

TO VISIT COUNTY ASYLUM.

Supervisor Chase introduced the following Resolution, No 1:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the annual visit of said Board to the County Asylum and Poor Farm be made the Special order for Tuesday, Nov. 22, and that the following named persons be and are hereby invited to accompany said Board as guests, to-wit: Dr. W. Gordon, superintendent of the Northern Hospital for the Insane; Ex-Chairmen of the County Board, E. R. Hicks and John Harrington; Ex-superintendent A. C. Austin and Ex-Trustees W. C. Kimball and E. D. Mathewson of the County Asylum; Ex-county Clerk J. G. Pickett; Circuit, County and Municipal judges and their court reporters; Clerk of Municipal court; Superintendent of Work House; county officers; members of the Assembly; senator and members of the assembly elect; Supervisor of Assessments, and one representative from each of the newspapers published in Winnebago county.

Further Resolved, That when the Board adjourns on Monday, Nov. 21st, it be to meet at the County Farm on the morning of the 22, at 9 a. m., or as soon thereafter as convenient; also that the county clerk be requested to notify Superintendent Appley of the intended visit, giving date thereof.

Supervisor Arnemann moved its adoption. Carried.

Chairman Nash for Supt. Abrams, invited the members to supper at the Work House on the 17th.

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: In submitting our Annual Report for the year ending June 30, 1904, we have to announce that the State Board of Control has made a slight change in the basis for per capita report which will have a tendency to make the per capita of all county institutions higher than usual, whether it has cost more to run them or not.

Our per capita this year is \$2 31, but the expense of running the two institutions this year over last year is about \$2281.39, which will be found mostly in the permanent improvements and repair accounts.

We find as our institution gets older that the demand or repairs increases, and we are bound to make them in order to keep the buildings in good condition

The following is a tabulated statement of the expense account of the two institutions for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904. The statement, however, includes only nine months of the Poor Farm expense, viz: from October 1, 1903 to July 1, 1904. The other three months' expense from July 1, 1903 to October 1, 1903, was reported in our last annual report. and arrangements have been made to have the fiscal year of both institutions begin and end on the same date:

In the beginning of the winter of 1903-04 we discovered that our heating system at the County Asylum was in bad condition. We employed E. H. Doman, of this city, to go over the whole system with us and after a vigilant investigation concluded to put in three receivers and pumps, one for each engine, to receive the condensation from the steam coils and return the same to the boilers. This, with the repairs of the engines, including the dynamo engines, and installing extra coils, placed our heating system in very good order; and, notwithstanding the cold winter we were able to keep the building comfortable in all departments. These repairs and permanent improvements on heating system cost about \$1000.00.

We desire to thank your honorable body for the generous appropriations for the water tower and laundry, made at the November and March sessions, respectively.

The Board of Trustees, acting with the Committee on Insane, entered into a contract with H. E. Horton, proprietor of the Chicago Bridge & Iron Works, February 25, 1904, for the erection of a steel tower and tank at the County Asylum to be completed July 1st, 1904. General outline of the tower and tank is as follows: height 114½ feet, capacity 80,000 gallons, tower steel, tank steel, roof steel. Structure equipped with 8 inch riser pipe and frost proof casing.

Contract price \$4785.00 without foundation or pipe connections.

We constructed the foundation of crushed stone and cement at a less figure than we could have contracted for with the Tower Co.

While the work was not completed on time specified in the contract we had time to connect the pipes before cold weather set in, and at this writing, the connections have been made with the Poor House and County Asylum, and have an abundance of water and good pressure at both places.

We entered into a contract with G. W. Maxey to put in a system of water pipes with hydrants, valves, etc. The work has been completed but settlement in full has not been made at this writing, but will be taken up later and reported by Committee on Insane.

We have been planning for several years on the water tower and now that it is complete with hydrants, valves, etc., we have in fact all that we had planned on as far as water supply is concerned. The hydrant pressure is 49 pounds when the tank is full. In addition to the supply of water at the asylum and poor house, it supplies the stock barns. Supt. Appley has had it conducted into the horse barn so that water may be secured there in stormy weather without going outside

We now have it so arranged that we can use our own water system on all the hydrants and inside connections independent of the Northern Hospital supply; also use the Northern Hospital supply independent of our own and a splendid pressure from both systems.

We have also constructed a telephone and alarm from the County Asylum to the Northern Hospital so that we may have the use of their powerful direct water pressure almost instantly in time of fire.

Together with the Committee on Insane we also made a contract with the A. T. Hagen Co. for laundry machinery to be placed in the laundry at the asylum.

The machinery is all in good working order at this time, and there never has been an improvement made since the Asylum was built we are so pleased with and which is so indispensable as the laundry machinery The cistern under the laundry, which has been out of repair for so long a time, has been cemented and is now doing good service.

We believe that the above mentioned improvements have been thorough in every detail, and we invite a careful inspection of the same by you.

We desire to commend the work of the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, which has had in charge the permanent improvements on the farm. The improvements made there were certainly needed and they add much to the convenience and general appearance of the place.

There has been 2338 weeks' board furnished inmates of the Poor House for the last nine months, and 10278 weeks and two days' board furnished inmates of the Asylum for the past year.

was placed in the general fund. We recommend that it be transferred to the Asylum Fund.

In view of the fact that the item of \$11,307.89, while an earning, does not come into the Asylum Fund, also the item of \$928.57 for the support of county poor does not come into said fund, and in view of the fact that the item of repairs is constantly increasing, and that we do not intend to ask for any special appropriation, unless something unforeseen transpires to make it necessary, we recommend that an appropriation of \$1000 be made to cover the item of General Repairs.

We would be untrue to the best interests of the Institution if we failed to speak a word in behalf of the Superintendent and Matron at the Asylum and Poor House. As you well know, the great part of the responsibility falls on them.

The Trustees cannot have in hand the details of the management. It falls on the Superintendent and Matron. We have always found them very zealous for the best interests of both the county and the patients, and they have made a vigorous effort to make our Institution second to none in the State, at the same time practicing as much economy as is consistent with good business management.

Attached hereto and made a part of this report will be found the reports of Superintendent C. F. Appley and County Physician Dr. F. A. Brockway.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the County Asylum and Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis :

GENTLEMEN: I herewith respectfully present to you my report as County Physician from the beginning of my term of office, January 1st, 1904.

The sanitary conditions of all the County Institutions have been good and we have had no contagious diseases among the inmates.

THE COUNTY ASYLUM.

I have visited the County Asylum regularly twice a week, and at other times when necessary.

There have been but four deaths, three males and one female, at this institution this year, and all from chronic diseases, the death of males being caused by dementia and paralysis, and that of the female by consumption. There have been no contagious diseases, few accidents, and those of a minor character, and comparatively little sickness. The food for the inmates has been uniformly nourishing, well cooked and appetizing, and special food has been provided in sickness wherever required.

The beds have been kept in a cleanly condition and the dormitories well ventilated and not overcrowded.

The heating, lighting, ventilating and sewerage systems have all

been in good working order and have all contributed a share toward the general well being of the inmates. The inmates have been given plenty of exercise in the open air, and wholesome amusements such as gramophone music, concerts and dancing have been provided.

Suitable employment has been given those who were able to work.

The Superintendent and Matron have been zealous in the good conduct of the institution, and careful of the welfare of the inmates, and the attendants uniformly kind and humane in the treatment of their charges. The institution is sanitary, well equipped, and the welfare of the inmates carefully safe-guarded.

THE COUNTY POOR HOUSE.

I have made regular visits twice a week to the Poor House, besides numerous special visits. Here, in the very nature of things, we have had, and will continue to have, a great deal of sickness, owing to the advanced age, and the crippled and diseased condition of the inmates. There have been four deaths this year, all males, and all due to paralysis, apoplexy and senile decay.

There were no serious accidents and but one major surgical operation, which was necessary for the relief of strangulated hernia. This operation was successful.

There were two births during the year; both babies were found homes by the Children's Home Society and the mothers left the institution as soon as their health would permit.

Perfect sanitation is practically impossible in the Poor House, as the building is old and has few modern improvements. However, under the supervision of the Matron, Mrs. C. F. Appley, the rooms, beds and clothing have been kept in cleanly condition, plenty of good wholesome food has been provided, the sick properly cared for, and everything possible done to better the condition of the inmates. Notwithstanding the fact that the majority of the inmates are unfortunate enough to be crippled blind or diseased, making it doubly hard for those who care for them, still they have been given a good home and have all the comforts possible.

THE COUNTY JAIL.

I have had numerous calls to the jail; being called in most instances to examine and treat new arrivals, who were either insane, victims of the drug or liquor habit, or suffering from some disease or injury acquired before their admission. Two men and one woman were committed to the Northern Hospital from the jail, and one male prisoner removed to Alexian Brothers' hospital for treatment.

In few instances has it been necessary for me to prescribe for a prisoner for any sickness acquired after admission, and then only for some slight ailment.

This shows that the building is sanitary and the prisoners well cared for by the Sheriff and his assistants.

THE WORK HOUSE.

I have visited this institution and found it well arranged and conducted, and the sanitary conditions excellent.

There have been no sick calls there this year, which is an excellent showing, and no doubt largely due to the experience of the Superintendent in handling the class of men confined there.

In closing, I wish to state that I have had the hearty co-operation of those in charge of all the county institutions, for which I thank them, and I also wish to thank you gentlemen, for your co-operation with me in my work and your courtesy to me personally.

ROOF OF POOR FARM BARN.

Supervisor Kenny submitted the following report No. 6:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Poor and Poor Farm beg leave to report in relation to the final settlement on the metal roof on the cow barn.

Last November, when about to pay the contractor, Mr H. A. Porath, in full, it being a rainy day, we discovered that the metal roof leaked badly.

We held back \$250 00 until the roof should be made rain tight. The matter remained thus until some time this fall, when the sub-contractor demanded pay for the roof. We then served notice on contractor Porath to finish his work on the roof which leaked like a sieve. They then brought a lawyer with them and declared they could not make the metal roof any tighter as specified, but would shingle it at an additional cost of \$250 over the contract price. They also to have the metal roof.

On consultation with the district attorney, who advised that even though we had a good case, still if we brought it into court it would cost the county considerable if we beat them; we therefore offered them \$100.00 to settle, which was accepted. This was on September 26, this year. We paid this sum out of the \$250.00 held back, which left \$150.00 on hand.

We relet the metal roofing to Tirwedo & Warning for \$225.00 which leaves a shortage of \$75.00 in the contract price. This has caused us considerable trouble and time, but we considered it best under direction and advice of District Attorney Jackson, to keep the case out of court, and relet this work under a new contract.

We tested this new roof last week and found it O. K.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISING LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Libraries of Winnebago County, Wis , for the year ending November 15, 1904:

GENTLEMEN: It is a pleasure to report that the Traveling Libraries of Winnebago county are in an excellent condition, as a result of the appropriation made by the County Board last April. Four new Libraries of 50 books each have been added to the county system, making a total of 1719 books in 31 libraries. Of these, 29 Libraries are out in circulation and two are kept at the Oshkosh library for exchange. Twenty-eight books have been rebound.

Following is a list of stations where Libraries are placed:

Algoma, Allenville, Black Wolf, Boom, Butte des Morts, Delhi, Elo, Eureka, Fisk, Larsen, Mear's Corners, Nekimi, Nekimi No. 2, Omro, Omro Junction, Pickett, Poygan, Ring, Rush Lake, Vinland, Waukau, West Algoma, Winchester, Winnebago, Winneconne, Zion. On account of the large number of readers at Eureka, Omro and Winneconne, these places are, for the present, provided with two libraries each.

The circulation for the past year, so far as statistics have been furnished, is 2869. The actual circulation must be considerably larger than these figures; for a number of Libraries whose circulation should be included, have not yet been returned and so could not be counted.

In June last Miss Stearns, State Librarian, visited nearly every library station in Winnebago county. Several new stations were established, and in a number of old stations Libraries were placed in different hands

These annual visits are necessary in order to see that Libraries are properly placed and are accomplishing the good for which they were intended. That the books are accomplishing their purpose of giving pleasure to many persons whose reading matter would otherwise be very limited, was evident in every visit made.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Superintendent of Schools, Overton, read his report No. 7.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: We now have in the several towns and villages ninety-six districts having ninety-nine buildings, one hundred twelve departments, and employing one hundred fifteen teachers. Our schools embrace ninety-two Rural, two State Graded, fourteen Village Graded and two High Schools. Last year our total receipts, including \$17527.03 on hand, were \$65244.97. Expenditures were \$46453.33 leaving a balance of \$18791.64.

In this county there are 5637 children of school age, of whom 3775 were enrolled in our schools with an average daily attendance of 2284. There were 2810 between the ages of 7 and 14, of whom 2375 were enrolled in some school. Giving due allowance for inaccurate reports, there were 400 children between 7 and 14 who did not attend school last year.

TRUANT LAWS.

The legislature of 1903 passed a law governing truancy which compelled the attendance of all children between the ages of 7 and 14 under penalty of a heavy fine, and between 14 and 16 unless regularly and lawfully employed. It also gave Boards the power to appoint truant officers. Some new districts have done so and in other cases they have discharged the duties themselves as provided by law. In a circular letter to the Boards I explained the working of the law and called attention to the penalties imposed, yet this law is not being properly enforced as is seen by the 400 absentees already noted.

CERTIFICATES OF AWARD.

Last year we issued to each school a supply of certificates to be given to a child who had not been absent or tardy for one school month. When he had received three or more he was given a large Certificate of Award issued from the County Superintendent's office.

This plan resulted in greatly increased attendance and decreased the cases of tardiness. The teachers uniformly reported in favor of continuing this scheme. The only modification this year is, that a child must receive five certificates of attendance before he receives a Certificate of Award.

CONSOLIDATION AND TRANSPORTATION.

For the last few years there has been a great deal of agitation in favor of consolidation of the smaller schools and transporting their pupils to some near by school at public expense. Nothing has ever been done along this line until this fall when Joint District No. 3, Utica, made arrangements with another district to receive its pupils and is transporting them to this other school, a distance of two and one-half miles on the average, and three miles for the farthest. At this writing all details have not been settled, hence I am not able to give the exact expense, but it will be very much less in their case than to maintain a school in their own district, and the pupils have the advantage of the stimulation that only numbers can give to the classes. There are several other districts that could very advantageously follow the same plan.

EXAMINATIONS.

During the past year there have been held one regular and three special examinations. The regular examination was held at the close of the summer Institute in the several examination districts and the specials were held in this building. The number of applicants has been about the same as the number of teachers required. The quality of material that comes out seems to grow better year by year. It has been my policy to make the tests hard enough to discourage the incompetents, but still not severe enough to shut out those experienced teachers who find it hard to pass examinations in branches that they are not actively engaged in teaching.

MEETING OF SCHOOL OFFICERS.

On the 13, day of February a meeting of the school officers of the several districts, was held in this building. Prof. B. Mack Dresden, of the Normal faculty, gave an address on the importance of having beautiful rooms and surroundings for our schools, that was very well received by the members of the school boards. He pointed out simple and inexpensive means of beautifying the surroundings by utilizing the means at hand in the district by the teacher and pupils. School Boards will always find ready co-operation in teachers and pupils, if they will only take the initiative. Mr. Dresden entered a strong plea for clean and well lighted outhouses. Other discussions were led by the Superintendent, and largely indulged in by the officers present.

While the attendance was not as large as was desired, the energy and enthusiasm in the work made the meeting highly successful. Still I feel that the best results to the schools was not reached, as those members of school boards who needed the work most were in nearly every instance, the very ones who were not in attendance, hence could not be reached. It was also a notable fact that the members of school boards most conveniently accessible to the meeting, were not in evidence, and that the most enthusiastic members of the meeting were from a distance.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS.

A teachers' meeting was held in District No. 1, Winchester, in the latter part of February. This meeting was for the benefit of the teachers in the northern part of the county. Every teacher within a radius of six or eight miles was present. The meeting was very beneficial to the teachers, because in my later visits to teachers in this section I saw carried into effect, the plans that were discussed at this meeting.

There were also present a number of school officers who were very attentive listeners to the discussions of the teachers. At one period an informal discussion of topics pertaining to their duties was indulged in. In these discussions the officers were prepared with questions that were to the point and showed active thinking on school matters.

INSTITUTES.

On March 5, a one day institute was held in Omro, under the direction of State Conductor Hewitt. During some of the periods the meeting was sectioned thus securing better results, as the conductors could be brought into closer touch with the teachers in the smaller groups. The purpose of this meeting was to round out the work that was being carried on in the schools that were then in session.

The regular annual Institute was held in the Normal building in this city August 15, to 26. The attendance was 10 males and 99 females; the average daily attendance was 92.5.

Of these people, two had attended Universities, 49 Normal Schools, and 63 others were High School graduates. Of the whole number only five had attended no school higher than a graded school and one of these was a graduate of a County Training School.

One teacher holds a life certificate, two Elementary Normal, eight First Grade, twenty-eight Second Grade, and fifty-one Third Grade. This shows that we have with us an excellent quality of material for the teaching force.

The Annual Institute has now become an established element in our educational system. Teachers are looking forward to it and making their plans accordingly. The help they get in the Academic

work, supplemented by contact with others doing the same work, and from the suggestions and broader experience of the trained conductors, all contribute to make the Institute of the utmost value to our school system.

This year very few of the teachers asked to be excused attending. Nearly all of these had made arrangements to join parties that were going to the St. Louis Fair at this time. All such were gladly excused. One young lady thought a camping party of more importance than attendance at the Institute, but a suggestion from a friend brought her into line before a reminder from her school board became necessary. The daily attendance was good, very few being absent without reasonable cause, and the cases of tardiness were limited to a few who at first, did not realize that they were being held up to business standards.

Regular exercises were given in Reading, Language, Arithmetic, Agriculture, Geography, School Records, Drawing, Library Methods, and Manual Training. Of these subjects several deserve more than passing notice.

DRAWING.

Drawing as a part of our rural school system has been too long neglected. The art of graphic illustration is one not to be lightly considered in any occupation or profession. The farmer needs it more than any other, as a day seldom passes without his having opportunity to use this art. In the designing of buildings, laying out fields and fences, designing implements about the farm and home, and in planning repairs for broken parts of his machinery, all become simple matters when one has a knowledge of drawing. Nearly every farm has proof in the shape of poorly planned buildings, of the inability to make the average builder understand ones ideas without the aid of a drawing to illustrate. In school work drawing is of the utmost importance in giving pupils ideas that could not otherwise be brought out. This year many of our teachers are doing good work with only the training that they received at the Institute.

MANUAL TRAINING.

Again this year we offered a course in manual training. We laid particular stress on training teachers to make things that were useful and that contributed directly to the school room, rather than any thing merely for show or ornament. This year Book Binding formed the principal part of the course. The teachers made all of their own apparatus, which was simple, and then bound an old book. Their next piece of work was a new book including the covers and all other parts. Every part of the work was done by the teachers themselves. They also made portfolios, and received lessons in paper cutting and basketry, and each teacher made a case for the card catalogue of

her school library.

Manual Training, while useful for the intrinsic value of the things made, is chiefly valuable for the training that it gives in following definite directions. Any attempt to do work in a slip shod way, or not according to the plan, is instantly evident both to the pupil and instructor, hence the discipline is excellent.

LIBRARY METHODS.

A feature of Library work not before attempted in Institute work in this county, was the training in the use of the card catalogue and the card charging system. Each teacher was given a book from the township library list and required to classify it according to the Cutter system; to make the necessary cards to properly catalogue it by authors and title; to make card references to matter contained in the book; to paste in the pocket for the book card and to make the book card and the drawer's card. In fact to do everything that was necessary to properly catalogue a book so that its contents might be readily available.

TOWNSHIP SCHOOL LIBRARIES

The Township School Libraries distributed among the 96 districts of this county now number more than 10,000 volumes which cost \$5,800.00. The Libraries will range from 50 to 200 volumes each, and the average is now nearly 100 for the ordinary district. It will be readily seen that something must be done in order to get the most good from these constantly growing collections of books. I have at present, reports from more than twenty teachers who have installed the card system in their schools. They report that the average cost is about \$1.50 per district, and that the utility of the library is in direct ratio to the number of cross references they have in their catalogues.

APPARATUS AND SUPPLIES.

At this writing not more than one-half of our schools have the requisite amount of apparatus and supplies. During the past summer a large number added to their stock, but we need a great deal more in many of the schools to put them into the proper state of efficiency. We still have a few members of boards who seem to think that the highest state of efficiency in a school officer consists in running a school at the least possible expenditure of money, rather than in having a well equipped and more efficient school. This is most often true in districts where the state and county money suffice to maintain the school.

While I have never advocated the lavish expenditure of public money, I have uniformly and firmly contended that money spent to increase the efficiency of the school was the strictest economy.

WAGES.

In 1901 the average wages paid to male teachers in our rural schools was \$32.73, and of females \$26.79; in 1902, of males \$40.03, and of females \$27.43; for 1903 for males \$33.68, and of females \$28.70; in 1904 of males \$38.93, and of females \$34.10

This wholesome increase, and we are still far below a fair, living wage, has brought to us a better class of teachers and the inevitable result has been to greatly increase the efficiency of the work done in our schools last year. This year School Boards have recognized the worth of good teachers and have either retained the old teachers at an increased salary, or have insisted on the best to be had and are offering more than they paid in former years for the same work. The teachers realized that at last in Winnebago county that efficiency was being recognized by better pay, are putting forth their best efforts in their respective schools.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion: I am glad to report that while we have well roofed and well painted buildings, that are reasonably well equipped for the most part, with furniture and apparatus, and a good supply of the latest text books, a force of teachers that is the best we ever had, our schools are still not making returns that are all that we have every reason to expect. Parents in too many instances are not keenly alive to the great evil resulting from desultory and intermittent attendance at school by their children. Pupils are kept out of school for trivial causes and often are not sent to school in the beginning of the terms. This all prevents proper classification and bars the progress of the school as a whole. The results of this are evident in the training that our young farmers are showing while transacting the ordinary business of our government.

Much has been said about the greater good accomplished by the old time school, as compared with the efficiency of the present system of education. In the old time school a great deal of memory work was done in a few of the fundamental branches. Now schools aim to give the child a culture that will enable him to work things out for himself. Could the average parent be prevailed upon to allow his child to remain in school as long as the boys and girls of 25 or 30 years ago, there would be no grounds for a comparison between that system which trained one faculty of the mind and that which aims to develop a well balanced intellect.

REPAIR OF BUILDINGS AT COUNTY FARM.

Supervisor Kenny offered report No. 10 and resolution No. 7 as follows:

To the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.:

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Poor and Poor Farm beg leave to report: By resolution passed by the Board on November 20, 1903, there was appropriated \$2500 for building and repairing of two barns, also that the amount left over namely \$456.47 from special funds be used in Poor House repairs and building Henneries. In all, placed at our disposal \$2956.47.

We advertised for bids on the two barns and let the contract to Oscar Clow the lowest bidder for \$2164.80.

We had the horse barn torn down and moved 10 feet for greater convenience and a stone basement 84 feet long, 40 feet wide and 9 feet high built for horse barn and root cellar all of stone on farm except stone for corners which is quarry stone. On this foundation was erected a barn 16 feet high, 40 feet wide and 84 feet long, of which 24 feet of the East end is new. We also made extensive repairs on the barn next south. A new hen house and yards were built at a cost of \$347.50.

There was work done in Poor House principally on first floor to the amount of \$358.15 of which \$58 63 was for carpenter work, \$291.17 was lumber and \$8 35 nails, etc.

In relation to the horse barn we found it better and safer to put a



We thought it absolutely necessary after the erection of the tank to connect it with both institutions, although in so doing we were obliged to exceed the appropriation. Accordingly we entered into a contract with G. W. Maxey to do the work. 4 inch pipe was laid from tank to poor house. Six inch pipe was used in making connections with the pump. Two new four inch hydrants were put in west of the Asylum and all necessary valves and fittings. The four inch pipe cost fifty-five cents per foot complete. The six inch pipe seventy-five cents complete—fittings extra.

The total amount of the bill for the above mentioned work was \$1, 147.42 We have paid, as stated above, \$355.55 on the contract leaving a balance due Mr. Maxey of \$791.87.

As one of the objects of constructing the tower was to secure a water supply at the Poor House we did not deem it wise to have the work only partially completed, and were obliged to extend the appropriation to the amount above stated. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution, No. 10:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis., That there be appropriated out of any funds not otherwise appropriated the sum of Seven Hundred and ninety-one and 87-100th dollars, [\$791.87], to be paid to G. W. Maxey to balance account.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNTY SUPERVISOR OF ASSESSMENTS

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Pursuant to Section 8, Chapter 445, Laws of Wisconsin, of the year 1901, I have the honor of presenting to you my third annual report.

Section 10 of Chapter 445 provides for a meeting of the Supervisors

of Assessment of the various counties to be held annually in February, at the capitol, at the call of the State Tax Commission, for a conference on the subject of taxation, and for the instruction of the county supervisors. Such meetings are found to be of much value in acquiring a good working knowledge of the assessment law and especially of the latest amendments; in promoting uniformity in the application of the law; and in cultivating a spirit of mutual helpfulness among the supervisors, especially among those in adjoining counties where similar conditions prevail, and similar questions arise. An instance in point may be seen in the adjoining counties of Winnebago and Outagamie, where some difficult questions arise in determining the assessable value of water power and paper mill property. Each supervisor of assessment is certain to secure in his investigations information and knowledge that escapes his neighbor; and an interchange of such knowledge, in a helpful spirit, is of great value to both.

Section 4, Chapter 445, requires the supervisor of assessment to call a similar meeting in April of each year, viz: a meeting of the assessors of each assessment district in his county, for consultation and instruction in the assessors' duties. In addition to the information and knowledge gained, there is also a great gain in the improved spirit of "good government," in the desire to comply with the intent of the law, to "play fair," to avoid under-assessment for the purpose of a small local gain in county and state taxes at the expense of neighboring assessment districts. It might be added that there are still three or four assessors in this county who are disposed to adhere to the spirit prevailing more generally a few years back, viz: to seek to keep their assessments so far under true value as to acquire an unfair advantage over their neighbors in the county equalization. Through the work of this office, in presenting reliable tables of comparative values, such unfair assessments have had little or no effect. In this connection is to be commended the desire of equal and fair treatment almost uniformly shown by members of the county board. The first and most important lesson that had to be learned was that it was foolish and useless, as well as immoral, for a public official to violate his oath of office; that equal justice to all required the faithful enforcement of law without fear or favor, and that this is especially true of the officials whose duties it is to assess the property of the county. It gives me pleasure at this time to especially commend the work done the past summer by the new assessors of the towns of Winneconne and Nepeuskun, where assessments were made of unusual accuracy, discrimination, and independence of previous assessments.

While a close adherence to the law is always to be sought and urged, yet it does not follow that we must be worshippers of the law and blind to any injustices that the law itself may perpetrate. It is

not easy to see why debts secured by real estate mortgage should be exempt from taxation, while one secured by chattel mortgage, or not secured at all, should be assessable property. Here is a chance for the legislature to improve the law by providing for like treatment of all credits, while the justice or injustice of exempting credits from taxation is still a debated question, there can be no two opinions as to the justice of treating all credits alike before the law.

The law defines with clearness upon what property taxes shall be levied in the precise manner in which assessments shall be made. Regarding the enforcement of the laws of the past let us go back to the year 1897.

The first State Tax Commission was created nearly seven years ago, and held their first meeting on the 10th day of June, 1897. The conditions that led to the creation of the State Tax Commission are best described in the language of the commissioners themselves, page 69:

"No intelligent man can become familiar with the methods of raising taxes now in vogue in Wisconsin without being impressed by the fact that they are very defective in many particulars, and fall far short of what the intelligent and progressive people of this State have a right to demand."

In their first report the Commission points out that the property of Wisconsin was assessed at less than forty per cent of its value, as shown by the United States census, (p. 71, Report of '98.) The commissioners say, on page 75: "A great and growing evil in our State is the prevailing custom of assessing property at a sum far below its true value." * * * "If the assessor is disposed to be fair as between different tax payers of his district, he will, perhaps, start with some former assessor's value of a particular parcel, or with his own arbitrary modification of such value, and assesses the adjoining property by comparison with the first, the next by comparison with the second, and so on till the first standard is virtually lost sight of. When the average assessor once departs from the standard of true value, he speedily comes to have no standard except a sort of comparison between like properties so circumstanced as to be easily compared. It consequently happens, unless the assessor is a person of diligence and unusual judgment, that his valuations soon show wide variations not only in respect to dissimilar properties and different classes of property, but even as to properties which differ only in ownership. The habit of under-valuations is one of such long standing that in most assessment districts sets or series of arbitrary valuations for assessment purposes have become established. These, originating in slight departures from true value, have been changed from time to time according to the notions of successive assessors, previous assessments being taken as a guide or standard, rather than

actual values, until the whole becomes but a mass of arbitrary figures. Assessment valuations have come thus to be, in fact, and are commonly considered and treated as something apart from and unrelated to actual values."

(Page 77, Report of '98.) "The feeling on the part of the assessor that he is bound by no definite rule or standard begets indifference and carelessness, gives bias or prejudice free play, and with easy-going or intentionally dishonest officials, affords both room and cover for favoritism and partiality." * * * "In very many instances perhaps in a majority of cases, the assessment has come to be hardly more than a farce. But this so-called assessment roll with a piece of perjury attached in the form of an assessor's oath, is solemnly accepted as the basis on which citizens are asked and virtually forced to make their contribution to the heavy and constantly increasing burden of taxation. These perjured documents are also supposed to form the basis of the county equalization, and ultimately, the basis for the apportionment of state taxes."

This is the method which grew up under Sec. 1052, R. S. which provides that real estate shall be assessed "at the full value which could ordinarily be obtained therefor at private sale." In the case of Schettler vs. City of Fort Howard, 43 Wis. 58, Chief Justice Ryan says, speaking of the law and its abuses: "The statutes are so carefully framed that it does not lightly trust the conscience of assessors. It requires from each a precise and positive affidavit that he has made his assessment upon statutory rule. If an assessor does not annex his affidavit to his assessment roll he does not complete his duty, and there is in law, no assessment. If the assessor make and annex the affidavit to an assessment made in violation of the statutory rule he takes an absolutely false oath in the execution of his office. What faith can be reposed in an assessment so made and so verified? What security is there that such an assessment is just, equal or honest in either respects, even upon the rule of the assessor?"

We know that throughout Wisconsin property was assessed all the way from twenty per cent of true value to eighty five. We know that the same conditions prevailed in the different assessment districts of the county. We know, too, that these conditions have not been entirely eliminated. It was to remedy, and if possible, remove these conditions that laws were passed organizing in this state a new system of supervision. First a commission of three members was created in 1897, with limited powers and no salary, to investigate and report. Second, in 1899, a permanent commission was created, consisting of three members who were provided with a suitable salary and vested with considerable powers of supervision over the assessors and assessments of the state. Third, in 1901, the duties and powers of this commission were much expanded, increased and broadened; and fourth, the new office of "County Supervisor of Assess-

ments" was created to act in conjunction with and under the general direction of the State Tax Commission, and having a general supervision over local assessors, boards of review and boards of equalization.

To show the condition prevailing in the past, and that some improvement has been made toward complying with the law, and assessing at true value, I submit the following table, showing the assessed value of the property of the county, and the equalized value as fixed by the County Board for the past seven years:

This shows that the assessed value has been doubled in the last four years, and that the equalized value has been trebled. It does not mean that the value of the property of the county has increased in any such degree, but that the assessors of the county have made an effort to more fully comply with the law and assess all property at its true value.

I know that it is claimed by some that it is foolish to enforce the law as we find it, and it is argued that the assessor should not assess at full cash value because it would raise the valuation of his district too high; and they therefore ask the assessor to violate his oath of office by under-valuing property.

A public officer who intentionally violates his oath of office, is, to say the least, neither a safe nor a creditable citizen. He has taken an oath to faithfully perform the duties of his office and enforce the laws of the state, therefore no good citizen can honestly criticise him for obeying the law.

Especial attention is called to the assessment of land; for, after all land is by far the largest value that appears on the assessment roll. I again call your attention to Section 1052, R. S., which provides that "real property shall be valued by the assessor * * at the full value which could ordinarily be obtained therefor at private sale." Assessors often make the mistake of devoting a disproportionate part of their time in looking after trivial items of personal property, thus leaving themselves short of time to properly investigate the "full value" of real estate, especially with a view to determining the increase of value since the last assessment. There is much land in the county, both farming and city property that has advanced in value

during the year. There is some land that has advanced ten to fifteen per cent in value. If anything must be neglected for want of time it would be more profitable to neglect the smaller items of personal property than this growing and important value of land.

One of the most valuable of recent laws is that providing for the separate assessment of land and the improvements thereon. (Chap. 92, Laws of 1901.) It is generally true that increase in value does not attach to buildings and improvements, but to the land only. In fact, while land is increasing in value the buildings thereon are depreciating. In some cases it will be found that the buildings are assessed higher proportionately than the land. Unless this is changed it tends to become worse, for the land is likely to advance while the value of the buildings decreases, thus making the disproportion constantly greater. Where there is doubt as to the value of the buildings it should be decided in favor of the lower value; while the contrary rule should apply to land. However, care must be taken that the sum of the separate values of the land and improvements shall not exceed the combined value of both. Let me illustrate: A house costing \$4000 might be built on a lot costing \$500; the entire property then be marketable for only \$3500, because people sometimes do foolish things. In such a case as the above the assessed value should not exceed \$3500, and the separate value would be \$500 for the lot and \$3000 for the building. Again, there may be buildings and improvements costing \$4000 on a forty acre farm having a land value of \$4000. In such case the farm might not sell for more than \$6000. In such case the land would still be worth \$4000, while the buildings could not be assessed at more than \$2000. The correct rule is first to assess the true value of the land as if it were vacant, and assess then for the value of the buildings such sum as when added to the land value will equal the true market value of the entire property.

The members of the county board can do much to aid the work of this office by constantly impressing upon the assessors in their respective towns, the lawful rule of assessments, viz: at "true value." This would tend to avoid what we sometimes find, as assessment based upon the number of acres, regardless of whether the land is good or poor, convenient to market or inconvenient, well improved or much run down.

The legal rule for valuing property is not what some people still seem to believe it is, viz: what it will bring under the hammer; nor neither is it what a man might get if some one had to have the property; but it is the agreeing price between a man who wants to sell and a man with means who wants to buy.

The great mass of the people are educating themselves to believe the full or true cash value is the only true way of assessing property, while some people are still opposed to it, believing that the higher the assessment the higher the taxes. I want to say to those people

that is not so. The appropriations made by the town, city or village for local purposes, the appropriations made by the county board, and the State tax levy, govern the amount of taxes paid by each property owner, while the assessment governs the per cent; if the assessment is low the per cent is high, and vice versa.

There is a sentiment among a great many people in the cities, and also among the city assessors, that merchants' stock and manufacturing plants should not be assessed at as full value as other classes of property; on the ground that those properties are a benefit to the cities in which the same are located, and should not be taxed to death. It is a hard matter to get the assessor to assess property at full value when such sentiment prevails among the people at large. Especially is this true where the sentiment extends to the Board of Review of such cities.

If the people of such cities are willing that such properties should be partially exempt, it works no injustice to any other district if those cities having such properties will assume their just portion of county and State taxes in connection with local tax.

The State Tax Commission, in their instructions, say: "The fundamental requirements of a good assessment are, first—a complete listing of all taxable property; and second—a correct valuation of the same. The one is as important as the other. If some kinds of property are omitted from assessment injustice will result to those who have little or none of the kinds of property omitted. A correct valuation of property listed does not help inequalities resulting from omission.

The fact that a particular property is now unsalable does not necessarily imply that it has no value, or warrant the assessor in reducing the assessment to a figure which would produce a purchaser.

The cost of a property, even with allowance for depreciation and wear, does not necessarily determine its value. The capacity of a property to produce income, or the fact that it is producing none, cannot ordinarily be taken alone to fix its value.

The asking price at which a property is offered, or an offered price, would not in every case settle the value. It is the agreeing price which the law contemplates.

In estimating real estate, the assessor should bear in mind that portion of Section 1052 which reads as follows: "In determining the value the assessor shall consider as to each piece, its advantage or disadvantage of location, quality of soil, quantity of standing timber, water privileges, mines, minerals, quarries, or other valuable deposits thereon, and their value."

County Boards and the State Board of Assessment are not bound or concluded by items of property actually listed and included in the local assessment, but are at liberty, in determining the relative value of taxable property in each district or county, to take into considera-

tion the amount and value of all taxable property in each, whether listed upon the assessment roll or not.

Such Boards are not only at liberty to do this, but they are bound to do so so far as they have knowledge. Thus, the relative valuation of a town may be increased by the county board, and that of a county may be increased by the State Board, solely on account of property which ought to have been, but was not, included in the local assessment. But such increase would not enable local assessing officers to amend their rolls so as to add the omitted property, and the consequence would be that the increase in state and county taxes resulting from such increase in relative valuation would fall as an additional burden upon the persons whose property was actually listed upon the assessment roll."

The same method of determining the ratio of assessed value to true value of property was used by me as was used in 1903, viz: by actual inspection of a limited number of parcels in each taxing district, and by comparing the true value of these parcels with assessed value deriving therefrom a basis of true value to assessed value for the entire taxing district.

I also carried with me the sales of each assessment district for the last two years, investigating the same as to how much personal property, if any, was included in the consideration, then using the same to assist me in arriving at the true value of the parcels taken.

The following tabulations contained in the report cover substantially my investigations relative to property valuations and assessment for the present year:

Table showing the total assessed value of Taxable Real Estate in each Assessment District in Winnebago county for the year 1904 and the true value of the same according to calculations made upon inspection by the Supervisor of Assessments for said County, and showing also the basis upon which such calculations were made:

ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS

Supervisor Lueckenbach submitted the following Report, No. 29, and moved its adoption:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report on the several petitions referred to them for the cancellation of tax certificates as follows, to-wit:

The petition of F. J. Barber for the refunding of the sum of \$6.78, and interest, represented by 67 tax certificate No 358, sale 1896, attached to petition. The petitioner represents that said amount is due him on account of the fact that the tax as represented by said certificate was readvertised and sold on May 16, 1899, for some omission or mistake unknown to petitioner.

Your committee finds the fact as set forth in said petition to be true, and also find that the reason for such re-sale and re-advertisement was on account of the fact that the certificate No. 358, sale 1896, was defective, for the reason that the property in question was set forth in the advertised list of taxes of 1895, sale 1896, issued by Thos. J. Baird, the then treasurer, as being in the Third ward, Oshkosh, when in truth and in fact said property is situated in the Fourth ward, Oshkosh.

Your committee therefore recommends that said tax certificate No 358, sale 1896, be cancelled and that the amount so paid for such certificate be refunded to petitioner with interest at the rate of 7 per cent from May 16, 1899, being the date of the re-sale of said lands on account of such void certificate, viz:

No. 358, sale 1896, re-sale 1899, amount of certificate \$6.78; interest, \$2.60; total, \$9.38.

The petition of F. J. Barber for the refunding of the amount represented by tax certificate No. 236, sale 1897, amount of \$17.83, which said certificate was issued on this sale of 1897, tax of 1896. That said certificate was purchased by petitioner as mortgagee of premises and described therein; that said lands were re-sold for said tax of 1896, for a defect or omission un-

known to petitioner. That said re-sale was held on May 15, 1900, said lands for said tax being sold to N. A. Greenlaw, unbeknown to petitioner and a certificate issued thereon to substitute said certificate, No. 236, sale 1897.

Your committee finds the fact as stated in said petition to be true, and also find that the reason for such re-advertisement and re-sale was on account of the fact that the lands described in said certificate No. 236, sale of 1897, were not advertised in the treasurer's list of delinquent taxes as issued by Thos. J. Baird, the then county treasurer, for the sale of 1897, and on account of such omission we find said certificate and sale thereof to be void.

Your committee therefore recommends that said tax certificate No. 236, sale 1897, be cancelled and the amount so paid for such certificate be refunded petitioner with interest at the rate of 7 per cent from May 15, 1900, being the date of the re-sale of said lands on account of such void certificate, viz:

No. 236, sale 1897, re-sale 1900, amount of certificate, \$17.83; interest, \$5.66; total, \$23.49.

The petition of Thos. H. Gill in behalf of Wisconsin Central Railroad company for cancellation of certificate No. 217, sale 1904, on account of the fact, as stated in said petition, that the property therein described was acquired solely for railway purposes and has since the date of the purchase been used in connection with the operation of said railway as contemplated by Section 1038, Revised Statutes. That the above described property has been duly returned to the State Board of Assessments as railway property and assessed by said Board as such and is consequently exempt from taxation.

Your committee finds that the material facts as alleged in said petition are true. That on examination of the records we find that the title to the property in question is in the name of the Milwaukee and Lake Winnebago Railroad Company (now known as Wisconsin Central Railroad Company) that on examination of Abstract Book of Taxes, we find that the taxes for prior years were cancelled by the County Board on account of the fact that said property was used and has been used for several years last past for railroad purposes.

We therefore recommend that said tax certificate be cancelled and the amount so paid for such certificate of sale be refunded, with interest at 7 per cent to petitioner, and the amount so paid be charged back to the city of Oshkosh, viz:

Certificate No. 217, sale 1904, amount of certificate, \$3.56; interest, \$.13; total, \$3.69.

Petition of E. W. Thomas for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 109, sale May 21, 1905, amount \$5.99, representing that said certificate is void for the reason that Thos. J. Baird the then treasurer, failed to make an affidavit of the posting of notice of sale of taxes for that year, according to

the provisions of Section 1132 of Revised Statutes of 1898. Your committee report that an examination of the treasurer's list in the county clerk's office we find the facts as alleged in said petition are true and recommend that said certificate be cancelled, and that same be charged to the city of Oshkosh, with interest at 7 per cent and that the amount so paid therefor be refunded to petitioner, viz:

Certificate 109, sale of 1895, amount of certificate, \$5.99; interest, \$3.98; total, \$9.97.

The petition of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad Company by Barbers & Beglinger, attorneys for cancellation of tax certificates, sale 1895, 1896, 1899, 1900, 1902, 1903; amounts, 80 cents, 81 cents, 79 cents, 81 cents, 94 cents, 89 cents, respectively; representing that Lot 21, Block 92, effected by said certificates is owned by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad Company, and is now used for railroad purposes; that by the mistake of the assessors of the city of Oshkosh, said premises were assessed for taxation and so taxed for the years 1894, 1895, 1898, 1899, 1901, 1902.

Your committee on careful examination of the records in the office of the Register of Deeds, and after viewing the premises and consulting the Assessor for the Sixth ward, Oshkosh, wherein the land in question is located, find that the material allegations set forth in said petition are true, and we would recommend that said tax certificates heretofore mentioned be cancelled and the amounts of said certificates be refunded to the holders thereof in accordance with Section 1184, Revised Statutes, with interest at the rate of 7 per cent per annum, and that the same be charged back to city of Oshkosh, viz: (except certificate No. 167, sale 1895, which is outlawed):

No. 393, sale 1899, amount, 79 cents; interest, 30 cents; total, \$1.09.

No. 257, sale 1900, amount, 81 cents; interest, 28 cents; total, \$1.09.

No. 251, sale 1902, amount, 94 cents; interest, 16 cents; total, \$1.10.

No. 216, sale 1903, amount, 89 cents; interest, 9c; total, 98 cents.

The petition of Charles Barber for cancellation of tax certificate No. 236, sale 1901, of which he is the lawful owner and holder as therein represented, further represents that the property described in said tax certificate was, at the time of the assessment and levy of taxes thereon for the non-payment of which said premises were sold and certificate issued; not assessable for taxes and was exempt from taxation for the reason that said property was owned and is now owned by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad Company and was then, and is now, used for railroad purposes; that the assessment of said property was a mistake made by the assessors of the city of Oshkosh.

Your committee, on examination of the records and on viewing the premises and consulting the assessors who assessed the property at that time, stated in said petition, find the facts as stated to be true, and would therefore recommend that said tax certificate be cancelled and the amount thereof refunded to petitioner with interest at 7 per cent, and that the same be charged back to the city of Oshkosh, viz:

Certificate No. 236, sale 1901, amount, 83 cents; interest, 20 cents; total, \$1.03.

The petition of E. W. Thomas for cancellation of tax certificates Nos. 362 and 363, sale May 15, 1900, effecting east $\frac{1}{2}$ of Lot 34 and all of Lot 35, Algoma addition, and west $\frac{1}{2}$ of Lot 37, and all of Lot 36, Algoma addition, Twelfth ward, Oshkosh, for the reason that by a decision rendered in Circuit Court, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, the assessment under which said certificates were issued was declared null and void; that said assessment was made for special improvement; that the land described in the tax certificates issued under said assessment be released from any lien or charge upon the same, by reason of such assessment. Your committee find the facts as stated to be true and would therefore recommend that the same be cancelled and the amount so paid for such certificates be refunded to petitioner with interest at 7 per cent, and the amount so paid be charged back to the city of Oshkosh.

Certificate No. 362, sale 1900, amount, \$91.45; interest, \$29.09; total, \$120.54.

Certificate No. 363, sale 1900, amount, \$91.45; interest, \$29.09; total, \$120.54.

The petition of Max Schoetz, Jr, for cancellation of tax certificate No. 162, sale 1901, for the reason as represented in said petition that the same is illegal and void on account of a double assessment on the land described therein for the year 1900; that the land is owned by Valentine Koslinski who maintains that the tax for the year 1900 on his property was paid by him and presents a receipt of the city treasurer of Menasha therefor; and further represents that the tax roll of the city of Menasha shows a double assessment of said land of Valentine Koslinski.

Your committee on careful examination of the records finds the facts as set forth in said petition to be true, and recommends that the amount so paid for such certificate with interest at 7 per cent be refunded petitioner and that the same be charged back to the city of Menasha, viz:

Certificate No. 162, sale 1901, amount, \$6.86; interest, \$1.71; total, \$8.57.

Your committee further reports that in the County Treasurer's list of taxes withheld from sale we find a tax returned by the City Treasurer of the city of Menasha for \$1.57; also a tax for \$9.44; also a tax of \$5.61; all of which were intended to cover certain descriptions or tracts of land in the city of Menasha, and we find on careful examination that the foregoing taxes were withheld from sale on account of the description thereof being indefinite, and your committee would therefore recommend that the same be charged back to the city of Menasha.

Your committee has before it the statement of the county treasurer of lands withheld from sale and beg leave to report that they have carefully considered the same and find that a part of the land in said statement was withheld from sale for the reason that the same was supposed to be church property and exempt from taxation; the description of said tract of land in

question is Lot 8, of Block 2, Interurban Land Company's first addition in the town of Oshkosh.

Having examined the records we find that the title to said tract of land is in the Trustees of the Wisconsin Conference Methodist Episcopal church, as per deed recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds, in volume 241, page 198, and we further report on careful inquiry and on examination made of the premises we find no buildings of any nature whatever on the above described tract of land and your committee would therefore recommend that the amount of the tax as levied on said property which at this time is \$1.13 be charged back to the town of Oshkosh for the reason that said property is not exempt from taxation according to our findings.

We would also recommend that the sum of Ten Dollars be allowed E. W. Thomas for services rendered in examining titles to property in question, assisting in other matters in connection therewith including stenographer work.

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the proposal submitted by the new German American Bank of Oshkosh, being the most advantageous of the several proposals submitted, be and the same is hereby accepted, and the new German American Bank of Oshkosh, is designated as the County Depository

The following is a copy of said proposal:

"The New German American Bank of Oshkosh, Wis., will pay the County three per cent per annum on daily balances. Supervisor Schoetz offered Report No. 13:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report on the several petitions referred to them for the cancellation of tax certificates, as follows, to-wit:

FIRST—The petition of L. G. Arnold for cancellation of tax certificate No 446, Sale of 1897 and No. 402, Sale of 1899, upon a piece of land on 9th street, city of Oshkosh, Wis., 66 feet east and west by 660 feet north and south, being east of and adjoining the twenty rods east and

RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD

ADOPTED AUGUST 24, 1903.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees: Equalization; Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constables' Accounts, Sheriff and Coroners' Accounts, Insane, Poor and Poor Farm, Work House, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings, Printing, Per Diem and Mileage, Bonds and Salaries.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day will be read, and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of Standing Committees.
4. Reports of Select Committees.
5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by five members; and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.
