## Look what's being displayed this summer at Park View!

Mr. Joseph Stieg has graciously offered to share his meticulous wood carvings of ducks and other birds this summer here at Park View.

Mr. Stieg began carving after retirement from the Oshkosh School System in 1980. The oldest carving on display was completed in 1985 and the last one he carved was around 2002. He liked to work with wood. and carving was something he could do without spending a great deal of money on equipment.

In addition to enjoying carving, he built his own garage, a pigeon roost house that was in a dog house/ shed he built; the shed later became his wood carving shop after he stopped training dogs and raising pigeons. Mr. Stieg also built his own kitchen cupboards, and a beautiful rec room in the basement with a bar and fireplace where family and friends enjoyed many parties. During 1992, his old shop was in much needed repair and was actually getting too small, so Mr. Stieg's son, Gary, built him a new, insulated and heated shop so he could work out there year round. He had a TV and an intercom system so he and his wife had immediate contact for dinner calls. It had become his "get-away"!

To further master his craft, Mr. Stieg would meet and consult with other carvers in the area. That motivated him to work into the next level of achievement, as he started to create these very life-like carvings.

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## **Annual Satisfaction Survey Results Summary**

Park View Health Center sends out satisfaction surveys to our residents or their legal representatives on an annual basis. The purpose of the survey is two-fold:

- 1. To measure resident/family satisfaction in relation to Park View's facility, services, and staff.
- 2. To identify trends in order to make improvements.

Of the 156 surveys sent out, 98 or 63% were returned.

#### Of the responses:

- 100% (maintained from 100% last year) stated staff welcome and accommodate their visitors.
- 99% (up from 97% last year) stated they are able to find nursing staff when needed.
- 98% (up from 96% last year) stated staff does well assisting residents in being well-groomed.
- 100% (maintained 100% since 2012-the start of this particular survey) stated public areas look & smell clean.
- 98% (up from 93% last year) stated they are satisfied with scheduled activities & leisure opportunities.
- 92% (up from 89% last year) stated food served tastes good and looks appetizing.
- 100% (maintained 100% since 2012-start of this particular survey) stated they would recommend PVHC.

#### While there isn't room for all the comments received, here are a few:

- The health shakes are tasty.
- All staff are very professional with few exceptions. Staff on the unit are very positive and helpful. Feedback from staff is always timely and informative. There have not been any negative incidents to report. Unit staff are concerned and thorough in their job duties. Unit staff attitudes are always positive.
- Everyone is friendly & they say hello no matter where you are in the facility. Residents seem happy. Always get answers when I have questions.
- I can't say enough nice things about the staff—kind, caring, patient, and always very helpful. Also, amount and variety of activities and quality is exceptional.
- Would like more fresh fruit—oranges, grapes, bananas. MORE BINGO.
- We call Park View "the palace". Keep up the amazing ministry!
- (Resident) has been there four years. You are now his family, giving him needs and cares. Something I could never do for him all the years I knew him.
- The family of (Resident) has been so pleased with the facility and staff caring for our dad! Thank you for being such a blessing to us in treating him with dignity, kindness and compassion. The few concerns we had were met with prompt attention and we were satisfied with the outcomes. Thank you for all you do!


Alex, they have THREE dogs, and as the picture shows, each one is quite different in appearance with differing personalities to match!

More about the therapy neighborhood: This area consists of both short and long-term care residents. About 2/3 of the residents are short-term, therapy stays. The diversity of this resident population provides a unique challenge in the role of caregiver. The unit can become extremely busy with frequent admission, discharges, therapy appointments, and rehab programs for our short-term residents. As Elizabeth states it, "It's very important, especially on chaotic days, that we always strive to provide our long-term residents with individualized care focused on the comforts of home."

<u>Family/Pets</u>: Elizabeth has three children, ages 18, 16, and 10. The family has a black female Pug named "Wednesday".

<u>Hobbies/Interests</u>: During her free time, Elizabeth enjoys gardening and planting flowers, hiking, biking, fishing, and scrapbooking.

<u>Valuable Lessons</u>: Elizabeth shared that trust is a very special gift that shouldn't be taken for granted and that attitude really can make all the difference!

# How can PVHC residents' families and friends reserve the Great Room or the Multi-Purpose Room for resident events?

Families/friends of Park View residents can reserve the Great Room or the Multi-Purpose Room for resident events by contacting the Business Office Mondays through Fridays, 8:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. The Great Room or the Multi-Purpose Room can be reserved no more than two months in advance of the event, and the hours the Great Room or the Multi-Purpose Room can be reserved are from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Requests for additional hours would need the Administrator's approval. A minimum donation of \$25.00 is recommended which will benefit the resident needs fund.

When reserving the Great Room or Multi-Purpose Room, the following information needs to be given:

- a. Name of person making the reservation
- b. Contact person's phone and address
- Name of resident involved and resident's neighborhood
- d. Date of reservation
- e. Time of reservation
- f. Approximate number of individuals attending
- g. If reserving the Great Room, specific area needed:

Full Great Room (capacity 120)

Great Room-South (altar area; capacity 70)

Great Room-North (capacity 50)

- Number of tables needed
- i. Number of chairs needed
- j. Any other special instructions



#### Additional information for the contact person's consideration:

- Park View is a smoke-free campus and no open flames are permitted.
- No alcoholic beverages may be consumed.
- 3. You will need to supply your own place settings and kitchen equipment.
- 4. Use the facility's main entrance, only.
- 5. The number of electrical outlets are as follows:

Entire Great Room = 2 floor and 6 wall outlets Great Room-South = 1 floor and 3 wall outlets Great Room-North = 1 floor and 3 wall outlets Multi-Purpose Room = 1 floor and 8 wall outlets
