Spotlight: Sexually Transmitted Infections

- We are asking that you provide treatment to all patients you test based on the CDC treatment guidelines - <https://www.cdc.gov/std/treatment-guidelines/default.htm>

Spotlight: Monkeypox

- Providers should suspect monkeypox in any patient who presents with the characteristic monkeypox rash (well-circumscribed, hard or firm, deep-seated lesions that may umbilicate or become confluent and progress over time to scabs).
- A patient with suspected or confirmed monkeypox infection should be placed in a single-person room; special air handling is not required. PPE including gown, gloves, eye protection, and an N95 respirator should be used when caring for or collecting specimens from patients. Patients who do not require hospitalization for medical indications may be isolated at home using protective measures.

- **Monkeypox is reportable in Wisconsin as a Category I Condition. Clinicians must report suspected and confirmed monkeypox cases IMMEDIATELY by telephone to the patient's local health department.**
