

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County met in annual session at the Court House, in the City of Oshkosh, on the 12th day of November, 1901, at 10:00 o'clock, A. M. and was called to order by Chairman John Harrington.

After severally subscribing to the oath of office they were duly sworn as such members by C. D. Cleveland, County Judge.

Supervisor Arnemann nominated John Harrington for Chairman.

Supervisor Athearn nominated Wm. Mayher.

The Chairman appointed as tellers Supervisors Ganzer and Gove.

On roll call an informal ballot resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast 37, of which John Harrington received 22; Wm. Mayher received 14; and Benj. Edwards received 1.

Supervisors Harrington and Mayher were excused from voting.

The informal ballot was made formal and John Harrington was declared elected Chairman.

The Chairman expressed his thanks to the members for their continued expression of confidence in him and thanked them also for their courteous treatment of him as their executive. He also expressed his thanks for the careful consideration with which they have attended to all matters coming before them, and stated that he believed that no member has any explanations in the nature of apologies to make to his constituents. He stated that he believed that the feeling throughout the county is that the board of Winnebago county is equal to any in the state.

Supervisor Edwards moved that the rules adopted at the last annual session be adopted by this Board.

The motion was carried.

Supervisor Ganzer moved that the Board take a recess of twenty minutes to give the chairman opportunity to prepare his list of committees.

The motion was carried.

After recess Chairman Harrington announced the following committees:

Supervisor Arnemann announced that Chairman Mathewson of the County Insane Asylum wished the Board to visit the asylum, as some repairs were needed.

Supervisor Chase thought the regular annual visit should do, and offered the following resolution No. 1:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the annual visit of this Board to the County Asylum and Poor Farm be made the special order for Tuesday, Nov. 19th, and that an invitation is herewith extended to the county officers, including Superintendent Abrams, of the Work House, State Senators and members of the Assembly, ex-District Attorney W. W. Quatermass, and one representative from each newspaper of the county to accompany said Board as guests.

Also, That the members from the north end of the county, who may so desire, be excused from roll call on the morning of said visit.

Also, That the County Clerk be directed to immediately notify Superintendent Austin of said intended visit, giving date thereof.

Supervisor Arnemann seconded the motion.

Supervisor Edwards moved to amend the motion by adding ex-Sheriff White's name.

The resolution as amended was adopted.

Chairman Harrington called for the District Attorney, who made some remarks about a resolution passed last session regarding a suit against Ashland County, stating that suit had been commenced and that the District Attorney of Ashland County had advised that he thought when their Board met they would pay \$583.00, claiming the balance had been paid. The matter was referred to the Committee on Corporations.

Supervisor Ganzer moved to adjourn to 9 o'clock, A. M., Wednesday. The motion was carried and the Board adjourned.

WEDNESDAY—SECOND DAY.

SUPERVISOR'S ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS.,

November 13, 1901, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment, Chairman Harrington presiding.

On roll call the full Board was present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Accounts were presented and referred to appropriate committees.

Chairman Harrington spoke regarding an infant committed by Judge Cleveland to the State school for Dependent Children at Sparta, and referred the matter to the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm.

The following petition from the Town of Utica was read by the Clerk and referred to the Committee on Corporations and to Supervisor Edwards.

THE SUPPRESSION OF ANARCHY.

WHEREAS, At a meeting of the citizens of the Town of Utica, Winnebago County, on the evening of September 25, 1901, in memory of our beloved president, deceased, the undersigned were appointed as a committee with instructions to draft a petition to the County Board of Supervisors touching the subject of anarchy, and the means necessary to its suppression, and

WHEREAS, Our President has been shot down by a tool of anarchy, therefore, the undersigned, representing the citizens of Utica, respectfully petition your honorable Board to take such steps and use such means as you shall deem most effective to aid and encourage

our representatives in Congress and in our State Legislature in their efforts to secure such legislation as shall effectually check and exterminate the murderous creed of Anarchy, and to secure better protection for our public servants. The chairman of our Town Board is hereby instructed to present this petition to the County Board and to use every honorable means to secure prompt action in the matter.

W. W. Noble, trustee for the County Insane Asylum, read the following Trustees' Annual Report:

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT.

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: We hereby submit our annual report as Trustees of the Winnebago County Asylum for the Chronic Insane for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1901. We have little specially new to report at this time as nothing unusual has occurred to disturb the general equilibrium at the County Asylum. As will be seen by reference to the Financial Statement the total current expenses for the year are \$25,496.39.

There have been furnished to inmates of the County Asylum and Poor House 13,551-4 weeks' board at a cost per week, per capita, of \$1.82.

The Permanent Improvement Account amounts to \$577.76. It will be noticed that the list of permanent improvements is very limited this year. A telephone from the Asylum to the Poor House, a pair of scales, grates for the windows, and a slight expenditure for fencing make up the list. The new coal shed erected last year has proved to be a valuable improvement. We are enabled to purchase our year's fuel at one time and to take advantage of the low rates, and always have a supply independent of blockades, strikes, trusts, etc.

It requires about one thousand tons of soft coal per year to supply the institution, and we have received about seven hundred and fifty tons thus far on this year's contract.

Several transfers of patients have been made to and from the Winnebago County Asylum in the past year. The asylum at Brown county, contemplating extensive repairs, twelve of the patients from that institution were transferred to Winnebago in the month of May of this year and have not yet been returned.

By order of the State Board of Control, in July thirty-three patients were transferred to Chippewa County Asylum from the counties of Fond du Lac, Outagamie, Washington and Winnebago, eighteen patients going from Winnebago, and fifteen from the above mentioned counties. The transfer was made under the management of Superintendent Austin. A previous transfer of nine patients from Winnebago was made to Trempeleau county in the month of May of this year, together with patients from the above mentioned counties.

A movement has been started and has met with a reasonable degree of success, looking toward the organization of representatives of county asylums. A preliminary meeting was held in Appleton in the month of February, 1901, with about seven counties represented. Committees were appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws, make arrangements, etc. The next meeting was held at Chippewa Falls, March 20, 1901. Officers were elected, constitution and by-laws adopted, and the place of next meeting fixed at La Crosse.

They meet once a year, on the first Wednesday in December. The county asylums, State asylums at Oshkosh and Mendota, State Public School and Home for the Feeble Minded at Chippewa Falls, are all included in the scope of the organization. The State Board of Control are made honorary members. Fifteen counties have thus far joined in the movement. The objects of the organization are:

I. To bring those directly interested in the management of county asylums (and the other institutions above mentioned) together for an interchange of ideas.

II. To unite in securing legislation, when needed, to better protect and provide for the insane, and otherwise unfortunate inmates of our state and county institutions.

In the line of permanent improvements we have to report that the large iron tank located on the third floor of the Asylum building shows some signs of giving out, and if such a thing should occur it would leave the building destitute of water, as nearly all the supply pipes connect with it, and we are contemplating the erection of a water tower or elevated reservoir to take the place of the old one. Another weakness occurs in the water system of the building from the fact that unless the tank is always kept full water will not flow to all parts of the building.

There are, at this time, about 137 of our own county insane in the Asylum, and at the present rate of increase it will be but a short

time before our Asylum will be filled with our own county insane. Some of the reasons for this are:

I. Increase in population.

II. Instead of insane being cared for at homes, as formerly, they are now maintained at county asylums.

County Physician Fred W. A. Brown read his report.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN: I beg to submit my report as County Physician since assuming charge January 1, 1901, and a few suggestions which seem to me worthy of mention.

COUNTY ASYLUM.

Visits have been made to the County Asylum according to the requirements of the State Board of Control, and as much oftener as the occasion demanded. The Superintendent, A. C. Austin, and the

Matron, Mrs. Eaton, are at all times actuated by the kindly spirit of humanity which should obtain among those in charge of the poor and unfortunate, and have heartily co-operated with me in every manner connected with their welfare. The general health of the patients has been good. There has been no epidemic. The diet has been abundant, nutritious and varied; well cooked and well served; the hygiene excellent. The attendants seem to spare no pains to make the existence of the inmates as pleasant as possible, and are prompt to report any illness or disability.

POOR HOUSE.

The most of the inmates are those who have passed into the "sere and yellow leaf." The infirmities of old age have fallen upon them. Medicine cannot bring back to their tortuous veins and tottering steps the rich flow of virility and the elastic step of youth. However, medicine can do something to ease and alleviate, if not to renovate, and has been given when deemed necessary, the rest being unfortunate, maimed or crippled. The year has been characterized by almost an absence of the ones who love "not wisely but too well," only one, at the present writing, wearily waiting for the shortening months to bring forth in tears and anguish one whose prattling tones and cooing voice will never gladden a father's heart. The Matron, Mrs. Seymour, has spared no pains to make the inmates as comfortable as possible.

Mortality statistics for the above will be found in the report of the Superintendent.

COUNTY JAIL.

Visits have been made as necessary. There has been no serious illness. The sheriff and his assistants are to be congratulated on the manner in which they have looked after the unfortunate evil doers.

WORK HOUSE.

Very little sickness has obtained here. There was one sudden death due to paralysis of the heart. Mr. Abrams has well and carefully performed his part, not only in seeing that the edict of the law was carried out, but in his kind and considerate bearing toward those who have sometimes been described as "undeveloped children."

SMALL POX.

Small pox, that dread disease, in the earlier months of the year nearly approached an epidemic in the northern counties, and there being also a few cases in our own county, it was thought prudent to do everything possible to prevent an outbreak in our institutions; hence, everyone who might come in contact with the disease was rendered immune. All the inmates of the Poor House were vaccinated, and the attendants in the County Insane Asylum. A regulation, with

the approval of your committee on poor, was made that everyone coming into the institution must present to the Superintendent before admission, a certificate of being free from any contagious disease.

Small pox is essentially a preventable disease. Its subjects are unvaccinated or badly vaccinated persons, extensive observations having shown that in proportion to the efficiency of vaccination are the rarity and mildness of small pox.

Before the advent of vaccination, small pox was one of the scourges with which people were afflicted. So great was the terror, that even at the present time there are few persons outside of physicians and nurses to whom the mere mention of small pox does not fill with shivering dread. Physicians in this case practice what they preach. The majority have been vaccinated and re-vaccinated.

The disease is smouldering in different parts of the state. It awaits a favorable condition to become epidemic. Owing to the propaganda of the anti-vaccinationists, apparently sincere but notoriously misguided people, and the lethargy of public opinion, due to the mildness of the disease for some time past, the present condition seems pregnant with menace, and to be in the same condition in which was the city of Montreal, when, due to the teachings of a prominent French physician, vaccination had fallen into disrepute.

Small pox in that city died out in 1875. The city was free from disease until 1885. During this time vaccination was neglected. The tinder was there. A Pullman car conductor, from Chicago, stricken with the disease furnished the spark. The disease spread like fire in dry grass, and within nine months there died in that city, of small pox, 3164 persons, and of these 2717 were under ten years.

Small pox was formerly one of the army scourges, but to-day it is, owing to vaccination, of rare occurrence in the German and Continental armies

I beg to quote the remarks of Col. Ryerson, a surgeon in the British army, formerly in the Boer war. He states: "With an enormous army of 200,000 men, nothing proves more definitely and more emphatically the importance and power of vaccination, when there was never a single case of small pox in the entire army."

I would suggest that this County Board memorialize the Legislature in accordance with the recommendation of the State Board of Health, folio 4, report of State Board of Health, edition of 1900.

TUBERCULOSIS.

While Wisconsin can proudly point to the numerous institutions for the care and treatment of the insane, which dot the surface of her fair domain, institutions which stand as monuments to the humanity of her people and their zeal for the unfortunate; and while we stand in the van of progress, marking time on the onward march for the

welfare and amelioration of unfortunate mankind, we must again be up and doing.

Once more we hear the Macedonian cry "Come and help us" In pleading tones it comes loud and strong from the bereaved, and in plaintive wail with the pathos of subdued resignation from the afflicted. It comes from the rich and it comes from the poor; from Dives and Lazarus; from the country and the town; the palace and the hovel; from the pavements to the gutters; from the bereft husband and the widowed wife; from the weeping parent and the wailing orphans; from the synagogues of the righteous and the gilded haunts of hell. Help! For what? From what?

There is a disease so mortal that it is credited with causing one-seventh of all deaths. In the United States census reports for 1890, 102,188 deaths were reported to be due from consumption. A low estimate gives 150,000 deaths annually in the United States from some sort of tuberculosis. Dr. Vaughn gives as an estimate, based on that census report, the total number of persons infected with tuberculosis as 1,050,000, or one in every sixty of the population. These are dread facts. Appalling! Alarming! And this is the condition, even while E. F. Wells states that the evidence is in favor of a positive decline in the prevalence of the disease.

Even so, shall we wait while our loved ones pass away without putting forth an energetic effort to stay the ravages of the disease?

What do we advocate? In the past, Wisconsin has done nobly; but she must not sit and smirk complacently o'er deeds done, but rather, spurred on by achievements already accomplished, press forward with untiring zeal. Progress, with pen dipped in the fountain of undying love, has written in words of flaming fire across the broad bosom of her charity—"State Sanatoria."

Wisconsin must not lag. It must be abreast of the times. It must do its duty. It may be asked: "Is there any use of trying to cure consumption?" As well might it be asked: "Is it of any utility to care for our unfortunate insane?" The question is to be answered in the affirmative. I will mention a few celebrated men who have been cured of consumption: The German poet, Goethe; Napoleon I; Peter Cooper.

Dr. Herman Brehmer, one of the foremost German physicians, was a consumptive when he started the first sanatorium for tuberculous patients in 1859, over which he presided for more than thirty years.

Dr. Dettweiler, his most celebrated pupil, entered Brehmer's Sanatorium as a consumptive, became his assistant, and has been for twenty-five years the Medical Director of the Falkenstein Sanatorium. The late Dr. Pean, of Paris, declared phthisical at 20 died at 65, and there are many more cases that can be cited.

Statistics from Sanatoria for Consumptives, where patients in all stages of the disease are received, show that twenty-five per cent.

leave as absolutely cured, and forty to fifty per cent. are much improved. Surely, it is the duty of this State to do all in its power to bring about such a desirable state of affairs.

I advocate State Sanatoria on the same grounds as are given for State Hospitals for the Insane. I beg to make the following extracts from the prize essay of Dr. S. A. Knopf, of New York, entitled, "Tuberculosis as a disease of the masses and how to combat it," in reply to the questions, "What are State Sanatoria?" and "What evidence exists that by taking care of consumptives in special institutions and by hygienic measures, tuberculosis as a disease of the masses can really be successfully combated?"

"A State Sanatorium in the United States means an institution " for the exclusive treatment of patients suffering from Pulmonary " Tuberculosis, created by the funds of the State and supported en- " tirely or in part by the State. The first State Sanitorium in Amer- " ica was erected a few years ago near Rutland, Mass. In this in- " stitution patients pay fifty cents a day. Recently, other States, " New York, New Jersey, Iowa, Illinois and Maine have projected " the building of similar institutions. * * * While it is gratify- " ing to note that some States have undertaken to care for their " consumptive poor, and while noble men and women have private- " ly undertaken to care for some of these unfortunate sufferers, " there is yet a great deal to be done. In view of the great number " of consumptives with little or no means in our thickly populated " States, it is evident that the existing institutions are like a 'drop " of relief in an ocean of woe.' Then let us hope that the good " work will go on and that the new century will see the multiple " creation of State and Peoples' Sanatoria in the United States."

That such special institutions and thorough hygienic measures are well calculated to combat tuberculosis as a disease of the masses, we shall try to prove as follows: In England there have existed special institutions for the treatment of consumptives, that is to say, hospitals and sea coast sanatoria, in relatively large numbers for over fifty years. As a result of the maintenance of these institutions and the enforcement of a most excellent general public hygiene, it was possible to reduce the mortality from tuberculosis during the last few years in a most surprising manner and more rapidly than in any other country in the world. According to the following statistics compiled by Dr. Tatham, the statistical Superintendent of the Registrar-General's office, the mortality from tuberculosis among the population of England and Wales has been reduced to well nigh one-half of that which it was thirty years ago.

The death rate per million of the population of England and Wales from pulmonary tuberculosis was in 1870—2410, 1875—2202, 1880—1889, 1885—1770, 1890—1882, 1893—1468, 1894—1385, 1895—1398, 1896—1397.

Surely these quotations are enough to warrant the assumption of State care for the tubercular by the commonwealth of Wisconsin. Also the benefits which must accrue to the community by the return from a Sanatorium of a cured or much improved sufferer, is inestimable, as he will be a peripatetic dictionary of information in disseminating knowledge of the workings and advantages of such an institution.

What is known as the "Wisconsin System" for the care of the Chronic Insane, has in the past received considerable attention from Alienists, and others interested in ameliorating the condition of unfortunate mankind. This interest has not waned, as our institution has received numerous visits from superintendents and physicians in charge of the insane from all parts of the country; on one occasion no less than five prominent Alienists from Boston arriving on one day.

It is to be hoped that the dissemination of ideas regarding the Wisconsin System of caring for the Chronic Insane will still further better the condition of the wards of Humanity wherever they may be.

Chairman Harrington called for Mr. P. V. Lawson, who was present, to read the report of the Board of Traveling Libraries, of which he is Chairman.

Following is Report No. 4 which was read:

REPORT OF BOARD OF LIBRARIES OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

To the Honorable, the Chairman and Supervisors of the County Board of Winnebago County.

The members of the Board of Libraries of Winnebago County, as elected by the County Board of Supervisors in March, 1901, are as follows: Mr. P. V. Lawson of Menasha, Mr. L. B. Scott of Neenah, Mr. R. E. Root of Omro, Mrs. Jennie Chapelle of Eureka, and Miss Lillian G. Kimball of Oshkosh.

At the first meeting of the Board, April 10, 1901, Mr. Lawson was elected president; Mr. Root, vice president; and Miss Kimball, secretary.

Besides the members of the Board, there were present at the first meeting Mr. F. A. Hutchins and Miss L. E. Stearns, both members of the State Library Commission, and their counsel and assistance were of great value to the Board in organizing a traveling library system in Winnebago County.

The Board received for the County as a gift from the heirs of the late E. D. Smith, of Menasha, fifteen libraries of fifty books each, in cases containing about 725 books. The Board voted to expend about four hundred dollars in the purchase of additional libraries. The selection of these books was entrusted to Miss Stearns and Miss Emily Turner, of Oshkosh, who was elected Supervising Librarian of the county libraries.

The Oshkosh Library Board gave the use of their rooms to administer the libraries, and consented to the appointment of Miss Turner.

In order to get the matter of traveling libraries before the people of the County, several hundred circulars containing information regarding the libraries were sent out over the County, also blank applications for libraries.

Copies of both are appended to this report. During May and June

applications were received from almost every township, and twenty-two libraries have been placed. The libraries are distributed as follows:

It will be seen that the townships of Menasha, Neenah and Poygan are still without libraries. A great effort has been made by the Board to locate one in Poygan, but so far the effort has been unsuccessful. It will also be seen that the Township of Utica has three libraries. Application for these were among the first received, and the Board was able to grant them and at the same time do no injustice to other townships because of the generosity of Mr. E. P. Sawyer, who gave to the Board Seventy dollars (\$70.00) with which to purchase two additional libraries.

The county now owns twenty-three Libraries and 1329 volumes.

The libraries consist of fifty-five books each, five of them being in the German language. They are in strong chests, and the only expense connected with them is that of transportation. This is borne by each local association. Four associations, those at Allenville, Winnebago, Winneconne and Eureka, have returned their first library and received a second one in its place. Twenty-two libraries are out. As there are but twenty-three, and one must be kept on hand for exchange, it will be seen that no more applications can be granted until the Board has the means to purchase more libraries.

During the past two weeks reports have been received from the librarians of eighteen different associations. They bear uniform strong testimony to the great pleasure and benefit that have been derived from the books, and they are convincing proof that the libraries are both needed and desired throughout the county.

The libraries having the largest circulation are those at Omro and Eureka. At Eureka 350 books have been drawn, and at Omro there

are eighty patrons, each having drawn from five to thirty books. Omro and Waukau have the largest number of persons drawing books, Omro having eighty and Waukau fifty.

The combined reports show 454 persons drawing books, and 2000 books drawn. This is especially gratifying when we take into consideration the fact that the summer months are not the time when much reading is done by a rural population. The Board feels that the traveling library movement has been very successful thus far, but at the same time there are numerous communities where the books are needed to which they have not yet gone, and in some localities the efficiency of the libraries might be very greatly increased. An appropriation of \$200 will be of immediate benefit for the purchase of more books

At the meeting of the County Board of Winnebago County held in March, 1901, it was voted to establish a County Board of Libraries, and to appropriate five hundred dollars to purchase books for traveling libraries, to be circulated among the farmers and villages of the county. The members of the Board of Libraries have been appointed by the Chairman of the County Board as follows; Mr. P. V. Lawson, of Menasha; Mr. L. E. Scott, of Neenah; Mr. R. E. Root, of Omro; Mrs. Jennie Chapelle, of Eureka; Miss Lillian G. Kimball, of Oshkosh.

Immediately after the appointment of the members of the Board of Libraries, the heirs of the late Hon. E. D. Smith placed at the disposal of the Board fifteen traveling libraries of fifty volumes each. At the first meeting of the Board, April 10, 1901, it was voted by the Board to expend four hundred dollars at once in the purchase of books to constitute eight additional libraries.

It is the wish of the members of the Board of Libraries to make these traveling libraries of the utmost possible use to the people of Winnebago County, and still to secure good care of the books. Each traveling library will remain in a community six months, and then be exchanged by the Board for another.

To secure the regular visits of these traveling libraries, the people of a community must organize a local library association, or establish a permanent public library under the State law. In case a local library association is organized, it must consist of at least ten adult citizens of the county, and they must elect a secretary to act for them in dealing with the Board of Libraries. They shall also elect a librarian, though the secretary may act as librarian. The secretary and at least nine other adult members, or the officers of a permanent free public library shall sign an application promising:

1. To pay the expenses of the transportation of these libraries

from and to Oshkosh, and to provide a suitable place to keep and shelve them.

2. That the books of these libraries shall be loaned without charge to any person in the county who will observe the rules laid down by the Board of Libraries.

3. That the association will be responsible for the safe return of the books of the library, in good condition except for unavoidable wear and tear.

The libraries will be sent by freight or delivered to an agent of the local library association. The Board will generally be able to send a small box of magazines with each library, if the association desires them. These magazines may be freely loaned to do the most good, but need not be returned to the Board of Libraries.

All inquiries concerning libraries should be addressed to Miss Emily Turner, Public Library, Oshkosh, who has been elected by the Board as supervising librarian.

PRINTING OF PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY BOARD.

Supervisor Chase offered the following resolution, No. 2, which was adopted on roll call by ayes 35, nays 0, absent 4.

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the County Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be printed in pamphlet form 1000 copies of the proceedings of this Board for November session, 1901, and March session, 1902, together with such statistics and tables as are usually printed therein; said pamphlet to be indexed in a similar manner as in previous years, and that said County Clerk deliver to each member twenty copies thereof; that said proof be carefully read and corrected by said County Clerk, or by his direction; and that the contract for said pamphlet shall require their delivery to the County Clerk on or before July 1, 1902, and contain a forfeiture clause of one dollar per day for each and every day that the delivery of said pamphlets shall be delayed after the foregoing time limit, and that the purchasing agent is hereby instructed to withhold the amount of said forfeiture (if any) from the contract price of said job when he audits and pays said bill; and further

Resolved, That said work be let to the lowest responsible bidder, and not accepted unless completed in a correct and workmanlike manner.

Supervisor Chase read the following report of the Work House Committee, No. 4, which was adopted by ayes 38, absent 1:

REPORT OF WORK HOUSE COMMITTEE.

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 260, General Laws of 1895, and amendments thereto, known as the "Work House Law," your committee beg leave to submit the following report:

There is little to add to the conclusions contained in previous reports as regards the satisfactory results arising from the establishment and maintenance of the county work house. The advantages secured thereby to every tax payer in the county have been so thoroughly exemplified and practically demonstrated by statistical facts that no further object lesson is needed to prove that the work house

is fulfilling its mission far beyond the expectations of even the most sanguine of its original advocates. But it is fitting to add that present conditions have not been attained by smooth and unobstructed pathways strewn with cheers and roses, but in opposition to determined, stubborn and ingenious schemes and methods, and said conditions can only continue by the same eternal vigilance which has previously characterized the committee on justices and constables, sheriff and coroner's accounts, the District Attorney and others, whose business it has been to look carefully after details and thus aid in effectually closing, and legally and hermetically sealing the avenues through which designing parties sought an entrance. By the aforesaid methods only can the pockets of the tax payers be effectively safeguarded.

DISCIPLINE, SICKNESS AND SANITATION.

The same commendable local management is manifest as in former years, under the firm but humane discipline of Mr. and Mrs. Abrams, Superintendent and Matron. By their wholesome restraint, enforced cleanliness of inmates, sleeping hammocks and quarters, sanitation has at all times been complete, and as a result no contagious disease has found sustenance, nor even a birthplace therein, notwithstanding the vermin and filth with which some of the inmates were clothed when received.

There has been but little sickness among the inmates, and but one death, to-wit: P. J. Horn, who died May 28th of heart disease.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN.

County Physician F. W. A. Brown has been prompt in response to calls from the work house, and attending his professional duties when called thereto.


ATTEMPTED JAIL BREAK.

Supervisor Hough read petition No. 2, as follows:

STATE OF WISCONSIN }
COUNTY OF WINNEBAGO } SS.

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

The Town of Winneconne, in said County of Winnebago, hereby petitions your honorable body, and shows and represents as follows:

That the said Town of Winneconne, at the April election in 1900, voted to construct a certain bridge that is wholly within said town; that the said bridge has now been completed, and is more particularly located on the North and South road in the South-east quarter (S E $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section number three (3), in Township nineteen (19) North, in Range fifteen (15) East, where said road crosses Mud Creek; that at the November session, in 1900, of the County Board of Winnebago County, upon petition of the Town Board of Winneconne setting forth among other things that the cost of said bridge would be the sum of fifteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1550), asking that the said Board appropriate the sum of seven hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$775), one half of the cost of said bridge, in pursuance of Section 1319 of Wisconsin Statutes of 1898; that upon said petition the County Board did appropriate the sum of seven hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$775) with which to defray one-half of the expenses of building said bridge; that the entire cost of the said bridge exceeded the amount as stated in the petition presented to the said Board at the November session, 1900; and that the entire cost of said bridge, instead of fifteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1550), was seventeen hundred dollars (\$1700), an excess of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150); that the Town of Winneconne appropriated the sum of seven hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$775) as its share of the cost of building said bridge, and that there consequently remains to be paid the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150); that the said Town of Winneconne has provided for the payment of the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75) being one-half of the amount still unpaid; that the cost of such bridge exceeds one-fourth of one per centum ($\frac{1}{4}$ of 1 per cent.) of all the taxable property in the said town according to its equalized valuation in 1900, and that the equalized valuation in 1900, when said bridge was built, was three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$325,000).

Your petitioner therefore requests your honorable body to appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75), being one-half of the amount still required to defray the expenses of erecting said bridge under and by virtue of Section 1319 of the Wisconsin Statutes of 1898.

REPORT OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN:—I again have the honor of submitting my annual report of the condition of the schools of Winnebago County, according to Section 461, R. S.

In the several towns of this county there are ninety-three districts, employing ninety-five teachers. In Omro Village there are seven teachers and in Winneconne Village there are five, making in all one hundred and seven teachers who are under my supervision. During the past school year I visited all of these schools, besides making twenty-five second calls, a total of one hundred and thirty-two calls during the year. Since the present school year opened I have made fifty-three visits. Hence, I feel that what I have to report is based on conditions as they exist.

Two regular examinations were held in the several examination districts, one in March and one in July. Two supplementary examinations were held, one in May for 1st and 2nd grades, and one in September for 3rd grade. Both were held in this building.

Some certificates were issued on Normal standings, and a few on papers transferred from other counties. In all the supply has been about equal to the demand. I am pleased to note that fewer teachers are contented to plod along on a third grade certificate, and that each year an increasing number are trying to raise their standings.

The Laws of 1901 provide for but one regular examination each year, and others at three month intervals, to be held at the county seat. I have planned to hold the special examination next spring in the regular examination districts. After this there will be but one regular examination each year and this will be held in the fall.

There was a scarcity of experienced teachers this fall, caused by

many of our best instructors being called to other counties where the wages are from fifteen to forty per cent. higher than here. If we are to keep the teachers we have trained we must pay them for their experience.

Last winter State Superintendent Harvey conceived the plan of sending the State Institute conductors to visit the rural schools and there to carefully study the conditions under which they were working. Conductor W. C. Hewitt was assigned to this county. During the week ending February 1st we visited twenty-one schools in different parts of the county, and addressed five audiences in the evening upon educational topics. In every place we found a number ready to receive us with questions which showed that people were thinking along the lines of educational reform suggested. The immediate results of this visit were to awaken in the Institute force a realization of the fact that a great deal of their work was based on theory only, and suggested lines for the practical work which was done in the Summer Institutes. The general result will be to bring the Normal schools into closer touch with the district schools and increase the efficiency of each.

During the past year three Institutes were held, two in March of one day each at Eureka and Gillingham's Corners respectively. The purpose of these meetings was to give the teachers the benefits of the observations of the Institute conductor on his recent visit. These meetings were very successful.

In July we held a ten days' Institute at the Normal building in this city. Eighty-nine teachers were enrolled, with an average attendance of sixty seven. Academic instruction was given in arithmetic, geography, reading, and elements of agriculture; also professional work in the Manual, school management and library readings. The lessons were regularly assigned and prepared, and recited in classes. Lesson plans were made, and the teachers were held up to the standard of work that was expected of them this year in their schools. Superintendent Harvey has expressed his appreciation of the character and amount of work done, and of the enthusiasm and professional spirit shown by those in attendance. In my visits this fall I noticed that those teachers who had the benefit of the Institute training were doing very much better work than those who had "rested" during vacation in a hammock.

The classification registers purchased at the November session last year were placed in the schools in due season. One report was received at the end of the winter term. The teachers took hold of the work of grading and classifying the schools with a will, and we expect by the end of this year to have the system thoroughly established on a working basis. From the use we have made of the reports received I consider the money appropriated to this use very wisely spent.

The establishment of the Superintendent's office in the county building has proved to be a great convenience to teachers and others who have had business to transact with this department. I interview from five to a dozen or more people every Saturday. If these people were under the obligation of hunting me up at my home on these occasions, you can readily see the inconvenience and expense it would involve. I have on my office table copies of several educational papers, the latest text-books are on file, and other material at hand. Hence, I am able to make the visits of teachers to the office profitable.

Most of the school sites are pleasantly located on high ground and are well drained. Many are supplied with beautiful shade trees; in others some attempts at tree planting have been made, and in others no attempt whatever is visible. The buildings are generally in good repair, standing on good foundations, and are well roofed and painted.

In many houses the rooms are dull and cheerless, due to dingy, smoky walls and woodwork sadly in need of paint. There is lack of any effort in too many instances to make the rooms attractive and pleasant. Floors are largely of hardwood, but we still have some of pine. These are unsanitary in the extreme, catching and holding dirt and giving it off again with every movement of the pupils.

The apparatus is sadly deficient. In not more than a dozen schools in the county is the supply adequate to our present needs. Maps are antiquated and often torn so as to be unfit for use. Blackboards are in many cases of pine boards with a poor writing surface, and abounding in great cracks. Globes, where any were found, were relegated to some corner or were stowed out of sight under the teacher's desk. Very few reference books were seen. Text-books were found of every possible variety, and in many instances worse than useless as they were time wasters.

Stoves are often placed so as to occupy valuable floor space. In some houses one-fifth of the whole area is thus wasted. The other furniture also could in many instances be more economically placed.

The most serious proposition we have had to face is the school out-house question. With very few exceptions the buildings were found to be in a dilapidated state, littered with filth and abounding in obscene pictures and writings. In this state they were hotbeds of immorality, and their presence would counteract the good influence of the best of teaching.

I found the teaching force, with very few exceptions, to be composed of conscientious, hard-working young people, who were striving to the best of their ability to advance the pupils in their charge. But the work taken as a whole was very "ragged." It lacked system and organization. Each was working in her own way to get along with what was immediately before her, with little regard to the Course of Study.

The school year is not always divided to the best advantage. In many schools an early fall term is maintained, a cheap teacher is hired and only a few of the smaller children are in attendance. This sort of a school is the most expensive that can be kept. The cost per month in accordance with the number of scholars who attend is nearly always greater than at any other term. Many older scholars cannot attend at this season of the year, hence, classes are broken up and it is impossible for a teacher to follow a Course of Study. Low wages do not stimulate a teacher to do her best, and much valuable time is wasted for those of the older pupils who have to help on the farm.

Not enough use was being made of the school libraries. This was due in a measure to unwise selection of books, but more largely to the lack of knowledge of the use of the library on the part of teachers. This year I have taken a great deal of pains to select only such books as can be used in the school, and at the Institute the teachers were given training in the use of books in school work. Hence, I am anticipating better results next year.

In regard to the general condition of the schools of the county, I regret to announce that under present conditions, they are not doing as much good as we have a right to expect and that the present progress of the commonwealth demands. In order to better the present conditions I respectfully submit the following suggestions:

Put the school houses in as neat condition as means at hand will admit; make the surroundings pleasant and the question of good order is more than half solved; adopt a Course of Study and see that it is followed; adopt a line of up to-date text-books that will conform as nearly as possible to others in the county; supply the school with sufficient and suitable apparatus, be guided in its selection by the advice of the teacher and the approval of the Superintendent and not by the assertions of the agent; hire teachers who are best qualified for the position and not those who have a "pull", and then pay them wages that will make it an object for them to stay with you and give you the benefit of their experience.

I have made some attempts to carry out some of these suggestions. Circulars have been issued to school boards, to patrons, and to teachers setting forth the needs of the schools. On my visits this fall I noted with a great deal of pleasure that many of my suggestions had been carried out. Buildings had been improved, a few outhouses renovated and some apparatus purchased. Very much still remains to be done.

I regret to report that school boards are too apt to "put off" doing little things that are for the good of the schools in their care. Reports are often delayed or not sent in at all; minor repairs are often neglected, and often the time of a \$30 teacher is wasted to save a few dollars' worth of apparatus. These men, I know, have the inter-

ests of the schools at heart, but do not realize that these little neglects so seriously impair the vitality of our schools. Without the hearty, entire and immediate co-operation of every member of all school boards it is utterly impossible for me to make any material improvement in our schools.

Some improvement in our schools must be made, for the State has by a law passed by our last legislature, interceded in behalf of our country young people. Towns must provide suitable opportunity for them to receive an education at home or pay their tuition in some neighboring high school. Let us make our schools such that this law will be a "dead letter" on the statute books.

In conclusion I beg leave to express my appreciation of the hearty co-operation your honorable body has shown me in my efforts to fulfill the duties of this office. I hope our intercourse in the future will be as pleasant as it has been in the past.

Also, that we can take enough space off from a room in the western part of the house to accommodate three more. We have in mind to use one of these rooms for men and one for women, so as to have them well isolated. These changes can be made at a moderate expense and will not discommode the balance of the house.

Your Committee would recommend that said improvement be done, and the extra expense in the care and attendance of such persons at the Poor House afflicted with such disease as would require them to be isolated, charged to the town, city or village where said person is a resident.



Your committee have further to report: We have carefully examined the roof of the court house and have found that a coat of paint was very much needed, and with unanimous consent we ordered Venetian red paint and oil and had the whole roof painted. There were complaints that the offices of the county clerk and register of deeds were too cold and could not get steam enough to warm them up properly. We examined the heating apparatus, and by changing the pipe, thereby making a direct return to the boilers, was a great improvement in quick heating and saving of fuel. We have changed the piping in the clerk's and treasurer's offices. We would recommend the same changes in the office of register of deeds and supervisors room.

Your committee further report that we have made a contract with the Oshkosh Water Works Company for water for the court house at one hundred dollars per year, and for the jail at meter rates. The toilet room in the court house on the first floor is in a very bad condition. We would recommend that the same be torn out and new up-to-date fixtures put in and have it all in a good sanitary condition. We have estimates of the cost for the improvement that will amount to about \$475.00.

We further recommend that we buy a rolling top desk for the clerk of court's office, which is needed very much, at a cost not to exceed thirty-five dollars (\$35.00).

WINCHESTER BRIDGE.

Supervisor Athearn chairman of Roads and Bridges Committee presented Report No. 25, as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Roads and Bridges to whom was referred the petition of the Board of Supervisors of the Town of Winchester, said county of Winnebago, and State of Wisconsin, which petition represents that said town has voted to build a new iron bridge

across Rat River, said bridge being located in section ten (10), in said town, on the New London road, and that the cost of said bridge will exceed one-fourth of one per cent of all the taxable property in said town of Winchester, according to the last equalized valuation thereof; that said town of Winchester has appropriated \$800.00, being one-half the estimated cost of said bridge, respectfully report the town of Winchester has complied with all the requirements of law in providing for the cost of said bridge, and that the county is under legal obligation to provide for the payment of one-half the cost of building said bridge. Your committee therefore recommend that the sum of \$800.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary to pay one-half the cost of said bridge, be appropriated for such purpose, according to the prayer of the town of Winchester.

Your committee further recommend that the chairman of this Board appoint two commissioners from towns exclusive of the town of Winchester, and subject to the payment of their proportional parts of said appropriation, who shall act for and in behalf of the county in the disbursement of such appropriation, to the following towns, to-wit: Algoma, Black Wolf, Wolf River, Winchester, Clayton, Menasha, Neenah, Vinland, Winneconne, Winneconne village, Poygan, Omro, Omro village, Rushford, Oshkosh, Nepeuskun and Utica.

REPORT OF ILLEGAL ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE.

Supervisor Hough, Chairman of the Illegal Assessment Committee, read Report No. 26.

Supervisor Pfeiffer moved its adoption, which was carried, ayes 38, excused 1, (Tipler).

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that they have examined and considered the several petitions for the cancellation of Tax Certificates and other matters referred to them, and report and recommend as follows:

1ST. Your Committee has had under consideration the petition of W. T. Munsil for cancellation of tax certificate No. 13, sale of May 18, 1897, for the reason that it is illegal, having been advertised by the County Treasurer as south $\frac{1}{4}$, northeast $\frac{1}{4}$, northwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of southeast $\frac{1}{4}$, section 15, town 20, range 14; where it should read south $\frac{1}{4}$, northeast $\frac{1}{4}$ of southeast $\frac{1}{4}$, section 15, town 20, range 14.

Your Committee having examined the records in the County Treasurer's office find the above to be correct, and therefore recommend that said certificate be cancelled and the amount thereof paid the petitioner, with interest at 7 per cent. per annum, upon his surrendering said certificate for cancellation; number of certificate 13, sale of 1897, face \$.90, interest three and a half years \$.22, total \$1.12.

Your Committee would further report that they have considered the petition of R. H. Hackett for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 109, sale of 1895, amount of tax \$5.99. Your petitioner represents that the certificate is illegal and void for the reason that the tax was paid for the year 1894 on said property. Your Committee finds by an examination of the records in the County Clerk's office that this certificate was issued on a special improvement tax; that the general tax was paid for said year but not the special tax that this certificate covers. Your committee, being satisfied that the tax covered by said certificate was not paid for the said year, would recommend that the petition be denied and said certificate be not cancelled.

Your Committee would further report that they have considered the petition of G. W. Washburn for the cancellation of tax certificates Nos. 349 and 350, sale of 1896. Certificate 349 is described as follows: Lot No. 2, and $3\frac{3}{8}$ feet of lot No. 1; and certificate No. 350 is described as follows: The south $\frac{1}{4}$ of lot 7, block 1. Your petitioner represents that shortly after said sale he became the purchaser of said certificates, amounting to \$67.37. He further represents that at the date of said sale, and for a long time previous thereto, he was the owner of said lots, and bought up said certificates in order to clear the title of said lots from said incumbrances. He further represents that the same property was re-advertised and sold again for the same tax in 1899, and certificates No. 604 and No. 605 were issued for the same sum named in the certificates for the sale of 1896.

Your Committee, after considering the matter carefully, find that the above mentioned tax certificates, Nos. 349 and 350, were wrongly advertised before the sale of the County Treasurer of the taxes of the year 1896. For the above reason the County Clerk refused to issue a tax deed on said property, and before the tax sale of 1899 said property was re-advertised and sold at said sale, and tax certificates No. 604 and No. 605 were issued on said property, and are now outstanding. Your Committee would therefore recommend that said certificates, Nos. 349 and 350, be cancelled, and the County Clerk be

instructed to issue a county order in favor of the owner of said certificates for the amount paid for said certificates, with interest at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum, upon his surrendering the same for cancellation.

Your Committee further report that they have considered the petition of Julius Buelter for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 392, sale of 1896; conveying lot 21, block 92, in the Sixth ward, City of Oshkosh. Your petitioner represents that the certificate is illegal for the reason that said land and premises are owned, used and occupied by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Rail Road Company for railroad purposes, and that said land and premises are exempt from taxation. Your Committee, being satisfied that said property is covered with switch track and used for railroad purposes by said Company, would recommend that said certificate be cancelled, and the owner paid the amount paid for said certificate, with interest, upon surrendering the same for cancellation. No. of certificate 392, sale of 1896, face \$ 81, interest 5½ years \$ 28, total \$1 09, and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Oshkosh.

Your Committee has had under consideration the petition of the Wisconsin Central Railroad Company for the cancellation of tax certificates Nos. 144 and 142, sale of 1899; also Nos. 113 and 114, sale of 1900, described as follows: All except Wisconsin Central Railroad lot 1, block 11, Second Ward, City of Menasha. Your petitioner represents that said property has been doubly assessed and doubly taxed in both the years 1898 and 1899, and that the tax certificates on this property in each of the sales of 1899 and 1900 are now outstanding, that the Wisconsin Central Railroad Company is the owner of an interest of all the above lots, acquired through a tax deed to the Wisconsin Central Railroad Company dated October 13, 1878, and recorded December 16, 1878, in Vol. 64, page 451, but is unable to tell which of the certificates to redeem. That double assessment, such as the above, is void, and for that reason the four tax certificates above mentioned are illegal. Your Committee having carefully considered this matter find the above to be true. But we find that the Wisconsin Central Railroad Company is the owner of but one of the above mentioned certificates, No 142, sale of 1899; the owners of the other three certificates herein mentioned not having asked for cancellation of the same. Your Committee would recommend that certificate No. 142, owned by the Wisconsin Central Railroad Company, be cancelled, and the owner paid the amount paid for said certificate, with interest thereon, upon surrendering the same for cancellation. No. of certificate 142,

sale of 1899, face \$1.62, interest 2½ years \$.29, total \$1.91, and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Your Committee would report that they have had under consideration the petition of Silas Bullard for the cancellation of two tax certificates, No. 172, sale of 1898, and No. 241, sale of 1899. That the lands specified in said tax certificate on such sale were bid in by and sold to said Winnebago County, and thereafter, on the 30th day of January, 1899, the County Treasurer of said county duly sold and assigned said tax certificate, No. 172, for the sum of \$10.79, and on August 28, 1899, the said County Treasurer of said county duly sold and assigned said tax certificate, No. 241, to said petitioner. The amount paid for said certificate, No. 241, was \$10.79. That land sold for non-payment of taxes is described in said tax certificates as follows: West ¼ of lot 11, block 55, subdivision of lot 10, block 55, 4th ward, Menasha, in said county. Your petitioner alleges that such description is erroneous, indefinite and void, and that there are no lands in said City of Menasha properly described as in such tax certificate. Your Committee, after making a careful examination of the matter, find that the subdivision of lot 10, block 55, City of Menasha, as shown by the plat thereof, contains two blocks numbered 1 and 2, and that in each of said blocks is a lot numbered 11, and as the records show, the taxes on lot 11, block 1, of such subdivision of lot 10, block 55, for each of the years 1897 and 1898 were paid before the sale of lands for taxes, and that lot 11, block 2, of such subdivision was property of the Polish church and not assessed; and that the west ¼ of lot 11, block 55, in the Fourth Ward of the City of Menasha, could not be situated in any subdivision of lot 10, block 55. Your Committee, being satisfied that said certificates are illegal and void, would recommend that said certificates be cancelled, and the owner paid the amount paid for said certificates, with interest, upon surrendering the same for cancellation, and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Your Committee would further report that they have considered the petition of Julius Buelter for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 580, sale of 1897; also tax certificate No. 551, sale of 1898; that the land purported to be conveyed by said above tax certificates is described as follows, to-wit: Lot 10, block O, Riverside Lawn Addition, Twelfth Ward, City of Oshkosh. Your petitioner represents that said tax certificates are illegal for the reason that there is no lot 10 in block O, Riverside Lawn Addition, Twelfth Ward, City of Oshkosh. Your Committee, being satisfied that the above reasons are true, would recommend that said certificates be cancelled, and the owner paid the amount paid for said certificates, with interest, upon surrendering the same for cancellation, and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Oshkosh.

and that the said several amounts so paid be charged back to the City of Oshkosh.

The petition of E. W. Thomas for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 445, sale of 1898, for the reason that the said tax certificate was issued under a special assessment, which special assessment was declared illegal in an action brought by owners of real estate abutting on Rosalia street, against the City of Oshkosh and Winnebago County; which special assessment was for the curbing and macadamizing of said street. That the Circuit Court of Winnebago County has declared void said taxes issued for said special improvement, and has forever barred and restrained the County of Winnebago, or its officers, from issuing any tax deed for the said unpaid taxes so levied and assessed. Your Committee further report that they have had under consideration the petition of Angella Weller, executrix of the last will of E.

F. Brush, deceased, for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 29, sale of 1896, conveying lot 14 of North Side addition to the Village of Omro. That said tax certificate was cancelled by the County Clerk of Winnebago County, according to section 1170, annotated statutes, for the reason that it was wrongly advertised by the County Treasurer; that since the cancellation of said tax certificate the same has been lost, and your petitioner has been unable to find same; that the amount so paid for such tax certificate by E. F. Brush, now deceased, has never been refunded by the County to him during his life time, nor to any of his heirs or executors. Your Committee would further report that they have considered the petition of Julius Buelter for cancellation of tax certificate No. 306, sale of 1897, on the following described property, to-wit: All of lot 21, block 55, between Old Plank Road and right of way of Milwaukee & Northern Railroad Company, Fourth Ward, City of Menasha; the amount of said certificate being sixty-eight dollars and fifty cents. Your petitioner further represents that said certificate is illegal and void for the following reasons: That an examination of the tax roll of the City of Menasha having been made for the year 1896, and that said tax roll shows that the assessments under which said certificate was issued purports to be for "taxes unpaid previous years." Your petitioner further represents that on examination of the tax rolls of the City of Menasha prior to the year 1896, and on examination of the abstract book of taxes in the office of the County Clerk, the taxes for all previous years on the land described in the certificate herewith presented for cancellation, have been paid. Your Committee, having investigated this matter carefully, find, the above reasons true. But we find that the City Clerk of the City of Menasha, in making out his tax roll for said year, inadvertently placed said tax under the wrong heading in the tax roll. Said tax was a special improvement tax, and said Clerk placed it under the heading of unpaid taxes for previous years. For this reason your petitioner asks for cancellation of said certificate. Your Committee, not being satisfied that the above reasons would invalidate a tax deed, would recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be denied, and said certificate not cancelled.

Your Committee further report that they have had under consider-

ation the statement of M. J. Rounds, County Treasurer, of lots and tracts of land withheld from sale, and to be charged back as prescribed by Section 1135 of the Revised Statutes, for the reason that the descriptions of the parcels of land therein given are indefinite and insufficient. After examining said descriptions we concur in the opinion of the County Treasurer that the descriptions are too indefinite to be sold, and approve his action in withholding said tracts and lots from sale, and recommend that the amount of tax standing against each tract and lot therein named be charged back to the town or city in which such lot or tract of land lies or is located as required by law.

Following is the statement of lots and tracts of land withheld from sale, and to be charged back as prescribed by Section 1125, of the Revised Statutes:

Your Committee would further report that they have had under consideration the joint petition of the Northwestern Railroad Company as property owners, and J. Howard Jenkins as certificate owner, and also the petition of L. G. Arnold and the petition of Wm. Wake-man for the cancellation of certain tax certificates. Your Committee, not having had time to consider these matters satisfactorily, would beg leave to have further consideration deferred until the March Session, 1902.

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Your Finance Committee, to whom was referred the report of M. J. Rounds, County purchasing agent, for the year commencing January 1, 1901 and ending October 31, 1901, would respectfully report that they have carefully examined the same, checking up all vouchers in his office, and compared his records, and find the same correct. We therefore return said report and recommend that it be adopted by this Board as a correct settlement with said purchasing agent to November 1, 1901.

Your Finance Committee, to whom was referred the report of M. J. Rounds, County Treasurer, for the year commencing January 1, 1901 and ending October 31, 1901, would respectfully report that they have carefully examined the same, and compared the records in his office and find the same correct. We therefore return said report and recommend that it be adopted by this Board as a correct settlement with said Treasurer up to November 1, 1901.

In this connection your Committee wish to commend the Treasurer and purchasing agent for the careful and systematic manner in which the records have been kept.

Resolved. By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) be, and the same is hereby appropriated in accordance with Section 704 of 1896, Statute page 506, to be paid in monthly payments during the year of 1902, the same to be charged up to the several towns and villages, to be paid the same as his salary.

Your Finance Committee to whom was referred the report of the

Indigent Soldiers Commission have examined the same and compared it with the orders drawn and cancelled and find them correct. In order to provide a fund for the relief of indigent soldiers of Winnebago county for the ensuing year, your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:



Your Committee recommend that all papers pertaining to the burial of deceased soldier, and submitted by B. H. Soper, be referred to the District Attorney with instructions to collect the same from the United States.



WINNEBAGO COUNTY ASYLUM FOR INSANE.

Your Committee further report on the communication from the Superintendent of the State Public Schools for dependent and neglected children at Sparta, Wis., which was referred to us.

We find from chapter 109, Laws of 1901, as follows:

SECTION I: "In addition to the classes of children now received " " at the State Public Schools for neglected or dependent children, " " pursuant to existing laws, there shall also be received as pupils " " in the said schools any such children under fourteen years of age, " " residents of said State, who are of sound mind, but who are crippled or deformed in body, provided their bodily ailments are such " " as admit of proper care and treatment at the School with the facilities which are or may hereafter be provided therefor, subject only " " to the limitation contained in the next section.

SEC. 2. "All existing provisions of law for the commitment, care, " " disposition, control and discharge of the inmates of said School, " " and all restrictions upon their admission, except the three years' " " age limitation, and except as herein provided, shall apply to such " " crippled or deformed children."

Chapter 223, laws of 1901, has provided that children under three years of age may be committed to the Public School at Sparta. The object being to place such children in worthy homes within sixty days after a child has been committed, or to report failure to do so, and reasons therefor, under oath, to proper officials, and to do the same every sixty days thereafter until the child has been provided with a home. The expense of keeping such children in the School is paid by the State.

It is expected that in almost all instances of the commitment of young children under three years of age, a home will be speedily provided. The actual expense and a fee of two dollars per day in transportation to and from the school must be paid by the county.

Your Committee, from the experience recently gained and in view of the facts above mentioned, consider it for the best interest of the county, and recommend the committing of young children to said State Public School at Sparta.

Your Committee further report in regard to the matter pertaining to a child committed by the County Judge to the State Public School. We found that the child was so committed, and was under the care of Mrs. Mary E. Halsey, in the City of Oshkosh, at an expense of five dollars per week.

Your Committee deemed it necessary to transport the child to the Home as soon as possible, and so arranged with Mrs. Halsey to take said child to the Home, and on the 14th day of November, 1901, the child was taken and received at the Home.

The person taking the child stated to the Committee her financial standing. Your Committee conferred with the Chairman of the County Board, and considered it advisable to advance the sum of

fifteen dollars to pay expenses of transportation, and the said amount was paid by the Chairman out of the contingent fund, as appearing in the report of the Chairman and adopted by this Board.

REPORT ON NEW BARN AT POOR FARM.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Your Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, with Superintendent A. C. Austin, by a resolution, No. 18, offered by Supervisor Arnemann November 27, 1900, and adopted by the Board, to whom was referred the charge of building the new barn on the County Farm, beg leave to report that on the 13th day of last March your Committee made a partial report, and now offer our final report on said barn.

Your Committee did from time to time meet as the case required, and paid such sums of money to contractors as was agreed upon in the contracts, and on the 25th day of July your Committee met and examined the barn and basement, and accepted the same, and ordered the balance of the amount due to contractors, paid.

APPOINTMENTS AT COUNTY ASYLUM.

W. C. Kimball, Trustee of the Winnebago County Asylum, read the following report:

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Deeming it advisable that we should acquaint your honorable body with the condition of affairs at the County Asylum and Poor House, we herewith report as follows:

On January 2, 1902, Mr. A. C. Austin was duly appointed by the Trustees, by a majority vote, Superintendent of the County Asylum for the year 1902, at a salary of \$800 per annum.

On January 30, 1902, Mrs. C. G. Patrick was appointed as Matron of the Asylum, and her appointment was duly confirmed.

Under the authority given the Board of Trustees of the County Asylum by chapter 73 of the Laws of 1899, Mr. C. F. Appley was tendered a like salary of \$800 per annum to manage and take charge of the poor house and poor farm, which he declined to accept. He was

then given possession of the Poor House and Poor Farm to manage and take charge of the same, pursuant to the following motion:

Trustee Kimball moved that C. F. Appley be appointed to take charge of and manage the Poor House and Poor Farm in and for Winnebago County, under the direction and supervision of the Board of Trustees of the County Asylum, pending the action of the County Board of Supervisors at its March session, 1902.

This motion prevailed by a majority vote, and Mr. Appley took charge of the Poor House and Poor Farm on the first Monday in January, but has rendered no bill for his services and has been paid nothing so far.

PURCHASE BOILERS FOR COUNTY INSANE ASYLUM.

W. C. Kimball, Trustee of the Winnebago County Asylum read the following report:

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: We herewith beg leave to call your attention to the condition of the boilers at the County Asylum. They are three in number, 14 feet by 48 inches, with a working pressure of 80 pounds each. When they were installed they were to run a thirty-five horse power engine and heat the building. Since that time, and some five or six years ago, a new 65 horse power engine has been purchased, taking the place of the old engine and running an increased electric light plant. The boilers have not capacity sufficient to run the engine and heat the building, so that when the electric dynamo is in operation the building is not heated as it should be in cold weather when warmth and heat are required. The boilers being too small and the steam is used so fast it uses the water up immediately, and trouble is caused on that account. We are of the opinion there should be purchased two new Scotch Marine boilers, 150 horse power each, 100 lbs. working pressure, and would recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That there be appropriated out of any fund not otherwise appropriated, to the Trustees of the County Asylum of said county, the sum of Thirty-eight hundred dollars, (\$3800) for the purpose of purchasing two Scotch Marine boilers, 150 horse power each, the same to be installed at said County Asylum, and that the Chairman and Clerk of this Board be and they are hereby instructed to draw an order for the same.

HEADQUARTERS OF THE H. J. LEWIS POST, No. 129, G. A. R.,

COMRADES: It has been frequently reported lately in public that our comrade, John McMahon, late of Co. G, 14th Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry, owing to his wounds, received on the field of battle at Vicksburg, May 22, 1863, and his advanced age and infirmities, has been confined in the Winnebago County Asylum, and that said John McMahon and others were grossly neglected during the extreme cold weather, if not misused and abused by the regularly employed superintendent and attendants, whose duty it was to look after

the welfare of the patients, and who are paid by the tax payers of the county to perform good and faithful service.

In justice to the superintendent and his assistants, and that they may be either proved innocent or guilty before the public, and feeling that in justice to all concerned an investigation of the case should be made, the following resolution was passed at a meeting of the H. J. Lewis Post, G. A. R., Neenah, Wis., March 1, 1902:

Resolved, That we, the members of the H. J. Lewis Post, No. 129, Grand Army of the Republic, Neenah, Wis., respectfully request the honorable members of the County Board of Winnebago County to investigate the management of the Winnebago County Asylum, and ascertain the facts as regards the management of the same, as to the care of said John McMahon, and the care of all other patients confined therein, and the general supervision of said Asylum.

The above resolution was unanimously adopted by the H. J. Lewis Post, No. 129, Grand Army of the Republic, Neenah, Wis., at its regular meeting, March 1, 1902.

Sawyer Post, No. 7, Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Wisconsin, held in the Grand Army Hall, Omro, Wis., March 8, 1902, that the honorable members of the County Board be and they are hereby requested to investigate the management of said County Asylum, the treatment of our Comrade, John McMahon, deceased; and other parties while there confined, by the Superintendent, A. C. Austin, and the attendants employed in said Assylum.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON POOR AND POOR FARM.

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, to whom was referred the report of the Trustees of the County Asylum of Winnebago County, concerning said Poor Farm and the management thereof, beg leave to report as follows:

We have consulted the District Attorney concerning the matter therein referred to, and annex the written opinion given us by him. In accordance therewith we find:

1. That the Trustees of the County Asylum of Winnebago County have not now, and never have had, any authority, power, control or right to the management of the County Poor Farm and the County Poor and Poor House.

2. That the Trustees are not, and never have been, Superintendents of Poor.

3. That Chas. F. Appley is the lawful agent of this County at the County Poor House and Farm, and that the right to appoint such agent, or "Superintendent of Poor and Poor Farm," rests wholly with this Board.

4. That said Charles F. Appley is entitled to the salary of one thousand dollars as such agent or "Superintendent of the Poor House and Farm," for the year 1902.

5. That said salary must be paid said Charles F. Appley in monthly installments by the County Treasurer, on the order of the County Clerk and Chairman of the County Board.

We therefore recommend the passage of the following resolution by the Board:

Be it Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that John Harrington, County Chairman, and J. J. Fish, County Clerk of Winnebago County, be and they are hereby directed to draw and issue to said Charles F. Appley, county orders each month for the monthly installment of the salary of the said Chas. F. Appley, as Superintendent of the Poor House and Poor Farm, on the basis of an annual salary of One Thousand Dollars, the first installment of said salary to be issued as of February 1, 1902.

OPINION OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY ON ASYLUM MATTER.

Opinion concerning the right of Mr. Appley to recover the salary fixed by the County Board of Supervisors for the office of Superintendent of Poor Farm:

A county, by statute, is liable for the support of poor persons within its jurisdiction, not having a legal settlement in any town or city in that county, but the distinction between town and county poor may be abolished and the county become liable for the support of all poor in the county. In the former case the county may maintain a poor farm for the support of those for whom the county is primarily liable, and such other persons as the county may contract with the towns to support. In the latter case, it may maintain a poor house for all the county poor. In the former case, the county may appoint an agent, "Superintendent of Poor Farm and Poor House," or whatever it may please the fancy of the County Board to call him, to manage the Poor Farm and Poor House. In the latter case, they must appoint three Superintendents of Poor, and if there is a County Asylum in said County, the Trustees of that Asylum now become *ex-officio* Superintendents of Poor, unless the County shall order otherwise.

By examination of the statutes of Wisconsin from the year 1849 to the present date, it will be clearly seen that the only case in which a County is authorized to appoint three Superintendents of Poor, (not Superintendent of Poor Farm and Poor House), is where the distinction between county and town poor has been abolished.

In 1858 this distinction was plainly made by Chapter 34 of the Revised Statutes of Wisconsin for that year, which provided that all poor were to be cared for by the Supervisors of the towns, the county to reimburse the towns for the expenses of the county charges. The town system might be abolished, however, and the county assume the support of all the poor in the county. Then, as is stated in Section 33, of Chapter 34, "Whenever the Board of Supervisors in any county shall have determined to abolish the distinction between county poor and town poor, said Board shall elect, by ballot, three County Superintendents of the Poor;" the duties of which officers are prescribed by this and the following sections of the chapter. From that it is manifest, and in fact is expressly provided, that County Superintendents of the Poor can only be elected in those counties where the distinction between county and town poor has been abolished. Section 37, of Chapter 34, provides that the Superintendents of the Poor shall perform the duties which devolve upon the local town poor officials, where the distinction between town and county poor has not been abolished. Precisely the same distinction and the same law as to the election of County Superintendents of Poor existed by virtue of Title XI, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of the State of Wisconsin for 1849, the sections in this regard being identical. (Page 241, R. S. Wisconsin, 1849.)

In the Revised Statutes of 1878 the Poor laws have been amplified. Where the town system exists the county may contract with the towns to support the town poor at the place where the poor supported by the county are kept, (Section 1517, R. S., 1878), and by Section 1518 it is provided: "The County Board of any county wherein the distinction between town and county poor shall exist, may purchase or hire suitable lands and buildings at or upon which the poor supported by the county may be kept and maintained, and the County Board may appoint an agent to take charge of such poor and such lands and buildings, and perform such other duties relating to the care and maintenance of such poor as may be imposed upon him by said Board."

This section is in force to-day, without the change of a word, and the agent mentioned in this section is the person who for years this Board has called "Superintendent of the Poor House and Farm."

Section 1520, R. S., 1878, contains substantially the same provisions as have been found in the Revised Statutes of 1858 and 1849, providing for the election of three Superintendents of the Poor, "whenever the distinction between county poor and town poor shall have been abolished in any county,"

Here again follow provisions demonstrating beyond a doubt that "County Superintendents of the Poor" can be elected only in those counties that have adopted the county system. Most of these provisions are incorporated without change in S. and B. A. Statutes of 1888, and in the present Revised Statutes of Wisconsin.

By Chapter 298 of the Session Laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1878, counties were authorized to build asylums for the county insane; and a body of five trustees is provided for, three to be appointed by the Governor, and two by the county. It is not until 1887 that we find any statute as to the Trustees of the Asylum being Superintendents of the Poor, or *vice versa*. By Chapter 138, of the Laws of 1887, the County Asylum Law was changed, and provided for three Trustees of the asylum instead of five, to be appointed by the County Board. Section 4 of that Act is as follows: "Any county having the county system for maintaining the poor, with three Superintendents of Poor, may by resolution constitute such Superintendents of Poor, Trustees of the County Asylum for the Chronic Insane." Section 5 prescribes the duties of the Trustees of the Asylum in relation to that institution. From this it will be plainly seen

1. That it is only in those counties that have adopted the county system of maintaining the poor, that Superintendents of Poor are to be elected. There are to be no Superintendents of Poor in any county like Winnebago County, having a separate county and town system.

2. That in those counties adopting the county system, the functions of the County Superintendents of Poor become entirely

changed when they act as Trustees of the Asylum. As Superintendents of the Poor they are to look after the poor in place of the Supervisors of the town, and other local poor officers. When they become Trustees of the Asylum they have appointing power at the Asylum, they audit bills, make full reports, etc. Such powers are not given them as Superintendents of Poor. They are not in any sense Trustees over the Poor House and Poor Farm.

There is nothing in any statute adopted thereafter to show that the Legislature ever intended to change the law as here originally and plainly set forth.

Section 604a of the Statutes of Wisconsin for 1898, among other things, provides that "The County Board of any county which supports its poor under the county system, and elects three Superintendents of the Poor in the manner prescribed in the section may, by resolution, constitute such Superintendents Trustees of its Asylum."

Section 1520 provides: "Whenever the distinction between the county poor and town poor shall have been so abolished in any county, the County Board may elect three County Superintendents of the Poor, * * * or any such County Board may provide for the support and maintenance of such poor, without the election of Superintendents, in such manner as they shall direct. In any county which maintains both a Poor House and a County Asylum for the chronic insane, the Trustees of the latter shall be *ex-officio* Superintendents of the Poor, unless the County Board shall, at an annual meeting, order otherwise; but the Board of any such county may appoint a Superintendent or Superintendents of the Poor solely to have charge of such poor persons as need relief outside of the Poor House."

It will be observed that Section 604a provides for making Superintendents of the Poor, Trustees of the Asylum by resolution, at the option of the Board. Section 1520 makes the Trustees of the Asylum *ex-officio* Superintendents of the Poor. Neither section applies except in those counties having the county system. There is a direct conflict in the provisions of the two sections. It would be possible for a county, at the time the law was passed, to have two sets of officers—three Trustees of the Asylum and three Superintendents of the Poor. Which body is to give way to the other? One section says the Trustees of the Asylum are to give way to the Superintendents of the Poor, and the other section that the Superintendents of the Poor are to make way for the Trustees of the Asylum. And in counties not having two sets of officers, was the County Board to elect three Trustees of the Asylum, and have them *ex-officio* Superintendents of the Poor, or elect three Superintendents of the Poor and have them *ex-officio* Trustees of the Asylum? Furthermore, Section 1520 provides for the election by the Board of other Superintendents to care for the poor needing relief outside of the Poor House, while Section 604a does not. Manifestly to reconcile the differences, and especially the

direct conflict between the two sections, Chapter 73, of the Laws of 1879, was passed. By this act, that clause in Section 1520, relating to the Trustees of the Asylum being *ex-officio* Superintendents of the Poor, and for the election of other Superintendents of the Poor for outside work, was incorporated bodily in Section 604a. So that now Section 1520 provides for three Superintendents of the Poor in counties that have adopted the county system, and Section 604a, as well as Section 1520, makes the Trustees of the Asylum *ex-officio*, such Superintendents of the Poor; of course, only where there are to be Superintendents of the Poor, which is in counties that have adopted the county system.

The only provision for County Superintendents of the Poor is found in this section, 1520, which in 1898 and ever since, and now provides for such Superintendents only in counties having the county system. The same section, and now Section 604a as amended, provides for electing a Superintendent or Superintendents to care for the poor needing relief outside of the Poor House. Where the county system has not yet been adopted this provision would be needless, for such work has to be attended to by local poor officials of towns and cities. It will thus be seen that every part of this section (1520) applies only to counties that have adopted the county system. And it is in perfect accord with Section 604a. All the Poor laws since 1849 make this construction necessary. To construe the section otherwise, is to place the whole body of the law "in confusion worse confounded."

For instance, Section 1524 provides as follows: "When any county shall have abolished the distinction between county and town poor, the powers conferred and duties imposed by this chapter on town Supervisors, as officers of the poor, shall be exercised by the County Superintendents of the Poor in such county," etc. And again, Section 1525 provides that where a county has once adopted the county system, it may return to the town system, and if it does so, the office of Superintendents of the Poor shall become vacant. It is, therefore, absolutely clear—

1. That there can be no Superintendents of the Poor in any county where the county system of providing for the poor has not been adopted. Therefore there can be none in Winnebago County.

2. The County Board is empowered by statute, and it is the duty of this Board, to annually appoint an agent to attend to the Poor House and Poor Farm. It is immaterial that he be designated "Superintendent of the Poor House and Poor Farm."

3. The Trustees of the Winnebago County Asylum are not, *ex-officio* or otherwise, Superintendents of the Poor, or Superintendents of the Poor Farm or Poor House, or Trustees thereof. They always have been, and now are, absolutely without a shadow or vestige of right, power or authority over the poor, or Poor House and Poor Farm of Winnebago County, or the management or control thereof, and the

assumption by them of such power heretofore, or now, is without authority of law, and the performance on their part of any supposed duty connected therewith, has been, and is, gratuitous and without legal sanction.

The only possible legal barrier to the recovery by Mr. Appley of his salary of \$1,000 is the one suggested by the members of the State Tax Commission in their opinion of the right of a County Board to elect one of its members a County Tax Commissioner. This opinion is written by men, some of whom are very eminent in the profession of the law, and is entitled to great weight. It may be said, however, that the question has had little judicial consideration, and that none of the cases cited by the State Board are directly in point or of controlling weight in this State where the question has never been decided. In the cases cited by the State Board the appointees either voted for themselves, casting the decisive ballot, or held two offices at once: the office they appointed themselves to and the one held by them at the time of making the appointment. It might also be said that the legislature of this State has evidently entertained a different view of the law, for the statutes contain provisions expressly denying the right, in some cases, of the county board to appoint any of their members to an office, which provision would be unnecessary if they could not do so at common law, Chapter 165 of the laws of 1893 providing that a member of the county board shall not be appointed trustee of the county asylum, and expressly providing that the act shall not invalidate the election of any such person holding that office at the time of the passage of the act. Chapter 73 of the laws of 1899 makes the same provision.

As to what the law in this particular may be in this State, I shall not presume to decide, believing, as I do, that Mr. Appley is entitled to the salary whichever way the law may be on that point.

At the annual meeting of the Trustees of the County Asylum this year they appointed Mr. Austin superintendent of the county asylum. This appointment was in the nature of a compromise, the Trustees understanding that it was the desire and intent of this Board that Mr. Appley should act as Superintendent both of the Asylum and Poor Farm and receive the one thousand dollars given him by this county as superintendent or agent of the Poor Farm, in full for all services. If I am right in this, Mr. Austin agreed to give up the superintendency of the Poor Farm if the Trustees would appoint him Superintendent of the Asylum. Understanding fully and agreeing at the time that Mr. Appley should act as Superintendent of the Poor Farm, Mr. Austin voluntarily relinquished any right he might have to that office, and accepted as consideration therefor the appointment by the trustees of superintendent of the County Asylum. Since the first of the year Mr. Appley has acted as Superintendent of the Poor Farm and performed the duties of that office. Such being the case, Mr. Austin

is forever estopped from claiming to be the lawful superintendent of the Poor Farm, or claiming from this county or from Mr. Appley, the compensation belonging to that office.

If Mr. Appley is not superintendent of the Poor Farm, no one is, and there is no *de jure* superintendent of the Poor Farm. If Mr. Appley is a *de facto* officer merely, he is not such in the ordinary sense of the term. He not only holds the office under color of legal title, but cannot be an intruder, as certainly no one else is entitled to the office, and if he does not act, there will be a vacancy. He excludes no one from the office or from the compensation belonging to it.

It is my opinion, therefore, that if Mr. Appley is superintendent of the Poor Farm *de facto* only, he is entitled to receive the salary of \$1,000, payable monthly by the County Treasurer, for all the time he shall actually perform such services.

The cases that bear on this point are altogether too numerous for citation here. They are also contradictory, and only one or two are directly in point. In England it has been decided that a *de facto* officer who had performed the services was entitled to the compensation, though this was based partly on statute.

Where an officer *de facto* however, is an intruder, and usurps the office belonging to another, it is quite generally held that he cannot recover compensation. But, as I have stated, that is not the case here. I am, therefore, of the opinion that Mr. Appley is entitled to the salary of \$1,000, and can collect the same in an action against this county.


Your Committee did on the 14th and 15th days of January, 1902, take inventory at the County Poor Farm, and the same was filed in the office of the County Clerk.

- Certificate No. 204, sale of 1900. Lot 9, W. F. Steel's subdivision of part of lot 4, blk 29, 2nd ward, city of Oshkosh.
- Certificate No. 205, sale of 1900. Lot 11, W. F. Steel's subdivision of part of lot 4, blk 29, 2nd ward, city of Oshkosh.
- Certificate No. 206, sale of 1900. South 56 feet of lots 12 and 13, W. F. Steel's subdivision of part of lot 4, block 29, 2nd ward, city of Oshkosh.

for the reason the said tax certificates were issued under a special assessment, which special assessment was declared illegal in an action brought by owners of real estate abutting on Rosalia street against the city of Oshkosh and Winnebago county; which special assessment was for the curbing and macadamizing of said street. That the circuit court of Winnebago county has declared void the said taxes issued for said special improvement, and has forever barred and restrained the county of Winnebago, or its officers, from issuing any tax deed for the said unpaid taxes so levied and assessed. Your committee, after a careful examination of the records in the office of the clerk of the Circuit court, and in the office of the register of deeds of Winnebago county, find as follows:

That the special assessment for the macadamizing and curbing of Rosalia street in the city of Oshkosh was declared illegal and void; that the allegations are true.

We therefore recommend the tax certificates herein mentioned be cancelled and that the owner thereof, on presenting and surrendering the same for cancellation, be paid the amount so paid for such certificates and interest thereon at seven per cent from the date of said certificates, to-wit:

and that the said amount so paid for such tax certificates be charged back to the city of Oshkosh.

Your committee further report that they have considered the petition of Silas Bullard for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 153, sale of 1901, described as follows: W $\frac{1}{2}$ of lot 11, block 55, Fourth ward city of Menasha. Your petitioner alleges that said description is erroneous, indefinite and void and that there are no lands in said city of Menasha property described as in such tax certificate. Your committee, after making a careful examination of the records, find that the subdivision of lot 10, block 55, in the City of Menasha, as shown by the plat thereof, contains two blocks, Nos 1 and 2, and that in each of such blocks is a lot numbered 11, and as the records show the taxes on both of these lots were paid before the sale of lands for taxes in the following year. That the west $\frac{1}{2}$ of lot 11, block 55, in the Fourth Ward of the City of Menasha, could not be situated in any

subdivision of lot 10, block 55, therefore the description in such tax certificate is indefinite and illegal. Your committee, being satisfied that the above allegations are true, would recommend the cancellation of said tax certificate, and the owner be paid the amount paid for said certificate, with interest, upon surrendering the same for cancellation, as follows:

and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Your committee would further report that they have considered the petition of L. G. Arnold for the cancellation of four tax certificates, as follows:

for the reason that said lots are all owned and occupied by railway companies for rail road purposes. From the best information your committee has been able to get from abstracts of title and other sources, they believe the allegations of the petitioner are true, and that said certificates, except No. 439 and No. 123, are illegal, and they therefore recommend that they be cancelled, and the owner be paid the amount paid therefor, with interest at seven per cent from date of sale, upon surrendering said certificates for cancellation, as follows, to-wit:

and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Oshkosh.

We further report that we believe that certificate No. 439 is a legal certificate, as not all of lot 21, block 92, covered by it, is used for rail-road purposes, and that the right of way is excepted in the description, and therefore recommend that said certificate be not cancelled. And as to certificate No 123, sale of 1895, this certificate was presented to this Board for cancellation more than six years after said sale or assignment by Winnebago County. Section 1185 of the Revised Statutes provides that every claim against the county for the recovery of money on account of any defection or void tax certificate must be presented within six years after the sale and assignment of said certificate by the county. This petition or claim having been presented more than six years after the assignment of said certificate by the county, your committee report that they are compelled to recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be not granted, and the said certificate be not cancelled.

Your committee would further report that they have considered the joint petition of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company

as property owner, and J. Howard Jenkins as certificate holder, for the cancellation of nineteen tax certificates, as follows, to-wit:

for the reason that said lots are owned by said rail road company and used for rail road purposes, therefore are exempt from taxation. Your committee, after making a careful examination of the plats, and making a personal view of the lots and rail road tracks, finds that more or less of all said lots are used for rail road purposes and the right of way, not excepted in any of the descriptions. Your committee would therefore recommend that said certificates be cancelled, and the owner be paid the amount paid for said certificates, with seven per cent. interest, upon surrendering the same for cancellation, to-wit:

Your committee have considered the petition of Henry M. Northrup for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 159, sale of May 1, 1901, described as follows. The west 77 feet of lot 12, block 55, subdivision of lot 12, block 55, Fourth Ward, City of Menasha. Your petitioner represents that the taxes for the year 1900 on a portion of said lands described in said tax certificate were paid to the city Treasurer of the City of Menasha before the return of delinquent taxes to the County Treasurer. That the taxes on the 50 feet next east of the west 27 feet, south of the north 132 feet of lot 12, block 55, in the City of Menasha, for the year 1900, were paid by Elizabeth Lawson on March 15, 1901, and that such lands on which said taxes were paid comprise the greater portion of the lands described in such tax certificate, and by reason thereof said sale of said lands for such taxes was illegal, and said tax certificate is illegal and void.

Your committee, having examined the records in the County Clerk's office, find the above facts to be true, and would recommend the cancellation of said tax certificate, and the owner be paid the amount paid for said certificate, with interest, upon surrendering the same for cancellation, as follows:

Certificate No 159, sale of 1901, face \$18.91, interest \$1.10, total.....\$ 20 01

and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Your Committee have considered the petition of Wm. F. Gruenewald. Your petitioner respectfully represents that at the last session of this Board, being the November session of 1901, certificate 381, sale of 1901, was presented for cancellation. That the petitioner represented in his petition that the amount of the tax was \$67.46, when in truth and in fact the said tax certificate had a face value of \$97.46; that the petitioner in drawing up his petition for the cancellation of said tax certificate inadvertently inserted the amount therein as \$67.46, instead of \$97.46. That said tax certificate was duly cancelled, and the amount as represented in the petition, viz: \$67.46, with interest thereon as by law provided, which was duly paid the petitioner. We would therefore recommend that the petitioner be paid the balance due on said certificate, which is \$30.00, and interest, \$1.75, making a total of \$31.75, and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Oshkosh.

Your committee would further report that they have considered the petition of Chas. J. Koch for cancellation of tax certificate No. 114, sale of May 15, 1900, described as follows: All except the right of way of lot 1, block 11, Second Ward, City of Menasha, for the reason it is a double assessment. Your committee, after making a careful examination of the records in the County Clerk's and Treasurer's offices, find that the assessor of the City of Menasha for the year 1899 assessed said lot 1, block 11, to A. L. Reed, and also to the Wisconsin Central Rail Road Co., and two tax certificates were issued on lot 1,

block 11, Second Ward, City of Menasha for the same year, Nos. 113 and 114. Your committee, being satisfied that the certificate is illegal, would recommend that said certificate, No. 114, be cancelled, and the owner be paid the amount paid for said certificate, with interest, upon surrendering the same for cancellation:

Certificate No. 114, sale of 1900, face \$1.65, interest \$.21, total.....\$ 1 86

and when so paid to be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Your Committee further report that they have considered the account of E. W. Thomas. The account is for looking up titles on some railroad lands under consideration by your committee. We recommend that the same be allowed at two dollars.

Your Committee have considered the petition of Wm. Wakeman for the cancellation of two tax certificates, as follows: No. 255, sale of 1899, described as follows, to-wit: The north 40 feet of lot 1, block 9, original plat of the city of Oshkosh, First ward; was sold for the sum of \$133.38; and Certificate No. 177, sale of 1900, covering the same property and same description, was sold for the sum of \$142.45. Your petitioner alleges that said real estate, aforesaid described in said certificates, was the property of the Young Men's Christian Association of the city of Oshkosh, a religious and benevolent association. That said property is now used exclusively for the purpose of said Association and does not exceed ten acres. That upon the real estate is situated a brick building about forty feet in width and covering practically all of said lot, and consisting at the times hereinafter mentioned of two stores or divisions of equal size in the first story and above; the second story consisting of a large hall with two smaller rooms connected therewith. There was also a basement under said building. That at the time the taxes were assessed in the year 1898, and upon which tax certificate No. 255, sale of 1899 is issued, the building was entirely used by the Association for the purposes of such Association, except one of the stores on the ground floor, which was leased and used by one J. J. Moore, who also had the right to use the back part of the basement under his store. That instead of assessing to J. J. Moore the real property held under lease by him from said Association the assessors of the city of Oshkosh for that year assessed the whole of said property above described to J. J. Moore, when, in fact said J. J. Moore had leased not to exceed about one quarter of said property. And when the assessment was made upon said property for the taxes of 1899 said Association was occupying the whole of said building for the purposes of the Association except the second story which was rented to the city of Oshkosh for school purposes through the day, the Association reserving the right to use the same in the evening. That said arrangement with the city was temporary to meet an emergency which had arisen in the condition of the schools of the city. That said city was using and occupying only the second story of said building and the stairway affording access thereto. That

notwithstanding said property was leased by the city for school purposes, and said city did not use to exceed one-half of said property the assessors for that year assessed the whole of said property instead of the part used by the city to the city of Oshkosh, as lessee, and the taxes levied upon such assessment are the same for which said premises were sold for the 15th day of May, 1900, by the county treasurer, and certificate No. 177 issued thereon.

Your committee are satisfied that the Young Mens' Christian Association building is exempt from taxation when used exclusively for that purpose, but when leased or rented for pecuniary profit it becomes liable to taxation to cover the part rented. In this case it seems to be a question of law whether this is a legal assessment or not. Your committee have obtained all the evidence on the case they could, and have heard the matter argued by the District Attorney and the attorney representing the petitioner, but are not satisfied that said tax certificates are illegal; therefore would recommend that the prayer of said petitioner be not granted.

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Poor and Poor Farm would respectfully submit the following report, setting forth the dilapidated condition of the Poor House of said county, namely:

The roof of said building requires new shingling, and the portion covered with metal requires repairing. The flooring requires to be replaced. The sanitary condition of the closets is poor, and they should be replaced with new closets, suitable for such an institution. Remodeling inside and painting is also required. The heating apparatus is inadequate to furnish heat for the building.

We would respectfully recommend the Board to make such appropriations for such portions of the above improvements as it may be deemed proper, and authorize said committee to do the same.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE REGARDING E. L. MATHEWSON.

Supervisor Rosenkranz, of the special committee, offered Report No. 1, as follows and moved its adoption:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your special committee, appointed to examine into and report upon the conduct of E. L. Mathewson, Trustee of the Winnebago County Asylum, in boarding and living at the County Asylum at the expense of the county, beg leave to report as follows:

We have visited the County Asylum, made investigation of the matter, and taken the testimony of Trustee Mathewson, as the result of which we find:

That said Trustee Mathewson has lived at the County Asylum, taking his board there and sleeping there nights, at the county's expense during several days in the month of November, the month of December, except about ten days while in Milwaukee, during the month of January, except for about twelve days while at Milwaukee and three days in Neenah, and during the entire month of February.

That during said time said Trustee had his post office address changed to the County Asylum at the Winnebago post office, in Winnebago County, and that said Trustee had offered to pay the

county therefor the sum of \$15.00, which he considered, together with the services rendered by him to the county, would be sufficient to square the account.

Your committee finds that; so far as can be ascertained, said services consisted of eating three square meals a day and sleeping at the County Asylum, all at the expense of Winnebago County.

Your committee recommends that any such actions hereafter, upon the part of any Trustee, be made a cause for censure.

Resolved, That the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm be instructed and authorized to procure plans and estimates as to cost of placing of water closets in the Poor House, and when water works are installed in the house this summer, as contemplated by the Committee on Insane, that they be given authority to install said closets as soon as water is put in the building, and that there be appropriated for said purpose, subject to the use of said committee, the sum of \$250.00.

RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD.

ADOPTED NOV. 13, 1900.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constables' Accounts, Sheriff and Coroners' Accounts, Insane, Poor and Poor Farm, Work House, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings Printing, Per Diem and Mileage, Bonds and Salaries.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman shall take the Chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, and the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of Standing Committees.
4. Reports of Select Committees.
5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by five members; and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment; if an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.
