes of a T. B. struggle, and ranks as one of the highest associations in the whole state.

2. Tuberculin Testing—More work has been done and some progress made during the year on the petitions for the County Wide Tuberculin Testing of all the cattle, but not yet enough. In the change from last year's assessment roll to this year's quite a few names were lost off the petitions on account of these people not being listed as cattle owners this year. However, with the new names put on we have 1,265 out of 2,703 cattle owners.

2. Swine Improvement—This work on account of low pork prices was not so much in demand consequently of all the prospective entries in the ton litter contest only three litters were kept in through the summer. These were very good litters but even they on account of losing a pig apiece couldn't quite make the required ton of pork at six months of age. Our Progressive County Fair had offered very handsome premiums for this contest, which would have made it interesting had there been more interest in hogs this year.

4. Poultry Improvement Work—A new feature was added to this project with the help of our university poultry specialist in the selection of good breeding pens in five different flocks. By having these pens mated with high production strain cockerels we now have in the off-spring breeding stock that can be recommended by the County Agent as good enough to use in most any farm flock with improvement. Poultry culling demonstration were held on seventeen farms with an attendance of 1923. As we not only show people how to detect the poor layers but have them practice the culling themselves under our supervision and they in turn tell their neighbors about it, the influence of these culling demonstrations had undoubtedly spread to many more than 1923 farms of the county.

5. The Better Fruit Project—Was built around the two cardinal principles of good pruning and thorough spraying. Eight pruning demonstrations were held with the help of the university fruit specialist. Their purpose to get bigger and better and cleaner fruit is usually realized only when followed by thorough spraying hence the spray program was discussed at all these pruning demonstrations as well as at spray ring meetings. The Clemansville spray ring was strengthened with the purchase of a power sprayer by the operator and the membership was doubled. A second ring although small was organized around another new power sprayer privately owned near Waukau. Several small power machines were purchased or improvised by individual orchard owners for their own use under the County Agent's guidance.

Three apple grading demonstrations were given to call attention to the essentials of good marketing. An apple booth at the County Fair also was so designed to bring out that quality fruit sorted into commercial grades is the basis for good prices.

6. Alfalfa vs. Thistles—This campaign was instituted last winter in response to the request from your honorable body and it undoubtedly was a big feature in bringing about the astonishing increase in the alfalfa acreage. Our area sown to alfalfa jumped from 3,166 to 15,679 acres. This brought Winnebago up to fourth rank in the whole state.

The gospel of more alfalfa as a thistle control measure as well as for better and cheaper dairy feed was spread by means of meetings in each township—three farm institutes with a total attendance of nearly 1,300 at all sessions and thirteen special meetings with an attendance of 456.

Circular letters advertising all these meetings and generous publicity in the papers also emphasized the thistle control feature of this "More Alfalfa" campaign. Out of 186 farmers growing alfalfa, 139 in response to a questionnaire reported that they had successfully controlled thistles with this crop.

7. Cooperative Marketing—Considerable time was devoted a year ago and the last several years in cooperation with the County Farm Bureau to help organize for the cooperative marketing of cheese through the Wisconsin Cheese Producers Federation. Towards the close of last year enough

factories had affiliated themselves with the federation that the Fox River Valley Cooperative Storage Company could be legally organized for receiving and warehousing the cheese.

A thoroughly modern plant was built at Neenah and opened by March 1. Fifteen factories have been bringing their cheese here. A total of probably well over two million pounds will be handled the first year of business.

8. Home Work—A year ago four clothing classes had been started for farm women. These and four more classes went through the regular course with a clothing specialist; took the work back to their home groups, and reported last summer as already having made over 500 paper dress forms.

As a wind up to the clothing classes last spring a county wide round up was held, attended by over 200 enthusiastic farm women.

This fall four classes have been begun in food and cooking work with a food specialist from the university in charge.

9. Emergency Hay Crops—On account of the dairyman's old friend, Red Clover, getting a poor catch last year, we were anticipating a drive for Soy Beans as a good legume hay in emergency. Most dairymen, however, seemed to have fortified themselves with an alfalfa seeding; so that the prospective shortage of good hay did not seem so great this spring as it did a year ago. A few large plantings of soy beans for hay came through very satisfactory as to yield and feeding qualities. This points the way out of a bad situation dairymen have been in when clover and alfalfa killed out.

10. Drainage—On twenty-seven farms surveying by the County Agent helped find a solution for drainage problems. Preliminary surveys were made and drainage systems suggested for 312 acres wet lands. At least 21,500 feet of tile were laid according to the County Agent's plans and figures.

1. Pure Bred Bull Sales—Six pure bred bull sales were held last November in cooperation with the County Holstein and Guernsey Associations. Sixty-two sires were distributed thereby into fields of usefulness at an average cost to the buyers of about \$84. It may be of interest to recall at this time that this bull sale idea was originated in Winnebago county.

Three successive years of bull sales have now put out about 275 pure bred sires. The standard of quality too is being raised every year, so that now only the best animals are accepted for these bull sales.

12. Dairy and Cattle Sales—The selling of dairy cattle has been gradually developed by the county breed associations in cooperation with the county agent and more and more the actual work of taking buyers around has been done by the secretary or other farmer representative of a breed association. The county agent, however, keeps in touch with all these buyers, he answers inquiries from prospective buyers and tries to get them to Winnebago county. Three hundred thirty-three head of dairy cattle were sold this past year through the county agent and breed associations, for approximately \$32,800. When the sixty-two pure bred sires from the bull sales were added to this, a total of 395 head have been sold for about \$36,000.

13. Farm Bookkeeping—Farm bookkeeping practice in the rural schools' seventh and eighth grades was made a part of the arithmetic work by your new county superintendent of schools. Your agricultural agent was called on to help get this started. The County Bankers' association was induced to offer prizes for the best books kept. This contest feature gave a good deal of interest and zest to the work. Undoubtedly this practical bookkeeping practice is a fine thing to help prepare our young future farmers for the time when they will take over dad's farm. And isn't that what we want our rural schools to do?

14—Better farm and city relations were promoted by the series of farmer-merchant get-together meetings last fall held in cooperation with the Winnebago County Farm Bureau and the various business and civic groups from our city.

A final county-wide get-together was held at Oshkosh with John M. Kelly as principal speaker. Not only was a much better understanding of one another's problems brought about and much suspicion and hard feeling wiped out, but a very concrete result was had in the formation of a county agricultural council with representatives of all farm organizations in the county. This body has been of great help to your county agent and agricultural committee in suggesting lines of work, in cooperating with your agricultural committee to plan this work, and, above all, in helping to carry out some big projects like the county dairy day celebration.

15—County dairy day, featuring the dairy parade and John Kelley's show and "Fun on the Farm" was without doubt one of the red letter days of the year for Winnebago county agriculture. A dairy parade over two miles long was held in the morning. A crowd of nearly 3,000 witnessed

"Fun on the Farm" that afternoon. The whole event helped to impress on people the magnitude of the dairy industry, and some of the possibilities for improving it with better business practices.

16—Winnebago county had the pleasure this year of entertaining several farmer delegations from other states on dairy inspection tours. Most notable of these was the group of 145 farmers and businessmen from Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma. It was the county agent's job again to make arrangements for taking these visitors on a tour of our and the neighboring county. Farmers from the county, businessmen from Oshkosh, Neenah, Menasha responded most generously in furnishing the forty autos required. The County Bankers' association helped entertain the visitors right royally with a banquet. Already this tour is showing results. Representatives of two state institutions from Oklahoma purchased twenty-six head of grade and pure bred dairy cattle.

A second visiting delegation to look over our dairying was a group of boys and girls from northern Michigan with their parents and club work leaders.

Another one was a group from Mississippi, which group came here to interest us in developing our dairy cattle market in their state.

17—To encourage the use of war salvaged explosives for clearing out stumps and stones in our cultivated fields, seven land clearing demonstrations were held this fall. At most of these quite a little interest was taken in this easy and cheap method of doing a hard job.

We find that the hook and ladder truck is in very good condition and all the attachments in good condition, except that the truck is in need of a good coat of paint, and that the same can be purchased from the city of Oshkosh for the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), and that your committee has decided to leave the matter to the discretion of the Board.

Gentlemen—The undersigned members of your committee on equalization respectfully submit the following minority report in relation to the report of the committee on equalization.

We call your attention to the fact that the committee on equalization

used the sales for the last five successive years in arriving at the equalization for the cities of Neenah, Menasha and Oshkosh and villages of Winneconne and Omro, and that for the balance of the county the average sales for three low years were used. It is our opinion that this is unfair because the county valuation is based on the past three years when sales of property were low, while the city valuation includes in addition two years when sales were high. The effect of this in general is to lower the assessment on all property except in the three cities of Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha, and villages of Winneconne and Omro.

For these reasons we respectfully submit that the action of the committee is unfair to the cities and villages in question and we submit this as our minority report.

SNOW REMOVAL.

Supervisor Spore offered the following Report No. 31:

To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen:

Your committee on roads and bridges respectfully submit the following for your consideration in relation to snow removal for the coming winter season:

Your committee is desirous of learning the sentiment of the board as

to snow removal and of course willing to do anything directed by the board to accomplish that purpose during the coming winter season.

There is at present in the snow removal fund of the county a balance of about \$4,000 available for that work this winter.

Section 84.07-5-b does not impose upon the county the duty of keeping the highways free from snow and open for winter travel even though that highway shall be maintained by the county at either county or state expense.

The removal of snow from the streets and highways of the county is the duty of the town, village or city in which the road or street lies and the law provides that such town, city or village shall make every reasonable efforts to keep such highways open for travel during the winter months.

The law does provide, however, that the county board may determine at any meeting that it will remove the snow for the winter season from the highways maintained by the county and this expense must be met by the county out of such funds as the county board may provide.

At the discretion of the county board, the board may charge not to exceed 50 percent of the cost of removal of snow to the unit of government in which the work is performed on the road.

If any town, village, city or county shall fail to keep the portion of the state trunk highway system open to travel during the winter season when the state highway commission has determined that public interest demands that it should be kept open for travel during the winter season, then the state highway commission may order the county road and bridge committee to keep said highways open during the winter season and the cost of such work shall be paid by the county out of the general fund of the county and the county board at its next meeting shall provide for payment of the same by tax or otherwise and may charge 50 percent of the cost to the unit of government in which the removal took place.

The state highway commission cannot order any section of the state trunk highway system kept open for travel unless it shall have received a petition signed by at least fifty persons certifying that they would often travel with vehicles the portion of the highway in question in pursuit of their ordinary avocations if this highway were kept open during the winter months.

The law, however, does not impose upon any town, city, village or county the duty of clearing up the roads for travel when the necessary work would impose an unreasonable public expense.

You are therefore confronted with this situation. If no money is appropriated by this board and no work is ordered done to remove the snow from the roads and a petition signed by fifty persons is filed with the state highway commission, it may then come in and order the roads in question cleared of snow and the county must pay the expense and raise the money for the same in some way the following year.

Your committee calls your attention to this situation so that the matter may be thoroughly discussed and that it may be determined whether such petition will probably be filed and whether if it is filed and the snow ordered removed the expense would be greater than it would for the board to proceed at this time and appropriate money and direct that the snow be removed from the highways.

All of which is respectfully submitted for your consideration at this time.

Since 1921 there has been a constant decrease, probably due to several causes: First, because the teachers and others do not keep the records of circulation, and because few or no books have been purchased since the funds are not sufficient, and because the people from rural districts are borrowing from town or city libraries in the county.

During the past years there seems to have accumulated a surplus of funds due to a misunderstanding. It is recommended that this fund be spent in its entirety for books to replenish the decreasing number.

The books show that they have been well used, for they have worn out and many have been re-bound. Ninety-eight have just been returned from the bindery.

A personal visit to the library centers showed that the books were highly appreciated in the out-of-the-way farm house, schools, cross road stores and communities. The people welcomed the boxes brought to them this fall, and hoped that they would contain some new books. There is a great opportunity for service in Winnebago county, and we hope that in time every citizen of the county shall have convenient access to books furnished by the county.

The assistant in charge of the traveling libraries feels that she cannot continue with the work any longer. If the salary was put at \$150 per year, we could secure some one who would be qualified to carry on this work, especially since there is a little money for new books.

MEMORIAL TO LEGISLATURE TO AMEND THE PRESENT AUTO LICENSE LAW.

Gentlemen: Whereas, the danger to life and property, through the rapid increase and the reckless and incompetent operation of automobiles and trucks, in Winnebago county and throughout the state, renders imperative the enactment of laws protecting the sane and careful car driver and car owner, their families and car occupants from the physical suffering and financial losses that are recorded daily, due to careless, inexperienced or intoxicated drivers, speed mania and irresponsible owners. Therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the County Board of Winnebago county, Wisconsin, do hereby—in all seriousness and earnestness—request our state senator, M. F. White, and Assemblymen Thompson and Larson, together with their fellow members in the coming session of the state legislature, to amend the present auto license law, by the insertion of a provision prohibiting the issuance of any auto, auto-truck or motorcycle license, until application for said license shall be accompanied by a personal injury and property damage policy in some recognized, responsible company covering the motor vehicle in question for the full period for which license is granted. Personal injury protection guaranteed in such policy shall be not less than \$15,000.00, the property damage, not less than \$2,000.00, the state to guarantee safe return of said policy in all cases.

CONTRACT WITH SHERIFF-ELECT STEVE GORE.

Supervisor Korotev read the following contract:

This agreement, made and entered into this 7th day of January, A. D. 1925, by and between the county of Winnebago, state of Wisconsin, and Steve Gore, sheriff-elect, witnesseth as follows:

That the said Steve Gore, in consideration of the payment of the money herein provided for, agrees to board all prisoners who may be confined in the county jail of Winnebago county, except those prisoners confined at hard labor out of doors, to wash their clothes and mend the same and to furnish wholesome and sufficient food for the proper feeding and maintaining of such prisoners at a price of 25c for each meal so furnished such prisoners, with no extra charge for washing and mending the clothing of the said prisoners, the amount to be paid for prisoners before trial to be the same as for the prisoners after trial.

In case of prisoners sentenced to hard labor out of doors, the sheriff shall receive compensation at the rate of 35c per meal for each meal so furnished during the actual time that such prisoners shall be working out of doors and other times he shall receive for such prisoners at the rate of \$5.25 per week.

It is understood that said amount is to be paid for all meals actually furnished said prisoners, and the sheriff agrees to keep the county jail register so as to show the hour of receiving and discharging such prisoners and the exact number of meals furnished to each. The said sheriff further agrees to board all prisoners as above set forth and in no case to make any extra charge for washing and mending; where necessary said meals are to be put up to be carried by prisoner to work and furnished at suitable times so that prisoners can go to work.

It is further agreed that no bills shall be presented to the county or any charge made to it for any service rendered in connection with the purchase of food for said prisoners or in doing the washing and mending herebefore provided for or in furnishing any articles or materials in the way of preparing said food, and the county of Winnebago shall properly heat and light said jail for residence purposes and shall furnish heat for cooking purposes.

In consideration of the faithful performance of the above agreement by said sheriff, the county of Winnebago agrees to cause to be paid to him the sum of 25c for each meal for regular prisoners, and the sum of 35c per meal for each prisoner sentenced to hard labor out of doors while performing such labor.
